

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TABLE TENNIS NEWS

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BEST INTERESTS

Much furore has been created by the introduction of the Global National £2,000 tournament by Barry Meisel and Danny Kinnard on behalf of Global Table Tennis Promotions Limited.

Whatever the outcome of this "dream come true" spectacular at Greenwich Baths, a top cash prize of £1,000 for the open singles, incorporating both men and women, constitutes quite a large slice of "bread".

And it was this element which led an apprehensive National Council to permit the E.T.T.A. membership at large to participate in the tournament and grant blanket permission for members to accept the cash prizes listed for the three separate category events.

As to whether the enterprise is one akin to that of Kerry Packer's World Series Cricket remains ponderable.

But the hope is expressed that should the tournament prove successful and lead to others, perhaps more ambitious still, then like the Norwich Union Grand Prix, close co-operation with the governing bodies would be in the best interests of all parties concerned.


CZECHS HANG ON

In Pribram on Feb. 6, Czechoslovakia were exceedingly hard-pressed to preserve their unbeaten record when, after the sixth set, they were tying 3-3 with Federal Germany. Nor did it stop there for in that final nerve-gripping set Josef Dvoracek and Peter Stellwag stood one game-all before Dvoracek got home in the third to keep his country's record intact in the Super Division of the European League.

Matters went a little awry for the Czechs when, in the second set, Engelbert Huging got the better of Dvoracek and the "pocket battleship" Ursula Hirschmuller was equally convincing in beating Ilona Uhlikova. Huging came again in the penultimate set equating the match score with a splendid victory over Milan Orlowski.

beating Sweden 6-1 in Paris, took over the third position. Sweden, again without Stellan Bengtsson, could only manage one win and that in the mixed doubles with Ulf Thorsell and Eva Stromvall beating the reigning world champions Jacques Secretin and Claude Bergeret.

In Kaunas, the Soviet Union were beaten 4-3 by Yugoslavia whose battle-hardened Dragutin Surbek shook off the punitive challenge of both Valerij Shevchenko and Igor Solopov and, in partnership with Zoran Kalinic, accounted for Shevchenko and Mironas Kreeris. The fourth Yugoslav win came from Kalinic who beat Solopov in the opening set. And now nothing short of a miracle can save the Russians from being replaced by Poland in next season's Super Division line-up.



Once again this popular junior tournament was held at Folkestone (Dec. 2/3) and although a larger entry was accepted than at first agreed over farger entry was accepted than at first agreed over 50 forms had to be returned before the closing date much to the all-round disappointment of competitors and organisers alike. Looking to the future it would seem to be appropriate to do away with the Under-15 mixed doubles event to allow more singles and ordinary doubles entries.

As in past years a strong entry of 4 boys and 4 girls from Belgium was received and through the efforts of enthusiasts locally housed and fed. The tournament, this season, was refereed by Mike Watts who took over the job at short notice when it was found that Albert Shipley was engaged on E.T.T.A. business. Mike was greatly appreciated and brought some fresh ideas with him.

The entry from the top English boys and girls was disappointing, but did not detract from the tournament and it was quite a revelation to see the standard of play in the U-11 and U-13 events although it brings organisational problems. The Belgian entry was expected to do well and indeed won 5 of the 16 events the most successful being Barbara Lippens who won the U-17 and retained the U-15 girls' singles titles as well as winning with Nathalie Higuet the U-15 girls' doubles title.






Once again a full entry was received and there was some good table tennis enjoyed all day, culminating in some very exciting finals.



EUROPEAN LEAGUE TRIUMPH!

The European League Third Division matches, played as a curtain raiser to the Stiga Welsh Open, attracted nine teams, much the biggest ever.

And this was what happened — Graham Davies, George Evans and Stephanie Jones disposed of Malta 7-0, whilst Jersey beat Iceland 4-3, and Norway "whitewashed" Guernsey.

We continued our winning way in the afternoon

with a 7-0 win over Jersey with our strongest team — Alan Griffiths, David Welsman and Stephanie Jones. Denmark beat Switzerland 5-2, Portugal beat Guernsey 6-1, and Norway beat Iceland 7-0.

Monday evening saw us with our first big obstacle — Norway, whose chop defenders and Guttormsen had caused us problems in the past. But Paul Guttormsen wasn't playing and they had two new men — Johansen and Gierloff. We won with surprising ease, with both Griffiths and Welsman showing impressive form, whilst Stephanie also played well to beat Hundveen. Seven-nil to us was just the right medicine.

Tuesday morning brought us another comfortable win — Evans, Davies and Stephanie picking up maximum points, meanwhile Portugal beat Malta 6-1, and Norway beat Jersey 7-0. THE MISSING LINKS

Is it not the time for sweeping changes in the game of table tennis? Not on the actual playing 'field' where the rules are as near perfection as will ever be possible, but in the presentation to the public at large.

With acknowledgements to a famous quotation in the game of Draughts, my table tennis version would go:- "Everyone plays table tennis but comparatively few are table tennis watchers"!

It is sadly only too easy to see the reason why. Go to the average, one, two or even three star sure that competitors can quickly get to their playing tables. But what of spectators? They can wander around the maze of tables to view a player they may particularly want to watch and if they are especially lucky may find a nearby seat not already clotted up with sports bags and picnic foods of the contestants.

