
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SUNSHINE AND **CLOUDS**

A bright new season lies ahead and already, in the competitive field, England have got off to the best possible of starts by beating the old enemy, Federal Germany, in their opening European League Super Division fixture.

Matches have already got under way in the newly-formed English National League and certain players are to receive remuneration for both loyalty and service to the English Association.

Prize money continues to escalate not least via the medium of Barry Meisel whose Global organisation which, despite thunderous threats to out-Packer the Australian impressario, can still achieve harmony with the governing body to the benefit of all concerned.

Norwich Union maintain their sponsorship of the major English championships whilst continuing with their Grand Prix incorporating Top Table and Masters tournaments all again to be televised. Debenhams are to come in on the junior front while Rock Motor Parts have broken new ground in the Under-21 category.

The Sports Council are still very much our staunchest supporter, the major bleat being in respect of publicity and the lack of it, particularly in respect of the National League, in the national press. But, thankfully, this is not evident provincially.

JILL BACK AT No. 1 IN EUROPE

In revised ranking lists issued by the Classification Committee of the European Table Tennis Union in August, England's leading lady, Jill Hammersley, regains her No. 1 position having been previously placed to the committee of at No. 3 behind Judit Magos of Hungary, the European champion, and Ann-Christin Hellman of Sweden.

Undoubtedly benefitting from her results in Pyongyang against her fellow Europeans Jill now heads Gabriella Szabo of Hungary and Miss Hellman with Judit Magos down to No. 4. And one must not overlook, admittedly at No. 25, the first time inclusion of another English girl, Karen Witt.


Desmond Douglas retains his No. 5 position in the men's list which is headed by Tibor Klampar of Hungary who has been elevated from No. 2 in front of Milan Orlowski of Czechoslovakia and the former No. 1 Gabor Gergely of Hungary.

Newcomers to the lists are Claus Pedersen Newcomers to the lists are Claus Pedersen of Denmark and Andrzej Grubba of Poland to the exclusion of Ralf Wosik (Federal Germany) and Josef Juhas of Yugoslavia in the men's list while, on the distaff side, Marie Hrachova (Czechoslovakia), Kirsten Kruger (Federal Germany) and Miss Witt replace Liana Mihut (Rumania), Dubravka Fabri (Yugoslavia) and Monica Kneip-Stumpe (Federal Germany).


New world champions Seiji Ono of Japan and Ge Xinai of China head the respective lists the newcomers being Lu Ŷaohua



We consider some of the statements issued

by Global Table Tennis Promotions Limited to be grossly misleading and view some of their plans as being detrimental to the interests of the sport.

As a member of the International Table As a member of the International Table Tennis Federation, along with another 121 member countries, and the European Table Tennis Union, the Association is bound by certain rules intended to safeguard the interests of the players and cannot commit its players to any organisation which may be in breach of such rules.

The Association is conscious of the increasing needs of the professional player and is actively pursuing a policy of enlarg-ing the incentives available. One example of this is the recent decision to more than double the prize fund for the Norwich Union English Championships.

In the view of the Association any attempt by an outside body to obtain publicity by encouraging dissatisfaction amongst the players is not in the interests of English table tennis.

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Welsh Corner

TRADITIONAL OPENING

The Welsh season opens with the now traditional Willis Faber Welsh Junior Open Tournament, but also with a difference in this event.

In the past we have had an enormous entry, and with the added complication of good cadets also being in the later rounds of the junior events, we have run acceptably late. In an endeavour to overcome this problem, we have scheduled the tournament over two days — Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 1/2, and although the tournament will be over by the time these notes appear it's as well to talk about our attempted solution.

We had thought at first about a team event, with the object of attracting foreign entries, but we eventually decided against this, feeling that, for the time being at any rate, we should retain the mostly British element. So we decided on a combined group

and knock-out tournament, and it now means that the weaker players, sometimes making long journeys for the doubtful pleasure of a first round knock-out, will get at least five matches.

This idea we believe meets the initial object in holding this event, and although there is a reduction in the number of entries, we believe the plan will provide an enjoyable tournament for all competitors.

The new season also sees a return of Wales to Division 2 of the European League. Our great performance at last season's Third Division matches in Cardiff means that we have a very full European League programme, both home and away.

Our away matches mean trips to Belgium, Switzerland, and Ireland, whilst our Home encounters will be against Spain — On Friday, September 28th, in Cardiff, with the Spanish team staying to play in the Glamorgan Open on Saturday/Sunday Sept. 29/30.

We then meet Norway, at Rhyl, on Friday, Nov. 16, and our North Wales County Association is already working hard to make this a success.

Denmark, who just pipped us for the Third Division Championship, come to Wales before the Stiga Welsh Open, and we shall meet them in Swansea on Wednesday Feb. 6. The Finns will also come to the Welsh Open, and our match with them will be immediately afterwards — at Bridgend on Feb. 11. Swansea and Bridgend Leagues are already hard at work.

Foreign entries for the Stiga Welsh Open on Feb. 7/9 are already assured from many Associations, and although we don't expect 27 countries as on the last occasion, we are still planning for another big entry. The event is again in the Norwich Union Grand Prix circuit. The European League Third Division matches, which swelled our entry last time, are scheduled to take place in Guernsey immediately before our event, and it is expected that most of the participants will come on to Cardiff.

Our usual Welsh Inter-League programme starts early because of the big junior entry, whilst the usual round of open tournaments will take place at Aberdare, Swansea, Cardiff, Glamorgan and Gwent, with the new ones — the Clwyd Junior and the Wrexham Open now an established part of the calendar.

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
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RANKING POLICY 1979-80 SEASON

by Peter Charters (Chairman, National Selection Committee)

The Selection Committee met recently to decide on the intended ranking policy for the coming season. It is very important for players and all those concerned about ranking to understand the basis on which the lists are prepared. Confusion can arise where there is ignorance of the way that the ranking lists are formulated and which results are used. Players should know before the season starts exactly what they must do to improve or obtain a ranking place. It is literally then in their hands to obtain the necessary results. For the guidance of tournament organisers, the Selection Committee intends to produce three seeding (ranking) lists during the season covering Seniors, Juniors and Cadets.

