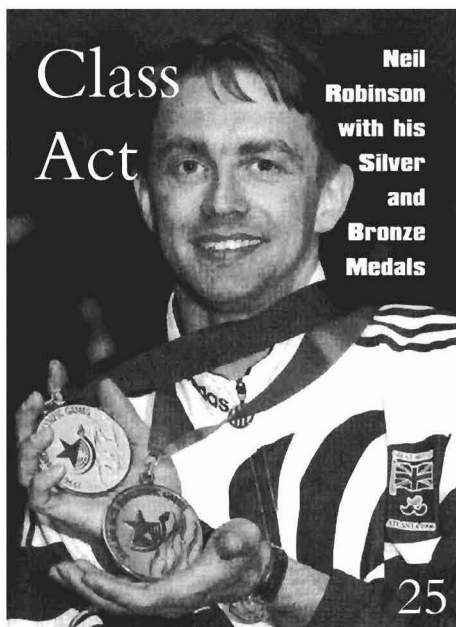

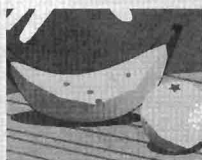

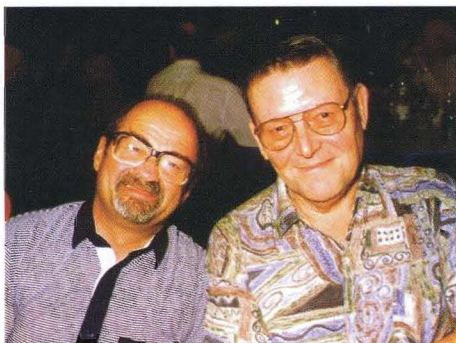

# FAREWELL to Jack & Dave



**DUE TO FAILING EYESIGHT TWO OF TABLE TENNIS' FAVOURITE UMPIRES, JACK MELNICK AND DAVE PERRY, RETIRED AT THE PENIEL 5 STAR, IN SEPTEMBER.**

Jack Melnick, 63 years old from Wembley in London, started umpiring in 1966 when Doreen Stannard suggested he try the County Umpires paper, the rest is history. "I've done everything in umpiring, including two World Championships, one in Yugoslavia and one in Sweden, plus the Olympics in Barcelona. So I feel that I've had a full umpiring life!" explained Jack.

We have not seen the last of Jack, because he will be a Table Manager at the World Championships in Manchester.

Dave Perry, 60, from North Kensington in West London, started umpiring 27 years ago, at the English Juniors as a county umpire.

Dave umpired at the World Championships in 1977 in Birmingham, where he had the honour of umpiring the Women's Singles Final assisted by Jack Melnick.

"We had a lot of bother in this final between a Chinese lady and a Korean, the Chinese supporters

were not happy when Jack foul served the Chinese lady. Seven years later when Jack and I were umpiring at a Midlands 3 Star tournament, we went for a Chinese meal in the Shirley Temple Chinese restaurant in Shirley, Birmingham. When we walked in, the Chinese waiter said that he remembered Jack because he had foul served his favourite lady player!" said Dave.

Both Jack and Dave will be sorely missed, but Peniel have kindly invited them both to next year's tournament for the Saturday night dinner.

On behalf of English Table Tennis I wish to thank Jack and Dave for their many years dedication to the game we all love, and hope that during their years of retirement they can look back on many pleasant times that they spent in England and overseas - John Wood, Editor.

## SPORTS COPS?

Sports Law Research Centre in "Pole Position" Anglia Polytechnic University (APU) has launched a designated sports law research centre - the first of its kind in the UK. Based at APU's Anglia Law School in Chelmsford, the new research centre has been created to provide greater understanding of the Law in relation to the sporting world.

Anglia Sports Law Research Centre will be run by a team of six sports law enthusiasts, all with proven track records in existing research and publication. It has a formal collaboration agreement with the National Sports Law Institute based at Marquette Law School in Milwaukee (USA), the premier sports law research organisation in North America, as well as similar contact internationally.

The centre will look at the legal values which can contribute to the running and organisation of modern sport. Law plays a crucial role in regulating sport, with many ethical issues to be determined concerning the relationship between sport and the law. Sports law interrelates various disciplines in such areas as: contract, taxation, employment, competition and criminal law, and the field of legal scholarship is a highly dynamic and quickly expanding one.

# SINGLE VENUE

## MANCHESTER ORGANISING COMMITTEE PROPOSE A SINGLE VENUE AT G-MEX



**THE WEAKEST POINT OF OUR PROPOSAL MADE TO THE ITTF IN DECEMBER 1994 WAS TO HOLD THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN TWO SEPARATE VENUES IN MANCHESTER CITY CENTRE, THE NYNEX ARENA ON THE NORTHERN SIDE OF THE CITY AND G-MEX TO THE SOUTH, APPROXIMATELY ONE MILE APART**  
**WRITES ALAN RANSOME**

A new proposal has now been formulated centring everything at one venue, the G-Mex Exhibition Centre. This has been made possible by the addition of some large temporary buildings which were used by the Interhome Exhibition last May and which will be used again for the 1997 exhibition. Interhome's dates follow immediately after the World Championships. These temporary buildings will be large enough to house the practice hall with 30 tables, changing rooms, facilities for drug testing, gluing and glue testing, offices, hospitality suites and the large exhibition which is always a feature of the World Championships. In addition, both the players and the umpires' lounges will be included and probably all of the eating facilities for the players and officials meals. G-Mex itself has a Conference Centre annexed onto the main building which will provide an ideal Press Centre and facilities for VIP hospitality. The temporary building which is to be used for the practise hall was tested by Alan Cooke and Nicola Deaton and found to be up to championship standard. This leaves the main hall to be used exclusively for the 44 match tables. There will be four show courts with a total of 5,000 seats and a TV gantry, eight second show courts with 1,000 seats and a large third playing area with 32 match courts, all of which will have seating immediately behind each table.

I discussed the single venue option with the ITTF Executive Committee in Atlanta. They produced a number of questions and an ITTF delegation consisting of ITTF Vice President, Hans Giesecke and Ian Marshall visited Manchester on Wednesday, 17th September to view the

facilities at G-Mex and discuss the details. The ITTF representatives were satisfied with our proposals and are recommending acceptance at the next ITTF Executive Committee meeting in Hong Kong at the end of this month. There is no doubt that the single venue will be more convenient for all the participants and will avoid the perception of two tournaments, one for the best players and one for the rest. The concept of a centre court with four tables and seating close to the tables on all four sides will produce a terrific atmosphere. The only possible downside could be the shortage of seats for those who do not book ahead. The ticket pricing has been provisionally decided and full details are

expected to be available within the next month. Pricing will be reasonable throughout.

England have started well in the European League. The men defeated Turkey in St Austell in the Joola Men's League by 4 sets to 0 in a match that was much closer than the scoreline suggests. Matthew Syed, Alan Cooke and Alex Perry all played well. This match was sponsored by the Restormal Borough Council. England women also won 4-0 against a weak Italian team at Warwick, sponsored by Warwick District Council. With both the top two Italian girls missing, the Italians were outclassed by Lisa Lomas and Andrea Holt. Nicola Deaton who was given the opportunity to make an important start in her bid to replace Alison Broe, who is expecting a baby later in the season, also did well.

