

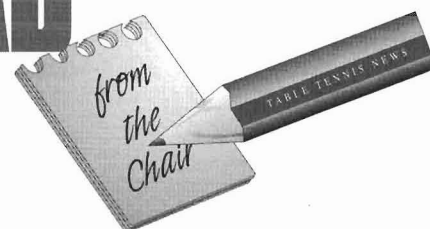

IMPORTANT SEASON AHEAD



Alan Ransome, Chairman ETTA

WELCOME TO THE NEW TABLE TENNIS SEASON! THIS SEASON IS LIKELY TO BE ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT FOR ENGLISH TABLE TENNIS IN THE HISTORY OF THE SPORT. WE HAVE BEEN GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY BY THE ITTF TO STAGE THE 44TH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN MANCHESTER AND THE HOLDING OF SUCH AN IMPORTANT EVENT SHOULD HAVE A VERY BENEFICIAL EFFECT ON THE POPULARITY OF OUR SPORT.

Just as important for the future of table tennis in England will be the decisions taken by the various Sports Councils and other allied government agencies on the future of the National Academy of Sport and on how the Lottery funding, which from next January will be available for revenue projects, is to be allocated.

From an ETTA perspective we need to campaign hard press for table tennis to be included in the new Academy and that the necessary funding is provided to fully support the four levels of the Top Club and Top Sport programmes. These are the programmes that will introduce the sport to youngsters in junior schools and give them the opportunity to join clubs to continue to enjoy and progress in the sport. Table tennis is one of the seven sports in the first phase Sport. Top club provides the opportunity for clubs across four levels ranging from school club through to excellence, one step below the Academy to gain support for improving their facilities provided they are willing and able to carry out the junior coaching and competition programs. The ETTA Management Committee and

professional staff will be doing all possible to ensure that table tennis is fully included in all these programmes and that we maximise the opportunities made available to us to the full.

In addition to the World Championships in Manchester, the commonwealth Championships are to be played in Glasgow beginning just twelve days before the start of the World Championships. The Commonwealth Championships give the English players their best opportunity of winning international medals and the publicity provided will be an excellent lead in to Manchester.

The English teams begin their programmes with two homes matches in the European League. The Men's team open their fixtures in Division 1 with a home match against Turkey at St. Austel in Cornwall on 14 September. Three days later on 17 September our Women commence their season with a match at St. Nicholas Park Leisure centre in Warwick against Italy.

On the tournament scene, the ETTA Marketing Department have launched

five new tournaments with the objective of re-establishing a senior tournament circuit. We have been concerned for sometime that, whilst the junior tournaments and veterans tournaments have been well supported, we have been losing a number of our senior events and this new venture is designed to re-create this competition. The five tournaments, the Eastern Open in Kings Lynn, the Western Open in Bath, the Souther Open in Andover, the West Midland Open in Stratford and the Norther Open in Sunderland are being launched as a Grand Prix with the finals being played in Bath in May. Sponsorship has been obtained from Yasaka as well as significant assistance from the host venues for each of the events.

This Summer has been one of the busiest on record for table tennis events and the highlight was the Olympic Games table tennis competition which took place in Atlanta. The Chinese won all four Gold medals and completely dominated the event building on their success in the World Championships in Tianjin last year. The Swedish team who played so well in the European Championships in Bratislava failed to perform in Atlanta and the best European performance came from Jorg Roskopf of Germany who won the Bronze medal and Peter Korbel of the Czech Republic who was fourth. Nikki Struse of Germany was the best European woman. Our British players, Chen Xinhua, Carl Prean, Lisa Lomas and Andrea Holt all won matches against weaker opposition but were unable to raise their game when it really mattered against the class players.

The European Youth Championships played near Ostrava in the Czech republic, produced one medal for our young English team with Scott Friday of Kent and Andrew Badderley of Milton Keynes clinching the Bronze in the Cadet boys doubles. With the exception of this outstanding performance, the English results were again only mediocre. One cannot blame the players, they all clearly did their best. Opportunities that are provided for our youngsters at the present time do not begin to compare with the training and competition given to many of their rivals in Continental Europe and we cannot hope to move up the junior European league table until significantly more resources are invested in the junior national team programme. The Academy and the new Lottery fund may well provide the necessary boost but even if this is provided, it will still take time to catch up.

The World veterans Championships was held in Lillehammer with approximately 2,000 participants. This is a really magnificent promotion for table tennis. The spirit amongst the competitors is terrific and a thoroughly enjoyable time was had by all. We are the hosts in Manchester in two years time and we are looking forward to this event just as much as we are to the full World Championships next April.





FLAGSHIP

I have always felt that our top players are the flagship or show piece of the ETTA, but looking back through the old mags makes one appreciate what a wonderful contribution dignified gentlemen like Johnny Leach and Ron Crayden have continued to make long after their playing days were over.

From younger generations we can think of many other former internationals who continue to give important service - Jill Parker, Carol Moore and Nick Jarvis for example - and I have no doubt that people like Lisa Lomas and Alan Cooke will follow. It was a great shame when the International Club, set up by Geoffrey Harrower (and continued by Laurie Landry) partly as a vehicle to allow international players to put something back into table tennis, folded.

Of course, some self centred individuals' only contribution is in playing well, but that is important. But whether as a performer, raising the profile and acting as role models, as sports personalities, or as future workers, our top players are vital to the health of our sport. We should treat them well and appreciate them.

FIRST EXPERIENCE

My son recently decided he would like to play in some major tournaments - something which I imagine the ETTA are in favour of. However, our first experience this season was not such as would encourage a relative newcomer to continue.

For a start, there are no open tournaments whatsoever within our region, the Southern, or in London, so we found we had to face a lengthy journey just to take part. We learned that one of the nearest to us (we live in west Berkshire) was the Cotswold, so we entered, only to be forced to pull out by a school commitment we had no knowledge of when we entered. We then tried the Bristol. This necessitated a very early start and a drive through fog, but we arrived in good time, forty minutes before the first match was due. What happened then? My son was told that none of the other boys in his group had turned up, so he had a bye through to the knockout stage. This meant a three-hour wait, with nothing to do but the benefit of at least three matches, and not surprisingly, he lost in straight games to a player he had previously beaten. End of tournament - go home.

The whole thing cost us quite a lot in entry fees, petrol etc. - just for one game against a local Berkshire lad whom we could play regularly anyway!

I am not saying the Bristol tournament was badly organised. I am sure it was as well run as any other. I also appreciate that to put players into groups different from those pre-arranged may spoil seeding plans, etc. But I do not understand why players not getting a game in the groups (and my son was not the only one in this position!) could not have been given at least one warm-up game against each other, so that no-one would enter the knockout stage at a disadvantage. After all, there had been tables allocated to the scratched groups.

I am writing to the Bristol organisers with the same point: but I

think they would only have been following standard tournament practice. Hence my plea through your strategic magazine to all tournament organisers, for the sake of all players (not just beginners, who are more easily put off) - please do something for those who, through no fault of their own, find themselves without a group to play in!

WONDERFUL FEAST

However there are a couple of points that should be borne in mind by the officials who run such events, I know that many of them are unpaid volunteers who, without their support, table tennis nationally and internationally would find it very difficult to function.

My first point is that my wife and I sat in the tiered seating just below the referees/organisers table on Easter Monday. The amount of noise coming from that area made it impossible to hear the umpires voice down in the arena. I went down to court side and the noise from the balcony was just as bad. I, my wife and many others found the din distracting. I feel that this was very inconsiderate to both the players and us the paying spectators. I would add that without us table tennis in this country would be all the poorer.

I sincerely hope that my criticisms are seen as constructive ones. Taken on board and put right in time for Manchester 1997 when the eyes of the table tennis world and the media are upon the sport.

IRRITATING REGULATIONS

Laws, rules and regulations get irritating, get ignored or get inconsistently applied when they are complicated to understand, lead to difficult decisions, or are impossible to actionfully.