It is intended to continue the basic policy of last season but with one major addition. The National Club League with its guarantee of 3 Star playing conditions and involvement of most of England's top men players, has been added to the list of events, the results of which will be used for ranking.

In all cases of equality after nominated results have been considered. 2 Star Tournament results and previous ranking position will be used to decide the final order of players considered equal on results.

Results for ranking will be considered strictly in separate categories, i.e. Senior, Junior and Cadet.

Each ranked player will be given a card on which wins loses and position reached in a tournament will be recorded. Anyone beating a ranked player will then be given a card in the same way.

It must be appreciated that ranking is not the same thing as selection. Ranking. which is based on a comparatively small number of specified results, will be used only as a guide to selection. Selections are based on who, and what combination of players will in the opinion of the selection committee, do the best job for England.

The Junior ranking tournament will run The Junior ranking tournament will run on similar lines to that of last season with Regional Ranking Lists being used for the extra invitations (ranked player, not "A" group being invited automatically) for the first Junior ranking tournament in November. The fate of the senior ranking tournament is now uncertain due to sponsorship difficulties. A fourth junior tournament has been granted "select" status for use in ranking this season.

Rankings will be issued at the following approximate times:-

By the end of November '79. By the end of January '80. By the middle of May '80.

By the end of December '79. At the end of March '80 (between J.R.T. and Yorkshire Select).

By the end of May '80.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

SOUND A WARNING

Commercially sponsored tournaments for Commercially sponsored tournaments for cash prizes are now becoming increasingly part of the table tennis scene within what are loosely known as "Western" countries, and it is easy to understand why these events are becoming more numerous and more financially attractive.

But in my capacity of President of the International Table Tennis Federation I must sound a warning. We are an organisation of over 120 Associations, fourth largest in the sports world, and it is a fact possibly not known to many people in Britain that over ninety percent of our organisations are amateur within the IOC concept of that word.

We had been under pressure for many years from this huge element to seek recognition by the International Olympic Committee, because this recognition would mean that National Table Tennis Associations would be recognised by their own National Olympic Committees, and thus receive added financial and organisational support.

Following several years of contact, correspondence and visits to IOC Headquarters at Lausanne. I was able at the Biennial General Meeting in Birmingham in April 1977 to report that with certain amendments to our Constitution, the IOC was prepared to recognise us. Understandably there were objections from some Associations whose players had enjoyed the benefits of our earlier principles — that players were players, and that the words "amateur" and "professional" appeared nowhere in our Constitution. But, reflecting the views of that enormous element of our membership which was in fact amateur, the proposal to seek recognition was overwhelmingly carried, and the last dotting of the "i's" and crossing of the "t's" was successfully accomplished.

Already the effect has been tremendous, and many many Associations which had hitherto been "outside the pale" reported recognition by their NOC's with consequent increasing of their financial support, and very much greater prestige.

All this has been accomplished with very little change affecting the average player in the Western countries, but changes are now becoming apparent and it is for this reason that I find myself obliged to point the problems.

It was not part of our original plan to seek inclusion in the Olympic Games but there is already great pressure from all sides for us to do this. It is essentially a very long term project, simply because the Olympic Games programme is agreed many years before even the next but one Games take place. Thus, although Moscow is the host for 1980, the programme is already agreed for 1984, and we shall not be in it as a competitive sport. Similarly, we are not in the Commonwealth Games programme for Brisbane 1982, and can not hope for inclusion before 1986.

But, table tennis has already been included in the African Games, in the Asian Games, will be in the Mediterranean Games in Split this September, will be in the SEA Games in South East Asia next year, and has also been a demonstration Sport in the Pan American Games in Puerto Rico. All this because we are now recognised by the IOC.

This may be all rather remote from the thoughts of the players here in Britain, but I must remind them that they are in fact vitally interested.

The I.T.T.F. Rule on Prize Money, accepted by the IOC as one of the rules under our control, specifically states that no player may receive more than 1250 Swiss Francs in prize money and remain an amateur. At the present rate of exchange that is about £340. Yet a tournament in England is offering prize money for the Open Singles of £1,000 and the runner-up is offered £350. Moreover, the E.T.T.A. has announced (February "Table Tennis News") that its players may accept these prizes.

It's true that participation in the Commonwealth Games and the Olympic Games may be a piece of pie in the sky at the moment, but either of these things could

happen within the playing career of some of your players, and it would surely be a tragedy if England found that the players they would pick in 1986 or 1988 had professionalised themselves in 1979!

I am all for the commercial involvement in our sport as witnessed by the fact that the Norwich Union Grand Prix was conceived in co-operation between the I.T.T.F. and the Norwich Union.


BUT, the implications of competing in these events MUST be made clear to those whose continued amateur status is of importance to them. No prize money exceeding 1250 Swiss Francs may be won for any event, and, equally important, no amateur can enter into any contract with a manufacturer for the use of his name. Any such arrangement must be between the manufacturer and the player's Association.

I am sure that very few players are aware of these conditions, and I hope that all will have the patience to read what is important for them to know.

********* NO ROMAN HOLIDAY

Represented by Graham Sandley, Colin Wilson, John Souter, David Barr, Mandy Smith, Alison Gordon and Sally Midgley at Under-17 level, and by Adrian Moore, Andrew Dixon, Cheryl Creasey and Jackie Bellinger in the Cadet category, England had high expectations in the Palasport, Rome over the period July 21-29.

But, in the 22nd European Youth Championships, it was not to be, the squad, under non-playing captains, Donald Parker and Susan Lisle, returning to these shores with not a solitary medal between them.

Granted in the team events the boys improved on their final positions in Barcelona from No. 7 to No. 5 and the girls from No. 9 to No. 6. But in the Cadet field our players equated at No. 11 in the boys' and it was down from No. 6 to No. 10 in the girls' team event.

Sweden took over from the USSR in the boys' team the Russians retaining their No.
1 position in the girls'. Czechoslovakia superceded Sweden for the gold medals in the Cadet boys' and again it was the Soviet Union who retained the Cadet girls' title.