Within this column I have been writing about several Government/Sports Council initiatives of which table tennis has been able to take advantage. The main benefits so far through the Focus Sports programme has been the Facilities

programme and the 100+ Woolwich Junior Leagues. With Lottery revenue funding being available shortly, there is an enormous amount going on now behind the scenes and we are working very closely with all the relevant agencies to ensure that table tennis is in the best position possible at the appropriate time. 1997 will be the year when most of this comes to fruition.

One scheme that has started is the Youth Sport Trust "Top Sport" programme and table tennis has been included in the schemes going into the primary schools across several local authorities. This scheme will certainly gain momentum in 1997. The link to Top Sport is the "Top Club" programme. Here the ETTA is looking to appoint approximately 1,000 school clubs, 400 participation clubs, 200 advanced and 50 excellence clubs. It is possible for a club to qualify for more than one level. The Youth Sports Trust are launching a pilot programme before the end of this year and the following areas have been selected for inclusion: Yorkshire & Humberside: Scarborough, Leeds, Kirklees, Bradford. Northern: Cumbria (Barrow and Kendal), Middlesbrough, Darlington, Newton Aycliffe. South East: Surrey (Guildford). North West: Manchester, Cheshire, Lancashire (Hyndburn). Southern: Isle of Wight, Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire (Milton Keynes). East Midlands: Nottinghamshire. Eastern: Suffolk, Hertfordshire.

Facility programmes are continuing apace. The Director of the Yorkshire & Humberside Sports Council, Cyril Villiers, opened the new YPI Table Tennis Centre in Hull in July. This centre, with space for 5 match tables or 9 practice tables, cost in the region of £225,000 to build and was supported by the Hull YPI itself, the Foundation for Sports & the Arts via the ETTA and the National Lottery. Terry Sutton is the main co-ordinator from the YPI viewpoint, assisted by Yorkshire Development Officer, Ray Burch. The YPI and the Hull League have both been heavily involved in the development.

Approximately half a million pounds has been invested to build the new

Cippenham Club in Slough with contributions from the Westgate School, the Foundation for the Sports & Arts via the ETTA, the Department of Education Funding for Schools programme, the Sports Council and the National Lottery. The Centre is due to open in October and will have space for 8 match tables and 15 practice tables. The Slough League Chairman, Graham Trimming and headmistress, Wendy Armstrong have been the main innovators behind this scheme.

The Table Tennis Centre at the Laurence Sherrif School in Rugby is due to open shortly. This has been a joint venture between the school and the newly formed Rugby League. It will be suitable for 9 match tables and 16 coaching tables. The previous Regional Development Officer for the West Midlands, Sandra Roden was heavily involved in the development of this scheme together with Head Teacher, Ray Pogson and Andy Jarvis of Rugby Table Tennis Club.

Another scheme which recently commenced building is the Bishop Reindorp School in Guildford which, when completed, will have 8 tables. The cost of this development will be close to half a million pounds and it should be ready in the Spring of 1997. Funding for this programme has been provided by the school itself, Surrey County Council, the Foundation for Sports & the Arts via the ETTA and the National Lottery. The main movers of this scheme have been John Maton, Head Teacher, ETTA Vice Chairman Coaching Gail McCulloch who is Head of PE at the school and Ken Lemon of Challoner Hall TTC which will be responsible for the management of the extensive table tennis programme.

There are several other schemes in the pipeline across the country, some of which are awaiting the Sports Council announcement to say that 80% funding will be available from the National Lottery for school based programmes. ETTA Facilities Officer Paul Baker, has been heavily involved in the development of all the above projects.

I have played many players of the calibre ranked between 50 and 600 and I am sure that playing in the National League will keep up my performance to the highest level. If you wish to know about my record, REJECTS will tell you of my calibre and verify that the only reason I cannot play for them this season is because of too many members.

### GRAND PRIX - THE FUTURE

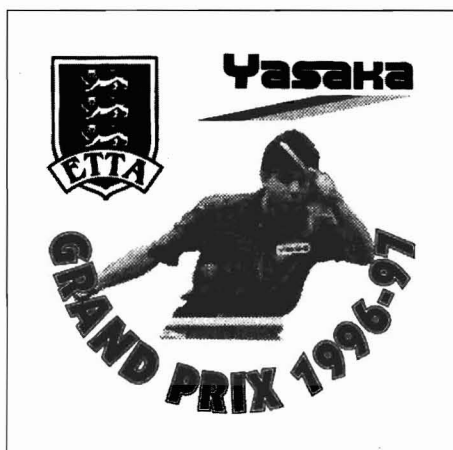
If, as we anticipate, this season's Yasaka Grand Prix is successful, we hope to increase the number of tournaments comprising the 1997-98 Grand Prix.

We are looking to do this in 2 ways:

1. Organise 2 or 3 more ETTA run events. 2. Include established tournaments within the Grand Prix structure.

I have had discussions with a number of parties who are interested in a Grand Prix tournament being staged in their area and these possibilities will be progressed over the next few months.

I have also been talking with some of the existing tournament organisers about their inclusion. Both the Clare Pengelley Memorial tournament and the Blackpool Open have indicated an interest in joining the circuit. Also interestingly enough, two tournaments that have not been run in recent



seasons, have expressed an interest in running as part of the Grand Prix. If anyone else is interested in running a Grand Prix event, whether it be a new, existing or resurrected tournament, I would be delighted to hear from them.

### NATIONAL TEAM FINALS

This season's finals will be played over two days at the luxurious China Fleet Country Club at Saltash near Plymouth. A superb venue, where excellent facilities include an 18 hole Golf Course, Driving Range, Indoor Pool, Health Club and cottage type accommodation. It is anticipated that the first session will be held on Saturday afternoon, with perhaps a dinner dance in the evening, and the final session will be played on Sunday morning, allowing teams plenty of time to drive home. The dates are Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 June 1997.

Rider, who suffers from the extreme heat and keeps herself cool with cold wet rags wrapped around her neck, took another scalp when she knocked out the No.1 Veteran lady Helen Shields 21-19 in the third, following a marathon semi-final battle. Simpson defeated Eileen Shaler in the other semi-final.

In the Men's semis Hilton beat Dave Newton, whilst Bowen defeated Billy Russell from Lancashire.

Hilton and Bowen teamed up to overpower Brian Allison and Chris Budden, 10 and 17, in the Men's Doubles final, whilst Shields and Simpson tasted summer success when they won the Women's Doubles final, beating Carol Judson and Rider in an all Yorkshire affair, winning 10, -17, 16.

This tournament wasn't really about winning though, but about having fun and competing against friends. This was best displayed in the match between Rod Hullah and Simon Peters.

The true spirit of this summer's tournament was encapsulated in this one contest, between two very unusual styles.