We all know the service that looks all tight front one angle, but, when seen from a different view when the player moves to the other end of the table, is clearly not being thrown up "near vertically". Or the racket that dips

marginally below the table during the service action - a stipulation against which made more sense before the red and black colours became mandatory. This was to prevent a player gaining an unfair advantage by turning the racket with combination rubbers and stopping his opponent seeing the change. But he can still hide it momentarily behind his body.

The umpire can cope with all this, although some people may feel if laws are applied too rigidly we may lose sight of the basic intention of making sure that no player takes an unfair advantage during play.

However, there is one area which is assuming higher profile lately which puts the umpire in an almost impossible position. That is "Advice to players", see "Handbook for Match Officials 1995", section 16 Players are allowed to receive advice only during designated times, and in non team matches only from a designated coach. The umpire is supposed to hear every remark that is passed, decide whether it constitutes coaching, and even if it's at an allowable time, decide whether it constitutes coaching, and even if it's at an allowable time, decide who said it. It is easy to see the difficulties is the simple expression "work" an encouragement or pointing out that too many unwarrantable chances are being taken, and the player must play more cautiously? "Good service now" any mean "Use that special we decided upon before the match which we reckoned would upset the opponent at this critical juncture".

Not to mention the shouts in a foreign language that we haven't a clue what they mean. What about the signals from behind the umpire's back. The ear rubbing, head stroking or collar straightening? Quite useless to pretend that these can be controlled, so why not face reality and merely say that no interruption of the process of play is permitted, particularly by calls from spectators. I think it must be difficult for a player to concentrate with too much advice, but that's his problem.

I remember when a player missed the ball completely when going for an easy smash, and his friend shouted "Open you eyes". I quickly said "No coaching", but perhaps that was going too far!

YASAKA Grand Prix

THE FIVE OPEN TOURNAMENTS BEING STAGED BY THE ENGLISH TABLE TENNIS ASSOCIATION THIS COMING SEASON ARE TO FORM THE 'YASAKA GRAND PRIX'.

At the end of the 5 tournaments the leading 16 players in each of the 14 events will be invited to play in the finals, which will take place on Saturday 10th May 1997 at a venue yet to be decided. The finals prize money will total over £4,000.

All Singles events will be played in groups of 4, where possible, with 2 going through to the knock-out stage.

Initial response from the players has been fantastic and judging from the number of requests we have received for entry forms, I would expect most tournaments to be over-subscribed.

In all five tournaments, plus the finals, play will take place on 18 YASAKA 25mm, blue tables and we will be using DONIC Double Happiness, 3 Star Orange balls.

My thanks to Nick Jarvis of Jarvis Sports, the UK distributors of Yasaka products, whose generous sponsorship has enabled us to stage these tournaments.

Joola Mens European League Mens Division One

England's first match in the Joola European League Division One since 1992 will be against Turkey at the Polkyth Leisure Centre, St. Austell, Cornwall on Saturday 14th September.

This will be the first occasion the teams will have met in a European League Mens match. On the other three occasions that the two countries played, the teams were mixed. England won all these matches in 1986/87 at Pontesbury by 6-1, 1987/88 at Ankara by 5-2 and in 1988/89 in Bexleyheath by 7-0.

Although, on paper, we will start favourites, Turkey cannot be

underestimated. Their No. 1, Gurhan Yaldiz (ranked No. 92 in the World) is a difficult player to beat, and is likely to be backed up by Ilhan Eren (199) and Oktay Cimen (249).

EUROPEAN LEAGUE WOMENS SUPER DIVISION

Our womens first match is against Italy, who they recently defeated in the European Championships. The match will be staged at the St Nicholas Park Leisure Centre, Warwick on Tuesday 17th September. The Italian team is likely to be: Fliura Abbate-Bulatove (World ranked 27), Alessia Arisi (46) and Laura Negrisoni (157).

At the time of writing neither of the England teams had been announced, but the women are certain to be without National Champion Alison Broe who has retired pending the birth of her first child in the New Year.

ENGLISH OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS 7TH/10TH JANUARY 1997

At the time of writing it seems likely that the event will, as last season, be played at Kettering Leisure Village. More news will appear in the next edition.

ENGLISH SENIOR NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS 14TH/15TH/16TH MARCH 1997

Following a survey of players playing in last season's English Senior National Championships, this season's tournament will be extended to a third day. Subject to entries, play will commence about midday on the Friday which should enable the Singles to be played in groups. The tournament will again be played at the prestigious Brighton Centre.

Clean Sweep for CHINA

CHINA'S ACHIEVEMENT IN BECOMING THE FIRST NATION TO WIN ALL FOUR OLYMPIC GOLDS WAS ONLY SERIOUSLY THREATENED BY A FIGHT BETWEEN TWO SPECTATORS, A FIVE-MINUTE DELAY BEFORE THEY WERE CARRIED AWAY BY POLICE, AND THE EMOTIONAL AFTERMATH OF ANOTHER EPISODE IN CHINA'S QUARREL WITH TAIWAN.

All this disrupted the concentration of the defending women's singles champion that, having been within six points of a straight games victory in the final against Chen Jing, she was taken the full distance before fully regaining her sensational counter-hitting skills.

Chen is the player who defected to Taiwan after winning the Seoul gold for China - and one of the arrested spectators had been waving a Taiwanese flag. This is illegal under IOC rules and the Atlanta house rules, and proved highly provocative to one of Deng's supporters.

Deng eventually completed two successful title defences, for she won the women's doubles with Qiao Hong. Two golds were also won by Liu Guoliang, although he achieved it for the first time.

Three of the four finals were all Chinese affairs. Coming not long after the clean sweep of all seven titles achieved by China at the World Championships, it suggested a worrying return to the bad old days of the late seventies and early eighties when Chinese players dominated so much for so long that table tennis became extremely difficult to promote.

China is where Chen Xinhua, such a colourful figure in the English game for the past six years, has now returned. He confirmed his retirement after two victories and a loss in Atlanta, where two of his three contests ironically were against fellow Chinese emigres, David Zhuang of Canada, and Johnny Huang of the United States.

However he nearly did not leave China for Atlanta at all because for five days he was stranded in Fukien. It seemed there might be no Olympic Games for him to climax his remarkable career. Chen had been training and preparing at home, but had omitted to book in advance an internal flight to Beijing, and then discovered they were all full.

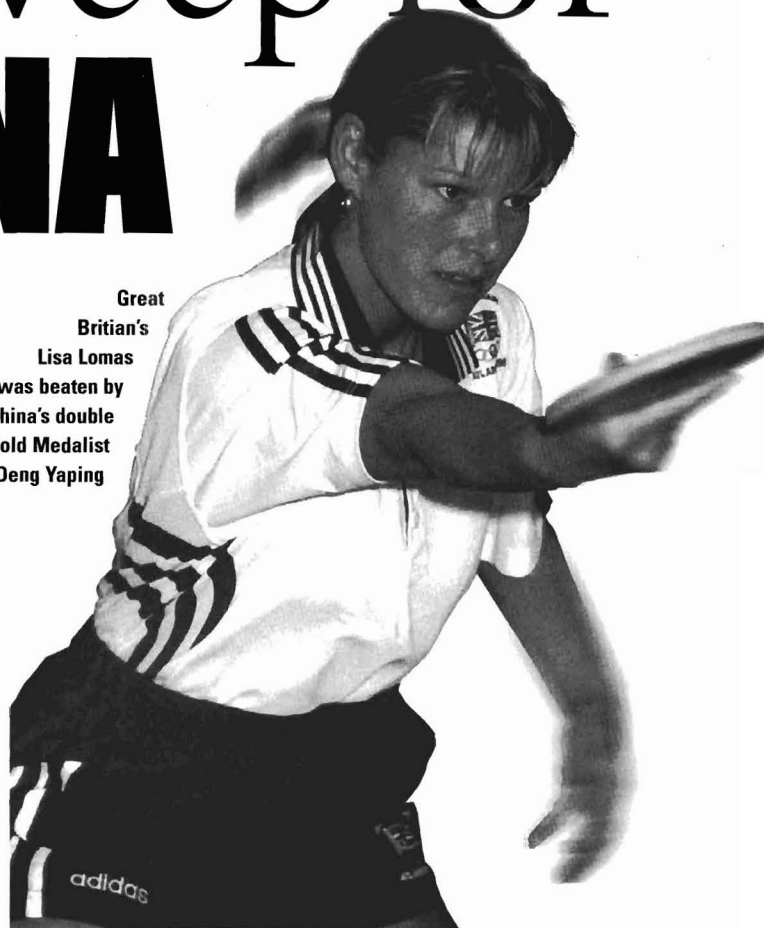
Eventually it required Alan Ransome and the British Olympic Association to fix up an escape route via Hongkong, Singapore, and Frankfurt requiring the incorrigible itinerant to travel for fully 40 hours.

