30th WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Shigeo and Toshiko take over

JUST as effectively as by the use of a karate chop, Japan's 24-years-old Shigeo Ito silenced the rhythmic clapping and frenzied chanting of "Schöler, Schöler" by a near-fanatical Bavarian crowd when, in the Eissporthalle, Munich on April 27, he came back from a 0-2 deficit to win the men's singles crown.

20-19 stood the score in Ito's favour in that dramatic third set when Eberhard Schöler came nearest to justifying the precautionary measures taken by the organisers in having thirty pistol-packing policemen rushed into the hall.

As the snow—so much in evidence earlier in the championships—had melted, so too did the uniformed

custodians of the peace for in the two subsequent games the Federal German champion slumped to a degree that, in the fifth, 9 pts. was the sum total of his beleaguered resistance.

Unashamedly the tears rolled down Ito's cheeks as he took his exalted position on the rostrum and to the credit of the German onlookers—they had so much willed their champion to succeed—their applause was generous indeed.

But one was left, however, in wonderment as to what volume of noise the roof would have withstood before parting from its shackles had Schöler won!

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WHERE ANGELS FEAR TO TREAD'

A damaging effect on the prestige of the E.T.T.A. abroad was the gate crashing that went on by English supporters at the 30th World Championships in Munich.

Under psuedo journalistic accreditation, or by complete subterfuge, our number were legion in places where the majority had no real business to be albeit the motivating force being occasioned by the in-adequacy of the foreign travel allowance.

Genuine members of the Sports Writers Association were initially denied access to the inner ring because of the congestion caused by people-not only English-whose presence at the barrier surrounds was selfishly considered to be their divine right.

Security precautions were such that at the outset English players had difficulty in getting back into the arena if only vacated for the purpose of answering the calls of nature.

But, by hook or by crook, the barriers were thronged by the Toms, Dicks and Harrys adding to the distress and discomfort of those with a genuine job of work to do.

I.T.T.F. CONGRESS in the F.T.T.F. Standing Orders Committee recommended the appointment of Folia Clarest as secretary of the IN MUNICH

A special report by Conrad Jaschke, Chairman of the E.T.T.A.

NO less than 60 countries were represented in person, plus seven by proxy, at the two sessions of the I.T.T.F. Congress in Munich last month, making this the largest ever gathering of associations in the history of the international body.

I.T.T.F. membership has risen from 47 in 1950 to 94 in 1969.

Far reaching proposals put before Congress by the E.T.T.A. were well received, and most were either accepted or referred to the Advisory Committee for consideration. A large part of the first session of Congress was in fact taken up by discussion on the E.T.T.A. proposals, and it was gratifying that the most important of them, increasing the limit for prizes in cash or kind from 75 Swiss Francs to 1250 Swiss Francs (say £100) was carried by the unexpectedly big majority of 88 votes to 30, with a few abstentions (each country having two votes).

In putting the case to Congress, I pointed out that unless a more realistic upper prize limit was agreed it was virtually impossible for associations to prohibit players from participating in events staged by outside promoters even when these clashed with official events. Since we expect from top players a standard which can only be reached by continuous practice and training which are not compatible with the fulltime job, it was not unreasonable to give players the incentive of worthwhile prizes for winning important titles.

Prior to Congress, it had been thought that the E.T.T.A. proposal stood no more than a 50/50 chance and the large majority vote may well have been due to the fact that outside promoters have recently been running tournaments for money prizes offering around the £100 mark, in a number of countries. Under the new rule official governing bodies will now be able to bring such tournaments (to which some have been turning a blind eye) under official auspices, and co-operate with promoters to the benefit of all concerned.

There will be a proposal put to the National Council to allow Spaldings (the London firm of sports goods manufacturers) to give a £100 cash prize to the men's singles winner of next season's English Open, but it does not follow that there will be such large prizes authorised for other open tournaments—this indeed is a matter to be discussed with tournament organisers before a decision is

England fared extremely well in the attempt at better representation on international committees. I was fortunate enough to gain one of the seven places on the Advisory Committee decided by secret ballot from a field of 21 candidates, thus giving England two members on this key I.T.T.F. management body, the other being Bill Vint who was re-elected Hon. Secretary of the I.T.T.F.