Peters, a former artist who now

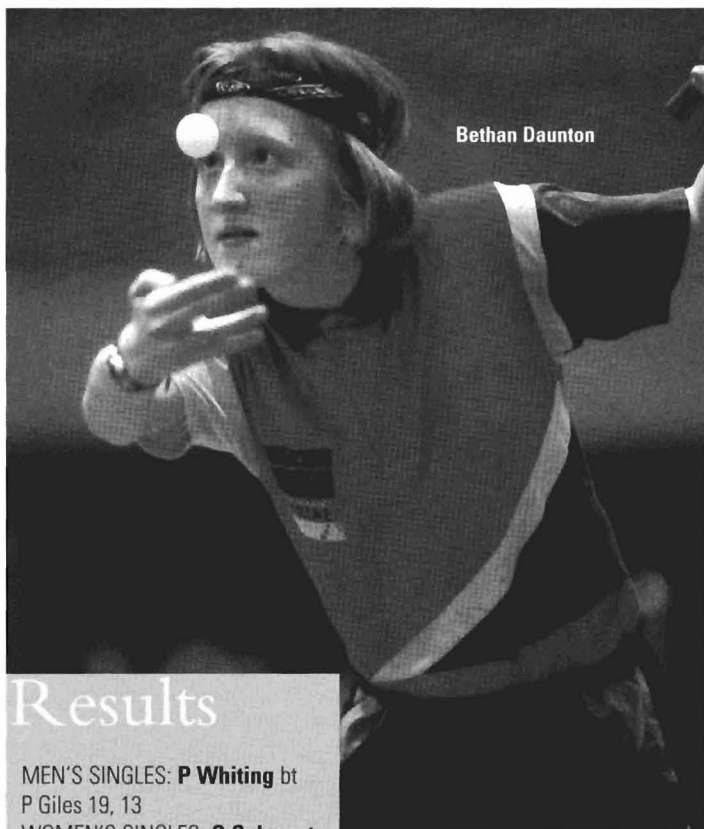

Although table tennis is not a sport that has been involved in too many legal battles, it is important that coaches are aware of their legal responsibilities which include:-

- the growing incidence of litigation
- no win, no fee policy of lawyers
- changes in social attitude (looking to apportion blame)

- media exposure of bad practice. The workshop highlights the main areas of liability:-
- Negligence ● Contract
- Statute ● Defamation

- Disciplinary Issues. It is unfortunately the area of negligence which is most likely to affect a coach. This is dealt with in detail at the workshop and covers

the 4 main areas of negligence:-

1. There exists a duty of care toward the athlete or performer.
2. This duty imposes a standard and that negligence has caused that standard to be breached.
3. That there is loss, harm, damage or injury to the performer

developed - the game over 100 years ago, and it is surely time that somebody took the initiative to establish a museum in this country before more items are lost to museums abroad or to the national sports museum which is on the (distant) horizon. It is known that one or two collectors are considering how to dispose of their collections gathered over a period of 30 years or more and now of considerable value. The main problem, of course, is finding suitable premises, but this will be a long-term project.

Donors will, no doubt, require several conditions to be met: that items, or, at least, a high proportion of them, will be on public display; that records, books etc. will be available for research by accredited visitors; that due care will be given to the preservation of the items; that some items will be available for display at major event; that these arrangements will be made in perpetuity.

What are the prospects for a table tennis museum in England? The Tamasu Company in Japan has a substantial museum, but access is not too easy. The Friends of Table Tennis Foundation in Holland are already showing the way by building up a collection of memorabilia, including early and rare items, now on public display at the Sport Museum in Lelystad, but the long-term aim is to set up in their own premises. The Wimbledon Tennis Museum has a few items, and others can be seen in the national sports museums of Switzerland and France as well as in Sweden and in Bop Op De Beeck's remarkable, private museum in Belgium. There are rumours of a museum in Germany, and it is likely that a new museum in Japan will be taking over one of the world's most distinguished collections of racket sports.

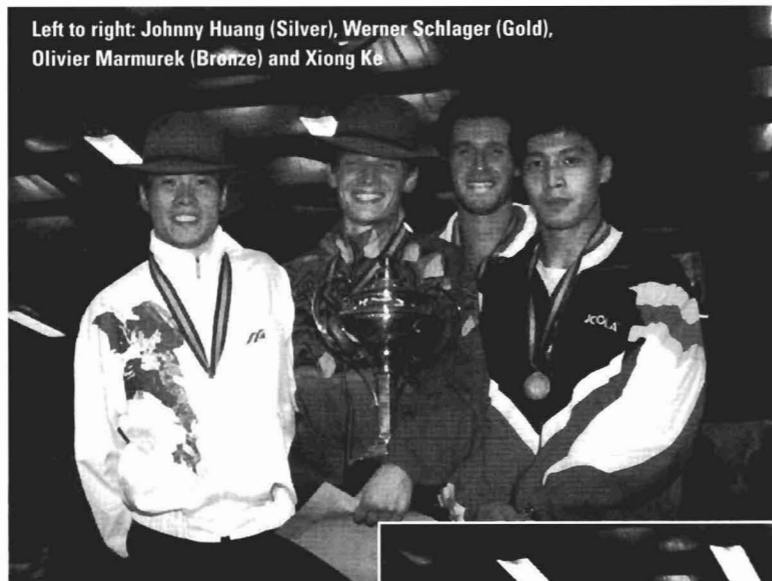

Excellent hospitality and a superbly organised and presented round robin of matches made the event even

more special. The draw handed Darlington the opening match against TTV Van Sloun. Following hotly on the heels of last month's announcement that Peniel had quit the British League, Table Tennis News sadly reports on the demise of Grove's British League Premier Division team.

Their top four players Chris Oldfield, Steve Ward, Carl Morgan and Steve Slater have decided to leave one of Britain's most famous clubs, due to Grove being unable to honour their contracts with the players, due to lack of cash.

A very sad Chris Oldfield commented, "I think it has been handled very unprofessionally. I did at least expect a letter or something because during the season, Grove was my only source income. Now I have no money. Before signing the contract with Grove I actually turned down two contracts abroad, one in Germany and one in Belgium. I'm really upset because I have been at the club for the past eight years and I didn't really want to leave, but table tennis is my living so I will try to play abroad. Grove have been good to me, but I can't play for nothing. You've got to go where the money is."

This proud club who had become one of the most successful in the history of the British game, will now only field their 2nd and 3rd teams in the British League. However they will continue to

compete in the Women's British League and the Woolwich Junior British Leagues.

Grove, who have been unbeaten for 5 years in the British League until this season and four times European Cup semi-finalists, have also withdrawn from this season's European Cup because of their financial pressures.

A Grove spokesperson said, "Unfortunately our sponsorship with British Fuels Limited, who have been superb sponsors, has ended after seven very rewarding and successful years. They are currently going through a restructuring programme, but they have agreed to continue supporting some of our tournaments. Also discussions are in progress with the National Sporting Centre at Lilleshal to hold tournaments at their splendid premises."

TTN wishes both Grove and Peniel Table Tennis Clubs the very best of luck for the future, and hopefully they will once again grace the British League Premier Division with their excellence.

We are sad to report the tragic death of Claudio Kano of Brazil, who was ranked at No 106 in the world. The death is also reported of Gizi Farkas (1925-1996). The three times World Singles Champion dominated the game from 1947-55. She also won a further seven World Doubles titles. She was twice the European

Champion, won 25 Hungarian titles and represented her country over 200 times. Her win in the 1949 World Singles Final in Stockholm saw her recover from 2 games to love down to win on time limit 8-1, 4-3, 3-0! A year previously Farkas had been involved in one of the most extraordinary games of all time. She was 2 games to love down to

Tozeanu of Fumania, levelled at 2-2 and won the fifth 29-27. The Rumanians protested that time limit should have been called with their player leading 21-20. Protests and counter protests eventually led to a replay. Justice was done with Farkas winning decisively.

