# CRICKET FALLS INTO LINE

Table Tennis, although a minor sport compared with football, can give itself a quiet pat on the back, in that one of the major sports have now followed its example of doing away with the out of date distinction between amateurs and professionals, and calling everyone players.

We refer, of course, to cricket, which has now taken this step, which if universally adopted would do away with the mockery of "shamateurism."

Lawn tennis have talked on similar lines for the past three years but so far have received too much opposition from members of their International Federation.

However, now that cricket has made its decision maybe this will be the opening of the door.

The whole point is that sportsmen and sportswomen can no longer afford to take part in the style of old. They lose money by taking time off from work and to try and compensate themselves have been taking under the counter payment. The system has therefore been abused.

It was back in 1929 that Table Tennis decided to take its revolutionary step and also adopt a system of registered players, who can receive payments for coaching, exhibitions and attaching their names to commercial products.

### THREATENED SUSPENSION

It is curious that at the time when cricket should fall into line Table Tennis should run into a spot of trouble over the question of payments, with the threatened suspension of a player for accepting payment for a representative match.

Alan Rhodes claimed loss of time payment for

playing for Middlesex against the Rest, and was paid in error. This came to light when other players made similar claims.

Fortunately the trouble has been averted by Rhodes refunding the money he was paid, but it has had everyone wondering what it was all about.

The position regarding registered players is that they are not allowed to receive other than travelling expenses when representing a club, county, league, or country.

One can sympathise with the players, who lose time and money to take part in a representative event, particularly when that is being put on for television purposes. They naturally feel why should they be the losers for someone else to make the profit.

These television matches have been taking place in afternoons. If they had been in the evenings then the players would not necessarily have to lose time from work and there would always be the extra income of a "gate."

### OFFICIALS ALSO LOSE

And remember that without the players there could be no television. It is an awkward position, but the point is rules have been laid down and must be strictly adhered to. They are rules that were drawn up before the days of television so maybe the time is coming when the officials must review this whole matter.

It should be noted, however, that not all television matches make a profit, and that officials, too, are often out of pocket with attending meetings.

HUDDERSFIELD spirits, which rose like spring fever when they pulled off a men's and women's inter-league championship double, have fallen with the autumn leaves. The chill winds which blew the women to their first defeat in two years came from Dewsbury.

Unbeaten performances from Pam Bodrog—a Huddersfield star before marriage and motherhood—and Iris Senior helped Dewsbury to a brilliant 6-4 win.

Huddersfield men have been hit by their own new rule which bars from the team anyone with below 50 per cent appearances in the local league. It was a new-look line-up that travelled to Hull with Peter Clowes and Stuart Sykes joining Raymond Hinchliff and David Hirst. Although Ray was unbeaten they went down 6-4. Mick Sothcott did well for Hull.

Although Dewsbury women's team lost 9-1 to Leeds, Miss J. Green gave Di Wright (ex-Cheshire) a hard introduction to Yorkshire inter-league play by beating

her in the first set.

With Dewsbury men hoping for a return ticket to the top section, Barry Lightowler faced crucial sets with his team leading 5-4. Against Huddersfield "B" he overcame Ken Burgess to give them victory; but David Robinson (Bradford "B") proved too strong and that meant a draw.

A newcomer to the Bradford "B" team, Pete Flesher, won his first four

sets.

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# **Hole-in-Heart Twins**

SPORT'S best-kept secret has recently been revealed. The popular Essex table tennis twins, Beverley and Gloria Sayer, have been hammering their way to stardom for five years with a common disability. Each has a hole in her heart.

Why have they hushed up the truth? "We were determined never to let the condition be advanced as a possible reason for being beaten," said the girls with a single voice.

But no longer will these two girls play matches with the thought that their future active life may be affected by their condition.

They are making medical history by being the first set of twins to undergo the hole-in-the heart operation.

Gloria has already entered University College Hospital London, and Beverley will join her later this month. They expect to be in hospital about a month.

But they are determined to be back to peak form in time for the English open championships at Brighton in March.

Will the operations affect their playing performances? "They may have more stamina after the operations," said their mother, Mrs. Eileen Sayer. "And that should certainly be a help to them."

#### Coincidental

This is the first time in history that each twin of a set has had a hole in the heart. Doctors have assured the girls' parents that it is purely coincidental.

The girls' condition came to light by chance five years ago when Gloria was receiving treatment for a necvous condition. A cardiograph revealed her heart-hole; Beverley underwent an identical test, with the same surprising results.

"The doctors told us that the girls could continue to lead a normal life, as they were so fit," said Mrs. Sayer, "and it was about this time that they began to play competitive table tennis.

"But we were warned at the time that it might affect them between the ages of 30 and 40."

The twins entered University College Hospital for a series of tests in May, 1960, when doctors decided they would both have to undergo the operations. But there was no urgency.

The girls started playing table tennis—the ping-pong version—on the dining-room table at their home. Soon they persuaded their parents to buy a full-size table, and a dividing wall between the two reception

rooms had to come down to accommodate it.

To-day the front room of the Sayer home is bare, except for the table tennis table.

From their lounge at home the twins graduated to St. Mark's Club, Walthamstow, which produced so

He won the singles at Birmingham, the doubles at Merseyside, and the doubles again at York. At Merseyside, where he reached the semi-final, he had wins over Derek Baddelev and Jeff Ingber, both ranked players, before going out to Mike Symonds.

He has steadily improved with each tournament since starting in the Sussex open, where he lost to Khana in the groups. He moved on to Hull, where he reached the quarter finals, then to Merseyside, Birmingham and York, with titles at the last three.

