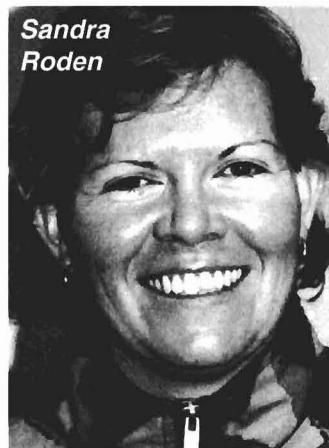
beat the new National Women's Veterans' Singles champion Janet Dunning in the final, 21-18, 21-14, at Droitwich Leisure Centre, last month.

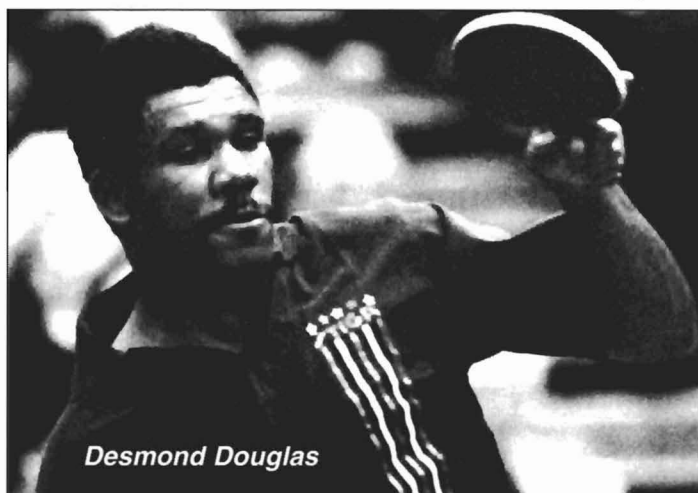
Supported by the Bath and North East Somerset Council, the 1998 English Senior National Championships were played in Bath for the first time, with Matthew Syed retaining the Mens' Singles title that he won in Brighton last year and Lisa Lomas taking the Womens' Singles for the fourth time.

Although two of our leading internationals won the main titles the player who created the most interest and produced the biggest impact was Desmond Douglas, who at the age of 42, reached the final of the Mens' singles and won the Mens' Doubles with Alan Cooke. Desmond reached the final by beating Carl Pread in the quarters and Terry Young in the semi-final. In the final Desmond pushed Matthew Syed all the way. In fact at the beginning of the fifth game it was difficult to predict with any certainty who was to be the likely winner. The fact that Desmond reached the final meant that Richard Eaton, the well known racket sports journalist of the Times newspaper, rushed down to Bath from his home in Oxford to cover the story!

BRITISH LEAGUE BOOST

Des has played most of his table tennis for the last two years in France but has returned to the British scene this season and his presence has been felt in a number of different ways. He is representing Darlington in the British League and since he joined the squad at the turn of the year the team's fortunes have improved to such a degree that they are the likely new Premier Division champions having beaten the holders Launceston 9-5 on a recent visit to Cornwall.

Desmond's appearances at England training camps where he is a regular high level practice partner for the squads have been welcomed by players and coaches alike. All the senior and junior players are

happy to have him on the other side of the table in a practice situation at least. Later in the season Des has the opportunity to really crown his table tennis career by winning his first world title at the World Veteran Championships in Manchester in June. The way he is playing at the moment, Des would undoubtedly be one of the favourites to win the over 40 Mens' singles. As yet Des has not decided whether to compete, so his fans will have to hold their breath a little while longer.

LISA WINS THE NATIONALS FOR THE LAST TIME

Lisa Lomas won the Women's title in Bath beating the holder, Nicola Deaton, in a good final after Nicola had done well to beat Andrea Holt in the semi final. Lisa, who won her first English National singles title in 1985 and regained it in 1989 and 1994, announced her retirement at the event. Her contribution to table tennis, however, will remain strong as after her last event, the European Championships in Eindhoven at the end of April she will be taking up a position as one of the part time National Coaches coaching the England Cadet and Under 12 teams as part of the new World Class Performance plan. We wish Lisa every success in her new career.

Matthew Syed retained his title by producing some spectacular

defensive play to beat Desmond Douglas. Matthew is having probably his best ever season. His international results have been very good and it appears likely that he will gain his first top 16 seeding in the singles event at the European Championships next month as his world ranking continues to improve.

Desmond Douglas is not the only player to return from abroad to play in the British League this season. The League suffered from an exit of leading players two years ago and it is good to see that at least some of them are now returning. Desmond and Bradley Billington have joined Michael O'Driscoll and John Hilton at the Darlington Club. Darren Blake has returned from Sweden to join the North London Club, Progress, where Gareth Herbert and Jason Sugrue are playing. It appears that more of our players who have looked for competition abroad will be signing for English clubs next season, and the majority of those who do sign for Continental clubs will be playing in France, where the clubs allow players to commute so that for most of the week they will be resident and practising in England. This in itself will help to boost the standard again.

MORE COACH APPOINTMENTS

In addition to Lisa Lomas, further

appointments have been announced for coaches within the World Class Performance plan. Denis Neale, Kevin Satchell and Bradley Billington have been appointed associate coaches, while Sylvia Broadbent has been selected as one of the Under 12 coaches. Not all of the positions have yet been filled. Discussions are on-going with two more of the world's leading coaches who are based in continental Europe. We are hoping to be able to announce the final appointments before the end of the season.

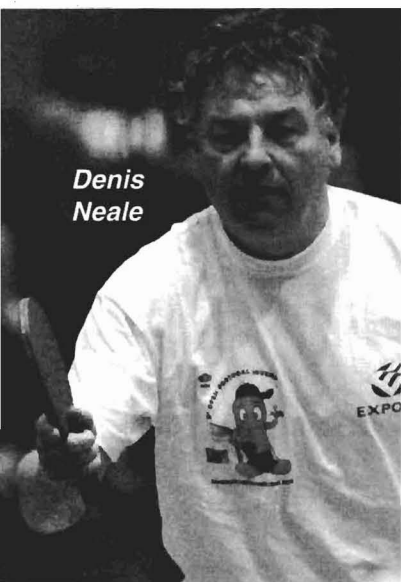
Entries are now arriving by the sackload for the World Veterans tournament which is to be played in Manchester in June. One former English champion who will definitely be playing is Denis Neale. Denis is preparing hard for the Over 50's championships and he is hoping that Desmond Douglas too will decide to play so that they can reunite for the doubles event. Denis and Des won the Mens' Doubles in the English Closed for two successive years in 1977 and 1978.

