The home crowd have been watching their hero Frans Schoofs who has already beaten our own Denis Neale, playing the great Stanek from Czechoslovakia in the Quarter-Final of the Men's Singles. They are disappointed as Schoofs loses three - nil, They stand about dispiritedly. Suddenly the word goes round that there is a great fight going on on Table 4. Barnes from England is playing the little German, Russy; the one that few people have seen before but who has already knocked out Andersson the number two seed from The crowd surges across the Sweden. The crowd surges across the hall and the players have to pause before they start the fifth and deciding game.

Chester Barnes they all know is one of the fastest counter-hitters in Europe. Who is this man Russy to be causing him so much trouble? He is short, stocky and he has tight curly hair. He hits almost continuously— quick jabbing counter hits that time and again have Barnes out of position. The wily East Londoner tries all he knows; he pushes and rolls, he swings the ball and varies the pace of his shots but still Russy keeps with him. Excitement stirs through the crowd as Barnes pulls away to a 20-19 lead; match point. Brilliantly Russy saves it as he angles one out of Barnes' reach on the forehand wing. Deuce. Barnes now shows the improvement in his temperament by gaining another match point. But Russy saves that. Then another. Then another, 23-all. Every time Russy saves the game by inspired counter hitting.

The score reaches 27-all in the fifth ! The excitement is intense. The English girls cannot watch. The Captain, Johnny Leach, his face ashen, watches tensely. Russy sud-denly switches the rally and catches Barnes on the backhand wing. The German has his first match point. Surely it must be all over for Chester? Russy goes for that wide shot down the forehand wing. Barnes is too far away to reach it. But Russy pulls his stroke and misses the table by inches! That was his last chance. Having weathered that one match weint sector the product of the strong the stron point against him Chester seems to gain confidence and hits two great forehands to win the game 30-28. Russy shakes hands and stands almost

IT is the moments of high drama in a daze, it seems, as the English players congratulate Barnes on his fine win.

> These are the moments that the crowd wait for. Somehow they have a feeling of pride because they helped to create the atmosphere and they were there on a memorable occasion.

> There is not enough room to relate some of the other great moments that the tournament provided . . . That fantastic rally between young Trevor Taylor and the great defender Eberhard Schöler; a point that it took Taylor 29 shots to win, the last eight of which were kills! There is not of which were kills! enough room to relate all these incidents and we must be content with a brief look at the exploits of the whole of the England Team.

> Denis Neale fell to the extremely fit Frans Schoofs of Holland. Schoofs always seems to play well on his own ground; he had already beaten Christer Johansson of Sweden in the second round.

> Barnes, after his exciting win over Russy, and like so many great attack-ing players became, in the semi-final, the second English scalp for Schöler, Taylor having eventually lost to him in the second round.

Alan Hydes found the vicious top-spins and sidespins of Surbek, the European Champion from Yugoslavia, just too much for him. I had the feeling, however, that when he has had a little more experience Hydes will be able to play a more positive game and will then be very much more effective against players of Surbek's class. The final of the men's singles which had promised so much was rather an anti-climax Surbek having little trouble in beating Schöler 3-0.

Karenza Mathews fell unexpectedly to the Dutch No. 1 Micke Ten Broek. She did not seem to be quite sharp enough to penetrate the improved Dutch attacking player.

Having disposed of the sole rep-resentative of the U.S.A. in the first round, Judy Heaps hammered doggedly against the solid defence of Edit Buchholz in the second. Judy lost to this very fine German player but here again was a young English player who is obviously benefitting from early international experience.

Jill Shirley had a hard match to play against Hendrikson, the tall German defensive player. Jill played well but looked as if she will have a better chance against such players when she has improved the counter hitting technique that she is trying to put into her steady defensive game.

Pauline Piddock, who paid her own fare to the tournament, had her return fare paid for by the E.T.T.A. as she came off the best of the English girls came off the best of the English girls by reaching the semi-final of the women's singles. Here she had to play our old friend Diane Schöler whose defensive game, brilliant as ever, proved too much for Pauline. Diane also proved too much for Buchbalz who in the final tried up. Buchholz who, in the final, tried unsuccessfully to hit Diane off the table !

Pauline and Jill did very well to reach the final of the Ladies' doubles. They lost 3-0 finding Buchholz and Agnes Simon as hard as Karenza and Judy had in the semi-final. They also had lost 3-0.