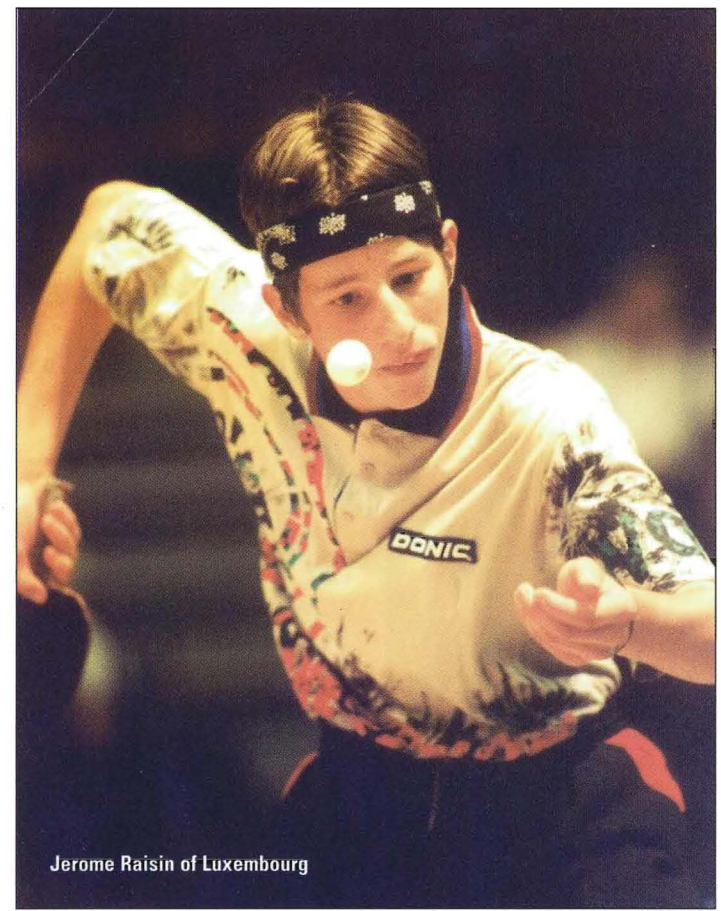

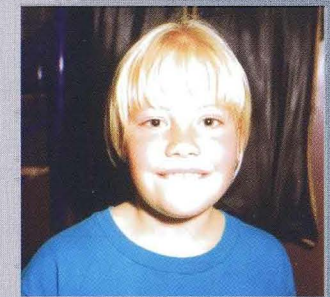

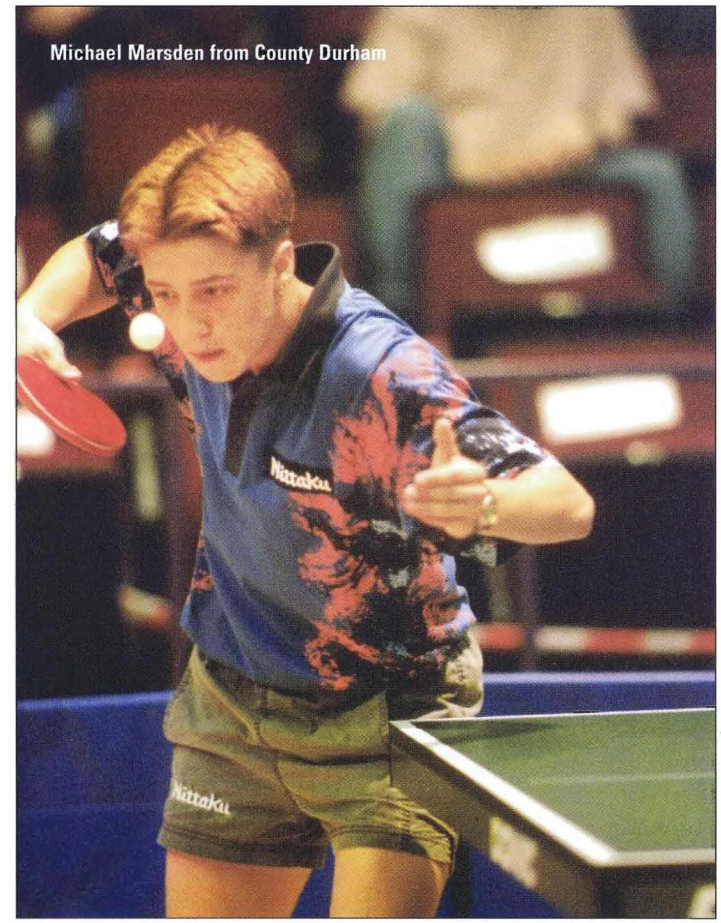
## STARS OF THE FUTURE

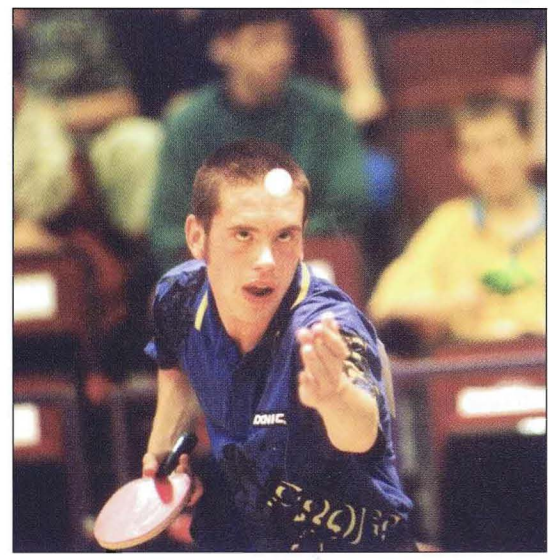

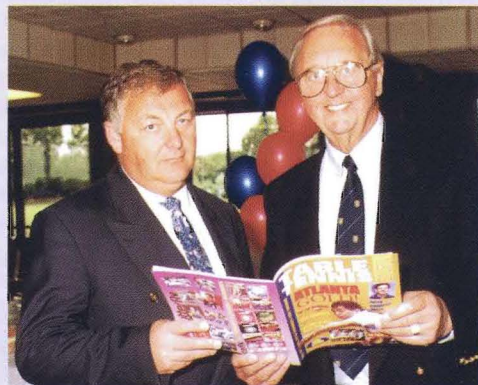

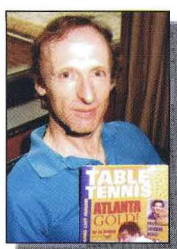

# SILVER & BRONZE Robinson & Rawson

NEIL ROBINSON AND JAMIE RAWSON REALLY FLEW THE FLAG FOR GREAT BRITAIN AT THE PARALYMPICS IN ATLANTA, WHERE THEY TRIUMPHANTLY COLLECTED SILVER AND BRONZE MEDALS IN THE SINGLES, THEN TOGETHER THEY WON BRONZE MEDALS IN THE TEAM EVENT.

In the Team Event, where our Class 3's were defending the Gold, we had to be happy with a bronze, going down 3-1 to Austria in the semi's, a match filmed by the BBC. Neil Robinson leading the opening encounter with Fritz Altendorfer a game and 20-18 up, let it slip away. Our Class 4/5's unlucky not to move on from the groups having beaten Belgium 3-1 in the opening match - great win for Arnie over Dmitri Ghion - but then to go down the following day 3-1 to Hong Kong and a count back on games saw us slip out of the tournament.

The tetras - Dave Russell and Jim Munkley have only themselves to blame for losing their grip on a

crucial doubles match against Germany which in the end was probably the deciding factor in them failing to qualify from their group despite wins against Argentina and Ireland. Had they done so, a medal was guaranteed.

Dave Hope and Tim Heaps Class 9/10 had a tough time losing to both Finland and Germany - just not quite strong enough to make an impression.

