Chairman's Foreword

hen I wrote in last year's Annual Report about our elite athletes making massive strides in the international arena, little did I imagine that a year later we would see them on the podium at the World Team Championships.

Yet that is exactly what happened in Kuala Lumpur in March as Liam Pitchford, Paul Drinkhall and Sam Walker won bronze medals, beating Germany and France on the way to a dramatic semi-final against Japan. The three of them really seized their chance and it was a fantastic performance which turned heads around the world.

All three have also earned a place in Team GB for the Rio Olympics – testament to the hard work they have put in to narrow the gap between them and rest of the world's best players. It was always part of our plan over the next 10 years to return to the top of the world game and the fact we have achieved this step forward at an early stage shows the potential we have in England. I know it has whetted the players' appetites to achieve even more.

You will read in these pages about other examples of achievement on the international stage, not only at Senior but also at Veteran, Junior, Cadet and Mini-Cadet levels. It is vital that we continue to support our leading athletes of all ages with the tools they need to succeed, whether physical, technical or mental.

The importance of elite athletes in developing any sport as a whole is not to be underestimated – think, for example, what the likes of Louis Smith have done to elevate the profile of gymnastics. They provide publicity and act as an inspiration not just for the next generation of aspiring athletes but by encouraging people in all walks of life to make sport part of an active lifestyle.

Recognisable elite athletes also help to make the sport marketable to television companies – and the fact that ITV4 broadcast live coverage of the closing stages of this season's PG Mutual National Championships is another important step forward for our sport and one we plan to build on.

Having said all of this, we must and will not forget that elite performance is only one part of our remit as National Governing Body. Our primary purpose is to create an increasing number of outstanding and exciting opportunities for everyone to enjoy and achieve in table tennis.

That means working in partnership with organisations including clubs and leagues, schools, workplaces, local authorities and other stakeholders to ensure that anyone who wants to play has the opportunity to do so, at whatever level they want.

Those partnerships are the key to the whole ethos of the organisation. We want to invest time, resources and support in

the People who make table tennis happen and the Places where it is played. If we do that, then the other two pillars upon which the future of our sport rests – Participation and Performance – are far more likely to be strong.

I'd like to close with two votes of thanks. First, to our army of volunteers, without whom we would not be able to deliver our vision for the development of our sport. My full message of thanks can be found on page 35 of this publication but I would like to state here again how grateful both myself and Table Tennis England as a whole are for their enormous commitment.

Secondly, my personal thanks to the company members who voted at the elections for Chairman, Deputy Chairman and Treasurer last summer, when myself, Susie Hughes and Keith Thomas were elected to serve in those posts for another four years.

I said at the time what an honour and privilege it was that the members had put their trust in us. All three of us are looking forward to three more years and will continue to do all we can to repay that trust.

Chief Executive's Statement

The last 12 months has been a period of evolution as we lived the first year of the Mission 2025 strategy, and it has been year of excitement and continuously challenging ourselves to improve our delivery and support to the membership.

It has also been a year characterised by consultations as the new Minister of Sport announced she was ripping up the existing strategy for sport.

Shortly before Christmas the Department for Culture, Media and Sport published the Government's 'Strategy for an Active Nation'. As had been widely anticipated, there is a greater emphasis on public funding being directed towards physical activity rather than sports for sport's sake. We were, however, very pleased to see that the outcomes the Government want delivered do go wider than just the current blunt tool of '1x 30 minutes of weekly participation'.

The strategy recognises the wider benefits of sport including physical wellbeing, mental wellbeing, individual development, social and community development and economic development. In the centre of the strategy the Government clearly states that it wants to see 'more people from every background regularly and meaningfully taking part in sport and physical activity, volunteering and experiencing live sport'.

Earlier this year we were involved in Sport England's consultation process for its strategy to support delivery of the Government's strategy. In May, Sport England published its document called 'Towards an Active Nation'.

Central is the vision 'that everyone, regardless of their age,

background or level of ability feels able to engage in sport and physical activity. Some will be young, fit and talented, but most will not. We want everyone to feel welcome, to find something in sport and activity that meets their needs and for the sector to value them as customers'.

This provides a challenge to the traditional core of a Governing Body although the need for us to maintain (and grow) our committed players and provide a better experience for them is recognised, albeit it is expected to cost the public purse less than previously.

However, there are also exciting opportunities in the Sport England strategy, especially for a sport like table tennis that is easily accessible, does not require expensive specialist equipment at entry level and can fit into the modern and busy lifestyle. Work is now under way to submit our funding bid for 2017-2021.

Away from looking into the next four-year cycle, we have experienced some exciting evolutions this year. The Senior Leadership Team was added to with the creation of a new Head of Workforce, Greg Yarnall, whose focus is supporting, development and growing the coaching, officiating and volunteering networks. We also include brought on board Mark Taffler as Head of Commercial.

We launched our new website in February and introduced a new dynamic direct e-mail system. We often heard that members want to receive more communication from us. The new system has allowed us to launch targeted newsletters for clubs, schools, counties and leagues as well as the monthly Over

the Net newsletter direct into the inbox of all members. The feedback so far has been positive.

In March we turned a corner in terms of modernising the sport's image and profile with the National Championships appearing live for three hours on ITV4. We announced a title sponsor in PG Mutual, who were great supporters of the event.

One of the most memorable moments was the on-court presentation of a framed compilation of photos to the World Championship bronze medal-winning team to a standing ovation and long applause. The achievements of Liam, Paul and Sam in Kuala Lumpur were phenomenal and as I write it has been announced that they are all on the plane to Rio this summer for the Olympic Games, the first time Great Britain has featured in the team event.

We must all ensure that this is a not a flash in the pan, but represents the early stages of a turnaround in fortunes for England and Great Britain. It has certainly started to catch the attention of the nation's media, which we must build upon.

We launched Loop this year, a brand for social and recreational table tennis which is a core Sport England-funded programme aimed at taking table tennis to where people are, rather than requiring people to come to where the sport is based.

Loop at Work is not reinventing the wheel. Workplace table tennis was very much part of the environment where table tennis thrived in past generations. But now, rather than relying on workplace social clubs and sports facilities, we are encouraging offices, factories and others to put table tennis right

into the heart of the workplace. With close to 200 workplaces engaged already, we believe this has the potential to be very successful programme.

Based on our own case study in the Milton Keynes head office, we have a thriving league competition and a lot of free play throughout the day. Members of staff who had never previously picked up a bat are now playing regularly and whenever any of our staff with coaching qualifications come near the office they are quickly tapped up for a quick coaching session.

I cannot finish my round-up of the year without paying tribute to two longstanding members of staff who left us this year. Rob Sinclair worked for the ETTA for 40 years, man and boy and was the key point of contact for administrative matters. On a personal note, Rob was a tremendous help to me as we took the Association through some huge changes in 2013/2104 and I remain very grateful that he then weekly commuted up to Milton Keynes from his home in Winchelsea for another two years. Rob is now enjoying semi-retirement, spending time with his family and other pastimes.