Tomlinson, who is a newspaper agent, working on the distribution side, has relatives in this country, but has come here primarily to play table tennis and to take part in the world championships in Prague next April. It is his first visit to Europe and by the time he returns home he estimates it will have cost him around a thousand pounds

He has been playing at the Putney Club and has also joined the Wembley Institute.

Tomlinson was New Zealand champion in 1959 and has been runner-up for the past three years.

Two other New Zealanders over here are Joan Brown and Jeanette Crosby, who will represent their country in the Corbillon Cup. Miss Crosby travelled over on the same ship as Tomlinson. She ranks No. 9 in New Zealand.

### JACK CARRINGTON'S NOTEBOOK

# **COACHES MUST HAVE** AN OPEN MIND

ENTERTAINING though it might be to follow John Corser into the higher flights of "debate on definitions," it is time now to revert to more practical use of our limited space.

Those who try to put a little system into our thinking, can easily be labelled "dictator"; those who like to air their individualistic views can easily be labelled "crank." In all things a sense of proportion is essential.

In fairness to the workers in the E.T.T.A.'s official Coaching Scheme, I can confirm:

- 1. Our syllabus papers and our opening lectures emphasise repeatedly that the Coach must have an open mind, and must continue to learn.
- 2. Our instruction gives no preference to any bat-covering materials, in fact no distinction is made except to assist the Coach to understand the capabilities of each type.
- 3. Our instruction gives no direction about bat-holding styles, exceptagain—to encourage Coaches to understand their capabilities. Our latest syllabus actually classes them as "2-sided" or "1-sided" Grips—a definition which surely covers a multitude of styles,
- 4. Our technical instruction gives no preference to any particular strokes or tactics. Instead, emphasis is placed on the efficiency and control of arms, feet, body and brain.

- 5. Tactics and strategy are discussed for wider understanding. Their application our Coaches are told, depends on personal characteristics, and circumstances.
- Because E.T.T.A. Coaches are our "missionaries," they are trained to work with groups, and in crowded or cramped conditions. They are encouraged to develop from the groups, some of each style of play. Only occasionally do we find a "penholder" or "one-sided" aspirant for fame. one-study aspirant for lane. If enough interest is shown anywhere, such a specialist group can be developed within our scheme. Any inquiries?

A MONTH or so after the President of the Board of Trade had visited Skopje, capital of Macedonia, for an International Trade Fair, an English team of table tennis ambassadoresses arrived in the same hall to take on the best women players of Europe. Despite the depressing registration letters of the aircraft in which we travelled —YU ADM and YU ABF—our team appeared in two finals, Di Rowe in the singles and Lesley Bell, partnered by Isle Lanterman, of W. Germany, in the women's doubles.

A match against East Germany was arranged while the men's team event took place and resulted in a 3-2 win for England.

Di Rowe and Mary Shannon, our European champions presented themselves at 8 a.m. the following morning to compete in a field, which included Alexandru and Pitica, of Rumania, the world champions, and Foldi and Heirits, the strongest pair from Hungary. A walkover was a poor reward for this early rising and three hours later the girls had been eliminated by the Czech pair Luzowa and Bosa in their first match, although we led 16-10 in the first two games. Even a 10-4 lead only enabled us to scrape the third at 19 and the fourth was lost at a similar score. The Czechs played wonderful attacking table tennis and hit themselves out of trouble against our pair, who failed to press home their advantages.

Meanwhile, Bell and Lanterman had disposed of the experienced Zeller (Rumania) and 14 years old Poor, the latest Hungarian star. An 18-15 lead in the first game disappeared suddenly but from then on the Anglo-German combination kept the ball in play by devious methods and ran out easy winners. They followed this up by beating the second Yugoslav pair Mitovic and Petra 3-0 to reach the semi-final against Luzowa and Bosa. The match was played in the early evening of the following day and our hopes of a final placing were very slim, but we were pleasantly surprised to see that the Czechs could not produce the rhythmic hitting which had overwhelmed our top pair.

The Lanterman jab and the Bell push and prod reduced the Czechs to mediocrity in the first, despair in the second and panic in the third for Lesley to reach her first big tournament final.

### WORLD CHAMPIONS BEATEN

In the other semi-final the world champions were eliminated rather easily by Foldi and Heirits and once again everybody expected that our pair would be annihilated in the final.

The Hungarians started very casually but at 10-3 down they were reduced to pushing desperately and were fortunate to take the game at The Anglo-German pairing,

arranged by Di Rowe in Holland the previous week, came back strongly to take the second and held level until after 10 in the third but then collapsed. The match was apparently fizzling out when the Hungarians took a seven-point lead in the fourth but amid roars of encouragement from the crowd, the Hungarians were pegged back to 17. There the fairy tale ended and they collected the next



# Referee Waived the Rules

THE Sussex Open at Hastings on October 27-28 attracted its usual entry, including most of England's ranked players. But it is doubtful if 25 per cent. of them would have been allowed to compete if the referee had adhered rigidly to the rule concerning dark coloured and non-reflecting rackets.

This is a problem that has confronted the referee at every open tournament I have attended this season. And no referee is going to sabotage his own tournament with wholesale disqualification of the rackets.

The players are also confused. They claim that there has been no complaint about their racket at other tournaments or even international matches. It is a tricky question and I am wondering whether some form of colour chart could be used to assess the eligibility or otherwise of rackets.

Ian Harrison, making his first open tournament appearance of the season took the men's singles, while Diane Rowe won the women's title for the third successive year. Both went on to take three titles each. Harrison won the men's doubles with Brian Wright, Miss Rowe took the women's with Mary Shannon, and they combined to win the mixed.
