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PACKAGE DEAL

There are still some leagues, not particularly isolated from the established centres, whose interests, if not wholly parochial, are still very much self-centred and in no way harnessed to the national body other than by the payment of an affiliation fee in respect of their member clubs.

This is a type of administration which, although commendable in many ways, still falls short of total fulfilment.

Such shortcomings become most evident in the standard of play achieved. Youth, in particular, needs the challenge of far-reaching competition which provides an outlet for the aggressiveness of the young and for their natural desire to excel.

But big fish in little seas will do nothing to improve our national standing if we are to keep pace with the progressiveness of other countries who, justifiably, take pride in their national and international achievements.

Today's top-liners all had their roots at club level and progressed because of opportunities provided by clubs and leagues whose constant aim is the provision of more distant targets than in purely domestic competitions.

Such targets, in recent years, have become more numerous, and provide greater incentives as evidenced by the feats of the Ormesby club upon Teesside.

Involvement is surely a natural progression and rather than pose the question "what do we get from our fees to the E.T.T.A. ?", why not take advantage of all that is on offer—a far from inconsiderable package!





Competitors in the 15th Scandinavian Open played in Boras, Sweden over the period of Nov. 24-26, were welcomed by Tore G. Warenstäm, Chairman of the Commun Council, as the town was celebrating its 350th Anniversary.

Attracting one of the strongest entries ever to assemble outside a World Championships, the tournament provided a veritable feast of exciting and spectacular table tennis. The only dismal note was Japan's withdrawal of their former world champion, Shigio Itoh, together with Mitsuru Kohno and Norio Takashima from the men's events and Sachiko Yokota and Riyoko Tasake from the women's for reasons which were obscure

Play began with the team events, played on Corbillon Cup lines, with England called upon to face a much-improved North Korean side in the first round. In a very close struggle, which went to the limit, the Asians got home 3—2, England's wins coming from Denis Neale, who beat Kim Chang-Ho 17, -11, 17, and in the doubles with a win for Neale and 'Les'' Haslam over Kim Chang-Ho partnered by Yun Chuk.

Yun Chuk had 2-straight wins in both his singles, his second, over Haslam, sealing England's fate in the final set By coincidence, England's women were also drawn against North Korea in their first round match, and Sook Chuwent down 0—3 although two of the Mathews.

first, Jill Hammersley lost to O Yeung Suk 8, -15, -21, and, with Karenza Mathews in the doubles, England's pair lost 17, -20, -13.

ORLOWSKI UNBEATEN

In the men's team event, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia provided the surprises, the former, after nearly losing to England's conquerors, crushing China 3—1 to reach the final. The Czech team, of Milan Orlowski and Jaroslav Kunz, raced through in the bottom half of the draw leaving in their wake Norway, Sweden and Japan, with Orlowski unbeaten.

Not so in the final, however, which deservedly went to Yugoslavia 3—1 the scores being:— Surbek bt Orlowski 16, -12, 23; Stipancic bt Kunz 19, 11; Stipancic/Surbek lost to Orlowski/ Turai -20, -18; Stipancic bt Orlowski -19, 16, 10.

The women's final was contested by China and Czechoslovakia with the former coming back from 0-1 to win 3—1 the scores being:— Lin Mei-chun lost to Polackova -17, -15; Chin Paochin bt Vostova 18, 21; Chin Pao-chin /Lin Mei-chun bt Polackova/Vostova 9, 15; Lin Mei-chun bt Vostova -11, 9, 15. Both finals were closely fought, but only the men's gathered any excitement.

As reported by **Les Gresswell**, the battle between East and West was continued in the individual events and, in the men's singles, Kjell Johansson finally triumphed with victory over China's Yu Yi-tse to retain his title, last won in Gothenburg with a 3—2 win over Tiao Wenyuan, also of China.

There was very little topspin in the final encounter, only hit and counterhit with the rallies being extremely fast and the success of Johansson was based on courage, for in the last game he managed only two forehand smashes.

WHIRLWIND ATTACK

Early shocks was the 3-0 defeat inflicted on Istvan Jonyer by China's Hsu Shao-fa, Dragutin Surbek out to Gabor Gergely 3—1, and Neale going down 2-3 to the whirlwind attack of Kim Chang Ho. Reigning world champion, Bengtsson, was ousted by French "ace" Jacques Secretin, 24-22 in the fifth!

