(STAMCO) SUSSEX OPEN TWO STAR 60TH ANNIVERSARY

The first tournament was held in 1927/28 and, apart from two years, has always been run by this Association. There has always been a Sussex Open held every year since that date, apart from 1928/29 and the war years. Fond memories are still held by these players who played when the tournament was held at the White Rook Pavilion but, due to its refurbishment and new regulations as to height of lights etc, it was necessary to move to his current venue, Hastings Sports Centre and this year marks the 12th year at the Centre. The first winner of the Men's Singles was C. H. Bull and, allowing for the no contest in

heading the list winning four times in all. Nicky Mason is the only player to win three successive titles since Mr Bull back in the old days. On the Ladies front, the Rowe twins dominated each winning the Singles title three times in succession as well as being involved in 10 doubles successes. Ann Haydon had her successes before turning to Lawn Tennis. The late 60s and 70s were dominated by Mary Shannon (Wright) (4 singles wins), Kazensa Mathews (4 wins), Jill Hammersley (3 wins), Karen Witt (4 wins) and not to forget the achievement of Alison Gordon (now Broe) with 9 singles wins including 7 in succession, plus being involved in 11 doubles successes. It is hoped that continued support of the tournament by players and supporters will ensure that the tournament will run for many years to come.

Three new community clubs are set to take off in January, 1996. They are at Holyhead, Rhyl and Llandudno. These are the first clubs in North Wales, with already twenty community clubs already formed in South Wales. The potential of new players is enormous to combat the declining number of players in the leagues.

NEW SEASON

New Hopes



THE FOCUS SPORTS PROGRAMME INTRODUCED IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE SPORTS COUNCIL HAS PRODUCED TREMENDOUS BENEFITS FOR TABLE TENNIS OVER THE LAST 3 YEARS OR SO. ONE OF THESE BENEFITS HAS BEEN THAT WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO TURN THE SPORT FROM ONE WITH A DECLINING GOVERNING BODY MEMBERSHIP TO ONE SHOWING A MODEST INCREASE FOR THE FIRST TIME IN MORE THAN 15 YEARS WRITES **ALAN RANSOME**.

On the 14th July, the Prime Minister, John Major launched the programme entitled "Sport Raising the Game" which was fully explained in a document prepared by the Department of Heritage. If we take full advantage of the opportunities it offers it may be of an even greater benefit to table tennis than the Focus Sport's programme has proved to be.

The fact that we have the Focus Sports Programme in place has given us the qualified and experienced people and the infrastructure to be able to undertake the work involved to implement this new initiative and to be able to reap the benefits from it. From a table tennis point of view there are 3 main advantages.

1. TOP SPORT

This is a scheme previously launched by the Youth Sports Trust and the Sports Council whereby the teaching of selected sports in schools is encouraged by the Government. Table tennis is one of the first sports to be included in this programme. Pilot projects are being tested by the English Schools Table Tennis Association and the ETTA, at the moment the project launch date is April 1st 1996.

The ETTA will be heavily involved in the training of the teachers. The success of the programme will be largely dependant on the involvement and commitment of the teachers in the selected schools and

therefore the uptake may vary throughout the country.

Table tennis has not been able to make a major impact on school sport. The programme provides us with a unique opportunity to do just that.

2. TOP CLUB

The Government have recognised that youngsters who play sport in school do not automatically join a

participating in the Top Sports programme to local clubs and encourage pupils who like the sport to join clubs before leaving school so considerably increasing the likelihood of continuing playing after leaving school. The ETTA have a major role to play in this programme. The Regional Development Officers are already locating and encouraging local clubs who have the facilities and are willing and able to accept

members into our clubs from youngsters who have already gained the enthusiasm for table tennis from playing at school.

The Top Club programme could have 3 stages, stage one is detailed above, the second stage would be for a club to provide advance coaching and local league play for the youngsters who have progressed through the first stage. The third stage would be excellence coaching and local league top division play plus higher level match play including British League, County programmes and tournaments. Opportunities should also be provided for youngsters to be introduced to and encouraged to take up coaching, umpiring and administration. The Top Club programme should swell the numbers of players joining table tennis clubs and should in turn increase the numbers participating in our sport in both local leagues and casual players within our club structure.

3. TABLE TENNIS ACADEMY

One of the main points of the Prime Minister's statement and the one that gained the most headlines in the national press was the establishment of a sports academy for the country's sporting top prospects. The exact form that this will take is not decided and consultations will take place in the next month or two with all

club to play outside school hours or continue playing that sport after they have left school. Therefore the Youth Sports Trust and the Sports Council have established the Top Club programme with the objective of linking schools particularly ones

new young members to enrol for this programme. It is envisaged that clubs would offer junior coaching and Woolwich Junior Match League play weekly for the new members. This programme in itself would ensure the continuous flow of new

interested parties. On the Continent several table tennis associations including the French, German and Danish have already established Academies where their top young players live, are educated and play table tennis in a residential centre throughout the year. The results of the players who attend these academies have been very impressive. The ETTA have recognised the need for such an academy for some time and are ready to take full advantage of the establishment of such a centre for table tennis excellence at the earliest possible date.

NEW CENTRES

The benefit of the Focus Sport programme and the grants received from the Sports Council, the Foundation for Sports and the Arts, National Lottery and local authorities are now coming into full effect. On July 15th it was my pleasure to open the new Cirencester Table Tennis Centre in Gloucestershire. The Cirencester Centre has been built as a result of a partnership between the Deer Park School and the Cirencester Table Tennis Association. The Centre has been purpose built to accommodate 10 tables and has a specialist lighting and flooring. The facility will be used during the normal school day by the Deer Park School then used in the evenings and the weekends by the Table Tennis Association who have developed a full programme of competitions, and league play, coaching and practise to make full use of time available. The centre cost to build in excess of £300,000 with contributions for the Deer Park School, Sports Council - South West region, Foundation for Sports and the Arts via the ETTA, National Lottery and Cotswold District Council and Cirencester League. I congratulate Development Officer, Bob Davis and his colleagues on their success. This centre will be a major boost for table tennis not just in Cirencester but in Gloucestershire and throughout the South West. Several other official openings are likely to take place in the near future including the Barrow Centre in Cumbria on 22nd September and the

Hyndburn Centre in Lancashire on 23rd September. The Carl Prean Centre in the Isle of Wight is due to open in October and the Sedgefield Centre in County Durham shortly after.