In the individuals, Arnie Chan played out of his skin but lost "...it's not very often you see Arnie play so well but still get beat..." said coach Jane Barrella. His tournaments were Benedetti (France) - 18 in the third and Stefanu (Cze) deuce in the third. His biggest nightmare was yet to come in the Open event, though.

Neil Robinson buried the ghost of earlier losses in the Team Event by convincingly dismissing Kim of Korea and Starl of Austria to move to a semi-final contest with team mate Jamie Rawson, both players guaranteed a medal at this stage. But it was Robinson who had higher things on his mind, seeking to clinch a gold in the same event which in '92 had seen him narrowly miss out for Silver. He overwhelmed Jamie and moved to a final encounter with Zlato Kesler of Yugoslavia, the player he had beaten in the European final last

effectively five points! Her defeats against Rosenbaum of the States was 19 in the third and against silver medallist Gibelin of France was 18 and deuce.

Melanie Davis lost 18 in the third in the semi's to Davidkova of Czech Republic see a guaranteed Silver slip from her grasp with further agony in the play off for bronze with a narrow third game loss to Jagodzinska of Poland.

Tim Heaps had his chances to qualify for the quarters when he was a game and 15-10 up against Mueller of Germany but then lost concentration and let his opponent back in. Dave Hope battled valiantly but could only manage a win against the awkward Kivimaki of Finland which was not enough to see him into the next round.

The Open events concluded the tournament and the opening round saw the removal of most British players with the exception of Arnie Chan. It seemed like the Nottingham player would go all the way. Former World Champion Demsey of the USA, still a major force in wheelchair table tennis, was overcome in the second round in three hard games, followed by a third game win against Bollden of Sweden, current European Open Champion. A quarter final encounter against Ghion of Belgium, whom he had beaten earlier in the team event was now on the cards. Arnie dominated throughout and used the psychological advantage of the earlier win to great effect. Then at one game up and with a 20-15 lead in the second he saw a glimmer of a medal too early. Ghion clawed the next five points back and stole the game and eventually the match from disbelieving Arnie.

"That game will haunt me for the rest of my days" said a shellshocked Chan.

year. This time it was the Yugoslavian who got his revenge and once again, Neil had to be content with silver. Still, not a bad result for a player who was bed bound up to eight weeks earlier.

Coach Mark Mitchell, who has worked closely with Neil over the last ten years or more shared his protege's disappointment. Gold would have been a triumph for both of them in what has been an especially productive partnership.

# The Temple of Table Tennis

EMMA HURLING OF THE ADEYFIELD ENKOMPASS BRITISH LEAGUE TEAM, WAS OFFERED THE CHANCE OF A LIFETIME, 5 WEEKS PERSONAL COACHING BY SEK SEONG FOONG, THE FORMER MALAYSIAN NO. 1, PLAYING IN THE NIN YONG TEMPLE ON THE ISLAND OF PENANG.

Emma reflects on her summer experiences: "Back in January 1996 I was offered the chance to spend the summer in Malaysia to improve my table tennis and learn the Chinese techniques. Who in their right mind would let an opportunity like that slip by? Six months later I was on an aeroplane heading for Penang, a small island off the west coast of Peninsular Malaysia to begin what was to be five weeks of intensive training. My coach for the summer would be Sek Seong Foong, father of Jacky Foong, who played for Adeyfield in the British League while he was in England. Sek Seong Foong has an incredible list of credentials to his name. He represented former Malaya, then Malaysia from 1961-1971. This included the SE Asia Games and the 31st World Championships in 1971. Malaysia finished 28th and have not

finished higher since.

The club where I would spend the majority of my time would be the Toishan Table Tennis Club, and the conditions were not at all as expected. The venue is actually a 150 year-old Chinese temple which has space for three tables - one



Despite being so close to China, table tennis in Malaysia is still a minority sport. There is no league structure, and nothing as advanced as a National League. Instead, each state runs its own tournament once a year which includes team and individual events. The Penang

at the Toishan Club and they all play at a very high standard. During my first two or three weeks, I was not able to beat any of the players in the first two teams. There is an incredible variety of styles of play - penhold, shakehands, long pimples, short pimples, anti-spin, and this is all in one club! Two of the club's young stars, Choo Sim Guan and Lai Kong Yeow had just returned from three months training in China. They are the State's top two men, and have also represented the country.

I learnt most of my new skills during one-on-one coaching sessions with Sek Seong Foong which lasted anything up to three hours without any breaks. Sek Seong Foong does not speak much English, (although his English is much better than my Malay!), but always managed to make himself understood in the Universal language of table tennis! A typical training session would start with a 'warm-up' practising footwork for an hour. This would then lead onto looping against chop and hitting against pimples rubbers. Service and return of service were included in every session. The Chinese way of coaching is to always be one step ahead of your opponent - almost like a chess player planning strategically ahead. The game is extremely psychological. This seems to be the main difference between the English and Malaysian players. The Chinese also emphasise the importance of having a strong forehand and a winning stroke.

solely for practice, and the other two for match practice. There were so many new conditions I had to adapt to when I first started playing. The first was the heat and humidity. Temperatures during the day rarely fall below thirty degrees Celsius, and with an average humidity of 60-70%, things get sweaty very quickly.

The next thing was the speed the ball travels. Never have I played anywhere quite so fast. For the first few sessions, I was always a split second too late to hit the ball - totally frustrating! Malaysia are hosting the 1998 Commonwealth Games, and our table tennis players will also have to adapt to these climatic changes. As if these conditions weren't enough, I still had to get used to the large rats which would occasionally scuttle across the floor!

tournament was run during my stay in Malaysia and is always a tense two weeks, but has been dominated in recent years by the Toishan Club. Their first team of Choo Sim Guan, Lai Kong Yeow and Choo Yit Cheang won the team event for the second year running in a nail-biting final. Their second team of Lai Hee Kong (the club captain), Jacky Foong, Choo Yit Lim and Woo Wing Chin finished third. In the individual event, there were over one hundred entrants, and in the closing stages, five of the quarter finalists were from the Toishan Club. The tournament committee are now considering adopting a similar format as our highly successful British League.

I had no shortage of 'sparring partners'

Sek Seong Foong also has a vast collection of table tennis videos. These date back to the early 1980s, right up to the present day. The majority of the videos are from China, showing the top Chinese players in action, and we spent many hours comparing the styles of these players with the Europeans.

As my five week stay came to an end, I felt quite at home in the new conditions and realised I had a greater understanding of the game, although there is still much to be learnt. This is all due to the time and effort of Sek Seong Foong and the players at the Toishan Club who made me feel so welcome and part of their 'family'. To them I would like to say **terima kasih banyak**. It is an experience I will never forget."



# EAT FOR VICTORY

Does your diet have any bearing on how you perform?  
Mark Bawden has the answers.

WHAT YOU OFTEN SEE AS YOU WALK AROUND A TOURNAMENT IS PLAYERS EATING CHIPS, CRISPS, BURGERS ETC. THE QUESTION IS, DOES WHAT YOU EAT INFLUENCE YOUR PERFORMANCE ON THE TABLE?

**A**n aspect of Table Tennis performance that can sometimes be overlooked is nutrition. Eating and drinking correctly can help to maximise energy levels and thus have a significant influence on performance. At a table tennis tournament players are required to produce and reproduce intermittent bouts of intense activity (periods of heavy exercise followed by rest) and therefore need to maximise energy stores both before and throughout the duration of the competition. The following information can help to guide players as to what they should and should not eat and drink actually on the day of the competition.