Japan's former world champion, Nobuhiko Hasegawa, fought back from 0—2 to beat Tiao Wen-yuan, but 'blew up' in the semis against Johansson. Haslam lost to Sweden's Bengt Levin 1-3 in the first round.


Both English girls lost to the eventual finalists from South Korea, whose women have improved tremendously and must now rank amongst the world's best. Ailesa Lee had too much topspin for Jill Hammersley, while the cast iron defence of Hyon Sook Chung did not give to Karenza

Ailesa Lee won an excellent final over her compatriot but the big shock in this event was the defeat of Zoya Rudnova, of Russia, by Cha Kyung-Mi of North Korea.

LITTLE BETTER

England's representatives fared a little better in the doubles when Neale and Haslam had a good win over the Swedes, Bo Persson and Ingemar Vikström, but then lost an exciting second round match to Stipancic/Surbek 1—3 The title went to Russia's **Stanislav Gomozkov** and Sarkis Sarkhojan,

The mixed brought Haslam and Mrs. Hammersley up against Hasegawa/Tatsuko Abe of Japan who won 3-1. Neale and Mrs. Mathews had an excellent opening win over Gergely /Beatrix Kishazi (Hungary) but, without having any of the 'breaks', lost to Tokio Tasaka/Tomie Edano, of Japan, the eventual finalists, who were beaten by Istvan Jonyer and Judit Magos of Hungary.

In the women's doubles, the Anglo-Hungarian pairing of Hammersley/ Kishazi reached the semis before losing to the event winners Ailesa Lee
/Mi Ra Park. Karenza Mathews was paired with Kyung Ok Sim of South Korea and performed creditably losing over four close games, to China's Chu Nai-chen/Feng Meng-ya.

Last won by England's Peter Taylor, the junior boys' event was won, on this occasion, by the host country's Ulf Thorsell with final victory over Chang Li-wei of China. Beaten semi-finalists were Ake Grönlund (Sweden) and Pak Jung Ake Shul (N. Korea).

The tournament was staged in the Borashallen, a very large Sports Hall with fluorescent lighting and plastic floor covering. Stiga tables and Halex balls were used.

FRENCH OPEN KEEPING FAITH

Coincident with the Middlesex 3-Star Open, the 22nd French Open championships were staged in the Stade Pierre de Coubertin, Paris from Dec. 3-5. The tournament, this season held in memory of Victor Barna, attracted entries from 15 countries other than France.

In keeping faith with undertakings in respect of 3-Star opens, England called on Tony Clayton and Mike Johns to make the trip accompanied by juniors Desmond Douglas, David Alderson and Paul Day. Brian Wright was the non-playing captain.

EARLY SHOCKS

As in the Scandinavian Open, team events started the proceedings and shock No. 1 occurred early in the men's event when China, the holders, after beating Italy 3—1, were beaten 3—0 by France Secretin struck the first blow in defeating Ho Tsu-pin (18, -18, 19) and Jean-Denis Constant kept up the good work by accounting for Chou Lan-sun (-12, 21, 21).

Only one more set was needed, the doubles, in which the home pair came out winners 16, -15, 14 and France were through to the semis only to be beaten 3—0 by Hungary. In this engagement latter Tonver beat Constant (19, 17), Gergely beat Secretin (18, 13) and the Hungarians took the doubles at 13 and 15.

Sweden, represented by Stellan Bengtsson and Kjell Johansson, came through in the lower half of the draw beating Poland (3—0), England I (3—0) and Yugoslavia (3—1). In the final only one set needed a deciding game before Sweden triumphed 3-0 over Hungary. Final scores:

BENEFIT

England's first team of Tony Clayton and Mike Johns had the benefit of a first round bye before engaging Switzerland who had beaten Nigeria II 3—2. It was a match which England won comfortably with Johns beating Thomas Sadecky (10, 15), Clayton getting home (8, 23) against Erwin Heri, and the doubles taken two-straight (9, 7).