Our National Development team consisting of the National Development committee, our national development staff, the regional chairman and our regional development officers are all continuing to work hard to promote local schemes. The priorities for the 1995/6 season have been set as the establishment of new and improved facilities in all areas and the expansion of the existing and the establishment of new Woolwich Junior Leagues throughout the country.

IAN MARSHALL ITTF ADMINISTRATIVE DIRECTOR

The ITTF have appointed the Grove Team Manager, Ian Marshall as their professional Administrative Director from 25 September 1995. This is a full time position based in the ITTF Head Office in Hastings. His principle task will be to understudy Albert Shipley, the current Secretary-General, who is due to retire at the end of 1995. However, Mr Shipley will retain the title of Secretary-General until the end of the 1996 Olympics as he will be continuing to work for the ITTF on a part-time basis during that period.

I wish Ian every success in his new position. I am sure that his enormous enthusiasm for the sport and the experience that he has gained developing the highly

successful Grove Club he will be a great asset to the ITTF. Ian's move is however certain to have a detrimental effect on the success of the Grove Club itself which is unlikely to be a dominating force in the future that it has been in recent years without his constant efforts.

On the international front the European Youth Championships played in the Netherlands in July produced the expected modest results from an England view point. More needs to be done to give our leading juniors the coaching, experience and encouragement that they need to reach the standards to win honours at international level. The Management Committee via the Vice Chairman Selection, Richard Habgood has established a new junior selection committee who will take the responsibility of developing best talent. The chairman of the new committee will be former national champion, Carole Moore with Donald Parker, Ken Muhr, Jill Harris and Jai Yi Lui appointed as members so far. It will be the committee's intention to increase both the quality and quantity of training for juniors, cadets and under 12's as well as increasing the number of opportunities for international play.

The senior England programme commences with the Joola European Men's league matches against Hungary in Leeds Town Hall on September 5th sponsored by Leeds City Council. From an England point of view three important competitions this season will be the European League Super Division men's and women's and the European Championships in Bratislava in April. However, this

year will have the special significance of being an Olympic year when the selected British players will participate in the European Olympic Qualification tournament which is to be held in Manchester from 10th - 14th January to decide the extra European players who will qualify over and above those who qualify automatically from their World ranking for the Olympic summer games in Atlanta in July 1996. These championships and the World Championship 1997 are being supported by Manchester City Council and jointly organised by Manchester and the ETTA. Mike Watts, the ETTA Events Manager has been appointed a Tournament Director and will relocate his office base to Manchester with immediate effect. We have a very busy season ahead of us and I wish all members a successful and happy one.

ENGLAND'S MEN AND WOMEN AGAIN COMPETE IN SUPER DIVISION OF THEIR RESPECTIVE LEAGUES THIS SEASON.

In the first stage of the league programme England's Men take on newly promoted Hungary on the 5th September at Leeds Town Hall; then travel to Belgium for their 3rd October 1995 fixture against the reigning champions, before returning to Leeds Town Hall on Tuesday 31st October 1995 for the vital match against Austria. (Full details in next month's issue).

England's women start their campaign away to the Netherlands on the 26th of this month, continue with another away fixture against Hungary on the 10th October and then play Belgium at home in early November. (Full details in next month's issue).

It is the results from these first stage matches that determines who plays who, and where for the second stage of the league competition.

EUROPEAN CLUB CUP OF CHAMPIONS

youngest full-time professional. Before he makes money or gets a foreign contract the rough edges seen at The Hague will need smoothing out; it will not be easy, because at 16 he does not have the experience needed at this time.

So how did England's rivals from the continent do so well? Before I attempt to suggest the reasons these were the finishing spots for England in Holland:

JUNIOR BOYS

22nd position, one up on 1994.

JUNIOR GIRLS

23, ten down on 1994.

CADET BOYS

15, six up on 1994.

CADET GIRLS

18, six down on 1994.

have eight of these schools. Germany it seems, has the most successful one at Heidelberg. Here 24 resident youngsters, (10-16 age groups) continue their normal studies but are coached intensively by the German staff coaches from the DTTE.

The fact that the Germans won both the junior boys and cadet events in Holland seems to prove that after years of trying, the Germans are getting it right and will soon be producing not only the odd world star like Jorg Roskopf, but a large batch of star players. What we saw in Holland was Germany threatening to dominate Europe - but not quite on the scale they attempted from 1939 to 1945!

Spain's boys exceeded all expectations. It appears that their Chinese coach is producing winners, but who could have forecast that on the way to the final at The Hague they would capsize both Sweden and Hungary.

How some of the Eastern bloc "new" countries do so well without much sponsorship and scholarship schools is a mystery. How can they afford to send teams of between 14 and 18 players when England the poor relation, has only eleven?

One reason for the England Junior doldrums was exposed at the Birmingham AGM - local leagues and counties voted against the ETTA using half the returned VAT money (£35,000) on junior development and then some would say selfishly deciding to have their modest sums of money returned.

However, a brief look at the Cadets at the Hague - Andrew Baggaley impressed me most. He seems a talented boy, very young, who gets on with his game manfully, instead of staring at his coach when he loses points. I am told he did well at the Six Nations tournament at

Soham when he beat Jesper Dahl of Denmark, a great victory.

