If individual success is to be achieved then one can really only look to these two. But that is not to say the others might surprise us and the hope is that they will. Good luck and bon voyage to one and all.

ON THE INTERNATIONAL FRONT

THE ROAD TO PYONGYANG

Players from some 59 countries will contest the men's team championship for the Swaythling Cup in the North Korean capital of Pyongyang from April 26/30 and only four less (54) will have representation in the counterpart women's event for the Marcel Corbillon Cup, both trophies being held by the People's Republic of China. In Birmingham 56 men's teams and 48 women's competed.

From Wednesday, May 2, until Sunday, May 6, the battles for the five individual events will be fought with the men's singles title, undefended by Japan's Mitsuru Kohno, claiming the greatest attention worldwide. But, in going for her third consecutive title in the women's singles, the host nation's Pak Yung Sun, will doubtless have the greatest nationalistic following. And what a feat it would be if she were to bring it off in her own country.

In Birmingham, it will be recalled, England, in the men's team event, finished 10th, two places in front of their finishing position in Calcutta and the women dropped two places from India in finishing 7th at Birmingham's National Exhibition Centre in 1977.

Both teams are, of course, still in the first category which, for the men in Pyongyang, has been increased from 16 teams to 18, the latter number still applying to the women, as in Birmingham.

Newcomers in the men's first category are Hong Kong and the United States, spearheaded by the Seemiller brothers, both countries on promotion, plus North Korea who were not represented at Birmingham, and Denmark who last finished in 15th position and might otherwise have joined Indonesia in a drop to the second category.

On the distaff side, the newcomers to the top category are the Netherlands, with their up-and-coming star, Bettine Vriesekoop, and the United States, both on promotion, taking over from demotees Belgium and Indonesia who finished 17th and 18th in Birmingham.



As in the Norwich Union International Championships in Brighton, China's Guo Yuehua (Kuo Yao-hua) and Liang Geliang (Liang Ke-liang) occupy the top seeded positions in the men's singles draw with England's Desmond Douglas, seeded No. 8, being located in the same quarter as Liang Geliang, and in the same eighth as Lu Qiwei (Lu Chi-wei).

Nicky Jarvis meets a qualifier but is not far removed from Milan Orlowski, the No. 7 seed, with perhaps a more immediate meeting with Danny Seemiller of the United States. Paul Day with a first round meeting with D. L'Homme of Belgium could have his path barred by Jacques Secretin of France not to mention either H. Goto of Japan or Yun Chol of North Korea.

John Hilton, England's fourth male representative, must fight his way out of a qualifying group of six before coming perilously near Tibor Klampar of Hungary.

In the women's singles Jill Hammersley, seeded No. 6, has a first round engagement with Kim Chang Ai of North Korea with a likely meeting with China's Huang Xiping (Huang Hsi-ping) in the next round should she succeed. In the same quarter Jill will have Ge Xinai (Ke Hsin-ai) of China also to contend with if she is to make the semis and a probable meeting with Pak Yung Sun, the holder, to whom she lost in Calcutta but only over five games.

Karen Witt will have to be on top form if she is to get past the first hurdle in the person of Yugoslavia's Erzebet Palatinus and then there is Yang Ying of China to contend with!

Like Hilton, Anita Stevenson has first to qualify, from a group of nine, and then a meeting with Miss Vriesekoop of Holland!

In the men's doubles, Douglas and Jarvis have been drawn to meet Camille Putz and Andre been drawn to meet Camille Putz and Andre Hartmann of Luxembourg in a quarter in which Istvan Jonyer and Klampar of Hungary, and Jochen Leiss and Peter Stellwag of Federal Germany are the seeds. Hilton and Day have Engelbert Huging (GFR) and Igor Solopov (USSR) as first round opponents, the seeds in their quarter being Orlowski and Gabor Gergely and Li Zhenshi and Wang Huiyuan of China Li Zhenshi and Wang Huiyuan of China.

Jill and Karen, in the women's doubles, have a first round meeting with qualifiers with Judit Magos and Gabriella Szabo of Hungary lying in wait. Anita has been paired with Monika Kneip-Stumpe of Federal Germany and they will have to qualify to meet Ranguelova and Guergueltcheva of Bulgaria.

Nicky and Anita in the mixed have been drawn to play Grubba and Nowacka of Poland in the top half whilst in the bottom half Hilton and Jill meet qualifiers, their on-going opponents being likely to be Stellan Bengtsson and Eva Stromvall of Sweden.

In the qualifying groups, Des and Karen should be a safe bet to come through but Paul, paired with Karen Senior of Ireland, will have it harder with the likes of Sweden's Lars Franklin and Marie-France Germiat of Belgium to contend with.

EUROPEAN LEAGUE CZECHO CHAMPIONS, ENGLAND THIRD

Czechoslovakia, in maintaining their unbeaten record, duly won the Super Division champion-ship title of the European League when, in Komarno on March 8 they defeated Yugoslavia 5-2. The Czechs take over from France and bridged a gap of six years since last they won the title back in season 1971/72.

Both Milan Orlowski and Josef Dvoracek won both their singles in Komarno with Ilona Uhlikova also successful against Erzebet Palatinus.

It was also a victory that brought relegation for the Russians who, in the halcyon days of Gomozkov and Zoya Rudnova, thrice won the championship, in seasons 1967/68, 68/69 and 72/73.