I feel that it is very wrong to put tables up in every possible playing space in the arena to ensure the maximum number of entries. To me the Reading Junior event played in February, set the fashion for future tournaments. Here they had three centre tables and alongside a splendid spectator seating Stand. On the main two tables, complete with active large scoreboards, we saw mostly Belgian players who, particularly the girls, put on some wonderful entertaining matches against our best in the tournament.


Spectators thoroughly enjoyed the rare privilege of following with ease the excitement on both these tables and entered into the right spirit with rounds of applause for exceptionally good rallies

Thus I strongly advocate two side by side 'centre courts' complete with scoreboards. All players to wear identity numbers for easy reference in a 'who's who' (duplicated) programme. Then and only then, will the game really come into the public eye. That must be the set pattern for all future star tournaments.

CLOSE FINISH EXPECTED

In the County League, Wolverhampton "A" have built up a big lead in Division 1 with 8 points from 5 matches but both Potteries "A" and Stone "A" have maximum points from two matches apiece so a close finish to the season can be expected. County League Secretary, Bob Carr, tells me that a number of matches have had to be postponed due to the weather and this has affected league positions at the halfway stage. In Division 2, Darlaston "A" have 6 points from three matches, and Stafford "A" and Wolverhampton "B" have the same number of points having played an extra match. Stone "B" and Wolverhampton "D" both have maximum points from 3 matches in Div. 3, and Leek "B" and West Bromwich "B" top Div. 4, each with 8 points from 4 matches. In Div. 5 Stafford "C" lead Lichfield "A" by a point after 4 matches, the latter having dropped a point to their "B" side.

The county League continues to prosper this year with 37 teams entered from 12 leagues, many of them from the smaller leagues which have little chance of top honours but nevertheless aim to give their better players and up-and-coming juniors an opportunity of more competitive play.

The most notable upsurge in junior interest is in Stafford, where their two outstanding young players, Paul Dilger and Bill Bridgeman dominated the local individual championships, each appearing in four finals. At the end of the day honours were even between the two, for although Dilger beat Bridgeman in the premier men's singles event, the result went the other way when they met in the Under-21 final. Both matches were closely fought out over three games, and provided the large gathering at the M.E.S.C. clubhouse in Stafford with a real feast of exciting, hard-hitting table tennis. 15-year-old Paul Dilger is the youngest-ever player to win the men's singles and he takes over the crown from John Taylor, 12 times past winner, whom he beat earlier in the quarter-finals. The Finals night was dominated by junior players. The mixed doubles was an all-junior affair, Bridgeman and Rachael Roberts beating Dilger and Lynn Burgess over three games, and Richard Bridgeman, Bill's younger brother, appeared in 2 finals, win-ning the Handicap but losing out to the experience of veteran Dave Coates in the Consolation. Veteran Bill Bridgeman Senior, of course, is a long-standing and popular figure in Stafford table tennis circles.

The progress of juniors in Stafford is a great credit to Ron Harvey, the County Coaching Secretary, who has devoted himself to the coaching sessions at the Stafford Riverside Centre over the past two years or so. The results achieved are beyond all expectation, and the appearance of several Stafford names in the County Rankings bears witness to the standards being reached.

In the Stafford League, Bill Bridgeman is leading Trades and Labour "C" towards the 1st ing Trades and Labour "C" towards the 1st Division championship, although the experienced trio of John Taylor, Barry Donnelly and Simon Probert together with young Hugh Edwards in the M.E.S.C. "A" team are only a point behind and a close finish is likely. In nearby Stone the fight for top honours is clearly between two teams, Doulton "A" and Meaford "A". Meaford had the better of a tight tussle in the first half of the season, but Doultons were without unbeaten Tom. season, but Doultons were without unbeaten Tom Ball on that occasion so the return match is likely to decide the championship. Meaford's Emlyn Williams is the only other unbeaten player in the 1st Division so individual honour has to be decided at the same time.

In the Beattie Trophy semi-final, Walsall beat Darlaston 5-3 but the result of the other semifinal between Potteries and Wolverhampton is not to hand. The County "B" side lost to Cheshire 8-2, but the County juniors have been successful in several tournaments around the country. Andrew Dixon has recovered from his foot operation and is back in form with wins in the Lincolnshire under-14's and in the under-17's at Exeter. This was his first under-17 success and he did well to overcome Paul Stratton (Middlesex) in the final. Andrew Bellingham had a good win over Colin Wilson (No. 2 in he national ranking) in the Cotswold Junior Select Tournament, but then went down to Skylet Andrew (No. 16) in the final. Jill Harris won the Glamorgan under-17's and Fiona Elliot the under-14's and together they teamed up to win the under-17's doubles.

Reference to television exposure reminds me of the problem faced by umpires in top level table tennis. Umpires are, of necessity, always right, but we all know them to be fallible on occasion. A lot of publicity has been given to the problem of observing the service, but there also seems to be difficulty in judging a side edge. This is particularly so in local table tennis, but it was unfortunate of see recently on television a deciding point being awarded on a very contentious side edge. There seems to be a tendancy to allow the return as good if it goes anywhere near the top edge of the side of the table, and I think it would help a lot of players — and umpires — if Table Tennis News were to publish an illustrated article on the News were to publish an illustrated article on the subject. I have always understood that if a ball returned from outside the table does not gain any extra movement or propulsion from hitting the edge (i.e. the reflected angle is no greater than the incident angle) the return should be adjudged a fault since it did not hit the top of the edge. A few diagrams might help to improve our judgement.