At The Hague, he forged a brilliant 19-15 lead in the third in the Italian match, but lost 20-22. He left the court with head held high, a mark of a future winner.

From the team of five England girls at The Hague including the two cadets Lyndsey Thornton and Emma Smith, it was Miss Thornton who seemed to be the most promising, but only just, all five fought hard with very little reward.

With our two senior players Lisa Lomas and Alison Gordon (Broe) nearing retirement, England needs to have excellent juniors coming along to put pressure on the young seniors in waiting - Nicola Deaton, Sally Marling, Linda Radford, Gemma Schwartz and others. The female England quartet at The Hague seem to have a lot of work ahead.

The Dutch can almost take full marks for their organisation. The schedules seemed reasonable. Trying to cope with 700 players is no mean task. The seating in the halls was inadequate - nearly 1,500 watched the team finals, mainly on benches without backrests and the Dutch decided to charge spectators on some of the days at the end of the team event and the individual event. I am sure that did not go down well with the parents. As far as I know, admission has always in the past been free.

DEATH IN BOSNIA

In Bosnia and in all parts of the former Yugoslavia, there is more to worry about - in May, Elvis Alacio the Bosnian No. 4 was killed by a Serbian rocket. His name was amongst the fourteen players named for The Hague tournament.

In the Junior Girls singles, Glenda easily disposed of E. Vali (Estonia) 10,9 and M. Clement (Lux) 14,16 but then met last year's winner Svetlana Ganina (Rus) the defender. Although Glenda initially caused her problems, Ganina's combination bat defence saw her coast home 21-10, 21-11.

The Cadet Boy's singles saw Scott Friday win against G. Ayaz (Tor) - 13,8,9 before meeting a 10-year old from Wales - A. Robertson. Scott won the first 21-16 but was pipped 19-21 in the second. A good start saw him lead 17-13 in the third only to lose concentration and let Robertson in to an 18-17 lead. The inevitable deuce followed with Scott finally winning 23-21. Scott then played the French boy Jean Boisard who was to reach the final and give the German T. Boll, a good game. Boisard's speed around the table was too great in the first and Scott lost 21-16, but he gradually got to grips with the game and was ahead in the second, fell behind but came back to deuce. Boisard's relentless attacking play, however, finally saw him through 23-21.

In the Cadet Girls, Lyndsey Thornton lost to a Lithuanian, L. Stankute -19,-14 and Emma Smith to M. Xiang (Ger) -19,14,15. The Junior Girls saw Shelley Ruocco beat M. Rieder (Aut) 10,16 before losing to E. Shvets (Ukr) -9,-10 and Tracey Davies also lost in two close games in her first round match. The Junior Boys didn't fare well either; after winning his qualifying match, Vince

Avery lost -16,16 to Z. Fejer-Konnerth (Ger) and Terry Young was beaten at the same stage by the Ukranian no. 2 J. Matvejchuk - 17,15,-18. Steven Meddings won his first round against Q. Douberg (Ukr) -

Lyndsey Thornton/Emma Smith did well to beat C. Hof/L. Kooij (Neth) 14,10 and K. Rahotini (Slovakia)/F. Louviaux (Bel) 13,-20,11 before falling to top seeds N. Lapteva/I. Kotikhina (Rus) -14,-13. The Cadet

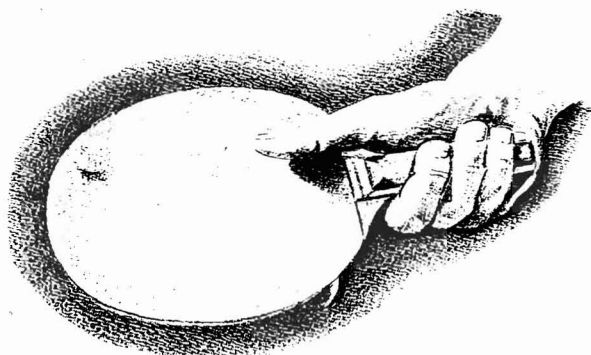

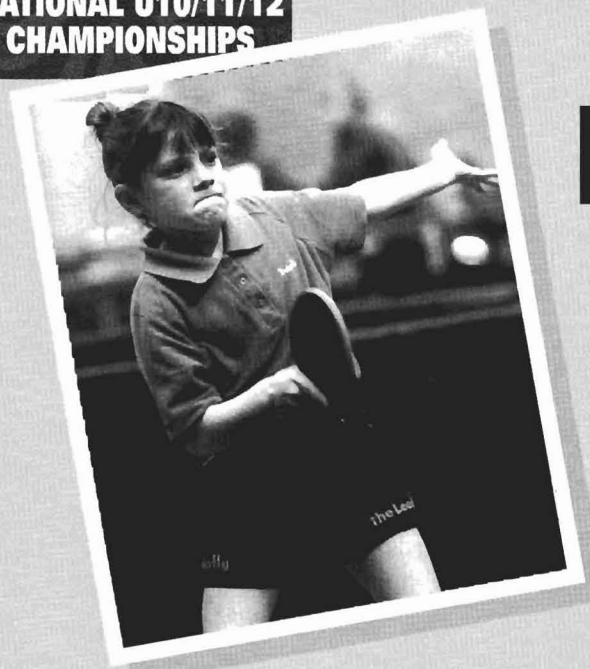
QUICK RETURN

Playwright Simon Block

NOT *a* GAME *for* BOYS

'NOT A GAME FOR BOYS' IS A NEW PLAY ABOUT A TABLE TENNIS TEAM, WRITTEN BY SIMON BLOCK, AND BEING PERFORMED AT THE ROYAL COURT THEATRE, SLOANE SQUARE, LONDON, WRITES **JOHN WOOD.**

This play that whisks you to the heart of all the trials and tribulations of a needle league match runs from the 24th August to 23rd September.

