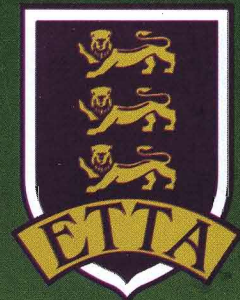

AWARD FOR CONNIE

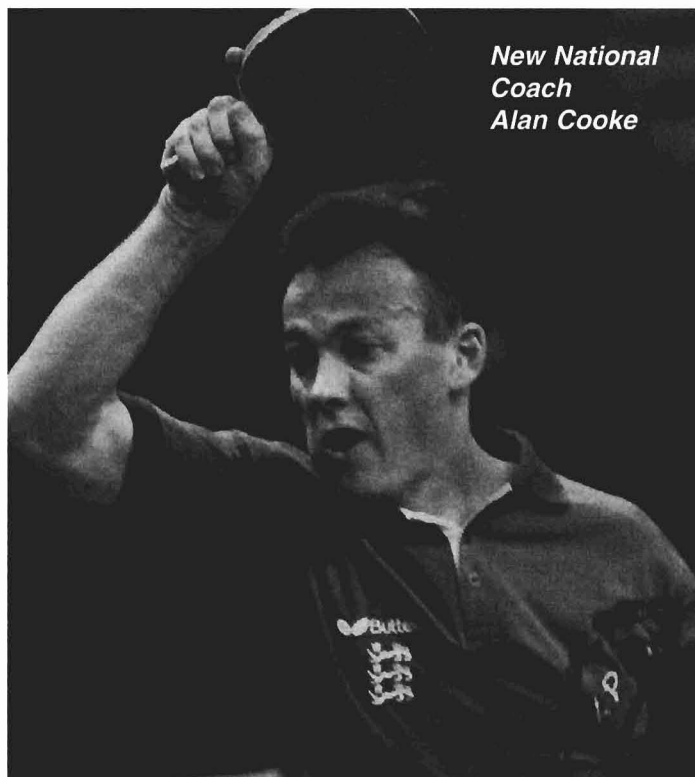

SEARCH FOR A NEW WORLD CHAMPION

The search for a new World Champion and a team of players who will ensure England's presence on the podium at top international events in the early years of the next century will start at Lilleshall and Cheltenham over the weekend of 27 February to 1st March.

The new ETTA Performance Director Michel Gadal, wishes to provide the opportunity for all eligible players with the necessary talent and commitment to be given a chance of being included in the new 48 member strong National Under 12 Squad. More than 130 nominations of players from all parts of the country will gather at Lilleshall for the first assessment. At the same time the National Junior and Cadet Trials for Under 17 and Under 14 years will take place at Cheltenham when the players who have qualified through the Regional trials will have their chance of recognition. Michel Gadal will attend both events.

This is part of the new ETTA Performance Plan for which the Association have been granted £1.28 million from the English Sports Council National Lottery Sports Fund in the first year of the eight year programme aimed at putting England in the forefront of international play.

For the Under 12's the Lilleshall weekend will be followed by a comprehensive programme of some 60 days per year, mainly at weekends or in school holidays when the players will be brought together for top class coaching training and competition.

For the junior and Cadet players there will be a strong build up for the European Youth Championships in Italy in July and then the opportunity of places in the new National Squads which will be formed before the start of next season.

The ETTA have added a further National Coach to the staff of the World Class Performance Plan,

Alan Cooke who retired from international play last year after winning the English Championship three times and the Commonwealth title, has been appointed on a full time basis.

Joola EUROPEAN LEAGUES

Whilst the prospects for the future with the new plan look bright the results for the England teams since the turn of the year have been disappointing. In the Joola European Men's League First Division semi-final the England men were beaten by Greece by 4 sets to 1. The match was staged and sponsored by the Potters Leisure Resort, near Great Yarmouth. The Greeks, led by the dynamic Kalinikos Kreanga, were good value for their victory and this was further confirmation of their recent arrival amongst European elite. Greece will now play Czech Republic for promotion to the Super Division of the Joola European League.

The venue for the match Potters

Leisure Resort in Hopton-on-Sea, near Great Yarmouth, has all the facilities and accommodation required for staging important tournaments and matches.

We are in discussion with the Management at Potters with a view to bringing a series of events to this attractive holiday centre.

In the Joola European Women's Super Division England lost their 4-2 advantage from the first leg of their first match against Italy in the relegation section by being defeated in the away leg by 4 sets to 1 which means that England will now face Sweden in a two-leg final relegation fixture. Sweden have recently been strengthened by the return from injury of the 1994 European Champion Marie Svensson and this fixture will be a hard one to win.. However England's performance in this competition has been extremely good over recent years and our participation in the top division will not be surrendered lightly.

MEMBERSHIP CHANGES

At the meeting of the National Council on 17th January it was agreed to propose to the ETTA Annual General Meeting in July a new three-tier membership system. The current system only really caters for players who compete in their local league and this misses thousands of players who are either in the early stages of their participation or at the other end of the scale, players who only compete at the open tournament level. The Membership Committee headed by its Chairman, Stephen Joel, who presented the proposals, believe that the Association should cater for all players and that in particular a better and more comprehensive service should be provided to those members who are investing a great deal of time in the sport playing in open tournaments etc. In addition, the sports main financial supporter, the English Sports Council, are concerned about the reducing share that the ETTA membership are contributing to the funding, of the sport. The Association in this financial year are only one of four sports to receive more than half a million pounds of exchequer funding from the English Sports Council. Our Sports Council funding has more than doubled over the last five years and even without taking account of the new World Class Performance Plan the membership from affiliation fees are meeting less than 15% of the total Association budget.

The new system proposes three tiers - Elite, Local League and Top Club membership. The Elite System is designed for players who represent England, play in open tournaments the British League, are involved in the Performance Programme and/or the upcoming World Class Potential squads and appear on the ETTA ranking list. They will affiliate directly to the ETTA and as a result will automatically be given membership

of their County association. Within the Elite membership package there will be three levels of programme, a basic level which includes all playing rights plus two enhanced levels which include a combination of a free copy of Table Tennis News, ranking audit trails, and a series of other benefits such as discounts on goods and services, etc.