Just as comfortably, however, Sweden disposed of England's duo in the quarters with Bengtsson beating Johns (19, 9), Johansson a 19, 13 winner over Clayton, and the doubles going to the Swedes (12, 12).

England's second team, the juniors, began brightly with a 3-1 win over Nigeria I with the following scores:-Alderson bt Obisanya 10, 15; Douglas bt Fenuvi 11 9; Alderson/Douglas lost to Fenuvi/Obisanya -10, 15, -12; Anderson bt Fenuvi 16, 10,

The brightness continued in the opening set of the second round match, against France, in which David Alderson took Constant to three before losing -13, 11, -10. Douglas then lost to Secretin -8, -10 and the Frenchmen took the doubles 18, 15 for a 3-0 result.

FINAL VICTORY

China, after beating Hungary (3—0) and Rumania (3—1), won the counterpart women's event with final victory over Russia by 3-1. Scores:-Chang Li bt S. Federova -19, 11, 16; Hu Yu-lan lost to E. Antonjan -10, -14; Chang Li/Hu Yu-lan bt Antonjan /Federova 12, -15, 10; Hu Yu-lan bt Federova 14, 16.

In the men's team event, the Soviet Union, represented by Gomozkov and Sarkhojan, suffered a shock 3—2 reverse when beaten by Sweden II. Persson and Vikström both recorded wins over Gomozkov whose only success was in the doubles. Soviet's other win came The came from Sarkhojan who beat Vikström

The line-up in the individual events was almost as strong as in Boras with Bengtsson, the reigning world champion, defending his title in the men's singles from the No. 1 seeded position. Hungary's Jonyer was seeded No. 2 and these were the two to come through to a repeat of the European men's singles final in Rotterdam

It was a repeat in name only for the result was an utter reversal with

the Hungarian, who triumphed in over Maria Alexandru and Carmen 3-straight, never in any difficulty.

In the lower half of the draw, both Secretin and Surbek reached their seeded targets in the semi-finals but not so Orlowski and Gomozkov in the top half.

Orlowski was beaten in Rd. 3 by China's Kuo Chung-kung and the Soviet's No. 1 went under to Gergely.

LOST TO GOMOZKOV

England's Johns, after beating Canada's sole representative, Adham Sharara (13, 13, 9) then lost to Gomozkov (-16, -14, -9). Similarly Clayton, who opened with a win over Denmark's Claus Biehl (8, 13, 15) was next seen off by Kunz (-11, -12,

Paul Day, the Cambs, junior, made his debut under the big lights against Jean-Paul Weber (France) who won (20, 9, 15).

Alderson had a Rd. 1 win over Fenuyi (Nigeria) (18, 17, -14, 13) before losing to China's Kuo Chung-kung (-18, -18, -13). Again, in the kung (-18, -18, -13). Again, in the first round, Douglas scored a win (16, 15, 12) over Marc Merlot (France) before losing to Persson, over five, (12, -24, 17, -18, -9). It was a brave effort from the Warwickshire boy who only lost his hold in the fifth and deciding game.

England had no representatives in the women's events, the singles being won by China's **Hu Yu-lan** over her compatriot, Chang Li, and the doubles by Hungary's Magos and Anna Molnar Crisan of Rumania.

Hungary's Beatrix Kishazi was the only European to reach the semi-final stage of the women's singles for both Magos and Alexandru were ousted by Chinese players.

FIRST HURDLE



CARDIFF OPEN

Warwickshire's Derek Munt walked off with two major cash prizes at the Cardiff Open championships, played on Dec. 9, (writes H. Roy Evans) but Desmond Douglas made him work very hard in a final which saw the English junior take the first game.

Munt had previously beaten Simon Heaps who did not seem quite up to the form that brought him two Welsh tournament titles last season. Douglas had some hard battles, only getting home narrowly in the third against Welshman Johnny Mansfield and Leicester's Paul Randall.





NATIONAL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS



In the Men's event, now called the Ormesby Cup competition thanks to the generosity of the Ormesby Club, we have 64 teams competing including the holders, Ormesby themselves. So much has been said and written about this club, but it is important to recognise all the other teams who make up such an interesting competition each season.

The Women's entry seems to remain static on 11 and once again the Gainsford Club, now competing in Europe for the first time, spearhead this season's entries.