The team consists of three London taxi drivers who are fighting for their lives against relegation and the untold horrors of playing in a lower division. Only a water-tight game-plan can ensure victory, but as the evening progresses team spirit

begins to give way to chaos.

The writer Simon Block, who plays table tennis himself in the Barnet League in North London, actually used to be a Bus Driver of a No. 19 bus whose route went past the theatre in Sloane Square.

The set of the play is based upon the clubhouse at the Barnet Table Tennis Centre.

Simon started writing 'Not a Game for Boys' last summer when his pen was kick-started by the falling standard of his game. So he decided to write about the game he loves instead of playing fulltime.

He said, "Not a Game for Boys' is a comedy that gets progressively darker as the play progresses".

"After I had written the play I met a theatre director Richard

Georgeson, who sent the play to the National Theatre, who liked it. And a rough staging of the play was then performed at the National Theatre Studio. Various people were invited and one was the Literary Manager of the Royal Court Theatre, Graham Wyebrown, who liked what he saw."

"The team's captain 'Eric' who is played by actor Christopher Fairbanks, is a monomaniac, he has to win the match but the evening falls down around him, because 'Oscar', played by Peter Wight, wants to throw his games because he wants the team relegated so he can have an easier life in a lower division. 'Oscar's' action is influenced by the fact that a friend had died the previous week whilst playing a table tennis match, a

death that he witnessed. 'Tony', played by Neil Stuke, who is a mini cab driver, is a younger player who is caught in a watershed, he has to decide which road to go down either Eric's or Oscar's way of life."

Simon Block who is 29 years old is now a full-time writer, with a comedy appearing on Channel 4 next spring, entitled 'After Birth'.

Shelley Ruocco won all her 14 matches. Ryan Jenkins (Glamorgan) lost only once and topped the boys averages with 93% wins.

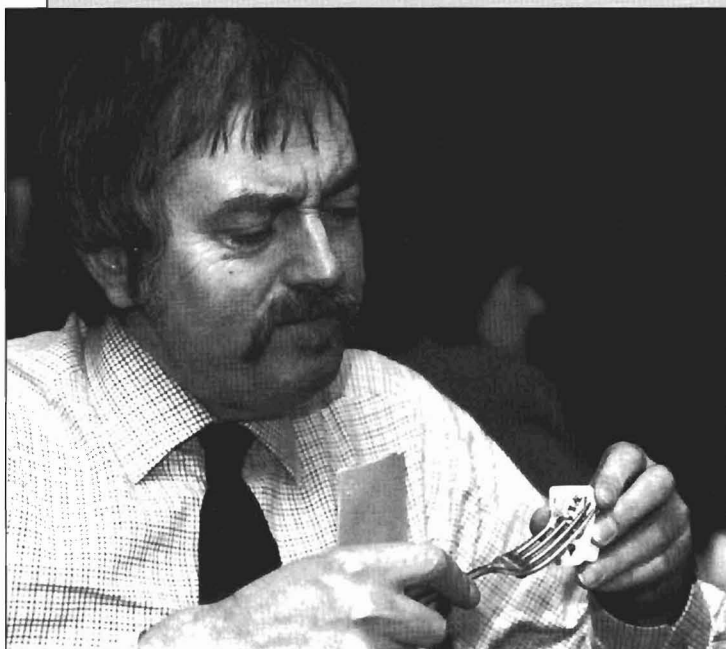

FOND RECOLLECTION OF A
TALENTED SPORTSWOMAN

I was deeply shocked to hear of the death of Vera Thomas (nee Dace) who died suddenly in the early summer, just prior to the start of the 1995 Wimbledon Lawn Tennis Championships in which she had so often been a featured player.

Vera was a child of the twenties with a middle-class upbringing and a bright intelligence. She was blessed with a natural talent for ball games and had a personality that seemed to radiate a joy for life. Her parents devoted their lives to her well-being

championships and became a star on the tennis courts. In many respects there was a similarity between her achievements and those of Ann (Haydon) Jones, another great two-sports champion, although Vera never quite reached Ann's eminence at Lawn Tennis. However, the devotion of her parents over the years was rewarded by her outstanding achievements.

its collateral Table tennis. I can vividly remember her winning the singles title of the Beckenham Open Lawn Tennis Championships in 1946, when, in the final, she beat Betty Nuthall, a famous name in Tennis circles. The Beckenham tournament is one of England's prestigious 'grass tournaments' that take place just before Wimbledon. Its honours list is studded with the names of tennis greats such as John McEnroe, Jimmy Connors, Billie Jean King and Martina Navratilova.

It would appear that Beckenham had a magic appeal for Vera, as in August 1947, she married A.H.Thomas, a local cricketer of some renown. That year she also reached the semi-final of the World Table Tennis Championships in Paris and helped England win the Corbillon Cup. Married life must have had a stimulating effect on her for in 1948, she reached the singles final of the World TT Championships, won the Women's Doubles title in partnership with Peggy Franks and gained another gold medal in the Corbillon Cup team competition. For good measure she then received automatic selection for the Wimbledon Lawn Tennis Championships.

The next big occasion in Vera's life came with the birth of her daughter, after which her commitment to table tennis seemed to fade. For those who saw her play in her heyday, she will be remembered for her searing left-handed forehand drive executed with a balance and a follow through straight out of the text book. Coupled with her attacking skills she had a fine chop defence and a sound temperament.

She continued to play Lawn tennis, mainly for pleasure, at the All England Tennis Club - Wimbledon and the only consolation that can be drawn from her sudden death is that she did not suffer the afflictions and indignities of old age.

KEN EDWARDS

The sudden death of Ken Edwards at the age of 73, a few weeks after he had been playing in league matches, has shocked the local table tennis community. Forty-one years earlier, Ken had won the Norwich and District Table Tennis League's singles championship, and at that time was already a member of the league's committee.

