As to be expected of the media, the English Table Tennis Association's adoption of Stiga AB equipment for the forthcoming 34th World Championships in Birmingham, was given prominence following criticisms levelled by Keith Buckle, the Hon. Press Officer of the Players' Association of Table Tennis and of the North Middlesex Table Tennis League.

Whether or not this was a one man crusade for tables of British manufacture, the fact remains that the Swedish firm's offer exceeded that of any other, and with the interests of the membership at large, purely from a financial aspect, the offer was accepted.

There was nothing more sinister to the affair than that. After all, the membership would not thank the Association if at the end of the day their quarantee funds were used to offset a deficit which might otherwise have been averted.

Month by month the budget estimates have to be revised as inflation bites ever deeper, making it imperative to seek income from whatever source provides the greater yield in hard cash-always accepted that the equipment has the approval of the International Table Tennis Federation.

NEW WORLD RANKINGS

Owing to insufficient evidence, Istvan Jonyer, of Hungary, the reigning world champion, has not been included in the revised Individual Classification List issued by the International Table Tennis Federa-tion on September 21, 1976.

His former No. 1 spot has gone to the People's Republic of China's Liang Ko-liang, winner over the period April 26-May 7, of the men's singles title in the 3rd Asian Championships in Pyongyang, Korea DPR, and victor, last season, of the Stiga Welsh Open title in Cardiff.

Open title in Cardiff. Appropriately, Jacques Secretin, of France, winner of the European title in Prague, is brought in at No. 2, a leap of twelve positions from his previous placing. Anatoli Strokatov, of the Soviet Union, the defeated finalist in Prague, is advanced thirteen positions, from No. 24 to No. 11, while China's Kua Yao-hua, the losing finalist in Pyongyang, comes in at No. 8, from nowhere, ahead of his compatriot Li Cheng-shih. Cheng-shih.

Both England's Denis Neale and Nicky Jarvis have been uplifted, the former from No. 25 to joint 19th, and Nicky from No. 34 to No. 22. Trevor Taylor, the former English international, now well established in Holland, is omitted, having previously been listed at No. 20.

On the distaff side, **Pak Yung Sun** (Korea DPR) retains her No. 1 position, afforded her after her women's singles victory in

SENSATIONAL DEFEAT AT MANCHESTER Shocks abounded in the men's singles event of the Wilson's Brewery-sponsored North of England 2-Star Open at Manchester, on September 25, none more so than the 4th round dismissal of Desmond Douglas, the reigning English champion and defending title-holder, seeded No. 2, who was sum-marily despatched 11 and 15 by Stephen Cowley, the 16-year-old junior champion of the Bolton League.

the Bolton League. Young Cowley eventually fell to Nigel Eckersley in the quarters, at which stage Jimmy Walker, seeded No. 3, took his departure when beaten by Donald Parker, Prior to this, in Round 5, Denis Neale, seeded No. 1 because of his world and European ranking, was ousted by Chris Sewell, a player in his first season out of the junior ranks having, in July, been a mem-ber of England's team in the European Youth Championships in Mödling, Austria.

Thus was the way opened for Paul Day, the beaten finalist in Mödling, and the 4th seed at Manchester, to snap up the title with a final win over Parker after eliminat-ing John Hilton in the penultimate round.

Top seed **Carole Knight** was a comfortable winner of the women's singles title beating the holder, Susan Lisle, in a one-sided final encounter which reversed the result of last season and of the previous evening when, at Hyde, Cheshire played Cleveland in a Premier Division County match, which the North-Easterners won 8-1.

England's No, 2, Nicky Jarvis—a non-starter at Manchester—won the men's singles title in the **Cumbria 2-Star Open**, at **Carlisle**, on October 2, his final victim being the defending title-holder, Jimmy Walker.

There were no giant-killing feats from Cowley on this occasion nor from anyone else. Again in the boys' singles the young

Lancastrian failed to make any substantial Lancastrian failed to make any substantial progress, being humbled 11 and 8 by Paul Hindle, of Cleveland, in Round 3. Eventual winner of this event was **Chris Reed**, who performed most creditably in beating both Kevin Beadsley and Tony O'Connor, the latter a late stand-in for the absent Keith Paxton.

In a turbulent women's singles final, Carole Knight again got the better of Susan Lisle, the only real shock of the day being at the starting time when not a table was to be seen. But when they did arrive, some 15 minutes overdue, they were put up in record time by so many willing hands, it was untrue. In the **Coaching Field**

by JOHN O'SULLIVAN

After giving many reports on its progress and stating the amount of work required to put it all together, the E.T.T.A. Coaching Manual is now complete.

As from October 1 last, this Manual became the official reference book for the training of student coaches in the E.T.T.A's National Coaching Scheme.

All new students to register from that date will receive a copy of the Manual together with Log Book, at an enrolment fee of £3.50.

Students who enrolled before October 1 and paid an enrolment fee of £2.25 may now obtain the Manual at a cost of £1.25 on request to Jack Carrington, at 71 Maplin Way, Thorpe Bay, Essex. Similarly, any coach who qualified before October 1 and whose name is included in the current Pagister of Coaches and obtain the Monuel Register of Coaches, can obtain the Manual at the same cost of £1.25.

Other affiliated members of the E.T.T.A who wish to purchase a copy may do so at a cost of £3.25 on application to Jack Carrington.

One would wish to record due thanks on behalf of the National Coaching and Schools' Committee to the firm of John Jaques & Son Limited, for their generous contribution towards the production costs of the publication.

It must be stressed, however, that the main function of the Manual is as a reference to the training of coaches. It is not intended to be used as a training programme for use with pupils on table tennis courses.

As from October 1, all student coaches' assessments and qualifications will be in agreement with the coaching Manual. This standardisation is carried further with a revised paper on coaching awards procedure for all grades of coaching which again will be in line with the Manual.

