A special four man committee has been set up to organise dope testing at the 41st World Championships which will be headed by Dr Jean-Francois. The rest of his team will be De Knut Havag (Norway) Dr.Michael Scott (USA) and Dr Stan Szatkowski (Canada).

Remember also that dope testing can be taken at any of our major domestic events without warning. If you have any doubts contact ETTA offices in Hast-ings who will be pleased to help.

OAKHAMPTON Table Tennis Club is one of the ETTA's newer clubs. They started out just over one year ago when eight people turned up to the first meeting and a committee was formed with Ken Clarke taking on the job of trea-surer.

Ken also signed on for the club's second team and despite having no competitive experience he finished the season with a 50% average. Not bad for a 77 year old!

Wally Joins ETTA

WALLY Smith an unregistered coach for many years has finally joined the ETTA Coaching Scheme. The popular Newbury man has always gone his own way introducing youngsters to the sport he loved and seeing several of them reach international standard.

Wally, of course is the father of Mandy Sainsbury, a Commonwealth silver medallist and top England player, so has close links with the ETTA.

To get his official qualification he attended a coaching scheme in Newbury and passed with flying colours. Run by the local league for school teachers, sports centre staff and league players, it was a great success with Chris Baker, who plays for local side GKB Oaks, making the grade also.

Also busy on the day was Ken Muir in his capacity as ETTA Southern Region Coach who directed the course helped by Ian Langley, a diploma coach.

DAVID Hannah, 29, from Dorking and ten times Scottish champion has been banned for eighteen months commen-cing July 1 1990 by the Scottish Table Tennis Association.



Awards

TWO teenage table tennis stars were awarded a surprise cash bonus by Leeds Permanent Building Society for their outstanding performances at the Leeds Junior English Open.

Sally Marling (Hull) and Nicola Deaton (Chesterfield) each received £250 from an incentive fund provided by the Leeds as part of their investment in the development of the sport at junior level.

Sally was nominated for winning the cadet (U14) girls singles title in which she beat Nicola in the final. The title was Sally's second in as many weeks following her victory at the Leeds Youth Cup final in London.

Nicola not only reached the cadet final but also played outstanding table tennis in the junior (U17) section beating No.2 Petra Fichtinger of Austria in the first round and reaching the quarter finals where she was beaten by the eventual winner, Kim Boon Sik of South Korea.

President of the Welsh Association, Roy Evans and his wife Nancy have been awarded life presidencies in recognition of over 60 years each in the service of Welsh table tennis, as international players and as leading administrators.

Master Prean

CARL Prean, winner at the Daily Telegraph Masters, has qualified to play in the Stiga World Grand Prix Masters to be held in January at a venue yet to be named. His place was reserved after finishing in the top ten places (7th) of leading points scorers.

Fab Four

NICKY Mason, John Holland, Junior Stoddard and Tim Shepherd recently gave exhibitions of table tennis to over 1000 schoolchildren throughout Nottinghamshire. The four players visited four schools with the end result that over 100 youngsters were invited to take place on nine more advanced courses throughout the county.

Grove Deal

NATIONAL champions Grove have signed a sponsorship deal with National Fuel Distributors. It should help the club make ends meet when they set out on their journey across the sea for the European Club Championship.

All Change

EXPERIMENTS continue into the use of special floors, blue topped tables, orange/yellow balls, larger courts, ballboys etc. Expect more positive news on this front before too long.

Crystal Clear

THE English National Championships will be played at Stoubridge on 9/10 March 1991. The venue will be the new Crystal Leisure Centre which was so successfully used for the Womens British League weekend.

LOOKING GOOD

SOME have said that this will be a quiet season, one of consolidation rather than the breathtaking progress of the last few years. I do not agree.

The ending of the Leeds sponsorship was, of course, a blow.

They were magnificent and highly professional supporters of our sport. Sponsorship, however, is not, as some still think, a boost to the profits and loss accounts. It enabled us to do far more than would otherwise have been possible and to do it much better.

In 1990/91 there will be no major tours, which enable us to bring top class table tennis to areas which had not seen this for years, sometimes not at all. We still look for a sponsor for the English Open in 1992.

However, our first TV event was sponsored by the Daily Telegraph and the Masters, played in Gateshead on August 11 proved an enthralling event which achieved 75 minutes or so of TV exposure on the excellent BBC Grandstand and despite the competition of a high scoring test match. I recall the days when we got odd 10 minute spells between horse racing.

It proved a magnificent tournament with some added topical interest in the former Chinese national player Chen Xinhua, whose controversial selection for England certainly achieved newspaper space seldom rivalled by events on the table.

I watched it all on the box on this occasion and was delighted by what I saw, noting the ever improving presentation of the sport to the millions at home on their own screens. The BBC headed by Grandstand Editor John Philips did a great job for the sport and the viewers.

Many who were wondering whether to play league table tennis this season may have found the decision easier as a result of what they saw. Our sport looked good.

Form

The probable absence of overseas superstars nevertheless leaves us with an unusually interesting season. We were, as you know, relegated from the European Super League and will have to battle for promotion again. The format adopted makes for some interesting matches as the league progresses, ending with the semi-finals and finals on a home and away basis.



As the new season gets underway John Prean looks at the good and bad, defects there are some hopeful signs and that good news could be just around the corner.

If the form-book prevails, these may result in contests against Bulgaria and Hungary — difficult matches, as both have ladies of world calibre, a reigning and past European champion and men not quite as good, but still hard to beat on most days.

Our doubles problems still have to be resolved and two defeats here leave a virtually impossible task in the singles. Promotion will therefore again be very hard. I hope we make it and then keep our place at the top. It was almost our only setback last season, but a very nasty and major one.

A new Women's League begins in Europe and we are able to start right at the top in the Premier Division. We must try to stay there. Again, the division will function in groups of 4, leading to semi-finals and a final, also place matches and relegation, if things go wrong!

I see it is an opportunity to develop and boost the ladies' game, to achieve more media interest and to establish more clearly figures at the top whom the youngsters will look for inspiration and that the whole process will attract more girls into the sport. The work at the top will require equally energetic efforts at the grass roots.

It will be a season in which greater efforts than ever before will be made at local level and often our £100,000 development fund will provide an incentive and real cash help. Leagues all over the country have begun development initiatives, mainly coaching of the young and very young, leading to youth leagues and more young boys and girls coming into the game.

Some schemes are directed at providing more playing space, as much has disappeared all over the country. All schemes are dedicated to attracting more members.

There has been much discussion of this topic, which is a good thing. It has not always been noted that my management team has recognised the problem from the beginning and has worked to overcome it.

There are, as President Ogimura would say, both good news and bad news. The latter may consist of the loss of so much playing space and the reluctance of so many members to pay what today pass as economic rents. A league secretary told me on a recent visit to Lancashire that she handled a couple of dozen enquiries each year when she could not readily direct the potential new member to premises where table tennis was regularly played or where league places could be offered. However, it indicates that interest is being generated and our office handles many enquiries which we are able to pass to local associations.

The membership losses have, in broad terms, in fact been halved to somewhere from 3% to 4% the last two seasons from 6% to 8% a few years earlier. It is paradoxical, and perhaps a little more, that so much fuss is made about the 4% when so little was made about the 8%! It is not untypical of the sport and you can make of it what you will.

Further bad news may be found in the diminishing numbers of young people, mainly the 16 to 19 age groups of whom fewer are appearing as a result of earlier birth rate patterns.

Good News

The worst news must be the way we compile our membership statistics, entirely on the basis of players in local leagues. That is undoubtedly a big, and perhaps still our most important activity, but it is not and never was our only one. Much depression, both real and imagined, is therefore due to an incomplete scenario. However, there

may also be good news around the corner.

In our local development schemes, in which I was very involved during the summer, I was pleasantly surprised by the number of young and very young who came, who already had quite fair skills. When I asked them where they had learned the game, they told me that they had a table at home, usually in their garage.

I see many, many people playing (often badly and with bad equipment) in sports centres and they would be happier in the more structured environment of the local club. Whenever I see tables, be it on boliday camps or on an ocean liner, they never seem to be empty. There always seem to be hordes of people wanting to play. Our cause is not all gloom. Many hopeful signs and trends can be detected.

Volunteers

The only trend I find really depressing is the one towards less and less discipline and self-discipline in the sport. This applies to activities both on and off the table. The former include what is almost hooliganism and the latter the persistent savaging of the most active workers in the sport by generally the least active.

Whilst personally it presents me with few problems, as Winston Churchill described it "to be savaged by dead sheep", it worries me profoundly to see these antics at both national and local level.

The sport relies very heavily on the work of totally unpaid volunteers, who do their job for fun. In my time as a 'critic' I took great care to be fair, positive and constructive. I cannot see the same care very often today. I see the lie, the invention, the imagination creeping into assessments rather too often. I hear too much malicious and malevolent gossip, particularly being fed to the young, who are most vulnerable.

We are part of a most wonderful sport, but some of the antics reported are making me apprehensive about the future and the most worrying aspect of all is the silence of the many good people in the sport, when clearly they should be speaking up. As history shows, evil succeeds best when good men remain silent.

MAJESTIC

MATTHEW Syed and Andrea Holt proved far too classy for the opposition, when they brushed aside all comers to take the winners crowns in their respective under 21 singles sections, of the Jarvis Sport SKITT Milton Keynes under 21 tournament, at the Bletchley Leisure Centre, writes John Wood.

Matthew Syed played with usual majestic flair, which is a joy to watch, as he overcame the challenge of John Holland in the mens singles final 23-21, 21-16.