In the mixed doubles, English pairs had dominated one half of the draw, with Hydes and Piddock beating Barnes and Shirley in one semi-final. Mathews and Neale lost in the quarter-final in the other half of the draw to Surbek and van Ruiten of Holland. In the final Pauline and Alan played well but were unable to penetrate the formidable defensive partnership of Diane and Ebby Schöler.

In the men's doubles, Hydes and Taylor lost to the young German pair Jansen and Schmittinger, but Neale and Barnes did well to beat Schöler

and Russy for a place in the semifinal. Here they lost to the eventual winners Surbek and Stipancic of Yugoslavia.

Considering that the opposition was really very strong the English Team gave a good performance by reaching three semi-finals and two finals. It was also good to see that good per-formances were put up by all the members of the Team and not just by one or two individuals as has so often been the case in the past.

Second European League Triumph

BOTH Denis Neale and Chester Barnes had twin successes over Janos Borzsei-runner-up to Dragutin Surbek of Yugoslavia in the European Championships-and Matyas Beleznai when, in Budapest on November 4, England triumphed 5-2 over Hungary to record their second win in the European League.

Barnes was again to the fore when, in partnership with Karenza Mathews, England won the mixed doubles and only just failed 23-25 in the deciding game of the men's doubles when paired with Neale.

Kent's Pauline Piddock contested the women's singles but failed against the experienced redhead Erzsebet Jurik.

Not so Johnny Leach, M.B.E., who shoulders the onerous task of naming England's senior teams.

Granted there is a selection committee within the framework of which members can be freely consulted but the final choice is Johnny's who bravely accepted the invitation to become the Sir Alf Ramsey of table tennis.

It is unlikely that the twice former world men's singles champion will receive a knighthood for his labours not even, if, next April, a world title should happen to come our way in Munich.

Ponder yet awhile on the responsibility of such a task for if stones are to be cast following defeat there can only be one target.

In the world of football, managers on pricely salaries for such responsibility go down like ninepins and their paths are strewn with "corpses."

It is not an easy undertaking, not even with selection narrowed down to members of the International Squad.

Let us therefore have a care for Johnny's acceptance of the position for it is not one to be eagerly sought or maintained.

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INTERNATIONAL ROUND-UP

CHAIRMAN OF THE ENGLISH TABLE TENNIS ASSOCIATION

IN a matter of a few months the new E.T.T.A. administration has solved the problem of financing a far more ambitious international programme than has been possible in the past. There will be more top class international matches, more second-line matches in which fringe players can gain initial international experience, more chances to present international table tennis in every corner of England where there is local demand for it, and more opportunities for English players to gain experience abroad . . . as many as nine international squad players competed in the recent Netherlands Open.

Czech players are staying over after their tour to play and train with our squad, and opportunities will arise to send some of our players abroad for extended practice and training. One or two of our young coaches will get the chance to study successful continental training methods abroad, and talks about this are going on with the Yugoslavs whose men came tops in Lyons. We are seeking co-operation with the Swedes from whom we could learn much about modern coaching and training methods.

Our new income from sponsorship, trade and television sources enables us to spread our wings in this way, but we have not yet enough money to give our players the backing that will enable them to compete on completely equal terms with, for instance, leading East European rivals. But that day will come.

The king pin in our ambitious programme to get England back into top championship class is team manager Johnny Leach, who is making great personal sacrifices to help us push ahead as quickly as possible.

In his mammoth task of co-ordinating selection of teams and captains, coaching and training for the international squad, and liaison with coaches and trainers abroad, Johnny has the help of a dedicated team of officials, and the full backing both of the National Selection Committee and the National Coaching and Schools Committee.

Laurie Landry has also been given added responsibilities and is bringing in helpers to cope with these; he will be working very closely with Johnny Leach as the demarcation between senior and junior players becomes more and more blurred now that so many juniors are reaching senior selection standard before they leave the junior ranks.

It would be unfair to expect miracles. But we look with some confidence to an improvement in our players' performances at the world championships in Munich next April, and it would be a real disappointment if England were not to figure somewhere on the championship-roll by the time the European championships take place in Moscow in April 1970.

Players have responded magnificently to the new policies and requirements, and if they maintain their enthusiasm and dedication then I believe our efforts will be crowned by success. It is inevitable that on the way we shall encounter setbacks and disappointments, and our ultimate success will depend on whether such setbacks are met not with recriminations, but with extra effort and team spirit.