CO-OPERATION

Coaches who administer coaching on the various Panels require the co-operation of the Counties within their panels. It is diffi-cult to plan programmes and run courses, only to find that a County has arranged a squad-training session for the same date.

It was suggested at a recent meeting of the National Coaching and Schools' Com-mmittee that efforts should be made for greater liaison between County and Panels and that Counties should have a representative on Panel Committees. It is not unusual to find that some County officials know little of Panel programmes, or what Panel their County actually belongs to!

Coaching, be it at County or Panel level, benefits all and should be a joint operation rather than isolated groups. Many coaches who help to staff courses, both at Panel and County level, may find that the information in the coaching Manual differs from

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their way of thinking.

This is most likely if the coach qualified a number of years ago. It could be a good reason to book on to the next available refresher course, for the methods and con-tent are continually being updated, and the present format is the result of many hours discussion and research by the National Coaches in consultation with senior coaches throughout the country.

Congratulations are due to Bob Wiley, of Cleveland, on his upgrading to 3-Star Coach. Bob is well known in the coaching field, not only for his instruction but also for his expertise in physical training, for which there is a great need in most parts of the country.

When the National Coaching and Schools' Committee meet, the agenda is such that the meetings may go on into the small hours. At the last meeting Ron Crayden, chairman of the National Selection Committee, was in attendance, and the mem-bers took the opportunity to question him on many aspects concerning the workings of his committee.

The discussion that followed on selection matters, even allowing for a full agenda, was extensive and searching, especially in regard to the assessment of potential national juniors.

Ron explained the current policy of the selection committee, and took note of the feelings expressed to put forward to his own committee at a future meeting.

NEW METHOD FOR YORKSHIRE "CADET" ASSESSMENTS by Eric Hill

(Yorkshire Coaching Secretary) This year it was decided that for the Under-14's, instead of just having a trial,

we would have assessments and then a selected Under-14 trial.

Nominations were requested through coaching secretaries and coaches from all parts of Yorkshire. The result was that we girls. On the actual day 38 boys and 15 girls turned up to be assessed.

The first step was for each player to be documented—we now have name, address, date of birth, name of coach, past exper-ience, including how many matches they play and how often they practice each week.

The next step was for teams of three coaches to assess each player on rating, uniformity and consistency of stroke accuracy, co-ordination, dexterity and anticipation. The individual marks of the coaches were then transferred to a "master copy" so that an average assessment for each player was obtained.

Copies of the "master copy" were then returned to coaches so that they could see in the opinion of other coaches, the strengths and weaknesses of their pupils. Selections were made from these forms, along with advice from senior coaches, for our Under-14 trials. We believe that these assessments will be of great help in the future and that we are getting table tennis on to a sounder basis. We now have a file on 53 players, which means we do not have to rely on memory alone, or on the odd over-zealous coach being too ambitious for his particular pupil.

It did entail a lot of hard work and I should like to take this opportunity to thank Peter Simpson, whose idea it was, for showing me the way, and all the coaches for their most generous help on our first assessment day, held at Moor Grange School, Leeds, on September 5th, 1976.

Belinda Chamberlain, our leading junior girl, deservedly heads this column this month having obtained a No. 19 national junior ranking. The St. Neots girl had previously been in the "A" Group for the past two seasons. The new rating is well justified and before the end of the season a higher ranking still may well be merited.

Hunts will again turn out three teams in the County Championships. Few, if any changes can be expected at senior level after our best ever return last season. Under the leadership of Alan Lamprell similar performances will be the order of the day.

The juniors had some slightly disappointing showings last season but here also hopes are high. Belinda Chamberlain and Melanie Ringrose are certain to fill the distaff roles while the Fisher twins, Mark and Steven, look set to again fill the leading two boys' positions. Stuart Smith, the promising Peterborough youngster should com-plete the quintet for the opening encounter against Bedfordshire. In view of tough opposition the vets seem to average one win per season but now with a larger pool of players a more optim-istic position can be sought.

The County's three member leagues, Hunts, entral, St. Neots and Peterborough, have en-Central, tered the largest-ever number of representative teams in the inter-league competition of the S.E. Midland League. An early warning has been given by the St. Neots men who have obtained 1st Divison wins over Bedford and Wisbech, 6-4 on each occasion, after gaining promotion.

Hunts Central's second men's team went under to an experienced Cambridge side 1-9. The "whitewash' was prevented by Mark Fisher beating Ken Green. Central's vets had their usual close tussle with Wellingborough, a 5-5 draw being the outcome. The same league's reserve team got off on the right note beating Kettering 8-2.

St, Neots vets, always a force to be reckoned with, toppled Bedford 6-4. Hunts Central held a successful pre-season tournament at St. Ivo Rec. Centre, St. Ives county men's singles winner Tim Speller added to his trophy cabinet by overhauling N.C.I. Cambridge player David Tiplady in straight games. Speller had looked set to make an exit a round earlier when at 17-19 down in the decider against clubmate Martin Murden he reeled off 4 consecutive points. Tiplady was also taken to three by Sid Burgess.

Peterborough held a tournament as part of the "Sport for All" week. A good sized entry provided keen competition with Peter Berna confirming his leading rating by winning the final. Opposing Peter in the final was the county's leading lady Jean Allinson.

The St_Ives club lifted the Cambridge Summer League trophy at the first attempt thanks to a final win by Speller, Jim Sizer and Mark Fisher. In the final they defeated Telephones II 6-3 with each of the trio having two wins.

All three leagues within our Association report healthy increases in their numbers with Peterborough still leading in numbers. They now have 7 divisions with 11 teams in each. Central provide 6 divisions for their 59 teams while St. Neots continue with 3 divisions but with a higher ratio of teams per division.