Secondly, Brian Skinner has also returned to working back down on the South Coast after 18 years of doing a sterling job of managing the Association's finances. The office 'Round the Table' trophy has been renamed the Skinner Cup in Brian's honour. We all wish Rob and Brian the very best for the future.

Finally, my sincere thanks to all the staff, Sandra and the rest of the Board, National Council and numerous other volunteers who are the heartbeat of our sport up and down the country.

Operations

t has been another exciting year of change and progress in the Operations team whilst importantly preserving and embracing the best of what has gone previously.

I would therefore like to start by thanking all the committees and individual advisers who form part of the Support and Advisory Network who have provided support and guidance throughout the year, a number of whom have provided reports below. A special thanks must go to the Trade Committee whose support for the organisation has been much valued. However, after a detailed internal review it was agreed that following the change in articles their role should be replaced by advisers and scrutineers. A special thanks must also go to John Freeman who retired from the Board of Appeal after 39 years, 22 as Chairman.

The staffing structures within the Operations team have also changed. In respect of staff, both Rob Sinclair and Brian Skinner have left the organisation. Rob has been an ever present in the organisation for 40 years and Brian 18 years and in both cases their knowledge, support and expertise will be missed.

We were pleased to welcome the membership team to the department, whilst the processing of our financial transactions were successfully transferred to Jockey Club Services, creating a more efficient and automated system. This has meant that we have been able to reduce our operating costs and allowed these savings to be moved from the back office to frontline delivery. The system successfully went fully live on 1st April 2016.

A new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system and coaching portal have been successfully tendered for and established this year. The CRM system is still going through development but has begun to create more effective, personal and relevant communications with the table tennis community, whilst the coaching portal has re-established links to coaches and has supported the growth in numbers of licensed coaches.

> Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Company for 2015 was held on July 11, 2015 at Milton Keynes, with 63 Company Members present or represented by proxies, as well as 36 others.

There were no propositions, however a discussion took place around affiliation fees which remained the same for a further year while a longer-term strategy was determined; the Annual Report and Accounts were approved.

> Board

The Board met four times during the year with a two-day meeting in December. All members attended meetings as follows. Elected Directors: Sandra Deaton (Chairman) – 4, Susie Hughes (Deputy Chairman) – 4, Keith Thomas (Treasurer) – 4; Appointed Directors: Simon Griew – 4, Phil Huggon – 3, Andrew Nixon – 4, Tom Purcell – 2, Kelly Skeggs – 4, Mike Smith – 4, Sara Sutcliffe – 4, Anna-Lisa Tazartes – 4 and Colin Wilson – 2. Doreen Stannard (President) also attended, as did Senior Management Team and, as needed, other staff as well as external guests.

Colin Wilson resigned from the Board and it has been decided to leave the role vacant until the new strategy for sport is

published by Sport England to understand its direction and where new skills may be required by the Board to support its delivery.

In its roles as policy maker and monitoring the executive activities, discussion topics covered included the revision of the coaching strategy and changes in the coach licence structure, club affiliation, a commercial strategy, major events strategy (which resulted in both a new format for the Senior Nationals, the Senior Nationals being televised and the successful bid for the European Youth Top 10 in 2017) and the Mission 2025, a 10year plan for table tennis.

The Board has also been busy forming responses and influencing both the change in the Government Strategy for Sport and the formation of the new strategy from Sport England. Importantly, these responses have had input from National Council, ESTTA, BTTAD and various other table tennis bodies.

The Board Standing groups – Finance, Operations and Risk chaired by Keith Thomas, Honours chaired by Sandra Deaton and Network chaired by Mike Smith – all met during the year, whilst the Review Groups, Commercial (led by Keith Thomas), Competitions (led by Sandra Deaton), Major Events (led by Sandra Deaton), Voting (led by Tom Purcell), Website (led by Susie Hughes) and Strategy (led by Sara Sutcliffe) have all met and presented views and papers to the Board to help drive the sport forward.

These groups usually included a mix of Board members, volunteers with relevant experience, senior staff and in some cases external advisers.

> National Council

National Council met four times during the year in its advisory and communications remit. It was chaired by Tony Catt during the year.

Reports were made by the Company Chairman and Treasurer, Chief Executive and Senior Management; National Councillors,

covering Development and Membership issues. In all, more than 100 volunteers apart from Board members were involved nationally in the Network. Ten Regional Committees with revised terms of reference concentrating on organising coaching and competitions while supporting development were operating, with the Regional Chairmen meeting in a Regional Forum. The South East region was split off from the South.

> Chief Executive and Senior Management Team

Sara Sutcliffe (Chief Executive) with her Senior Managers, Jonathan Bruck (Operations), Gerry Cronin (Marketing & Communications), Simon Mills (Coaching & Performance), Greg Yarnall (Head of Workforce) and Emily St John (Development) led the professional staff, taking immediate responsibility for the executive functions of the Company, working to implement policy decisions by Board.

> Rules Committee

A major task this year was the drafting of Anti-Corruption Regulations, as a precaution against the growing threat to all sports of practices such as match-fixing. Other regulations were amended with the object of simplifying them and of eliminating possible misunderstanding. Advice on rule interpretation was provided on request to the Board, committees and Affiliated Members.

> Disciplinary Committee

Two cases were determined this year, involving two quite different child safeguarding issues. The respondents were suspended permanently in one case and for at least five years in the other. We take the view that, even if there are extenuating circumstances, safeguarding the welfare of young people in the sport is paramount.

A case concerning a member yellow-carded at a competition did not reach the Committee as the Investigator did not find a case to answer because the member had already been adequately dealt with under the penalty marks regulations.

> Archives, Museums & Records Committee

The archive material that had been held in Milton Keynes have been moved to St Leonards-on-Sea. The increased storage capacity has been well utilised as Liverpool University informed the Association that it was no longer able to store all the material that had been held there for many years, over 50 boxes in all. This has been added to the store in East Sussex and is gradually being sorted and catalogued.

Research, record keeping and scanning has continued throughout the year and many queries from parties as far afield as the Moldova TTA and ITTF, as well as many personal enquiries from the public and staff, have been addressed.

The weekly Friday's Photos is proving as popular as ever with the number of views at times surpassing 1,000 hits.

Over the year we have received many additions to our collection: magazines, programmes and photographs as well as more personal items. Our thanks go to everyone who has contributed.

Thanks go to all the members of the committee for their work and contribution over the past 12 months.

> Board of Appeal

Board members and other invited colleagues then discussed matters arising from them.

Major discussion topics in presentations and groups included Children and Young People and Schools, Clubs & Volunteers, Anti-Corruption, Affiliation Fees.

This year has seen the National Council align with the board to enhance the transmission of feedback and guidance between the two bodies. The coming year will see the evolution of the National Council to enable it to establish its utility within the plans for table tennis development for the future.

> Support and Advisory Network

The previous committee system was transformed into the Support and Advisory Network set up in July 2014; a review in 2015 confirmed it was proceeding on the right lines. A total of 12 Committees continued to deliver national activities led by volunteers, for example County Championships and Rules, while 17 Individual Advisers supported senior staff in their work remits in Development and Operations.