John Holland, with superb attacking forehands, led the first leg 10-8, at the halfway stage, before going down deuce due to the sheer excellence of Syed.

The second, and deciding leg, followed a similar pattern with the match standing at 16-16, before the pressure got to Holland. He started to rush his shots, as the meticulous defence of Syed and occasional flashing forehands, broke the heart of Holland, who actually led the second leg 10-4, at one stage.

In the womens singles final, Andrea Holt proved to be the number one lady, when she crushed the aspirations of 14 year-old Sally Marling, 21-18, 21-9.

Holt's class proved too much for the talented Marling, although the young lass from Yorkshire did play well in the first leg, but her confidence drained in the second as she became unsure of her shots against Holt's combination bat.

Apart from the final, Miss Marling had a marvellous tournament, beating the No. 2 seed Julie Billington 20, -13, 15 in the Under 21's, before going on to take the under 17 girls title, when she comfortably overcame the challenge of Maria Thornley from Lancashire, 17 and 16, although Maria Thornley did have her moment of glory when she beat the No. 2 seed, Ellen Meddings, 9, -14, 15, in the semi-final.

Hero of the boys under 17 was Gareth Jones from Yorkshire, who played with a big heart to tame the tiger from Berkshire Martin Adams, beating him -13, 20, 13, in an exciting final.

Adams superior hitting took the first leg, whilst the second was a much closer affair, as the score suggests, 22-20, to Jones, who took both the deuce points.

The third and final leg was fairly even with the score standing at 15-13 to Jones, before the lad from Yorkshire let loose with backhand drives and forehand loops to take the under 17 crown.

The mens doubles title went to the scratch pairing of Michael O'Driscoll and Leigh Jeffries, who beat John Holland and Sean Gibson in an attacking match, 16, -19, 16.

Whilst the womens doubles final was a one sided affair with Andrea Holt and Julie Billington overpowering the pairing of Nicola Deaton and Ellen Meddings, 13 and 13.

Surprise of the day was John Holland's big win over Bradley Billington in the quarter-finals of the mens under 21 singles, in straight sets 10 and 19.

Holland, who has been training hard this summer, played tight and was looping off the bounce, plus he has at last found confidence in his backhand, and was hitting instead of blocking.

The prizes were presented by the Deputy Mayor and Mayoress of Milton Keynes, Bill and Geraldine Harnett and Nicky Jarvis of Jarvis Sports.

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CHANGES TO EURO LEAGUE

RISE AND FALL OF EURO/ASIA

IT had been hoped that following the French Open in Lyons (Nov 29/Dec 2) the fifth series of the Euro/Asia confrontations would take place in various European locations over the period Dec 4/11, 1990.

Regrettably the Asian Championships have proved the stumbling block these being dated Dec 5/11 in Kuala Lumpur hence the cancellations of the Euro/Asia series for this season at least.

But every cloud has a silver lining and in this respect and with due thanks to the Deutscher Tischtennis-Bund two new events, both carrying high prize money, are to be introduced into the ETTU calendar starting on January 18/20, 1991 with the European Nations Cup followed with the European Masters Cup. These tournaments will thus be the first high level prize money events, other than the Stiga Top 12, in the history of European table tennis. An amount of up to 100,000 US dollars will be at stake in each tournament — the Nations Cup for teams and the Masters Cup for individuals.

A new system of play will henceforth be operable in the European League based initially on a group system with subsequent cross-over matches leading to a final and matches in the Super and Division 1 will have 2 officials, acting alternatively as Referee and Umpire.

And a further new initiative to commence this season will be a European League for women with no less than 19 associations having made entry application. Sixteen of these have been split into two groups of eight forming Divisions 1 and 2 with three associations being put on the reserve list.

Elsewhere in this publication you will find an up-to-date calendar and fixture lists appertaining to the European League and we look forward to a Europe/Asia confrontation at the 41st World Championships to be staged in Chiba City, Japan over the period April 24/May 6, 1991. Have a good and prosperous season.

SORRY SKY

Inadvertently in my report of the 17th European Championships in Gothenburg I wrote that Skylet Andrew was taken out of the men's singles by Sandor Varga of Hungary. This was not so for Skylet beat the Hungarian -20, 14, 18, -18, 16 losing in the third round to Jean-Philippe Gatien of France who won 12, -14, 19 and 19

IN welcoming all delegates to the Congress of the ETTU in Gothenburg, Mihovil Kapetanic, the President, requested brevity from speakers when addressing the meeting having regard to the long agenda.

Congress considered and debated a number of proposals for changing the system of play within the European League and it was a majority decision to accept the proposal put forward by the ETTU's Technical Committee for divisions of 8 teams playing a first stage in two groups of 4, with two further stages of cross-over matches in two legs, home and away, in order to determine the final positions.

This system would therefore produce a final and a last match battle against relegation. The system would be mandatory for Super and First Divisions and optional for 2nd and 3rd divisions. The composition of teams and order of play would remain as before

The Congress went on to debate the proposal that there should be separate sections for men and women but it was agreed to run a separate women's league if sufficient Associations were interested in participation and a separate meeting of interested parties was subsequently convened.

An application for membership by Israel was supported by several Associations and following an address by Dr. S. Kedar, the President of the Israel Table Tennis Association, the application was approved, 33 votes in favour none against.

EURO VOTE

Delegates were invited to study the paper on a qualification procedure for ETTU events which would essentially require a longer period of residence than the two years currently required under ITTF regulations. 24 Associations voted in favour of this principle of which 16 voted that the residential period should be 6 years.

The new qualification would come into immediate effect except that any player who had already qualified for a country other than that of his birth would remain so qualified. A registration procedure would be introduced.

As it was known that the ITTF were considering amending their own qualification regulations at a Council meeting to be held in July, 1990, it was agreed to adopt the ITTF regulations, provided they were similar to the principle

adopted by the ETTU.

If not, then an Extraordinary General Meeting would be held at the time of the 1990 European Youth Championships in Austria. It was also agreed that a panel consisting of the Executive Committee plus Andre Damman would decide any questions of doubt over individual cases. Mr. Kapetanic appealed to all Associations to implement the new ETTU regulations at all

levels.

ELECTION

The President (M. Kapetanic) the Vice-President Mrs. E. Zeller-Constantinescu), the Hon. Treasurer (Henk van Dilst) and the Hon. Gen. Sec. (G.R. Yates) were all unopposed as the members of the Executive Committee. And, again, no ballot was necessary for the seven members comprising the Management Committee namely N. Bergstrom (SWE), C. Christodoulatis (GRE), A. Damman (BEL), J. Devys (FRA), J. Dachowski (POL), C. Sagrestani (ITA) and R. Sporrer (AUT).

As the addition of Israel entitled the ETTU to 7 members on the ITTF Council, a ballot was conducted which resulted as follows:Mrs. E. Zeller-Constantinescu (FRG) 27 Votes

PREAN WINS MASTERS TITLE

CARL Prean is England's best player - and that's official after the popular Isle of Wight player clinched the new Daily Telegraph Masters title at Gateshead Leisure Centre.

With BBC television lights beaming down, Carl started slowly and finished at a gallop to hold aloft the BBC Grandstand trophy and to earn the cheers of a knowledgeable Geordie crowd which numbered about 300 but made enough noise to suggest at least double that figure.

The final result was desperately close with all four players in with a shout right up until the afternoon session. The occasional delay to fit in with television demands and a fuse that caused the TV lights to go out midway bet-ween Carl's match with Alan failed to spoil a first class event.

Prean, the youngest of the four-some invited to take part in this new round robin competition and the highest ranked English player in Europe, came through hell and high-water to take the trophy which hopefully will be played for again next year.

He got off to the worst possible start by losing to Desmond Douglas 19, 19 in a match which could have gone either way but which Des-mond, possibly quicker into his stride, came safely through.

The other first round match saw Chen Xinhua, perhaps the player most had come to watch in this television spectacular beat Alan Cooke in two games although only winning 25, 23 in the second game.

Taking the earlier advice of MC Clive Oakman to make them-

selves heard, the crowd stamped, clapped and cheered almost every point so unusual for a British audi-ence, yet which gave so much atmosphere.

With the first two matches out of the way it was a winners versus losers confrontation and the match that many were looking forward too turned out to be a

real cracker.

Chen took an early lead against Prean, the Ryde player hit back and then Chen's chance came in the fifth service game when he took five points in a row. But Prean clawed his way back to level at 15-all but then inexplicably lost every point of Chen's service to go behind 20-15 and lose the game.

Chen started the second game leading 11-9 and 17-13 but then dropped six points in a row to put Prean into a lead he didn't waste. Chen never seemed to recover from that desperately poor showing and never took the lead again with Prean taking the

final game 21-17.

Nobody can underestimate Alan Cooke. In a gritty performance that must rate among one of his best in months, he took on Desmond, without doubt the crowd's favourite on the day, to win the first set 24-22 and then the TV lights went out.

It was a break that neither player wanted especially Cooke who looked all fired up but then had to wait twelve minutes before getting back into action.

But it was a break that seemed to effect the Walsall player rather than Alan who put the problem behind him and went on to win in two straight games.

At this stage each of the play-ers had won one match so it left the afternoon session evenly balanced and with everything to play for.

Douglas took on Chen losing the first game 21,16 but like Prean had done earlier took the next two games to reserve himself a place in the final.

For Chen it was a big disappointment. Twice he had taken the first game only to fade away, something he almost did again in his only win of the event against Cooke. It is a chink in his game that England manager will have to work on.