The benefits enjoyed by league members will, for 95% plus of the members, remain unchanged with no new increases in fees and with the opportunity to play in all events held under the auspices of their County associations and where selected to play for the County in the County Championships, but will not include the opportunity to have a national ranking.

The third tier, Top Club, is a programme for membership of all of the new Top Club players who are being introduced by the English Sports Council/Youth Sport Trust Top Club programme to the sport. These clubs will affiliate directly to the ETTA and will receive a package of appropriate benefits including affiliation to their County association. This programme is aimed mainly at players who are in the early stages of their involvement with table tennis but will extend to players and clubs who are climbing the talent identification ladder.

All the above proposals are subject to approval of two thirds of the membership at the ETTA Annual General Meeting in July. For some players who play in more than one competition it may mean more than one affiliation fee but this is similar to the current system whereby an affiliation fee is paid on a team place basis so that players who play in more than one league pay a second fee. This follows the principle that those who play more and gain greater benefits, pay more. It should be recognised that the current level of affiliation fee is traditionally lower and much less than some other sports organisations in this country and much lower than the general affiliation fee paid by many players on the Continent to their National Associations.

The above is just a short summary of the proposals. The full proposals are being worked up by the Membership committee and the Administration Department and

should be presented to the membership in good time for consideration at the AGM.

In my opinion the new proposals from the Membership Committee are fair and meet the current needs. It is clear that while the team place system in force now met the need when it was introduced three or four decades ago it does not meet the present requirements.

I sincerely hope that any members who do not like these proposals exercise their right and propose progressive alternatives. This issue is key to the future health of table tennis in this country.

WOMEN'S BRITISH LEAGUE

Over the weekend of 14/15 February Jose and I had the pleasure of attending the 10th Anniversary weekend of the Women's British League at the Kingsway Leisure Centre in Widnes, Cheshire. This was an excellent event and congratulations are extended to Yashima South Kesteven Sovereigns who retained the Premier Division title as well as supporting teams in the Second and Third Divisions.

The reason that the Women's British League has been so successful for a decade has been that the league has a good playing system with five matches of six sets each over two weekends, that the standard of the top division has always been good, that the social side, in particular the Saturday night dinner, is enjoyable and that the event is played in good facilities and Widnes was no exception. Finally that the league has a very good organising team led by Mike and Christine Lewis. The ladies led the way and the Veterans and Woolwich Junior British Leagues followed with equally successful league competitions.

The opportunities for women in table tennis are much better now than they were ten years ago before the Women's British League started. There is in place the Women's British League itself and the Joola European Women's League. Coming into being now for the best players is the World Class Performance programme referred to above and thousands of girls are being introduced to the sport each year through the Top Sport programme in primary schools.

What we need to do now is to build up the middle encompassing the Women's British League more competitions and coaching at the local level throughout the country for girls or ladies only programmes as these appear, in general, to be more successful than mixed leagues or coaching sessions. Table tennis is one of the sports that can be enjoyed equally by men and women, although traditionally in this country the sport has been mainly male orientated in the past. With the new opportunities being presented to us the chances of bringing a large number of new women and girls into the sport are there but they will not happen unless our programmes take the initiative.

One recent breakthrough for women in international table tennis was the decision by the Qatar Table Tennis Association to include women's events for the first time in the Qatar Open. This in itself sets a record because this is the first time that women have played in any international sports event in Qatar. In addition to the Men's team England have selected Lindsey Thornton and Gemma Schwartz to participate. The first team players have a date with Sweden at the same time. Several leading countries have supported the Qatar initiative by sending their lady players.

MANCHESTER LOOKS FORWARD TO THE WORLD VETERANS

Entries for the World Veterans Championships which are to be staged at the G-Mex Centre in Manchester in June are beginning to arrive. Though there is still over two months to the Closing date, more than 250 entries from many countries around the world have already been received and it is anticipated that the bulk will arrive in the next few weeks. 2000 players in all are expected. The man with the mammoth job of scheduling the matches is John Jermyn who has recently been appointed as the Referee. John is likely to preside over approximately 12000 matches on the 98 tables over the ten day period of the event. To gain a further indication of the scale of the competition, it is likely that in the region of 30,000 bed nights will be booked in Manchester for the duration of the World Veterans Championships. Unlike the full World

Championships anyone with ETTA membership who is aged over 40 years of age can play in this World Championships. A good time is enjoyed by all. If you would like further details contact Mike Watts on 0161 831 9135.

BUNDESLIGA ON TV

A new innovation in Germany is an agreement with the German Satellite TV sports channel DSF to show seven Bundesliga matches between the end of February and the middle of April. DSF is one of the channels broadcast by the Astra satellite and is normally available to viewers who have a Satellite receiver and dish without subscription. Each match starts at 20.00 German time which is 7.00 pm in the UK. The match schedule is as follows:

CHRISTIAN THOMPSON

Reports were received by the English Table Tennis Association in December 1996 regarding possible drug abuse by Christian Thompson at an England Junior Training Camp, these reports have proved to be unfounded.

The English Table Tennis Association has found no evidence that any drug abuse took place. The player has been tested and the results have been negative.

Drug abuse is an extremely sensitive issue, the English Association regrets the time that it has taken to resolve the matter and the anguish that it has caused the Thompson family.

We are grateful for the co-operation of all concerned in resolving the issue.

MAILBOX

FLAWED SYSTEM

Paul Hutchinson's letter in the January edition of Table Tennis News illustrates yet again the glaring shortcomings of our present ranking scheme. It is now five long years since I first expressed similar concerns in this magazine ('Negative System', TTN, Feb 1993). Sadly, little has changed.

Fear of losing is, unfortunately, implicit in any competitive sport played at a comparatively high level. Every player knows that there will inevitably be occasions when his or her 'low' coincides with a lesser player's 'high', when nets and edges all seem to go the wrong way, and the dreaded 'shock defeat' ensues. To add the prospect of a massive ranking penalty to an already painful situation merely compounds the problem and produces, as we seem to be doing now, a generation of terrified players, often totally unable to relax and play at their optimum level.

Coaches are well aware of this inherent fear and many are choosing to avoid these stressful situations altogether. They advise their players to withdraw or simply not turn up if a potential points loss is on the horizon; a negative attitude brought about by a negative system.