During the year, a further three Focus Groups were organised

Marketing & Communications

> Website

Much-needed revamp of the main Table Tennis England website was carried out and went live in early 2016. This included a new, cleaner design and a reorganisation to make it easier for visitors to navigate their way around the website and find information.

It also made the website responsive to mobiles and tablets, which the majority of website visitors now use. The work was carried out in-house with minimal financial outlay relating to updating of existing software and website hosting fees.

In terms of website hits, March 2016 was the second most popular month for visitors since the former ETTA website was launched.

> Newsletters

The new Dotmailer communications platform was introduced in late 2015. This allows us to design more engaging newsletters and other communications and to deliver targeted messages to sectors of our membership, such as all coaches or all members of a certain age or living in a certain area. This will enable us to deliver relevant information to our members and stakeholders.

The Chairman's Newsletter was rebranded to Over the Net and delivered to all members via this platform.

Among other things, the platform was used to boost ticket sales to the PG Mutual National Championships and deliver postevent player and spectator surveys.

> Press and PR

Highlights of the year included:

- Three hours of live coverage on ITV4 during the final stages of the PG Mutual National Championships.
- Daily coverage on the BBC website during the World Team Championships.
- Coverage of National Table Tennis Day on Sky Sports News and across the BBC regional network.
- National Lottery film advertisement featuring table tennis, facilitated with help from the communications department and Deputy Chairman Susie Hughes.
- Table tennis feature included in the primetime BBC programme *How to Stay Young*, facilitated with help from VETTS.
- Paul Drinkhall appeared on the Danny Baker Show on BBC Radio 5Live from the PG Mutual National Championships, playing the *Sausage Sandwich Game*, which reaches an audience of approximately one million listeners.
- Paul Drinkhall appeared alongside his wife Jo and son Dougie on the BBC1 *Sportsday* programme in the wake of the World Team Championships.
- Coverage of various events and players in local media outlets around the country, including press and online organisations with combined daily readership of almost two million.

> Social Media

We continue to grow the number of people we engage with on social media and as of March 31, we had 9,389 Twitter followers (up from 7,728 the previous year) and 10,091 Facebook likes (up from 8,266). In the past year, just under 900,000 minutes of footage were watched on our YouTube channel.

During the World Team Championships, a total of 11 Facebook posts reached more than 142,000 people directly, plus countless thousands more as a result of posts being shared 445 times.

We have launched a LinkedIn account, primarily for B2B coverage, and an Instagram account in the last year and continue to monitor developments in social media.

> Events Coverage

We live-streamed coverage from all three National Championships, including tapping into the ITV4 footage on the final day of the PG Mutual Nationals before the channel was live on air.

The Communications team also attended two National Cup events, Inter-Regional Championships, selected Grand Prix events, the School Games, two ESTTA finals events and the Jack Petchey London Schools Championships.

Membership & Ranking



> Membership

his season has seen another busy season for membership renewals and at the time of writing we have reached a total of 30,267. At March 31, the total was 29,944.

This year saw the introduction of free Associate membership which has seen the figure for that type of membership rise to 3,830. This is a 44% increase on the figure of 1,674 in the 2014/2015 season.

A total of 14,186 joined online, representing 47% of the membership. That is a 2% increase on last year, although we aim to increase that to 75% by 2016/2017.

Memberships arranged direct through Table Tennis England Head Office stood at 7,449 or 24% – 2% less than last year. Via Agent, the figure was 8,886, at 29% the same as last year.

We also introduced the ability to pay membership fees by direct debit this season, with 820 members signing up to the direct debit scheme.

> Membership by age

> Membership by type

We currently have 2,866 Licensed members of which 735 are Veteran, 802 Senior, 535 Junior and 794 Cadet.

Player membership stands at 24,012 of which 16,291 are Veteran, 4,053 Senior, 1,393 Junior and 2,275 Cadet.

The number of Associate members is 3,830 of which Veterans number 2,092, Seniors 484, Juniors 222 and Cadets 1,032.

At the time of writing, the number of new members to have joined so far this season is 5,763.

We have a total of 203 registered leagues containing 6,024 teams at the time of writing.

> Ranking

With the introduction of the new Ranking system in 2014/2015 we are now into season two and we have nearly finished all the upgrades.







The system has still been met with positive feedback and with all the upgrades nearly completed it is now a lot more userfriendly for both player members and staff who have to input the 80,000 results per season.

Players who can view their audit trails have said this feature is a great addition as it gives them the ability to see all of their results throughout the season and is most definitely the best feature of the Ranking system.

So far since the beginning of the 2015/2016 season we have inputted a total of 58,306 results. December was the busiest period with 10,543 results, but on average the team input 6,500 results per month.

The last year has been hugely exciting in the area of Development with new initiatives launched and more people engaging in our programmes than ever before. This section will introduce our new 'Loop' initiatives, share successes of the Ping! project, the second National Table Tennis Day and our clubs and disability initiatives, as well as introducing our new children & young people offer.

> Loop

'Loop' is our new offer for the social table tennis player. It offers workplaces, non-table tennis sports clubs and universities the opportunity to purchase everything they need to introduce table tennis to their organisation at a heavily subsidised price.

Packages include tables, bats, balls, resources and training for Ping Pong Pioneers to help them get lots of new people playing.

> Ping!

It has been a record-breaking year for Ping!, the nation's biggest street festival, with an estimated ONE MILLION visits to its free table tennis tables.

When Ping!, the free ping pong festival, first exploded onto the streets of London six years ago, no-one could have predicted that by the summer of 2015 there would be a thousand free-to-play tables popping up in the public spaces of 19 towns and cities all over England, from Teesside to Penzance; and that the public would flock to play on them in their hundreds of thousands.

The Ping! website has a 'play on' feature where you can find places to play in formal and informal settings at www. pingengland.co.uk/#playon.

> National Table Tennis Day

The second annual National Table Tennis Day saw more than 200 events held in clubs, schools and workplaces around the country, with thousands of people involved.

Our national event was held in Nottingham City Centre with special guests Des Douglas, Kelly Sibley and Sam Walker and attended by Sky Sports News and the BBC, among others. More than 1,200 tweets on the day used the hashtag #TableTennisDay, reaching an estimated 4.7 million unique users.

The point of the day is to help raise the profile of the sport and to reach out to new participants, volunteers and officials.

> World Table Tennis Day

Our staff worked with clubs, workplaces and other organisations to facilitate participation events on World Table Tennis Day, organised by the ITTF to promote the sport around the world.

> Disability

The disability table grant scheme has helped 26 organisations supporting those with disabilities to introduce table tennis into their facilities.

The ability club support scheme has supported eight clubs to deliver projects to those with disabilities, which have to date engaged 172 new disabled participants. The clubs supported include Halton, Albert Premier, Deighton, St Neots, Knighton Park, Brighton, Generation 2 and Dorset.