The other semi-final between Prean and Cooke flowed from

one player to the other before Prean, who was improving as the event progressed, took the final two points to win the closest match of the day 21-19, 19-21,

As is often the case, especially when television is in attendance, the final was not the most exciting match of the tournament. Unlike the earlier encounter when Desmond shot into an early lead, this time it was Prean who took the initiative and took Des apart in the first game 21-9. At one stage the Isle of Wight player took ten points without reply.

Yet Douglas hit back in a manner that suggests his officially announced retirement from Euro-pean matches has come too soon. Although he trailed for most of the second game he was never far be-hind and inched home 21,19.

But after just seven points in the final game Prean took a lead he was never to relinquish. Matching Des shot for shot he ran out a clear winner 21-16.

"It was always an uphill strug-gle," admitted Carl afterwards. "I took longer to settle in than I would have liked. But I got some breaks when I needed them and at the end of the day I was pleased to win."

Modest words but in truth it was a victory well deserved and

watched by millions.

Without doubt the event was a great success and hopefully it will be repeated next year. On this showing there is little to separate the four players. Prean showed he can take early setback and fight back. Douglas, forget his age he's playing as well now as he did ten years ago, will surely be missed if he is thinking of hanging up his bat. Alan Cooke who was

doubtless disappointed by his performance in coming fourth, should forget this one and turn his attentions to grea-ter things. While Chen the 'un-known factor in this all star line-up is still a player of outstanding

ability.



MAGNIFICENT

Andrea heads off challenge to win title

THE inclusion of a Friday evening international and international team event to this new and indeed first senior tournament of the season attracted a strong entry (including a small foreign contingent) and gave the sponsors M & G the opportunity to see England's elite players in action early in the season, reports Diccon Gray.

The Friday evening friendly between England and France was held in the sports hall at Peniel Academy, Brentwood. A 3-3 draw was enjoyed by a full house of approximately 350 and a banquet for players, officials, sponsors and VIP's followed.

The tournament itself was held on Saturday and Sunday at the magnificent Brentwood International Centre. First class presentation and superb facilities set the scene for a high standard of play. On Saturday in the individual events the main upset came when Jonathan Taylor despatched Brad Billington.

However the top four seeds in the mens singles came through to the semi-finals where Xinhua Chen repeated his slaughter in the Leeds English Open of top seed French ace Jean-Phillipe Gatien to gain a comfortable two straight victory. Gatien proving once more his vunerability to defenders.

In the other semi-final Alan Cooke beat Desmond Douglas for the second time this season after having disposed of the Frenchman Marmurek in the quarters and



avenging last seasons European league loss. In the final Alan had his chance in the first game but eventually fell in two very close games to Xinhua.

Unfortunately, a midweek European League injury deprived the tournament of the ex-Chinese woman Wang Xiao Ming who would have been a red hot favourite for the womens singles title, This however opened the way for Andrea Holt to follow up her end of season good form by taking the title without the loss of a set.

She defeated both Lisa Lomas and Alison Gordon with her more decisive hitting proving to give her the edge. Foreign resistance ended in the semi-finals when Coubat (France) went out to Gordon.

Coubat had earlier put paid to national champion Fiona Elliot in the quarters and it was Fiona who ended Marie Svensson's interest in round two.

In the invitation team event upsets and controversy galore with matches consisted of four mens singles and one womens singles. England's first team of Douglas, Cooke and Gordon beat Denmark and Team Peniel 2nd. but surprisingly lost to France 2nd 3-2.

In the other group there was a three-way tie between England 2nd (Syed, O'Driscoll and Holt), France and Team Peniel. England beat France, Syed recording a double beating European No. 6. Gatien. Team Peniel beat England and France beat Team Peniel. Scotland did not win a game.

After much deliberation, including phone calls to and from France and the sitting of a jury, the method of calculating who should go through to meet France in the final was agreed and France duly beat France 2nd in an anticlimatic final.

Final presentations were made to Sir Robert McCrindle (MP for Brentwood and non-executive director of M&G) and sales manager M&G Graham Sinclair. The late finish was an unavoidable consequence of the earlier debate but should not be allowed to detract from a highly successful tournament which may well aspire to 5 Star status in the future.

Perhaps a one horse race from the outset, subject to in-season recruitment. Ormesby are minus their usual Canadian registrations. Team Peniel come in looking relatively strong on paper while Bath drop into the 'average' looking category.

Ellenborough introduce Ewan Walker from Scotland and Butterfly Cardiff have wrestled Steve Ward from their local rivals. DML Destroyers (Plymouth), alias this that and the other, live to fight another season in the Premier despite gaining no league points last year. However their chances of survival seem to be slightly improved.

West Warwickshire look to be struggling from the outset but could cause some upsets if they find their form together. As for NFD Grove — they must be glad that they are playing in Europe as they are in a class of their own. Their only challenge at the moment seems to be to overcome Chen Xinhua.

Players I tipped to do well in the October 1989 issue have made some progress — mostly in an upward direction and their inclusion in British League teams has no doubt contributed.

In the mens rankings over the last year Jonathon Taylor has moved up from 27 to 16. Andrew Eden defied his critics playing for Peniel. Having now been tested on the senior circuit he has recorded a meteoric rise from 118 to 57. What ever happened to Alan Cole? — maybe this season... The 'blast from the past' came in the form of Ellenborough's Colin Wilson who has suddenly shot back up from 96 to 30.

Players to watch out for this season, at the risk of possibly stating the obvious, I think must include Surrey's Edward Hatley who currently appears at 299 on the mens list, and his friend and rival Alexander Perry—that is if they find the time for senior events at their tender age!

PURDY WINS JUNIOR TITLE

THE National Under 11 Championships were once again played at the Mansfield Leisure Centre following the Schools Individual Championships. Numbers in both the boys and girls events rose from 112 in 1989 to 163 this year.

The tournament commenced at 10am and was completed by 6.30pm due to the cooperation of players, coaches and parents. It was played in groups of 4 with group winners progressing to a knock out tournament later. There were 26 boys groups and 15 girls groups.

The groups were umpired by the players themselves (with the help of parents) and so the tournament kept to schedule. The tournament was due to have a coaching session after the finals but due to the number of competitors there was not sufficient time to hold it, but Don Parker was present and answered any questions that were asked of him.

The boys singles final was a repeat of last year with Steven

Meddings (Birmingham) playing David Purdy (Sheffield). This year however the winner was David Purdy reversing last years result when he won -18, 19, 17.

The girls final was played between Nicola Smith and Nicola Silburn. Both girls attend the same school in Leeds so showing the strength of the game in that area. The result was a win for Nicola Smith 12, -20, 10.

The tournament was attended by ETTA Vice Chairman Stuart Sneyd and Jackie Bellinger who selected the under 12 squad for national training.



NO DOUBLES BUT MORE LADIES

THE popularity of the Championships continues and there is yet a further increase in the number of teams competing — now totalling 187!

The senior section has 64 teams, the veterans 67 and, disappointingly, a slight decrease in junior teams to 56. With more than 60 senior and veteran teams there are again 3rd divisions.

An important topic, particularly over the last two seasons, has been the participation of ladies in the championships. At the annual conference in June the county championships committee prompted further thought and discussion with a proposal that, in the senior and sunior sections, the ladies/girls should each play two singles instead of one singles and a ladies doubles.

This meant omitting the mens doubles as it was considered that 10 events was the maximum number per match, county representatives at conference were almost unanimous in the wish to improve the participation of ladies in matches. There was disappointment at the loss of doubles events but the proposal received very good support and the change in rules was agreed, senior and junior sections matches will now comprise 6 mens singles and 4 ladies singles events.

I strongly support the changes made but naturally disappointed at the loss of doubles events. I see all match score sheets and record players' wins/losses in singles and doubles events. From this I see how often the results of doubles events, especially with ladies, can be surprising when compared with singles results in the same match. My feeling is that the results of matches this season will be more predictable.

Another change, agreed at the 1989 conference, takes effect this season. There will be 2 ladies in the senior premier division teams — as already applies to the junior premier division. It is hoped this, and the change to 2 singles, may encourage more of the top ranked ladies to participate.

I will be continuing with the Telecom line (0898-884418). With 26 divisions, and a suggested two minute message, there is a severe limit on what can be reported on any one occasion. It is the intention to give news on all divisions throughout the season.

Fixtures start on 29th September so by the time these notes appear, over 70 matches will have been played. In addition, the first round of junior premier division matches will have taken place at St. Neots

Table Tennis Club. Lancashire wrested the title from Yorkshire, the champions for so many seasons. Essex were also strong challengers last season so the competition seems open.

It seems Lancashire's three top boys — Andrew Eden, Howard Whewell and Darren Howarth — will not be eligible agewise but Maria Thornley and Karen Richardson, will be able to compete.

The team event began with the junior boys (Andrew Eden, Grant Solder and Leigh Jeffries) placed with Switzerland, Israel, Czechoslovakia and Luxembourg. The Czechs proving the best winning the group unbeaten. England finished third with wins over Switzerland and Luxembourg, but losing out to a much improved Israel and missing out on qualification for the top eight.

The Junior Girls (Ellen Meddings, Maria Thornley and Joanne Roberts) were in with Hungary, Finland and Ireland and a Greek team which failed to arrive. A single 3-0 victory over Ireland put the girls also in third place after the first stage.

A second entry in the Cadet Boys meant that Alex Perry, Edward Hatley and Darren Blake were in a group of eight for the first stage. Two wins over Wales and East Germany came from this with THIS years European Youth Championships in Hollabrunn turned out to be a strong test of character for all involved. In extreme heat both inside and outside the playing hall the English squad of hopefuls found themselves up against it from the start.