During March we will be organising the Junior Ranking Tournament (also known as the Middlesex Junior Authorised) on the 3rd and the Middlesex Closed Championships on the 18th. These events are being held at the South Ruislip and Queensmead Leisure Centres respectively and we hope by then the weather will have improved sufficiently for all the players to arrive. I hope to have a report on the Junior event in next month's edition, but unfortunately the Closed will be just that bit too late.

The season for League Closed Championships seems to have arrived although I have not had any results so far. It will be interesting to see whether any new names emerge — if I am informed of the results. I often wonder whether other County Secretaries have as much trouble as I do in finding out what is going on at League level.

As usual, North Middlesex League are doing well in the County's Inter-League Championships with the exception of the Ted Connell (Veterans) Competition. North Middlesex is a League which has always been "rich" in playing strength and one wonders what is the secret of their success. Certainly they deserve it as they work hard to earn it, from coaching right through every stage of the game. A lot of Leagues could, I am sure, learn from them.

RECORD FOURTH WIN FOR JILL by George R. Yates

Overshadowing the record fourth win by Jill Hammersley in the women's singles event of the Stiga Welsh Open, played at the National Sports Centre for Wales in Cardiff's Sophia Gardens over the period Feb. 9/11, was the feat of Czechoslovakia's Milan Orlowski in winning the men's singles, men's doubles — with Gabor Gergely of and the mixed, with Eva Ferenczi of Rumania.

The men's team event was won by Hungary, who beat Yugoslavia 3-1 the latter country's Branka Batinic and Erzebet Palatinus winning the women's doubles. But it was England's Jill Hammersley and Linda Howard who triumphed in the women's team event beating Hungary's Judit Magos and Gabriella Szabo 3-2 in a fascinating midnight finish.

In this latter event Jill and Linda, representing England I, were in receipt of a first round by and a gentle easing into the competition with a match against Turkey which must have proved a 'delight'. Belgium's Germiat sisters, Marie-France and Veronique, caused little more effort except in the doubles but from thereon the path became rugged.

The semi-finals had England facing Sweden 1 represented by Ann-Christin Hellman and Marie Lindblad, the former ranked No. 2 behind Judit Magos and one position higher than Jill in the revised European classifications. And it was Hellman who drew first blood by beating Linda in the opening set only for Jill to equate the match score with a win over Lindblad.

The English girls showed their expertise in winning the doubles but then Jill faltered for, after winning her opening game against Hellman, she slid to defeat in the next two leaving Linda the task of accounting for Lindblad for the match. This she did but only after losing the first game -13 and getting home 22-20 in the second. with victory in the doubles.

Matters were repeated in the final encounter against Hungary although the pattern was somewhat different. Initially Jill hammered off Gabrielle Szabo, 8 and 10, but Linda, after winning her opening game against Magos, went down in the next two and the Hungarians went into a 2-1 lead

Jill then equated the match score in beating Magos and once again it was Linda who had to face up to the pressures of winning her final set, against Szabo, for the match. Coming back from an opening game deficit, Linda showed her mettle in winning the next two for England to take the cheers and the title.

England's second string team in this event, Karen Witt and Anita Stevenson — the pair accompany Jill Hammersley to Pyongyang — began with a 3-1 win over Luxembourg the one to get away being a loss for Anita against Carine Risch. But against Risch and the formidable Jeanny Dom, Karen had no trouble at all although the doubles proved troublesome with a 22-20 victory in the

Curtains came in the subsequent round against Rumania whose master tactician Maria Alexandru and reigning European Youth champion, Eva Ferenczi, swallowed up our girls without so much as a hiccup.

MEN'S TEAM

England I in the men's team event was represented by Desmond Douglas and his fellow Bundesliga player Jimmy Walker. They began their run by beating Norway 3-1 Jimmy losing to Jorgen Gierloff who Des beat 9 and 10!


Then followed a match against the team from the principality with the Welsh dragon in evidence on the shirts of Alan Griffiths and David Welsman. And here again, it was Jimmy who failed in losing to Griffiths in the opening set. But Des shrugged off the setback by accounting for both Welshmen in straight games with a doubles win sandwiched between.

That win took us into the quarter-finals and opposition in the persons of Ulf Thorsell and Lars Franklin, representing Sweden I, who had seen off Netherlands II (3-0) and Federal Germany

Des continued his winning ways in disposing of Franklin in the opening set only for Jimmy to blot his copybook once again by losing to Thorsell. And worse was to follow when the Swedes took the doubles 9 and 12. Des then beat Thorsell leaving Jimmy with the unenviable task of 'taking' Franklin for survival.

The Clevelander began like a thunderbolt, to the tune of 8 in the first game, but it was Franklin who won the second at 22-20 and Jimmy had to begin all over again. To his credit he stuck manfully to the task and emerged the winner to take the team into the semis and a match against Yugoslavia's Dragutin Surbek and Anton Stipancic.