"I was up longer than some astronauts," he joked. The serious side to it was that it may have cost him his chance of qualifying from the group.

Despite this, his was the most successful British performance. Carl Prean beat Stephen Hylton of Jamaica, lost narrowly to Andrei Mazunov the former European silver medallist from Russia, and was walloped by Vladimir Samsonov, the world number ten from Belarus who is perhaps Europe's most improved player.

Lisa Lomas, who had a terrible

draw, also won once, against Nadumbe Kyakobye of Uganda, but lost to the former European champion from Sweden, Marie Svensson after a tight first game, and also to Deng Yaping.

Lisa and Andrea Holt were only a little less unlucky in the women's doubles, losing to Jie Schopp and Olga Nemes of Germany and to Liu Wei and Qiao Yunping of China, and beating a pair of Chileans.

It had been a long way to go, a lot of hard work to put in, and a lot of expense, for such modest reward.

FIGHTING SPIRIT

The five British players in Atlanta showed fighting spirit in abundance. The Chinese players rate the Olympics as the most important event in the world. All the best players in the world were present, with the possible exception of the English No. 1 Matthew Syed.

British team manager Alan

Ransome said at the end of the British challenge "The team did their best but the opposition in Atlanta was if anything, stronger than the world championships. I was of course disappointed with two results - the defeat of Lisa Lomas by Marie Svensson and Carl Prean losing to Andrei Mazunov - those were two matches we should have won."

Atlanta's table tennis tournament will be remembered for the sheer power and accuracy of two men before the later stages - Vladimir Samsonov who reduced Prean to single figures in the groups and Johnny Huang the Canadian champion who did a similar demolition job on Chen Xinhua -14, -13 in the group final qualifying match.

Huang went on with Samsonov to the quarters in the men's, with Samsonov - my choice as the most improved player in Europe - ripping through Wang Tao 16, 16 in the first

two games but eventually losing -10, -15, -15 after a match wrecked by two lighting failures each of 20 minutes duration.

The Prean quote on Samsonov - "He was too good for me" - and he proved nearly too good for the world No. 2 the short and chunky Wang Tao.

The best match I saw was the Roskopf victory -12, 24, 12, -16, 24 over Kim Taek Soo. A standing ovation saw Roskopf at his very best especially his devastating backhand, although he missed two match points on the backhand, one a sitter.

Lancashire's pride and joy Andrea Holt had a pretty thankless task spending five weeks away from home and playing only in the doubles. Losing -19, -19 to Jie Schopp and Olga Nemes was a cruel blow, but possibly not as cruel as the draw for Lisa Lomas in the women's singles against Deng Yaping, who has now dominated the women's table tennis world for the last five years.

Reflecting on the British team's performances, Chen Xinhua is, unless he changes his mind and his

business based in China does not come up to expectations, gone for ever. But before he left Atlanta in two sweaty performances he scrambled past the champion of Africa Sule Olaleye and the powerful USA champion David Zhuang 18, -14, 18.

Carl Prean did not reach his devastating best in Atlanta. He only lost at 18 in the third to Andrei Mazunov. But Carl has a lot to look forward to - in a few weeks time he will line-up for his new club Julich in the Bundesliga; he is officially at No. 4 but it is expected he will play at No. 3 because above him will be the Olympic gold medallist Liu Guoliang, Yang Jinhua and Trinko Keen, but only one Chinese can play at one time, elevating our Isle of Wight professional to No. 3.



Jean-Philippe Gatiien the former world champion from France crashed to Petr Korbek from the Czech Republic. Korbek had a great Olympics reaching the semi-finals. Korbek suffers from a permanent heart and kidney condition.

Jean-Michel Saive flew the Belgian flag to the quarters but there it was hauled down 10, 13, 19 by Korbek.

Jorg Roskopf also had a great Atlanta. His victims included Patrick Chila 16, 16, 21 and the great five-game struggle to take out Kim Taek Soo before he went down 17, -18, 18 to Liu Guoliang.

DRUG-TESTING was carried out frequently and it caught a few athletes in other sports - the name of the senior drug-tester was DOCTOR HARRY SAMPLE - that is not a wind-up!

TABLE TENNIS fans attended in force. It was alleged that there was a 5,000 sell-out for all sessions. There were often hundreds of seats empty - sold to sponsors, we were told. Tickets for baseball, basketball sold for £150 a session!

CARL PREAN left Atlanta with a smile - he has moved up two places on the world list to No. 33. We can only hope that with Chen Xinhua back in China, Don Parker will be able to persuade Carl to play again for England as they start the promotion bid to win back a place in the Super Division of the European League at St. Austell on September 14. Carl also holds the No. 3 spot on the men's singles list for the ITTF professional tour.

LIZ WILSON was the only British umpire in Atlanta. She found the whole Atlanta experience "enjoyable" and sometimes wishes that other umpires who travel abroad and come back with a list of major moans should not put their names forward - things are always different abroad.

GERMANY AND SWEDEN DOMINATED THE WORLD VETERAN CHAMPIONSHIPS HELD IN LILLEHAMMER, NORWAY. THEIR PLAYERS WON A TOTAL OF 51 MEDALS INCLUDING 12 "GOLD" WRITES BRIAN HALLIDAY.

Li Yuxiang of Germany won the Over 40 mens singles after a titanic struggle in the final against Claus Pedersen of Denmark. Li saved two match points to take the title 14-21, 21-15, 22-20.

TENNIS ELBOW

Pedersen had put paid to the chances of Liang Ji Liang at the semi-final stage. The reigning champion was suffering from tennis elbow and was not quite the force of previous years.

MAJOR SHOCK

The Over 50s event provided the major shock of the championships, when Dragutin Surbek suffered a totally unexpected defeat in the final to Herbert Neubauer. The world famous Croatian, who had demolished all opponents with ease

up to the final, never got to grips with Neubauer's combination of long pimples and anti loop rubber. The Swiss player bemused Surbek and stunned a crowd of over 2000 with an extraordinary display.

England's best moments came from the old firm of Derek Schofield and Matt Sheader.