However, the 'fear factor' is only part of the problem. As well as penalising losers, the present system fails to reward the real winners. Any reasonable ranking scheme would recognise the achievement of the player who actually wins the tournament; this is surely the ultimate goal. But if that player was unfortunate enough only to have 'expected wins' the rewards can be absurdly meagre, as John Prean pointed out recently when son Carl received only seven points for winning a Grand Prix tournament.

Sometimes a comparatively lowly ranked player will reach a final following an unexpected win over a top player. He will gain a substantial number of points for this win, but the other top player who then beats him in the final has no such opportunity. Many players have the occasional sensational victory, but only a few consistently reach the latter stages of tournaments. Under the present system there is very little reward for those capable of achieving

sustained success.

Too much emphasis is placed instead on whether wins or losses are expected or unexpected, thereby pre-supposing that the ranking list is completely accurate, an exact reflection of current standards. Given the rate at which many young players are improving, this objective is, of course, totally unachievable.

Further inaccuracies develop as a result of combining the junior, senior and veteran lists. As a veteran myself, I am painfully aware that we all attain a false position on the main list. This results in very severe points penalties if we decide we would like to compete sometimes against younger players. So far this season I have entered three Grand Prix tournaments and won the Veterans Womens Singles in all of them, yet I am now further down the list, with a lower points total, than I was at the start of the season. I would have been better off not playing at all. However, because I love table tennis and refuse to 'play the system', recognising that it is flawed, I shall continue to play in as many events as I can afford to enter in these rather expensive, but highly enjoyable, Grand Prix tournaments. I gain a great deal of personal satisfaction from winning the Veterans singles, which is just as well because I certainly don't seem to gain any ranking points!

Critics of the old (far better) system complained that players lost out if they couldn't afford to travel to many tournaments, that other players could attain an unrealistically high ranking by 'chasing round the country in pursuit of computer points'. The critics are failing to recognise two vital factors: 1) We should reward players for entering lots of tournaments; this is exactly what the sport needs. 2) The bonus points system included in the previous scheme ensured that only the best players reached the top ten or so positions on the list. Substantial bonuses were awarded for winners, runners-up and semi-finalists. Entering only a few tournaments, and reaching the final stages, would give you a higher ranking than entering everything

but being eliminated early in the proceedings.

After my last letter appeared in Table Tennis News, I received many messages of support, but during these five years various attempts at cosmetic tinkering have been little more than a tacit admission that inadequacies do exist. In my view three radical changes need to be implemented as a matter of urgency:

- Eradicate points losses for lost matches
- Re-introduce bonus points for reaching the final stages of tournaments
- Produce separate lists for points gained in veteran and junior events

Maybe then we can enter the new millennium with a ranking scheme that accentuates the positive by concentrating on rewarding winners, instead of penalising losers.

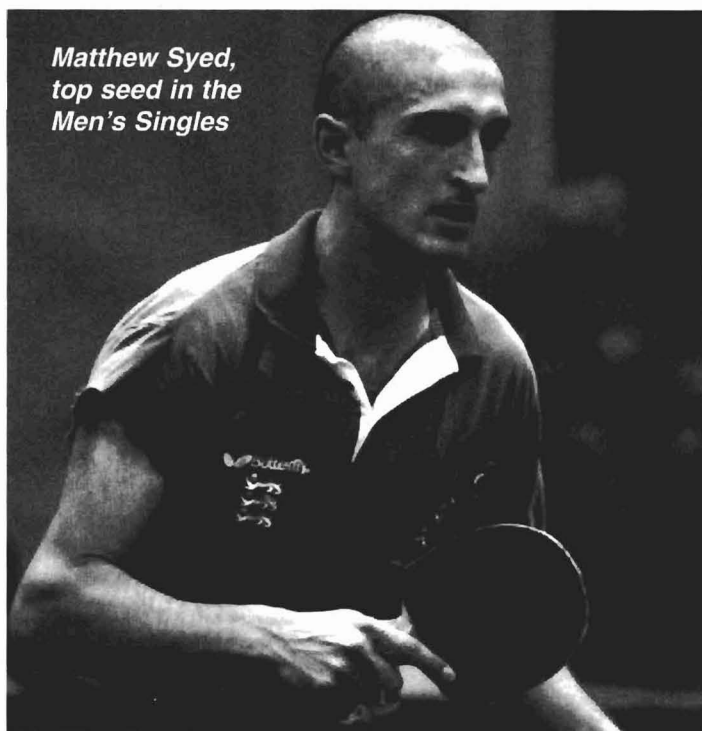

Published and distributed by The Organising Committee, it has been translated into French and German with 40,000 going to those two countries and 10,000 to the UK.