#### **WE CAN LOOK AT THE HUMAN BODY IN TERMS OF A MOTORCYCLE ENGINE AS THEY RUN ON SIMILAR PRINCIPLES.**

Throughout a competition make sure you follow a simple nutritional routine. Do not try anything new, eat what you are used to.

If you knew that your motorcycle worked efficiently using four star petrol you wouldn't try using two star on the morning of a motor race as it may disrupt the smooth running of your engine.

If you are playing early in the morning make sure that you eat breakfast. This should be rich in carbohydrate and include plenty of fluids. E.g. cereal with milk, toast and jam, fruit, baked beans on toast, fruit juice etc. Breakfast should be light on digestion, avoid fatty foods (e.g. a fry up) that slows your digestion. This will result with you feeling heavy when you actually get on the table and start playing.

On the morning of a motor race you would want to start with the right amount of 'high performance' petrol to ensure that you complete the race, but not so much that it weighs the bike down and slows down your performance time.

Ideally the pre-match meal should be eaten 2-3 hours before competing, however this is not always practical.

If you cannot tolerate food in the morning try having a drink high in carbohydrate.

#### **DRINK BEFORE YOU 'DRIVE'!**

Throughout the competition don't let yourself get dehydrated, make sure you drink regularly, before, during and after playing. Drinking liquid high in carbohydrate will help to keep your energy levels high throughout the day.

You wouldn't want your engine to overheat in the race, therefore you would start with adequate water to keep the engine cool, if water levels dropped you would have to pull over into the pits and have them refilled. This will ensure that the engine continues to run smoothly and doesn't seize up!!!

At lunch the same principles apply as to breakfast, avoid foods that are slow to digest (fatty foods e.g. burgers, chips, crisps, cake etc.), do not eat too much, but don't leave yourself feeling hungry.

#### **GO BANANAS!**

If you snack throughout the day between matches try to take in fluids and carbohydrates. The fluid will help to prevent dehydration, and the carbohydrates will aid the maintaining of glycogen (energy) levels. Good examples of foods to snack on are sandwiches (with low fat fillings), fruit (bananas are good), Muesli bars, biscuits, marshmallows, boiled sweets, chocolate bars (careful about the fat contents).

During the race the bikes have to have a pit stop in order to refuel their engines to ensure that the bike has enough fuel to finish the race and that the engine is still running smoothly.

#### **FAST SERVICE**

If you are in a competition that stretches over several days or at a training camp, refuelling your energy stores after each day is highly important. Don't wait for hours after competing before eating, start refuelling immediately in order to maximise your energy levels for the following day's competition.

At the end of the race the bike needs to have a full service (petrol refuelled, water and oil levels topped up etc.) to ensure that it is ready to race the following day. Good motorcycle maintenance will ensure that the bike is always running smoothly. This will give the rider the best chance to have an efficient fast machine, now it is just up to his/her skill level to determine whether they win the race.

Just like the biker, good Table Tennis players will make sure that their engine is fully fuelled in order to allow them to perform at the highest possible level.

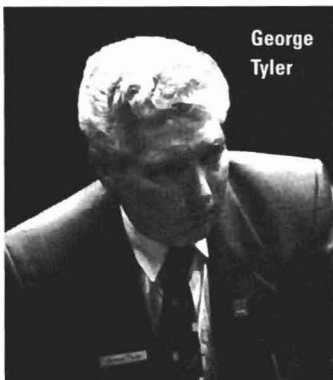

# WHY

## Have Umpires?

WHY INDEED? A QUESTION TOO OFTEN ASKED BY PLAYERS WHO BELIEVE THAT A GAME HAD BEEN LOST BECAUSE OF THE UMPIRE, AND A FORMER NATIONAL COACH CLAIMED THAT UMPIRES ARE TOO EXPENSIVE. TWO VIEWS WHICH MAY RELATE TO THE CURRENT IDEA OF PLAYERS ACTING AS UMPIRES FOR THE TOURNAMENT IN WHICH THEY ARE PLAYING. HOW DIFFERENT THE VIEWS OF THE ORGANISERS OF THE PENIEL 5 STAR INTERNATIONAL TOURNAMENT, WHERE UMPIRES ARE VALUED, WELCOMED AND MADE TO FEEL AN IMPORTANT PART OF A PRESTIGIOUS EVENT.

**W**hy have umpires? All competitive sports whether individual or team require an impartial official to ensure a fair result. That official needs an expert knowledge of the rules and regulations of the sport, when and how to apply them plus a good working relationship with the participants. Procedure and presentation is also an important part of the umpire's stock in trade.

Anyone who plays league table tennis would probably know how to score; counting the point, change of service after five (except at deuce), change of ends etc., but this is not umpiring. To umpire correctly one needs to become qualified, and to become qualified takes time and experience. The idea of players acting as umpires is not a new one, it used to operate before the game became more professional, before the present system of training and qualification became standard. The idea of having more tournaments at reduced costs is welcomed but will the 'player-umpire' be able to cope

with tricky situations? One experienced and cynical umpire once said that he regarded players as 'cheats' and he was there to prevent this. The crafty player doesn't use his doubtful service at two all, but at nineteen all; while gamesmanship and bad behaviour is best curbed by an umpire, a player acting as an umpire can only accept it or refuse to score.

Umpires are expensive? But are they? In most professional sports the officials receive expenses plus a fee commensurate with the level of competition. Table Tennis umpires receive travel expenses (they usually travel together) and accommodation. They work from early morning until late evening for two or more days. A player who wins the tournament may well be on the table for up to three hours in total, an umpire would probably be on the table for up to eight hours. When they travel abroad to represent the ETTA at an event they do so at their own expense.

The ITTF "Handbook for Match Officials" states: "the work of match officials can be difficult and demanding. They must be fair but not indulgent, firm but not officious and confident without being obtrusive. For most people these qualities are acquired only through experience.

For players who may act as umpires at the regional open tournaments Drop Shot will highlight one particular rule each month. This month:

**"The server shall then project the ball near vertically upwards without imparting spin, so that it rises at least 16cm after leaving the palm of the free hand and then falls without touching anything before being struck."**

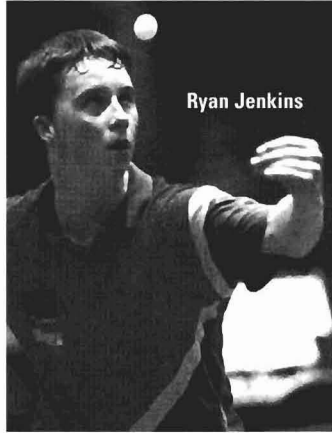

# SWANSEA SIZZLER !

THERE'S A NEW WELSH NO.1 AT THE HEAD OF THE RANKING LIST FOLLOWING THE PRE-SEASON WELSH INVITATION TOURNAMENT AND THE SWANSEA OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS. WALES' BRIGHT HOPE, RYAN JENKINS FROM TONYPANDY, HAS BEATEN TERRY YOUNG, VLADIMIR BRIL AND STEVE WARD IN THE FIRST FEW WEEKS OF THE SEASON TO OPEN UP AN EIGHTY POINT LEAD ON THE WELSH LIST AHEAD OF STEVE WARD OF NEWPORT WRITES STEVE GIBBS.