Jimmy was first to the table, against Surbek, that wielder of the sledge hammer, who thrashed home

in straight games. As in Duisburg, in the European Championships, Des was not intent on losing a set nor did he beating both Yugoslavs to equate the match score after defeat in the doubles.

Once again, as against the Swedes, it was Jimmy who claimed the spotlight in the final meeting with Stipancic and in winning the first game hopes were high. But they were subsequently dashed as Stipancic got a grip and never let go in the next two.

England II in this event had John Hilton and Alan Fletcher as a team and in losing 1-3 to Denmark failed to inspire.

Claus Pedersen was the match winner for the Danes beating both Englishmen, Hilton over three, the Lancashire player having previously beaten Palle Rud 7 and 12. But a -15, -8 reverse in the doubles sealed their fate.

Hungary, the eventual winners, beat Yugoslavia 3-1 with Tibor Klampar, twice a victor in singles, and Gabor Gergely and Istvan Jonyer successful in the doubles. Surbek was the losing finalists' only winner beating Jonyer 24-22 in the third.

INDIVIDUALS

Jill Hammersley in winning the women's singles title for a record fourth time — her first as Miss Shirley in 1971 — broke the 3-way tie of triple successes which she had shared with Diane Rowe (Mrs. Ebby Scholer) and Ilona Vostova of Czechoslovakia.

Relaxing her grip only in the third game of her final encounter with Ann-Christin Hellman, Jill regained her confidence in the fourth to take the title 3 games to 1. En route to her success Jill had put down the challenge of Marianne Domonkos (Canada), Marie Lindblad, Ursula Hirschmuller (Federal Germany) — this after losing the first game -7 — and, in the semis, Szabo.

England's only other player to reach the last eight was Karen Witt who, after victories over Sandra de Kruiff (Netherlands) and, remarkably, Ferenzi, fell to Szabo in the quarters. Linda Howard after beating Karen Senior of Ireland fell to Weibke Hendriksen (Federal Germany) and Anita Stevenson fell foul of Alexandru in the first round.

Douglas, holder of the men's singles title and undefeated in the team event, was the focal point of great expectations moreso after his quarter-final victory over Klampar who, this season, has carried Europe on his back.

But sadly the Warwickshire left-hander allowed his semi-final opponent, Ulf Thorsell, to upset him with a little gamesmanship and a slowing down of the tempo, a tactic that paid off for the Swede who, against Orlowski in the final, was just as ineffective.

No other Englishman succeeded into the last eight, Walker falling to Surbek and Max Crimmins to Gergely in the previous round. Hilton went out over five games to Engelbert Huging (Federal Germany) and Fletcher to another German, Peter Stellwag in Round 1.

All three doubles events were latterly contested without an English pairing being involved but in taking two titles in a competition that boasted nationals from 27 countries England can justifiably feel proud of their achievements.

So too can Nancy and Roy Evans who, as ever in their own domain, worked like trojans to make the tournament the success it was despite adverse weather conditions and a depth of snow which, at one time, over the weekend, caused the M4 to be closed.

But come rain, snow, or what you will the show had to go on, and so it did . . . successfully. Results:-


DES RUNNER-UP IN KRISTIANSTAD

Several schools were due to make their debuts in the Grand Finals of the National School Team Championships (organised by the English Schools' Table Tennis Association and sponsored by Stiga AB) at Lea Green Centre, Matlock on Saturday, March 10.

Although there was a sprinkling of familiar names amongst the finalists, the qualifiers from the three Regional Finals held at Leeds, Swindon and Orpington on Sunday, February 18th managed to oust some of the "big guns" and all seven trophies were due to change hands.

For the first time since the E.S.T.T.A. organised the championships in 1968 the finalists did not include a team from the West Midlands. But the West Country was well represented with two teams each from Devon and Cornwall.

Their boys team of Diccon Gray, Ian Reed, Andrew and Timothy Pachul had comfortable 8-0 wins over Culcheth (Cheshire) and Frank Wheldon (Notts) but Allerton Grange, Leeds took them to a 5-3 decision.

Two withdrawals in the girls' U-19 event meant that Millom's match against St. Mary's, Hull was the decider. Although the Humberside team had Yorkshire-ranked juniors Angela Hudson and Angela Lutkin amongst their ranks Millom's strength in depth saw them through to a 5-3 win thanks mainly to No. 4 Pam Bickerdike.

But another Humberside team, Riley High, qualified in the boys' under-16 category. Led by Sean Madden the Hull boys beat Longlands, Kendal, 5-3, and beat Culcheth by a similiar margin. With a draw against Henry Fanshawe (Derbys.) sufficient to see them through to a 5-3 agreed to call it a day at 4-1 to Riley.

Thornes House, Wakefield, qualified by virtue of a 6-2 win over Ryhope (Tyne and Wear) and Walton, Liverpool, 7-1. (In the February magazine I inadvertently referred to the team from Sunderland as "Geordies").

Another Wakefield team, Sandal Endowed, secured impressive wins over Bishop Barrington (Bishop Auckland) and Fleetwood Hesketh (Lancs) in the girls' U-13 event. Three days later they entertained Tupton Hall, Chesterfield and in a close encounter wins from Karen Arnold (2) Debra Tomlin and Kathryn Dickinson put them through to Matlock.

At the same time Sandal Endowed also played Holmgate Primary, Chesterfield (last season's runner-up) in the Under-11 competition.