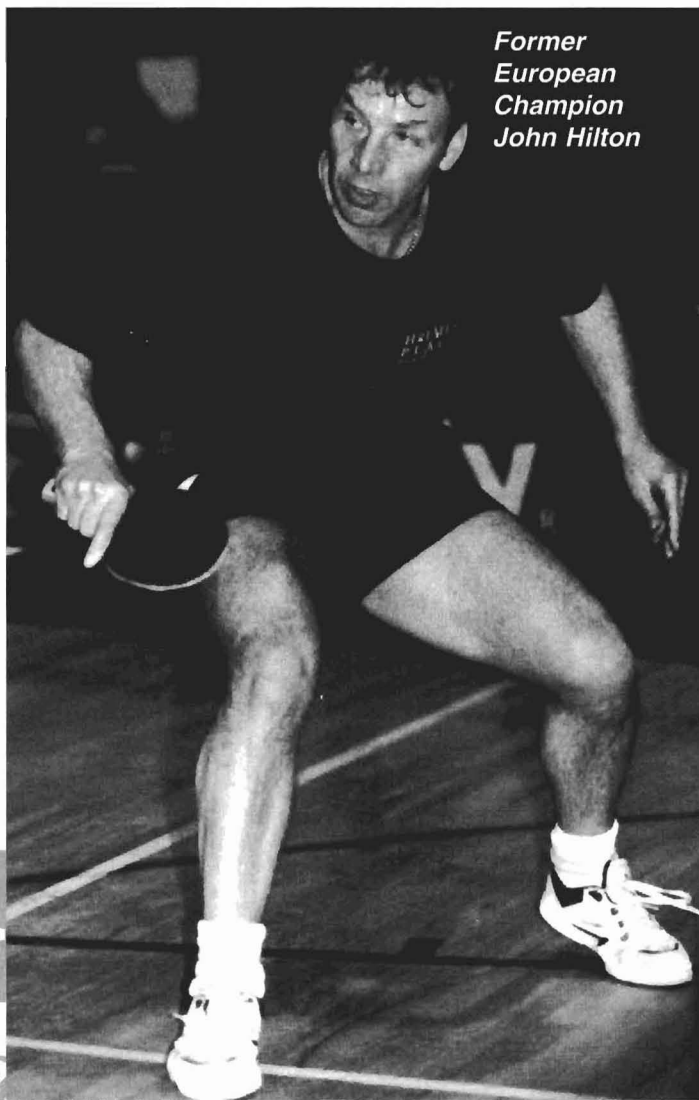
UNIQUE TEAM

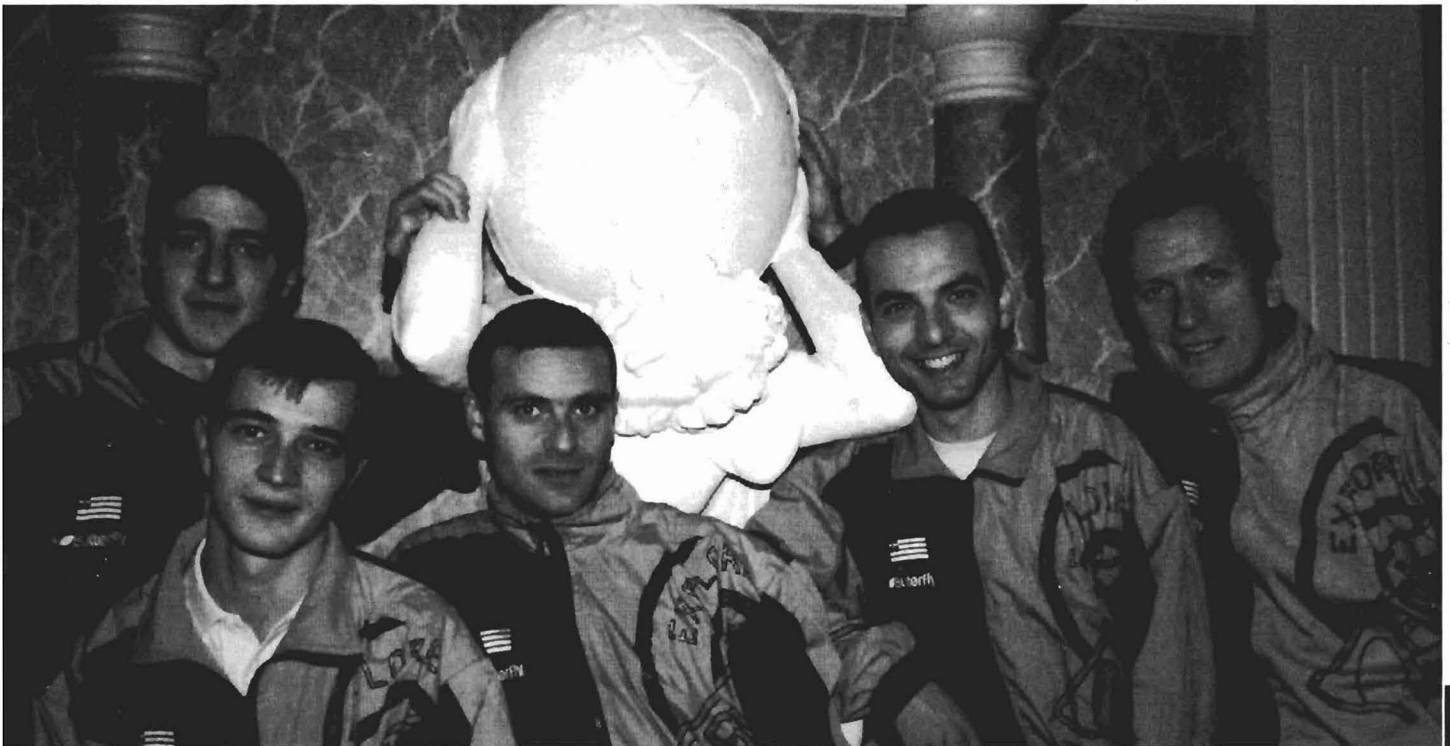

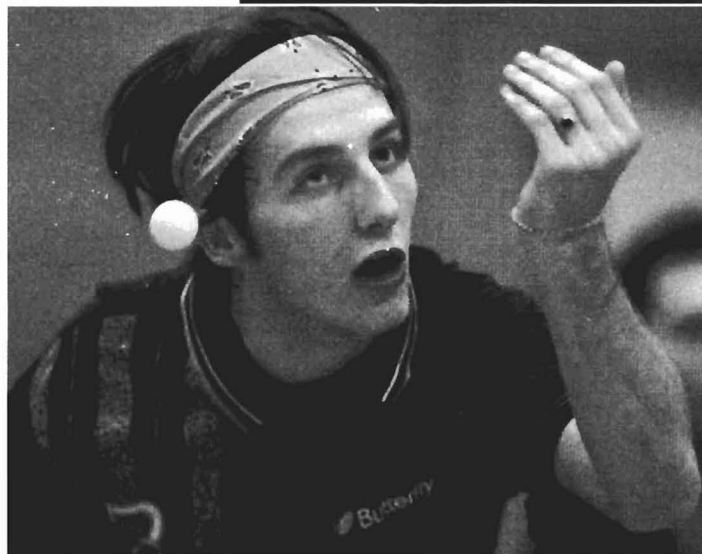

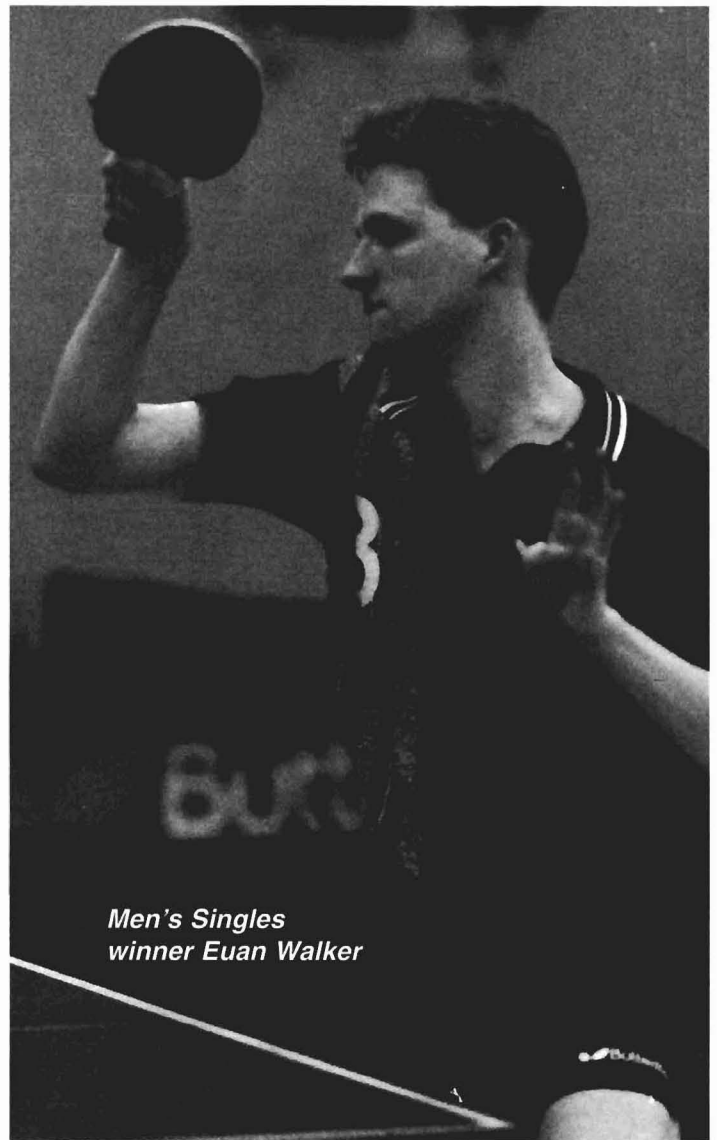
Young also lost the Men's Under 21 final where he was out-gunned by Welshman Ryan Jenkins 21-18, 17-21, 21-19.

Kubrat Owolabi majestically strode to yet another Women's Singles victory when she beat Bethan Daunton 21-19, 21-8.