His complaint has since been diagnosed as jaundice which means that he will have to take things just that little bit easier for a month or so.

Horsham, a former English junior international having completed two months training in China, is now in Japan.

It was back on Sept. 29 last that Ian arrived in China to be put up at the Peking Physical Culture Institute prior to visiting Tientsin, Shanghai, Nanking and Canton from which latter place he was due to leave, for Japan, on Nov. 13.

On his arrival in China and before the hard work really began, Ian was allowed a couple of days to get used to the time change which was spent sightseeing.

He walked through Heavenly Square taking film with a cine camera with everyone looking at him. On Oct. 1, the 23rd Anniversary of the Cultural Revolution, he visited the Summer Palace in the Forbidden City and, in the evening, attended a banquet in the Great Hall of the People.

Training then began in earnest and Ian was introduced to a new technique Chinese style, not much spin but smash, smash, smash! The work was hard, a typical day's routine being 07.30 Rise 08.00 Breakfast 08.30 to 12.00 Training 12.30 Lunch 13.00 to 15.00 Sleep 15.00 to 18.00 Playing table tennis 19.00 Dinner 20.00 Discussion or other chores like washing clothes, writing notes and letters 21.20 to 22.00 Bed.

The working week was one of $5\frac{1}{2}$ himself available to train him again. days but on the weekend of Oct. 7/8, To his coach and assistant, Ian pre-

Ian visited the Ming Tombs and the Great Wall concluding the break with tea at the British Embassy.

Chuang Tse-tung, China's 3 times former World champion visited the Peking Institute as did 3 times runner-up Li Fu-jung. The training, meanwhile, remained hard and it would appear that so much continuous training, day after day, for so many weeks, really does become a strain. This is understandable as the chance to carry out the same programme in this country does not present itself.

Ian was being taught to shorten his strokes and a variety of new services which he found difficult but was improving slowly. Quoting Ian from a letter written home "Here the facts of table tennis hit you. I doubt whether I would be in the top 100 Juniors, but my game is getting better because the players who beat me, under 10 points, when I first arrived, I am now able to beat".

On Oct. 27, Ian met the British Ambassador and attended a banquet given to Sir Alec Douglas Home in the Great Hall of the People on Nov. 1. On Oct. 30, Ian played in a match against the Chinese National Team but, of course, didn't win a game. Doubtless the experience would have been worthwhile.

Ian's arrival in Canton was on Nov. 6, feeling rather sad at parting from so many friends at both the Embassy and the Institute who had all been so helpful. Before leaving Peking, the Chinese T.T.A. gave him a farewell dinner at the Peking Duck Restaurant. As the guest of honour, Ian was given the part of the duck the Chinese consider the best, the **Head!**

He must have made a reasonable impression during his stay as he has been invited to return, this time for six months! Should he be able to take advantage of this offer his coach, Hu Hsu-Houn said he would make himself available to train him again. To his coach and assistant, Ian pre-

sented to each Churchill Crowns, a small present and one of his table tennis shirts.

Ian was due to leave China on Nov. 13 arriving in Japan on the following day to stay at the Chukyo University. Permission has been asked and granted by the E.T.T.A. for Ian to compete in the Japanese Championships which were due to take place last month.




EUROPE CLUB CUP

International Umpires

by Colin Clemett,

THE ETTA has recently received details of the ITTF proposals for the introduction of a new umpiring qualification, that of "International fication, that of Umpire''.

To be eligible for this qualification a candidate must have held the highest formal umpiring qualification of his own national Association for at least two years and during this time he must have had experience of umpiring at events of international status, such as World, Continental or International Open Championships. It is desirable, although not essential that he be able to umpire in a language or languages other than his own to the extent of being able to call the score and to explain decisions. (An ITTF Glossary of Table Tennis terms is in preparation, and its contents will indicate the range of knowledge required). Candidates whose nominations are accepted will be required to take a written test, staged by the national Association and marked by the ITTF. It is expected that the tests will be staged annually, probably in the period March - June.