At the Essex and Newbury Junior Opens Mel-anie Ringrose and Julie Cundell reached the last 8 on both occasions whilst some encouraging res-ults have been forthcoming by 10-years-old new-comer Richard Ballard of St. Ives in both the Cadet and U-12 events

Hunts named Grahame Dale, David Thorogood, Richard Wells Melanie Ringrose and Julie Cundell for their opening match against Beds in late October, Ken Chamberlain adds the Cadet and Junior team captainy to his already full administrative programme. But special thanks are due to Cliff Olver who has filled the role of Junior Captain since our initial entry in the County Championships.

Cliff has now stepped down but I know the 23 youngsters who have played for the junior team over the period have a lot to thank him for. Finally a welcome back to our County Chairman, Mappin Webb, back in circulation after spending most of last season Down Under.

SAD START TO THE SEASON

The start to the season has not been a particularly happy one, the worst news being the death of our President, Frank Newell, on Sept. 9, Frank who was also President of the Cheltenham Association, died of cancer and his death was not entirely unexpected. The Secretary of the CTTA has written a fuller obituary elsewhere in this issue and I do not propose to write further on the subject other than to state that I am certain he will be very sorely missed in the table tennis world.

No competitive matches have been played by town teams at the time of writing other than that played by Gloucester City juniors in the Midland League, at home to Wolverhampton. This match was something of a disaster, as having been relegated last season, it came as a shock when we crashed 2-8 against a younger and less experienced side who were without their best player.

Turning to the leagues I am glad to report that Stroud has a record 48 teams in four divisions whilst Gloucester have 96 teams in eight divisions and Cheltenham 71 teams in six divions. Three new clubs have entered the Gloucester league, the Rising Star Youth Club, Hucclecote MYC, and two teams from Churchdown Club and there are still a few teams waiting to fill places if anyone drops out. There are two new clubs in the Cheltenham league, Up Hatherley and Sun Alliance (from Gloucester) whilst Hospitals have returned after several seasons' absence.

Stroud men's team for their opening match against Bromsgrove in the Midland League con-sists of Alan Giles, Roger Webb and Martin Armstrong whilst 12-years-old Andrew Golding re-ceives recognition at senior level for the first time, being named as reserve.

Cheltenham's Dave Harvey has attained early success in open tournaments this season getting to the final of the men's singles in the Four T's 1-Star only to lose 18 in the third to Englandranked junior Graham Sandley. Dave followed this up by winning the Men's Doubles with Steve Moreman at the Merton I-Star. DETERMINATION

On the playing side, Bucks finished last season on a very low ebb with our senior team finishing rock bottom in Div. 3 South.

But far from driving the county's management council to the depths of despair, and along with the realisation that our playing standards can hardly get worse, a sense of determination is rapidly developing within the county to put us firmly back on the map.

The county's A.G.M. approved the running of second senior and junior teams, and luck was on our side when, due to some geographical manipulation, our senior first team somehow managed to hold its ground in Div.2 East. Having our junior first and second teams both in Div. 3 was not to the apparent satisfaction of everyone in Bucks but we should really count our blessings that all our teams are not in this division!

Many innovations have been introduced by county administrators this season with the future very much in mind. Surprisingly, the squad system has never seriously been used by Bucks before, but it is now being developed on senior, junior and cadet levels. The senior and junior selection committees are now meeting and working together under the very able chairmanship of Mick Willett to ensure that the same basic policies are carried out harmoniously at all levels.

The Cadet Trials were held in Milton Keynes in early September, and bearing in mind they were the first such trials to be held by Bucks the entry of 23 youngsters was a pleasing sight. An initial squad was immediately set up, and following the Junior Trials was amended on the basis of the extra information subsequently gleaned by yours truly as Coaching Secretary.

Many members of this squad will be given county match experience through the junior second team, which is basically being used as a nursery team, and the formation of this squad is creating so much interest within the county that the need for a third junior team next season is already becoming apparent,

This puts the onus on the junior first team to gain promotion, and although the abolition of mixed doubles in the County Championships is probably to our immediate disadvantage at all levels, I would certainly not put it past them to succeed in this task.

The Junior Trials were held in Aylesbury in mid-September and were notable for a large number of juniors failing to turn up, thus wrecking the balance of the carefully-prepared initial groups, and also for the performance of Sam Harmer, who amazingly failed to make the final group of 8 boys. Chris Leslie was left to dominate the boys event, while Ian Haines, who continues to make rapid strides forward, was a clear second. In the absence of Christine Bahryj. Dawn Risby topped the girls' event, having earlier done likewise in the Cadet Trials, with Jo Catchpole finishing second in what was largely a trouble-free event

Sadly to report, petty arguments immediately began to rage over the Boys' trial, but both the Management Council and Joint Selection Committees backed up its organisation and common sense eventually prevailed when the Junior Ranknig Lists were issued. They are:

Tony Clark remained in the first team picture by taking third place, while the excellent form showed by John Leith indicated that he will make a more than useful playing captain for the second team. The fact that Robert Harman, who showed great promise in the first team games last season, will be starting off in the second team this time demonstrates the greater all round strength of our men, whilst at the same time I cannot resist mentioning the likely revival of the Wat-Wood doubles combination, the thought of which can only send shivers down the spines of prospective opponents.

The Men's Ranking List has recently been decided upon but as it is at present in Mick Willett's hot little hands I will reveal it next month, by which time we will have hopefully decided upon our Women's list. Well organised, aren't we?

A further Women's Trial will have been held by then, in which the main successes of the original trial, Stephanie Lines, Sue James, Ivy Cooper and Christine Darcey, will be pitted against a selection of the absentees who, the selectors feel, must be given a chance of proving their worth for the benefit of the county.

On the local league front. Slough staged an exhibition of local players who have "made good" at Montem Sports Centre as part of "Sport for All" week. It goes without saying that the big attraction was Jill Hammersley, who, along with other Bucks stalwarts from Slough, drew a massive audience to make the venture a considerable success.

After many years of invaluable active service, Don Norton has retired as High Wycombe General Secretary, needless to say much to the regret of the league's committee who, I know, would like to express their thanks through this column for the tremendous job he has done over the years.