Jenkins showed true character to win the Swansea Open at Neath Sports Centre on Saturday 7th September. Earlier in the day he had lost at the semi-final stage of the Intermediate Singles to Terry Young but he made a much better job of it in the final of the men's singles. The final game was no classic but Jenkins wins points by focusing on the job at hand while other players lose them by lack of concentration. Having beaten Steve Ward quite comfortably at the semi-final stage of the men's singles Jenkins was in no mood to miss out on his first Swansea singles title and he beat Young over three games showing how tough he is mentally.

The policy of the Table Tennis Association of Wales and the Sports Council for Wales in targeting promising players like Jenkins seems to be paying off. Jenkins, a member of the Sports Council for Wales Elite Cymru scheme returns to Denmark for a second six month period at their specialist table tennis school. Apparently Terry Young is the first to recognise the value of the scheme and he is likely to accompany Jenkins to Denmark but paying out of his own pocket.

The presence of Young and Ben Johnson, now qualifying for Wales, certainly added to the quality of the Swansea event. With over 100 players in the draw the tournament must rank amongst the best in Wales and the West. Young knew he wouldn't get it his own way when he

saw the Russian Vladimir Bril in the draw as well. Bril, in Wales as a practice partner for Welsh players (another innovation of the TTAW and the Sports Council), was chasing the prize money and at their first encounter Bril beat Young in the final of the Intermediate Singles over three games. Young led 15-9 in the decider but was upset at a net call against him and, unable to put it out of his mind, proceeded to go down 21-19 to the Russian. At their second meeting in the semi-final of the men's singles Young was more focused and this time he reversed the result to meet Jenkins in the final.

It wasn't all eyes on the men's performances. Helen Lower from Staffordshire was the No.1 seed in the women's singles and she proved too strong for Wales top two women Bethan Daunton and Natasha Williams. She beat Daunton at the semi-final stage before polishing off Williams in the final. Williams held on in the first game to lose 21-18 but in the second game she got off to a bad start with Lower opening a 12-4 lead. Williams got back into double figures but few women can afford to give Lower that sort of start and hope to come back to win.

Lower won a second title when partnered by Welsh No.3 lady Judith Saunders from Swansea they beat the established Welsh pairing of Natasha Williams and Meinir Davies in the ladies doubles final. Earlier in the day Juniors, Cadets and Under 12's were trophy hunting. With Adam Robertson (Wrexham) and Stephen Jenkins (Ryan's younger brother) in the draw there was little hope of the trophies travelling outside Wales. Robertson helped himself to both the Junior and Cadet Singles trophies while James Haymer from Port Talbot won the

under twelve boys event.

The girls' events were also dominated by the Welsh entry. Bethan Daunton (Pontypridd), Charlotte

Cooksley (Barry) and Gemma Thomas (Bridgend) winning their respective age groups and keeping the invaders at bay.

## EASTERN REGION

It is my intention this season to give reports

upon individual clubs situated in Gloucestershire, in this county column.

To achieve this with a modicum of success, I suggest that any club/Secretary - Chairman or interested club member should contact me with their club's information, and provided that space is available, I will do my best to include your news in this county column.

The first club to be mentioned is probably membership-wise the largest individual table tennis club in Gloucestershire - namely "The Rudford & Highleadon TTC" situated in the twin Hamlets of R & H, with a population of around 450.

Founded by three local stalwarts in 1953 the club was based at the village hall at Rudford, and began its humble beginnings by entering one singles team in the lowest division of the Gloucester City League. Owing to rapid expansion the club moved their headquarters to the nearby Bridge Farm in 1958, and played league matches in a converted hay loft, with deep litter poultry below and a twice daily used milking parlour in close proximity, the annual rental for these premises was fixed at one shilling or 5p per year. This remained unchanged until 1983 when the clubs administrators purchased a redundant cedar wood old school building from the neighbouring village of Highnam - the purchase price was £1,000 and the club was held responsible for dismantling and transporting everything to where the building stands today, adjacent to the village hall at Rudford.

After professional work was completed on the footings and drains, the club members then re-assembled the building and in June 1984 the late Mr Tom Blunn, Chairman of the ETTA came down to officially open the new playing headquarters.

Currently, the club has 42 fully affiliated members and 10 teams registered in the Gloucester League, two teams in the first division, three in the second, two in the fourth, two in the fifth and finally one team of almost beginners in the sixth division.

The club was most fortunate to obtain a grant of £2,000 from the Sports Council - plus several other smaller grants from other sources, and a lot of cash was raised by members themselves.

In the mid 1980s R & H TTC won the Gloucester City first division team cup three years on the trot, the success of such a large club has unquestionably rested on the shoulders of the administrators, who have the task of running it.

The county are entering four teams this season, they will consist of:- 1 Senior team, 1 Junior and 2 Veteran teams, this will be one team less than last year.

A day or so too late I fear for this month's publication of the results of county trials, the first incidentally to be held for several years, but these results plus the first county ranking list involving - Senior Men/Women, Juniors and Veterans will appear in next month's County column.

After a long absence away from table tennis former English & Gloucestershire International Bryan Merrett is making a welcome return to League play this season and his many friends in our sport, I'm sure, will wish him well.

### GOOD RESULTS

Our youngsters travelled hopefully to the Clare Pengelly Memorial Tournament in Torquay, chalking up some good results.

Lucy Pointer won the Under 12 girls event, the good news being that it was her first win in a National 3 Star event, the bad being that only 6 girls entered. We certainly hoped that she would win the Under 14 as well, but she lost in the Final by two deuces. She picked up £35 in prize money, which did not cover half her costs. These were kept low and to avoid hotel bills our contingent left on the 5 am boat. Perhaps these logistics explain why entries were low. To which one has to add the 'benefits' of our incredible ranking scheme (more of that later).

Danny Burns won four matches on his way to a meeting with Gareth Herbert in the quarter finals. Herbert, whose play and talent have impressed me in the past, is probably the best junior in England and Danny lost 18 and 17. You get no prizes in table tennis for gallant defeats, but it did show how close Danny is to the very best in English Junior Table Tennis. I have written, when

he was in the top 50 of our ranking list, that he was really top 20 material and now, some time and much improvement later, see him in the top 10.

This brings me back to that incredible ETTA ranking scheme. Lucy, with a win and a runner up spot, has returned with only a handful of ranking points and the same fate has befallen Danny after his four wins and that one defeat against the English junior champion. Getting up at four in the morning, travelling 150 miles and some pretty good play left both more or less where they were in terms of recognition and certainly in terms of statistics. I do not attribute the generally downward trend in tournament entries to the recession or the other factors so often paraded before us, but our ranking scheme. It would be hard to cobble together one that is so discouraging and heartless as the one we have. Changes are often promised, but harder to detect and the lack of common sense and reality is the main feature, as one contemplates the final lists. Among the many things which seem to have gone wrong in English table tennis, this at least is something capable of immediate cure.

No news, at the time of writing, about any resolution of the problems which have kept the Isle of Wight player Carl Preat out of the England Team for a season and which did much to propel our men's team into the depths of the second category of the team event of the main European Championships and the second division of the annual European League. In the former our last four outings had brought two semi-final and two final places which put us right near the top of European nations. Yet a year later we attained (and deserved) second class status, which was self-imposed by national politics and therefore completely unnecessary. Some changes in management, notable the return of Donald Parker to decision-making roles may bring new attitudes. One certainly hopes so.

### 29 U12S IN KENT'S DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Over 200 players have taken part in three Assessment/Development Tournaments run during July and August. Organiser Tina Stewart ensured that all players got an equal number of games, and although there were small trophies for the different section winners the most important aspect of three days was to introduce as many as possible youngsters to competitive Table Tennis.