The I.T.T.F. Standing Orders Comof Colin Clemett as secretary of the Rules Committee, Johnny Leach as a member of the Classification Committee, Ron Crayden as a member of the Equipment Committee, Laurie Landry as a member of the Junior Commission, and myself as a member of the Standing Orders Committee itself. These proposals were accepted by Congress thus giving England its best representation on key committees for many a year. Bill Vint continues as chairman of Standing Orders Committee, but all the other appointments were new.

The E.T.T.A. view that the time had come when paid staff was essential to further I.T.T.F. progress was accepted, and an emergency resolution doubling membership fees was agreed by overwhelming vote, in order to finance this new development.

Surprisingly the I.T.T.F. leader-ship put before Congress a proposal to charge an approval fee of £250 for each ball trademark bienially instead of the nominal testing fee charged previously. One would have expected countries to be given ad-vance notice of this amount instead of having it sprung on delegates at Congress, and certainly Walter Mitton and I would have liked guidance from our own National Council on this point. Whilst presumably one would agree to the principal of the I.T.T.F. receiving an approval fee, the amount is high when one considers that some countries put forward as many as four or five different balls, each of which will attract the £250 levy, and this is a matter we shall be discussing with English manufacturers.

It was decided to examine the possibility of the use of yellow balls, now that it has been pretty well established that there are substantial advantages in their use. English players will also welcome the I.T.T.F. decision to conduct random tests on balls by purchases in shops, so that future approval will depend on overall quality, not only on tests carried out on specially selected balls.

Congress condemned the action of the South African Government in once again depriving members of the South African Table Tennis Board from participating in the world championships by refusing them travel

It was good to see Ivor Montague, he I.T.T.F. Founder President, pay a flying visit to attend the Corbillion Cup finals.

Roy Evans (Wales) and Ake Eldh (Sweden) were re-elected President and Deputy President unopposed, and on Bill Vint relinquishing the post of Hon. Treasurer Jean Mercier (France) was elected on a ballot by a large

LIVERPOOL'S JIM GREEN A TRIBUTE

NO one on Merseyside more deserved the psuedonym of "Mr. Table Tennis" than Jim Green, even if, as far as I know, it was never conferred on him. The game which, in his youth, had been his recreation became, particularly in his later years, his life.

Marc Antony's words about Caesar -"he was ambitious"-could well be applied to Jim Green, but there the similarity ended for in him 'twas not a grievious fault. Of all his ambitions connected with table tennis only one was personal-to complete 40 years association with the Liverpool League, and fate was unkind enough to rob him of that by a mere fortnight.

All his other ambitions were impersonal. He was to see table tennis rise to new heights in Liverpool and for the league to become a real power in the table tennis world. He wanted to see Liverpool produce players who would be ranked among the best in the country, and he wanted to see his own club win some of the honours of the league.

Jim Green first became associated with the league in 1929 when he joined the Pastime Club in Crosby when the league was still a puling infant being nurtured by Les Forrest. In the intervening years he became a member of several clubs but it is with Linnets, which he helped to form, that his name will always be linked. It was his baby; he gave it almost everything he had and he was the driving force behind it. I have even seen him take up a bat when a team was a player short and play in a match when he should have been at home in front of the fire with his

It is no exaggeration to say that Jim Green gave his life to table tennis, particularly in the last 20odd years. He had been player and club secretary for many years before he became a member of the league's Management Committee, editor of the 'Digest,' inter-league match secretary and keeper of the records. I have not the slightest doubt that he could have joined the Management Committee much earlier than he did had he not refused, on several occasions to accept nomination,

For many years he felt that he could do more for the game by being unfettered and free to speak his mind. And speak it in forthright terms he did on many occasions, and although one might not always agree with his views one had to appreciate the sincerity which lay behind them.

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

AS a follow-up to winning the Girls' Team championship, and the Boys reaching the final of their Boys reaching the final counterpart event, at the Marine Pavilion, Folkestone over the weekend of April 3-4, England's Juniors made a good impression in the in-dividual events of the English Junior Open. Reaching four of the five finals and winning two was a first class effort.

Jill Shirley was steadiness itself, moving the ball all over the table and picking out some lovely hits, she won a nice struggle with Sweden's Lena Andersson, saving game points in the 2nd.

Trevor Taylor, whilst not reaching the final of the Boys' singles, took part in a match with the eventual winner Yosef Dvoracek, which brought all play to a standstill. These two played and placed the ball with aggressive table tennis in rallies that never seemed to end.