The Wheelpower Spinal Injury Centre pilots has seen activity introduced to their Pinderfields, Wakefield and Salisbury centres. Informal coaching and activity sessions have been delivered to patients, with equipment available outside of the sessions and support given to link players into local clubs.

Development

Highlights from the 2015 project:

• Brighton's 'chef's frying pan championships' using cooking implements as bats.

• Newquay's 'longest rally with a flip flop' record attempt!



• The conversion of a vacant shop space in Plymouth, converted

into a 'Ping Pong Parlour' with eight Ping! tables resulting in 300-500 people a day playing and the discovery of a Syrian refugee who unveiled himself as the former national coach for Syria and became involved in developing gifted and talented players in the local area.

Table Tennis England staff have presented at the All Party Parliamentary Group for mental health, speaking about the benefits of table tennis. There is also a Table Tennis England mental health action plan outlining our steps to raise awareness and support this area.

Three disability awareness courses have been delivered in Milton Keynes, Middlesbrough and West Ham.

> Clubs

We have received applications from 167 clubs for PremierClub Affiliation this year and five fully completed Clubmark accreditation submissions, which were all granted.

The satellite project continues to be successful with us hitting our Sport England recommended targets.

An initial pilot was set up with four table tennis clubs delivering adult satellite sessions. These sessions were at Bishop Auckland TTC, Crewe Central TTC, Weymouth TTC and Cheltenham TTC.

Table Tennis England invested £2,758 in these projects and all of the projects had successful results and had drawn in new club members. These sessions were also said to be sustainable and are still running beyond our funding support.

After this initial success we extended this project to

PremierClubs in early 2016. We offered these clubs the opportunity to apply for up to £750 to run an adult satellite clubs session to attract a new audience and new members to the club. After an application process, on assessment we were able to grant 15 successful projects with a combined total of £10,186.

The Youth satellite clubs programme has continued and has funded PremierClubs to introduce new sessions for young people, engaging a total of 5,176 participants.

> Facilities Grants

Two dedicated multi-table club schemes were supported at Carlton Le Willows, working with Sycamore, and Nottingham University. Five improvement fund projects were supported, including Corby Smash, Age Concern Great Yarmouth, Swerve, Bishop Auckland and Heacham TTC, and 11 clubs were also supported to purchase more tables to enable more players to come to sessions.

> Children and Young People Initiatives

Our schools table and equipment offer launched in January 2016. The offer provides schools a simple route to access appropriate CONTINUED ON PAGE 12

tables, equipment and resources at great rates (cost covered by schools).

We also launched the schools grant scheme, enabling primary schools to apply for a grant to subsidise the pack. In the first three months the grant scheme supported more than 50 schools, with an additional 35 schools self-funding their own table packages.

Our new schools newsletter was launched in February 2016 and is currently received by

1,436 schools on our database.

The Jack Petchey Foundation Jack Petchev project focused on London and Essex has placed a further 308 tables into schools, alongside teacher training courses and



student competitions. A further grant for 2016/17 has been confirmed.

This year's programme has seen an extremely successful table donation scheme reaching 8,851 participants (6,858 new)

There have been 1,642 participants involved in the Jack Petchey London Schools' individual and team competitions.

The programme continues to grow year on year. We have been pleased to work with the English Schools' Table

Tennis Association on development of our strategy/initiatives. Thanks to both ESTTA and the Jack Petchey Foundation for their support throughout the year.

> Priority Zones

Priority Zone work has seen focused efforts in the locations of Plymouth, Bristol, Southampton, Oxford, Brighton, Croydon and Sutton, Tower Hamlets, Chelmsford, Leicester, Birmingham, Nottingham, Liverpool, Sheffield and Leeds. Following a rigorous selection process the appointed zones have received staff support to develop each zone and increase participation.

The activities launched in each zone depend on the needs of the area. Across the country these activities have included the development of new clubs, leagues, disability sessions, leisure centre sessions and social sessions, resulting in more than 7,980 over-16s and 3,813 under-16s playing in new activity.

> Premier League 4 Sport

PL4S continues to be a success, with high numbers of participants engaged throughout the programme. However, female participation in table tennis is the lowest across all of the sports and is something we need to address going forward. The end of Year 2 PL4S stats (from 31st August, 2015) showed

144 satellite projects being delivered by 28 football clubs engaging 6,436 young people, only 1,361 of these were females and of those females only 35 have been sustained to attending on a regular basis.

The PL4S Year 3 first quarter stats from 1st December 2015, show 116 satellite sessions being delivered by 28 football clubs engaging 2,761 young people since September 2015.

We ran a very successful national event on 12th March, 2016 at the Lighthouse in Birmingham, with 14 clubs attending what was a great day for all involved.

> Recreational Table Grant Scheme

The scheme was set up to allow organisations working with people aged 16-plus to introduce or expand provision of the game in social spaces, with the outcome of enabling more people to participate on a regular basis.

The scheme has delivered over 30 tables reaching more than 1,000 people. Organisations to benefit included community centres, trusts, colleges and bars. Moving forward, the scheme will form part of the Loop in the Community offer.

Please can I take this opportunity to say a big thank you to all clubs ,schools, volunteers and partners for all their hard work over the past year. We look forwarding to continuing to work with you all.

Workforce

> Staffing

There have been key changes to the staffing of the coaching and workforce team towards the end of the 2015/16 year. Simon Mills, who was previously Head of Coaching and Performance, now has a stronger focus on our talent and performance pathway and takes on the role of Head of Talent and Performance.

This enabled us to change the structure of the coaching team, which became the workforce department and will continue to lead on coaching but also now work with our volunteer structures across the whole of Table Tennis England.

As part of these changes, Greg Yarnall took up position in February 2016 as Head of Workforce, Miriam Beales has been replaced by Aled Howell as National Workforce and Education Officer and Sandra Pelizzoni continues in her role as National Coaching Co-ordinator.

> Coach Licence

This year has seen the introduction of the coaching portal, which provides a much easier system for coaches to manage their credentials and their continuous professional development. Coaches can now create their profile and manage their coaching qualifications through this system. The portal also enables us to communicate with coaches much more effectively.

It is important to emphasise that Table Tennis England see the coach licence scheme as an important way to ensure coaches continue to learn and develop, as well as ensure we are offering a safe and inclusive environment in our clubs and leagues across the country, which is why we ask coaches as part of their licence to keep their Safeguarding and First Aid certifications up to date.

The scheme also enables us to provide more support and tools to help coaches improve, such as the Winning Edge magazine and CPD opportunities free of charge. There are plans to engage with coaches even more in months to come to support them on their coaching journeys.

> Numbers

We now have 470 coaches who have purchased their coach licence, and this number continues to grow every week.

> Coaching course programme

There have been 27 Level 1 courses and five Level 2 courses run this year with a total of 315 coaches beginning or continuing their coaching journeys.

There have been challenges with the Level 3 programme and we are currently working closely with Sports Coach UK to ensure Level 3 courses are being offered in the 2016/17 season. We look

forward to welcoming coaches onto the course in the coming year.

We have begun work on redesigning our Level 1 and Level 2 programmes to ensure we continue to provide the best possible starting point and education for budding and existing coaches.