Hungary, the runners-up this season, concluded with Tibor Klampar figuring in three wins. Stellan Bengtsson, with a victory over Tibor Kreisz, and Ann-Christin Hellman, who beat Gabriella Szabo, scored for the home side.

So it was third time lucky for this immensely talented and popular table tennis player as he was in the last six on the two previous occasions the award was made. Gleefully accepting the trophy Derek said he was sorry he hadn't prepared a speech. "I didn't honestly think I'd win", he said, "to be truthful I thought I had a bit of a chance the first time and I had prepared a little speech then, but I haven't done so this time.

"But I'm delighted. Although I have won hundreds of trophies throughout the years, none of them will mean as much to me as will the possession of this trophy for the next twelve months"

GLOBAL OPEN TOURNAMENT

INTO ORBIT by JOHN WOODFORD

Global Table Tennis climbed into orbit at Greenwich Baths on March 3/4 with as much style as possible at the venue which clearly has its limitations. Whether Barry Meisel's team will in due course attain the much higher objectives of world promotion remains to be seen. I can only report the event as I saw, trying to be as unbiased as possible and not knowing which hat to wear.

To receive entries from the top twenty men was a definite achievement, although there were several abstentions on the day, it was crystal-clear that the players enjoyed themselves fighting for the balance of the prize money, after Desmond Douglas had taken his £1,000 and Jill Hammersley secured her £310 for winning the A and B events.

The conditions were good for the players with Stiga tables (six on the Saturday and five on the Sunday), plenty of light etc. There was a shortage of light-blue blazered umpires at times. Had it been possible to provide two officials for the Open event for each game, the presence of scoring machines would have brought the scene close to, say, the English championships.

On the control there were enough experienced hands available, Mike Ellis, Lou Hoffman and Mike Johns to make sure that the events ran smoothly. At 4 p.m. on Sunday it was pointed out to me that things were right on time.

The spectators seemed to enjoy themselves, there were about 250 at the finals session that included a table tennis cabaret and even Bunny girls! The crowd enjoyed all of the ballyhoo of the cabaret which I am told, runs successfully in parts of the north.

Press men of course, with the inevitable deadlines to meet, will never really appreciate tomfoolery, professional though most of it was, especially the efforts of Brian Kean, whilst waiting for the serious business to start.

Global's biggest victory came the morning after the finals when the "Daily Mail" carried Jill Hammersley's picture on the front page and a feature story with the sort of errors that are bound to occur when written by a journalist not familiar with the table tennis world. However, the novelty, of a woman beating 14 men in top class table tennis appealed to the media. Regrettably of course, and with respect to the rest of the leading England players, Jill is the only player who can live with the men.

There was no abundance of shocks at Greenwich, unless the fourteen men who fell to the Hammersley defences can be counted in that vein. Paul Day was a John Hilton victim whilst Douggie Johnson, the surprise finalist at Woking fell in Round 2 of the Open to Simon Heaps.

Douglas made the easiest £1,000 of his career. In the final Nicky Jarvis made some brave efforts especially in the second game, but it is becoming increasingly obvious that apart from the odd shock result as when Thorsell beat the "magic touch" at Cardiff, there are only three men in Europe and none in England, who are in the same class as the Birmingham professional — they are of course, Klampar, Gergely and Surbek.

THE TIMES THEY ARE-A-CHANGING by KEN BAKER

At last a tournament with big prize money and plenty of razzamataz actually got off the ground when the Global Table Tennis Promotions National Tournament took place recently at Greenwich.

LARGEST PRIZE MONEY EVER

The old idea of graded events was given a new meaning by the awarding of £2,195, being the largest ever prize money for a tournament. There were only 3 events — all singles. The "Open" event was open to all players of all standards — the "A Grade" barred all England ranked players — the "B Grade" barred players of County First Team standard and above. All 3 events were open to women, regardless of their standard.

HUGE SUCCESS

Above all else the tournament proved to be a huge success and should by now have silenced those pessimistic critics that were around before it all got under way. The so-called "amateurs trying to run a tournament on 6 tables" did actually that. What is more, at no time was the tournament ever running more than a mere 6 minutes behind schedule — not bad for "amateurs".

Conditions, according to comments from the players, were excellent — waiting between games minimised and no complaints about the Stiga tables and Nittaku balls.

REALISTIC ENTRY FEES

Global (Barry Meisel) and G.P.D. Freight Services Ltd. (Danny Kinnard) combined forces and took the bull by the horns by making the entry fees realistic in today's inflation-hit climate with the cost for all three events being £9.

Five foreign entries were refused so as to keep it very much a National event, and the overall entry of 140 players was most gratifying. If entries were not over-high in quantity then at least the quality was not in doubt — all 20 of the top 20 men, plus our number one lady — Jill Hammersley, were drawn to Greenwich by the £1,000 prize money for the "Open" event.

BLOW FOR WOMENS LIB

It could be said that a blow was struck for the Womens Lib cause since Jill walked off with both the 'B' event (which was not altogether surprising) AND the 'A' event which was quite amazing. She was simply magnificent and looked virtually unstoppable until she met Desmond Douglas and lost comfortably in the "Open". The media quickly picked this up and Jill made front-page news in the next mornings Daily Mail.