Jiri Ezr of Czechoslovakia won the boys' singles title with a final win over Jonas Berner of Sweden, the girls crown being captured by **Bettine Vriesekoop** of the Netherlands who swept to final victory over Kristina Nilsson of Sweden.

The Swedes had better luck in the boys doubles won by Mikael Appelgren and Anders Thunstrom, the girls' title going to Marie Hrachova and Alice Pelikanova. The mixed title was won by Federal Germany's Jurgen Rebel and Susanne Wetzel.

Czechoslovakia had another winner in the Cadet boys' singles Vladislav Broda beating Jan Ove Waldner of Sweden in the final whilst in the cadet girls' Miss Daniliavit-choute of the USSR had a final victory over Miss Guergueltcheva of Bulgaria to provide a copy taker's nightmare!

PERFORMANCE

There were good efforts put in by English players headed by Graham Sandley who, out of 17 singles outings won 11 and only played badly on two occasions. Unfortunately one of his bad outings was in the first round of the boys' singles when he lost to Andreas Zehetbauer of Austria, 19 in the third.

Foremost cadet, Adrian Moore proved his leading position in England by winning 9 out of 12 sets in the team event including two against Federal Germany, Denmark and a very strong Hungarian team. On two occasions he saved five match points to win showing he has the determination required for a good player.

WOT! NO MEDALS?

I was talking to Tom Blunn in Rome at the European Youth Championships and we were discussing team events. Tom said "Why is it we seem to finish just out of the medals year after year?" Good question!

I have been fortunate enough to attend the last four E.Y.Cs., where the team events have been dominated by Sweden, Russia and Czechoslovakia and the reason for this is undoubtedly that they prepare their teams carefully and methodically with the Championships in view — whereas our preparation is very much a "hit or miss' affair. Proper preparation for these events is vital. All the players need to be at their peak physically and mentally to have any chance of finishing in the medals.

Team events are played on the group system and all can be won or lost in the very first match played — this is how important it is. We pay insufficient attention to this and our teams always travel to the venue the day before the event, leaving themselves no time to practice and get acclimatised to strange tables and conditions. In fact, at Vichy three years ago the tions. In fact, at Vichy three years ago, the players did not arrive and get to bed until after midnight yet some were playing at

8.30 that morning. This is not giving our players a fair chance. All our main competitors arrive as much as two clear days before the Tournament commences yet we risk everything by late travel — presumably to save money.

I believe we should also send out more players. With the present format there is not enough depth available to allow the Coach to permutate his team or rest players. In addition, more Coaches are necessary—two, to look after four teams, is insufficient. They, the Coaches, are drained mentally long before the end of the Championships. How often have I seen our Coaches trying to look after two tables each? These competitions are so finely balanced that the alert, mentally fresh Coach who knows his players, can be the difference between success or failure, for believe me, you have to find another gear as it were, to get into the medals in team events in these Championships and this includes players and Coaches.

I understand money is partially the prob-lem but now that some is available spend it wisely England. Send your teams out to compete secure in the knowledge that you are allowing them to participate on equal terms; that you have prepared them properly; that they are fit both physically and mentally than the medals will surely and mentally — then the medals will surely come.

We should emulate the top teams whose training camps before the championships have present their best senior players with the object of giving the juniors the type of practice required to give them the necessary edge.

So, what about it England? Enough of this just missing the medals. The lesson is — "you get out of it what you are prepared to put into it" and, in the past, for one reason or another, we have not been going into these Championships one hundred per cent prepared.

NORTH KOREA -A Player's View

On the long arduous journey home, one third of the way around the world, amidst the boredom, the cards, the drowsiness, the piped propaganda and inedible meals; one thought kept coming to mind like a recurring bad dream — how on earth do I answer people when they politely enquire "What was Korea like?"

Surely it was not possible to explain in a few brief words two of the most unusual weeks of my life. In fact, I was not sure whether I could even touch upon the experience by answering at length, and that at the risk of being the 'well-travelled bore'. But the worst fear of all, would I, in an irritable weary state, suffering from lack of sleep and the time change, mumble an abrupt answer that would not do justice to a trip to Barry Island. If I was to succumb to the latter reply, then I only hoped that my friends would put it down to 'jet-lag', as this excuse perfectly accepts the blame for all inadequacies following long journeys.

Well the questions have now mostly been answered, and my replies were as inadequate as I feared. The enquiries most easily satisfied were those interested in the table tennis. For on this subject I was only too willing to expound on the success of our team (we won all of our eight matches, and gained promotion to the second category), and also on the eclipse of the Chinese (who surprisingly failed to win any men's titles). This was relatively easy to discuss because I shared with these friends a common frame of reference, that being table tennis, but to those who wished to know of North Korea. I had no basis for explanation or comparison, and found this task as difficult as it had been to talk of Britain to the Koreans. This problem arises from the fact that so few Westerners are allowed to visit Korea, and even fewer Koreans are permitted to leave. In addition there is practically no interchange of news and ideas between our countries.

My own previous knowledge of Korea was confined to the medical exploits of Hawkeve, Radar, Clinger, Hotlips, etc., of the 4077th M.A.S.H. regiment — and I also knew that the late John Wayne had defeated the communist revolutionaries virtually single-handed during the 1950's. But I was unaware of the existing lack of communication until we were informed that there was no Korean Embassy in Britain, and the nearest place to obtain a visa was Switzerland. Hence, our initial flight was a brief hop to Geneva where we spent a relaxing day and night before setting off on the real thing early next morning.

At the airport we were confronted with the sight of a sorrowful South Korean team and officials who had failed to obtain visas, and were therefore barred from playing in the world championships. (How can we still call them that?). The incident moved me considerably. Every player with whom I spoke was sympathetic and appalled. The moment cried out for a great orator to persuade the players of the numerous countries to take immediate action. Solidarity then must have forced the North Koreans to rethink. Some officials ignorantly turned their backs on their South Korean counterparts, and refused to even discuss the situation. But who am I to criticise? I did nothing, and my presumptuous wisdom is considerably aided by hindsight.