The Derbyshire boys were narrow 5-3 victors

and were once again shown the way by Andrew Henry who had two wins.

Five schools from this Region qualified for the

National Finals for the first time — the other two being well-known campaigners from Newham, Lister and Brampton Manor.

Swanley had a good all-round team which defeated previous finalists Queen Elizabeth's, Barnet (6-2), Wisbech Grammar (7-1) and Desborough, Maidenhead (5-3) in the Senior Boys' event.

Brampton Manor's 6-2 win over Tolworth Girls in the U-19 was the only sets they conceded — they had crushing 8-0 wins over Cedars, Leighton Buzzard, and St. Bernard's Convent, Westcliff-on-Sea, who had some consolation in beating the Bedfordshire girls to take third place.

Hereward School, March became only the second Cambridgeshire side to appear in the Finals when their Boys' Under-16 side of Robert Swift, Gary Jordan, Michael Jackman and Neil Parsley pipped Trinity, 5-3, to add to wins over Horsell, Woking, and Harvey G.S., Folkestone.

The Girls' U-16 category was a very close battle. Thurleston, Ipswich, were unable to travel and the contest was reduced to three teams. Lister and Bishop Reindorp, Guildford, drew 4-4 in the first match. Lister then defeated Wyndgate, Folkestone 5-3 and as the Surrey girls could only manage another draw against Wyndgate the Newham team edged through. Highlight of this last match was Carla Wilson's win over Sarah Cresswell of Bishop Reindorp.

Andrew Sexton was Hillcross Middle's outstanding player as the Merton boys reached the safety of a 4-1 lead over Bedford Modern in their deciding match.

In the other two events there were some very interesting results. The outcome depended on the final set between Conyngham, Ramsgate, and Clacton County High School. And it was the Conyngham No. 4, Dennise Whalen who clinched victory (5-3) with a 21-18 margin in the deciding game.

But the tightest results came in the Under-11

event. Sweyne Primary, Swanscombe looked to be in the box seat with 5-3 victories over Old Buckenham Hall, Ipswich, and Hill House, London. An inspired performance by Wallop, Weybridge, in winning 5-3 over Sweyne meant that three teams were in with a shout at the end but Ray Perrin's fall was complete when the Suffolk boys' 5-3 win over Hill House meant a close encounter of the third kind and a place in the Grand Finals by virtue of a fractionally better sets ratio.

By the time these notes appear in print the seven winners of these Annual Championships will probably be known. As for forecasts, I make but one — that once again the Finals at Lea Green will be a memorable occasion for players, parents and teachers alike.

WESTERN LEAGUE NOTES by Grove Motlow

PLYMOUTH BEATEN

Early in January, Plymouth journeyed to Oldfield Park and there beat Bath 9-0 with maximum performances from Brian Davies, Mike Short and Mike Shearman. Subsequently at home to Poole, on Jan. 14, they were beaten 5-4 with the visitors' Trevor Smith claiming a treble and Martin Abbott losing only to Short.

Plymouth were again on the receiving end of a 6-3 result away to Bristol on Jan. 27 and in fact were 0-5 down before they registered their first success by Paul Whiting over Martyn Smith. Whiting scored again, over Brian Reeves, in the penultimate set and, in the final one, Short accounted for Smith. Kevin Satchell was Bristol's 'big gun' with three 2-straight victories to his name.

Bristol, represented by a totally different team, away to Bath on Jan. 13, had lost 3-6. Robert Oldfield had a treble for the victors with John Higgs doing likewise although at pains against Tony Brown with the Expedite rule in force for the second and third games of a marathon encounter which Higgs won 15, -18, 20. In contrast was the all out looping set between Steve Gregory of Bath against Andrew Creed which the latter won 12, -12, 20.

ON THE COACHING FRONT

PERIODISATION PURSUED by DONALD PARKER E.T.T.A. National Coach North

It must at this stage be emphasised that as well as "peaking" periodisation is also concerned with optimal realisation of potential. In other words at the end of the season or whatever the period, it is of the utmost importance that the individual is technically a better player. Therefore when planning or periodising a player's training programme these two factors must be taken into account. The emphasis placed on either one will depend upon the stage of development of the player.

In general it is true to say that in this country our players train by competition instead of for competition. Time is not set aside in the training programme for technical improvement as players compete in competition almost every weekend. The Grand Metropolitan Scheme is most definitely a step in the right direction with a weekend set aside for practice, as opposed to competition, with top class players to practice against.

Last month's article examined briefly how physical training should vary at different stages of the training programme. This month's article will look at how practice on the table should vary at different stages of the training programme in order to accommodate both technical improvement and peaking.

The first half of the preparation phase (see last month's article) should be devoted almost exclusively to working on technical matters. For example if a player needs to change his grip in order to progress further then this is the time to alter it and not the week before a major cham-

pionship. If a player needs to modify a stroke or learn a new stroke this is now the time to learn it. This is the period when the player should be concentrating on his techniques and consciously grooving in the correct ones. The coach during this period should be checking the various techniques and correcting any faults while at the same time reinforcing any good points. This is the period when the coach does most of his coaching as opposed to training and captaincy.

As the competition phase draws nearer there is a need to develop consistency with the newly acquired techniques. Therefore while there is still a certain amount of technical feedback from the coach the player should be allowed to consolidate and groove in the techniques in a consistency type practice on the table ready for competition.