Before Desmond, the nearest she came to actually losing was to veteran rubber bat player Lionel Koutikoff, whom she beat only by a whisker at 18 in the third. Doubtless Lionel will claim he weakened Jill to allow Desmond to finish the job.

Still, with a cool £300 for her weekend's efforts Jill went away quite happily. Desmond took the big £1,000 prize with consummate ease beating Nicky Jarvis in the "Open" final. So poor Nicky only had £250 to console him — ah shame!

TABLE TOPPERS AND BUNNY GIRLS

As so often happens, the actual finals were somewhat disappointing — all played over best of 5 — all won in straight games with Jill beating Ian Collins in the 'B' and Brian Kean in the 'A' events respectively. Desmond looked lightning fast against Nicky, who is no slouch either.

However, the events preceding the finals were anything but disappointing, and can only be described as a sheer joy.

A cabaret act, the "Table Toppers" was provided to entertain the 600 strong audience and entertain they did! The act included John Hilton, Phil Bowen and the unbelievable Brian Kean, who combined playing with a frying pan with some quickfire impressions of Benny Hill, Harold Wilson, Margaret Thatcher and Columbo.

Come to think of it, the frying pan might have come in handy when he played Jill. Hilarious is the word that springs to mind to describe the antics of the Table Toppers, who were nobly assisted by two gorgeous Bunny Girls, whose lack of table tennis prowess did not somehow seem to matter at all

For sheer style the tournament couldn't be faulted — even the programme was in full colour.

WHAT NEXT?

Who knows? Already some 10 separate concerns have expressed an interest in providing substantial sponsorship. Global intend to produce bigger and better events and some far-reaching groundwork has already been laid. The next scheduled event takes place in the City of London from August 31st to September 2nd.

The money is around — it just needs people with drive and a little flair to go out and get it.

It is fair to say Douglas cruised through his matches with ease and at no point was he stretched, the magic this man projects is outstanding, he is undoubtedly a player with a special talent but it's also a visual talent. Everyone likes to see the underdog win, except when he's playing Douglas! The ovation the spectators and players gave him was bordering on riotous.

John Dabin lost in the first round to Ian Horsham, which was not only disappointing but surprising, considering John beat him comfortably the day previous in the Bromley Invitation Tournament

The Cabaret was very well received, so much so it was allowed to overrun an extra 15 minutes. The Table Toppers' are a professional act made up of International T.T. players, the star of which for my money were the antics of Brian Kean. I was fortunate enough to have a chat with Desmond Douglas at the end of the evening and he willingly gave me his opinion of the event, which I believe was echoed by Jill Hammersley and the majority of the players, so I'll give the last word to Desmond Douglas, and I quote, "This was the best organised tournament I've played in — and it was fun!!" You said it Des!

ON THE COACHING FRONT

A PEAK PERFORMANCE TONIGHT

Last month's article examined the role of the coach and the various areas he should be concentrating on at different stages in order to produce technical improvement and a peak performance. The role of a non-playing captain is slightly different in that his job is to make sure his players play well, realise their full potential, on the night.

Indeed this was the subject of an article I was asked to write in the programme of the European League match between England and Federal Germany. Under the heading "A Peak Performance Tonight" it read:-

"It goes without saying that with there being so much at stake this evening, both teams will be hoping to do well. Over the last few years most of these players have played each other several times and have both beaten and lost to each other. With this being the case it is a reasonable theory to assume that it is not necessarily the best player who will win this evening but the best prepared player.

An individual may have a high skill level and yet lose to a player with a lower skill level who performs well. A player producing his optimum performance, playing at his best, is said to be 'peaking'. One of the classical examples in recent sporting history were the achievements of Lasse Virien in the last Olympics. When it really mattered Virien was able to produce his best performance. Tonight is one of those occasions and all the players will be hoping to produce a peak performance. If this match were to be replayed in four weeks' time there would almost

certainly be a different result but it is tonight that counts.

Undoubtedly the most important factor affecting performance in table tennis is skill. However, as already mentioned, all these players are capable of beating each other, and, therefore, at this level perhaps skill is not as decisive a factor as is often considered. To reiterate and emphasise the abovementioned point, it is not always the best player who wins but the best prepared player.

The main task for Peter Simpson and Christer Johannson, the two respective non-playing captains, has been to prepare their players to 'peak' at the right time, i.e. this evening. Training for a peak performance requires much more than natural ability in a player. It requires organised technical practice, physical and psychological work combined with rest. Reaching peak performance will not happen by chance, but happens as a result of a well-planned programme of hard-work and rest. It will have been up to the two captains to structure a training programme which takes into account the technical, psychological, physical and tactical aspects of the game that will give their players the maximum possible chance of producing a peak performance.

You will see this evening the players receiving advice from their captains during the games and to the spectator there is a tendancy to understandably believe that this is the only responsibility of the captain. Whilst this tactical advice given by the captain can be, and often is, of the utmost importance it is only part of his job, the second part being the preparation of his players technically, psychologically, physically and tactically so that they are able to play well. A player who is playing well but is given the incorrect tactical advice will not produce a peak performance. Likewise, a player given the correct tactical advice but who has had a poor preparation for the game will also not produce a peak performance.