Shameful visa holders moved through the usual security checks and screening, without too many hitches. This was followed by a further identification of baggage on leaving the departure lounge, and this is also becoming the norm these days. However, when about to board the plane everyone was presented with their luggage yet again, and the plane's captain, who wore a Biggles-type tacket, demanded we search it once more. He added "This was not a usual day" "Something has happened . . . Something has been found!" All very dramatic, and just the sort of reassurances the nervous fliers needed.

When eventually airborne, the flight passed uneventfully, that is, if one is entitled to describe an 8.000 mile journey which consumes almost a day of one's life, as being uneventful. Refuelling stops were made at Moscow, Novosivarski (New Siberia) and Irkutsk (Eastern Siberia). The capital's airport offered free literature, in English, by a host of authors who happened to be either Lenin or Marx, Novosivarski provided us with sub-zero temperatures and the most revolting, smelly toilets in the world; whilst Irkutsk completed a sequence where by each place was more bleak and delapidated than the last.

SHATTERED

On reaching Pyongyang we passed through the welcoming formalities in a numb, shattered state, but our rapidly closing eyes were soon opened wide. Wasn't this the capital city, but where was the traffic? There was not an item of litter to be seen anywhere! Were those people really collecting the dust from the street? The children wore identical uniforms. The men, too, wore exactly the same suits. The women's dresses varied only in the materials, the style was the same. Huge posters proclaimed "Welcome" and "Friendship" (To South Korea also?). The children waved and smiled infectiously, with well-rehearsed spontanaity.

Whilst our eyes were working overtime, our ears were doing likewise. One of our two guides Mr. Chu Jung pitied us because we did not know of the "wise guidance and lofty virtues of the great leader Kim II Sung". He, the president of North Korea for the past thirty or so years, was attributed with everything that was good about their country. It was Kim II Sung, the greatest man in the world who presented Mr. Chu with his shoes socks and tie. (All students and school children were provided with free clothing from the state, but it was considered a personal gift from the great man). It was the respected and beloved leader who was solely responsible for their 11 year compulsory education system and free medical service (When we casually mentioned that Britons were also able to en'oy such privileges, they smiled in disbelief and politely said that this was not quite true!).

It was the great president who had built their magnificent theatres, stadiums and palaces of culture, for the people to enjoy. It was the same Kim II Sung who as a rebel leader in the hills, had fought the "Japanese imperialists" during their occupation of Korea, and it was that man again who revived the country after they had "suffered severe damages by the U.S. imperialist

aggressors cruel bombing raids during the Fatherland Liberation War". Kim Il Sung alone had devised their Juche communism (Any resemblance to the works of Lenin and Marx is purely coincidental).

But do not get the idea that the president is concerned only with the big time. All sorts of tear-jerking tales are attributed to his good nature, and his concern for the well being of his people, and particularly the children. His supreme knowledge encompasses all fields, and he travels the country to give "on the spot guidance" to rice planters and factory workers. He is even said to have spotted the young Pak Yung Sun, and predicted that she would become world table tennis champion, and therefore supplied her with equipment and all she needed to fulfil this aim.

A measure of the esteem in which the beloved leader is held may be gained from the fact that every man, woman and child in the country sports a badge embossed with his head, and every room in every building contains at least one photograph of him.

AMAZEMENT

Our first few days were spent in astonished amazement at the naive adulation of the comrade president. It seemed incredible that our guides could seriously expect us to accept all that we were told, as they obviously did. And the guides were mostly students — who are usually regarded as the most sceptical section of the community. So blind was the devotion that one could easily adopt a sarcastic tone when discussing him, and it was never spotted.

In defence of Mr. Kim Il Sung it must be said that he has achieved wonders in putting his country back on its feet after it apparently stood in ruins a quarter of a century ago. There is no sign of poverty anywhere in fact the people looked particularly healthy. The city of Pyongyang has almost entirely been rebuilt, and it is by far the cleanest city I have ever visited. The streets were broad and empty (practically no one owns a car and it was possible to hold a conversation in the middle of the busiest road in the 'rush hour'). The special buildings, museums, theatres etc., were magnificently designed and decorated, but the flats and shops were monotonously the same.

Obviously the only people we really got close to were our guides Although they all tended to discuss the same topics and spout the same old political cliches this did not hide their individuality. For instance, the two associated with the Welsh team. Mr. Chu and Mr Kim were very different. The former pushed ideals and beliefs in a most serious manner on every conceivable occasion whilst the latter said very little unless asked. Mr Kim often saw the humorous side of things and was very good company. However Mr. Kim could never be described as a dissident or a non believer, for when I suggested that the hostilities during the Korea y U.S.A. match were far too extreme and had no place in sport he gave me a twenty minute monologue without pausing for breath on the atrocities of the Americans during the war.

Incidentally, during the Korean game with the USA, we found ourselves supporting the Americans as a small gesture to even things up a little, and one official tried to remove us from our seats.

The English of the guides was of a very high standard, especially when one considers that they have never left their country and have only been taught by Koreans. Sometimes they used incredible words and phrases which although correct made one smile. On one occasion Mr. Kim arrived at the stadium soaking wet and exclaimed "It's raining cats and dogs outside!" Another time one of our number was suffering from an anti-social complaint after consuming an ample portion of curry the previous evening, and Mr. Kim enquired "Who made a fart?"

Despite the fact that they were students

of English the guides knowledge of Britain was limited and rather confused. Mr. Chu was under the impression that our respected and beloved leader was someone called Elizabeth. Another guide wished to know if it was true that 1 in 5 of all British men were homosexual. One of the Scottish players was quick to point out that this statistic only applied to Welshmen.

The weather whilst we were there was hot and humid by our standards, but considered to be spring-like by the locals. (We did have a few days of continuous rain). Because of the heat, training and practicing were very difficult at first but not too bad after a few days. Matches were always played in stifling heat mainly because of the vast number of spectators. There was often a capacity 21,000 and there never seemed to be less than 10,000. It should be added, however, that a great percentage of these were on a nationalistic ego trip, rather than genuinely interested in the table tennis. This was very evident when half the crowd left the stadium when the Koreans were defeated in the women's team final, although the blue ribbon event, the men's team final, was still in progress.