Czechoslovakia and West Germany topping the group (eventually silver and bronze medalists respectively). Three defeats of 3-2 and two deciders being at deuce in the third, left us feeling a little unlucky.

The cadet girls, Nicola Deaton and Sally Marling lost to Russia and Yugoslavia in their group of six but good wins against Finland, Denmark and Austria put them in third spot also.

In the second stage of the tournament and the eventual position play-offs the junior boys defeated Turkey but lost to Finland in a crucial contest for places and despite a 5-0 drubbing of Spain and a repeat victory over Switzerland —

a good team effort — finished at seventeenth position.

The junior girls beat Denmark but lost to Luxembourg in stage two and defeats against Austria and Norway left them in 20th position.

The cadet boys lost 3-2 to Israel, but a strong finish defeating Turkey, Luxembourg and finally Switzerland left them thinking what might have been and a disappointing 19th place.


The cadet girls finished in 11th place with a 3-0 defeat by Czechoslovakia from the second stage and victories over Spain and France, With both Nicola and Sally in this age group next year they

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KOREANS ROMP HOME AGAIN

SEVEN gold medals including the boys and girls team events for South Korea was the final score as the nine-strong Asian squad tightened their stranglehold on the Leeds English Junior Open at Bridlington. Whether invitations should continue to be sent to Seoul is a matter that will have to be decided in the corridors of ETTA power in due course.

The Korean policy of sending young teams abroad to gain valuable experience especially in Europe they will see as having paid off—Yoo Nam Kyu the reigning Olympic champion is a former winner of the English Junior Open but he won that title in Korea. On other trips abroad the Koreans both at senior and junior level have rarely reached their full potential, that it seems is why Korea, the South anyway, believe in sending their youngsters abroad.

Team Events

England's top teams managed to lose without meeting the Koreans. Our boys were brought down 3-0 by Sweden and the England girls were defeated 3-1 by France, both in the second round, failing to reach the semi-finals.

A year earlier England had Michael O'Driscoll in the junior ranks and capable of beating the Koreans, as he did at the time, but regretfully we have at the moment no junior players of the O'Driscoll calibre in the junior ranks, despite gallant performances by Grant Solder and Andrew Eden, the two

top-rated England boys.

John Prean reminded us in the programme (written before the event). "Those who saw and remember a magical Olympic final between Yoo Nam Kyu and Kim Ki Tack, seen by hundred of millions on television all over the world, may recall that both were on view at English Junior Opens. Yoo was here as recently as 1985 and fought out tremendous battles with Carl Prean, each player winning one of the contests. Yoo was already junior champion of Asia, Prean was about to become junior champion of Europe. We saw history in the making and matches of absolute top class. I have little doubt that this will happen again this time."

History seems unlikely to repeat itself as Carl Prean and Michael O'Driscoll were higher in their class when juniors and the Koreans at Bridlington seemed to be either in their last year as juniors or ineligible. However, they were talented players with powerladen topattacks, but I could not spot a potential Olympic champion for Barcelona in 1992.

England captain Donald Parker, present throughout the week-end said "We have several excellent prospects in the younger age groups, notably Sally Marling, Nicola Deaton and Alex Perry, but our older juniors are not so strong as in recent years".

Sally My Choice

Miss Marling was the player who caught my eye at Bridlington and she did the same in London at the Leeds Youth Cup finals. She seems to bristle with both determination and an armoury of fierce attacking shots that proved too strong for all her opponents in her age group in London and Bridlington.

Not far behind the Yorkshire lass is Nicola Deaton, coached by impressario and entrepreneur Colin Deaton. The two girls met in the cadet girls Bridlington final. To prove a point Nicola took the first game 15, but Sally came from the rear to win 10, 13.

Alex Perry, star pupil at the West Country "stable" of coach Malcolm Francis reached the final of the cadet boys event and was so narrowly beaten 16, -18, -20 by Jurgan Pastors of Holland.

Lacking in height Perry seems to spend most of his time a pace or two back from the table piling on the top-spin loops of the most vicious brand and profiting from the mistakes of his opponents.

But he seems to have the ability to play closer to the table and he certainly approaches the game as if he is determined to win. He will of course, have to accept more umpiring decisions with more grace than he did at

the Youth Cup finals.

So, how far did our strongest boys advance? The answer is that Andrew Eden and Neil Bevan were the only two English boys to reach the last sixteen, both in the bottom half. Eden went down 19, 18 to Christophe Legout (France) in a thrilling battle whilst Bevan was brought down by the second seed Park Sang Joon, who earlier had accounted for Alan Cole (Sussex) 16, 10.

Major Shock

England managed five girls in the last sixteen of the singles. The five included Nicola Deaton whose win over the second seed Petra Fichtinger (Austria) the second seed provided the biggest surprise of the three-day event. Nicola beat Fichtinger 18, 20, going on to beat Ingrid Bogren (Sweden) to reach the quarter-finals, the only English girl to reach the quarters, where she lost to Kim Boon Silk. It looked doubtful if Bogran and Fichtinger would have survived against the Korean girl had they clashed.

But Miss Deaton made her mark and duly received the special cash award from the Leeds Permanent Building Society who were involved in staging the very last event of their three-year sponsorship. Miss Marling was also a special award recipient.

The event was also the very last under the ETTA Tournaments Committee, presided over by Doreen Stannard. This group of stalwart referees, organisers and umpires have completed sterling work over many years and it was sad to see them bow out. Perhaps some may return at some future time.

The Korean Problem

There is one argument in favour of inviting Asian teams such as the South Koreans — it gives our young players experience against Oriental opposition. But there are powerful schools of thought who say "why should we

continue to invite them? — they smother the tournament, in this case they took all five titles in their age groups."

I joined the onlookers who believed that several of the boys in the Korean squad appeared to be over age — in fact one of them appeared to be not far short of twenty. The same opinion was raised I am told, when they played some matches at the Peniel Academy prior to travelling to Bridlington.

Nightmare

The problem of trying to tell the boys from the girls in the Asian teams has become even more pronounced — the cropped hair-do's favoured by many young ladies world-wide now provides an identification nightmare.

South Korea has almost dominated the last two, possibly three English Junior Opens atBridlington. We are certain by going there again next year, but I feel that the time has come to leave out the Koreans and hope we can attract some other nations instead.

The experiment tried in Manchester of running the team event after the individual events was given another airing in Bridlington but it produced an anticlimax of monumental size because the Koreans dominated. So few people were interested in watching the Koreans when many were hundreds of miles from home and facing long journeys, that towards the end less than half-a-dozen spectators were left, apart from ETTA Chairman John Prean, deputy chair Alan Ransome both flanking the local dignitaries who seemed too polite to plead other pressing engagements.

It appears that the Bridlington tournament lends itself to running the team event first.

Continuing the age factor saga, the amazing Dave Harvey (ranked No. 48 in the ETTA Junior senior rankings) and enjoying his first ever season as a Veteran, took the Gloucester closed singles by 21-18 in the final game versus 27 year old Michael Owens, and a few nights later over in Cheltenham, Harvey totally annihilated Graham Slack 8, 8 in the Towns closed singles final, here again the difference in ages was most noticeable - to hazard a guess somewhere in the region of 15 or 16 years.

Neither of these Veteran players have had any coaching, the latter was not available in their younger days - great emphasis is placed upon coaching today, but in the ultimate long run it is still the old Uns in Gloucestershire that carry off the majority of senior cups and trophies and at the moment - with seemingly apparent ease.

However, there is one youngster in Gloucestershire duly described as having "ALL BOUNCE", AGGRESSION AND ARROGANCE" (not my words - quote "Focus on points" April 1990), Gloucester Cities official newsletter, who could ere long knock some of the old uns right off their present championship status.

I will for the moment refrain from mentioning his name, but there will be few readers of this column who have not heard of him, and without doubt will hear much more as we move into the immediate future.

The Old Market Printers Gloucester Table Tennis League has for numerous seasons always promoted a Handicap Knockout team competition. using the same format of play last season's number of entries slumped considerably.

With this fact in mind Andy Browett (a former club General Secretary) decided to do something about matters, quite early last summer he drew up a proposed new schedule of rules and playing conditions - including allocated special weeks during

the season for handicap play only. Andy then duly presented his findings to the City Committee in Mid-July where upon after much serious thought and discussion, the Chairman rightly put it to the vote. Ave or Nav as to whether to continue the tournament upon these new lines or not.

The Executive decided by a 5 to 4 vote against holding the competition next season, now it appears to this ancient old scribe that some members are perhaps a little frightened of new thoughts and ideas instead as most table tennis committees these days appear only too keen to be promoting our sport.

To ultimately survive, table tennis has to adapt some new thoughts and ideas into its playing curriculum and at least one great factor was achieved at this year's AGM when the League agreed to adopt the ETTA ruling of using red/black coloured bats for this forthcoming season, a very welcome decision - perhaps some City players still oppose it?

New ideas are not always restricted - appressive or even vengeful, often they are merely a blueprint for a reasonably better table tennis existence based on sound common sense, table tennis committees should at all times where possible be in the business of always trying to promote our sport, because sadly no one else will.

Coaching in Gloucester City

Gloucester TTA will this season miss the great help and dedication that former 2 Star Coach Paddy Jackson gave for the past 11 years, Paddy has now retired and his position as Senior Coach has been taken over by George Novoth who I understand is looking forward to the new season of continuing to supply, not only the City, but the County also with youngsters willing and able enough to progress at our sport.

Crypt Tigers TTC History

The Crypt TTC was founded in the early 1980's as a coaching centre for Gloucester in direct association with Oxstalls. Many talented youngsters have passed through into ranking lists - in 1990 three new coaches ie Judy Morley, Lesley Dewick and Mike Flynn were enrolled and gained sponsorship from the Gloucester City AFC. A firm bond has been established, hence the Crypt 'Tigers'.