Ken contributed table tennis notes to the sports pages of the Easter Daily Press and

Easter Evening News for many years. He was a keen amateur footballer and cricketer until comparatively late in life.

Following upon the many years of good service provided by the late Harold Betts, and by Lennie Miller, Ken took over the honorary secretaryship of the Norwich and District League in 1983. In view of the demands made upon him by his work in the roofing industry, he made it clear that he would accept the secretary's job only on a temporary basis. In the event, he carried on until the last, assisted by his good friends Dennis and Margaret Calver (chairman and treasurer) and by other stalwarts.

Whilst Ken was secretary, one of the greatest achievements of the league, the building of the Miller Hall (instigated by Lennie, after whom it was named) was completed in 1985. It now provides accommodation for about 20 matches a week during the season and for cup matches, friendly matches and, of course, British League matches. Needless to say a great deal of coaching, the most important element of all, goes on in the Miller Hall also. During Ken's tour of duty, five international matches were allocated to the city by the ETTA. Ken invariably attended local meetings, county meetings and table tennis tournaments large and small. He rarely missed any festive occasion, whether run by the ETTA or locally, that was associated with the game he was so fond of. More importantly, though, he knew everyone associated with his league, liked 95% of them, was tolerant of the rest, and had an insatiable appetite for getting things done. As well as doing his administrative work, Ken Edwards was, until almost the end of his days, delivering magazines, lugging tables on and off lorries and doing other menial jobs that had to be done. Assisted by his dedicated fellow-workers, Ken has brought pleasure to thousands. He was a kind, generous and convivial man, whose death will sadden not only his family but the whole table tennis fraternity and many others.

It is with much sadness to announce the death of D.S. Purr who was a Vice President of the ETTA for a number of years.

D.S. Purr died peacefully at home on 28th July 1995, after a relatively short period of illness, five months short of his 95th birthday.

and strove to give her advantages that would bring success and a high quality of life. At an early age she took elocution lessons and then had private tuition at the piano. Actually Vera became quite an accomplished pianist and I remember her playing Beethoven's 'Moonlight' Sonata with deftness of touch and feeling. I have no idea how she first became involved with ball games, as she was a star in her own right when I first met her. I would surmise, however, that she was influenced by her father who kept a tight reign on her activities.

It is quite remarkable for a teenage girl to reach the top rung in two sports but Vera took it all in her stride and in the 1939/40 season she won the English Open TT Championship. The War must have had a detrimental effect on her progress as she lost at least five years of competitive play. After the War, Vera won three gold medals in World table tennis

I first met Vera in the late thirties when I joined the Denmark Hill Lawn Tennis Club and as teenagers we became close friends. In addition to ball games we shared several interests and together went to music recitals and the London Theatre. At this period of her life I was always aware of the influences her father had on her young life and how he directed his own energies to make her a champion. He would spend hours trying to improve her tennis strokes even to the extent of throwing balls across the net to make her stretch and play difficult angled shots. He was her chaperone, guide, coach and mentor.

In 1940 I joined the Royal Air Force and except for the occasional exchange of letters we lost touch. How Vera kept up her high standards of play in wartime London I do not know, but keep them up she did. When the War ended and major tournaments started again, she won titles at both Lawn tennis and

AS THE NEW SEASON BEGINS, I THOUGHT IT APPROPRIATE TO CONSIDER THE ROLE OF THE COACH AND I BELIEVE THAT THERE IS ONE FACTOR THAT EVERY GOOD COACH SHOULD HAVE UPPERMOST IN THEIR MINDS AT THIS TIME OF YEAR - AND THAT IS PROGRAMME PLANNING WRITES GAIL MCCULLOCK.

No matter at what level the coach is working and regardless of the ability or potential of the players, the coach

must have a clear vision of what is to be the aim for the season. (With better players, the plan may be more long term - 3-5 years)

The plan must be realistic and therefore different for most players. Individual plans need to be negotiated between player and coach (and maybe agreed by parents). The ambitions and attitudes of the individuals will influence the targets that can be set. Training programmes cannot be planned until agreement of the targets has been reached.

Hans Soova, the coach at the Leeds Centre for Excellence, sent me a leaflet which highlights 4 important areas that both coach and

player would do well to consider at the start of a new season.

As Hans says, in his quest to get players to commit to excellence: "It takes more than potential to reach for the peak of sporting achievements. It takes dedication, discipline and determination and almost unnatural single-mindedness."

Hopefully, you, the coach can help your players with constructive programme planning, to achieve their full potential.

Preliminary Regional Trials are imminent (Oct 21/22), Final Regional Trials are scheduled for Dec 16/17 with National Trials and The Masters in February (3/4 and 24/25 respectively). Coaches please ensure

that your players understand that these competitions are all stages of the same Event ie The Trials. A commitment is required to play throughout the event and not just in part of it. If for some good reason a player is unable to fulfil his commitment at any stage of the event, they must have the good manners to notify the organiser so that replacements can be found if appropriate.

It is one of the duties of the coach to teach players that withdrawal without notification is not acceptable in any ETTA event.

She then played Anna McNamara, who had earlier beaten Trudie Bloor in a nail-biting 'deuce in the third' encounter. James Wakelam was beaten by

Andrew Baggaley and Robert Pountney met Andrew in the semi after beating the Welsh number 1, Stephen Jenkins. The English lads had a classic match which Andrew won 18,-21,20. In the other half, Scott Friday was beaten by unseeded Dominic McGreevey who then beat his Irish counterpart and top seed Alan Monks in the semi before winning the final against Baggaley. England monopolised the Under 15 events with all 4 semi-finalists in both girls and boys events. In the girls, Jo Bush-Harris beat the top 2 seeds to reach the semi, but couldn't get past the eventual winner Claire

The remaining 7 were Robert Pountney, Paul Pountney, Adam Laws, Matthew Stilwell, Anna McNamara, Sarah Lane and Vicky Lampkin. Gail McCullough and Bernard Rowley who was 'Chauffeur' for most of the trip went also. They firstly travelled to Edinburgh. The first hour involved training with some of their players, while the next few hours involved friendly matches vs. Senior A team. FACT OR FANTASY

The World Championship has come and gone. China has resurrected again as the power of the cellulite ball game taking all 7 titles at stake. Who would doubt their ability to be a force into the next century.