Following consistency practices the emphasis should shift to regular footwork exercises, exercises when the player knows where the ball is going and must move his feet accordingly. The types of footwork patterns practiced will vary and will be dependent upon the players particular style. The aim of this particular set of exercises is to groove in the correct footwork patterns having already spent time grooving in the correct strokes.

Still working within the preparation phase the next set of exercises are moving even closer to the match situation. Irregular footwork exercises are quite simply exercises where one player acts as controller placing the ball where he likes. Therefore the player at the other side does not know where the ball is going to and must play the ball back to a set target. If the footwork patterns break down in this type of situation then more time should be spent in the regular situation grooving in the correct patterns.

At a reasonably high standard there is no doubt that the most important stroke in the game is the service and the second most important stroke is the receive. John Clarke (Sussex) carried out a piece of research at the 1977 World Championships on behalf of the E.T.T.A. and found that approximately 50% of the points were over with the fourth ball and approximately 80% by the seventh. Therefore it is vital that towards the end of the preparation phase and throughout the competition phase a lot of time is spent on service and receive and linking these to third and fourth ball.

The final 'touch' to the preparation phase is to put all the foregoing sub-skills into the whole skill

and play some competitive matches. Some players need more match play than others before they realise their optimal performance.

Once in the competitive phase the coaches role becomes very much that of a trainer/captain. The players should not have to worry about any technical matters and should be concentrating simply on winning points rather than concentrating on their grip or whatever. The coaches role during this phase is very much in the tactical and psychological areas rather than the technical one.

Before finishing this article it should be emphasised that preparation for a peak performance will vary from individual to individual. However a programme similar to the one I have briefly outlined, incorporates both the technical improvement and preparation for a peak performance.

READING JUNIOR OPEN

CAPACITY ENTRY by Alan Dines

The popular Reading Junior Open again attracted a capacity entry of 336 players including a strong squad from Belgium competing for a prize fund worth about £500. The championships were sponsored by Gillette and organised by I.M.P.A.C.T. with the venue at Meadway Sports Centre, Reading, on Feb. 10/11. Thanks to detailed organisation the participants appreciated the tournament running with clockwork precision and the Finals starting on time and finishing early in the evening — still a 100% record.

Star of the Boys' Singles was 'veteran' Sam Harmer who trains at the Centre of Excellence in Reading. The main contender for the title was expected to be Desmond Charlery who just scraped through the quarter-final against Skylet Andrew who was in brilliant form. His semi-final against Stephen Moore produced two close first games but a collapse under a fierce onslaught in the third, won by Moore, 21-7. Ian Attridge made good progress to the last 16 by disposing of Martin Les 17 in the third and David Sharpe, also 17 in the third, but was not able to make much impression on Harmer. P. Brownlow reached the quarter-final via a good 15, 15 win over Glen Baker but was convincingly beaten then by Harmer. Neil Stratton after a very close win over Guy Nailis of Belgium then beat Eddie Gorniak for a semi-final place but further progress was stopped by Harmer. The Final produced some spectacular table tennis with Moore taking the first game at 19. Harmer sharpened measurably as the match progressed and by increasing the pressure on his opponent won the next two games 15 and 13. Thus the Under-17 title went to 'veteran' junior Harmer at his eighth attempt.

The girls' events were dominated by the Belgians and in particular Barbara Lippens who had won titles in previous years. Among the shock results the biggest upsets were Lorraine Garbet's narrow defeat by Sharon James, Julie Speight's win over Shirley Cain and Cathy Belcher's win against Jill Purslow. Cathy then succumbed to Linda Degg who then fought her way to the semi-final and a defeat at the hand of Barbara Lippens. Alison



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Burke defeated Eleanor Hughes and then narrowly lost to Claire Maisey. Claire then came up against Barbara Lippens in the quarter-final where after a superb match she was narrowly the loser. Meanwhile Nikki Hamilton with a good win over Nathalie Boeckx of Belgium then reached the quarter-final where she lost to Jackie Bellinger who had just disposed of Sharon James. Cherry Creasey reached the semi-final with a win in the quarter-finals over Leslie Tyler. Her semi-final with Jackie Bellinger provided the spectators with a brilliant and close contest. The Final between Cherry Creasey and Barbara Lippens produced a one-sided first game won easily by Barbara. Cherry got the measure of her defence in the second and with some inspired attacking looked as though she would take the game. However, she did not quite make it and the title went to Barbara Lippens.

Results in the Cadet Boys' Singles went generally as expected except for those of Jeremy Duffield.

Andrew Dixon beat Gorniak in the semi-final who Andrew Dixon beat Gorniak in the semi-final who had previously just beaten David Sharpe. Graham Russell beat Marc Rosseel of Belgium before losing to Duffield in the quarters. Gary Lambert won a close encounter with Carl Prean in the quarter-final before falling in the semi-final to Duffield. The Final seemed to be in the bag for Dixon, but a last moment comeback in the second game swung the match round to a win for Duffield.