MARTA IN GERMANY

Marta Luzova, the Czech player, ranked No. 5 in the world, has left Czechoslovakia to make a new home in Germany with her husband whom she married earlier this year. He is Peter Hejma, centre forward of the national Czech ice hockey team. Marta first played in England when she was only 17 years old, and she has established herself as a firm favourite with English table tennis audiences in Brighton and other centres where she graced the scene with her attractive play and personality.

ACCOUNT SETTLED

A happy ending to a period of considerable worry for the Swedish T.T.A. comes with the news that they have reached agreement with Eagle Star, a British insurance company, on a settlement of their claim in connection with the loss suffered in the 1967 world championships at Stockholm. The Swedish T.T.A. were able to insure against all losses, and indeed there was a substantial deficit when spectator support fell well below the expected figure.

12,000 BALLS IN MUNICH

Some 60 countries are expected to participate in the world championships in Munich next April, but the big question whether or not the Chinese will compete is still un-solved. Organisation costs are around £50,000 and this will be financed by government contributions from sources, from the local government of Bavaria, from the town of Munich itself, and television fees. There will be a seating capacity for only 2,600 spectators but several thousand standing places. I understand that there is no likelihood of a financial loss, in view of the amount of advance guaranteed—a very happy state of affairs which we would like to be able to achieve with our big promotions.

In order to be able to offer selection of new balls for each match, some 12,000 balls will be made available for the championships !

EUROPEAN LEAGUE **BARNES IN** COMMAND AT BOLTON

CHESTER BARNES returned to the glory trail at Bolton, on October 24, when he was successful in all his three sets against West Germany, his last over Bernt Jansen clinching victory for England 4-3.

Before a capacity audience at Smithills School, Denis Neale laid the foundation stone on which Barnes built up by disposing of Jansen in the opening set.

Avenging his Netherlands Open defeat, Barnes was the acme of shrewdness in beating ace defender Eberhard Schöler who adopted more venturesome tactics to turn the tables on Neale.

Successful too in the men's doubles. England held a 3-1 lead at one stage but it was left to Barnes to deliver the hammer blow after the visitors had equated the match score.

Well as Karenza Mathews played in her singles encounter with Edit Buchholz, it was not good enough to break through the defence of the joint holder of the European Women's team championship title.

Captains Courageous by

ENGLAND'S Team Manager, Johnny Leach, under a new policy laid down by the National Selection Committee, made an innovation by his selection of Team Captains for the three matches against Israel.

The Captains were: Laurie Landry in London, Ian Harrison in Man-chester and Peter Simpson in Leeds.

This experiment will give valuable experience of captaincy to younger members of the Association and, if successful, could eventually lighten the load of captaincy which, for the last few years has fallen on the shoulders of Johnny Leach and Ron Crayden.

Laurie Landry has represented both Middlesex and England many times, and is no newcomer to captaincy as he is the present Captain of England's Junior teams.

Ian Harrison is the most established member of the International Squad from which all teams to represent England this season will be selected. Ian has represented England in 177 Internationals to date and will no doubt add many more to this number.

The captaincy at Manchester was another step in his International career as the Selectors take the view that the vast experience gained in 177 Internationals, added to his appear-ances in six World and six European Championships, will prove to be valuable assets that are needed in his capacity as team Captain.

Peter Simpson of Leeds, the Staff Coach (North) is 32 years old. He is a good tournament player and has held the men's singles and men's doubles titles of the Leeds League Closed Championships, but is better known for his coaching activities in the North of England.

He is a strict disciplinarian, who pays great attention to the correctness of dress of the players under his command, and is a firm believer in physical fitness, having many original ideas on 'fitness training' for members of the International Squad.

Some weeks ago he sustained injuries in a car crash whilst going to a coaching session in Manchester. These injuries have stopped his coaching activities for some weeks. However, he was still able to carry out his duties as Captain of the England team in his home town of Leeds.

A REALLY SUCCESSFUL IDEA

The Girls lost 4-5 but were not disgraced. Sue Howard played wonderfully well in not dropping a game. Her sister, Linda, won the odd one against Heltzel in straight games but Lesley Pacitto just failed to make it against the same opponent.