For both the team events, if China were given the honour of entering a second team in the next world championships, do you think we would be watching an all-china final?

Fact or fantasy? Has anyone ever thought what lies behind their success? Long-term strategy!

Sweden has ruled the world stage for the past 6 years because they have exceptional talents in Waldner, Appelgren and Persson. But where is the continuity? In football, Liverpool FC had proven in the early 80s they were successful because they had continuity in the team. The team was ageing under manager Kenny Dalglish just like China was ageing under Li Fu Rong. Does that apply to Sweden now? What about England? Fact or Fantasy?

It is a shame for England to drop a placing (12th to 13th) in the world standing and coming out second best in the Commonwealth when there are so many talented young stars waiting to fly the flag with blood, sweat and tears. Bringing in Chen was a knock on the Englishman's ego. Making himself not available for certain games is inexcusable when others would pay to represent their motherland. But making Chen the scapegoat would be wrong too. The administrators in the ETTA should know that Chen comes from an Asian culture where he is brought up never to play against his countrymen (for another team?). In other words, a person never bites the hand that feeds them. Chen would have developed our game to new heights with this knowledge and experience. Who can pass on the knowledge and experience of being in a world championship winning team besides Chen? A theoretical coach? I do not doubt the ability of qualified coaches but can they pass on the much-needed experience never having played at the very top level?

Running a post-mortem on the England team performance from an "outsider's" point of view, we need a long-term plan. Even at the expense of going backwards now in order to move forward in the future. We need:

a) more "practical" coaches than "theoretical" ones

- b) specialists in rubbers and glues
 - c) several coaches - each specialising in their own field ie. long pimples, short pimples, rough pimples, pimples inward, antispin, tacky rubbers etc.
 - d) "odd" and awkward players
 - e) tactician ie. good reader of the game
 - f) marketing personnel to sell the game
- a) If a coach is unable to return a spinshot, how can they explain the characteristics of a slow loop against a fast spin practically? This is where players like Chen, Douglas, Preat and Cooke can turn into good "practical" coaches.

b) One can see from the British National League that most players love to play the fast attacking game. But can any player in the top 20 ranking explain the characteristics of a shot being hit from various types of rubbers as listed in c)? Only a minority! China has always sprung surprises at every world championship: High toss, tacky rubbers, magic bat, antispin, hidden services, etc. Are we behind in this area?

d) Has anyone ever thought why China produces a left-handed player (Wang Tao), right-handed (Ma Wenge), defensive (Ding Song) and pen-grip (Lin Guoliang) in the top 20 ranking in the world? Can any player say they have over 50% chance.

TABLE TENNIS FROM THE SEYCHELLES

My wife and I, both keen league players in the Southampton and Bournemouth areas, recently took a vacation on Mahe', the principal island of the Seychelles, to visit our relatives. Naturally we took our bats and playing gear as one should on all occasions just in case an opportunity to play should arise. To begin with we pestered local hotels

to see whether we might be able to use their facilities to practise, but for various reasons we met with little success.

Fortunately, my wife persevered and discovered that there were facilities at the Roche Caiman Centre which is an extensive sports complex built quite recently to host the Indian Ocean games. We were told that we could have use of their tables for 10 rupees an hour (about £1.40), but when we arrived we were treated like visiting dignitaries, allowed to select our table and with all halogen lights burning we commenced practising in their International Table Tennis arena complete with all the quality accessories.

On our second and subsequent visits, the Seychelles team was there practising and to

our amazement and delight, we were invited to participate in their practise and friendly games. They seemed as pleased for us to join in with them as we were. We soon learnt that they had limited opportunities to compete against other players outside their own group, except in officially organised events and this was evident as at any one time there is only a handful of players on the Island. By English standards their best players are about Division One, possibly lower Premier, but many were also youngsters still learning their skills.

If any table tennis buffs are going to the Seychelles on holiday, our advice is take your gear because you will be sure of an exceedingly warm welcome from their team and coaches and guaranteed a great time. We didn't come back with such a good tan as we would have liked but our forehand and backhand drives are like sun-creamed lightning! The Seychelles team are desperate to play against as many players as they can to improve their techniques, so whatever your skill level they will be delighted to see you. For more information either call Frances Remmy at the Roche Caiman Centre when you arrive on 323908 X 233 (8pm to 4pm) or the junior coach Mr Jimmy Vel 323755 (between 10pm and 11pm). But be warned, the temperature is around 30°C so take it easy and take a towel for the cold shower afterwards plus your own (cold) drinks as these are not always available at the centre, especially in the evenings. TRUTHS