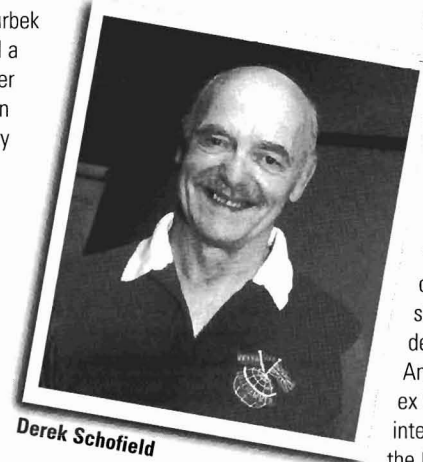

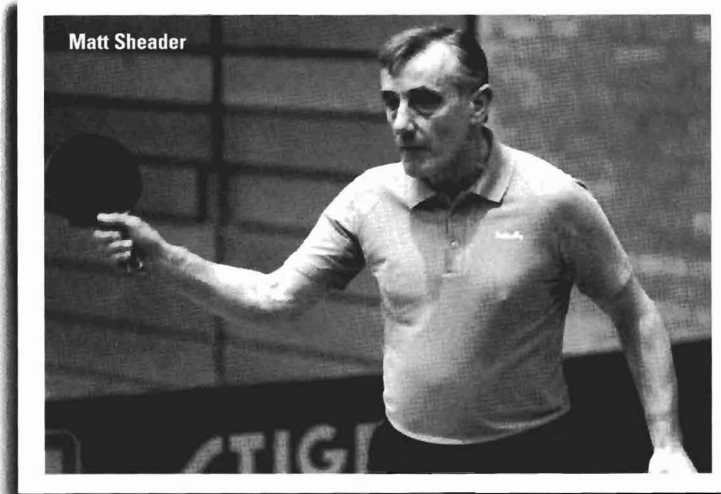

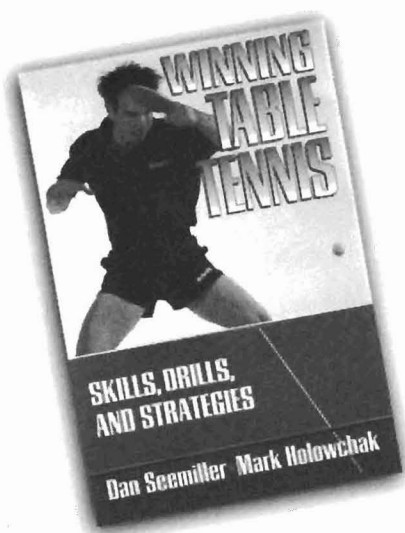

The final was a perfect battle between an attacker Charlotte Cooksley and a defender Hannah

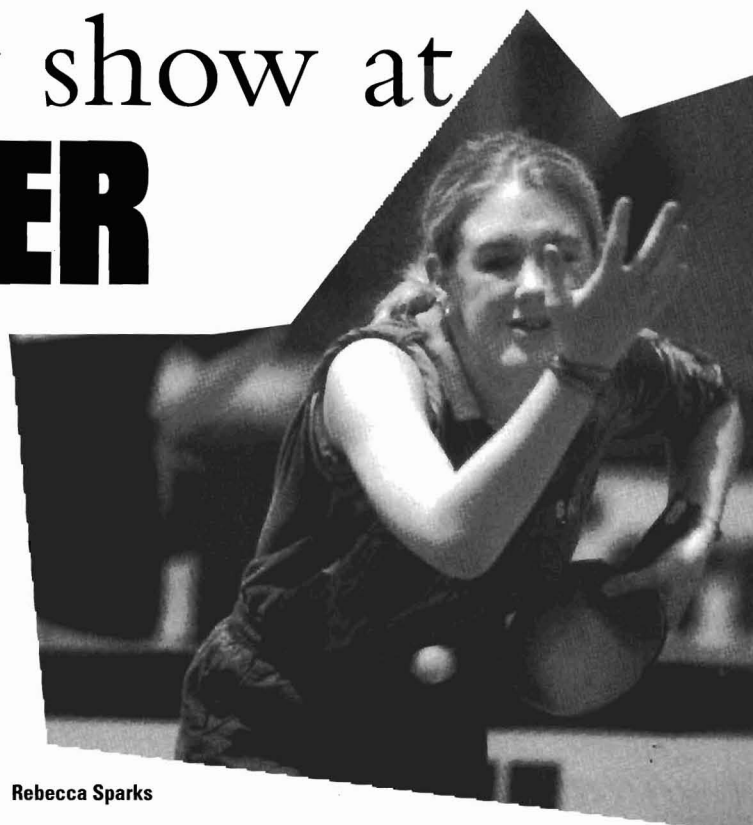

WESLEY BUSH-HARRIS NATIONAL YOUTH DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

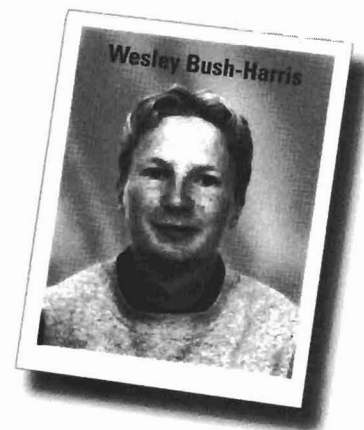

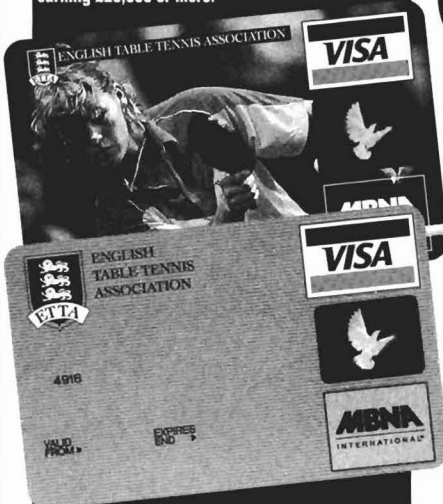
Over the past 3 years he has been studying at the Chichester Institute of Higher Education and has recently

TTN Editor John Wood interviews another big name in Table Tennis

“Table Tennis is My Life”



MICHEL GADAL, CANADIAN NATIONAL COACH SINCE IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE OLYMPICS 1992, BEFORE THAT HE WAS THE FRENCH HEAD COACH BETWEEN 1987 TO 1992.

JOHN WOOD: Why did you leave France?

MICHEL GADAL: I had a very good experience in France, but I needed to do something else. To work in Canada was a new experience and a new challenge, where the first thing was to build up table tennis in Canada. In France I was mostly involved in training, but in Canada I had to organise a system of a higher standard. I have had a very good time during my stay in Canada, the standard of living is very high. Whilst I have been there I have learnt some new things.

JW: When does your contract with Canada expire?

MG: My contract with Canada expires in August 1996, immediately following the Olympic Games in Atlanta. They have made me another offer, but I have also had two other offers from elsewhere, I will make a decision by the end of July.

JW: What do you think of the standard of table tennis being played today?

MG: I think the standard of play is improving and the quality is very good. But how to organise a system to market table tennis is the real problem that needs a solution. Table tennis has to fight with other sports, so we need to build a good product. The presentation has to be improved and the spectators need better information, so that they know what is going on at tournaments.

JW: Will you and your family

ever return to France?

MG: It is possible that one day I will return to work in France, with blinkers off! Because working in Canada has broadened my outlook. I now have a much broader perspective of table tennis. At the moment countries are fighting each other. But I have now learnt that for the good of table tennis we must all pull together, to combat the challenge from other sports. We must be more professional, because if we are not, we will lose our share of the market to other sports.

JW: Are you married and do you have children?

MG: Yes I am married to my wife Helene and I have two children, Stephanie who is 14 years old and plays the piano, and Christelle who is 23. Sadly both don't play table tennis, but there are other things in life. But for me table tennis is my life. I shall always be involved in the sport I love.

JW: When did you start coaching?

MG: Twenty three years ago when I was just twenty years old, I started in Montpellier in the South of France in 1979. It was where I met Jean Philippe Gatien. I was National Junior Coach from 1985 to 1987.

JW: Do you have any interests outside of table tennis?

MG: Since moving to Canada I have started playing golf, and whenever I am free I like to play and so does my wife Helene. I also like to read books and I like good food and wine.

JW: How will Canada do in the World Championships in Manchester in 1997?

MG: We have decided to finish with the older players and start with a new generation, with the juniors that



won both the English Junior Open titles in 1995. Most of the team will be young seniors, we won't worry about the results in Manchester, because we are building for the future. Our goal is the 2000 Olympics in Sydney. Canada is a very big country and they have had financial problems, where table tennis has had a 20% cut each year for the last two years. But it is better now. We have to spend more money travelling to Europe and Asia for the right kind of practice. We have been patient and the situation is improving and we will do better in the future.

JW: How do you see the world table tennis scene?