Entries to our leagues are particularly healthy this season, with Buckingham in particular showing a welcome upsurge of interest. Milton Keynesare intending to hold a restricted open tournament this season under the sponsorship of Connells, a local firm of estate agents.

Finally, our Closed Championships will once again be held at Montem Sports Centre, Slough, this season on the week-end of Feb. 12/13.

TO THE PRIME MINISTER

I am writing to you because I feel that you should be informed direct about a situation which has occurred in the Table Tennis world in this country.

Next March, in Birmingham, the English Table Tennis Association are staging the World Championships. This is obviously the greatest tournament any country can hold.

Almost certainly the best tables in the world are made by a British company named John Jaques & Son Ltd., of Thornton Heath, who introduced the game at the turn of the century and whose tables have been used at most major events throughout the world ever since.

Regrettably the E.T.T.A. have decided to use a foreign table tennis table despite the fact that Jaques had agreed to meet the required sponsorship costs in full for the use of their tables.

I feel so strongly about this that I think the whole situation should be investigated, especially as the tournament is very heavily sponsored by the Sports Council and, of course, involves a large expenditure of Tax-payers' money.

I await your favourable reply and trust that there will be some constructive action taken either by yourself or the Sports Council.

You will have received a letter dated 9th October, 1976, from a Mr. Keith Buckle, who is the Press Officer of the Players' Associa-tion of Table Tennis and of the North Middlesex Table Tennis League. It is not clear from that letter whether he was writing it in his private capacity or in his capacity as Press Officer of both these bodies. I make this observation because the letter was not written on headed notepaper.

Mr. Buckle voices his protest that the English Table Tennis Association should have chosen a foreign table for the World Championships, to be held next March, in Birmingham. He says that this is so "despite the fact that" John Jaques & Son Ltd., the well-known British company, "had agreed to meet the required sponsorship costs in full for the use of their tables" full for the use of their tables"

Mr. Buckle's letter is correct insofar as it

goes, but the officers of the English Table goes, but the officers of the English Table Tennis Association have directed me to write to you to correct any wrong impres-sion which you may have gained from Mr. Buckle's letter. It is considered that his letter could give the impression that the E.T.T.A. were bound by some form of agree-ment to John Jaques & Son Ltd. for them ment to John Jaques & Son Ltd. for them to be the sponsors of the World Champion-ships. This was not so and although they had agreed, in the sense of "offered", to sponsor the World Championships, their offer had not been accepted by the E.T.T.A. The E.T.T.A. considered John Jaques & Son Ltd's offer most carefully and they also considered that the offer made by Stiga AB was more advantageous to the E.T.T.A. and all its members than that made by John all its members than that made by John Jaques & Son Ltd., although their offer was a good one. I do not intend in this letter to go into the details and reasoning why this decision was reached, but I am instructed to say that the E.T.T.A. are only too willing to defend their decision openly and in detail if so required.

OUT OF REACH

Having just received another copy of a certain retailer's table tennis catalogue, the fourth from the same company, I was prompted to look more closely at the current prices of table tennis equipment. At first I thought there might have been some printing errors!

A year ago the Bishops High started to save up for a Stiga Robot, as it seemed an save up for a Stiga Robot, as it seemed an ideal piece of equipment to aid Alan Lampe with his coaching groups at the club. At that time the Robot was listed at £340, by the New Year it had risen to over £500 and now it is on offer at nearly £1,000. In the space of a few months it has passed out of the reach of all clubs, no matter how affluent they might be.

I am also concerned about the steep rise I am also concerned about the steep rise in bat prices. Why should a small piece of shaped plywood cost around £8 even before the rubber has been added? Compared with tennis and badminton rackets, which require a great deal more machining and craftsmanship in manufacture, the table tennis bat is very poor value for money. As the Bishops High T.T.C. is a school club I am involved a lot of the time with begin-ners who are introduced to the sport when ners who are introduced to the sport when they are 11-12 year olds. Buying their first bats presents no problems, as there are many reasonably priced ones on the market After a few months, when they need to progress to a faster rubber, they are faced with an outlay of upwards of £8.

If the trend continues, reasonably priced goods will be a thing of the past, and the sport will become one for well-off players only. Sportacus '77 would be an ideal time for a British company to introduce a sensibly priced range of bats using British materials and maybe a company will come up with a training machine that clubs could afford afford.

SHROPSHIRE NOTES

ADVISORY COUNCILS

The report recently prepared by the West Midland Standing Conference of Sports Organisations shows that there are 59 sports working with the various Sports Advisory Councils (SACs) in the West Midlands. Association football has the most representations (28) and other well represented sports are cricket (26), badminton, bowls and swimming (24 each), angling and lawn tennis (23 each), athletics, hockey and rugby football (21 each). Table tennis follows with 20. Table tennis has a voice on 4 SACs in Shropshire.

In Shropshire the other indoor sports now provide serious competition to table tennis for the leisure time of the limited number of sportsmen: excellent facilities are now being provided for them. The luxurious privately owned Shifnal Sports Centre has recently boosted its number of squash courts to nine and has opened a new badminton hall. This hall will be the venue of a table tennis county match during the current season.

SACs provide information on local facilities for sport and assist with the formation and growth of clubs. Very little of the financial assistance that is available to clubs directly assists table tennis in Shropshire. I believe that the club at Albrighton is the only single sport table tennis club eligible for financial aid.