The Cadet Girls' Singles proceeded fairly predictably with Barbara Lippens reaching the final with wins over Nikki Hamilton and Lisa Bellinger who had beaten Jackie Windle in the quarters. The other finalist was Jackie Bellinger with wins against Helen Bardwell and Nathalie Boeckx who in turn had put out Laura Goldsmith in the quarters. The Final was an entertaining attack versus defence match which resulted in two very close games both within seconds of the time limit, and a win by Barbara Lippens over Jackie Bellinger.

In the Boys' Doubles, Charlery and Andrew seemed to be on the way to the title with a convincing win over Baker and Les. Their opponents in the Final were S. and A. Moore who just managed a semi win over Harmer and Dixon at 19 in the third. The Final swung away from Charlery and Andrew and the Moore brothers ran out winners.

LANCASHIRE 2-STAR OPEN

TWO TITLES FOR 'THE DON' by Geo. R. Yates

Preston's Donald Parker, the E.T.T.A.'s Northern Staff Coach, beat Mike Johns of Cheshire at British Aerospace, Bolton on Feb. 3 to win the men's singles title at the Lancashire 2-Star Open, the first Lancastrian to do so since Kevin Forshaw of Manchester triumphed in 1965.

Partnered by Lancashire's No. 1 Junior, Paul Rainford, also of Preston, Parker also won the men's doubles by a slender 28-26 third game margin from Alan Fletcher of Yorkshire and Nigel Eckersley of Cheshire.

Fletcher, the top seed in the men's singles, was surprisingly eliminated by Cheshire's Mark Hankey, and the top seed in the women's singles, Melody Ludi of Yorkshire, was knocked out in the semi-finals by Susan Lisle of Cheshire, who went on to beat Lancashire's No. 1 Diane Johnson, in the final.



STIGA/GRAND MET. TRAINING WEEK-END

Late in December I attended the second Stiga/Grand Metropolitan Hotels Training weekend at York. After the first weekend, held at Birmingham, I had been told by various people that the whole thing had been a shambles, absolute waste of time, that they would not go again, etc., etc. Accordingly I was a bit apprehensive as to what I should expect. I took up there in my car, three of the invited players, namely David Newman, Skylet Andrew and Desmond Charlery, but as none of these can write, I have been asked to give my impressions.

We arrived at the plush Viking Hotel on the Thursday afternoon, and discovered that we all had really smart rooms — bathroom to yourself, T.V., and all the trimmings. It was teeming down with rain, but we took no notice of that; after all, we had all seen rain before. At 6.30 the entire party, consisting of 120 juniors, about 20 ordinary coaches, and sundry-super-persons, such as Peter Simpson, Peter Hirst, Donald Parker, Jack Carrington, Dick Tammadge, Gordon Steggall and Elsie Carrington, sat down to a splendid dinner in the Hotel dining room. The programme for the evening was that at 8 p.m. we would split up into two groups. The larger one (80 + coaches) would go to St. Peter's College, and the smaller one (40 + coaches) to the University of York.

After dinner everybody assembled in the foyer, only to discover that the River Ouse, which hitherto had been flowing past the hotel at the back, was now flowing past it on both sides and at the front — right up to the doors!! In other words we were virtually marooned. Eventually orders were given that all concerned should make their way through the hotel kitchens, out through the back door, up some stairs, over a bridge and thus to the main road, where buses were waiting.

You all must have read in the papers, and/or seen on T.V., that the River Ouse had risen by some 18 feet. This caused a subsidiary river, which was very deep, to flow along the road outside the Hotel, and many of the main roads in York were impassable. Fortunately our buses were able to plough through the floodwater, where private cars could not.

That evening the players took part in table exercises, to demonstrate the benefits of footwork, an aspect of the game on which all Essex juniors would do well to concentrate. After this there was a showing on video tape of a film analysing service and receive techniques. Finally a period was devoted to the very important routines of prematch warming up. I have to say that I found all this most impressive and, so far, that I had nothing but praise for the whole operation.

Friday dawned and the floods had not subsided. The buses were still able to get through to their destinations, fortunately, so our plans were not affected. What was quite a worry, however, was the fact that our cars were parked in a car-park opposite the Hotel and the flood waters had reached a point about ten yards away from it! Dick Tammadge of the E.T.T.A. was engaged in negotiations throughout Friday for the towing out of all the cars in that Car Park which would have involved them in being thoroughly soaked; his alternative plan was to get a wall at the back of the Car Park knocked down so that the cars could be driven out that way! Eventually that is what happened and we all managed to put our cars on some high ground about a mile away.

The division of the players into groups of 80 and 40 was still in operation. I must explain that by and large the best players were in the large groups and the more modest ones in the small group. I am not quite sure how the process of selection worked for this, but I must record that some of the players in the small group were little more than beginners. I had volunteered to act as one of the coaches of that small group in the University. I was very pleased to find on arrival, that far from this group being treated as the poor relations they were actually looked after by the top coaches on duty namely Peter Hirst and

Donald Parker. What happened was that Peter and Donald introduced and demonstrated each exercise that was to be done and the other coaches and I then proceeded to get the players to work on them.

During the morning we worked on table exercises designed to improve the technique of the forehand smash, including one very popular one where a feeder sent over 50 balls in quick succession which were smashed by the pupil, some even onto the table! Quite a pleasant packed lunch was provided by the Hotel and this having been consumed we went back to work in the afternoon. Donald Parker demonstrated the Chinese high throw-up in service and explained the benefits and pitfalls of it. Then everybody had a go at doing it, most people finding that it was a lot harder than it looked. After this back to the drawing board and Donald and Peter were explaining all about short services and how to receive them. Finally the players went away and practised these two difficult arts.