MG: I think that the European and Chinese men are well balanced, it is the best situation because no one nation is dominant. But at the English Open this year the Chinese put up a very strong display, especially Kong Linghui, but before I can make a decision on the quality of Kong, I will wait and see how he copes with losses.

JW: What is your opinion of the launch of the new ITTF Pro Tour?

MG: I think the ITTF Pro Tour is very good, it will make table tennis an

individual game. Which I think is a positive move, because I think that team events should always be separate. The ITTF Pro Tour will put table tennis in front of the public and put us up there with the other sports. The format of the ITTF Pro Tour is excellent. I think this tournament is made for players who are now used to playing for 12 months a year. If the countries who are staging their open tournaments as part of the ITTF Pro Tour, keep the same dates each year, then the players will get used to peaking at the same time each year. This tour will give players a good living in table tennis. Singles and doubles only is the best format. Michel Gadál was interviewed by John Wood at the Senior European Championships in Bratislava, in April 1996.

Since the interview Michel has continued as National Coach with Canada, having signed a new contract. He is also working part-time with the Brazilian Table Tennis Association and the International Table Tennis Federation, where he works on the ITTF High Performance Project.

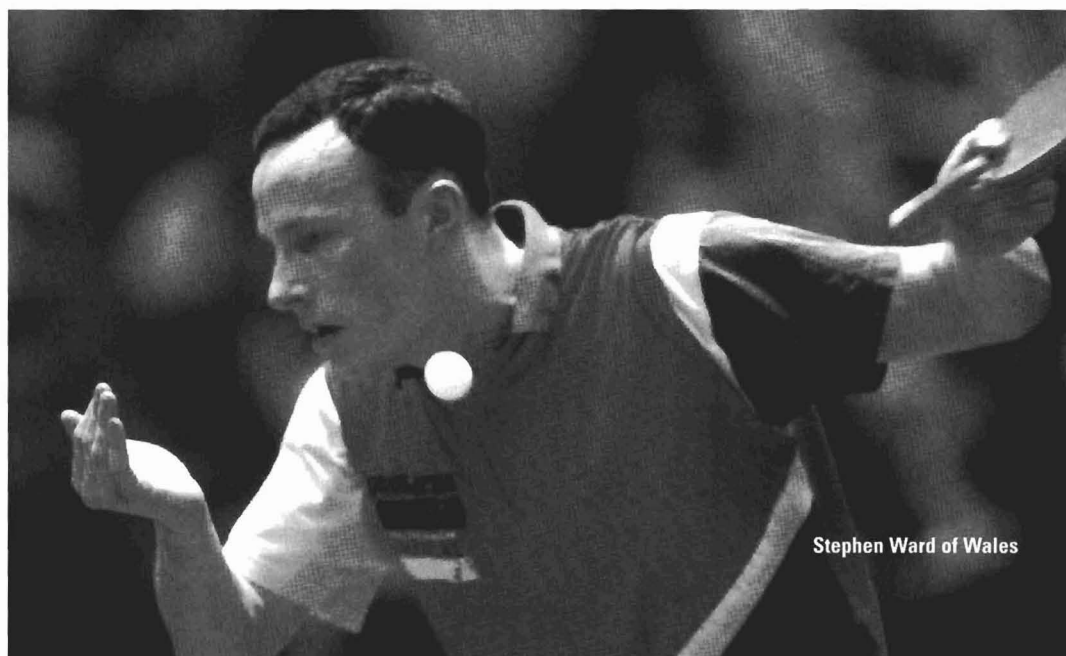
BLACKPOOL 3 STAR OPEN 25/26TH MAY 1996

Sadly, it is unlikely that the tournament will be staged next year due to the World Championships being held in Manchester.



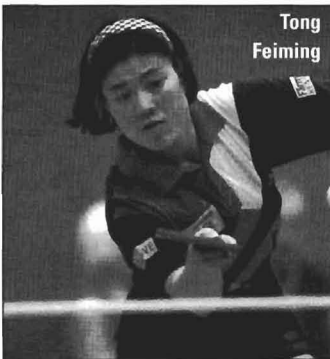

ONLY TWO FOREIGN PLAYERS HAVE SIGNED ON THIS SEASON, TONG FEIMING HAS JOINED LINDA FARROW JOOLA IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, AND MICHAEL GEORGE FROM TRINIDAD WHO IS JOINING BULLDOG SECURITY IN DIVISION III MIDLANDS & WEST



On their way this season to France are Alan Cooke, Lisa Lomas and Ewan Walker, joining Matt Syed, Desmond Douglas, Bradley Billington and Stephen Dorking, whilst Andrew Eden is on his way, joining Carl Prean in Germany. Last season saw Alex Perry and Debbie Toole join clubs in Sweden.

This means that nearly all of our top players are playing in Europe, reversing the trend of the dissy heights of the inauguration of the British League. When it started our top players of that era returned from Europe to play in Britain, when the likes of matches between Ellenborough and Ormesby would attract audiences of between 300 to 500 people.

So what has gone wrong? Possibly the lack of sponsorship. Probably the lure of big money, and the chance to play against some of the best players in the world are the main attractions of playing in Europe. But they aren't the only reasons, because this coming season has the most congested calendar ever! And, due to this congestion, there was the shock announcement that Team Peniel had

pulled out of the British League, because of too many clashing dates. When TTN asked other clubs their opinions of the clashing dates, we were informed that several had also considered whether to pull out. Gladly, they decided to stay in.

Obviously something is wrong with the format, so maybe it's time to consider playing the British League matches over 3 or 4 weekends, instead of 14 Sundays. Falling in line with the Womens, Junior, Veterans and County tournaments.

Sadly, Edison have also dropped out, but for different reasons, as they have lost their premises.

Edison's Reg Rockall said, "I've put a large part of my life into this club, only to see it all disappear. To put it mildly I'm gutted!"

PENIEL QUIT
THE DEPARTURE OF TEAM PENIEL FROM THE BRITISH LEAGUE FOR THIS SEASON HAS SENT SHOCK WAVES THROUGH TABLE TENNIS. JOHN WOOD INTERVIEWS PETER LINNECAR OF TEAM PENIEL TO DISCOVER THEIR REASONS FOR LEAVING.

JOHN WOOD: Why did Team Peniel decide to leave the British League?

PETER LINNECAR: We looked at the calendar where 8 clashes out of the 14 British League weekends occurred; 3 regional tournaments and our own Peniel Junior 5 Star plus four other tournaments. So we had 8 clashes affecting both of our British League teams. We want to support the idea of the regional tournament circuit, so we asked ourselves are there reliable people planning the calendar or not? But we are going to support the Woolwich Junior British League and the Women's British League weekends. We are still supporting table tennis. To suggest otherwise is a nonsense.

The problem is the kids are beginning to question the management of the sport overall. The impact on the children worries me because they think the sport is not being run professionally.

JW: Did Andrew Eden's departure influence your decision?

PL: Definitely not. We still had John Holland, Grant Solder, Sean Gibson and Vince Avery, plus others, available. Andrew has gone abroad to further his career because there isn't the right competition here in the British League to develop his game. We wish him well in Germany. He has been a great help to our club over many years.

JW: Will you ever wish to return to the British League?

PL: Yes, if it was constructed correctly, probably played over 2/3 weekends like county championships. It would be much more of an event with lots to see for the spectators and of course, there would be many more matches for the players.

JW: What is the future for Team Peniel?

PL: We have 70 youngsters playing now at the club and Nicky Jarvis has already given the targets to them for next season. Nicky is ably assisted by Grant Solder. We are very pleased with Grant. He has just completed his first season with us

£18,000. What we might do with the money not spent on the British League teams is to have another 5 Star Junior tournament at the end of each season, probably commencing with the 1997/1998 season, because there is a definite need for the kids to be involved in tournaments.

What is also required is the honour for kids to play for club, county and country. We have lots of children at Peniel and we are doing a lot for them. So we need it to be professional all the way to the top. We want the kids to aspire to the top with pride and at the moment I don't think the evidence is there. That is the case because of the lack of professional management

in the sport.