A 19-16 lead in the first seemed to disappear as Trevor tried to make the winning shot, then a tremendous fight back from 18-20 in the second and an eventual levelling at 26-24 gave him the initiative. But Dvoracek had that final burst of power as he caught Taylor from 13-17 and 19-20 to win the match—the best junior one that I have ever seen.

Susan Howard gave Jill Shirley admirable support to take the Girls' doubles from 18-20 down in the third but Taylor and Jill could not make it in the Mixed final after 2 days of exhausting table tennis.

Tony Boasman and Alan Fletcher showed what a regular partnership can do but in the final, the Swedish opposition were really too strong but well done all the same.

With 4 boys and 4 girls in the quarter-finals this was a terrifi all-round effort and England won an unofficial team points competition based on team events: Winners 10, Runners-up 7 and semi-final 4 with 7, 4 and 2 points respectively for the individual events.



STOP BEING COY

Surely it is time the E.T.T.A. s'opped being so coy about the list of players known officially as a Seeding List and popularly as a Ranking Of course, we all know that the primary purpose of the list is to guide Tournament organisers on Seeding. However the vast majority of players regard it as a Ranking List | Watford, Herts.

because it is generally reckoned that the criteria for a Ranking List must necessarily be the same as for a Seeding List. In the absence of an official statement to the contrary this view must continue to prevail.

In my opinion the only possible excuse for a difference in criteria is in the case of a player who has International results which are very much at variance with his home tournament results. However these cases are fairly rare and judgement about hem (as with all selection) is highly subjective. It would seem preferable herefore to judge performances as a whole except when required for a specific occasion, such as a match.

The present unsatisfactory situation inevitably invites the conclusion that he Selection Committee have not the courage of their convictions. It is auch better for the morale of the players that they know how they are regarded by the Selectors. Of course, there will be mistakes, but if the Selectors are frank there is less likelihood of these being attributed to bad faith or prejudice than under the present dubious system.

NOT EDIFYING

It is never an edifying sight when a chairman has to answer, through your columns, a letter from a member of his own committee; however, the views propounded by Mrs. Archdale in her letter to you last month do such disservice to so many thoroughly competent referees throughout the country that, coming from a member of the Umpires and Referees' Com-mittee of the E.T.T.A., they may be construed as in some way representing at least a line of thought on that committee. This is not so. Not only are they Mrs. Archdale's own views, but the suggestion that referees for all tournaments and matches should be National Umpires has been specifically repudiated by the committee.

Nobody can have more admiration than I have for those who achieve the National Umpire qualification, but the only thing that an umpire and a referee have in common should be a thoroughly detailed knowledge of the laws of the game. That an umpire is competent to handle a match actually on the table is no more a guarantee of his ability to organise a fournament and deal with the particular problems peculiar to refereeing; than is brilliant refereeing ability an assurance of even mediocre umpiring standard. To become a National Umpire requires at least three years umpiring experience some of which must be at National or International level. Many referees have neither the interest or time for this and, while I hope that it may not be too long before we can prepare a syllabus upon which to base a qualification for referees, I do trust that we shall in the meantime continue to have the benefit of the services of those many hard working referees, whether they have an unipiring qualification or not.

SWAYTHLING CUP TREBLE FOR KOHNO

Swaythling Cup (men's team championship) Japan were much indebted to Mitsuru Kohno whose treble accomplishment in defeating the Federal German trio of Schöler, Jansen and Leick was worthy of high

After accounting for Jansen in the opening set, Kohno's most telling win came in the fourth when he was opposed by "Ebby" Schöler with the match score 2-1 in Japan's favour.

Had the ace German defender been

IN retaining their hold on the able to subdue the Jap champion, waythling Cup (men's team chambionship) Japan were much indebted winning the second 14, the uplift to Mitsuru Kohno whose treble Jansen's morale in the final set could well have resulted in the title staying in Europe.

But it was not to be as Kohno stormed home in the decider and, again, after Schöler had beaten Hasegawa to narrow the Jap lead to 4-3, it was Kohno again who denied Jansen that final throw of the dice when he beat Leick for 5-3 victory.

By comparison, the Corbillon Cup final was a drab affair with victory going to the Soviet Union whose Zoya Rudnova and Svetlana Grinberg were never extended to a deciding game in beating Rumania's Alexandru and Mihalca 3-0.

But what of England's teams under the bright lights of Munich's Ice Stadium?

Our men improved their position from 8 to 6 and to No. 4 in Europe and if any one man should take the credit it should be Alan Hydes who blossomed into a world-class player despite the cold winds that, in the first few days of the championships, blew in with fierce intensity.