### TABLE TENNIS CENTRE PLANNED

Plans were unveiled to the Kent Press for a £1.3m National Lottery bid to build a purpose built 32 table Table Tennis Centre in Medway. Such was the excitement of the Kent Messenger Group of Newspapers that they asked for exclusive rights to publish the biggest sports story in Kent for many years. If the bid is approved the centre could be open in time to coincide with the World Championships being held in Manchester next spring. Surely the promotion and enthusiasm of having the Championships in this country can only benefit our sport if proposed centres such as our

own are given the backing they deserve from the ETTA and Government agencies. Kent County Council have donated a £500,000 green field site at Walderslade, within easy reach of the M2 and M20 motorways and sited in the centre of one of the largest housing areas in the South East. The centre costing in the region of £2m will be available to Kent Schools at no charge during lesson times, and the Kent Authority have agreed that table tennis can be included in the time table curriculum. Already over £600,000 has been raised towards the cost of the project which has backing from the National and County Table Tennis Association and the Kent County Council and Sports Development Unit. The Centre would have accommodation for up to 40 visiting players, including disabled players, a Table Tennis Sports Shop, bar and separate health suite. To ensure perfect playing conditions there will be a sprung floor and regulated airflow heating. With accommodation for a professional live-in Coach it is proposed that regular long stay visits will be made by top players and coaches from all over the world.

### U10S, U12S AND U14S OFF TO BELGIUM

Kent have accepted an invitation from Belgium to take teams of U10s, U12s and U14s to a Junior tournament in Belgium at the end of October.

### JUNIORS START SEASON IN FINE FORM

Kent Juniors started the new season in the same form as they finished the old, with wins for Dominic Hall (Maidstone) U12s and Justin Dodd (Gravesend) U14s but Christian Thompson (Medway) U17s just failed to make it a clean sweep for Kent at the Clare Pengelly Tournament at Paignton losing in the final to Berkshire's Gareth Herbert. Thompson in partnership with Herbert, lost in the final of the Peniel International Team Tournament to Luxembourg, but there were also good performances from our younger players in the U17 Singles, with Justin Dodd beating Robert Poutney and Dominic Hall accounting for Gavin Bloomfield.

### BRONZE FOR SCOTT FRIDAY IN EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Scott Friday and Berkshire's Andrew Baggaley were England's only success at the European Youth Championships held in Frydek-Mistek, Czech Republic, when they won the bronze medal in the Cadet Boys Doubles.

### NATIONAL U10S, U11S, U12S & EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

What a pity for the country's younger players that the National & European Championships did not receive proper recognition in the Sept '96 edition of Table Tennis News. Whilst I appreciate that John Wood can only be in one place at one time surely it is not too much to expect for the organisers and National Team Captains to submit a report and organise a photographer for what are surely major ETTA and International promoted events. I refer to Alan Ransome's comment that our results at the European Championships were mediocre, and I suggest that they will continue to be so if our best youngsters are not better supported and encouraged.

**MIDLANDS MECCA**

Following the successful staging of the English Open last April, Kettering Leisure Village has suddenly become the Mecca of Midlands Table Tennis, with a repeat of that prestigious event provisionally proposed for early January 1997. In addition the VETTS Midlands Masters is scheduled for the last week in January, whilst the Woolwich British Junior League is being staged on two Saturdays, the second of which falls on 22 February.

With County Championships weekends arranged for 18 January, 15 February and 1 March, the Wellingborough League had to delay its customary January Closed Tournament until 2 February, whilst the Queensbury Scimitar County Closed had to be brought forward to Sunday 16 March.

The net outcome of this increased activity in the first three months of the year has been the moving of the Kettering Closed from its traditional February date, and so for the first time in its fifty year history, the Kettering event will be held before Christmas, on Saturday 30 November.

In the event it was Elliott who had most cause for regret as he could only look back and wonder how his 17-14 third leg and semi-final lead over Hawes had disappeared as Hawes allowed his opponent to pick up six successive points.

Keates' place in the final, eventually hard-earned at the expense of a battling Gordon Shaw, had given him an outstanding opportunity, for he had already beaten Hawes twice in the league. Keates was also a finalist in the mixed event, but paired with Cathy Fleming, he again ended in second place, with Hawes and Jane Johnston regaining the title they last won in 1994.

It was a big day for Johnston, whose talented twin brothers, Keith and Ken Nicoll, both former winners of the Kettering and the Northants singles titles, called in to wish her well in a bid for a difficult treble.

In a repeat of last year's ladies final, she dropped the opening end, but again beat Viv Smiley to take the singles for the fourth time. However with Fleming as her partner she was unable to prevent Smiley and Jenna Ashberry

from retaining the doubles, despite going one game up.

For Gordon Shaw it was almost a case of so near and yet so far, as he ended a losing semi-finalist in both singles and doubles, and then a beaten finalist in the veterans doubles in which Alan Ashberry and Gerald Finney proved successful for the first time since 1991. Shaw, however had one particular aim - the Veterans Singles, and his deep conviction enabled him to despatch Peter Ainsworth, Allun Thomas and Steve Brown for the loss of a meagre 51 points. Brown had recorded one clean sheet on the way to a final, won with consummate ease by Shaw, who was registering his third consecutive win in the event.

The Thomas family also had a good day, for in addition to Allun's appearance in the veteran's doubles final and his pulsating 5-21, 21-17, 25-23 expedite win over Ashberry, son Paul not only took the Under 23 title, but also became their twenty first winner in 22 years of competition for the Consolation Singles. Brother Andrew, not to be outdone, turned the tables on Daniel Vertigan, and after a hard-fought final became the first player to take the junior singles title three times in a row.

Derek Muggleton emulated this achievement in the Mystery Doubles, when he and Stewart Abraham eased through on a third end deuce against Smiley and Geoff Wilkins, whilst Wilkins Market Harborough team-mate Andrew Pearson had the greatest reason for elation, when after a barren league season, he applied himself enthusiastically to annex the Division One Handicap.

Other winners included Steve Silk, John Palmer, Dennis Millman, James Fitton, Nicky Spence, Paul Lockyer, Daniel Vertigan, Ashley Vertigan, Ivan Retailc, Dean Warren, Mark Thompson and Andrew Dean, but the real winner was Tournament Organiser Phil Slade, whose 13th Kettering Closed was far from unlucky, with his expertise enabling him to ensure that more than three hundred matches were played in thirteen hours. Not perhaps one of his biggest tournaments, but certainly one of the best.

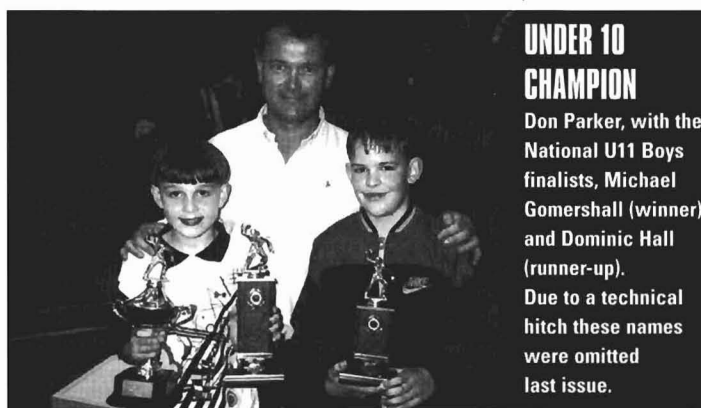