We will be involved in table tennis for the long term and are prepared to invest in all youngsters' futures, hence our staging of international open tournaments where all players get the chance to play against the best.

The vision should be one of excellence, not just making do.

Lindsey Thornton won this year's Womens under 18 Singles title, following a battle with her old rival Michelle Haynes, 17, -14, 11.

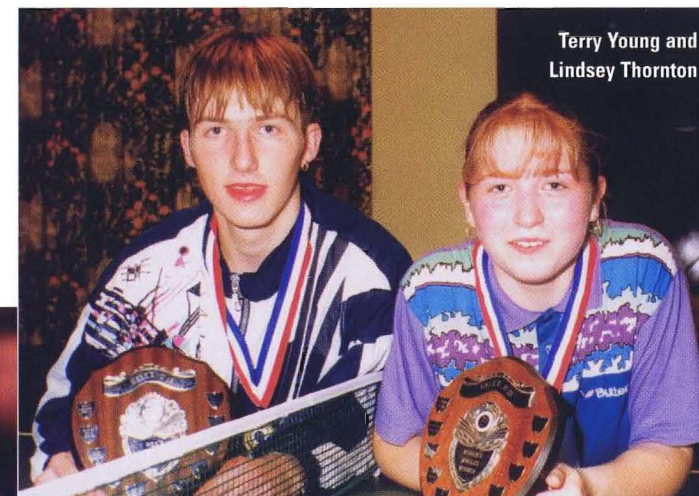
Thornton took the first leg in style 21-17, after a tentative start by both girls, but the second game was far more exciting going point for point up

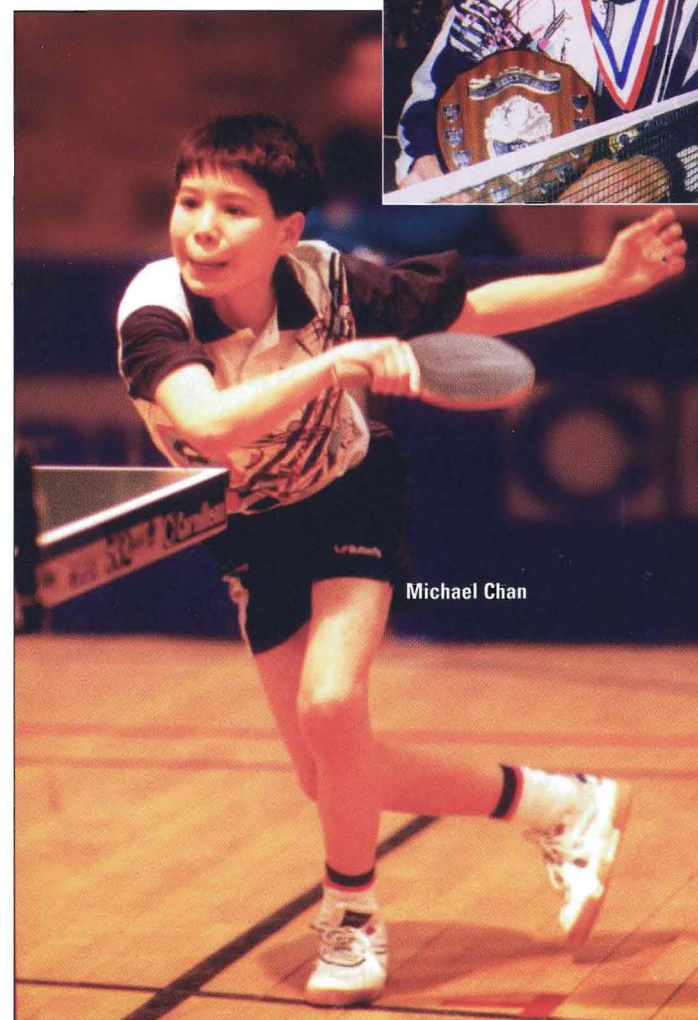

In general the sport is flourishing, due in no small part to the efforts of a large army of volunteer coaches, from Elgin and Aberdeen in the north down to Dunfermline and Wigtownshire two hundred miles to the south-west. There has also been a recent influx from the Orkneys and Shetlands. Our National Coach David Fairholm makes strenuous efforts to cover as much of the area as possible, and has developed his performing talents on his many visits to primary schools, where he inveigles youngsters into trying a sport which most of them have never considered.

Our 1996/97 season opens in a flurry of activity, with National Assessments in four age-groups (Minors to Seniors) in September. Our top players, Euan Walker, Iain Stokes, Sarah Hurry and Eleanor Meenan, will also be playing in the Isle of Man in the Home Countries International.

OLDFIELD WINS IN IRELAND

England Dominate

AS EVER, THE ENGLISH SCHOOLS' TABLE TENNIS ASSOCIATION CONCLUDED THEIR 1995/6 SEASON BY COMPETING IN THE ANNUAL HOME INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS, HELD THIS SEASON IN CARDIFF.

It is fitting to open these notes with a sincere 'thank you' and equally sincere congratulations to the Table Tennis Association of Wales and to their sponsors, the Sports Council of Wales, for hosting a thoroughly enjoyable weekend of table tennis at the prestigious Institute of Sport in the capital city.

As has so often happened in the past England, with their strength in depth, dominated the team events,

making a clean sweep at Under 14 and Under 16 level, with Ireland coming out on top in the B18 and a shock result turning up in the G18 where England, asked to field a 'B' team with the Isle of Man unable to name a squad in this age group, saw the second string overturn the senior quartet in the final.

And, before leaving the Isle of Man, they must be congratulated on fielding teams in five of the six age groups. No trophies were won, but to produce five squads to compete at this level from their small and sparsely populated island is a major success in itself.

Still with the Team Event and congratulations go to Ireland (Gerard Boyle, Paul Fitzpatrick, Brian

Fitzgerald) on breaking the England stranglehold, whilst Wales, who entered A and B teams in both Under 14 events which were played in the initial stages in two groups, saw the A team come out top of their group in each, only to lose to England in the play-off in both cases.

Moving on to the Individual events, a different picture emerged with England notching three wins, Ireland 2 and the host country one, the runners-up coming from Wales (3), Ireland (2) and England (1). Also introduced, possibly for the first time in these championships, was a doubles event in each age/sex group, and here the honours were very much shared round with Wales and Scotland each claiming two wins and Ireland and England one each.

Also worthy of note was the 'scattering of the seeds' in the Individual events with only Peter Marshall (England, B16) and Adam Robertson (Wales, B14) coming through from the top seeded slot to claim a singles title, whilst in the doubles Claire Lowe/Sarah Davidson

(England G18) and Robertson/Stephen Jenkins (Wales, B14) came through from the top of the draw.

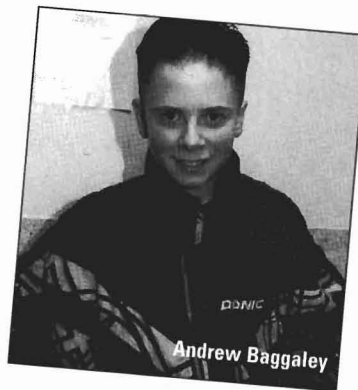

Chinese Fly-Away

THE SUDDEN DEPARTURE OF CHEN XINHUA BACK TO HIS NATIVE CHINA, SIGNALS THE END OF AN ERA THAT PROMISED SO MUCH WHEN CHEN BURST UPON THE ENGLISH TABLE TENNIS SCENE LIKE A BREATH OF FRESH AIR, WITH A STUNNING AND COLOURFUL VICTORY OVER GERMANY'S HIGH FLYING JORG ROSSKOPF IN THE MEN'S SINGLES SEMI-FINAL OF THE ENGLISH OPEN AT BOWLERS IN MANCHESTER, IN 1991.

It was hoped that Chen's unique style and approach to the game would rub-off onto our juniors, where he was expected to assist in the development of our young players, like European players do in their respective countries. But, sadly this never happened.