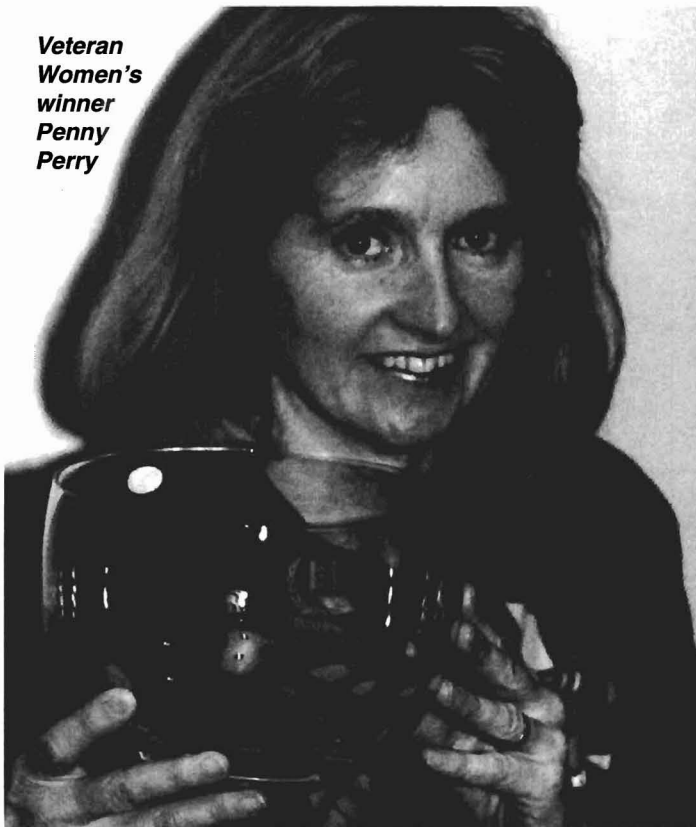

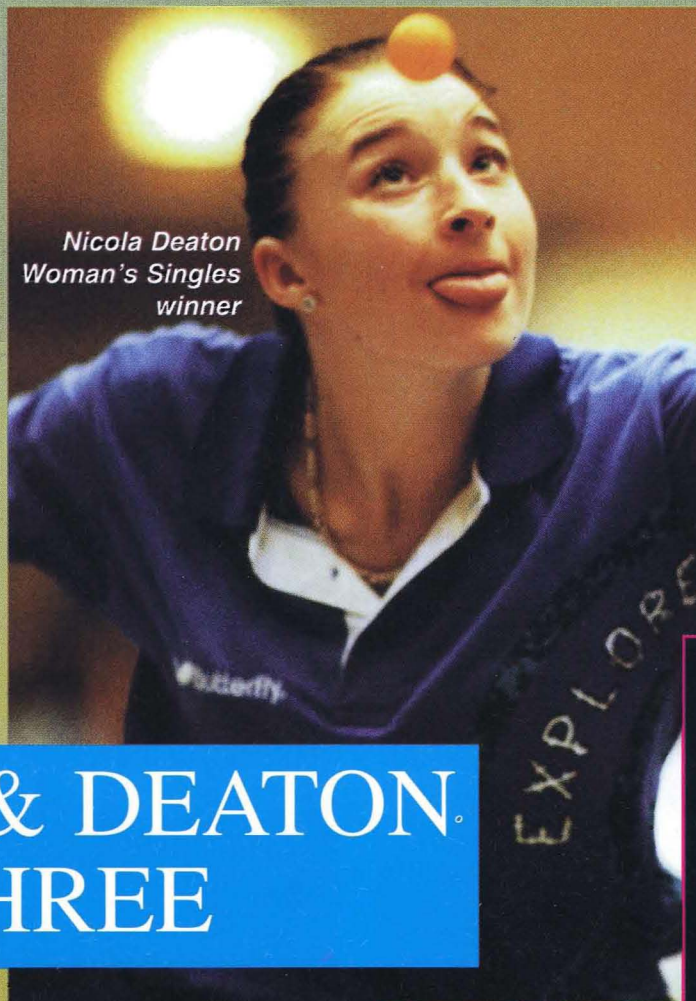


ETTA WEST MIDLANDS OPEN GRAND PRIX

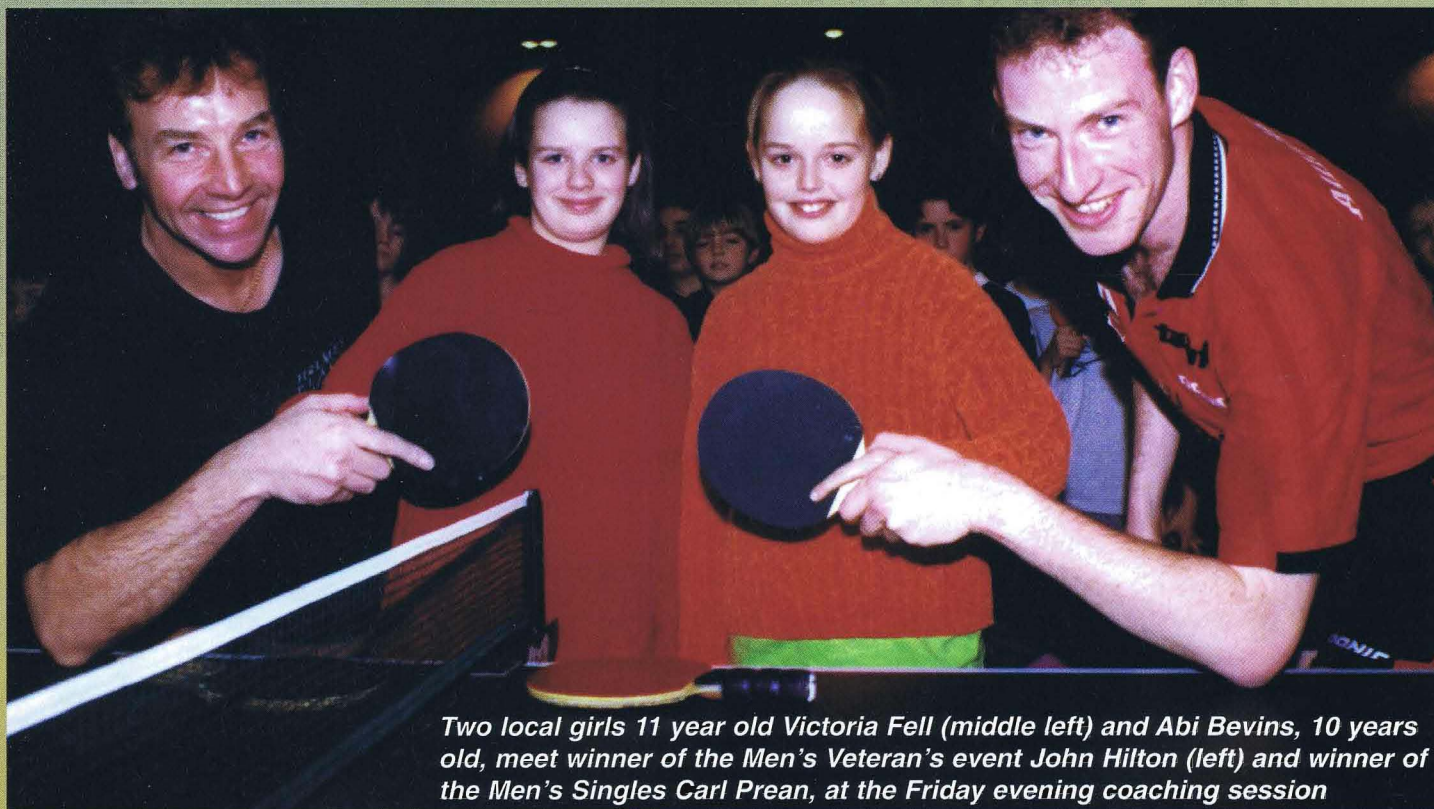

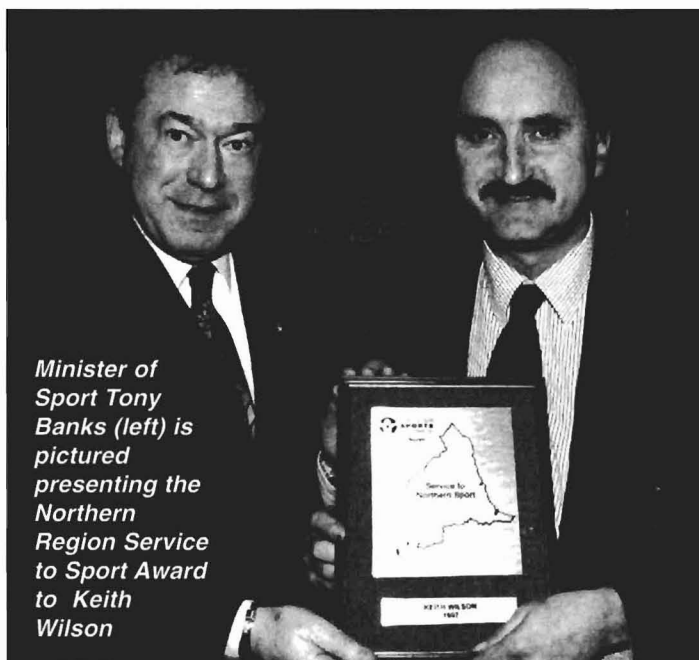
NORTHERN NOTES

Keith Wilson, the dynamo behind the Darlington Table Tennis Club, was recognised for his efforts when he was presented with a Northern Region Service to Sport Award by the Minister of Sport Tony Banks (a last minute replacement for local MP Tony Blair!), at a ceremony at the Eden Hotel, Sedgfield District on 19 December. A true fanatic, Keith will be best known nationally for running all the British League teams - as well as working on the venue side at major international tournaments - but he is also the mastermind behind significant coaching (5 nights a week planned) and club development schemes in Darlington. He also finds the time to undertake several roles for Durham County.