The number of International Umpires will be limited, both by restricting the number of candidates accepted each year and by annual review of the list to remove the names of those no longer active. The primary object of the scheme is to facilitate the ex-change of umpires between Associations for events of international status, by establishing an internationally acceptable standard of umpiring competence. It follows, therefore, that the qualification will be of interest mainly to those who are willing and able to take part in these exchange visits, although the scheme may later be used, for example, in appointing umpires at particular matches.

This whole unfortunate episode appears to lend some credibility to a feeling held in some quarters that the game in the Midlands is too strongly dominated by Birmingham, and that any small League which presents a challenge to the colossus will promptly be reminded of its underdog rôle by every means available.

With easier transport in the future a South Coast league, either at Town of club level, may get players out of the current apathy which exists in Hampshire.

A life member of the Southampton Association of which he was a founder member, he served on the committee for many years as an officer then Chairman and President. He also served on the Hampshire Committee. As a player he represented Southampton and reached the closed final in the 1930's. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him.



MEMORIES REVIVED (December 1972 Issue)

1935 World Championships. I was most interested to read the letter from Mr. C. F. Joyce, Chairman of the Surrey T.T.A., and there can be very few people in this country who can surpass Mr. Joyce's record of 44 years service to the game.

In the final paragraph of his letter, Mr. Joyce pondered how many people officiating during that great tournament' being present at the finals, were still trying to do their bit for T.T. As a very minor official at the 1.1. As a very limited official at the 1935 World's, a table steward, I am very proud to say that I am still connected with the game. Actually, I tried to play in that World's but was beaten in the qualifying rounds at the famous Indian Students' Club in Gower Street, London. My con-

queror was a promising young table tennis and lawn tennis player, Eric Filby, who went on to represent England in the Swaythling Cup matches at the 1938 World's; I am glad to say I managed to squeeze into the singles and doubles events.

There were some marvellous games in 1935 and I still remember the Swaythling Cup final between Hungary, the winners, and Czechoslovakia. Hungary's team on the night was, I believe, Barna, Szabados and Bellak. Austria's team included a very young Richard Bergmann, playing in shorts, men players wore long trousers in those days, of course.

The Corbillon Cup was won by Czechoslovakia, Marie led by Czecnosiovakia, ieu by mane Kettnerova, and this lady who had a very strong forehand drive also gained the women's singles over Magda Gal (Hungary). Barna, who was quite superb then, gained the men's doubles with Szabados and mixed doubles with another Hungarian, Annus Sipos. The men's consolidation singletics solation singles was taken by Sol Schiff, U.S.A. who produced a string of untakeable spin services (were they called "knuckle-spin" services?), and services were subsequently these barred from the game.

Mr. Joyce and I seem to have quite a lot in common. He started as an official in the London League in 1928, I started as treasurer for the Enfield and District League (later to become the North Middlesex League) in 1932. It is interesting to note that in 1932 there were 6 teams in North Middlesex, and after I was instrumental in re-forming the league after the 1939-45 war this went up to 160 teams. Mr. Joyce worked for the famous manu-



Table tennis is a young sport, a latecomer to the scene as it were, but it has of course made big strides. Even so it came as a surprise to me to learn that the Birmingham Association had been in existence for fifty years.

The site for the great occasion was the Penns Hall Hotel, Sutton Coldfield. Maurice wisely decided to restrict the numbers to 300, a figure which was attained without difficulty. I was met at Birmingham's New Street station by the indefatigable Richard Habgood and driven to Penns Hall. No-one could fail to be impressed with the place. As we were early we decided to have a peep into the hall and there was Maurice Goldstein, arranging the seating plan, putting out the menus — it was 'business as usual' for Maurice.

The guests started to arrive! Geoff Alderton, resplendent in handle-bar moustache looked exactly as he did when I first saw him over 20 years ago-the first representative player I ever saw. Bill Gallagher, one of the great stylists of all time, made the trip from Durham to be present -Bobby Murrell, as full of life and energy off the table as he used to have on it-he was there. John Harrison, Ron Vickers, Derek Backhouse, Derek Baddeley - all useful players still—were there. It was a wonderful start. Ralph Gunnion, Birmingham's captive Liverpudlian, got the first round in and there were some notable names in our own small group. Derek Munt. Paul Judd, Roger Morris to mention three. Oh! And Charles Wyles and Derek Tremayne.