In France it is normal for their National squad players to assist with the regular coaching schemes. Last season our very own Bradley Billington, who now plays in France, was amazed to be fed balls by Jean Phillippe Gatien during one of these sessions.

So TTN decided to publish two different examples of Asian table tennis players, who married English wives and promised to build a future in England.

CHEN IN BUSINESS

There are a few readers of TTN who are not especially interested in what the future is holding for Chen Xinhua as he dons his Great Britain shirt for the first and last time in Atlanta, but there are many who want to know what is ahead for him and his family.

Near his former home town of Fukien, in the suburbs of Fuzhou at the Deng Yun Summit Golf Club he has set up the Chen International Business Agency Limited - "The Ultimate China-Europe Link" announces his red and gold business card.

He is the chairman of the young

company and is hoping to business as middlemen between firms and individuals in China and Europe.

China is of course, largely a vast untapped market in the world of business - this is where the former World Cup Winner is hoping to step in.

He has had one success in persuading one premiership club - Manchester City - to pay a visit to China. He was hoping for more clubs to visit China this summer.

He has a huge passion for golf that started in England and is now playing off a handicap of six at his home club where he plays almost everyday, teeing off at 5.30 am before the day's business starts. "My house at Maltby is still on the market" he said, "but for now my future is in China where most importantly my three boys will become fluent Chinese speakers."

One of Xinhua's ambitions in life is to see his sons able to speak fluent Chinese - an ambition that is unlikely to be fulfilled when his family are living in Europe - only in Asia.

His wife Jeanette is gradually settling down to life in South China, but finds it difficult driving on the roads with all the signs in Mandarin - the same problem that Xinhua has in Europe. Will we in England ever see his skills as a table tennis player again? Possibly not, although it is still my view that he is amongst the

David Tan came to England at the age of eleven years old from Singapore and settled in London and started playing table tennis four

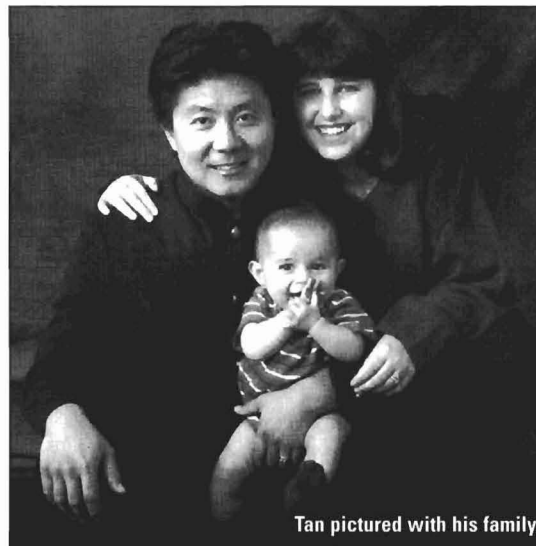
The second year he played for Ellenborough alongside Mark Mitchell, Colin Wilson, and Graham Sandley and won the National league.

Following 2 years of playing for Ellenborough he decided there was no future in the game and got a job working in the travel industry where he still is today, as a partner of Travel Power Ltd.

"Whilst working in the travel industry, my brothers and I also took

part in films and television. This included 'Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom', 'The Fiendish Plot of Dr Fu Man Chu' starring Peter Sellars and 'Chinese Detective' with David Yip," he said.

Tan is now married with an English wife called Lynn and has a little boy

years later.

Laurie Landry who was the Middlesex coach invited him to the weekly Middlesex coaching held at East Finchley, London. He also took David, Andy Barden and Mark Mitchell around the tournaments all over England. After one year of playing he was ranked No.9 in the national junior rankings.

During his senior playing days he was offered a professional contract to play in Holland in the first division. Trevor Taylor and Peter Taylor were the other players living and playing in Holland.

Tan believes England has a lot of talent amongst the children but in order for them to become champions a lot of work and support must be done. Both financial and training facilities must be made available.

Tan added, "The European players consistently have new players coming through. We used to beat the Belgians and the Dutch easily, I think we would struggle now to survive against them!"

"I recently moved from London to Brentwood where I will be playing and coaching for Team Peniel, assisting Nicky Jarvis. I decided to put back what was offered to me when I was younger by Laurie Landry and my Chinese coach Charlse Sia."

REGULATION Changes

THE NEW SEASON IS UPON US, THE OLYMPICS HAVE GONE, THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN MANCHESTER TO COME.

Also to come with effect from 1st September 1996 some regulation changes. The regulations regarding advertisements on players' clothing, highlighted in the last edition, show two changes (i) there may be 1, 2 or 3 advertisements on the front or side of a shirt within a total area of 160sq.cms. (not 120 sq.cms. as before) and (ii) there may be 1 or 2 advertisements (not 1 as before) on shorts or skirt within a total area of 80 sq.cms. (not 40 sq.cms. as before). Other changes made were:

Discipline: a player or official who commits a serious offence against I.T.T.F. regulations will be reported to his parent association with a recommendation for disciplinary action.

Lighting: where several tables are in use in a playing hall, the lighter level must be the same for all of them, and the level of background lighting must never be greater than the lowest level of lighting in the playing area.

Permission: an Association must not unreasonably withhold permission for any of its players to compete in Open International Championships or an international restricted or invitation tournament.

The new season also brings the advent of E.T.T.A. Regional Open Tournaments to be held at Kings Lynn, Bath, Andover, Stratford-on-Avon and Sunderland. A suggested innovation was to run these tournaments without qualified umpires (until the later stages). Many tournaments are run like this on the continent, apparently very successfully, with the players themselves accepting the responsibility of umpiring (or is it scoring?) the matches. This often happens at English tournaments for early group matches and is successful, but when the groups are

finished will players still be available to umpire when they are out of the tournament or when they have more matches to play? Will they be available when required? And will they have the expertise to maintain the referee's schedule? It is a bold experiment to provide more tournaments and will depend on the willing co-operation of all players involved. I would welcome comments, opinions and observations from regular tournament players regarding this idea.

There has been a good deal of interest in the Tournament Umpire qualification mentioned in the last edition and a list of interested County Umpires in being compiled. The list will be of great use to tournament organisers and can be made available on request. Full details regarding the qualification will be made available to everyone on the list when they have been finalised by the N.U.R.C.

News of another umpiring qualification, this time for youngsters under 16, who may take it at schools, youth clubs, sport/leisure centres and table tennis clubs. It is the Junior Umpire Award and is being introduced by the E.T.T.A. in consultation with the English School Table Tennis Association. A certificate and badge will be issued following satisfactory completion.

Many of you may well receive copies of the I.T.T.F. publication Table Tennis Digest. The July issue No. 22 is well worth reading with articles on the origins of table tennis by our own Alan Duke, on the demise of table tennis by Azmy Ibrahim (USA) and Peter Luxton (Australia), on the practical assessment of umpires by Derek Tyler (former English International Umpire and current I.T.T.F. assessor) and a possible way forward by the editor, Colin Clemett.