In the tournament held on the Sunday, Sue won the U-17's singles title but with a bit more difficulty than in the international and Simon won the U-15 after beating Van der Zee in the semis. Van der Zee went on to win the U-17 event beating Tony who had reached the final with an excellent semi result over Simon.

A successful trip altogether and the light training done on both days under the direction of Les Gresswell proved useful. Unfortunately, due to a misunderstanding about ages, both Tony and Lesley were not included in the U-15 events.

SUSSEX OPEN by John Woodford Finals Marred at

Hastings

THE 1968 Sussex Open lived up to its reputation of attracting an entry almost as strong as the English Closed and providing more than the usual quota of shocks. The popularity of the event was endorsed by the attendance of a record number of national and county umpires.

England No. 10 Trevor Taylor from Hertfordshire proved he is the player to whom the England selectors are looking for a great future by winning the men's singles with an impressive win in the final round over surprise finalist David Brown (Essex) 21-17, 21-9.

Prior to the semi-finals, a majority vote would have forecast a classic battle in the final between Ian Harrison and Brian Wright, but these two giants were both removed effectively in the semis by Brown and Taylor respectively. Brown especially, looked almost unbeatable against Harrison. The England No. 2's defence was cut to pieces by the young Essex player to the complete amazement of the onlookers. Taylor found Wright a little bit more difficult but ran away with the third set 21-12. In the earlier rounds Taylor had accounted for Chester Barnes who failed to produce his peak form throughout the two days play. Brown's main victims were "Connie" Warren and "Les" Haslam, so he earned his place in the final.

The Irish challenge from Jim Langan did not materialise and he was well beaten 21-12, 21-13 by Malcolm Sugden in the middle stages, but Harrison then eliminated the Scot.

In the absence of Mary Wright the holder, Karenza Mathews was a worthy women's singles winner and in the final Kent's Pauline Piddock never looked like causing another shock. But in the semi-final, Pauline managed to stop another fine run by Judy Williams, the new North of England Open champion. Earlier, Judy had overwhelmed Jill Shirley for the second time in eight days.

FINALS MARRED

The finals session, usually a masterpiece of organisation and dignity was marred by a disgraceful uproar throughout the first event, the veterans final. The finalists were Dan Blagojevitch, a Yugoslav from Ilford and the winner Ron Etheridge of Kent. The cause of the trouble was the Yugoslav's service which appeared on most occasions to lack a throw-up. Players and umpires meeting this player in the earlier rounds had been disturbed at his deliveries and he was warned and faulted before reaching the finals.

National umpire John Wright was the man assigned to the veterans final and immediately the game started would not "accept" Blagojevitch's service. A number of "faults" were called followed by outbursts from the player, with elements in the crowd encouraging him. Play was then held up whilst the umpire consulted the referee. More shouting by the Ilford man who claimed he could not serve according to the rules, further encouraged by younger elements whilst the coolest man in the heat was Ron Etheridge. Aided by the "fault" points the Kent veteran won the first set 21-8 and then went on to win the second 21-15 with the uproar continuing until the end.

Blagojevitch apologised to the Mayor of Hastings, Alderman Mrs. Vera Jones at the presentation ceremony for the scenes but BOTH players were cheered up to the rostrum.

TOURNAMENT "STOPPER"

ON Saturday evening, one of the finest men's singles matches ever seen in th 33 years history of the Sussex Open occurred in Round 2 of the men's singles when "Connie" Warren beat Peter Williams 19-21, 21-14, 33-31! All play in the lower hall was stopped when these two players, both on peak form reached 20-all in the third. Warren decided to hit every ball and survived five match points against him in doing so. As the score reached the middle-twenties with lightning exchanges, Williams was gradually reduced to counter-hitting. In the final nail-biting minute, Warren's two final points clipped the net before beating the Sussex player whose image cannot possibly have been dented by such a great performance.

A rare triumph for experience and adaptation to the modern reflex gauge came in the men's doubles where Tony Piddock and Henry Buist, the evergreen Kent pair triumphed in the final over Warren and Ralph Gunnion. Piddock and Buist removed Barnes and Harrison at the quarter-final stage.

many International players. Players who join a youth club, find they have the talent and enthusiasm for the game and make the necessary progress. Before the top is reached, however, a lot of hard work is necessary. One who will vouch for the accuracy of this statement is Staffordshire's Glenn Warwick.