It would therefore seem that the captain's job is more complex than it appears to the spectators' eye. However, to keep things in perspective it is the players who have had to prepare themselves, albeit directed by the captain, the players who have to cope with the various psychological pressures on them and ultimately it is the players who decide the result at the end of the evening. The point I have attempted to get over in this relatively short article is that the captain's job is two-fold, firstly the visually obvious tactical one and secondly, the preparation of his players for hopefully a 'peak performance', the latter being the one that is often overlooked".

ADDED CONFIDENCE

Our much improved performance in the European League, and a recent good performance against the strong Middlesex team in the County Championships give the Welsh team an added confidence for the long trip to Pyongyang for the World Championships.

The draw made in Pyongyang on March 14/15 shows Wales at the head of Group C in the 3rd Category. With us we have Mexico, Pakistan, Ghana, Mongolia and Uganda, and we ought to be able to survive those tests. We should then figure in a four team play-off for promotion to Category 2, and although it is hard to prophecy, one could expect Nigeria or Singapore to head Group A, New Zealand should be the best in Group B, and Spain should come through in Group D. With two teams to be promoted we thus have a good chance to move up into Category 2.

With such a strong entry in the individual events, it is hardly surprising that none of our men are in the first round proper of the men's singles. There are 29 groups of up to 8 players in a group. Alan Griffiths is in a group of seven, along with players from Nigeria and Spain to name the strongest, but he should come through this first test.

David Welsman finds himself with a North Korean to contend with and that could be very difficult — the winner should qualify. Graham Davies meets a Thailand player in the first round, and there are strong Egyptian and Austrian players also in his group. George Evans has Egyptian and Mexican players in his section, but Hansen from Denmark is probably the strongest here.

In the Doubles, David and George have a bye in the first qualifying round, but have an excellent chance of being one of the 8 qualifiers — that is if they can take care of a North Korean pair!

Griffiths and Davies have a hard group, which includes pairs from North Korea, New Zealand, Spain and the Soviet Union. They would do very well to come through here.

Before the World Championships, the same team, under the Captaincy of Brian Everson, will play in the Commonwealth Championships in Edinburgh, and we have every hope of improving on our results in Guernsey two years ago. Our girls — Stephania Jones and Cathryn Jones, with Betty Gray as their non-playing captain, are also scheduled for Edinburgh, but are not coming on to Pyongyang.

Our World Championship party, accompanied by Chairman Eddie Thomas, will join the English and other Commonwealth teams on the charter flight from Geneva on April 21.

Although I believe the exploit will be reported in the account of the Lancashire Junior Open, we must record with great pleasure that our Rhyl junior star Mark Thomas took the singles title at that event, whilst he and Mark Byles were runners-up in the doubles. Well done, indeed.







The Soviet youngsters, a quiet but talented bunch, hit back in scoring terms only once when Valery Shevchenko proved too strong for Nicky

From then until the end it was England all the way, all in straight games. Jill Hammersley had some trouble with the tall Ludmila Bakschutova who had ideas about taking Jill to expedite rules. But Jill is too good against this type of plot and ended by hitting through her opponent.

There was yet another fine mixed doubles win by Desmond and Linda Howard, whose return to the No. 3 ranking seems to suggest that the selectors are admitting their errors. The last two singles were mere ten-minute formalities, Douglas beating Shevchenko and Jarvis making amends by stopping Ovcharov.

Southend Cliffs Pavilion as Ron Crayden said afterwards, "is the best venue of its kind (800 sell-out) in the country" and Mike Watts must be England's most reliable and persuasive organiser.

Russia seem sure to spend only one season in

Division 1, but it was still a magnificent season for England who have finished in third place.

For the second year running the star of the Staffs. We are currently without a secretary and it may well be that the committee needs to be revitalised with an infusion of new blood to get us back on the right road. Certainly we cannot operate with the current shrinking numbers without some curtailment of County activities which cover coaching, County teams, tournaments, County League, umpiring and general administrative duties.

Sorry to end on rather a depressing note, but those of us with an interest in the County will hope that this apparent trend can be reversed.

REGULATIONS FOR THE 1979 UNDER-21 ENGLISH TABLE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

- The tournament will be held under E.T.T.A. and I.T.T.F. regulations and the current laws of table tennis for international competitions. All players must be registered with, or members of, a club affiliated to the E.T.T.A. Entrants affiliated to the E.T.T.A. must give details of their affiliation on their entry forms.
- 2. All events will be the best of three games. Each match will be controlled by an umpire whose decision will be final on point of fact. The referee's decision shall be final on point of law.
- 3. All events are open to all men and women, as indicated in each case, who are under the age of 21 prior to the 1st of July, 1978. Events 6 and 7 are restricted to those players who have not been ranked on the senior or in the top ten of the junior ranking list since the 1st of September,
- The Tournament Committee reserves the right to restrict or refuse entries and to hold a qualifying competition, or competitions, as may be necessary. The right is also reserved not to hold any event for which fewer than 8 entries are received. Entries will be ignored without notification unless they are accompanied by the full amount of fees due.
- 5. Entries will be automatically acknowledged. A player not receiving such acknowledgement by Thursday the 3rd May should telephone the Hon. Referee at 01-445 6512.
- The draw will take place at the Bonnington Hotel, Southampton Row, London on Friday, 4th May commencing at 9.30 a.m.
- 7. The scheduled time for each match for every round of each event in which a player may be

concerned, will be given to him before the tournament commences, but the referee reserves the right to alter the scheduled time of any match. Players absent at any time when called upon to play will render themselves liable to disqualification.