COMPARISON

I heard more than one player make a comparison between these championships and the 1936 Berlin Olympics. Another similarity to Hitler's pre-war Germany was the military-styled youth movement to which all the children apparently belonged. The youngsters always marched when mobile in groups and sang patriotic songs. All the children were taught to drive at school (although they are never likely to own a car), and even the youngest girls learned such things as semaphore and morse code.

During our stay we were invited, by the courtesy of Kim Il Sung, to attend numerous functions "for our enjoyment, free of charge". There were concerts galore, an opera, a circus, and various visits to such places as pleasure parks and war museums. The theatres were truly magnificent, and the standard of music and dance very high. The enjoyment of these items was greatly enhanced by the fact that we did not understand the lyrics. If one followed the translations, which were superimposed on a screen alongside the stage, then one became aware of the fact that every song was either honouring Kim Il Sung, glorifying the country, praising Juche communism or pressing for the reunification of Korea.

One three hour opera "Song of Paradise" was full of fine music and fantastic scene changes, but contained a plot which could have been condensed into a 20 second story, and it should qualify for the Guinness Book of Records as the writer managed to make some sort of political reference in every line.

May Day was a national holiday, and was also a rest day as far as table tennis was concerned. In the evening an estimated 100,000 people gathered in Kim II Sung Square for national dancing. This was virtually the entire population of Pyongyang. Many of the visiting competitors, myself included, were enticed to 'join in', and I was more than grateful that my friends at home were unable to see me, as I may have had great difficulty convincing them of my masculinity after adopting some of the dance poses.

The visit to the Pyongyang national circus was interesting and enjoyable, and very different to the traditional British circus. There were no animals, but plenty of unusual acrobatic and trapeze-type acts. Some of the balancing seemed to defy the laws of gravity as we know them. I momentarily became a converted circus-hater.

An incident in the theatre which proceeded the circus was typical of the way in which we were treated during our visit. One coach full of competitors arrived, after all the seats had been taken. Without anything apparently being said, a whole block of Koreans stood up and silently left, so as to

vacate their seats. Personally I found this extreme courtesy a little embarrassing when entering a shop and finding everyone standing aside to allow me to be served first.

CELEBRATIONS

The farewell celebrations on the final night were a suitable finale. The banquet was followed by dancing in Kim II Sung Square once again, but this time not so many participants — only about 60,000. As we arrived the entire assembly stood still in an eerie silence which lasted quite some time, until all of us were settled into position. We were again invited to join in, but this time I resisted the temptation although my feet were tapping to the songs which had catchly little titles like, "My country is tax free", "Let's send rice to the People's revolutionary army", "Infinite is the Raftsman's Honour" and "A Happy Country with People as its Master".

After an hour we walked over to the banks of the river, to the applause and waves of the Koreans. This boost to the ego was diluted by a feeling of awkward self-consciousness. We felt as though we were on a royal walk about. On the banks of the river we joined the missing 40,000 Pyongyang inhabitants to watch a display of illuminated boats and barges, and another open air concert.

By the time these final celebrations were completed I doubt if there was a player in the championships who was not ready for home. Not that I regretted one moment of my stay, for the visit was worthy of the well worn cliche — "an experience of a lifetime".

If, as has been suggested, the table tennis was a bait to lure the world's press into Korea and hence gain some free publicity for a little publicised nation, then I'm not sure the strategy worked. That is unless one subscribes to the Hollywood notion that "all publicity is good publicity", for I personally heard far more cynical than complimentary comments. I don't think that we foreigners could claim any successes either, for I know of no Korean who was converted to decadent western ways. In fact, I think we may have inadvertently helped to consolidate many of our guides views. I recall one of Mr. Chu's remarks "Look at that road. I walk along the street and my mind is in the clouds although my feet are on the ground. This place is so beautiful I could be in paradise".

PLAYERS' CONTRACTS

E.T.T.A. Rule 30.6.2 provides that no affiliated player may enter into a contract in return for capitalising his skill at table tennis without the sanction of the National Council.

The object of this Rule is to avoid a player getting committed to a contract which may infringe the International or E.T.T.A. regulations, or may make a player unavailable for important events without this being realised when the contract is signed. There have been one or two instances recently where players have not realised that this rule existed, so this reminder about it is being published. The E.T.T.A. has also written to a number of major suppliers seeking their co-operation in something which is believed to be in everyone's best interests. This is what the letter said:

It has for some time past been the practice for major sports goods companies like yourselves to take well-known players under contract, and nowadays this often extends to promising youngsters too. As I think you know, the English Table Tennis Association welcomes such arrangements by responsible companies, which can contribute to increased opportunities for main-

taining and raising the levels of playing skill.

However, there have been instances where such contracts have been entered into without the player first securing the approval required under our Rules. The purpose of this letter is to seek your co-operation in drawing the player's attention to the need to secure such approval before your company enters into any such contract with a player which it might in future contemplate.

We believe it to be in everybody's interests, and particularly those of the junior player who may lack any experience of business affairs, that we should check in advance the actual terms of any such contract related to table tennis which a player may contemplate, in order to ensure, for example, that it contains nothing which might bring the player into conflict with E.T.T.A. or International Table Tennis Federation regulations, or which might restrict the player's freedom to represent England when selected, or his ability to participate in important training, etc. activities.

May I ask if you will ensure in future that any English player you sign under contract first has E.T.T.A. sanction. Such sanction will always be in writing on official note-paper, and be signed by or on behalf of the General Secretary. In seeking permission, the player needs to supply a copy of the intended contract, which will be retained for reference.

We shall be very grateful for your help in this way. In a further effort to avoid future possibility of our players unwittingly breaking the rule about contracts, a copy of this letter will be published in the official magazine.





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

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APOLOGY AT THE A.G.M.

Mike Greatrex (Hon. Treasurer) opened his report at the E.T.T.A. A.G.M., held at the Bonnington Hotel, London on July 14/79, by Bonnington Hotel, London on July 14/79, by apologising for the lack of properly audited accounts. He had failed to appreciate the considerable amount of work involved in producing these accounts, and had not started preparatory work early enough. An audited set of accounts would be circulated as soon as possible. He invited any questions on the basis of the interim financial state-ment he had provided. The Chairman (Tom Blunn) thanked the meeting for its indul-gence and paid tribute to Mr. Greatrex.