With the recent signing of arguably England's greatest ever player, Desmond Douglas, who on his debut for Darlington made an unbeaten return to the British League against Muna Estates Progress on 18 January, the Darlington Club have achieved considerable national and regional publicity. Indeed, that same evening Des was a celebrity guest at the Northern Rock North East Sports Awards, Seaburn Centre, Sunderland where Bradley Billington (another recent Darlington big name signing) and Andrew Wilkinson did an exhibition, and Keith was interviewed, in front of a sports-star-studded audience filmed by Tyne Tees Television and broadcast the following Tuesday. Supported by Michael Watt and his company CSI Ltd, Darlington now look favourites to win the British League Premier Division.

Jade Kendall from Barrow, who is currently ranked No 7 England Junior Girl and partnered Trudie Bloor (Shropshire) to reach the English Junior Closed girls doubles final at Stratford, was presented the Cumbria Junior Sports Award. Jade, with Parkview School team mates Katherine Swan, Nicola Garret and Chloe Gasson, will be representing England in the Under 16 Champion School Team Event of

the International Schools Federation Championships in Portugal from 31st March to 7th April. And congratulations also to another Barrow youngster Michael Gomersall - who played so well to reach the cadet boys semi-finals of the English Junior Closed and has moved up to a No 5 national ranking - on being chosen to represent England in the Hungarian Junior Open. Although not awarded for services to table tennis, it is pleasing that Cumbria CTTA Chairman Bob Gale has been given the OBE.

It is good to see Northern Region players - Andrew Wilkinson, Dave Godbold (Northumberland), David Nesbit (Durham), Martyn Clarke, Richard Dunn (Cleveland), Michael Gomersall, Chloe Gasson and Grant Woodhouse (Cumbria) - picking up various singles titles on the open tournament circuit. Both the rapidly improving Kim Uppal (Cleveland) and Kate Vickers (Durham) have contested several singles finals, so far without ultimate success but this will surely come soon.

County cadet teams from Cumbria, Northumberland, Durham and Cleveland participated in a regional cadet competition organised by Keith Wilson at the Dolphin Centre, Darlington on 13th December. Although Cumbria (Zeke Dixon, Grant Woodhouse, Steven Jackson, Chloe Gasson and Faye

Gasson) ran out winners, all players enjoyed the day and the concept is recommended to other regions.

There are positive signs that table tennis is on the move in parts of the region. The Kendal League has expanded from 22 to 33 teams (and a new division), and their Woolwich Junior League has grown from 12 to 15 teams. Mick Taylor is starting a new club at Kirbie Kendal School. A committee has been formed to start a new senior league at Whitehaven Sports Centre where a WJTTL already operates. The Woolwich Junior League at Northfield School, Billingham now has 40 teams, Carole Moore and Bernie Morris are running regular coaching sessions there (supporting teacher Steve Burge), and the school club has gained Challenge Funding and ETTA TOP Club support. 'Outreach work' is being done with BT TOP Sport-delivering, feeder primary schools, and Northfield is wanting to convert a facility for dedicated table tennis use and gain Specialist Sports College status. Another school planning to apply to become a Sports College is Nunthorpe Secondary where Carole Moore is to run overflow Ormesby Club sessions on 12 tables until Ormesby can develop their own (larger) centre.

Alan Westwater reports that a new Stanley 8 team WJTTL is a great success and he wants to run

a senior league on similar lines. He is also preparing a Lottery Sports Fund facility application for Oxhill Youth Centre. And, great news, Alan Hedley has gained a £3,500 Foundation for Sport and the Arts grant for equipment for the Cramlington Club! The club may possibly move to Cramlington High School in advance of being included in a possible multi-sport hall facility application to the Lottery Sports Fund.

It was a great pity, then, that despite offering £2,800 in prize money, the Stockton Open Championships scheduled for 3-4 January had to be cancelled through lack of entries (the actual quality of entries was high). The Redcar and Cleveland Junior Open will go ahead on 7-8 February although the entry is also disappointing. The North East has too few open tournaments so I wish players would support those that are run.

The Regional Player and Coach Development Programme is also running strongly in three centres at Milton Keynes, Southampton and Cippenham. On a local basis, Witney coach Edwin Bone has deservedly received his local council's annual "Sport For All" award for his outstanding contribution to community sports development—well done, Edwin!

Still on the development front, 17 clubs and leagues were represented at the inaugural Southern Region Table Tennis Development Officer seminar. Each organisation present is to be allocated a £100 budget for expenditure on development

initiatives, and will receive an enhanced level of service from ETTA Projects Officer Steve Chu.

In fact, there was a very good field which included Euan Walker, the Scottish No.1 who won the next Grand Prix Event, Nicky Mason, who had given Carl plenty of trouble in the past, Darren Blake, the winner at Hastings and the Welsh pair Stephen Ward and Ryan Jenkins, both of whom would comfortably make the English Top 10. Jenkins was sensationally defeated by Kevin Satchell whose return to the big arena was itself a big story after a spinal operation before which he was unable to play at all. As the "Grand Prix" is our main hope of establishing a real tournament scene again in which the top players are on view all over the country, I would have thought such events needed and deserved all the support they could get, not least from the ETTA House Magazine. For once, I have no doubt that these sentiments will have the support of the leadership.

Our juniors won half the events at the Hampshire Junior Championships. Lucy Pointer's double (U-17 and U-14) was perhaps no surprise, since her main rival Nicolette Broome was absent from the latter, but Nathan Godolphin's win in the Cadet Boys was excellent and Harry Ovnik's win in the U-12 boys was a very pleasant surprise and his performances received very favourable comment. Deane Whittington will be disappointed that he "only" reached the S/F of the U-17s, but he has two more chances in this age group and plenty to look forward to.

Our own "Masters" event, the Peach Cup was won by Danny Burns, a welcome return to form, as his first season "out of the juniors" had not till then lived up to his best hopes. However, he still climbed steadily in the English rankings. I continue to find these incomprehensible and therefore will take the gift horse without further comment. A well wisher has explained to me that, if Carl Prean, now at No.2, wins another 20 Grand Prix tournaments, he will return to No.1, but only if his main rival does not play at all. "He is not that far behind" my informant told me.