- 8. Nittaku 3-star balls (white) will be used and Stiga tables, each in a court not less than 40 feet by 20 feet.
- 9. A players' number will be issued and must be worn at all times during play. A deposit of £1 will be required for each number, repayable upon the safe return of the number prior to the end of the tournament



A fleet of 46 mobile shops, carrying almost the total range of some 1,000 parts, maintains a regular service — fortnightly or monthly — to all clients. All of England and Wales is covered and part of Scotland.

The prime advantage of a mobile shop calling on a client is that there is no delay. The order is fulfilled on the spot but the client does not have to pay for his purchase there and then. He is invoiced in the normal way and enjoys the customary credit facilities.

In the simple concept of the mobile shop can be found the key to the dramatic growth of Rock Motor Parts Limited. Mr. Darham said, "In Gibraltar, as it is so small, no one has to wait for anything. Any order is fulfilled whilst one waits. When I arrived in England I was both amazed and appalled by the delays in delivering the most fundamental products.

I saw that the way to provide a service to the motor and engineering trades would be to buy in bulk, repackage at home and then offer for sale in a mobile shop. As the Company grew I was

able to introduce a more efficient stock control and to rationalise the range of products offered for sale".

HISTORY OF ROCK MOTOR PARTS LIMITED

February 1971

The company was incorporated in February 1971 to sell motor component parts to the Motor and allied trades.

It was a one man business operating out of Mr. Darham's home in Twickenham. The small third bedroom was the office with the garage as the storeroom. But with the help of his wife who operated as packer, secretary and telephonist, Mr. Darham was able to process purchases of 3-6 tons of component parts at a time.

August 1971

The volume of sales was such that the business had to move to bigger premises in St. Margaret's, Twickenham. This consisted of rented three linked garages. One person was employed and 26 tons of component parts were ordered at a time.

February 1972

Growth necessitated another move — to Teddington where the stores and offices were merged into a single building. Another person joined and so the total work force numbered three.

September 1972

Sales exceeded the most optimistic forecast and precipitated another move to larger premises at Spring Grove, Isleworth. By now the staff had increased to about 20.

September 1976

A dramatic and steady increase in turnover over the four years resulted in a move to the new Headquarters at Englefield Green. This is a freehold building of some 17000 square feet.

This was a year of consolidation linked to controlled expansion. The staff was increased to 50 and a greater penetration was achieved of the United Kingdom.

1978

The expansion continued. Negotiations were entered into with a view to arranging a reverse takeover to alter the status of the holding company into that of a public company with a stock market quotation. The staff increased to 76. Penetration of the whole of England and Wales was achieved. Subsidiary companies were established in Malta and Gibraltar.





GWENT NEWS

With an 8-2 win over Cornwall, Gwent's senior side concluded an unbeaten season in Division 3 West of the County Championships. This means that the Gwent team are promoted to Div. 2 after only twelve months in the third. For the match versus Cornwall, team Manager Basil Evans recalled Michael Nocivelli, who replaced the unavailable Kevin Boalch. Nocivelli, who has indicated only mild interest in County selection in recent seasons, showed that he was equal to the occasion and easily won his two events. Andrew Evans suffered his only defeat of the season in County matches when he succumbed to a hard bat player. Cornwall's only other win came in the women's doubles when Sandra Pickering and Brenda Annand were beaten. However, both won their singles and again both have managed to win three of their five singles events throughout the season. This is a considerable improvement on past seasons when unfortunately the women's play left an untolerable burden upon the men.

By entrusting the captaincy of the side to John Bloomer, Basil has ensured that every player has given a 100% effort. Bloomer, victor in 8 of nis 10 singles, has teamed up with Andrew Evans to win all five doubles.

With a 9-1 over Avon, 6-4 over Dorset, 9-1 over Somerset, 7-3 over Glamorgan, plus the fine win at St. Austell, the Gwent side has amassed a total of 39 sets out of 50. Basil's main concern now

rests with the future. Can he succeed where others have barely survived in the past? The answer probably lies with the performances of Ex-Welsh International Sandra Pickering and the everimproving Brenda Annand. In past seasons the men have always held their own at least in the higher grade, very often winning five or more of the seven men's sets in order to scrape a draw or on odd occasions to squeeze a win. A better performance from Gwent's women next season could be the platform for even further success.

Meanwhile, Gerald Watkins, manager of the Junior side, can feel well pleased with his side's performance in Div. 3 Midland. At one time it looked as if the team would also win their section but an 8-2 defeat at the hands of Worcestershire meant that they and not Gwent go into the second division. If Gwent can beat Staffordshire in an oustanding fixture then the Junior side will be runners-up.

With one match to go Gwent's leading Junior, Brian Jeanes, has only been beaten once while No. 2, Gary Wilkins of Abergavenny, has lost twice. Jonathan Hobbs of Tredegar has established himself as the Gwent No. 3 but has only managed a 50% win rate so far. For the Junior Girls Brenda Annand remains unbeaten but has only played in two of the four matches due to her senior commitments. THE SPORTS COUNCIL DECLARATION OF DISCRIMINATION OF VARIOUS KINDS IN SPORT

The Sports Council has been asked by the Minister of State for Sport and Recreation to draw the attention of governing bodies of sport and composite sports organisations to a Declaration of discrimination of various kinds in sport, which was adopted at the 7th Meeting of the Informal Working Party of Council of Europe Ministers Responsible for Sport, which was held in Athens on the 12th and 13th March, 1979. A copy of the Declaration is attached.