UNDER 12 SQUAD SELECTIONS

More than 130 youngsters played in the assessment for the Under 12 squad at Lilleshall at the end of February and from that weekend 56 players have been selected for the squad which will embark on 60 days of training and competitions at weekends and in the school holidays during 1998. Producing a wide base of talented young players who have the opportunity of training and coaching under the direction of a number of leading coaches is one of the key ways to improve the standard of the players in this country. Another is to continue with the ETTA's programme of assisting the building of new table tennis centres and three such centres, have opened in the last few weeks.

MORE CENTRES

At a cost of £280,000 and supported by the English Sports



Council Lottery Sports Fund, the Foundation for Sport and the Arts and the Kirklees Metropolitan Borough Council, the Dewsbury and District Centre opened in February as part of the Heckmondwike Sports Club. The facilities include a playing hall for 5 match tables, entrance lobby, kitchen, equipment store and toilets in the table tennis centre. A bar and changing rooms are in the adjacent existing sports club. The main people associated with the development of this centre are Garry Crossley of the Drewsbury & District TTA and Richard Brooker of Kirklees Metropolitan Borough Council.

The Cornwall Table Tennis Centre in St. Austell opened officially on 20th March but prior to that was ready in time to stage the England team qualification tournament for the European Championships in February. Again the English Sports Council Lottery Sports Fund was the largest contributor to the building of the project which will house up to nine match tables. The table tennis centre is a bolt on to the existing Sports Centre at St. Austell Rugby Club. The main driving force behind the project was Dave Lancaster of the Cornwall County Table Tennis Association.

On 4th April the Yellow Dot Centre in Sudbury holds its official opening with six match tables. The total cost has been £190,000 with the majority coming from the English Sports Council Lottery Sports Fund and the Sports Match organisation. The organisation of the table tennis part of the centre

has been undertaken by the Sudbury and District Table Tennis Association. The main people responsible for the development have been Brian Davison of the Sudbury & District Table Tennis Association and Nick Thompson of the Sudbury Yellow Dot Sports Club.

Editor's Comment: I thank you for your concern Derek, regarding *Table Tennis News*. I wish to inform you that other magazines have a production team available to produce their magazines, as well as

several journalists employed on a full time basis. Table Tennis News is produced on a very tight budget and I run a one man show. So as you can appreciate timing is vital in my case, as I don't have many hands to call upon when copy is delayed, due either postal problems or missed deadlines. But I can assure you Derek that I do the best that I can for all concerned.

OLYMPIC QUESTION

Whilst on the one hand international table tennis worthies such as the Japanese founder of Butterfly, Hikosuke Tamasu, and the Welsh Hon. Life President of the ITTF, H Roy Evans are warning that our sport's place at the Olympics may be at some risk, on the other hand we learn that snooker has gained Olympic status, being a demonstration sport at Sydney before full inclusion at Athens 4 years later. Surely both statements cannot be true? Table tennis is a truly massive world wide sport - the world's biggest racket sport - while snooker, despite its highish profile in Britain, is a minor game in world terms, confined largely to the old (white) British Commonwealth.

However, there is a growing international view that the summer Olympic Games are getting too big and that the number of sports and events should be reduced. Just as we may consider snooker a non sport, so we should recognise that many (ignorant) people do not regard table tennis as a proper sport: the real danger is that in a future backlash against size and a reversion to more traditional sports only, the Olympic movement might throw out table tennis alongside other new entrants such as snooker. That would be disastrous for our image, profile and funding. We must hope that the ITTF continues to lobby the International Olympic Committee to keep us in, as effectively as Roy Evans, then ITTF President, did to get us admitted in 1981.

Giving us a timely reminder of how athletic and skillful table tennis can still be played here in England, was the terrific English Closed Mens Singles Final, won 16 in the

fifth by holder Matthew Syed against eleven times champion Des Douglas, at Bath on 8th March - one of the best finals in years. Every point was different, a mini-battle, replete with subtle and sudden variations in spin, placement and tempo. Wonderful touches within classic attack and defence! World standard table tennis in a different dimension than that played by our young pretenders! Juan Antonio Samaranch should have been watching!

For a moment Des, still a class act at 42 and the spellbound audience's favourite, really looked like he might win as he closely took the first game. And again when he won the fourth! But Matthew, helped by a couple of edges, pulled away at the start of the decider, and the old man, tiring now, could never catch up. If Matthew had chopped only. he

undoubtedly would have lost (to an opponent he had never previously beaten), but the mark of improvement was in his fierce and courageous two wing attack and spinny serves. Lisa Lomas played a similar same way to retake the Women's Singles, for the fourth and last time (for she is retiring), against holder Nicola Deaton. I was pleased and privileged to be there!

The 31st successive Cotswold Junior Open took place over the weekend of 31st January and 1st February and this year saw our 6th season at the Cheltenham Recreation Centre. Play was on 17 tables, and there were ten events that were up for grabs, writes Alf Pepper.

In the absence of several of the top ranked boys - Tim Cleminson powered his way to a 12,19, two straight victory against fellow Essex colleague Chris Jamieson in the final of the Boy's U17 Open event.

The Girl's U17 Open for the second year went to a Welsh player - Siwan Davies from Clywd swept to victory with a 13,-19, 14, over Essex's Hanna Yardy.

In the Class2 Junior Girl's Singles, Lucy Pointer (I.O.W), lost her first game against Hayley Thomas of Glamorgan, but rallied to take the next two games at 12 and 11, and to win the event.

Likewise, in the Boy's U17 Class 2 Event Neil Page (Gn) dropped his first game at -21 to Dorsets Dean Haskett, but Page consolidated by taking the title with an overall score of -21,12,20.