> Coaching workshops with national coaches

This year there have been three coaching workshops held at England Youth Development Squads with some of our national coaches delivering. These workshops are very important to us and will continue into 2016/17 and enable coaches to understand what the national coaches are looking for from our up-and-coming young players, in relation to the technical, physical and mental sides of the sport.

> Technical officials

As part of the new workforce department we will begin to work much more closely with technical officials. This work has already begun and we look forward to working closely with the all officials from across the country and providing a much longer update in the next annual report.

> Volunteers

A special thanks must go to all of our amazing volunteers who do such brilliant work in getting new people into the game and providing the right opportunities to keep existing players.

We are currently carrying out work on a volunteer's journey within a club environment to ensure we have the right support, resources and training in place so volunteers across the country feel valued, supported and proud to be involved in table tennis.

The Volunteer Awards are one way we aim to value and support our volunteers – a list of this year's winners can be seen on page 32.

Competitions & Events

The 2015/16 season has seen the Competition Review Group implement a number of changes to the competition landscape. This included a restriction to entries in the National Championships, the removal of National qualification events, a new name for the National Cup events, the introduction of a new Inter-Regional Championships and a Premier League for Sport event and prize money awarded to Women's British League.

The Senior National Championships, which this year were sponsored by PG Mutual, were a resounding success and a major achievement and step forward this season.

With a growing number of competitions to deliver, Martin Day was appointed in February to join Zach Ferris, Neil McGuigan and myself and bring the Competition and Events team to four staff.

> National Championships

Undoubtedly one of our biggest highlights this season were the PG Mutual National Championships which were shown live on ITV4 on the Sunday. The draw took place at Head Office and the video was posted on You Tube for everyone to watch.

Tickets were sold through the Ticket Factory and were a sellout for both Saturday and Sunday (prior to the event) with Friday tickets just £5 on the door.

Four disability categories were included as well as a test Men's Team event which added a new dimension to the event. Held at Hatfield, 32 men and 16 women were selected and invited to take part.

The University of Huddersfield hosted the Cadet and Junior National Championships on 30th April & 1st May which saw 98 players competing for nine National titles. A test team event was added this year, involving four boys' teams and four girls' teams.

The final National Championships of the season were the Under 10-13s, these took place in Preston in June. This season saw a change to the age groups – adding the Under 10s and removing the U14 age group. In total, 48 boys and 24 girls were selected for this event.

> Inter-Regional Championships

A total of 176 players from across 10 regions came together at Arena Sports Kettering in May for the Finals of this newly established event.

The team event took place on the Saturday with the singles on the Sunday, both events involved players competing at U11, 13 and Cadet age groups.

Points were awarded to the medal finishing positions at the event and the South West were crowned the overall champions. The 10 Regional qualifying events involved a total of 535 players competing in individual events.

> British League

Prize money was introduced for the top four teams in the Premier division of Women's British League.

Derby Arena played host to both Junior British League weekends and one of the Veterans' British League weekends. Due to its popularity we have now secured the venue for the next three seasons for both JBL and VBL. Next season VBL will be run alongside VNL at the same venue, ensuring a good atmosphere and allowing players from both events to socialise together.

A new divisional structure will be implemented next season for the Senior British League with the Premier Division moving to a home and away format rather than central venue.

> Grand Prix

This season the Grand Prix series visited Liverpool, Aldershot, Bristol, South Shields, Nottingham, Doncaster, Blackpool and London. Satellites were held in Cardiff, Sussex and Jersey.

Due to popular demand we had to restrict the number of entries for three of the events. Overall entries were up an average of 24 players per GP.

London attracted 286 players, which is the highest entry for a Grand Prix since 2009/10. Next season we have secured larger venues in order to cater for more players and it is great to see so many new players taking part in the series.

> National Cadet League and National Junior League

15 NCL and 14 NJL venues saw nearly 1000 players developing their match play this season. Many thanks to Mike Atkinson for his diligence in arranging the venues and enabling as many young people to take part as possible.

> Jack Petchey

The team event, involving 160 players, was staged at the University of East London in January with the individual event at Brunel University in June. Sir Jack Petchey himself, knighted in the New Year's honours list earlier this year, was on hand to personally congratulate players.

> Junior National Cup

This event, formerly known as the Junior Masters, took place at Milton Keynes TTC in March. We were able to enhance the event for our players by laying Taraflex flooring.

A new selection criteria was implemented this season which meant the top six athletes were invited from the ranking list with a further discretionary selection of up to four further athletes. Games were played to the best of seven.

> Cadet & Under-12 National Cup

South Gloucestershire & Stroud College played host to the Cadet & U12 National Cup. With the addition of the U12 age group, the event saw 35 players take part over the two days in February.

> English Leagues Cup Competitions

The Finals weekend on 11th & 12th June at Westfield TTC saw the culmination of this competition following the zonal rounds which were held in April. Many thanks to Diane Webb for her continued dedication to running this fantastic event for local leagues.

> County Championships

A total of 264 teams were represented across five age groups in the County Championships this season. A huge thanks to Les Smith and his committee for their continued hard work in ensuring that the events run smoothly.

> Technical Officials Committee

A huge thanks to Stuart Sherlock for his ongoing hard work and dedication as Chair of TOC, along with his fantastic committee for continuing to drive things forward for officials in England.

This season we were successful in qualifying three International Umpires - Derek Sidaway, Lyndon Griffiths and Nico Caltabiano. We also saw two new National Umpires qualify - Lester Smith and Kim Mudge - and 28 new County Umpires. Congratulations to all of our umpires.

The campaign for more Tournament Referees resulted in more taking the test paper. Those who qualified were - Janie Kirby, Malcolm Macfarlane, Nico Caltabiano, Sue Hayes and Richard Hudson.

The Tournament Organiser course is currently being refreshed and will be rolled out in the early part of the 2016/17 season.

Ben Johnson was awarded the runner-up 'School Games Official of the Year' in this season's Sports Officials UK National Awards presentation. Ben is one of the youngest qualified County Umpires at 14 and was chosen to read at the oath taking ceremony on behalf of all Technical Officials at the event.

> Tournaments Committee

This season Tournaments Committee have administered more than 100 applications for open tournaments and five centres have run tournaments for the first time.

The number of players entering tournaments is down by 200 against this time last year however there are still several tournaments to run.

The number of warnings issued is down against last year but four players have been sanctioned during the season for one month for receiving five or more warnings.

Our thanks go to Steve Welch, who continued his role as Chair of Tournaments Committee, and the rest of the committee who work tirelessly to support tournaments across the country.

> Calendar Working Party

Harvey Webb continued his role as Chairman of this committee and has worked tirelessly over the season to produce action-packed calendars that provide plenty of competitive opportunities for players. Work continues to make the calendars more user-friendly, many thanks Harvey.

> School Games

Manchester Tennis Centre hosted 86 athletes and 73 volunteers

Clubs represented at the event were: Newcastle, Tottenham, Aston Villa, Plymouth, Swansea, Stoke, West Brom, Arsenal, Hull, Manchester United, Wigan, Sunderland, Southampton and Blackburn, who were declared winners on points difference.