I understand that the Scottish Sports Council, Sports Council for Wales, and Sports Council for Northern Ireland are being asked to send a copy of the Declaration to their governing bodies of sport.

Informal Meeting of Ministers Responsible for Sport DECLARATION

The Ministers, meeting in Athens for their 7th Informal Meeting, recall the resolution on Sport in Society adopted in London and in particular that part in which they

"emphasise their opposition to discrimination in sport which is based on race, religion, politics or any other criterion in contradiction to the Olympic Charter and draw the attention of the governing bodies of sport to the International Declaration against Apartheid in Sports adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations".

They consider that sporting contacts with countries practising apartheid, in so far as it is reflected in the composition of teams or sporting delegations should be actively discouraged.

They draw the attention of sportsmen and the various parts of the sports movement to the risks involved in international sports in particular the Olympic Games, if they continue to have contacts with representative teams from countries which exclude themselves from the Olympic Movement by not respecting the principles of the Olympic Charter. Neither sports organisations nor sportsmen should allow themselves to be used by countries which practise racial or other forms of discrimination in order to give respectability to an unacceptable sporting situation.

Similarly, they deplore any discrimination in sport based on anti-semitism against sportsmen teams and officials.

Lastly, they condemn any attempts to split duly constituted national teams for international or bilateral competitions.

Having helped for many seasons in the Fenland 2-Star Open with the Kings Lynn T.T.A. and the Wisbech T.T.A., I would like to say how disgusted I am with the attitude of the E.T.T.A. concerning the Global National Tournament organisers are aware of the amount of hard work, time and money involved in making a successful Tournament and one of the attractions for local leagues is the chance to see and play against some of the country's top players. But this season Mr. Meisel arranged his Tournament on the same weekend as the Yorkshire 2-Star and Fenland 2-Star with the approval of the E.T.T.A.! Straight away you lose the top players and the Tournament loses much of its appeal to both spectators and players.

Sponsorship keeps these Tournaments alive but what chance do we have when the main attraction is removed? Part of the last paragraph of the E.T.T.A. guide to Sponsorship states — "Make sure you deliver what you promise". How can we promise top class players, knowing that they may be attracted elsewhere.

The Tournament Calendar is compiled more than 12 months in advance, but Mr. Meisel's Tournament was approved by the E.T.T.A. at their Council meeting at the end of January — 6 weeks before it was held! Why does he not have to conform like the rest of us? Next season's provisional calendar has been issued already with no mention of the Global National Tournament. Does this mean that the same thing will happen next season? I have nothing against Mr. Meisel or the top players. Good luck to them! What I am concerned about is the way the E.T.T.A. have let the local leagues down by their attitude over this matter.

Tournament Organisers beware! If this arrangement with Mr. Meisel is allowed to continue, it may be the Fenland 2-Star Open that is hit again, on the other hand, it may be any one of you!

UNFAIR COMPETITION

With regard to the Global tournament held on the weekend of Mar. 4/5 I must first point out that I personally feel that cash being put into Table Tennis must be a good thing for the game. I hope that it was a success in all its aspects and hopefully the event will become a regular fixture in the tournament calendar.

Having said that I and my Association's committee are utterly disappointed of the allowance of the foregoing tournament to take place on that weekend. The Fenland 2-Star and the Yorkshire 2-Star the day before had been planned some twelve months before the actual playing date.

I am interested to know how at such a late stage the Global Organisers picked the weekend they did, knowing full well of the fixture clash, with even more interest of the E.T.T.A.'s approval for the go-ahead. It was quite obvious once I knew of the fixture clash — we offering far less prize money — that our entry would suffer.

Whatever the reasons were of which I feel an explanation is necessary from both parties, it is totally unacceptable for the Fenland to try and compete with the Global. If an alternative arrangement cannot be found, it is possible that the only open tournament in East Anglia may fall by the wayside. I can tell all who read this letter, the Wisbech Association have taken a great pride in running the Fenland these last two years, as did

the King's Lynn League before them. I think we offer a first class tournament from the entry form to the finish of the finals.

It would be so sad to lose a tournament through mismanagement at H.Q. It isn't very easy trying to explain to sponsors that all the best players have gone to another tournament. Finally, we have received the 1979/80 draft copy of tournaments. Please note the Fenland is scheduled for March 9/'80 and the Global — well it is not to be found!

THE STIGA WELSH OPEN

Did he really mean it? John Woodford I'm talking about, In his article in your March issue dealing with the Welsh Open, John made an acknowledgement of the efforts of my wife and I in promoting this event to its present high level, then spoils it all with a reference to our lack of tournament organisers of the calibre of those who operate at the English Open. By inference this means that the Stiga Welsh suffers by comparison with the English, a statement I am not prepared to accept.

It seems that John's complaint stems from a

difficulty in getting results quickly. It also seems that he has no problems in this respect at the "more sophisticated" English tournaments. John and other Pressmen were accommodated right next to the referee and the results section, and although there might have been a weakness, not entirely our fault, it was put right as soon as reported. Incidentally we have had no problem in this department before. It is regrettable that John should have concentrated on this aspect to the exclusion of any comment on other features which we, and many of our foreign visitors, believe puts our tournament in the top class in Europe.