In the U14 & U12 Events which were played on the first day, in the Girls U14 Karen Shepherd(Ch) beat Lisa Calcutt 19,10. And the corresponding U14 Boys event resulted in a easy 9, and 8, win for Greg Yarnall (Np) against a rather off form Joe Ferguson from Bucks.

This is another position that Championships Director Mike Watts hopes will enable him to complete a jigsaw of key officials.

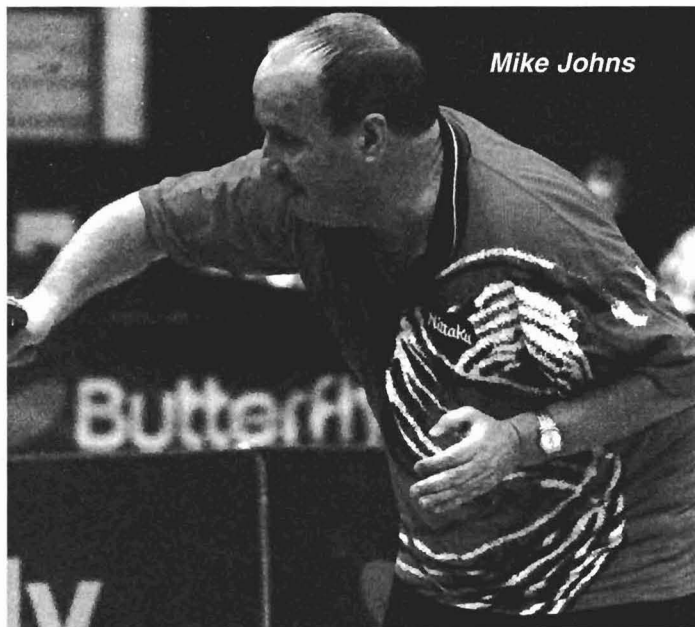
But somewhere in between all that extra work the Northwich official still wants to play.

"It is all about juggling work so that everything fits into place. Overseeing the arrival of 98 tables, along with miles of lighting cable and special flooring in a major job but



once the event starts everything should fall into place."

Only then will Mike be able to turn his talents to the table when he will link up with his three brothers Ian, Brian and Alex to try and win a medal in the team event.

The Cheshire trio have proved they are among the best veterans in the country and now want to prove themselves at world level.

JOHN TAKES ON THE WORLD

John Jermyn will step in as referee at the Championships

with over 50 years experience as player and official behind him.

With well over 2000 players from over 2000 countries taking part it is considered to be one of the toughest jobs in the sport yet John from Baldock in Hertfordshire is actually looking forward to the experience.

He was deputy referee at the World Veterans Championships in Lillhammer two years ago and has held similar positions at the Swedish Open and English Open in Kettering.

But until now he has never been asked to take on the top job. Now he has accepted the appointment he is rarin' to go.

"A good referee will make decisions with confidence. That means being able to

interpret the rules correctly and not to rush into making those decisions.

"It will have a lot of very experienced umpires to call upon who will be very capable of making any decisions that may crop up. Obviously if there are any awkward cases then I will step in," he says.

"A referee's job is to oversee the entire running of the playing schedule. If at the end of the day everything has run reasonably smoothly and I have not been called upon, then I would consider to have made a success of it."

After the championships John plans to begin winding down. "This is without doubt one of the top jobs in the sport but as soon as the championships have finished I plan to start easing up."

TRIUMPH *for* PRIMORAC *but* JOY *for* EDEN

ZORAN PRIMORAC, now 29, must be moving towards the latter stages of his career as a front-rank world-class tournament winner. He won his title at the Qatar Open by bringing down both his main rivals Vladimir Samsonov and Jan-Ove Waldner, just as he did in Nimes to win the World Cup, writes John Woodford in Doha, The Gulf.

The tall handsome Croatian said after his splendid Final's victory at 23-21 in the fourth game against Waldner to win \$30,000 first prize "Having beaten these two twice I am now looking to be No.1 on the world list for the first time."

Speed and accuracy were Primorac's two greatest assets on finals day at the Qatar National Exhibition Centre, but it was his daring ability to counter-hit storming winners with his backhand that gave him victory.

The inaugural womens events were dominated by Chinese players. The response by a number of nations for the women to wear long shorts or any clothing item to cover their thighs was predictable. Some nations declined to send womens teams and some sent reserves- England fell into that category because of the clashing European League match against Sweden.

However, Gemma Schwartz and Lindsey Thornton were feted by the local media. They had their pictures in both the main daily papers "The Peninsular" and the "Gulf Times". The English pair wore their tracksuit trousers on court. Several girls wore cycling shorts coming down to around knee level.

Gemma and Lindsey found themselves up against very strong opposition throughout the tournament, but no doubt the extra chance to play foreigners will pay off.

THE TEAM EVENTS

England's men opened with a relatively easy win over The Lebanon 3-0. But their next opponents Japan, are as strong now as they were five years ago, even with most of the same names - Shibutani, Matsushita. They were at one time all-out defenders, now they can attack to the highest



standard.

England went under 3-0, after Matthew Syed's defence was pounded 11, 13, by Matsushita. Matthew admitted then that he needs more practice against top class defenders.

England's new World-Class Performance director Michel Gadal said after France had stopped the Japanese advance 3-0, "That is the first time France have beaten Japan in twenty years."

So what a slim chance England had! Ironically, Japan's coach is now Soren Ahlen, who was England's coach only last year.

Terry Young, now maturing into a player of class came off best as the young England trio tackled the mens singles qualifying rounds. Some groups had five players. Alex Perry beat all his Arab opponents but fell to the young Danish star Martin Monrad -16,-18.

Andrew Eden had a tough group of five, were he defeated the Danish No.4 Michael Maze 14, -7, 19, but lost to the Indian Chetan Baboor and a Chinese player Tie Zichao.

Young qualified, unbeaten in the groups, finishing with an outstanding win over Mads Sorensen (Denmark) 19,-15, 16. Perry suffered an annoying defeat - he was 17-11 up in the third against the Slovenian No.1 Robert Smrekar but lost -18.