Supplemented by five silvers and two bronze these successes represented the best return by any of the 47 competing nations.

The Pennine computer ranking system remains a major talking point on the local table tennis scene, having both its advocates and its adversaries, but above all it has acted as a genuine stimulant, particularly within the Wellingborough and Kettering areas. Basically it reflects the criteria of previous achievement, planned effort, consistency, current form and durability, while at the same time listing players in an order of merit. However it has achieved much more than this, not least in

persuading the more enthusiastic players to participate in two, or even three leagues with appropriate benefits to all concerned.

Furthermore it may have been instrumental in creating two new posts within the executive structure and a subsequent change in the format of the county closed tournament, which from this year will take place on two separate occasions - the Seniors in December with a combined Veterans/Junior event in January. To revive the interest of lower division players the Senior tournament will include several class events based on Pennine ranking positions, while the split competition will be expanded, not only by ranking, but also by age.

The ranking system owes most of its development to the father and son team of Gwil and David Evans, and so the growth of Gwil's former Highfield club from its humble beginnings in Rushden, via a brief sojourn in Chelveston, to becoming the largest club in the county at its new headquarters at Rushden Athletic Club, seems but poetic justice.

Another interesting development concerns Kettering Town, for so many years Northamptonshire's premier club, and which this year celebrates fortieth its anniversary. To mark the occasion, the club is inaugurating a special award to be made to the most sporting team in the league which is to be judged by the teams themselves with points awarded at the season's close.

Let us hope that this venture will produce some memorable and happy occasions in the year ahead, and that the true spirit of table tennis will abound, not only in Kettering, but throughout the length and breadth of the county.

WARWICKSHIRE Alan Healey

LIKE MANY a (fool) hardy veteran player - I came to regret committing myself, yet again, to the highly competitive annual Birmingham summer League campaign - throughout what turned out to be a record-breaker of intense heat and humidity. However, things are now beginning to cool down again and preparation for the 1990/91 season is well under way.

The Birmingham and District AGM took place on Monday 25th June. The experimental one year old 'number of games won' league system was voted out in favour of another new system which allows 4 points to be shared 'according to achievement'. It was decided to continue with the 12 team per division format, pro tem.

Considerable concern is being expressed by both Birmingham and Warwickshire Association Management Committee's that apart from a number of individual efforts there is virtually no officially organised table tennis coaching or creation of new coaches throughout Warwickshire County which includes the huge potential of Greater Birmingham area, which was the original home of 'our' Desmond Douglas. Don Richards (Warwickshire County Committee) confirmed that intended coaching at Grove had been cancelled. 'Cost was against running larger rallies within the county, but smaller sessions 'round the towns' could be a possibility.'

Birmingham Schools table tennis has suffered considerably since a number of local schools have discontinued 'extra curriculum' after-school table tennis, but the good news is that the Birmingham and District TTA Development Committee will be meeting with Birmingham's decreasing band of invaluable hard-core school organisers/coaches - to discuss possibilities of merging Schools table tennis and local youth clubs in with the Birmingham League system. An 'Adopt a School' scheme is an additional possibility for local league table tennis/youth clubs.

Again - with the Birmingham and District TTA Development Committee - continuing efforts are being made to create two permanent table tennis centres (North and South Birmingham) but utilising dualuse Council facilities. Optimistic talks are continuing on this subject which has the backing of ETTA, West Midlands Sports Council, Birmingham City Council and Birmingham and District TTA.

Birmingham Association have completed two interesting surveys recently:

 A player/age survey taken from 1989/90 player league registrations, which confirmed the need for recruitment and development of young players. Results: Registered age groups -Under 17 years (6.0%); 17/25 years (11.0%); 26/ 35 years (24.5%); 36-45 years(25.0%); and 45 years+ (33.0%).

b) A survey conducted via the 'visiting team match card' allowing marks for general conditions experienced at the home venue such as floor, lighting, back walls, space, table and hospitality.

The Warwickshire County Selection Committee decided to run Cadet and Junior trials only, this year. Cadet (boys and girls) took place on Sunday 2nd September and the Junior Boys took place on Saturday 8th September at the Kingshurst Youth and Community Centre, Kingshurst, Solihull, West Midlands. Details of these should appear in the next edition of Table Tennis News.


Action

BEST STILL TO COME

ENGLAND captain Don Parker has returned on many occasions from trips abroad not always pleased with his player's performances. On this occasion, as we boarded the Bullet Train homeward bound for Tokyo, there is no doubt that his happy thoughts centred on England finishing third in Osaka, without one of the side's star players Carl Prean.

What is the team capable of achieving when Chen Xinhua, Carl Prean, Desmond Douglas and Alan Cooke are all available and playing well? Don replied "Provided I can call on all members of the squad and Chen's fitness is rapidly upgraded in training, we shall be challenging from the No.3 position we now hold, happy to take on China, North and South Korea, Sweden or anyone else."

"With these four we have the skill and the sheer professional input to do even better than we have done in Japan. We beat the Japanese 3 - 1 on their home ground. I was told by the Japan coach that they have been allocated £1m as their coaching budget for the World Championships in Chiba City next April" he concluded.

Sweden Jolted

Sweden were the worthy winners of the TSP World Team Cup, coming from 0 - 2 in arrears against China in a thrilling final, to clinch victory 3 - 2. The big shock of the day, even the whole tournament was

by Chen Longcan as he demolished Jan-Ove Waldner the world champion 13, 10.

Earlier, in the morning session on the final day, China started to show that they still have ideas of winning the Swaythling Cup back from Sweden next year. They knocked out North Korea 3 - 0, and Sweden put paid to England's hopes.

England were not expecting any favours from Sweden in the semi-finals, but it was another nailbiting encounter - Chen again tested Waldner, taking the second game with deceptive services, extremely powerful forehand loop, and vicious back-spin on return of service, in fact, that describes Chen's play throughout most of the tournament, although in the latter stages his stamina was running out after all, apart from the English Open in Manchester, this was his only attempt at top world-class play in the last three years.

Des Douglas has hardly played better throughout his career. Victory over Jorgen Persson in Aomori was not repeated in Osaka for the Walsall professional, but it was still a fine showing as the young, blonde Swede came through 18, 16.

The doubles, so vital in this new, refreshing Swaythling Cup format, went to Sweden but Alan Cooke and Des Douglas played tremendous table tennis just losing the first game -20, taking the second 19 and losing the third at 16.

England were out but with honour and with new unofficial world ranking of No.3 — there were no play-offs for third place, but I am assured that having lost to the winners England men were justified in taking the No.3 spot on the rostrum.

Group Stage

In Japan, there is a custom in table tennis to try and play in as many places as possible. An example of this is the Euro-Asia series, where the teams are dragged around a number of towns and cities almost at the point of exhaus-tion. The principle is fine. John Prean agrees that to try and show the sport at world level to a variety of audiences is good for the sport.

It is seldom good for the players. However, the men's and women's teams in the World Cup were shuffled around Japan after two re-draws caused by countries backing out, the teams were sent out to distant parts — Shibetsu, Aomori, Nigata and Tokyo. The organisers had a vague idea that they may have been able to keep the officials and the media in touch with what happened at the other venues, but it did not work out.

All we were able to find out in Aomori (£130 flight away from Osaka) was the biggest shock of the tournament the defeat 3 — 2 by Holland over Yugoslavia, a match in which Haldan and Keen were the stars and Ilije Lupulescu the two-time loser.

Later in the quarter-finals in

Osaka, Holland again hit their best form as Erik Lindh lost to Haldan -16, -15 and to Trinko Keen -14, 15, -20. But the Mighty Swedes still came through 3 - 2.

Back to Aomori, England opened with a 3 — 0 win over the Chinese Tapei a team who had spent a fortnight training with the Chinese squad before arriving in Japan. After months of controversy, haggling over visas and all sorts of other problems Chen Xinhua donned his England shirt for the first time. He seemed nervous, but quickly got into his stride to overwhelm the Taipei No.1 Chiu Chin Long 14, 10.

Delighted

"That was the one we had to win" said Don Parker, delighted with the performance of the England team in general including Chen's debut and especially fine doubles shows from Des Douglas and Alan Cooke.

A 3 — 0 win for England over Canada might sound a push-over but in fact, it was well fought by the "Canadians" Joe Ng and Horatio Pintea, both fine players on their best days.

So, drawing a veil over Aomori, shortly after the England team received their medals — "My first medal for over three years" said Chen whose spoken English is improving rapidly, the team were flying to Tokyo, en route for Osaka.

Fine Venue

The Osaka Prefecture Gymnaium was an excellent venue. Seating over 5,000 people, the average attendance was 4,000 at a peak of course, when Japan were playing. The venue held only two tables and none of the stupid restrictions where only players are allowed on the floor of the stadium.

We saw very little of the women's tournament, being mainly concerned with the men and especially with England.

The victorious women's teams in the two quarter-finals were North Korea who knocked out Hungary 3 - 0 and the favourites China who were 3 - 1 winners over Czechoslovakia. Marie Hrachova, the Czech No.1 was in fine fettle as she beat Deng Yaping, but that was the only surprise as the Chinese women moved smartly into the semi-finals.

Hopes were obviously high that if Japan's men were unable to reach the final, the women might be able to do it, but the Chinese women were in no mood to be polite to the host country, they swamped the Japanese women 3 - 0 and won the final by the same score against North Korea.