I regret having to make comparisons by inference, but I have seldom seen in your columns a more implied criticism of a tournament, and I would be a poor Welshman if I did not spring to the defence of all those helpers who, although apparently not endowed with the qualities possessed by those whom John names nevertheless contrived to make our Stiga Welsh Open one of the best tournaments of the present season. It is an irony that John Wright, Mike Watts and their colleagues have probably had to wait for criticism of an event not under their control in order to get the praise they surely deserve. I hope they can accept that I could hardly be expected to suffer John Woodford's barbs in silence.

The next time John Woodford comes to Wales he is going to find a horde of angry heavily-armed Welshmen and Welshwomen waiting for him at the border.

THE NOT SO MAGNIFICENT **OBSESSION**

BOMI AMALSADVALA, Bombay, India.

I often wonder if Table Tennis players take technical articles on the game sufficiently seriously. Yet realism demands that they should. No one is perfect and there is room for improvement, and enlightenment can often come from the most un-expected quarters. Players therefore have nothing to lose and something to gain by taking note of such articles, wherever and whenever they appear, not only for acquisition of theoretical knowledge but for practical follow-up also. And since these observations are based on actual experiences of top players in the world, there is no justification for the players to hesitate in taking advantage of

It is ironic that when physical fitness is becoming a fetish with a modern table tennis player, Indu Puri a long sufferer from asthmatic attacks, should have beaten the reigning World Champion Pak-Yung of North Korea in the recent Asian T.T. at Kaula Lampur. Almost a fortnight after that sensational, blood warming triumph of India in November 1978, came the devastating test debut of Australian fast howler Rodney Hogg also an Australian fast bowler Rodney Hogg, also an asthmatic, against Brearly's boys. And to cap it all, England's Derek Randall, a chronic sufferer of hay fever, also scored 149 runs in that first test at Brisbane. If further proof is necessary that physical fitness is not the ONLY thing in a champion, readers would like to note that Tony Grieg, the ex-captain of English cricket is prone to epileptic attacks.

Hence, I personally am quite perturbed to find that, now-a-days, there is a lot of talk and emphasis on physical training by officials and governing bodies at the cost of harder over-thetable' organised training. For the players also, it is supposed to be the 'in' thing to do while playing this game. Quite a few of our budding players now, are so carried away by the emphasis on physical training that some of them devote the entire off-season to just doing that, without touching the racket. While this trend could be a hangover of their eternal complaint of the paucity of practice partners available at all levels of play, during offseason, in reality, to the keen competitor, the offseason should be "the time" to take stock of the previous years' effort to make suitable changes with increased 'on-the-table' training.

The result, therefore, has been disastrous for many, as they not only increased their weight considerably, but when they started playing again, they found that their movements were even slower than what they used to be, before they took to extra physical training.

Two factors which such players do not reckon with, are the problem of weight control which they have to carry while moving and the realisation that physical training cannot possibly replace or take second place to the hard 'table-training' that is a must to reach the high class in the game.

Firstly, what they do not still understand is that the body weight that each player is required to control during play is more than 3 times his body weight at standing position. Which means, that, if you have 2 kg. Weight more than the weight with which you normally train, then you have to control 6 kg. of over weight for each stroke, in each rally and for each game, which at critical moments, becomes a real wastage of energy. And it is this extra weight, that slows their movements down and reduces their stamina.

Secondly, what they fail to realise is that, by no stretch of imagination, can physical training replace the required quota of concentrated practice that each of then must put in to improve their game to the required high level. Hard practice comes first and then physical training not vice versa. Neglect of this aspect indeed turns their effort into frustration, to say the least. Therefore, it must be quickly realised, that while long hours of serious practice can make them better players, mere physical fitness cannot. At best physical fitness can help them to put on muscles in the

arms, thighs and make them look fitter and improve their stamina. But what is the use of all this physical improvement, if it cannot help a player to win matches and titles! And to win matches, one has to practise first, very hard and then do physical fitness training afterwards.

Simultaneously what should also be understood is that because of the tremendous increase in the speed of the ball due to use of sandwich bats, there is a limit to their improvement by practice alone, without physical fitness. It is then and only thereafter that special physical training assumes great importance and not before. If the physical training is done at this stage, then it helps them to concentrate better for long hours, which in turn helps them to make their practice more fruitful. It then helps them to move faster and it then helps them to improve their stamina.

And in addition to this there is one more very important factor of physical training which has been lost sight of, or possibly not even known to many of these players. And that is, even after they put in the required efforts practice-wise, and then to their physical training, they still do not become quick so to say, automatically. It is a wrong notion that physical training and quickness is missing. And that is, the will of the player to move and try to reach each and every ball during his practice. The secret of becoming quick is in understanding this aspect of the game. Unless, therefore, a player cultivates an intense desire, from deep down within his heart, to move and reach each and every ball that comes to him, no amount of physical training can make a player quick. And what is required in present day T.T. is super-quick reflexes and quick-silver feet movements. Therefore, their approach to become quick should be like, rather die of shame than let go a ball past them, without reaching it or even touching it.