After the groups, the mens singles - the tournament attracted the top 22 on the world ranking list - Matthew Syed was a very disappointed defender. He lost at 16 in the fifth against his doubles partner Evgueni Ctchetinine (Belarus) who was "murdered" by Creanga in the second round.

Young is beginning to fancy his chances against players like Shibutani but coached by Soren Ahlen, it was the Japanese ace who walked home 12,14,16, against the Maidenhead striker currently without a club.

EDEN'S BIG DAY

Last but not least, it was a tournament to remember for Andrew Eden the strong lad from the Chorley, at least for the mens doubles. He was ecstatic about playing with the World No.25 Vasile Florea of Romania. They went through two rounds that included a great win over a powerful Polish pair before an incredible win -17,

10, 13, against the mens singles victor Zoran Primorac and Jean-Michelle Saive of Belgium!

After the stunning win Eden said "This is the best day of my table tennis life. I may be playing with Vasile again in the future".

Primorac was distraught after his doubles defeat, but his big day was to come, the toast was "Eden" but there was very, very little alcohol to be found in The Gulf.

HOSPITALITY & FRIENDLINESS

The Qatar organisers are quickly gaining more experience - this time, their efforts as ITTF Pro-Tour organisers were well up to expectations, the Sheraton and Oasis hotels were first class. Above all, their hospitality and friendliness is well above many other countries.

I represented both the ETTA and the Daily Telegraph at an exclusive banquet hosted at his palace by His Excellency Sheik Khalid Bin Thani Al-Thani who is roughly Minister of Sport in Qatar, although his palace seemed like he was Head of State!

My only stressful experience in Qatar came when a bank cash machine outside "swallowed" my best credit card on a Bank Holiday. Happily, our Arab friends telephoned the bank manager on his day off. He came in to unlock the machine and rescue the card - but I did lose a few hours sleep before the card was recovered.

HALIFAX RESTORATION



The Table Tennis Centre is based on the Calderdale Business Park at Ovenden, Halifax. An offer by the owner to develop a Centre utilising a building of 5,600 sq.ft. was taken up by the Halifax League Management Committee.

Much of the restoration work, painting and decorating was carried out by league officials and the Centre was officially opened in May 1994.

A management team of six led by the League Secretary, Peter Walker, is responsible for the day to day management of the Centre.

The playing side (equipment, etc) was acquired by courtesy of grants from the Foundation for Sport and the Arts and a joint equipment package sponsored by the Sports

Council and the ETTA.

The Centre has a nine table lay-out, twelve for coaching and junior events.

The management team who, between them, possess financial, joinery, electrical and decorating skills, have turned offices attached into a coffee bar, lounge, changing and meeting rooms, and storage areas. A separate room houses the table tennis Robot.

Establishing a specialist centre has stabilized the membership of the league with twenty eight of the fifty three teams using the Centre as a home venue.

The Centre sells table tennis equipment (bats, balls, etc), a service players find very useful.

A comprehensive programme of activity is in place including one evening for adult coaching and a further evening is Junior night. Saturdays are devoted to Junior coaching classes whilst Sundays are reserved for Yorkshire League matches and general practice. The Centre is also available for private hire.

The Centre has several coaches, one a Level 3, the others Level 2.

The effect of good coaching in pleasant surroundings is paying off. Two Junior Leagues formed with local sponsorship whilst a Woolwich Junior League also operates.

The management team are always looking for ways to improve, and at present a team of voluntary craftsmen led by Dennis Norburn and his

brother, Geoff are laying a semi-sprung floor. Two thirds of the Centre has been completed with the rest programmed for completion early in 1998.

Finance for the Centre came from local sponsorship.

The Halifax Table Tennis Centre stands out as a fine Yorkshire achievement and shows what can be accomplished by an enthusiastic team.

LAUNCESTON'S TITLE DREAMS DESTROYED....

By the end of March the transformation at the top of the Premier division was almost complete with Darlington poised to clinch their first ever championship, writes Aubrey Drapkin.

At the beginning of 1998 DML White Hart Launceston had a 100% record and were looking certainties to retain the title that they won last year. But disaster befell them with two successive defeats at the hands of St Neots and Vymura and then a draw with Muna Estates Progress. Darlington then went on to beat St Neots 12-2 this time with Bradley Billington in the team as well as Douglas whilst Launceston won 11-3 in

Glasgow. This left Darlington three points clear with only two matches to play.

Horsham slipped out of the reckoning when they went down 10-4 away to Muna Estates Progress.

Whilst all this was happening at the top of the table a dog fight was developing at the

other end with five clubs all in danger of relegation. Colley Hyundai moved up to seven points but could not get of the bottom, by beating both St Neots (9-5) and Vymura (8-6).

Hart Launceston seconds. OLOP took advantage of these slip ups by beating Kingshurst Bribar to draw level with JAGS.

JAGS however, lost again, this time to C & M Brentwood and OLOP again got both points with a 5-3 victory over Byng Hall Farningham Print which put them two points clear. They then visited JAGS who came back to form to beat them 5-3 and Brentwood won 6-2 at Leckie.

This all meant that the three clubs, JAGS, Brentwood and OLOP were level on points with two matches remaining. Set difference could well determine the winners of this division.

Seasiders Blackpool kept their unbeaten record intact in division two North with victories over Derwent and Grantham whilst Darlington III kept in touch by beating Bulldog Security and Drumchapel Glasgow III.

Hastings still held a three point lead in division two South despite a 6-2 home defeat by Barnet. Barnet then beat Lowlands to go level on points with Chelmsford in second spot, the Essex side being held to a draw away to Horsham II.