Another extraordinary quirk was that the women's final was played on the penultimate day, late in the evening, when most people were expecting to watch it on the last day, so most journalists including ourselves did not witness the women's final. The Japanese, traditionally good organisers, failed miserably with their results service, A completely new event, held infive cities, was an awkward burden.

ENGLAND TRIUMPH IN DOUGLAS

ALTHOUGH the England teams dominated the team categories of the Leeds Schools International Championships — held for the first time in Douglas, Isle of Man during early July — they suffered from their worst-ever showing in the 15 year history of the championships when they won only three of the six individual titles.

This year's championships attracted the biggest-ever number of competitors, 164, with Gibralter making their debut to join players from England, Iceland, Ireland, the Isle of Man, Scotland and Wales, in this three day extravaganza featuring the best schools players from the home countries and further afield.

The venue was Ballakermeen High School. What the venue lacked in the way of top-class facilities was made up for by the warmth, friendliness and enthusiasm of the organisers, fronted by the Bubb family who were chiefly responsible for the event taking place.

England were determined not to repeat their disappointing show in last season's championships in Birmingham when they registered their first-ever defeats in the team events, losing narrowly to the Welsh in the senior boys and senior girls.

Although Wales retained the senior girls title with considerable ease, beating England, 6-1, in the final, England won back the senior boys event in a closely-fought encounter which is not reflected in the 6-2 scoreline.

England's intermediate girls team didn't drop a single game against Iceland, Ireland and Scotland. The intermediate boys team were also in convincing form but their Cadet (Under-14) colleagues had to pull out all the stops to edge home a determined Ireland team, 6-4, by winning the decisive doubles matches, thanks to a shrewd tactical pairing decision by NPC, Paul Birch.

England's cadet girls proved too strong for Ireland in the final, winning 6-1, after decisive wins over Iceland, the Isle of Man and Wales in the group stage.

There were doubles and mixed doubles event, for the first time, but the interest on the finals night centred on the individual events.

Such had been England's dismal performance in the group

stages of the senior boys event that only one English player qualified from the eight four-player groups, Garry Knights. But an "unknown" English player - NG Ping Keung from Grantham — almost pulled off the shock of the championships when he took Welsh No. 1, Stephen Ward to 21-18 in the deciding game in his group match.

Keung, busy studying 'A' levels since Easter, led Ward 18-17 in the decider but Ward produced two brilliant winners to edge home. In so doing the enigmatic Welsh boy strained his back temporarily as he demonstrated his relief with his victory salute. But Ward was modest enough to concede that this impediment played no part in his subsequent quarter-final defeat by Scottish No. 1., Euan Walker. Keung, over in this country from his native Hong Kong, revealed that he does not have a coach and hadn't practised for some time!

Euan Walker, a student at Clairmont High School, East Kilbride, repeated his European Championships win in Gothenburg over Ward, winning 21-19, 25-23 and met Sean Spelman of Ireland in the final. Spelman had made hard work of putting aside Kjarton Briem of Iceland in the semi-final. Walker became the first-ever Scottish Boys Individual winner as he cruised home, 21-9, in the third game. Not even an English player in the semi-finals!

Justine Thomas (Wales) went one better than her runner-up spot in the senior girls event last year, beating team-mate Laura Collier in a one-sided affair, and Natasha Williams made it a notable Welsh double as she defeated Michelle Martin (England) in the cadet girls final.

England had to be content with wins for Darren Howarth (Audenshaw High School, Manchester), Maria Thornley (Albany High School, Chorley), and Chris Sladden (Cecil Jones High School, Southend) in the boys intermediate, girls intermediate and boys cadet events respectively, as they sped to their first schools international individual titles.

DUNLOP ENGLISH SCHOOLS INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AT MANSFIELD

There was quite a family atmosphere at the Dunlop English Schools Individual Championships at Mansfield Leisure Centre. Rather uniquely, I had posturated, three sisters were taking part. Natasha, Lian and Claudine Wilson — all pupils at Thomas Peacocke School, Rye, were representing East Sussex. Younger brother Alex had narrowly failed to win the Boys' Under-11 event and that would surely have been an achievement difficult to emulate.

When I returned from the championships I stumbled across a weekly Herts "freebie" newspaper which reported on Sarah Seaholme (Watford Girls GS), Neil Seaholme (Watford GS) and Tim Seaholme (St.Meryl School, Watford) all representing Hertfordshire Schools in the same tournament! It's not only "scoop" John Woodford who sometimes "misses the boat"!

Paul Carter (Purley Sixth Form College) won his first national Schools' title, beating Jason Bamford (Notts) in the final, having ousted number one seed, Garry Knights (Staffs) in the semi. The Girls' U19 final was rather onesided, with Lisa Crick (Berks) winning, 21-10, 21-14, over Tina Sadler (Yeovil College).

Edward Hatley made heavy weather of his Boys U16 win over Darren Howarth (Greater Manchester) with a 21-15, 10-21, 21-17, scoreline and Sally Marling (Humberside) conceded her number one status to Maria Thornley (Lancs), No.2 seed, who won 21-18, 21-10.

Nicola Deaton (Derbyshire) lifted her third national schools title in winning the Girls' Under-13 event, and Darren Blake looks set to break all records as he won his FOURTH title in FIVE years. Steven Meddings (West Midlands) held on to his Boys U11 crown and Kathryn Woodward (Gtr Mcr) got on the winners' podium for the first time. The championships were sponsored by the Dunlop Sports Company. The total number of players - 282 - was up on last season's entry - all of them county champions.

GET READY FOR CHIBA SPECTACULAR

As the world prepares for the 41st World Championships in Chiba, Table Tennis News takes a look at the logistics that the host country has to face these days and asks the question 'could we hold a similar championship?'



IT promises to be the most spectacular world championship event ever staged. When they get under way later this season, it will climax three years of hard work by the Japanese who confidently expect to provide the most stunning show and almost certainly the most expensive in the history of the sport.

In sheer size these championships will take some beating. Consider these facts. There will be at least four halls in which the players will compete. Hall 3 is just 6000 square feet and will house 26 tables together with 3000 spectators. An overflow hall will have four more tables.

In Halls 1 and 2 there will be a mind boggling 90 tables set in 13,000 square feet for the Masters and Junior events and which will accommodate 2500 spectators.

The entire stadium will cover 55,000 square feet which includes two halls set aside for a table tennis festival and two more halls using 13,000 square feet for the organisers, press centre, table tennis museum, Hall of Fame, sports equipment fair, mini-studio, cine-video theatre and other areas put side for organisers of the Olympic Games and Mexico where the 1993 championships are being held.

There will also be souvenir shops, display stands and between now and next April there could be a lot more on offer. Which all goes to show how the sport has progressed in the Far East.

More figures to stun the mind come with the announcement that over 1000 seats will be required for players and officials, 700 for the media, 500 for umpires and officials who all have to be fed and watered.

Seven years ago the championships sold over 70,000 tickets this time that figure could reach well over 100,000.

The only drawback is that there is only one hotel near the site and that will be used exclusively by ITTF personnel and other key officials and a few top ranking teams (!) Most of the other teams will be shuttled from the stadium to their hotel 30 minutes away.

There will be fashion shows, dances and opening and closing ceremonies of spectacular proportions and we hope some superb table tennis.

The Japanese who were present at the last championships in Dortmund went home with plenty of ideas of their own. Visitors in Germany should expect an even bigger and better show this time.

The last time we held the championships in England was in 1977 in Birmingham and the chances of them returning before the turn of the century seems very remote.

In Chiba they can guarantee full houses. Not so here where the sport would surely have to multiply a great deal before we took on such enormous responsibilities. In the meantime we will just have to watch all the action from afar.

New Scoring System for Junior Events

All team matches for boys and girls at intermediate junior open championships will have a new scoring system which will start at five points each. The sys-tem made its debut at the 33rd European Youth Championships in Hollabrunn and will continue at the Czech, Belgium, Spanish, Hungarian and dur-ing our own championships at Bridlington next year.

GERMAN Super team ATSV Saarbruken who lost in the final of the European Cup to French club Levallois 5-3, were reported to have earned 200,000 DM about £68,000 for their efforts. I wonder what the winners received?

Surprise, surprise. The player who topped the new Nittaku All Star World Circuit was Sweden's Jan Ove Waldner. The world champion pocketed \$34,000 with countryman Mikael Appelgren in second place with \$31,000.

PLAYER power has won a substantial victory at the Olympic Games in Barcelona 1992. The number of women players competing has been increased to 96, the same as the men and which on current rankings would include both Lisa Lomas and Alison Gordon. Again there will be no mixed doubles with just mens singles and doubles and ladies singles and doubles.

THE 12th Arab Championships due to be held to Baghdad in August had to be cancelled! Holders of the mens and ladies teams events Egypt, will now hold on to their titles until further notice.

After the world championships in Chiba, Japan next April, the 42nd Championships will be held across the globe in Mexico City. And that could mean special training for our players because of the high altitude of the venue and also a longer acclimatisation period.

THE biggest growth area over the next few years is likely to come from Third World countries including Africa, Latin America and Oceania according to Ichiro Ogimura, the president of the International Table Tennis Federation.

THE USSR have won the Joola Nations Trophy with a massive 2075 points. Second was Hungary (970) and third Romania (655). The trophy is awarded in recognition of work under-taken by an Association at the European Youth Championships in Hollabrunn. England came joint 12th with 50 points.

DON PARKER the England manager and National Coach has a wealth of experience at all levels of the sport. He has the ability to get over the most complicated techniques to players at international level yet has the knack of explaining to youngsters entering the sport for the first time the basics. He is constantly being asked to demonstrate his techniques at coaching schools all over the country and is a regular commentator to many of the table tennis TV spectaculars we have seen recently.