The modern Oakengates Leisure Centre was the venue for the finals of the judo and table tennis sections of the Shropshire Mini-Olympics organised by the Shropshire SACs, 24 different sports participated in this event throughout the county, leading up to finals in the "Sport for All" week. The Oakengates Centre is typical of those now being provided in Shropshire by local authorities. being provided in Shropshire by local authorities. The latest, opened in July at Bridgnorth, is already very well supported. The finals of the table tennis events took the form of a tournament between teams representing the Bridgnorth, Shrewsbury and Wrekin SACs. Each team, combackwoodly and witchin SACs. Each team, com-posed of players living within the area of the SAC they represented, consisted of 1 man, 1 woman, 1 veteran, 1 junior girl, 1 junior boy, 1 cadet girl and 1 cadet boy. Each player played the other 2 members in his class. The teams were:

This is an annual affair and used often as a county trial unofficially of course. The top eight men are invited to compete in a straight knockout, best of five. For the first time for several years this curtain-raising event saw all eight of the top Sussex men on parade—Chandler, Clarke, Ogundipe, Pugh, Horton, Douglas, Emecz and Stace.

One of the surprises was that Sam Ogundipe is still getting them back as well as ever. Sam reached the final via the bottom half pair of Stace and young Douglas who took the Nigerian international to expedite. In the top half Gerald Pugh was taken out 3-0 by Chandler whilst Clarke progressed at the expense of Keith Horton.

John Clarke, 28 and playing probably better now than he did for Lancashire some time back, saw the conditions at the Bexhill Youth Centre would suit a fast approach and overcame Chandler at 24-22 in the fourth, clearly the best win of the afternoon, Clarke then proved he could deal with any type of player by stopping Ogundipe in the final in straight games.

Indeed she was and still is, but on this occasion Diane scented the danger and elevated her performance to a level that saw Miss Randall going down 21-15, 21-15 in the final. Future battles between these two girls this season promise to be enthralling.

So the season begins with Roger Chandler and John Clarke fighting for county supremacy and fierce rivalry between Diane Gard and Carol Randall. Both pairs seem to be ahead of their rivals, but the Crawley contingent will have other ideas and a *stop press* item: Julie Reading is seeking a transfer from Hampshire to Sussex — at least that makes up for Linda Wales!

Bexhill's group of budding young stars are facing a long itinerary of tournaments this season. First two successes, a Group "A" ranking for Graham Gillett and an Under-12 final victory for Adrian Moore at the Essex Junior Open, There are several other youngsters strong enough to make their mark at tournaments. Nicky Standen and Stephen Moore are just two of them. The new Sussex No. 1 is Graham Gillett, watch out also for the new No. 2 Malcolm Francis from Uckfield — the newest recruit in the lions' den in the Crawley league, first division.

THIN ICE, MR. BUCKLE . . .

Keith Buckle is skating on thin ice as he stirs up this hornet's nest over which tables will be used at the World Championships.

There is no sentiment in business—the World's IS Big Business. £500,000 cannot be spent without hard bargains. Especially in these terrible financial times every business battle cannot be won. Similar situations happen daily in every town hall and in thousands of businesses throughout the world.

Party A has a large and juicy carrot to dangle. The proper democratic process is that parties X, Y and Z are invited to bid. The vendor is not obliged to accept the highest or the lowest or any tender. The most vital principle is that the vendor should not under any circumstances reveal to the bidders the details of the other tenders. That would be "horse-trading" as Mike Lawless so rightly says. Mike Lawless so rightly says.

Mr. Buckle is apparently suggesting that regardless of the amounts of money offered by the three companies, the tender should have been given to one specified British company.

I am sure that had the E.T.T.A. officers taken that course they would have been in trouble with the National Council, the body that represents 250,000 English players as opposed to the Players' Association of Table Tennis, which has yet to prove it represents more than a handful of players!

Not that I am opposed to the existence of P.A.T.T. Collective bargaining is a "must" in 1976; lone voices are seldom heard.

On October 16, the E.T.T.A. National Council moved on firm ground when they almost unanimously ratified the decisions taken by the World Championships Executive Committee. Make no mistake about this, had the vote gone the other way—it was in effect a vote of confidence—highlevel resignations might well have followed.

Roy Moor, table tennis correspondent of the "Daily Mail", gave the hornet's nest a justifiable second kick on October 13 with a story that is at least valuable publicity for the World Championships. But, the impli-cation in the opening paragraph that many England players were furious because Stiga tables have been chosen, I have found very difficult to confirm.

No doubt at all that Mr. Buckle is "furious" otherwise he would not have written to the Prime Minister. No doubt that Chris Jaques was "flabbergasted" but I still have to find these furious England players.

I believe the vast majority of foreign players coming to Birmingham will happily players coming to Birmingham with happing accept Stiga tables. There is also no doubt in my mind and everyone seems to agree on this one—Jill Hammersley, England's greatest hope for honours, is more likely to do well on a Stiga table!

NEALE IN DETERMINED MOOD

Although this season's Humberside 3-Star Open, generously sponsored by the Humberside County Leisure Services Committee, side County Leisure Services Committee, represented by Chairman Terry Geraghty, and the Dunlop Sports Company, equally well represented by former international star Alan Hydes, was probably most note-worthy for the mediocrity of its finals, there was nevertheless much of interest for the table tennis enthusiast.

Top of the list in this World Championship season, was the obvious determination of Denis Neale to regain the No. 1 spot from which he has been missing for some two years, and his semi-final clash with current No. 1 and top seed Desmond Douglas, must be regarded as the set of the tournament.

The chunky Neale, showing much of the fast reaction and the ability to play sharply angled balls that was a hallmark of the days when he was the undisputed champion, sailed away with the first game, but when he trailed in the second one wondered whether he had shot his bolt and the younger Douglas was going to cash in with the next two.

Back came Neale, however, with all the old grit, only to go down at 21-23 and, when he again fell behind in the final game, he had it all to do again. Yet back he came again to square matters off and leap high with delight as he finally edged home at 19.

Having held off the challenge of arch the middle game at 19, he smashed aside the challenge of the rising Paul Day with single figure scores in the other two.

Day, who crushed an out-of-touch Nicky Jarvis in the other semi-final, figured in one of the other great moments of the tournament when he put an end to the capers of Duggie Johnson in the last eight.