RARELY EXTENDED

In the initial Group A5 matches, our players were rarely extended and in beating Norway, Guernsey and Iran only two of the 15 sets involved went to three, Wright and Taylor dropping second games to Schierning (Norway) and Iranian champion, Bozorgzadeh, respectively.

Through the withdrawal of North Korea and Rumania, the correspond-ing "B" Group became a much weaker section which enabled both France and Ireland to achieve placings they could hardly, otherwise, have dreamed of.

However, England were assured of a place in the last 12 but seemingly very little above it on the evidence of their first two matches.

Disappointing indeed was the opening 1-5 loss to Yugoslavia for chances were frittered away both by Neale, who led Stipancic 11-4 in the third, and Barnes, who led Surbek 13-8 in the decider. Young Taylor found the decider. Young Taylor found this company much too hot and lost his place to Hydes in the next match against Japan.

Again we went down 1-5 but Neale, who had beaten Korpa in the Yugoslav match, played brilliantly to account for Kohno in straight games and only went down to Hasegawa 17-21 in the third.

Barnes was completely without fire but there was enough "smoke" from Hydes bat to cause captain Leach to note his potential in the top flight.

INCLUSION JUSTIFIED

The 5-4 win over Hungary brought the Yorkshire No. 2 into real promi-nence for the match became "his" when, with the score at 4-4, he defeated the more experienced Istvan Jonyer to give England their narrow victory.

With the score at 2-4 in Hungary's favour, Neale lost the first game to Klampar and trailed 14-18 and 18-20 in the second. At 3-4, Barnes was down 6-12 to Börzsei in the third, but again defeat was averted and Hydes was given the opportunity of steering the ship into calmer waters with scores of 14 and 11 over Jonyer.

Yet another 5-4 victory followed and Hydes became the master of all he surveyed after beginning with an astounding 14, 9 win over the English Open champion, Stanislav Gomozkov of the Soviet Union.

In the vital decider against Vardonjan, with the match score again at 4-4 and after winning the first game 15, the Yorkshireman trailed 16-20 in the second but dug in to win game, set and match.

Barnes fought and played much better than he did against Hungary beating Gomozkov and Sarkhojan. Despite a fall-off in form Neale, as usual, fought tigerishly and played his part in subjugating Vardonjan in convincing manner.

Both Neale and Hydes were stood down for the final group match against Denmark won, impressively, with Taylor and Wright accounting for the Danish champion Niels namberg—the former with a second game score of 2!

Anti-climax came in the play-off for ifth or sixth place against Sweden. It resulted in a 1-5 loss which, to say the least was disappointing with Neale scoring our only win against Bo Persson.

Hydes put up a tremendous fight against kjell Johansson but Barnes was well below his best. The reverse esulted in our being placed sixth our above such countries as Russia, Czechoslovakia and Hungary - no mean feat.

SAME AGAIN

Again in the final of the women's singles it was Japan versus Germany in the persons of 21-years-old Toshiko Kowada and, from behind the "Wall", Gabriele Geissler.

Nosing home 22-20 in the first game was the limit of the East German girl's successes for she too, from then on, took the downhill path in losing the next three, -8 being her fourth and final game score.

Both defeated finalists had, however, been involved in tremendous semi-final encounters which had stretched to the limit of five long and arduous games.

Geissler, for example-with the score at love-all after 15 minutes of her opening game with Niho Hamada won 22-20 in the decider of five all played under the expedite rule !

Schöler too, after going into a 2-0 lead over Tokio Tasaka failed to contain the 21-years-old Waseda University student in the next two but strove anew for final success in the fifth.

Swedish holders Hans Alser and Kjell Johansson retained their men's doubles title-captured in their native Stockholm—by overwhelming Tasaka and dethroned singles champion Nobuhiko Hasegawa whose defeat in the singles was accomplished by the young Yugoslav Anton Stipancic.

FIRST TITLE

Russia took their first world individual title-the women's doubleswhen Svetlana Grinberg and Zoya Rudnova withstood the challenge of Rumania's Maria Alexandru and Eleanora Mihalca to win 21-14 in the decider

And, with his new partner Yasuko Konno, the irrepressible Hasegawa turned up trumps again in the mixed doubles with a final victory over compatriots Mitsuro Kohno and Saeko Hirota.