There are certain self-evident 'truths' in coaching, but one, not explicitly stated in the Coaching Manual but with which no-one can really disagree, is that coaches should work together - co-operate - in the best interests of the pupils in order to try to ensure that players realize their potential. To restate this as an individual responsibility, a coach has an obligation (secondary to being concerned with pupils' overall well-being), to help pupils optimise their performance potential - provided the pupil themselves want this. Included in this responsibility must be to raise pupils' awareness of what their playing potential is and the opportunities available for fulfilling it, and to encourage pupils to follow these avenues, even if or when it means 'letting (them) go'. (There is a reciprocal obligation owed by more advanced level coaches to their basic level peers to work/liaise with them, and not to cut off new recruits from their coaching roots.) Underpinning this, however, it is essential that grass roots coaches have a conception,

vision or understanding of what the modern game, as played by highly skilled performers, is about, even if they cannot teach to that standard: a (player's) feel of the 'bite' as you 'launch' a 'loaded' loop or 'throw in' a 'fizzy' serve, (or of the delicate lightness of the ball as you 'touch' a 'tight' return), an ear for the sweet 'crack' of a flat kill or sharp flick, a hunter's or strategist's psyche in 'seeking out' that loose/right ball. In other words an image (if not experience) of what it is like to play at that level and therefore what a player has to do to get there. If they are coaching blind, how can coaches start their pupils in a way that facilitates progression? How can they recognise and advise a pupil that has it in him/her to go much further (than the local school/club/league)? How can they give that pupil a vision of what to aim for; of what he/she could do with his/her potential? Grass roots coaches perform a vital role in bringing in players to the game and holding them. But in order to make more than a chance contribution towards the raising of standards, they need a vision and understanding of top level play and a preparedness to pass appropriate pupils on to the next level of the path towards excellence. And having a wider view of their place and role in the overall coaching structure in co-operation with others will, I believe, encourage many motivated coaches to make their sessions more imaginative and demanding, thereby enhancing the interest and enthusiasm of their charges. Coaches, like pupils, are often capable of very much more than they imagine.

In this letter I have been expressing a private view and I have not meant to imply that there are not very many coaches doing an excellent job. However, as well as training new coaches, I believe there is a national need for 'inservice' updating, so that playing standards can continue to rise from a current low. There are too few top local players aged 18-30 who can act as role models for a new generation (and of these, too few are becoming coaches). If youngsters cannot see from others what they have to aspire to to be good, they should at least be properly advised by coaches working collaboratively within the coaching scheme.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS

At the time of writing, Dorset are struggling to find anyone willing to run our one senior team this season. This is because of the difficulty involved in finding two lady players who are willing and able to play. There are always sufficient men available, but never enough women to represent the county.

Several years ago we proposed a rule change to reduce the number of women to one per team, as per the Veteran's Divisions, but we were unable to gain sufficient support from other counties, despite general agreement with much of our reasoning.

It appears to be that if a county has sufficient women who wish to play for them they vote to retain the present system, whilst those counties like ourselves with insufficient women, vote for a change.

I would perhaps now suggest that a separate women's County Championship be run alongside the men's, and then counties can decide how many teams they can field without the men and/or ladies being disadvantaged.

BRITISH LEAGUE

Joliffe Poole will be in the second division south west of the British League again this season with matches against Cheltenham, Horsham, Kingshurst, Sheffield, St Neots, Launceston and Leckie in prospect.

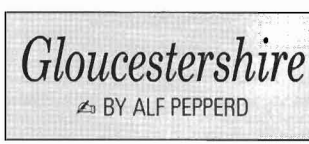
the County AGM with a typically warm and generous speech.

There were no important changes to our County Committee at the A G M which adds to the stability of the County. Ray Drew after many years as Vice Chairman stepped up to Chairman as Geoff Keer has to move over the border. Our main problem area is that of Secretary for the Junior 1st team. In spite of letters to the local papers and direct to all possible 1st team Juniors plus numerous phone calls so far there is absolutely no

response from anyone. I have threatened withdrawal of this team and then stand by and expect comments from the little darlings' parents who expect everything to be done without having to do anything themselves. Unfortunately my committee have ruled that this team must continue, so somehow us few will have to cope.

Both junior teams, our one senior team and one of the veteran's teams are being 'weekended' so we will not be seeing many of our players in action at home this season. A 3rd veteran's team was possible as there are many now available but once again no one was prepared to act.

Money-wise, our Treasurer has raised about £400 virtually by herself by arranging a jumble sale, charity stall in Norwich and a marathon. Superb individual performances from Keith Jones and Margaret Maltby, plus a vintage doubles from Michael Edwards and Ray Kingston, carved Northants Veteran Firsts a 5-4 victory over Lancashire Seconds and clinched the Division 2A title with a 100% record for the season.

Lancashire went two up before Jones opened the Northants scoring with an easy win over Barry Crook, and then he teamed up with Maltby to gain a third end mixed doubles success. Edwards and Kingston then gained a straight games win in the doubles, and after her game had gone to expedite at fifteen all

in the third, Mrs Maltby made it four in a row. Brian Clements pulled one back for the visitors, but Jones was not to be denied his moment of triumph and completed a memorable win with a 21-16, 21-10 success over Derek Watmough.

In the first semi-final of the Ram Sports Challenge Trophy, Thrapston displayed its strength in depth, by providing both sides. The Rovers always held an apparent advantage, with David Hoddle's surprise win over Steve West almost emulated by Geoff Atkinson, but a three nil, and then a four three deficit, were finally overcome by the Hotspurs, with singles from West, Alan Ashberry, Gerald Finney and Viv Smiley being eventually supplemented by a West/Finney doubles.

Norhampton's Doddridge had a painless passage to the final, but at Glamin Hall they were soon trailing to West and Finney, and could have gone further behind if Gary Webb hadn't recovered to take Ashberry in the third, especially as Rob Davies had been somewhat fortunate to get a close decision over Mrs Smiley.

The fifth singles was crucial, and Webb completed the individual performance of the day to beat West 18 and 21, and though Finney remained defiant, Davies and Kris Asnong with scintillating attacking displays made sure of the Ram Sports Trophy for Doddridge.

Donna Furniss, Clem Little, Murial Cox and Viv Smiley had all won five of their six games, but to take the title they had to win a sixth, and to hold a win over the other player ending with six successes.

Earlier Clem Little had produced the shock of the day when she had beaten County singles champion Donna Furniss in straight fames, but then Little had gone down to Murial Cox - 21,18,16, leaving Mrs Cox in pole position, for the fourth contender Viv Smiley had already been well-beaten by Miss Furniss.