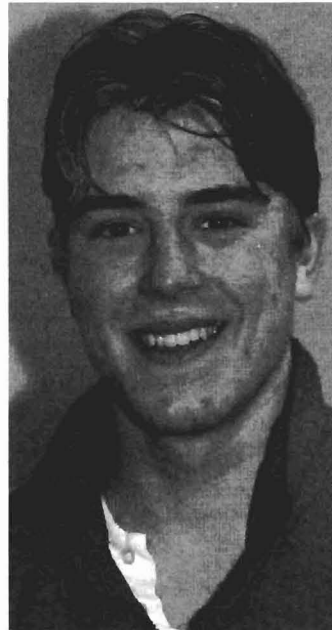

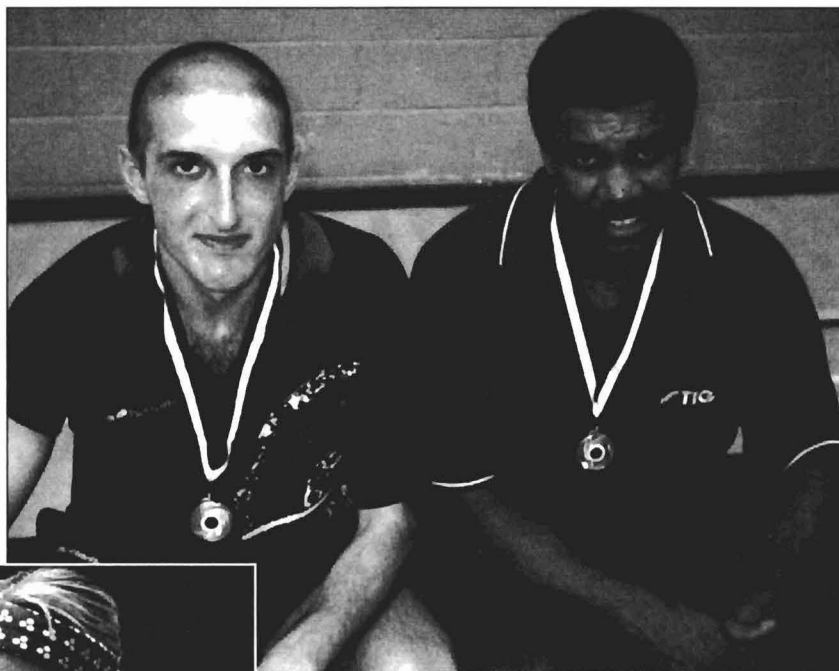

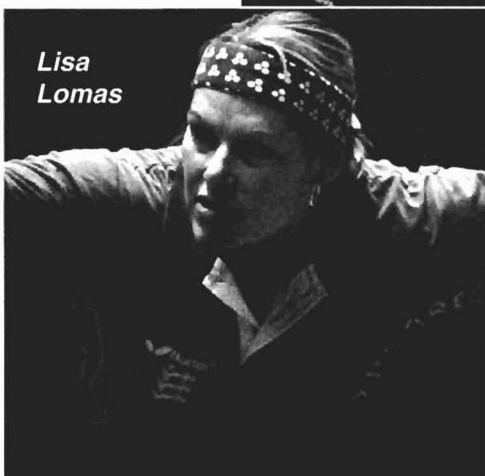

After the final Syed said, "Des is absolutely unbelievable for

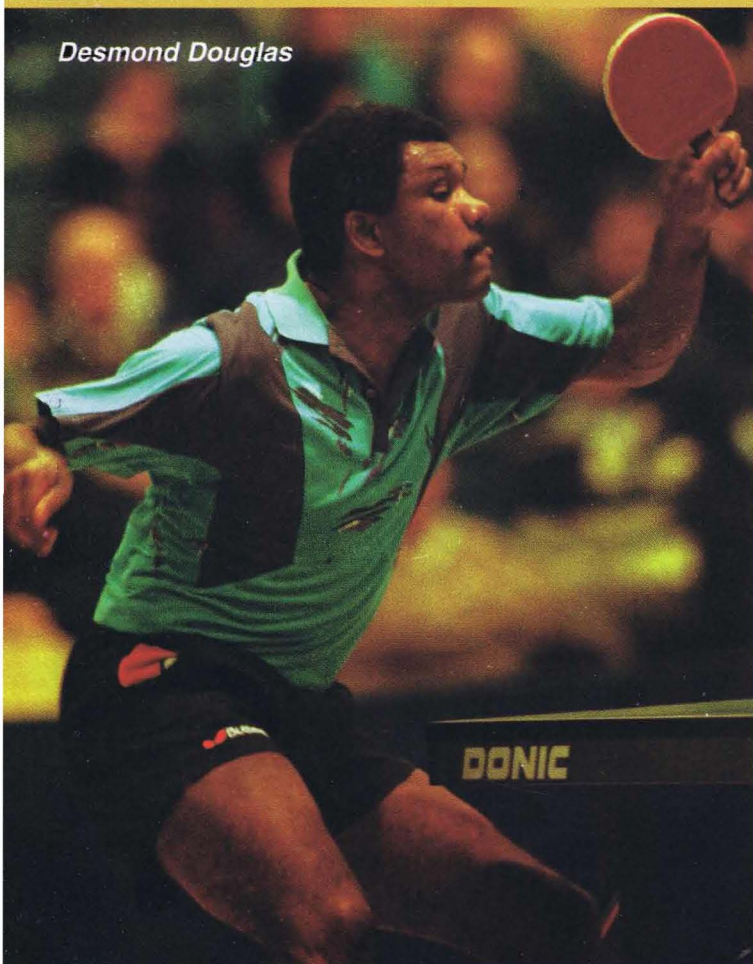
his age." And Douglas said, "I'm absolutely knackered, my legs are almost giving way under me."

FOURTH TITLE FOR LOMAS

If Desmond Douglas is our greatest male player of the modern era, there can be little

doubt that our most famous lady is Lisa Lomas, who announced her forthcoming retirement the day after winning her fourth Women's Singles National title at Bath, on her 31st birthday.

Lomas lost the first game in the quarter-finals to another great fighter Helen Lower, but bounced straight back in true champion's style, winning the next three 15, 11, 15. In the semis she beat Gemma Schwartz, in three straight games.

It was a great tournament for Nicola Deaton. Although she lost her National title, which she won last year in Brighton, she defeated England's second ranked player Andrea Holt at 19 in the fifth - one of her best wins ever, before losing to the super backspin of Lomas -18, 15, 16, 8, in the final.