The excellent meal was enjoyed by all and then came the speech making. Charles Wyles said a few words and then Ron Strevens (a vice-president who had made the trip from Edinburgh) gave an interesting speech on Birmingham's early days. Another vice-president, Reg McStanton came from Padstow, Cornwall! The top table had some illustrious names. The Deputy Lord Mayor, Alderman Victor Turton was there. Cyril Hames the Birmingham President chaired the whole event admirably.

Then came what to everyone was the highlight of the evening — the presentation to Maurice Goldstein. Maurice has been secretary of the Birmingham League for 40 years and the Birmingham League made it an occasion to remember in more ways than one by the presentation of a colour television set. A speech from Maurice is â rarity but this was a masterpiece.

He said "Why have I stayed in the game so long? I suppose I could have made some money. But I've enjoyed seeing so many young people get so much pleasure out of table tennis." Maurice then paid tribute to the smallish, balding man who sat opposite him — the great Adrian Haydon. "Adrian was the first good player I ever saw and it was him who inspired me more than anyone else to take a real interest in the game. Adrian was a magnificent player, the best player England has ever produced."

Maurice is not disposed to giving out praise lightly but such a compli-

ment was indeed well-earned. Maurice also made mention of his wife Gladys who has always been in the background but through force of circumstances compelled to live with table tennis nearly all her life. Gladys is one of those people who are in a way as important as the Maurice Goldsteins — never complaining but accepting everything philosophically.

After the meal and speeches, dancing and drinking brought the evening to a close all too soon but the unanimous verdict was that it was all so worthwhile.

But had it all finished? Not quite. The following morning Reg Chetland M.B.E., table tennis enthusiast extraordinary gave a reception at his Solihull home. There were a number of invited guests and all thoroughly enjoyed this delightful informal extra. During the course of it I had a chat to Adrian Haydon and he told me of an incredible record in Birmingham. In 41 years in Birmingham table tennis he lost only two sets!! Who could beat that?

And, of course, who could beat the 50th Birmingham Anniversary Weekend, an event to savour and remember for ever.

JOHN WOODFORD

writes on the Biggest Issue of the Lot

ENGLISH table tennis fans nationwide are now beginning to ask the Big Question, "How much longer can we be expected to wait to see better results from the England European League team?"

GEORGE CARR | All his many friends will wish George Carr and his wife Gwen (a **RETIRES**

A well-known figure in the British sports arena, Mr. George Carr, director and general manager of the International Sports Company Limited, a Dunlop subsidiary, has retired after 42 years in the Dunlop group of companies. His successor is Mr. Findlay Picken, previously managing director of National Tyre Service Limited, another Dunlop subsidiary.

Born sixty years ago in Alberta, Canada, of English parents, George Carr came to Britain at the age of seven and grew up in Salford, Lancashire. At eighteen he joined Dunlop starting in the postal department of the Cambridge Street factory in Manchester. After gaining useful sales experience in the export department, he became the Dunlopillo sales representative of the Midlands and Eastern counties just at the time when the unique foam rubber development was coining a new word in comfort. He was mobilised with the Leicester TA as a private in 1939 and it was during the final stages of hostilities when Major George Carr led a unit in Trondheim the landings that developed his subsequent interest in Norway.

When he returned to Dunlop in 1946, he was appointed the export sales manager of the newly formed Dunlopillo Division based at Walton, Liverpool. He is chairman of the Sports Trade Benevolent Fund and the Golf Foundation; a vice-chairman of the British Professional Golfers Association and is currently chairman of the Joint Consultative Council of the Federation of British Manufacturers of Sports and Games.

EARLY CUP EXITS

CAMBRIDGE made an early exit from the Wilmott Cup when they were beaten 7—2 by Colchester in the first round. Cambridge were represented by rather a weak team and Derek Fuller was the only successful Cambridge player. This was the earliest exit for a Cambridge team for a number of years and as this season is mainly concerned with team building perhaps we shall see an improvement in 1973.

Cambridge women also made a first round exit from the Rose Bowl, when they were defeated 5—4 by Peterborough (the identical score of last season). Previously in the South East Midlands League, when the teams met, Cambridge forced a 5—5 draw when playing with an under-fourteen tcam!