Tom Blunn, vacating the chair in favour of Maurice Goldstein (President), proposed an increase in the fee structure. After putting the E.T.T.A.'s case a block vote was requested and taken resulting in 15,758 votes for to 1,678 against the Proposition which the President declared carried. The annual affiliation fees will thus become (in season 1980/81) 50p instead of 21p per team place, plus 50p for one reserve place, for each team £1.50 for each team playing in a twoa-side division, £2.00 for each team playing in a three-a-side division and so on pro rata. 25p instead of $10\frac{1}{2}$ p per team place, plus 25p for one reserve place, for each team in a Youth League, etc.

ELECTION OF PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENTS

The Chairman (Tom Blunn) proposed on behalf of the National Council that Maurice Goldstein O.B.E. be elected President for a further three year term. This was agreed with acclamation, Mr. Goldstein indicating his pleasure to be able to give continuing service to the Association.

It was further proposed by the Chairman the re-election, for a further three year term, of the following existing Vice-Presidents: Mrs. A. Jones, M.B.E., Mrs. N. Vint, Messrs. J. Carrington, W. Evans, C. Jaques, P. Marks, A. G. Steggall, D. N. Tyler and E. Worsley. Agreed.

The Chairman then proposed, also on behalf of the National Council the election, for a first term of three years, the following new Vice-Presidents: Mrs. Elsie Carrington, Messrs. L. Constable, I. Crickmer, P. Smith and M. Shaffner. Agreed.

The Ivor Montagu Award went to Tony Ross of Yorkshire and the Leslie Forrest Award to Alan Shepherd of Essex. The President then presented the Malcolm Scott Award to Mr. E. G. White paying tribute to his long service and particularly to the additional work he had undertaken over the last two years as Vice-Chairman Administration. The presentation was greeted with acclaim, and George White expressed his gratitude.

NORWICH UNION MASTERS

SURBEK SUPREMO AT MILTON KEYNES

Yugoslavia's Dragutin Surbek, at 33 the oldest player in the tournament, won the £5,250 Norwich Union Masters title after a surprisingly one-sided 21-12, 21-16 victory over Li Zhenshi of the People's Republic of China at Milton Keynes on May 31.

In a class field of 16 international players, but lacking the new world champion Seiji Ono of Japan, England's sole representative, Desmond Douglas, was well below his best winning only two of his seven Group "B" matches — the 16 were initially split into two groups of 8 — and finishing no higher than No. 11 with a final victory over Jochen Leiss of Federal Germany.

Surbek, despite losing two matches in Group "A", to Tibor Klampar of Hungary and Shi Zhihao of China, succeeded in winning a place in the quarter-finals at which stage he disposed of Tibor Kreisz (Hungary) going on to account for Shi Zhihao, when the pair met for a second time in the semis and, in the final, Li Zhenshi who had eliminated Klampar in the penultimate round.




"I should like to take this opportunity to compliment you and your coaching staff on the superbly organised and controlled event held at the University last weekend.

PING COMMENTARY

IT'S NOT JUST A QUESTION OF **GEOGRAPHY**

My former enemy now close (table tennis) friend Tony Ross threw up the old chestnut at the E.T.T.A. A.G.M. concerning the choice of mainly southern venues for the major tournaments.

This is a question that interests me greatly for several reasons, not the least of which is that when I submit a list of major forthcoming events to "The Daily Telegraph" at the start of a season most of them are approved except those in the North.

When an event comes up in the Lancashire or Yorkshire areas I am usually told that the happening will be covered from the Manchester office of the "Telegraph". The results are that coverage, usually restricted, is given by a journalist outside table tennis. There is also the important factor that as I live in the South the cost of sending me from one end of the country to the other escalates daily and as we all know national daily newspapers, indeed all newspapers. have to watch their expenses like a cat watches a mouse.

THE PORTS

So it is all a question of expense and in particular the cost to the E.T.T.A. and the sponsors of transporting foreign teams from both the channel seaports and the two London airports.

We now have three major events, the Norwich Union International Championships the Norwich Union English Championships and now the Rock International Under-21 championships, all of which revolve around a vital factor — getting the foreign parties to and from the venue to the sea or airports, quickly and without too much expense.

I have watched the E.T.T.A. tournament officials working for many frustrating hours at the venues, struggling with the transport problems and the whims of the foreign team captains. In fact, some officials spend almost all their time on the important task of keeping the visitors happy.

Professional and amateur officials alike have to work day and night on and off the telephone making sympathetic noises to hotel managers, mini-bus drivers, players, coaches, etc. All this when the arrival and departure points are relatively close. I am well aware of the counter argument, that

there are airports and seaports in the top half of the country, but there is no doubt at all that air and sea services are better and more frequent and indeed less expensive in the South.

So, geographically and economically, everything is weighted heavily against the North, despite the tremendous efforts put in by Alan Ransome and his army of helpers in the Cleveland area when an event is held

Last, but not least there is the question of hotels. The bulk of the hotels in England big enough to take large parties and geared to take bookings for odd days are south of a line from Birmingham to The Wash.

Few of us realise the amount of negotiation that has to go into arranging block hotel bookings at reduced prices even in the South.

"All roads lead to London" is a well-worn catch-phrase. I can see little hope of Tony Ross realising his ambition of an equal share of tournaments between North and South, whilst London remains in the South! I doubt if Tony can even attempt to explode the case I have outlined but I shall look with interest at his attempt to enlarge constructively on proposals to shift some of the action into cooler northern parts — mean-while. I shall **not** be thinking of buying warmer winter clothing this coming season, or even the season after!

Mentioning that course leads me to the visit to Shrewsbury of Nicky Jarvis who, as guest of Shrewsbury Association Chairman Derek Ruddock, ran a week end coaching course for our Juniors at Condover Hall in the summer. I understand he is to come again soon, once more at Derek's invitation, this time to run a short course at Pontesbury.