However, true to form in this enthralling event, Mrs Smiley hit through the tight defence of Mrs Cox to win comfortably, and the scene was set for an intriguing finish. With the final two rubbers played simultaneously, fortunes ebbed and flowed as Little played Smiley and Furniss encountered Cox - all four players aware that ultimate success not only depended on winning their own game, but also on the result on the adjoining table.

For most of the opening end, Smiley held an advantage over Little, while in the Furniss/Cox clash, the lead changed hands on numerous occasions, but late claw-backs saw Little and Furniss take one game advantages. A similar pattern recurred in the second, until

Smiley's attack wavered against Little's unerring accuracy and the Furniss power just got her home by the minimum margin against Mrs Cox.

Six wins each for Clem Little and Donna Furniss, but Little's earlier victory over Furniss became decisive, and it was Clem Little who took the Queensberry Scimitar Trophy for the first time.

At the other end of the scale, it was almost as close, with Kath Walsh having the mortification of beating Chris Howell, only to see Howell finish three places above her, while Ruth Hoddle's 19,-22,19 win over Garielle Evans also determined the final placings.

At the end of last season, Higham Band's Andy Trott, Chris Handshaw, Richard Elliott and Adrian Roper easily held on to Wellingborough's Premier Division, but as anticipated failed to complete the customary double, when the Kettering League's corresponding section went for the first time to Team Electric, whose Ian Hawes, Julian Marshall and Steve West, beat Higham twice in the final week of the season, to take the title.

Hawes reached the final after a series of swift straight game successes, as did Elliott, until at the penultimate stage, he lost the middle end to colleague Chris Handshaw. This obstacle safely negotiated, Elliott made a valiant effort to end Hawes' winning run, but the champion had the edge in both power and resolve, and after Elliott had fought back to level at deuce in the second, Hawes kept his nerve and the title.

Hawes and West also held on to the Men's Doubles, after a close tussle with an inspired Geoff Atkinson and Ian Selater, who had earlier hit through top seeds Elliott and Handshaw to claim a place in the final.

It was quite a day for Atkinson who reached five finals and ended on top in three of them. He had been expected to win both the veteran doubles with Gordon Shaw and the Over 50s Singles at the first time of asking, but a mixed doubles victory partnered by a tenacious Jenna Ashberry after clear cut wins against both top seeds had to be seed to be believed.

Miss Ashberry also had good reason to be delighted with her day's work, for her dependability was not only the foil for Atkinson's flashing blade, but also for the accurate attacking play of Viv Smiley, as the unseeded pair gained an easy win in the Women's doubles.

For Mrs Smiley, it was so near and yet so far, going down -22 in a semi-final decider in the mixed, and then after featuring in a superb singles final, just failing to match an outstanding display from Jane Johnston, who took her third title after a gap of eight years. Gordon Shaw's day began badly when he lost in the singles to Alan Ashberry after taking the second round encounter to expedite, but it ended on a high note with Shaw retaining his Veteran Singles title, and the corresponding doubles event. He was also in winning vain in the Premier Division Handicap, when in one of the best matches of the day, he held on to his five point advantage to beat Ian Hawes (-3) on a third game deuce.

Normally such events would bring the season's reporting to an end, but on this occasion, the season, and a complete era, ended with the passing of Gwil Evans, Northants Development Officer.

I had the privilege of taking the service at the Kettering Crematorium with County Chairman Ken Marshant paying a glowing tribute and Wellingborough's Development Officer David Marsh reading the psalm.

It was so pleasing to see so many representatives, not only from local table tennis, but from farther afield coming to pay their respects, and it was indicative of Gwil's enthusiastic involvement in the game, that coach John Burlston from Milton Keynes, and Regional Development Officer Harold Taylor were part of the congregation.

Northants Table Tennis will not be the same without Gwil Evans, and the long winter evenings will pass more slowly without his articulate phone calls stretching deep into the night. The deepest sympathy of all the county's players and officials goes to his wife and family.

This move to Brighton will help to answer the growing number of complaints that almost all the table tennis events were being staged North of the Thames.

Keith Jackson retained his position as chairman of the Sussex TTA at a five-hour annual meeting on July 23. Keith has brought in several sponsorships for Sussex tournaments and has also started a very successful 200 Club that has helped the Sussex finances reach a very respectable level of £44833, a complete reversal of the trends that were being forecast last season - treasurer Laurie Holland is now a happy man.

All the other officers held their posts, except for two - Brian Keeley has pulled out of the veteran's secretary job and a vacancy still exists, whilst Dave Berriman takes over the coaching secretary's post from Peter Burdook who will still continue to provide facilities at the Newman School, Hove.

A new six or seven table venue has blossomed at Eastbourne - the Shinewater Club, where David Berriman and Jim West have already run several coaching courses. The centre will also house the Eastbourne Woolwich Junior League this season and in all probability be used for some tournaments.

Mark Smith (Bradford) took two 'gold's' in the B19 Team Event and the BD with Vince Aver'y (Essex), while also striking gold in the Team Events were Phil Neal (Hull) - B19, Zoe Fisher (Hull) - G19, Nicola Silburn (Leeds) - G16 and Emma Smith (Selby) - G16, with odd one out David Smith (Huddersfield) nevertheless contributing to his team's B16 runners-up spot behind Scotland.

At the opposite end of the scale Yorkshire's 'golden oldies' showed their paces against continental opposition in the European Veteran Championships held in Vienna as Keith Powell (Ossett) - Vic Smith (Ripon) took bronze medals in the 50+ MD after dismissing the second seeds in an earlier encounter, while Cleeve Judson, also from Ossett, and now semi-retired from our sport, dusted his bat off and played brilliantly to reach the last eight of the 50+ MS.