Back now to the more notable happenings, otherwise, in the men's singles where two qualifying rounds, in which the winner of the "A" versus "B" match next played "C" versus "B" match next played "C" Certainly it appeared so as the Karenza for a place in the first round proper. Barnsley left-hander levelled the set victorious

Alone of England's quintet, Alan Hydes was involved in the opening skirmishes and from the ''C'' position easily disposed of Bulgaria's Totor Beschowischky who had previously beaten Bert Schoofs of the Netherlands.

All five Englishmen, therefore, answered the starter's gun in the first round with Brian Wright our only faller who, surprisingly lost to Luxembourg's Gaston Krecke, -13 in the fifth, after pulling back a 0-2 de-

The sad ousting of the Middlesex player was in no way compensated by the subsequent second round the subsequent second round slaughter inflicted on his victor by Jaques Secretin of France.

Denis Neale, with a 3-straight win over Zvi Zacharias of Israel; Chester Barnes and Trevor Taylor no more extended by the Turks, Saban Selahattin and Osman Vardar; and, fourthly, Hydes with a like success over the French No. 2, Danny Dhondt, all got through to the second round and into the last 64.

DISASTROUS ROUND

And what a totally disastrous round it proved to be for England's representatives, although in all fairness it must be emphasised that the draw, made by computer, was most unkind to our players.

Neale was called upon to play Hasegawa, the defending champion, and well as the Yorkshireman played it was not good enough to account for the bouncy all-action Jap.

Barnes too went out to Kohno, the defeated finalist in Sweden, although the Essex player did manage one game but his one swallow did not make a summer.

Young Taylor took the opening game from Loka Purnomo of Indonesia but thereafter lost the next three, albeit 20-22, desperately, in the fourth.

Question now was whether Hydes could again "come good" as he had done in the team championship matches against Hungary and Russia?

score at 2-2 with a 24-22 win in the fourth over Hungary's ace "chopper" Janos Börzsei.

Expedite was introduced at 22-21 in Hydes' favour in the penultimate game and speculation on an English success was rife as the pair mopped up the perspiration before engaging anew in the decider.

Hydes led 10-6 at the turn only for the Hungarian to strike back and level at 10-all. Again Hydes assumed command to establish leads of 14-11 and 15-13, only to have them equated.

PENDULUM SWUNG

But from then on the pendulum swung and remained, as though heavily weighted, in favour of Borzsei who took the next six successive points for victory over an Englishman who had given his all in a tremendous fight.

Against Tasaka, in the very next round, Börzsei was blasted from the table leaving his compatriot, Istvan Jonyer-conqueror of Scotland's Malcolm Sugden in Round 2-to advance Hungary's cause only to be defeated by the Czech, Jaroslav Stanek.

After wins over Josef Bauregger (Austria) and Hans-Jürgen Hackenberg of Federal Germany, Dublin's Jim Langan then held the stage as he levelled with Kohno 2-2. No leprechaun was sprung from Jo Veselsky's pocket, no matter how deep he thrust his hand, as the Jap came up from behind to take the decider, at 16, from the greenshirted and gallant Irishman.

Sugeng Soewindo of Indonesia had a great win over Johansson whose doubles partner, Alser, lost 1-3 to Stanek.

European champion Dragutin Surbek, after wins over Milan Orlowski (Czecho), Martin Ness (Fed. European Germany) and Purnomo, lost over five games to the Jap predicted as the next world champion—Shiro Inoue.

English and Welsh Open title holder Gomozkov lost in the quarters to Ito after wins over Chung Cha Hyun (Korea), Zlatko Cordas (Yugoslavia) and Januz Kushinski (Poland).

Ito's game against Kenji Kasai reached perfection-or so it seemed -and in beating his fellow countryman in straight games conserved his energies for his subsequent titanic duel with Schöler.

MAGNIFICENT WIN

Whereas, from the No. 5 position, Hydes had stolen the limelight from his more renowned colleagues. Kent's Pauline Piddock-she had been omitted from England's Corbillon Cup squad-made her mark in the individual events.

Her first excursion into the cockpit resulted in the ousting of Federal Germany's Almut Stöhr but in the first round set that followed few could have predicted her magnificent 3-1 win over the defending women's singles champion Sachiko Morisawa of Japan!

This indeed was a tremendous achievement for the former Miss Hemmings of Hertfordshire and one which reduced her vanquished opponent to tears of incredibility.