Johnson, whose magnificent defensive capabilities must soon bring him to the selectors' notice, struggled through in three against David Constance (Cheshire) before going on to prise out fourth seed Jimmy Walker in his second outing to the table, and then despatched local boy and former international, Tony Clayton, in Round 4 before lining up against Day.

Here we had yet another set of cut and thrust, with every point disputed fiercely, before Day's superbly controlled top spin finally brought him victory at 22 in the third in a set which neither player deserved to lose

Elsewhere, with the exception of Ian Horsham, who went out to the always dangerous John Hilton, the seeds came through as predicted, and it remains only to note good wins by Joe Kennedy over the higher ranked Keith Paxton—his second of Higher ranket Reith Patton—his second of the tournament—by Clayton over former Hull colleague, Jean Krier, from Luxem-bourg, and the prospect of an upset when Donald Parker took the first set off Neale in a Round 2 match.

Moving over to the distaff side, there were surprises a-plenty after the event had been thrown open by the withdrawal of the unfit Jill Hammersley, and here, too, we had a heroine who "did a Johnson".

June Williams, still in the junior ranks and not considered among the seniors, opened her programme with a win over Ormesby colleague, Angela Tierney, went on

to dismiss Karen Rogers in three long games to earn a semi-final crack at Linda Howard, who had taken over the top seeded position from Mrs. Hammersley

This task would have daunted most, but the flame-haired Teessider tore into her illustrious rival to take the first at 14 and, although Linda recovered her composure somewhat in the second, it was too late and the final lay between June and Carole Knight, top of the pack at Ormesby.

Once again, however, the final failed to live up to expectations, the younger girl, who had looked so good in the earlier rounds, suddenly seizing up with Carole picking up the points at her leisure.

There was consolation for Miss Williams in the Women's Doubles where, partnering against Anita Stevenson/Susan Lisle, who had put out Carole Knight/Karen Rogers in the semi.

The Men's Doubles saw the singles win-ner team with semi-final victim Douglas to take the title in two single-figure games against Parker/Alan Hydes, who brought to an end the capers of Hilton/Phil Bowen, who had themselves shot out second-seeded Jarvis/Walker.

Other good results in this event were the victory of Ian Horsham/Bob Potton over the scratch pairing of Day/Nigel Eckersley and the defeat of Derbyshire youngsters David Yallop/Mike Vickers in three by Neale/Douglas.

Both Douglas and Linda Howard added a second title as they won the Mixed at the expense of Day/Angela Mitchell, who had made the last hurdle over the backs of the second seeds, Neale/Miss Knight.

With the juniors, Kennedy had the first of his wins over Paxton to clinch a final place which brought him up against No. 1 seed, Martin Shuttle, but, although he took the first game in the final, the England No. 1 came through comfortably enough in the end.

Karen Witt won the Girls', again in three, with Angela Mitchell, as expected, the runner-up, while in the Veteran event Derek Schofield, long a favourite on Hum-berside, was the winner over County col-league Peter D'Arcy.

Press Conference Statements

Four years ago we came into table tennis and have since financially helped the English Table Tennis Association to stage the two premier competitions in the Association's year, the Norwich Union English Championships and Norwich Union International Championships. Our contract with the English Table Tennis Association finished with the Norwich Union English Championships in April, 1976.

We have asked you here today to tell you of our continuing involvement in table tennis. We have agreed to three years further sponsorship in a package which will include all the major table tennis championships in England for the next three years, including the 34th World Table Tennis Championships, which will take place from 26th March to 5th April, 1977, at the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham. The Norwich Union involvement in the English and International Championships continues, therefore, until 1979.

In 1926 the first World Championships were held in London, with seven countries taking part, when, believe it or not, sponsorship was around, but of a different kind. The Championships were sponsored personally, at a cost of f300, by the Hon. Ivor Montagu. Seven countries in 1926—we hope to have more than 70 in 1977, where finances for the English Table Tennis Association in the region of f_2^1 million will be involved.

We have enjoyed our four years in table tennis. We have come to know a lot of wonderful people. The very dedicated permanent officials all round the country who help to keep 9,000 clubs, a quarter of a million players, leagues and championships all thriving.

I am delighted that our new agreement extends to 1979 and that we can play our part in helping the development of table tennis after the World Championships.

NORWICH UNION INSURANCE

Founded in 1797, Norwich Union is one of the top half-dozen British insurance groups, with a world-wide staff of 10,000 and operations in over 60 countries. Thirtysix per cent of their premiums were earned abroad last year.

The parent company is the Norwich Union Life Insurance Society, which is a "mutual" company—meaning that there are no shareholders, so that all profits revert to the policyholders.

The main subsidiary, Norwich Union Fire, specialises in fire, accident and marine insurance, and the group also includes Anglo-Portuguese Bank and Norwich General Trust, which provide banking services to industry and commerce. Total assets of the group are now over £1,250 million.

English table tennis has been sponsored by Norwich Union since 1973, when the English Closed and Open Championships became known as the Norwich Union English and the Norwich Union International Table Tennis Championships.

In 1974 and 1975 the Norwich Union sponsored a world open snooker championship in London.

IN REPLY . . .

That financial support by commerce and industry is vital to the development of so many sports is so often quoted does not deter me from again referring to it. However, we of the English Table Tennis Association have never regarded sponsors as benefactors and have always looked on our agreements as "partnerships", in which mutual satisfaction is as important as the overall success of the sponsored event.

That our approach to sponsored event. That our approach to sponsored event. correct is emphasised by the fact that a company of such prestige as Norwich Union Insurance—and one no doubt inundated with sponsorship proposals—should be pleased to enter into a second agreement with the English Table Tennis Association, which when it expires will show that company's continuous involvement with table tennis for seven years. I am confident that we will at that stage overcome any "seven year itch" and go on to further the association between the two parties.

I would like to record our thanks to Mr. McDonnell for his company's continued support and thus their show of faith in our management abilities.