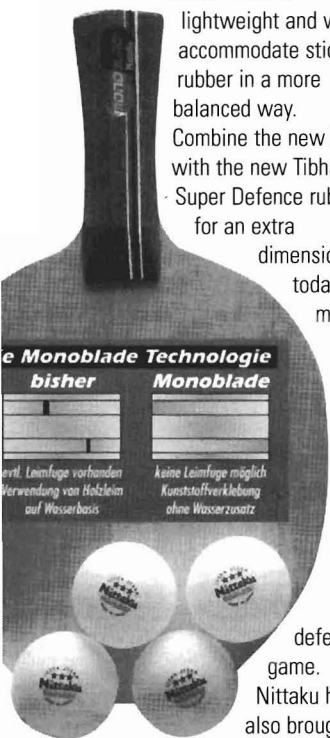

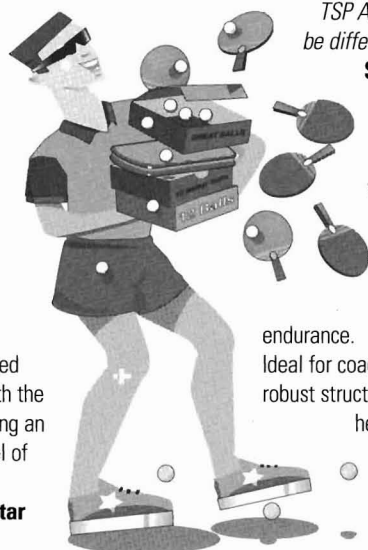

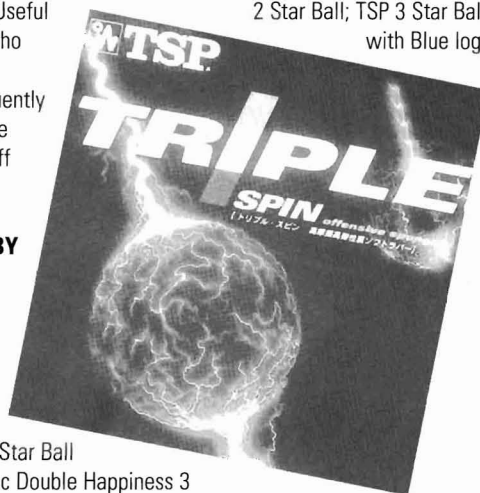

UNTOLD BENEFITS

It is, I think, a well-known fact that the number of people that are playing table tennis these days all over the country is rapidly approaching an all time low. Of course there are isolated places where coaching and development have triumphed and they have reaped untold benefits.

I was therefore delighted to hear last April that Dave Harvey and Graham Slack were proposing to concentrate specifically upon these two very important factors and, without any hesitation, I invited them both into the studios of BBC Radio Gloucestershire South and West to make their future proposal's public. Since that interview on 20th April, much has taken place and here are a few of the highlights:

Upon development Graham Slack reports: since the end of last season two 'taster' evenings have been held - at Grosvenor Y.C. and Twyning Y.C. Both were highly successful with follow-ups to be arranged.

The focus of development moves to Gloucester and the Forest of Dean in September. The year in Cheltenham and the North Cotswolds has been an unqualified success with a higher entry for our Lucozade Fun Day than for the county closed and two youth clubs (Westfield and Longborough) entering the Cheltenham Town League for the 1996-7 season, as a direct result of our development policy. Replies are awaited from a further six youth clubs.

A major step forward is that some of our juniors are now attending open tournaments with reasonable success. This will continue next season and hopefully even more juniors will attend.

County trials will be held on 1st and 7th September at Cirencester for men, ladies and

junior boys and we hope to hold an assessment for junior girls on the same days.

Coaching reported by Dave Harvey: Dave has conducted regular three hour sessions split into two groups and generally aimed at improving the overall standard of our juniors. Due to the lack of junior girls an additional ten weeks on separate dates were exclusively devoted to encourage rank and file beginners and various junior girls schools were targeted.

This venture has proved to be most fruitful and several talented youngsters have emerged. Grateful thanks are recorded for the help received from Peter Cruwys, Graham Slack, Mike Brown and Tony Morgan.

On Saturdays, in a joint venture with Graham Slack, Dave Harvey has conducted four hour coaching/training sessions open to anyone residing in the county. This has proved to be extremely popular and results are encouraging - a maximum of eight tables are in use for all the above mentioned coaching and training sessions.

Recently Cheltenham were approached to see if they could raise enough support in table tennis for a sports exchange holiday in Germany in August. It is pleasing to note that nine or ten of our junior players (including no less than six from totally new clubs Longborough and Bourton) will be taking part.

Dave Harvey further reports that Elaine Marshall has recently won the British Open Table Tennis Tournament for the disabled at Wrexham - beating her long term rival Judith Smith in the final 21-12, 21-15.

Elaine is now the third National Champion from Gloucestershire since Ian Harrison and Bryan Merrett achieved similar success over thirty years ago - indeed a fantastic achievement. In combination with Judith Smith, Elaine also triumphed in the lady's team event against Bernice Woodhead (Devon) and Jo Roberts (Northampton).

Elaine represented Great Britain in the Olympics four years ago in Barcelona and is also Strouds Ladies Singles Champion. She owes much of her success to her own great determination and that of her coach - County Coach Steve Moreman.

PLEASURE

A good time to sum up last season. It was one which locally we remember with some pleasure.
 Our new centre opened in August and in its first year managed to break even, which offers encouragement for the future. More important, it afforded regular practice under excellent conditions to our best players as well as others who have improved their game. It afforded an excellent venue for our tournaments and representative matches. We now have firm roots.

The Ryde Club which uses the venue on two nights per week is enjoying a rise in membership. Local taxes remain shattering and a cause for concern.

Our team won the Southern Region League. Despite two victories of 6-3 against main rivals Coppenham, in the end it was KCD Fareham who brought home our bacon by defeating Cippenham. The curious, if not uninteresting points system nearly caused our downfall. You get two points for winning 5-4 and 6-3, but three by winning 7-2 and over. The latter important 'formality' our team too often overlooked even when 5-0 up. Only one game was lost, but that was by 7-2 against Burnchal, which reversed a 6-3 win at home. Serious thought is now being given to entering the main British League, perhaps in 1997. All our players performed with distinction, notably the ever reliable Roger Hookey, 16 year old Danny Burns and Mike Turner who kept producing wins at vital moments, which is what one hopes for and seldom gets from a No. 3. Our Juniors again won the Hampshire Inter-Town League. With Danny and Lorna Dutch (playing in a boy's spot) and James Ovnik and Lucy Pointer this was a very strong team. We have won the event 3 times out of 4, but next season will be tough with Lorna seemingly 'losing interest' and Lucy away for the first match. It will be a hard act to follow.

Our Cadets came second in their section. With Lucy (playing against boys and almost unbeatable for all that), Nathan Godolphin and Dean Whittington this was a very strong team (average age 11) which indicates a major achievement in coming second in such good, older company.

Lucy reached the semi-finals in the National U-12 Championships, but did less well in the Under 11. I could not make it to the event, but was pleased to see that it has remained on the Calendar. It was something I started when I was Chairman of the Association. Lucy has been working on her game all summer, as, no doubt, have her main rivals. Time will tell how effective our coaching has been. I see a great future for her, if she keeps her enthusiasm for the game, which is not always easy to do.

I also have high hopes for Danny Burns, so much better than the ranking points indicate.

I get quite a few letters on the subject of Carl Preat, such an asset when he is here (not often enough), after whom our centre is named.

As all local league players know, sometimes there are players with whom we do not want to play in the same team, let alone for a season or more. Carl, rightly or wrongly, came to that point with Chen Xinhua after 5 years of patience, when Chen had let us down, as Carl saw it, rather too often. Carl did not enjoy our descent into second class status as a table tennis nation.

It was perhaps inevitable that Chen would let us down yet again when we most needed him,

which was in the two relegation matches against Poland, who should, without Grubba, have been a doddle for us. There was no sign of Chen. He had returned to China in our hour of need. We may have no fewer than seven selectors, but I presume it did not occur to any of them to recall Carl for the match against the Poles. Pride came before the fall and so we went down, a ridiculous and unnecessary state of affairs.

We repeated that dose in the main European Championships and the next team event will see us perform in Category 2.

We had high hopes for Carl in the Olympics, particularly after he had won the "Brazilian Open", a Grand Prix event. However, the sort of black day it is difficult to explain saw our hopes explode. The Atlanta jinx also struck our table tennis hopes.

For all that, his friends on the Island hope that Carl's return to the England Team and the main international tournament scene will not be delayed for too long. One presumes that Chen at 36 (at least) has really retired and that the way is now open for a recovery from a bad time for English table tennis. I was never one to feel that the importation of Chinese veterans was the best way to encourage or produce good English players, but often seemed a voice in the wilderness, obvious though the conclusions were. The scars will not heal overnight and good sense may remain an absentee for some time yet. With the World Championships in Manchester only a few months away, time is not on our side and it never was.