Desmond Douglas and Kelly Sibley were on hand to offer advice and tips and pose for photos, as well as play a scintillating exhibition match. Players had the chance to pose for photos with the Barclays Premier League trophy and enjoy the social area where they could interact with each other, play pool and Xbox games and less competitive table tennis.

> European Championship Qualification

The draw for the European Championship Qualifier events took place live on Laola1.tv on 27 November 2015. England's Men's team were drawn against Netherlands and Greece whilst the Women's team were drawn with Germany and Slovenia.

Matches will be played from the latter months of 2016 and with the final match in March 2017.

> Europe Youth Top 10

Table Tennis England were successful in their bid to host this event in September 2017 which will take place at Worcester Arena. We are excited to welcome Europe's best youth players and see our players compete on home soil.

> World Championships

he undoubted highlight this year was the outstanding result for the England men at the World Team Championships. A bronze medal was significantly beyond expectation going into the event and whilst the details of the performances will be covered in more depth elsewhere in this publication, the journey to these performances is as exciting as the result.

The men were promoted to the Championship Division the last time this competition was held and the initial objectives and expectations were focused on securing this promotion and remaining in the division. So a top-four finish in the group round was important.

The competition also was important for Paul Drinkhall and Liam Pitchford to secure sufficient world ranking points to safeguard their Olympic qualification and to support this these two players, with Alan Cooke and Sam Walker, travelled to Singapore for their preparation.

Just a few days before the competition, Andrew Baggaley was forced to withdraw with an ankle injury that

was to later rule him out of the National Championships. The selection panel felt the best option was for the team to enter with only three players and Alan available as a reserve should the worst happen.

The initial performances at the tournament against Sweden and France, whilst disappointing in the outcome, showed the players were improving and not far away from the performance standard required to secure the outcomes needed. Liam won against Kristian Karlsson to secure his first vital WR points and whilst Paul and Sam lost all their matches in these first games, they were close. The third match

three matches to wrap up the tie and ensure that England would finish no worse than fourth.

The next match was against Germany, who with Ovtcharov out through injury and an ill Boll, had lost 1-3 to France. The work behind the scenes continued to focus on 'staying in the moment' and being present and that, when all the players delivered this, then anything was possible. To support this, the talk of results and outcome was replaced with a conversation about delivering performances that the players could be proud of, whatever the result - in other words, controlling the controllables.

The rest of the matches continue the story from the early part of the competition, each player continued to focus on being present and delivering their performance(s) and along the way they all played at a level that surprised all those around them and delivered results not seen from England (or GB) players in many years. The key to these results though were the conversations and discussions off table where the focus shifted from being in the past or the future to being in the now.

The fact that each player had no option to rest and instead

had to play each and every match, meant that there was no opportunity to relax or become distracted and it is not a coincidence that, with the smallest team in the division, some of the best performances were produced. The clarity of purpose and simplicity of task was an enabler.

Finally, thanks must also go to the physio support that Freddie Murray provided to the teams at the event, which meant that all three men could recover from some of the longest games in the tournament and continue to perform the next day.

The Women's team also delivered some strong performances, headlined by Kelly Sibley, who delivered consistent wins

including several against players ranked much higher than her. Kelly's preparation - physically, technically and mentally enabled her to perform at a much higher level than in recent international competitions, most notably the disappointing performance at the 2015 European Championships.

Kelly was ably supported by improving performances from Tin-Tin Ho, who again won consistently, including a big win against Todorovic in a top of the group clash against Serbia.

The emotional toll on the players and staff after the tournament was significant and all three suffered in the months

was a must-win against Denmark and the players responded perfectly.

Behind the scenes the focus was on supporting the players to become more bulletproof, in other words delivering their best when it matters most. During this competition we identified the importance of staying 'in the moment' as the vital characteristic that would enhance their ability to be bulletproof.

Paul showed the improvements first in his match against Groth in the must-win match. Despite being close and showing huge progress, Paul lost. However, Liam and Sam secured the next

afterwards and took much longer to recover than originally planned, highlighting the importance of being physically fit.

The most abiding memory from this special tournament was not the individual or team wins or the medal ceremony, but the return to the hotel after the quarter-final match and the spontaneous ovation the players received from all the other teams when they arrived in the foyer.

> England Youth Squad

The England Youth Squad programme continues to progress and support players to make the jump to senior international standard.

This year has seen a shift from individual monthly sessions to fortnightly and whilst this is not able to replicate the daily training environment required by developing players, it is able to ensure that there is much greater alignment between the England Youth Squad programme and each player's home environment.

The current funding limitations continue to require each player to meet their own costs, although Table Tennis England is able to support a number of players to meet some of these financial costs through a number of initiatives including Sports Aid, Backing the Best, The Ivor Montagu Fund and Table Tennis England's own financial resources. Some players have also benefitted from local funding support, in part sourced through the performance team and some of which include the players local clubs.

Improving fitness support has provided all players on the England Youth Squad with a physical training programme and although some players are not doing enough physical training the importance of the players developing this part of their game has never been more important

> European Youth Championships

The performances from the teams at the 2015 European Youth Championships were again an improvement ,with the Junior Girls finishing seventh, Junior Boys 10th and Cadet Boys 15th, all having earned promotion within the tournament and thereby achieving the objectives set by the selection policy.

Tin-Tin Ho was unbeaten throughout the Team event, including defeating the No 1 and No 2 seeds from Romania. The defeat of Germany was also a huge highlight for the Junior Girls, especially given that Maria Tsaptsinos received an injury to her **CONTINUED ON PAGE 18**

shoulder, which prevented her playing several games.

Tin-Tin and Tom Jarvis also reached the last 32 of their singles competitions, as did doubles pairs of Alex Ramsden and Harry Dai and Helshan Weerasinghe and Tom Jarvis.

> Cadet & Junior Opens

Table Tennis England have supported a number of players to enter these events and a growing number are also choosing to build international competitions into their programme at their own cost.

This exposure is critical for players to learn the standards required and the evidence that England players are taking this into their training is through the results that players are attaining.

The highlight of these results was the Junior Girls Team winning the Italian Cadet & Junior Open, where Tin-Tin Ho, Emily Bolton and Kate Cheer surprised the Japanese women in the final. Tin-Tin also reached the singles final narrowly losing and picked up a doubles medal with Emily too.

The Notable Achievements section of this publication also highlights a number of other great results. Well done to all.

> Talent Development Centres

Following a successful Reward and Incentive funding application, Sport England has provided additional support to add another two centres to the existing seven. The tenders have been received and will be assessed once the new Talent Pathway Manager, Marcus Gustafson, starts in June.

This post is also supported by the new funding and will see each Talent Development Centre provided additional support and integration into the England talent pathway, with a growing emphasis on providing opportunities for athletes with a disability to enter the pathway and be supported through to the BTTAD programmes above.

Thanks must go to the significant number of volunteers in each centre who support and frequently enable the Talent Development Centre programme to operate.