One of your esteemed colleagues, Frank Butler, referring to the 1977 World Championships which we will be staging, wrote:

"The Birmingham venture—which will take place from March 26th to April 5th, 1977—will be the biggest thing that has happened to table tennis."

I will go further. These championships will be the largest single-sport event held in this country and will attract the participation of far more countries than any other sporting occasion ever before held in England.

John McDonnell has referred to the firstever World Championships held at the Memorial Hall in 1926 when the Hon. Ivor Montagu met the cost—some £300—from a legacy. Ivor is today the Life Vice-President of the English Table Tennis Association but, after careful thought, we decided that it would be wrong for him to have the opportunity of again sponsoring a World Championships and we turned to our friends from Norwich to help us meet the estimated cost of the $\frac{1}{2}$ million pounds!

Although I see that the assets of Norwich Union Insurance now total over £1,250 million, we agreed on a smaller but nevertheless very substantial sum of over £50,000 for the three years sponsorship package.

Background notes on the arrangements of the World Championships are in the folder you have been given, but I would like to mention, with pleasure, two further points. We have been informed by the Sports Council that in the special year of 1977 we can incorporate the word "Jubilee" in the title of the events; 1977 will also see the 50th Anniversary of the English Table Tennis Association and of the International Table Tennis Federation. The second point is that table tennis will be featured in a set of stamps to be issued by the Post Office early in 1977.

These two points really do stress the importance of these Championships and the

European Superstars

The British heat of the European Superstars competition, presented by Trans World International, was staged at St. Ivo Recreation Centre, Cambridge, on June 3-4. The Superstars competition will be shown in several European countries and later this month on B.B.C.

Table tennis was included as one of the nine sports together with swimming, canceing, weightlifting, gymnastics, pistol shoot-ing, soccer, cycling and athletics. Our sport was featured on the first afternoon in the main sports hall with an audience of around 300.

A late lunch brought about by several hitches at the canoeing gave the competi-tors little time for practice and the first reaction being that most of the stars looked more at home in the other sports than T.T. Two new tables were used for the quarter-tingle each of just one game. finals, each of just one game.

John Conteh, the World light-heavy-weight champion, and undoubtedly the crowd's choice, started proceedings with a 21-8 win over World speed skating cham-pion, Pat Kleine, of Holland. Late replace-ment, skier Christian Neuretter, was then matched with Henry Dwilliard (World professional ski champion).

Both players arrived at the table with similar coloured shirts and the latter had to go through a workmanlike few minutes as he changed no fewer than five times before one was found suitable for the box. Neuretter won 21-12.

Following two skiers the third quarter matched Belgium football captain, Maurice Martens with Peter Shilton (Stoke and England), Shilton finding the net more times than he usually hopes his opponents would do and went out 13-21. Thomas Mag-nusson, Sweden's leading cross-country skier, then encountered Bernard Roussi, an Olympic Gold Medalist and the last of the eight stars.

The tall Swede proved too strong, gaining The tall swede proved too strong, gaining a 21-15 advantage. Conteh lost his bat somewhere during the quarters and semis and found no more success on the table with a replacement, bailing out on a 21-11 result. Magnusson then outplayed Martens, who had placed table tennis as his favourite pastime in the programme. One hopes that a 21-7 drubbing does not alter the mind.

Commentators David Vine and Ron Pickering were by now interviewing almost everybody, as were the commentators of the everybody, as were the commentators of the other televising countries. After some delay one table was positioned in the centre of the hall and Magnusson faced Neuretter, not, I might add, on skis. The former looked throughout the competition as the best of the players and with an array of various spin services, very few of which came back on his side of the table, he was able to collect the maximum points for the table tennis section. CLARIFICATION

I wonder if you would be kind enough to clarify a point for me. Several people have noticed that quite a wide range of T.T. bats are now being advertised with 2.5 mm thick-ness. Is this the combined sponge and rubber measurement? For if it refers to just sponge or just rubber, surely it contravenes the bat regulations unless, of course, these have been altered since 2 mm was the maximum thickness as far as I was aware.

Another point of recent contention has concerned the Expedite rule. In a recent game in which one end took 33 minutes! the general opinion amongst the players seemed to be that Expedite Rule could only be applied if both players had been notified by the Umpire prior to the start of the set I understood that the "Expedite" was just like any other rule, e.g., volley, service, etc., and would be applied as and when neces-sary. Could you please resolve this for me.

Colin Clemett, Secretary of the National Umpires' and Referees' Committee, replies:

I am fairly sure that the advertisements to which Mr. Sleight refers are for bats covered with sandwich rubber of one type or another, as most are nowadays. If so, the permitted thickness is up to 4 mm and these bats are well within the limit. The 2mm limit applies only to what used to be known as "ordinary, plain, pimpled rubber", which now seems to be the exception rather than the rule for bat coverings.

Mr. Sleight is perfectly correct in his

understanding of the Expedite Rule. It is an I.T.T.F. law and, as the E.T.T.A. plays under these laws, it is to be applied to any match. I think the confusion arises from the fact that, originally, this Rule was compulsory only for certain international events and, at other events, the organisers could decide whether or not it would be applied. However, this situation changed in 1967 and the Expedite Rule became part of the laws.



NEALE TAKES TOP SPOT

"Like Jill, I shall be most surprised if they don't reach the top world class", says Johnny Leach.

John Souter's success was the more remarkable since he was obliged to compete in the finals with a broken arm, the result of a football injury suffered only four days beforehand. "My arm hurt a bit, but I was determined to take part and win", said John.

Despite his handicap, John was the unanimous choice of all four judges—Jill Hammersley, Alan Hydes, Suzanne Kavelleriou and Paul Beck. Runners-up to him were 14-years-old David McIlroy, of Glasgow, and 15-years-old Malcolm Green, of Shrewsbury, who were within two points of each other.

Helen Williams had a much closer battle in the girls' section. with 15-years-old Mandy Wallis, of Wellingborough, Northants, narrowly missing out for the second year in succession. Thirteen-years-old Janet Deakin, of Warrington, Cheshire, was third.