And talking of quickness, one regrets to notice that even today after so much international experience, so many of our top players do not still believe that flat-footed stance considerably hamper their movements and thereby their total progress. Let me explain. Some of them do stand on their toes or on the ball of their feet at the start of a rally or during the early stages of game. But then, as the rally progresses, or the game advances towards the closing stages, you will notice that, they tend to move flat-footed when it really matters. This is because, while moving, their thighs are not strong enough to carry their body weight forward all the time on their toes and with their knees bent, for longer periods. This is mainly due to lack of awareness of the importance of this aspect of training! It is only when these players understand what an important part this will-to move' and 'playing-on-toes' plays in improving their quickness, that they will reap the benefit of physical training backed up by the hard 'over-the-table' practice, It is only then, that the road to success will be opened for them to enter that high class of T.T. which they dream to play.

And in the wake of the success of our women's players in the last Asian at Kaula Lampur, if our other players get inspired and try to understand and realise the importance of these few observations, I am sure, our progress will then be much faster. And if they earnestly desire to achieve the greatness which goes with such type of training, then they cannot possibly afford to neglect it any further, because for the top-ranked players, three major T.T. events viz. the National Championships the Commonwealth Championships and the World T.T. Championships at Pyongyang, North Korea, are round the corner.

Norwich Union English Championships

SHOCKS IN MEN'S SINGLES by John Woodford

But there were shocks in abundance in the later rounds of the men's singles. Biggest surprise of all was a tremendous performance by 21-year-old Dougie Johnson, the losing finalist who, like Douglas, hails from Birmingham.

Johnson headed a list of shockmakers as he moved through to the final with John Hilton and Mark Mitchell among his victims. In the 24-minute final, however, Johnson's defences finally crumpled under an onslaught of sheer power from Douglas who triumphed 14, 8, 7. Among earlier shocks which worried the England selectors was the defeat of Paul Day, the holder, to Mitchell.

NEALE FAILS

Little known Tottenham player David Wells was the shock quarter-finalist as he stopped Denis Neale.

E.T.T.A. selectors were satisfied with the results of the women's singles, Karen Witt, 17, tried hard in the final but Mrs. Hammersley's defences have reached a new peak of perfection and there never seemed to be a way through for Miss Witt, who has, for the moment, secured her England No. 2 ranking.

The doubles events provided more successes for Douglas. He won the Triple Crown lifting the men's doubles title with Jimmy Walker and the mixed with Linda Howard who also took the women's doubles with Mrs. Hammersley.

IRISH DROP

Ireland dropped down to the second division without a whimper, when they lost ignominiously without winning a set in a non-event against Bulgaria in the Maysfield Complex, Belfast. The large crowd were stunned to a 'deafening' silence as the superbly fit visitors won the first three sets without dropping a game and won the other four sets in the third game.

This was the first European 1st Division match ever played in Belfast, and great credit is due to Eddie Limberg, Chairman of the Ulster Branch, Mrs. Pat Hunter, their hard working Hon. 

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

POINT OVERLOOKED

How nice to see a letter from my old Basildon team mate and Southend League committee colleague Stan Thacker in Table Tennis News.

Certainly services have attained an importance which clearly is not in the best interests of the sport.

However, one point seems to be overlooked by many umpires. It is the duty of the umpire to satisfy himself that the service is good. If the ball has been correctly projected upwards (in the view of the umpire) and the latter has seen that the ball is falling what happens thereafter, as far as the umpire is concerned, is irrelevant. Once falling the ball cannot be struck 'on the up' and whether the umpire sees it struck does not matter providing he is certain that the ball has been hit with the bat fairly. (He could not be certain if for example one side of the bat was covered with a surface not legal for striking the ball). If the umpire is in any doubt he can take the appropriate action.

Colin Clemett made this point well in the January 1979 edition of Table Tennis News when he wrote "non-visibility of the service action, or of the ball during service, is not of itself a fault".

One other point on the high services. Sometimes the ball is not projected to the satisfaction of the server, whereupon he catches the ball. This is a lost point. Service commences with the server projecting the ball by the hand, and the ball is in play from that moment.

County Championships Round-up

LITTERED BATTLE GROUND

As I prepare these notes, the end of the County Championships season is only a few short weeks away and the battleground is littered with many matches abandoned by the severe travelling conditions to which the large band of faithful and hard-working voluntary officials have succumbed.

By the time these notes are read many more matches will have been completed (hopefully) with only the Promotion Challenges to Senior and Junior Premier Divisions to be completed. The Veteran Challenge is the first to be completed, breaking from tradition and being finalised on April 7 at the Barnet Centre — one month ahead of its regular spot, at the request of regular contenders who had to compete with the F.A. Cup final. This season's line-up sees two new Counties playing for Veteran honours — Avon and Lincolnchampions Middlesex (who have dropped only three sets from 45 all season). Now the suggestion being bandied around is: "Is it time to form a Veteran Premier Division?".

Wiltshire are almost certain contenders for promotion to the Premier Division with Kent and Leicestershire (certain to participate) while Cleveland look set to take the championship of 2 North. From 2 East, Hertfordshire look set for another try for promotion.

In the Junior section, Devon are strong enough to return to the Junior Premier but opposition at the junior challenge will be tough. Any two from Cumbria, Clwyd or Lancashire will qualify from Junior 2 North; Junior 2 Midland is also wide

While half of the Championships divisions have been decided, Junior 3 West has produced the tightest finish.