To return, however, to our "Masters" it was good to see Danny back to his best. He defeated Alex Rorke 12 and 13 in the Final which he dominated. He beat Roger Hookey earlier 22 & 15. Roger, who has dominated Island events in the last decade was last year's winner. Deane and Lucy did not repeat their best league form, but gained useful experience against our best players.

No Island team this season since

the "closure" of the Southern Region League and so Danny and Roger play for Fareham in the British League, whilst our juniors play for honours in the Hampshire Inter-Town Leagues.

Our outing in the Wilmott Cup was undistinguished to put it mildly and the new financial arrangements hardly encourage a further trip. We prefer single matches rather than multi-table events in single venues. We have a nice centre and the present system deprives us of home matches where we can attract small crowds and get our members involved or at least try to. I see little merit in staging matches in "far away places of which we know nothing", time-effective though this may be. When I was playing in representative matches, I enjoyed the social side of these "away" matches as much as the play and looked forward to the trips. This is something which is departing from the sport as we become willing victims to "time pressure". It is not only the playing side but that of spectating and support which has to be built up and we seem to be giving up on the latter. Long term this will be bad for the sport and dwindling gates can be reported all over the country for the few spectator events we still have. Without spectators and the resulting TV, we shall not be a major sport. There is more to the game than getting everything over with as quickly as possible with long exhausting days the main consequence and, in the end, not much fun.

I still hope that the lottery millions will produce a string of attractive spectator events which our members will, in time, flock to watch. It seems an essential ingredient in any mix that will make us a successful sport, one that gains members rather than losing them.

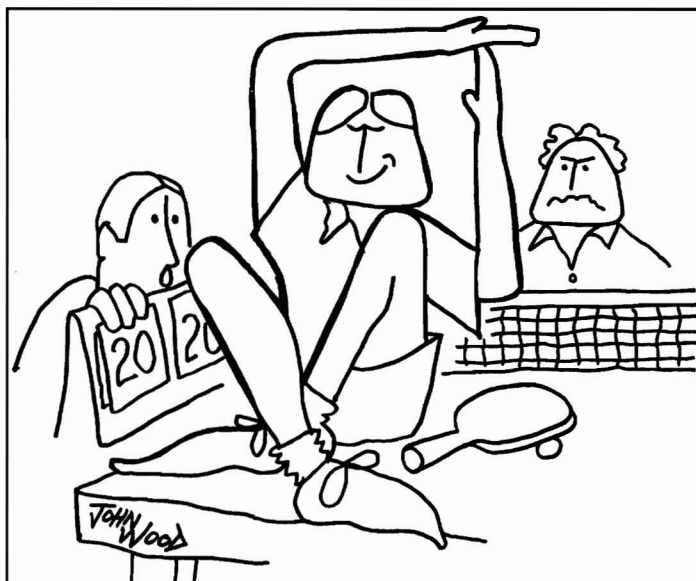
'Time-out' an integral part of American football and Basketball has appeared in table tennis. It was seen at the ITTF Pro-Tour Finals in Hong Kong during the final between Vladimir Samsonov and China's Wang Liqin. In the fourth game, with Samsonov leading 2-1, 'time-out' was called and the Chinese player went to talk to his coach. It happened again later in the same game when Samsonov called for 'time-out', but having no coach, walked around the court for the period allowed. Samsonov then went on to win the game and the final, writes George Tyler.

There is no mention of 'time-out' in ITTF Rules, but apparently, according to Colin Clemett, Chairman of the ITTF Rules Committee, there is a 'time-out system' for the Pro-Tour Finals, which is as follows:-

"Each player or pair is allowed a 1-minute time-out in a match.

To request a 'time-out', the player or assigned coach shall indicate so by putting up a 'T' sign with his hands; the request

may be made only between rallies.

When a 'time-out' is requested the umpire shall suspend play, the timekeeper shall stop the clock and the assistant umpire shall place a blue card on the side of the court nearer the player or pair who requested the 'time-out'.

When the 'time-out' period is

up the assistant umpire shall retrieve the blue card and put it next to the score indicator on the side nearer the player or pair who requested the 'time-out', play shall then resume."

Is 'time-out' to become a feature of major competitions? And if it does will it not conflict with the current ITTF Rules? Rule 2.12.1 states that play

shall be continuous throughout a match except that any player shall be entitled to an interval of not more than 2 minutes between successive games. And rule 3.5.3 states that players may receive advice only during the intervals between games or during other authorised suspension of play.

One should question the availability of 'time-out' to discuss tactics at a critical stage in a game, as it may well lead to gamesmanship, particularly in vital matches with the score 20-20 in the final game! And may it also be used to break up the rhythm of an opponent on a 'roll'. What do you think about a 'time-out system' for table tennis? Your views will be welcomed, if you have any please write to me c/o The Editor.

officials are forgotten after their time has passed?!).

John Thurston (with John Cornwell, his county colleague and slight superior) was in the 1950's a big name in the Eastern and Southern Divisions of the County Championships and regional competitions. And in the 1960s (probably throughout the 1970's as well), he was still the man for any rising star in Cambs to beat to make your name. When in the early sixties Cornwell retired through injury and took up coaching, he advised us youngsters against his old adversary's pimpled-bat-stone-wall-with-forehandhit-defensive game, but Thurston saw-off waves of us sandwich bat loopers. He played the 'wrong' old-fashioned way, but we respected him.

A broad-shouldered unpretentious, gentleman who always seemed to perform in the same old green shirt, John had a dignity and serenity - and wry humour. I understand that though still a top local player, John had to retire owing to heart problems and his later life was tinged with sadness; Nancy his longtime girlfriend and eventual wife predeceased him and then John himself succumbed to cancer, leaving a teenaged son.

As I get older I appreciate more that table tennis is the people in it. They must matter in the community of table tennis. That is why organisations like the ETTA 100 Club and club reunions are so important. Not so that 'stuffed shirts' and 'blazers' can 'lord it' above current players but so that they can remain part of the 'family' when no longer active. Players and officials past and present are the game's history, culture, soul - and future.

At a recent open tournament a parent remarked, on seeing a group of players of all ages, both sexes, white and black, from North and South, chatting together, 'That's what it is all about! And it is. A common interest, a passion shared. Each person important. Great to be a top player (and even better to be recognised and rewarded for it), but as Scottish coach David Fairholm has said, "The player is always above the performance." Writing on Burns