Nicola is now an established member of the England Women's squad, and now that

Lisa is going to concentrate on coaching, her win over Andrea indicates that she could soon be competing for the England No.1 spot.

This year's Under 21 Women's title was won by Shelly Ruocco from Essex, who defeated west country girl Joanna Barraclough in the final, -17, 11, 13.

Former National Singles champion Alan Cooke partnered Desmond Douglas to record their sixth National Men's Doubles title beating England's next generation Gareth Herbert

and Terry Young in the final comfortably, 21-12, 21-6, proving that there is many a good tune played on an old fiddle.

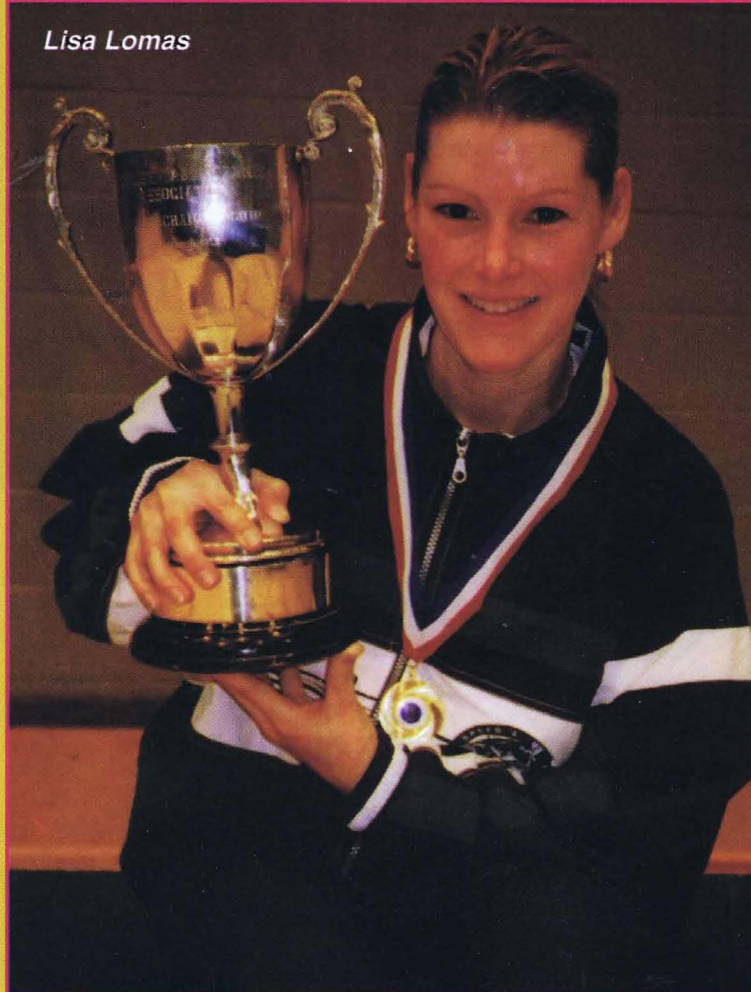

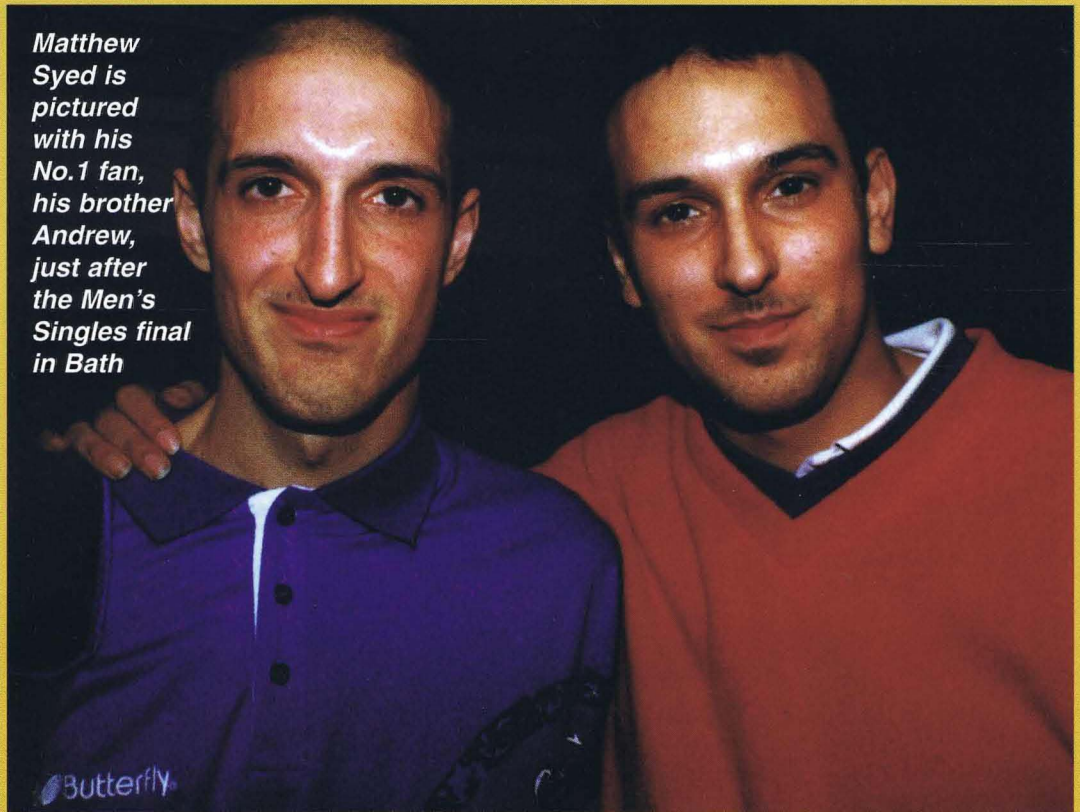


Champion when she looped and powered her way to victory against the tight defence of Devon's Penny Perry 14 and 14.