Glenn started playing, appropriately enough, at a local youth club. By the end of the season he had made sufficient progress to reach the final of the Youth League championships. Amongst the spectators was Brian Martin, a Staffs County player. Not wishing such talent to be lost to the game—as so very often happens— Brian invited Glenn to join Walsall's biggest club, the Cambridge, and it was an invitation Glenn was quick to accept.

Glenn's baptism to Walsall League table tennis was in the fifth division and in it he made speedy progress. At the end of the season, 1960-1, he became Walsall Junior Singles Champion.

It was an unexpected, but very deserved result. A summer's practice by the dedicated 15-year-old had its reward when he was selected for his club's first team.

His teammates were Brian Martin and Bert Hiscock. He could scarcely have had two better, Brian with his mastery of spin services and the loop, Bert with his excellent all-round game and magnificent temperament. In my travels I have never seen anyone with such complete composure as Bert.

SOUND ADVICE

Nothing ever upsets him. He once id me ''Why get excited over an You can't do anything about it! Forget it. Play each ball on its Glenn, had derived from it.

LOCAL youth clubs have produced merits and forget the previous one" It was sound advice, Advice he passed on to the quick-learning Warwick. He has never forgotten it and it is reflected in his play. His temperament was great by any stan-dards. For a 15-year-old it was almost uncanny being largely instrumental in his quick rise up the scale that season.

> He played for both Walsall and Staffordshire Juniors. His team won the Walsall first division. He retained his Junior Singles title, And he added the Staffs. Junior Singles for good measure,

> 1962-63 was a season of consolida-tion for Glenn. He used it to build up his game, serving as a spring-board for the following season which was to be his last as a junior. Even so 1962-63 brought Glenn the retention of his Walsall and Staffordshire titles and more good representative wins.

> By now the Walsall hitter was visiting as many tournaments as possible. His preparations for the 1963-64 season were not to be in vain. the A summer's hard training was fol-lowed by Glenn gaining a place in Walsall's first representative team.

> He had fully merited his opportunity and he took full advantage of it with some great wins. He continued to hit his way to success and he had one of his dearest ambitions realised when he was selected for England Juniors against Wales. He emerged undefeated.

UNDEFEATED THROUGHOUT

At Scarborough, Glenn won the Junior Singles title at the North East of England Open. It was his only Open singles title win as a junior but he had fully earned it.

Staffordshire won the Junior Division (Midland) and Glenn did his share by emerging undefeated through-out the season. Not only did he win the Walsall Junior Singles but added the Senior title as well and further annexed the county junior title for good measure. To cap a great season Glenn became Staffordshire's men's singles champion.

His County were promoted to the Premier Division of the County Championships and the prospects o playing in it clearly thrilled Glenn. The team, as they realised, would be struggling from the start but it was obvious Glenn would benefit by the experience.

And indeed he did. He had out-standing wins over Alan Lindsay, Derek Basden and Tony Piddock. Glenn was occupying the No, 1 spot skilfully and successfully but it was plain the team would be releasted at plain the team would be relegated at the season's end.

No player in the country was show-ing more keenness than Glenn at this time. He used to enter all the tourneys he possibly could and not only played in the local league but also in the first division of the Manchester League.

To achieve this he used to travel up after work, play his sets, and then return overnight to resume work the following day !

STILL DEVELOPING

The Staffs No. 1 was still developing his game and he won the Men's Singles and Men's Doubles titles in both the Walsall and Staffordshire Championships.

Everything in the garden looked lovely but in fact 1965-66 season proved a very bad one. Hardly had the season commenced before Glenn contracted jaundice. It was to put him out for the rest of the season.

Whereas some players would have taken some time to rehabilitate themselves, Glenn was able to get back immediately. He went straight back into the Staffs first team and had his best-ever season.

Out of twelve sets Glenn lost only two and his consistency extended to his Birmingham League performances where he went through the season undefeated. Against such players as Ralph Gunnion, Paul Judd, Derek Munt and Derek Backhouse this was no mean performance. Besides re-gaining the Staffs Men's Singles title he also brought off a fine success when he won the strong Men's Singles Closed title.

1967-68 was one of mixed fortunes with the County title being retained and some good wins in the County Championships.

For so good a player it is amazing to find that Glenn has never won an Open tournament. It is something which could well be remedied this season. Certainly Glenn intends to spare no effort to win at least one Open Singles title in his career.