Karenza Mathews also emerged from

liminaries with the easy disposal of Alice Green (USA) and Gülsüm Dogan (Turkey) before touching greatness with a first round triumph over Czechoslovakia's up and-coming Alicia Grofova.

After accounting for Micheline Stas (Belgium), Jill Shirley fell to Hamada but it was only after five games, and from leading 2-1, that the Slough junior capitulated.

Four strong then was our representation in the first round, at which stage Mary Wright and Judy Williams came into the competition. They too advanced, in step with Pauline and Karenza, with respective wins over Magda Verlinden (Belgium) and Erika Schmollinger (Fed. Germany).

Up against a formidable trio comprising Grinberg, Kowada and Kasuko Ito, Judy, Mary and Karenza all took their departure in the second round with Mary alone taking a solitary game from Kowada.

Not so Pauline who, after her tumbling of Morisawa, was deserving of the relatively easy task of dispos-ing of Austria's Waltraude Stummer.

And so into the illustrious company of the world's last sixteen went the fair "Maid of Kent" only to be ravished by Federal Germany's Edit Buchholz with consistent wins of three 17's.

Of note in the women's singles championship was the defeat of the European champion Ilona Vostova by Beatrix Kishazi of Hungary and Diane Schöler's 3-straight wins over Rudnova and Ito.

Rumania had a triple representation in the quarters but only Maria Alexandru succeeded-against Di Schöler-as her compatriots Mihalca and Carmen Crisan fell to Hamada and Kowada respectively.

In four sets after beating Federal Germany's Heidi Müller 3-0 in the first round, Miss Geissler was concerned in 19 games before disposing of Kim Soo Kyung (Korea), Grinberg, Buchholz and Hamada. Kowada, on the other hand only had the going hard in opposition to Crisan winning 21-19 in the 5th.

IRONICAL

Taylor was England's most sucessful player in the men's doubles in partnership with the young Russian Uldis Eglitis.

Ironically it was the Anglo-Soviet combination which put paid to Hydes/Wright with Taylor fairly scintillating.

Ignoble indeed was the first round defeat of Barnes/Neale who for reasons best known to themselves were called upon to contest a fifth game with Sweden's Rolf Andersson and Björn Neidert.

Incredibly, after leading 20-14 in this decider, the English pair lost and the gloom that descended was shroud-like and impenetrable.

Event winners Alser/Johansson had a thunderous 3-0 win in the quarters over Istvan Korpa/Surbek whilst the stone-walling combination of Börzsei/Schöler soon had their combined defences breached by Matyas Beleznai/Jonyer.

In the counterpart women's event Mary and Karenza reached the quarters, their major win being against Geissler/Doris Hovestädt (21-10 in the 5th). Defeat came in 3-straight from the eventual winners Grinberg/Rudnova.

Fauline had Rumania's Crisan as her partner but after three wins, including a 3-0 first round success over Grofova/Miluse Kumpostova they lost (-15 in the 5th) to Korea's effervescent Choi sisters, Jung Sook and Hwan Hwan

Jill and Judy were always playing second fiddle to Hirota/Morisawa in the first round.

TANGIBLE

It was eventually left to Neale and Mary Wright to extract something tangible in the shape of beribboned bronze awards as losing semi-finalists in the mixed.

Having accounted for two Japanese pairings — Inoue/Morisawa Tasaka/Ito-still a third Jap couple barred their path and it was Hasegawa/Konno who accomplished their execution before going on to win the title.

Hydes and Pauline Piddock, both now standing six feet tall, further accomplished three wins before losing to Gomozkov/Rudnova in which round Barnes and Karenza Mathews lost to Turai/Grofova.

In the first round proper, Taylor and Judy Williams lost to the second Soviet combination of Amelin/Grinberg and the hammer and sickle was

again in evidence as Wright and Jiff Shirley lost to Sarkis Sarkhojan/Rita Pogosova.

Former Hungarian Laszlo Foldy lost his grip on the Jubilee Cup when beaten by the Swedish captain beaten by the Swedish captain Christer Johansson in the quarters. In the final, however, Johansson lost to another former Hungarian Swaythling Cup player, Ferenc Sido, despite a strong protest concerning the point awarded Sido for his narrow victory.

Jill Shirley was the only English entry in the consolation events and with wins over Eleni Marinou (Greece), Yveline Lecler (France), van Gelder (Belgium) and Monika Block (Fed. Germany) reached the semis only to be well beaten by the East German girl Petra Stephan, who subsequently won the event at the expense of Jutta Krüger.