MAPPIN STANDS DOWN

At the County A.G.M. held at St. Ivo Rec. Centre in mid-summer Mappin Webb who had held the office of Chairman since 1951 resigned his post. In the last 28 years Mappin, now 71, has played a great part in making this County rightly proud of its administrative side.

Mappin started playing at the age of 17, back in the roaring twenties, playing his early competitive matches in the London Business Houses League, before moving to Hunts in 1941. He first became chairman of the St. Neots League in the late forties, serving that league as first chairman, then as committee member until 1974. The St. Neots and Hunts Central Leagues joined Neots and Hunts Central Leagues joined forces to form the County Association in 1948, Mappin taking over as chairman in 1951. If a 28-year record as chairman is not enough he also became County non-playing captain no less than 12 times and County tournament secretary 15 times.

He served on the management committee of the Fenland League during the 1950's and in 1961, with Henry Fox, inaugurated the South East Midland League. He served this south East Midland League. He served this league with great enthusiasm from 1961 to 1978 as chairman, whilst Henry served throughout this period as secretary. His many other activities included serving on the Hunts Council of Sport, Huntingdon Town Council of Sport, coached at no less than 51 Youth Clubs within the old Hunts boundaries. Mappin obtained a Diploma 1-Star coaching award Star coaching award.

Mappin still plays regularly in the Hunts Central and St. Neots leagues and can often be seen giving players up to sixty years his junior a good deal of trouble. At the A.G.M. Mappin, who will shortly be leaving for a holiday in Australia, was made President of the County Association. On behalf of the County may I thank Mappin for his tireless efforts to this association. efforts to this association.

Another county stalwart, Cliff Olver, takes over the Chairman's position. Many thanks are also due to Pip Baker who resigned as Secretary of the Assn. after two years' hard work. This position will now be filled by Dave Morley.

STOCKPORT'S GOLDEN YEAR

It was in 1930 that a number of clubs who had been playing table tennis on a friendly basis decided to form the Stockport and District Table Tennis League. Secretary Frank Walker remembers the teams as Stockport Sunday School, St. Thomas's, St. Augustine's, Gatley Y.M.C.A.. Our Lady's, Alexandra and St. Andrew's. The last three clubs are still members of the league.

The years before the war were years of growth and consolidation and perhaps the most memorable events being the two exhibitions given by the Barna circus in 1934 and 1939. Herbert Airey, the local champion, played the great Victor Barna to lose -19, -21 before a full house at the Centenary Hall. This event raised the magnificent sum of £100 and must surely have ensured the financial future of the league.

POST WAR

The war interrupted play with so many young people away from home but friendly matches continued. However it was left to

Mr. Reg Stabbs to reform the league when, as General Secretary, he picked up the threads left by some 6 years of war. Under the chairmanship of John Bradshaw table tennis was again on the move in Stockport.

By this time the league had grown to 4 divisions but it was still the pre-war players who won the individual honours with Mrs. Stella Bown taking the women's singles in that first year (only a few months after the birth of her son Louis) and Herbert Airey taking the men's singles.

1948 saw the first breakthrough of the younger players when Derek Schofield won his first singles title beat G. Harry Jones who had won the title in 1938 and was keen to regain it. But this was not to be for the old order was changing with names like Schofield, Paul Stannard, Peter Heath, Lou Moran, Eric Johnson, Geoff Lomas and, later, George Temperton, Colin King, Alan Crossley and Bill Orme. A new era had been born in Stockport — a vital new era where crowds of up to 140 filled the Fairey Aviation Social Club on Saturday evenings to watch and enjoy inter-league matches (Yes, this was before TV had its lethal effect on attendances).

In 1952 Stockport won the second division of the Lancashire and Cheshire League to gain promotion to Division 1 but it was not until 1964 that they first won the first division title with a team of Derek Schofield, Roger Hampson and Alan Crossley. Currently we have again won the second division title under the captaincy of Roger Hampson and look forward to the first division battles.

The ladies too have played their part, Lorna Antrobus (nee Bown) being awarded her junior international badge to be followed by Diana Johnson (nee Wright). Diana now leads our women's team who have just won the Lancs & Cheshire first division title for the third consecutive year along with captain Doreen Schofield and Debbie Coulthard, this last season, and with Janet Carr prior to.

Truly a remarkable feat considering the strength of the neighbouring Manchester side

1st EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR PARAPLEGICS

Last year the International Stoke Mandeville Games Federation gave their blessing for European championships for Table Tennis to be staged on a bi-annual basis, and at the same time the British Paraplegic Sports Society made a successful bid to stage the very first championships, which will be held at the Stoke Mandeville Sports Stadium on the week-end of 6th and 7th October, 1979.

This will be the first time that the Championships have been staged outside the International games, which embrace all the games that are played from a wheelchair, and they will include team events (on the Saturday) as well as individual events for all the different classes, plus an 'open' event for both men and women. There are six classes, which will mean 12 team event competitions, and with the two open events, 14 individual competitions, which will make for a very busy week-end indeed.

Invitations to the 16 European member nations of the Federation were extended way back in March, of which 13 will be sending teams, with a total of over 100 wheelchair competitors. All the strong member nations of Europe, including Holland, West Germany, Switzerland. Sweden, Belgium and France, with, of course, ourselves, competing as Great Britain, will be looking for the medals, and some exciting play is promised.

Play will be on 14 Butterfly tables and will start at 9.00 a.m. each day. Len Pilditch and "Stew" Dane are Hon. Referees for the Tournament and a group of E.T.T.A. umpires, organised by Doreen Stannard, will be staying the week-end to see that things run smoothly.

It is hoped that a film unit from the B.B.C. will be there on the Sunday to film some of the play for inclusion in Sportswide in the Nationwide programme on the following Friday, Oct. 12. Look in and see some of the top players in Europe performing.

Roy Shepherd, Professor of Applied Physiology at the University of Toronto wrote in a recent publication "The Fit Athlete": "Unfortunately, very few coaches in the Western World have professional training. Some have made serious personal attempts to master the elements of nutrition, physiology and psychology, but others rely exclusively on their childhood experience of a given sport, attempting to cloak ignorance with a blustering authoritarianism".

There are some people who look a little deeper into coaching than "easily understood language together with action photographs". Books on which abound by Carrington, Leach, Myers, Sklorz and Tamasu Co.