Perhaps Glenn does not possess the "killer instinct". Certainly he has all the shots but lack of opportunity to play in the Premier Division must have affected his chances of regular good top practice. And, of course, the ''Lost Season''-1965-66-has had its effect. True he came back at once but it was a season he may well have utilised to great advantage.

However, whether Glenn does, or does not win an Open Tournament one thing is certain. And that is whilst he continues to play for whilst he continues to play for Staffordshire and travel the tourna-ment circuit table tennis will be the better for his presence. His good manners on and off the table, his obvious enjoyment of being with the table tennis fraternity and his progressive, sincere and helpful approach to the game are admired by all and sundry.

There is no more modest player in the game or one so keen to help younger players to improve. I have being them with their game for no other reason than for just that. Glenn Warwick is indeed a player we in the Midlands are proud of.

THE LAURIE LANDRY STORY

IT was on a fateful May morning in 1961, that England's Junior Team Manager, Laurie Landry, was hit with a fast-moving car in snatching to safety his 4-year-old nephew from its path on the busy A40 at Gerrards Cross.

Laurie's severe and multiple injuries were such that in Hillingdon Hospital, Uxbridge his very life was in jeopardy.

Thanks, however, to miraculous surgery the Willesden international pulled through and few, seeing him today, would believe just how near to death's door he was seven years or so ago.

Besides his indebtedness to the surgeons and staff of Hillingdon Hospital, Laurie is also conscious of the part played by Eric Blackman, Fellow of the Society of Remedial Gymnasts and the Farnham Rehabilitation Centre where Mr. Blackman has worked for the past 21 years.

Laurie has been back on twenty occasions since he was at Farnham Park for thirteen weeks, from July 14 to October 13, 1961. During his stay he was allowed to go home each weekend and this was made possible by his Tennyson Club colleagues, in the Willesden League, who took him to and fro, by car, on a rota system.

Players to have accompanied Laurie on his return visits include Buckinghamshire's Leo Thompson, Jill and Paul Shirley, Jackie and Robin Napper and Michael and Tommy Wald, Middlesex players Alan Rhodes, Brian Wright, Karenza Mathews, Jimmy and Christine Mann as well as Linda and Susan Howard (Surrey), Stuart Gibbs (Essex), Trevor Taylor (Herts.) and Graham Whalley (Sussex).

The further story of Farnham Park Rehabilitation Centre is penned by Eric Blackman, F.S.R.G., himself who writes:----

"Shortly after the war ended in 1945, the Nuffield Foundation and the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust, of which the late Sir Noel Mobbs, K.C.V.O., O.B.E., was a Trustee, decided to set up an area Industrial Health Service.

"The Borough of Slough was chosen for the project because of the diversity of industry located in and around Slough Trading Estate and because Sir Noel Mobbs was Chairman of the Slough Estates and able to obtain the co-operation of the Manufacturers who were interested in this progression of Health Service.

"A Central Clinic was opened on the verge of the Industrial area and a Rehabilitation Centre (a large House) was purchased for £25,000.

"The house was fitted out to take 45 resident patients who were admitted from all over the U.K. plus Day patients who mostly lived locally and whose injuries were of such a nature as to enable them to travel to and fro by public transport or ambulance.

"So The Slough Industrial Health Service was born, but here I must confine myself to the Rehabilitation Centre that received people from all walks of life, of both sexes and ages ranging from 18 to 60. This age group was however elastic and if a man of 65 was still working in industry he would be accepted, although there were obvious pessimists who talked loudly that with the arrival shortly of a State run Service this independent service would not succeed.

"Under the guidance of the Medical Director, Dr. A. Austin Eagger, a doctor with vast experience in all fields of medicine and a Brigadier with the 1st Airborne Division during the last war, the Centre went from strength to strength and in 1947 provision had to be made to take 66 beds and 30 outpatients. This late residence of Lord Kemsley was now bursting at the seams but applications from the medical profession all over the world were pouring in to inspect this revolution in medicine.

"Apart from the distinguished medical staff, Sisters Professions Supplementary to Medicine, cooks,

kitchen staff and a highly skilled engineer were hand picked by the M.D. and as a team set to work with this pioneering project to prove its worth. The efforts of this team produced very little monetary reward but great satisfaction was felt by all with the growing success of this project.

"Many road accidents were admitted from various hospitals and these included several well known athletes none better known perhaps in that day than Laurie Landry. Laurie had suffered serious injuries and had been unconscious for a very long time.