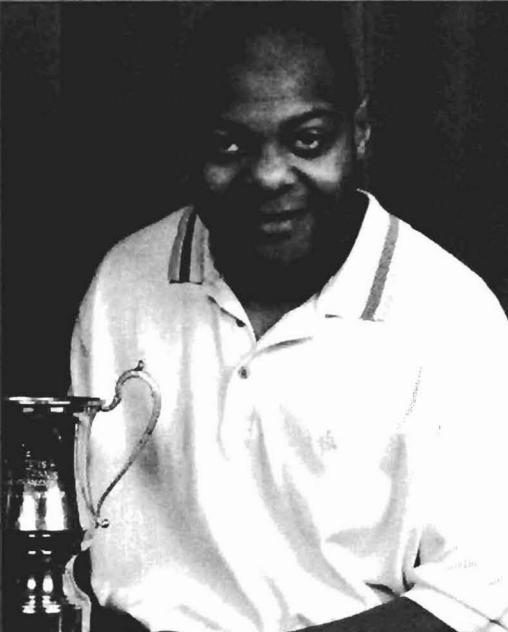

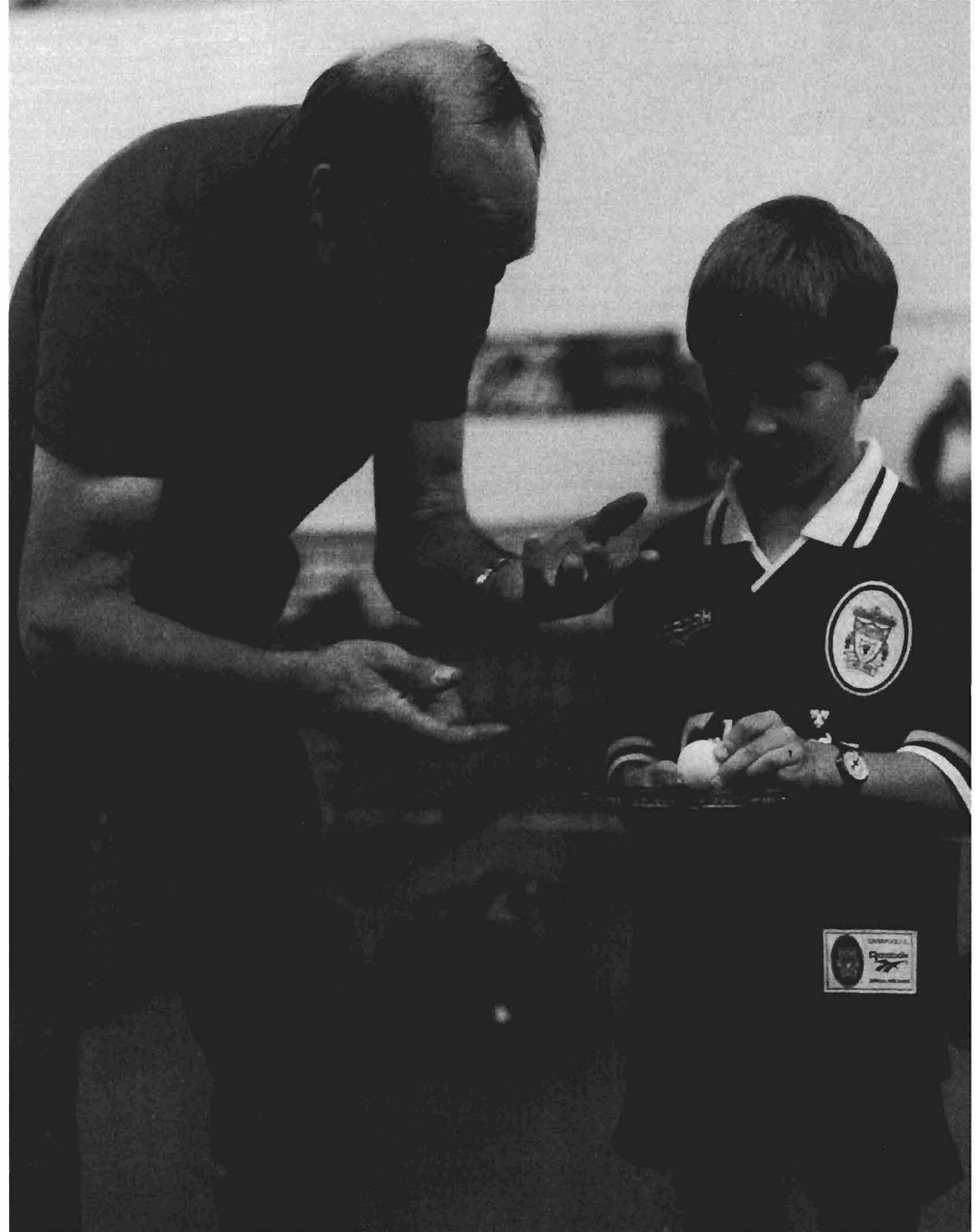
Table tennis clubs and individual volunteers are being urged to take part in the new look Volunteer Investment Programme (VIP) in 1998, which has just been unveiled.

At the other end of the division the two relegated teams are Essex and Buckinghamshire. Essex won one and drew two whilst Bucks failed to score a point losing all seven matches.

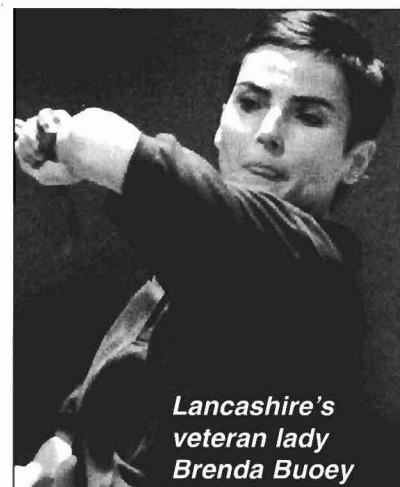
VETERANS PREMIER DIVISION

Our new Chairman, Gordon Burns will be heading our drive towards Phase 2 of our Carl Preat Table Tennis Centre. He has already enlisted the support of our MP Dr Peter Brand, who was kind enough to comment as follows on our endeavours "...I have been very impressed at the way the Isle of Wight Table Tennis Association has put Island Table Tennis on the National and indeed International map...You have shown what you can do for a broad sector of people and Carl Preat's example is something for many youngsters to live up to."