Table tennis is starting to emerge from the hit and hope era, Donald is trying to dispell the rationale that "coaching is an art" an inaccurate attempt to conceal ignorance in the scientific aspects of sport. Keep up the good work!





UNDER-21 INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

LION'S SHARE FOR KENNY AND MELODY

True equality of the sexes was achieved at the Black Lion Sports Centre, Gillingham, Kent over the weekend of Sept. 8/9 when the overall prize fund of £1,800 was split down the middle between the men and the women in the four individual events.

These, together with team events involving players from 9 countries, made up the Rock U-21 International Championships sponsored by Rock Motor Parts Limited whose Managing Director, Julius Darham, took more than a passing interest in how affairs were run.

affairs were run.

John Wright, that most admirable of Referees, came up with a novel format for the team events — given prominence elsewhere — and this met with a unanimous vote of approval from all concerned.

Denmark, represented by Johnny Hansen and Palle Rud, won the men's team event, with England II beating England I into second place for the women's title the honours going to Angela Mitchell and Suzanne Hunt and the blushes to Karen Witt and Melody Ludi.

England men's first team of Paul Day and Douggie Johnson could finish no higher than third, behind Denmark and Poland, with England II (Kenny Jackson and Andrew Bellingham) coming in fourth.

Both Jackson, later to win the men's singles, and Johnson had returns of 9 wins against 1 loss, the former to Hansen and the latter to Leszek Kucharski of Poland. But Angela Mitchell was the revelation with 8 wins in a row including the scalp of Karen Witt, the England No. 2 whose only loss this was in the team event.

But who would have plumped for Melody Ludi winning the women's singles, and the £350 that went with the title, after losing to Suzanne Hunt, Jolanta Szatko (Poland), Brigitte Ringhofer (Austria) and the defensive Barbara Lippens (Belgium) in the team event?

Angela Mitchell came out top in the individual placings for Group "A" with Karen Witt runner-up. Suzanne Hunt and Melody finished third and fourth in Group "B" behind Miss Lippens and Miss Szatko, the Belgian losing to the Pole, who lost to Miss Hunt.


Hansen and Jackson shared top place in the men's "A" Group, the former beating Jackson but losing to Poland's Andrzej Grubba. Three players shared top place in Group "B", each with 9 wins and 1 loss, Johnson to Kucharski, Kucharski to Rud, and Rud to Johnson.

AUTHORITY

Having thus established their authority in the round robins it came as no real surprise when Jackson and Hansen resumed battle in the final of the men's singles with the Essex player reversing the team event result against the Dane, much to his credit after losing the middle game of three.

But the murmers of the spectators rose a notch or two, when Berkshire's David Barr, in Rd. 2, ousted the top seed. Grubba, and went on to account for Leon Smith (Essex) and Wolfgang Schober of Austria to reach the quarters where he fell to Jackson.

Warwickshire's Johnson, winner of the Rock U-21 English title, took out the No. 3 seed, Rud, but fell, at 19 in the third, to Jackson in the semis.

In the lower half of the draw three English players had seeded positions the foremost being Day, at No. 5, but the Cambs international after a sparkling 13, 8 destruction of Graham Sandley, seeded No. 9, fell to Hansen in a tense 3-gamer. Colin Wilson, the other seeded Englishman, had a disappointing first round loss to Scotland's Keith Rodger who also beat Joey Kennedy of Kent before falling to Jjberd Meijer of the Netherlands.

Meantime Hansen, the defeated finalist, was crashing his way through at the expense of A. W. Dodd (Kent), M. Brown (Warwicks) and Ron Spanje (Netherlands) prior to his meeting with Day. Kucharski took out Bellinger, 12 and 11, and David Wells (Middlesex) in the quarters before losing to Hansen in the sems.

In the counterpart women's event the demise of the top seed occurred in the quarters when Karen Witt fell, 19 in the 3rd, to Barbara Lippens. Miss Lippens' compatriot, Marie-France Germiat, seeded No. 2, was a non-starter her place being taken by Carine Verachtert who was dismissed by Scotland's Carole Dalrymple.

The middle order seeds. Jolanta Szatko and Brigitte Gropper, the latter from Austria, were taken out, respectively, by Angela Mitchell and Suzanne Hunt who, in turn, fell to Melody Ludi and Miss-Lippens in the semis. It was thought that patience in abundance would be needed by Miss Ludi in the final but no such tactics were forthcoming by the Bradford girl who started off with a bang to destroy the Belgian girl 9 in the first and, more relenting, 18 in the second.

Miss Ludi, partnered by Miss Witt, never had it easy in the final of the women's doubles being at pains to dispose of Mandy Reeves and Sally Midgley. Not so the Poles Grubba and Kucharski in the final of the men's doubles against Hansen and Rud.

Little doubt that the Black Lion Centre fulfilled all expectations as a venue although suffering from an inadequate public address system, a common fault with modern sports centres. Publicity, from a national aspect, also called for a black mark but tournaments finishing on a Sunday evening stand no chance of being covered by the nationals but there is a stronger case in the sponsor's favour in respect of pretournament coverage the lack of which justified the complaints of Mr. Darham. Perhaps this coverage may help to placate.

SERVICE JUDGE

Passed at the Congress of the 1979 World Championships, it was decided that there would be a Service Judge operating opposite the Umpire. The following procedure will be adopted:-

- 1. A service judge (who may also be the edge ball judge or net cord judge) will sit facing the umpire, at the opposite side of the table.
- 2. When the service judge can see the player's service action and he considers it to be illegal he will signal to the umpire by raising his right hand to the height of his shoulder. (In making the signal, the service judge should be careful not to disturb unduly the concentration of the players).
- 3. If the service judge makes such a signal and the umpire is unable to see the service action, or if the umpire is able to see the service action and he considers it to be illegal, the umpire will call "Fault" and award a point against the server.
- 4. If the service judge makes such a signal but the umpire is able to see that the service is legal, the umpire will disregard the signal.
- 5. If the service judge is unable to see the service action, he will make no signal.






MIDLAND LEAGUE NOTES
