



JILL'S CROWN IN MUNICH

For the second time in their illustrious careers England's Jill Hammersley, the 1978 winner in Prague, and Stellan Bengtsson of Sweden, who won the event in 1973 in Boblingen, mounted the top level of the rostrum as winners on Feb. 3, 1980 in the Rudi-Stadlmayer-Halle, Munich.

It was quite a feat on the part of Bengts-son who went through his eleven rounds without once tasting defeat unlike Jill who went down to Gordana Perkucin of Yugoslavia and Gabriella Szabo of Hungary who was defending her title.

Desmond Douglas, England's other rep-resentative who, in Kristianstadt last year, finished runner-up to Dragutin Surbek of Yugoslavia, could do no better than 4th losing out to Jacques Secretin (France), Surbek, Istvan Jonyer (Hungary) and Wilfried Lieck (Federal Germany).

This was a particularly disappointing finish for the English No. 1 having overcome two of his bogeymen in the persons of Josef Dvoracek of Czechoslovakia and Ulf Thorsell of Sweden.

Thorsell had the satisfaction of finishing runner-up to his compatriot but Surbek suffered from being the last time winner to No. 8, Gabriella Szabo falling from 1st to 3rd, behind Jill and the ever-improving Bettine Vriesekoop of the Netherlands.

TITLES CROSS THE SEA

For the second year in succession, the Men's and Women's Singles at the Stiga Open Championships crossed the Irish Irish Sea.










PROFILE — DAVID TIPLADY

The final although very good to watch belonged to Rogers from a very early stage and he eventually won in fine style. This was Tyler's third final of the Champion-ships and by the end he was a very tired man with unfortunately only three runners-up medals to show for all his efforts.

The women's singles was undoubtedly spoilt by the non-appearance of Mandy Mellor. What was expected to be a well

contested event turned out as a one horse race for Cheryl Buttery of Nottingham University. This Lincoln student, also star of "It's a Knockout", won in a canter. Her opponent in the semi-final was Marilyn Sangster of Loughborough who had a great deal of difficulty beating the former Surrey Junior, Sue Head, representing Reading University. With Cheryl in such good form, no one could live with her on the day and we had another finalist who didn't drop a game. The other semi-final was between the Manchester pair Anne Sweeney and Debbie Coulthard and on this occasion Debbie won a very close game. The final was not disappointing although Cheryl in the end won easily but some of the rallies lasted a fair length of time and the spectators were delighted.

Yet another Universities Championships had been successfully contested. Admirably refereed by Pat Archdale assisted by two of her Avon colleagues, the tournament was enjoyed by all who took part. The excellent co-operation and help given by the Sports Centre staff deserves a special mention as does the contribution of Susan Lisle from the B.U.S.F. Sub-Committee.







SAD PROLOGUE