Here he provides a mixture of coaching ideas and tips for newcomers to the sport but which will also prove helpful to all levels of club players as well.

Basic Strokes

THERE are two basic strokes in table tennis, driving strokes and pushing strokes. As the name suggests the driving strokes are used for attacking, while the pushing strokes are more defensive. You use them for controlling the play and stopping your opponent from gaining advantage.

Don't make the mistake of thinking that these techniques are just for beginners. Watch any international match and you will soon see that these basic strokes are very much a part of the modern game even at the highest levels! Let's start with driving strokes first.

The Forehand Drive

IMAGINE you are rolling a big tyre along the road with one hand. You know how you have to keep brushing the palm of your hand across the top of it to keep it moving? This is almost exactly the action needed to play a forehand drive.

If you are right handed, hold the bat out to your right side at about waist-height with your elbow at around 90 degrees. (If you are left-handed, just read left for right and vice versa). Keep your bat slightly tilted forward - the closed position. You should be stood slightly sideways on to the table. For right handers this means that your left foot should be just ahead of your right one.

Using your shoulder, swing the bat forwards and upwards and at the same time start to rotate your upper body so that it becomes square-on to the table. Try not to use your wrist or move your elbow as you contact the ball - the power for this stroke should come from the shoulder.

Follow through until the bat is in front of you, roughly in line with your nose. You should finish the shot facing the area of the table where you wanted the ball to go. If you have played the stroke properly, your weight



should have been transferred onto your front foot.

This process of weight transfer must be mastered early on because at a later stage it will become essential to your ability to hit the ball hard.

The Backhand Drive

THIS is a swinging action, in which the bat moves forwards and upwards. Start with your feet and shoulders facing the part of the table where you wish the ball to go. Keep your feet in line with your shoulders and hold your bat in front of your stomach

The backhand face should be forward, held in a slightly closed position. Your elbow needs to be at an angle of about 90 degrees.

As the ball approaches swing your bat forward using your elbow only. Try to resist the temptation to use your wrist or shoulder at this stage - for the time being all the power you need lies in your elbow.

As you move through the stroke let the bat rotate and 'close' over the ball so that you end your follow-through with the backhand side of the bat facing downwards towards the table. As usual the best time to hit the ball is at the peak of its bounce.

Tips from the Top

In the 1969 world championships one of the world's leading players had to withdraw from the tournament because, after breaking his spectacles, he did not have a spare pair.

There was not sufficient time to have a pair made up, so twelve months of intensive preparation was wasted. The lesson to be learned by any bespectacled players is to always carry a spare pair.

The most important part of the body when playing is the wrist especially when playing touch strokes such as the service and receipt. If the hand is cold at the start of a game then a players touch or feel is greatly reduced.

Make sure you wear a pair of gloves prior to your match if the temperature is low as is often the case for league matches

The months of September and October are notorious for condensation particularly on your bat. Constantly check your playing surfaces are not wet as this will certainly cost you a

It is not a bad idea to take two towels, one for yourself and one for your bat. Do not, however, use this as an excuse as your opponent will be playing in the same conditions.

KINGFISHER FLY THE FLAG

HOW many of you have played in a tournament for which a postage stamp was issued? This was the experience of Kingfisher Reading who followed their appearance at the Luxembourg Junior Open by entering the Hungarian Youth Table Tennis World Festival in Budapest.

This tournament was notable for its outstanding table tennis organisation, friendly spirit and entertainment, which included a circus, swimming in the world's largest pool, a Danube cruise, and a disco.

The Kingfisher juniors all performed admirably, even though the draw set them against the toughest players. The seedings, based on the 1990 European Championships and the Hungarian ranking list, produced some groups topped by Hungarians below their top 20, but even the "easiest" Kingfisher group contained a No. 9! Since Hungary No. 20 probably equates with an England top 3 the size of the task can be appreciated. Nevertheless, no less than 4 Kingfisher players finished group runner-up to enter the second

In the Veteran event apart from a small number of foreigners including Brian Halliday and myself (nominally "in charge" of the Kingfisher Juniors), the Veteran entry was dominated by highly competent Hungarians, so Brian's bronze medal winning performance was outstanding. Seeing his name up in lights, he was so pleased with the ceremony that he failed to notice the two Hungarian beauties who bore the medals into the arena (although he ultimately corected this omission).

Noteworthy was that excepting some over zealous "usherettes" who gave more amusement than annoyance, the players were treated by the Officials as intelligent human beings — there were very few announcements and none such as "I shall have no choice but to cease all knocking" and "All those on Table 15 OFF".

The inclusion of "upper grade" consolation events for those going out in the 2nd round kept all the players occupied to the last day. Altogether a great event, thoroughly enjoyed by all. The young Kingfisher players matured noticeably from the experience, whilst Brian and I wished we were a little less mature! I should like to think we did our bit for international relations, at least this I can guarantee for Anglo-Canadian cooperation, but perhaps Sarah should be the one to comment!

BALTIMORE MASTER

MATT Syed, the pride of Reading, had a whole string of sen-sational wins in Baltimore in the All Star Under 22 event, to take the US Open by storm.

The original intention was to partner Matt with Chen Xinhua in the doubles event, but both players decided, with a very strenuous schedule lined up, that full attention should be channelled into the sing-

The Under-22 All Stars had attracted 84 of the world's best players, with Matt unseeded and the sole English entry. His first match barely hinted at the fireworks to come as he disposed of American Mal Jones, 2—0.

The second round, which was also played in the massive convention centre, saw him paired with the seeded Johan Fallby of Sweden. Fallby is ranked No. 7 in his country, along with a European and world ranking, he is also a member of the all conquering Swedish souad.

Matt started brilliantly, out foxing his crew cut opponent with clever use of float and chop to take the first game 21—12. Fallby stepped up a gear in game two, but the Reading player was now at his best, winning 24—22.

The victory caused considerable comment in the stadium, and there was more interest centred on Matt in his third round match against an unknown Iranian, Mirsadeghi Seyed. The Reading player, again, delighted supporters with an easy 2—0 win.

Jim Butler, a member of the 1989 US World team, was the round four opponent. He was the 1985 US National men's singles finalist at the age of 15, and currently trains with the Swedish national squad.

This fast, attacking style player carried the home hopes with him, but again Matt was in invincible form, running out 2—0 against the player ranked number two in the United States.

By now English supporters were at fever pitch of excitement as our home representative had progressed to the semi-final. Matches from now on were transferred to the Baltimore arena for the benefit of TV and large crowds. The semi-final opponent was the former European Junior and Cadet champion, Thomas Von Scheele who had beaten Jan Ove Waldner.

Matt was now getting massive support from the English veteran



confingent over in Balfimore for the Veterans World Championships, and again he did not disappoint his new fans, giving another breathtaking display of that clever controlled defence that is his hallmark.

Von Scheele is a left hand attacker with a very fast loop, but with very clever advice and coaching from Chen Xinhua, Matt came through to the final.

Style

By now the US media were involved, with everyone wanting to see and interview the Englishman whose unique style was captivating the crowds. The final opponent was, without doubt, one of the tournament's finest players. Peter Karlsson is the Swedish number five.has a high world and European ranking, was runner-up in the 1989 European Cup, has won both the Czech and Hungarian Open doubles titles, and just lost in the 1989 China Open semi-finals to Korea's Ahn

Jae Hyung. In the US Open he beat French number one, Gatien, 3—0, and had five match points against eventual winner and current World Champion, Jan Ove Waldner.

The task facing the Reading player was to be the biggest test of a sensational tournament.

Matt, defending for all his worth, took the first game easily to 15. Karlsson rallied from 18—19 in the second to level at one game all, but the fairytale was completed when Matt clinched the decider, to take the match and win the coveted title.

At the post match celebrations, Matt was asked for his thoughts on his success. He said that his return of serve was of paramount importance at this level, and recent concentrated training on this aspect of his game had given him the edge on a number of matches. As well as his trophy and cash prize, he was immediately invited to go to Sweden to train with the full Swedish team.

In the men's singles, Matt won through three qualifying rounds before being defeated by Phillipe Saive of Belgium.

MEDALS GALORE But not all is gold

A SUPERB all round effort from our veterans at the US Open which brought no less than twelve gold medals, seven silver and three bronze.

They were all outstanding but particularly so the gold won by octogenarian Phyliss Lander who played superbly to win the over-80's title. Elsie Carrington also showed some rare skills to win the over-70's title.

There was also gold and silver for England in the over-40's event with John Hilton, Stuart Gibbs and Malcolm Corking beating Mike Short, Matt Sheader and Roger Hampson in the final.

But whilst the players were taking medals galore, the organisers were taking some stick (writes Alex Murdock).

There were many sparkling performances, which I shall list later. Most of the event was marred by the most appalling organisation seen in the championships at this level. This is not just the opinion of the UK representatives as I talked (sometimes through an interpreter) to many other players from around the world, including the USA.

The timing/day of events changed daily and the lateness against the last schedule time varied between two hours and the next day. I watched players who played their first round matches at 9.30am expecting the second round to be at 10.30am waiting at the agreed table after midnight.

Two halfs were used and players were walking between them not sure, and unable to find out where and at what time they should play. The Tournament organiser's table was six deep with competitors trying to find out what they should do next. The in word was "default".

The presentation ceremony for the winners was well organised but the consolation winners were asked to go to a room to collect their awards. In this room first, second, third and fourth places were all given the same prize, a pen, badge and poster. Can you imagine the reaction from Veteraus around the world who had played their hearts out from round robins to the final over two days and to be given these prizes, many were in tears.