What was noteworthy of all this from a group—coaching point of view was that it had all been well thought out and prepared, each coach having a Schedule of the exercises to be gone through with explanatory notes and diagrams. So one was left with the feeling that if the week-end failed this time, it would not be because of lack of preplanning. As I have said I really was impressed and I personally feel that the whole week-end was a great success.

After the afternoon session we returned to the Hotel for dinner. The weather now changed once more and a snow blizzard descended on York, which did not help to reduce the floods. It did create much ice to walk on however, and proved for one thing that Skylet would be useless in the Slalom.

The following day was set aside for an interregional team event for 75 players, and an individual tournament for the remainder. Mike Watts, Doug Young and I were to be referees of these events and we spent the whole of Friday evening getting it organised.

The events of the Saturday went off very well and Panel 2 (Essex, Middlesex, Surrey, Kent and Sussex) proved supreme in the team event — Graham Sandley, Colin Wilson, Mark Oakley and "Costas" were missing, yet England No. 14 Peter Puddock could not even make the team! He did not win the Individual event either, that honour going to Neil Stratton of Middlesex.

Back to the Hotel and we dispersed at about 4 p.m. All that was left was to dig our cars out of the snow—, nobody's keys would turn in the locks which made it more unpleasant—but at last we got ours going and made it back to London. I think that very few of those present will forget this week-end and if any junior has a chance of going to the next one I strongly recommend he

RARE BIRD LINDA WITH WINGS CLIPPED!

It is often not possible to put across both sides of an argument in this column. By the time the next month comes along something else has happened, but in this case I am able to say that I fully appreciate that there are two strong cases on the question of dropping Linda Howard from the world championships team in favour of younger players.

Those of us who were at the Stiga Welsh Open in Cardiff saw the Guildford girl who is still on the right side of 25 fight bravely for England when the team had its back to the wall against both Sweden and Hungary. This came at a time when she is without doubt unhappy with the decisions made on Pyongyang by the new broom selectors.

Her fighting qualities and her experience do not seem to be questioned by anybody, neither is the

fact that she had a run of poor results in the first half of the season.

The case for sending Linda to North Korea was put to me by former selector Alan Ransome over a breakfast in Cardiff — she is a rare bird in that she has developed as a doubles specialist.

To be absolutely honest we know that Desmond Douglas and Jill Hammersley with their high world rankings in Korea have good chances of at least reaching the quarter-finals and with a bit of good fortune could do even better.

But our best chance of medals seem to be with Desmond and Jill in doubles when partnered by a strong and experienced person. Linda has vast experience playing with both Desmond and Jill, but alas, she will not have the opportunity to make use of it in Korea.

No doubt what the selectors have in mind. They are hoping that from the promising pair Karen Witt and Anita Stevenson will emerge a powerful doubles partner to take over the supporting roles for our world-class pair.

That is the other side of the coin to the views I expressed last month. Don't assume readers, that I am necessarily on one side or the other — only time will tell whether the selectors have chosen the right course — it's happening all the time in sport — new blood is brought in and experienced people are left out in the cold, but that happens all the time, everywhere, in sport and everywhere else.

The value of the Norwich Union Grand Prix and the Masters and the sponsorship of companies such as Stiga was brought home to me at Cardiff. The Welsh event is now one of the most important on the calendar. This is due to a number of factors especially the efforts made by Nancy and Roy Evans.

"The Daily Telegraph" made what I would think to be an admirable decision for me to cover this tournament personally after a gap of several years. Because they saw that the tournament had grown in its importance — even without Asian players there were 28 nations in action, not to mention the top twelve men in Europe.

Unfortunately, the Welsh T.T.A. through no fault of their own, do not possess tournament organisers of the calibre of John Wright, Mike Watts and strength in depth all the way down to the line backed by other stalwarts like Geoff Daniels, John Heritage and many others.

Indeed, E.T.T.A. national tournaments have become sophisticated and we Press men are inclined to expect an instant results service from the top table. It took a little time to impress on our Welsh enthusiasts in Cardiff that in order that the national Press agency network can operate properly, we cannot wait for half an hour or so whilst rounds are completed or whilst lists of results are stencilled and duplicated for the benefit of team captains.

But no doubt, now that the Stiga Welsh Open is one of the most vital tournaments in the Norwich Grand Prix and it is of vital importance to both sponsors, they the sponsors, will see that there will be streamlining between the top table and the media in 1980!



CHESHIRE IN LINE

Cheshire have placed themselves in line for the Premier championship with a 7-2 win over Warwickshire, but further inactivity at the foot of the table (Yorkshire postponed their trip to Glamorgan with Melody Ludi and Alan Fletcher on E.T.T.A. duty in Ireland and Essex were warned off travel-ling to Berkshire because of treacherous road conditions at the Essex end on Feb. 17) keeps the positions at the lower end the same.

No clear indication is available as to the relative strengths of the bottom teams but Glamorgan must improve previous performances if they are to stand any chance of retaining Premier status next season — their second team appear to have failed in a bid to repeat last season's trick of going to the Promotion Challenge.