> Commonwealth Championships

Table Tennis England selected a young squad to attend this event, the men led by David McBeath and the women by Tin-Tin Ho. Both teams won medals, with the men defeating top seeds Singapore to win silver and the girls defeating Wales to win bronze.

The singles and doubles events were less successful, although Tin-Tin reached the quarter-finals. Tom Jarvis, Alex Ramsden won their first senior caps and Helshan Weerasinghe and Maria Tsaptsinos their second.

Again, significant learning for the players included being physically fitter, staying in the moment and focusing on the performance not the result.

> European Championships

The highlight of this championships was Liam's last 16 result where a close match against European No 1 Ovtcharov saw him eliminated.

The first caps for Maria Tsaptsinos and Lois Peake were also positive, with both winning matches against higher opponents.

Disappointingly, however, both teams failed to make progress and fatigue and failure to prepare appropriately the likely cause of both.

> Olympics

The BTTF have nominated Paul Drinkhall and Liam Pitchford to represent Team GB at the Rio Olympic Games and Sam Walker to join them for the team event. Paul and Liam qualified by virtue of their world rankings – the first time two GB athletes have qualified this way since 1996 and the first time anyone has qualified by rights since Matthew Syed in 2000. It is also a first team qualification for GB. No female players were eligible for consideration.

> Paralympics

A total of eight English players were among the squad of 12 named by the British Paralympic Association to compete in Rio. The British Table Tennis Association for people with Disabilities is the governing body responsible for managing the Para programme.

able Tennis England has continued to have a strong working relationship with both the International Governing Body (ITTF) and the European Continental organisation (ETTU). We have had representation at the European Youth Championships (2015) in Bratislava, the European Championships in Russia, the European Youth Top 10 in Romania and the World Team Championships in Malaysia.

The European Table Tennis Union had their main congress in Russia. Both the Chairman, Sandra Deaton, and the CEO, Sara Sutcliffe, attended the meeting. There was more information on the qualification for the team events and the dates are now set with the draw completed. We will be promoting our home matches for both the men and women's team.

The ETTU Hall of Fame was also unveiled and English Table Tennis recognition includes Johnny Leach and Jill Hammersley (Parker).

In the European Congress held at the World Championships (Malaysia) we had full representation with the Chairman and CEO. It was revealed that the financial position of the ETTU was much stronger than anticipated and therefore they will be increasing the development opportunities for the member countries. Several of our young elite potentials and performance coaches have already benefited from the European development programmes.

Sara Sutcliffe had the opportunity to present our bid for the European Youth Top 10 event in September 2017. It was an excellent presentation and well received by the executive board of the ETTU. We were informed the next day our bid had been successful. The event will take place at the Worcester Arena.

Sandra Deaton remains as the chair-person of the ETTU Youth Committee and was present at both the youth championships in Bratislava (July 2015) and the Youth Top 10 in Romania (October 2015). She held a full meeting in Bratislava with youth committee members from other national associations as well as ETTU executive board representation and the secretary general.

Sara Sutcliffe remains deputy chair of the women's committee. All our other European Committee members remain in post. The congress in October 2016 will include new elections and the Board are in the process of considering the relevant nominations.

The Commonwealth Federation held their championships in India in December 2015. Simon Mills was the delegate attending the appropriate meetings.

The 20th Commonwealth Championships were staged by the Table Tennis Federation of India in Surat between 16 and 21 December 2015.

The Championships were very well organised and promoted. They were broadcast to more than 20 nations throughout Asia for six hours per day for five of the six days of the competition.

The Commonwealth Table Tennis Federation Annual General Meeting was held in Kuala Lumpur on 29 February 2016. One of Delegates at the Commonwealth Federation meeting in India

the main items on the agenda was a report from the Organising Committee of the next Commonwealth Games which are to be held in the Gold Coast, Australia, from 4 to 15 April 2018.

Table tennis is to be included on a very similar basis to Glasgow except that for the Gold Coast there will be disability events for both men and women.

The Commonwealth Table Tennis Federation has been asked by the CGF to produce a ranking system and this was agreed at the meeting in Kuala Lumpur and is now available on the CTTF website.

Currently there is no venue decided for the next Commonwealth Championships which are due to be played in 2017.

At the World Championships in Malaysia the Chairman and CEO attended the ITTF AGM. It was agreed that the chairman of the Athletes Commission, currently Vladimir Samsonov, should be a member of the ITTF Executive Board. There were numerous propositions, with many being defeated. Those agreed were mainly associated with the rules around equipment for events, however it was agreed for the ITTF to obtain insight into the height of the net with regard to different styles. It was also passed that from 1 October 2016 players may receive coaching advice at any time except in rallies, provided that continuity of play is not affected.

There is also considerable debate around the number of teams which should be included in the World Championships team event. It is becoming increasingly difficult to find host nations to cope with the numbers of players. The executive board have agreed on a significantly high-profile working group to discuss the options.

Our Chairman and CEO also attended the ITTF Development day which highlighted the significance of global increased participation. The ITTF are working on a "PING" project both from a development and marketing concept. As our association has considerable experience of the initial sport exposure we have offered to give support the international project.

There were also numerous meetings with other National Associations as well as a detailed discussion with the marketing and events department concerning the London Table Tennis Cup and future Pro-Tour events in England. Both our representatives once again had a personal meeting with the ITTF chairman Thomas Weikert.

Sandra Deaton was voted on to the ITTF nominations committee as a full member for a further two years, being the only female representative. She also had the great privilege of presenting the Swaythling Cup to the World Team Champions China, having previously watched with immense pride the England Men's Team stand on the world stage to receive their bronze medal.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The season saw a total of 236 teams entering the County Championships. Teams representing most counties in England and also some teams from our Welsh neighbours took part, ensuring it remains one of the most popular Table Tennis England competitions.

It was disappointing that only 16 counties entered all sections and that nine counties did not enter a Junior or Cadet team. There is still a shortage of girl and women players.

It has also been noted that as a result of the competition being held over only two weekends in the season and involving overnight stays, some players have found a conflict of commitments to families and so on. Following a request from the 2015 Annual Conference, next season matches will be staged over three Saturdays.

The Senior Premier Division was won by Sussex, with Middlesex taking the runners-up position - this was a reverse of their positions last season. Devonshire and Kent will be relegated.

Lancashire won the Junior Premier Division, runnersup being Hampshire, who had led until the final match. Glamorgan and Northamptonshire will be relegated.

Leicestershire took the Veteran Premier Division title, Sussex taking the runners-up spot. South Yorkshire and Berkshire will lose their places in the top flight next season.

Yorkshire retained the Cadet Premier Division for the third season, with Hampshire as runners-up, a repeat of last season. Cambridgeshire, Essex and Sussex are relegated.

This season the Over-60s' Premier Division was retained by Essex, with Oxfordshire in the runners-up position and Cheshire and Hampshire being relegated.

The administration involved by the volunteers is significant, but despite being a small committee, it continues to do its best to ensure all divisions run smoothly.