The Buffet Dance at the start was a disaster, bussing 2000 people across Baltimore. One entrance taking 2-3 people at a time, three toilets for the Ladies and the Men being asked to go outside. Soon after the start an announcement was made that if people wanted to leave they could. Buses to hotels would be provided and a refund made — the next day this statement was denied.

Without doubt I would like to commend all the VETTS players and supporters who when they were not playing supported other VETTS with so much enthusiasm that it indoubtedly helped us to our most successful World VETTS Tournament—the friendship, help and camaraderie both inside and outside of the Tournament was second to none.

I wish on behalf of the VETTS Society to give special mention to Sue Allison and John Glew for all their organisation before, during and after this tournament. To our Umpires Roger Varden and David Miller who worked 10-12 hours a day undervery stressful circumstances always with a smile on their faces and kept some semblance of order.



NO SURPRISES AS SEEDS EASE HOME

TWO players stood head and shoulders above the rest at the Kirklees Junior Open. Edward Hatley and Sally Marling showed just why they are among a clutch of youngsters determined to reach the top. Here our correspondent Rea Balmforth opens the new season with his account of how some of our leading juniors started off their campaign.

ALTHOUGH one or two of the big names were conspicuous by their absence from the Kirklees Junior Open, the pipe opener for the new season on the Junior circuit, over 200 youngsters assembled at Huddersfield Sports Centre for the tournament, organised by the Dewsbury League and sponsored by the Kirklees Leisure Services and M P Textiles, Ltd.

On a day more conducive to the traditional summer sport of cricket, the Junior Boys Singles brought few surprises with the top four seeds making their way in a reasonable amount of comfort to the semi-finals and Steve Coverdale and Jeremy Hyatt (seeded 5) joining

them in the quarters.

Missing out were Marc Priddle, beaten by top cadet Andrew Wilkinson who, in turn, fell to Robert Sharp, and Barry Forster, who went down 19, -19, 18 to Richard Hatley, elder brother of top seed Edward.

But, from that point on, the seeding went according to plan with Edward Hatley running out winner with a final straight sets victory over Alex Perry.

England No. 1 Sally Marling came safely through the top half, although she did drop a game to inform Yorkshire collea-gue Debbie Newman, but there was mayhem in the lower section where Irish girl Amanda Cooke shot out Claire

Marshall (seeded 2) and Lynsey Heyward, winner over 4th seed Caroline Bentley.

Action

Sally, however, fresh from a hectic 'close' season which has seen her regularly in action on the continent, soon put the record straight with a runaway final win in which she conceded only eight points.

From an unseeded spot, Scotland's Steward Crawford claimed the Cadet Boys Singles title in a topsy-turvy event in which not one of the top four seeds made the semis.

Crawford got his act under way as he removed Philip Neal (2) in his Round I game and then came past David Yardy in the semi-final to meet Paul Hudson, who had dismissed Mark Smith in the other half after previously toppling top seed Wilkinson.

The Scot must have felt his journey south to be very much worthwhile when he added the Class 2 Singles honours at the expense of Gary Pestka.

With the girls Sally had no problems in taking the Singles title without the loss of a game and completed a profitable weekend when she added the doubles with Gemma Schwartz.

The parallel Boys Doubles went to Wilkinson — Mark Smith, with Ray Powell — Coverdale and Marling — Zoe Buchanan claiming the honours at Junior TTN level.

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TIME FOR CHANGE

The first part of a two part series by Tony Morris, late of West Sussex Institute of Higher Education, now at Footscray Institute of Technology, Melbourne, Australia, on how important colour is to our sport and how we can adapt to change.

IN recent times table tennis in England, and also worldwide, has become sensitive to the need to give the game mass appeal. We have watched the way that sports like snooker and darts have promoted themselves on television. This sort of exposure not only brings in much needed revenue, either directly from television fees or indirectly, by acting as a magnet for big spending advertisers, it also attracts youngsters to the game, thus securing the future.

Table tennis is competing in a tough market place right now. Aside from the "rehabilitation" of games like snooker and darts from the "misspent youth" notion of bar-rooms and social clubs, there are exciting new sports like windsurfing and mountain biking and for the less adventur-ous there is a plethora of creative and challenging computer and video games.

Recognizing the need to give the game greater appeal, to get more media exposure and to draw in spectators and sponsors (the Leeds deal was a great coup), and table tennis authorities have started to change laws, regulations and customs of the game and there is surely much more to come.

There has been considerable relaxation in the regulations concerning kit. There are various ideas about colours of ball, floor and table as well. At the 1989 World Championships in Dortmund the ITTF announced that yellow and orange balls will be used in the 1992 Barcelona Olympic Games.

In English table tennis colour changes have accompanied the Leeds Permanent Building Society's major sponsorship of the game. For the showpiece events sponsored by the Leeds, such as the Leeds Masters and the finals of the English Open a special "Leeds blue" arena was constructed with blue floor and blue and grey surrounds. At some events a blue table has been used.

It therefore, seems pertinent to ask whether ball colour and background colours against which the ball must be viewed, such as walls, surrounds, floor and shirt of opponent make a difference to the players' speed of response. David Rogers, a student working with me at West Sussex Institute, and a

junior county player himself, has carried out a preliminary experiment to study this question.

Once again, our close working relationship with the Director of Coaching, Donald Parker, led to him kindly arranging for National Squad members to act as sub-jects. Our thanks, as usual, are extended to the seven top male and female players who volunteered their time for this investigation, which was carried out during a Lilleshall National Training Camp in November 1989.

Although the range of background colours now in use is great, it was necessary to be rather selective at this stage, since each subject had to complete ten trials for each combination and it was intended to use white, yellow and orange balls. With three background colours this leads to nine combinations and 90 trials, which was as many as we felt it was reasonable to ask subjects to do.

The background colours chosen were dark green, the Leeds blue, or as near to it as we could get, and red because many halls have red brick walls. In the event, it was not possible to obtain enough orange balls in time for the experimental work so only white and yellow were used, resulting in six ball/background combinations.

The balls were fired from a Donic 301 Robot ball-firer to control speed, direction and trajectory. The speed was 35 kilometres per hour, combined with a flat trajectory as it was necessary to put subjects under time pressure. Subjects were informed that each ball might go to either backhand or fore-

Unknown to the subject, however, the backhand was only used to ensure that the player had to make an observable decision; that is, once she/he moved to respond with the forehand this indicated that a decision had been made in favour of a forehand response rather than a backhand.

To produce the varied background colours, sheets dyed to the predetermined shades were mounted on a frame. This was placed immediately in front of the ball firer, so that players could not see its action in case this gave any visual cues. No

precaution was deemed necessary to hide auditory cues given by the ball-firer's release mechanism because this only indicated that a ball had been released, thus acting as a warning signal, it did not inform the player whether the ball was coming to forehand or backhand.

An area 30 cm by 20 cm was cut out of the coloured sheet where the ball would come through and a piece of tissue paper the same colour as the sheet, cut into inch wide fronds, was placed over this area. This obscured the ball-firer but allowed the ball, fired at speed, to come through unaffected in speed, trajectory and direction.


CHAIRWOMEN?

AN article by Mr. K. Muhr (T.T.News May/June) contains the following: "That the ETTA should be considering abrogating its responsibility for maintaining a national network of centres of excellence is a disgrace."

As results of recent European Youth Championships indicate, there is a great deal of scope for improvement in our 'excellence' programmes. This is one reason why the vice-chairman of our coaching/development dept., Stuart Sneyd, initiated a number of weekend 'centres of excellence' at Lilleshall. I attended one of these and was encouraged and impressed.

Since money is a finite resource, it follows that, if one project takes up greater funds, another will take up fewer, However, in my time, the overall sums allocated to 'excellence' projects have been rising consist-ently. In my first year the number of local centres was increased from six to nine and that at a time of great financial crisis.

What Mr. M. omits is that, whilst local (evening) centres now operate on smaller subsidies, additional opportunities are now open to young players as a result of the Lilleshall week-ends. The overall sums are, in fact, greater. So, if there is a 'disgrace", it is elsewhere.

OBITUARY ROB OLDFIELD

ROBERT EDWIN OLDFIELD, 34, who died suddenly at his home at Hurstpierpoint, near Brighton on August 27th, was a man with a touch of "magic", a magnetic and jolly personality that inspired many people.

He was a devoted follower and a skilled performer at lawn tennis, squash, badminton and table tennis, and his cheerful enthusiasm for sport and for life in general was totally infectious.

"Rob" as he preferred to be known was born in Essex and subsequently graduated from the University of Bath where he met his wife Caroline Searle who is a media chief with the British Olympic Association.

Both Rob and Caroline spent about five years in table tennis, taking on all sorts of tasks. Rob was at one time development officer for the ETTA and later spent a shorter time as vice-chairman public relations. He also edited this magazine for a season. Not long ago at Manchester at the English Open rumours abounded that he might return to table tennis but that did not come to pass.

He pulled out of table tennis because of business pressures connected with his senior post in the civil service with the Tidy Britain Group, but his interest in our sport continued.

Ted Wallbutton the ETTA
Chief Executive who, with
Chairman John Prean, represented
the ETTA at the funeral at
Hurstpierpoint said "We have lost a
great friend". The large attendance
at Rob's funeral showed how
popular and respected Rob had
been

His interest in the media and media people was as intense as his involvement in other spheres. I recall spending ten days with Rob and Caroline in Moscow reporting the European Championships, It was a memorable and at times hilarious trip coloured by Rob's special blend of humour. It is a devastating blow to all that knew him that a life should be cut so short.