"Although I, as the Head Remedial Gymnast, would never have the audacity to put myself in a class with Laurie as a table tennis player I, nevertheless, was fond of the game and could hold my own with the average patient.

"I soon had Laurie on his feet with a plaster from toes to groin but full of spirit and confidence. The game soon improved his co-ordination, his reflexes were soon back to normal and Laurie was a formidable opponent for the best we could produce.

"I personally played him many hundreds of times and was never able to get near beating him, his courage and determination were an inspiration to all who knew him.

"Since his discharge from here he has returned on many occasions bringing along a team of notable players not only to entertain us but to enable us to pit our ability against these distinguished people. Laurie will always remain a great friend of Farnham Park and of Yours Truly".

Ombudsman

THERE has not been a single grouse or complaint this month which means, I hope, that everyone is happy within the ranks of Table Tennis. We have, therefore, brought from our files an old item we had cause to look into on which we now comment. This is in answer to a local Newspaper report concerning the state of dress of Tournament Players.

We find that over the past few years the standard of dress by all players has improved. Among the better Tournament players, who invariably are supplied with free clothing, there can be no complaints whatsoever.

Players representing Counties and Leagues are also well turned out. Only in the lower divisions of leagues did we find matches taking place with players not having changed, dirty shoes and unwashed and unpressed shorts. We could not find fault with any girl we saw. From our enquiries the following reasons emerged. Played last night, forgot to change, left kit at home, and many more.

We found the answer to this in one club who refused to let its members play with dirty shoes or unless correctly dressed. This then is the answer to right this lack of pride by some of our male players. To the

Tournament players who said "I never expected to get so far"—carry a tube of shoe whitener, a spare shirt and a pair of shorts. Be prepared, you never know !

Something we left out of our comments on OPEN TOURNAMENTS and that was umpiring. We know that players need not have to umpire during an Open Tournament, but we feel that every player should, if asked, umpire a set to enable the Tournament Organisers to keep up to a time schedule. By umpiring a set we feel that players would learn that an umpire is entitled to respect and when the set is over to be thanked for taking it.

EXTRACT FROM THE WOOD GREEN WEEKLY HERALD 20 September, 1968

"IT is a great pity that a number of players did not take a greater pride in the image of Table Tennis. A great many people visited Alexandra Palace at the weekend to watch the matches and they must have particularly noticed the unkempt appearance of several male players.

"I noticed three players in the finals who wore filthy shoes, two who wore shirts which appeared not to have been washed recently. How little effort it would have taken for the players to have changed the shirts for the finals and given their shoes a quick wipe with a whitener. The notable exceptions were Chester Barnes and Brian Wright who are always neatly dressed. The ladies, of course, were once again immaculate".

TABLES FOR HIRE

UNDER the Terms of Agreement with Messrs. John Jaques & Son Ltd., the E.T.T.A. now has available a number of top-class Jaques tables, which may be hired by leagues or clubs, on favourable terms.

The hire can be for either a limited period or on a permanent basis. Any-one interested in this offer, should contact Administrative Secretary, Albert Shipley at the E.T.T.A. Office.

It must be stressed, however, that in the event of applications exceeding the number of tables available, then preference will be given to areas in which the need to develop table tennis is greatest.

This hire service is not intended to cover isolated events such as an Open or Closed Tournament, but is intended for installation of tables at club premises.

YOUTH FEES

IT is apparent from affiliations received so far that many leagues are unaware of the rule concerning reduced affiliation fees for youth teams. In order for youth teams to qualify for the half-rate of fee, they must either play in a youth league or in a division of a local league, the membership of which division is restricted to persons under 21 years of age.

This is to ensure that the reduction is given only to genuine youth clubs, for it was found that many clubs included the word "youth" in their name without restricting their membership to young people. Therefore, leagues with only two or three youth teams cannot, by rule, claim the lower fee.

PERMIT MEMBERS

REMINDERS have been sent to all existing members that on September 1 each year, the renewal fee of £2 becomes due. League secre-taries are asked to remind their members that anyone earning money by his skill or knowledge of table tennis should, under the rules of the E.T.T.A., register as a Permit Member.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

IT was duly brought to the notice of the National Council, on September 28, that the Disciplinary Committee was overstrength by one in accordance with the Rules, having six members instead of five.