Experience has shown that our access and parking facilities are inadequate, getting waterlogged in the recent wet weather and this is something that will have to be addressed if the centre is to be viable, let alone progress. We were, of course, one of the first centres to be built before the days of the lottery and the funding was a major problem which others did not experience, who started their projects later with much higher funds.

sign to all sports organisation that think that money is unlimited and that financial criteria can be ignored. Our Association has not made that mistake and continues on sound lines.

Deane Whittington won our junior title by defeating Lucy Pointer in an exciting final. We have insufficient girls to stage a junior girls event, a sad situation. Although Lucy was, no doubt, disappointed at losing a match in which she was favourite, she can take plenty of hope from having got so far at the age of 13. She remains unbeaten in the Junior County Championships first division and, if Hampshire win the title and reach the Premier for the first time, she will have played a very big part in that success. One draw was all that was needed at the time of writing.

Lucy's trip to the National Trials ended on a sad note. After travelling to Cheltenham, she was taken ill at the venue and did not play a single match, junior or cadet. However, invitations continue to come for England training camps and sessions and with them the chance to impress.

We did not have our usual big contingent at the ETTA Grand Prix event in Stratford-on-Avon. Lorna Dutch played, although still troubled by a shoulder injury and so did not repeat her sensational wins in previous Grand Prix's. However, Carl Preat won the men's event and so chalked up his third Grand Prix of the season, sadly also the last, as a hectic Bundesliga programme will keep him in Germany until the end of June (!). He played in good form, his victims in the last three rounds being Chris Oldfield, Andrew Eden and Terry Young, all in the top dozen of the English ranking list and I thought all of them played and battled more than well.

There is now a good chance that Carl will return to England after 13 years in the Bundesliga. If so, he will be seen rather more often in English events. He will practise at our own table tennis centre, named after him, which will be an attraction that may

increase attendances. English Table Tennis is now very well funded, thanks to the lottery, but the acid question remains what use the money will be put to and what will be achieved. At this time our few top players have all too often gone into important matches worn out by excessive travel and overseas demands. The whole history of our sport is one of missed opportunities. I pray that the lottery millions will be put to good use and that our sport wins its place in the sun.

It is with the greatest of sadness that I have to report the recent and premature death of my wife, lover and best friend for the past thirty years. She succumbed to cancer in early December after six months of severe pain and suffering. She will be known to most of you as Rusty, though she was born Evelyn Canham 49 years ago in Forest Gate, East London, in the same hospital as Chester Barnes.

She grew up in Stevenage, and together with her sister Jackie soon represented her adopted County of Hertfordshire. Rusty and I met for the first time on a blind date at the News of the World Finals at Bognor Regis in 1962, and we married five years later. We have spent the last 27 years in Chesterfield following an early three-year and very happy spell in Somerset. As many of you will recall, the Billington and Hall families were largely responsible for the halcyon days of Derbyshire Junior table tennis in the early 80's, since Kerry, Julie and Bradley swept all before them in those days, all three of them representing England and winning National titles. Although Rusty didn't appear at many junior tournaments at that time due to other family commitments, she was the strength behind the family and without her support those achievements would not be happy memories today.

In her memory the family decided to hold a private memorial tournament and this took place a few days after Christmas at the Springbank Centre in Chesterfield, a venue well known to many of the current England squad, and also where Rusty worked. Members of the family came from all over the country to take part. The difference in standard was, to say the least, considerable, since we had Bradley at one end of the spectrum and others who had

never played in their lives before. It also saw the return to the table of Kerry, Julie and Maurice, none of whom had had bat in hand for some time. The same applied also to me. In fact "rusty" was a fair description for all of us. The format was two games to 31 up (total points scored to count), with handicaps, and Bradley carried the extra burden of playing throughout with a miniature bat (and quite right too as he had beaten Kreanga the previous week). It was widely rumoured that secret practice sessions took place before the event, especially by the females.

A doubles tournament was also held though this was more of a fun thing. Partners were drawn at random, and this event was not handicapped. When the draw was made it was clear that the hot favourites would be Maurice and his Dad, and their dour defensive skills won the day, beating Eric and Bridgette in the final. For those of you who do not know Bridgette she is Bradley's partner and live-in housekeeper ! She was the star of the day, reaching her first major final in her very first competitive event. England selectors, please note.

The singles proved to be a hotly contested affair. The pick of the quarter finals was a very close win for Eric over Jackie, and that result apart, the semi-finalists showed no real surprises. The first was between Kerry, who looked at times as if she had never been away, and the event favourite Bradley, but it was Kerry who won the day with a 31-23, 31-27 victory. The combination of a ten point deficit and the little bat proved too much and we had the first major shock. Some of the shots he produced though with that tiny bat were out of this world. The second

semi-final saw Eric playing Julie. The games were shared, and Eric scraped through on point count.

Perhaps it was fitting that Kerry should have played Eric in the final of the Rusty Hall Memorial tournament, and so it was, but it was even more appropriate that Kerry should win it, as she surely did, thrashing her rapidly tiring 52 year old Dad without mercy.

The prestigious prizes for the event as a whole were produced and presented by Maurice himself with help from Rosanna Stevenson. In his opening remarks before we started, Maurice credited George Dixon with forecasting Rusty's marriage to Eric as early as the 1950's, since every week he stood under the Blue Lamp, saluted and said "Evelyn Hall". Nice one Maurice!

Since retiring from table tennis Kerry has spent much of her time acting as an independent unpaid voluntary worker in Romania, working in a hospital with HIV children abandoned by their parents. This of course requires funding. To this end we charged the family an entry fee to our tournament with the entire proceeds being donated to Kerry for her next visit there, starting at the end of March. Our thanks go also to the Springbank Centre staff and members, who themselves have raised a considerable amount for this worthwhile cause.