Thanks go to all who helped with the administration of the County Championships this past season and those who staged the Premier Division weekends.

he British League has made significant progress over the last 12 months.

The coming season sees the move back to home matches for the senior premier division, as well as a complete re-structure of the divisions in the senior event.

This is the most significant change in the British League, perhaps ever. It's a bold move that demonstrates the ambition of the British League committee and the confidence the Table Tennis England board has in the committee's vision. It is also very pleasing to note that the vast majority of existing premier division clubs have supported the initiative by signing up for the premier division already.

Due to the changes made to support the new home match format, no play-offs were held and North Ayrshire TTC and Halton TTC we promoted. These changes have also meant a large number of regulation changes, for which a tremendous amount of work has been completed by both the senior British League committee and the rules committee.

Next season's venues have been secured earlier than normal to provide a guide for geographic location of each division, this is in response to club feedback and it is hoped that with some of the mystery surrounding venue location removed, combined with the new pyramid structure, we will see an increase in entries this coming season.

This past season saw the introduction of doubles into the senior event following a close vote at conference.

The inclusion has been met with mixed responses and the future of the inclusion of doubles remains uncertain. The final decision will be announced at this year's conference.

The women's event under the stewardship of Amanda Robinson was a great success and offered prizemoney for the first time this season. Karen Tonge became the new referee following the

retirement of Gill Smith at the end of last season, plus recognition to Diane Webb for covering weekend one in Karen's absence. The organiser received very positive feedback from clubs and players this season following a number of improvements on the previous season.

The junior event was once again oversubscribed and required a play-off to determine the final 74 teams. The event was held at the new velodrome in Derby which, following a piece of research completed by Table Tennis England, will see this become the permanent home for the JBL for the next three years. The move to this bigger and higher quality venue will come at a cost, due to the increase in overheads.

The fee structure has also been changed to make the true cost of entering events more transparent for clubs, with the hope that when given the facts they will realise the current fee structure is necessary to ensure we provide first class facilities and equipment for each event.

The veterans also ran one weekend at the velodrome in Derby. Although the venue is big enough to incorporate the Veterans' National League (which has, historically, had to be run at a separate venue), on this occasion part of the arena was not available.

The general view of clubs and players was that the incorporation of the VNL

As a result, the Veterans' National League has been consumed by the VBL and all divisions will be played at the single venue. All regulations referring to the Veterans' National League will be removed. Gill Smith will receive additional support from the Table Tennis England competitions department to help with the additional workload caused by the amalgamation.

The press and publicity team worked tirelessly once again covering most of the events, my thanks to John Upham and Matthew Shaw.

Sadly, due to work commitments, we have now lost the services of Matthew Shaw, who will be extremely difficult to replace.

We are now looking to expand our team, so if you are interested please contact the British League Chair.

A tremendous amount of work has been put in by the British League committee and my thanks go to each member for their efforts over the past 12 months.

It has been a very busy but successful year for the British League and we look forward to the challenges that lie ahead. CHRIS DANGERFIELD

Financial reports



The year 2015/16 was the third year of the 2013/17 Sport England Whole Sport plan cycle. What is noticeable is that turnover has increased significantly with a marked escalation in expenditure to the frontline of the sport.

I am pleased to report that we are showing a surplus of £16,078 in a year where membership fees were frozen and some exciting and unexpected delivery took place. This delivery includes providing sufficient funds to support successful Olympic qualification and delivery of a new format for the Senior Nationals which were televised on ITV4 and reached an audience of 150,000.

The Performance programme continues to be self-funded but continues to go from strength to strength. This year was an exceptional year with two world championships taking place in one financial year, culminating in a bronze medal in the World Team championships.

Having delivered a new facilities strategy, Sport England re-introduced our capital funding, £375,000, which was utilised to deliver a number of exciting projects which varied from supporting the building of a new bespoke table tennis centre to new tables for clubs.

We continue to be vigilant with our operational costs, utilising limited funds to deliver the best service possible whilst saving money and moving it to frontline delivery. A new CRM system has been introduced, the impact of which has been felt with improved and more targeted communication. From the 1st April 2016 we outsourced our financial processing which will further reduce operational costs in 2016/17 and allow further funds to be moved to frontline table tennis delivery.

Based on its success, the Talent programme benefited from some additional two-year funding from Sport England, increasing the number of Talent Development Centres across the country.

Jack Petchey continues to support the Children and Young People and we continue to be thankful to the charity for its continued support, the effect it has truly impacts the lives of those who are supported by the funding.

Obituaries





Brian Brumwell: England international who made his senior England debut in February 1950, against Wales, playing alongside Richard Bergmann, Aubrey Simons, Ron Crayden and Diane and Rosalind Rowe.

Brian competed at World Championships in 1948, 1954 and 1955 and at the English Open every year between 1950 and 1963, reaching the Men's Singles last 16 on three occasions.

On his retirement from playing nationally, Brian became president of the Ilford & District Table Tennis League and was made a life member of Essex County Table Tennis Association.

Bill Moran: International Umpire and founding member of the AETTU, Bill had a long history in table tennis as a player, International Umpire, County Committee member and a member of many ETTA Committees. He was also a Table Tennis England vice-president.

He was a former National Councillor as well as treasurer of VETTS.

Bill qualified as a County Umpire in 1971, stepping up to

National level in 1975 and joining the International ranks in 1977. Bill was a member of the Grimsby, Cleethorpes & District TTA for more than 60 years.

Pam Mortimer: England international who made her debut against Wales at Bolton on November 26th, 1954 winning her one Singles and Women's Doubles matches in a 7-2 victory. She also played against France and Hungary.

She played in the World Championships three times (1954, 1955, 1959, the team finishing fourth in 1959.

In the Women's Singles, she reached the round of 16 in 1954; in the Women's Doubles the same stage in 1955; and in the Mixed Doubles the round of 32 in both 1955 and 1959.

In the English Open, she appeared every year from 1952 to 1963, winning the Women's Doubles with Ann Haydon in 1958. She reached numerous doubles semi-finals and the quarter-finals of the Women's Singles in 1955 and 1962.

Len Pilditch: Middlesex TTA stalwart, also a Table Tennis England vice-president, Len first qualified as a County Umpire in 1961, becoming a National Umpire in 1966 and attaining the International qualification in 1974.

He officiated at the Commonwealth Championships in Cardiff in 1973, the Welsh Opens of 1978 and 1987, the 1988 European

Youth Championships in Yugoslavia and the 1988 Paralympics in Seoul. Having qualified as a National Referee in 1971, his accolades included Deputy Referee at the World Championships in 1977 and Referee at the English Open in 1980, an event at which he was also Deputy Referee in 1970, 1971, 1976, 1978, 1979, 1982 and 1990. At the National Championships, he was Referee in 1972, 1973, 1975 and 1976 and Deputy Referee in 1978 and 1979, and Organiser in 1971.

He was also an ETTA English Championships and County Championships Committee member.

Harry Ward: President of Leicestershire County association. Leslie Forrest Memorial Trophy, 1996.

Sam Raistrick: President of Durham County association.