AS I SAW MUNICH

by John Woodford,

WITH the cries of "Schöler, Schöler" still ringing in their ears, the 15 members of the E.T.T.A. party left Munich on the Ostend boat train just two hours after the last of the world finals, a tired but united band of supporters.

Fantastic is the only word to describe the vocal support given to Schöler during the whole tournament. As he advanced through the rounds, one wondered if pandemonium and complete chaos would erupt should the German champion reach the final.

The unison clapping gained momentum as Amelin, Stanek and then Tasaka fell to Schöler's defensive blanket but the world title was destined not to be his.

The German fans reached the ultimate heights of vocal acclaim when in the final Schöler led by two games. But that was the end of the road for Germany—pint-sized Shigeo Ito showing great courage, gradually gained the upper hand. His work-rate was tremendous; switching from still got a roof!

wing to wing his attack gradually etched its way into the heart of the German. As he crumbled to defeat the cries of support died in 7,000 German throats.

Compressing the tournament in one sentence, the Japanese challenge took a real beating for three out of the last four days, during which they lost their two reigning champions but they had the last laugh with two new singles champions in Sunday's finals.

England's greatest moment was, of course, Pauline Piddock's great victory over Morisawa. The entire English contingent of some 50-odd people (including players, officials and supporters) had a breathless half-hour as this incredible victory came to Pauline and to England.

A measure of loop, backed up by a good defence is a recipe for success in the women's field today. Pauline used these ingredients in Munich and the result was the scalp of a world champion and a great chance of a ticket to Japan in 1971.

Munich, city of spires and screaming taxi tyres, was well and truly enjoyed by our party, some of whom even managed a dance at the Hofbrauhaus, Munich's top beer hall.

Sixteen tables were used in Munich in a set-up not unlike Wembley. The well-known German characteristic of thoroughness was well in evidence in the tournament organisation at the higher and middle levels.

At the lowest level of gate control, the uniformed German officials had quite a job checking tickets and passes. Tempers became frayed, the England players had trouble getting into the stadium on one occasion, and two spectators without the right tickets were thrown out!

Finally, no account of "Munchen" 1969 could go to press without mention of the extra-ordinary extremes of the Bavarian weather. During the team events, a temperature of 34 degrees was recorded with players playing in their track suits. The thermometer gradually rose higher and higher until on finals day 90 degrees was recorded with 7,000 spectators — all apparently shouting for Schöler who, incidentally, was only three points from being world champion in the third game!—at least the Eissporthalle has still got a roof!

Japanese Tour

K.O. AFTER DODGY ONE-TWO



WHERE, OH WHERE, HAVE THE LITTLE BOYS GONE?

SEASON 1968-69 has been one of mixed fortunes for Sussex. The premier division side has completed four seasons (28 matches) as an unchanged team of Peter Williams, Roger Chandler, Sam Ogundipe and Judy Williams. This is a fine performance and something of a record, but where, oh where are the next crop of young-sters, especially boys, to step up when the time comes?

At least we have two fine young prospects in Suzanna Kavallierou and Carol Randall, both of whom look as though they might hold their own in senior county play before many moons; and at least Sussex will finish the season with cash in hand to the value of well over £400.

So, we have the girls and the cash and no boys, or at least we have the boys but they need developing to a higher standard. Two remedies have been suggested. One is the appointment of new young coaching secretary, Brian Spicer whose enthusiastic

and youthful approach could work wonders. The second is a possible creation of a Sussex-sponsored squad of young players of the 18-23 age group, whose open tournament ex-penses would be covered. This would allow their participation in say an extra eight opens per season, a move which could soon prove who is going to make the grade and who isn't.

The gap in the progression of young Sussex players from the junior county side to the premier division is of course far too great to be made in one jump. A Sussex senior second team does not receive enough support and there is a great lack of venues, so perhaps the Sussex TTA have found the answer to the problem by the creation of a Sussex squad of about eight players for the southern tournament circuit.

Sussex juniors have finished third in the junior (south) table, which is regarded as a very good effort by the junior selectors. With the elevation of several leading juniors to the seniors, Sussex hopes next season will rest on Stephen Marley, Graham Good, Mark Bull and Carol Randall. The selectors main problem is the lack of a top girl player, which means hey may have to call on Carol's 12-year-old sister, Christine, already a tournament veteran in the younger age-group events.