The system of judging is unique in that no matches are played throughout the competition. Competitors are awarded marks at coaching sessions for ball control, stroke production and general promise. And results over 22 years prove that this is the most effective method of discovering future champions.

Winners of the Pupil Partners' Challenge Cup were Butlin's Minehead Camp represented by Malcolm Green and Helen Williams. In the final Malcolm and Helen defeated David Clegg and Joanne Palmer (Butlin's Filey Camp) by 21-18, 21-13. This popular event was very strongly contested, and the standard of doubles play has seldom been higher. David Green (14) is a member of the Stanley Square Club, Stalybridge, and Joanne Palmer (15), is a member of the Soham Club, near Newmarket.

SELECT TOURNAMENTS

The "Select" system has been criticised in recent months due to its apparent lack of success. There is nothing wrong with the select system. It is ideal for our requirements, just as the 3-Star system is right for the Senior tournaments.

The problems in recent months that have led to the criticism of "select" tournaments, have been caused not by a bad system, but by unco-operative players and poor organisation.

The Cleveland Select in September proved the value of the system in providing Junior international experience, not just for the players chosen to represent England, but for many other youngsters who entered as well. Virtually all the top juniors in England entered, plus the Scots. The tournament ran exactly to time throughout the weekend and playing conditions and auxiliary facilities at Thornaby Pavilion were good.

There is nothing difficult about running a successful "select". The key is to obtain a venue with good facilities and not try to do too much in the way of events or too many entries. The time schedule operated on 20 minute sets gives the organiser the breathing space he requires. The "select" tournament run on a 15-minute schedule with four players in a preliminary group is paramount to suicide. We now have the co-operation of the players, all that is required to make a select system work is to get the organisation right.

3rd Asian Championships

HIGH AND LOW AT PYONGYANG

The conduct of important global championships are now very systematic and wellorganised affairs. They are especially so in countries where sporting events are fully backed by Government. So it was at Pyongyang, North Korea, the city of many rivers, where the 3rd Asian T.T. Union Championships, held biennially, got under way at the hands of their Vice-President, Mr. Kang Ryang, with usual fanfare.

Ryang, with usual fanfare. The 31 Asian teams, including the World Champions, China, followed by their formidable opponents, Japan, host N. Korea and India, in their new track suits, smartly marched past the rostrum at the Morangbong Stadium, where 16 tables were lined up on well-polished, wooden flooring. It was a very picturesque sight to watch the 450 participants being greeted warmly by the 5,000 cheering and clapping spectators seated around the well-decorated walls of the huge stadium fluttering with multicoloured posters and women escorts holding bunches of flowers, dancing to the strains of the "A.T.T.U." song played by an impressive band.

Indeed, the loudest applause was reserved for their current world women's champion, Pak Yung Sun, when the entire stadium rose to give her a standing ovation. Equally significant was the continuous cheering to the Syrian Arab Republic team when they entered the stadium carrying a huge portrait of Comrade Kim Il Sung, the leader of their country.

The best item of the opening ceremony was a classic display of gymnastics performed by the schoolchildren of Pyongyang whose physical fitness had to be seen to be believed and whose great enthusiasm for the game could be vividly seen around the city, which was fully decorated with welcome arches and floats symbolic of the championships.

Opening sessions of the championships featured the men's and women's team events where eight groups of four teams fought out the preliminary matches, leading to a final group of eight. In the final play-off matches China and Japan's men exerted their superiority when they defeated their other six opponents with ease.

China then proved beyond doubt their world superiority when they outclassed Japan 5-1 with only Takashima, the classic defensive player, putting up a notable show of resistance against the all-conquering Chinese team comprising Liang Ko-liang, Li Chen-shih and their national champion, Kua Yao-hua. The latter's meeting with Takashima was the best of the team events.

LTD. 23a Mile End, Brandon, Suffolk, IP27 ONX The hosts, North Korea, had to content themselves with a bronze medal as they lost to China 3-5 although leading 3-0 at one stage, and to Japan 1-5. Indonesia stood fourth, N. Vietnam fifth, Malaysia sixth, India seventh and Hong Kong eighth in the final placings.

In the women's event, in a three-cornered fight, China and N. Korea entered the finals beating Japan 3-0 and 3-2 respectively. Although the Japanese women's team lost to N. Korea, they played superbly in this encounter which was the best women's match of the competition. Then the host nation put all their resources together and backed by loudly cheering spectators, defeated China, the World Champions, 3-1 to claim the gold medal and the honour of being the best Asian women's team for the next two years.

INDIVIDUAL EVENTS

Shifting the spotlight to the individual events, the placing of the top 16 men left much to be desired. How could four worldclass players meet each other in the last 16 is difficult to comprehend when no other such ranked players were in the draw.

The draw for women's singles was equally puzzling as four top Chinese clashed against four Japanese in the last 16 stage. And, perhaps for the first time Japan did not have a single representative in the quarterfinals of an international event.

North Korea and China each had four players in the quarters. The final was an "all-China" affair, as an unknown, Chang Te-ying, counter-attacked fearlessly and beat the current World Champion, Pak Yung Sun in the semis. The other Chinese girl, Chang Li, who had lost tamely to the same North Korean in the Calcutta final, thus won the Asian crown, beating her compatriot over four games.

The men's final was also "an all-China" affair. It was therefore more of an exhibition match than a real test of superiority, with Liang Ko-liang the winner over Kuo Yao-hua. In medals tally, China claimed three gold (M.S., W.S. and Men's Team). Japan cornered two gold in paired events (M.D. and X.D.) while North Korea had to be content with two gold (W.D. and Women's Team).

From an Indian viewpoint, where does one go from here? The World Championships in India have come and gone. The Asian Championships are now over, the next in line being the Afro-Asian Latin-American Championships in Mexico. And then it will be the World Championships again in the U.K. Will Indian standards never improve?
