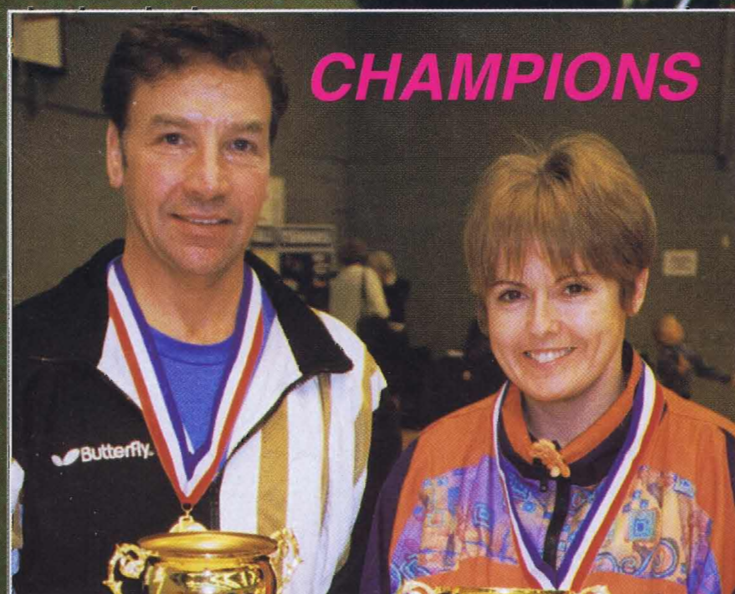

WELCOME TO MANCHESTER

Veteran players from more than fifty countries descend on Manchester later this month for the 9th World Veterans Table Tennis Championships being played at the G-Mex Centre. The World Veterans tournament is a marvellous event. It brings together a mixture of strong hard fought competition on the table with a special friendly spirit away from the courts which is evident when people who have been friends and competitors for many years gather together for such a festival of table tennis. It caters for players of many varying standards as well as ages, from the over 40 level through to the over 80's. More than 50 nations will be represented in Manchester, the largest number of countries ever. I would like to welcome the members of the Swaythling Club who are the international organisers of the championships, the players, officials and visitors to Manchester.

We are very grateful to our main sponsors, Manchester City Council who have supported us generously with the hosting of these Championships. Manchester are, in fact, great supporters of table tennis. The City assisted by hosting the European Olympic Qualification tournament at the Nynex Arena two years ago and were the joint organisers at G-Mex in April 1997 when we staged the first ever World Championships to have competitors from more than 100 countries. Manchester are busy creating additional opportunities for their residents to have a chance to play table tennis. Manchester as a City have a long tradition in the sport. The City Council are behind a development programme which takes the sport into the schools as well as encouraging participation in clubs

as part of their three-year programme. Manchester's support for table tennis extends into their staging of the Commonwealth Games in 2002 when table tennis will make its debut in this important multi sport competition. We are grateful to the City for their contribution to table tennis.

In England we are fortunate to have a very active and progressive VETTS Society which runs a series of its own competitions as well as co-operating very closely with the ETTA in the organisation and development of veterans table tennis. The World Veterans Championships from an organisational point of view is a joint venture between the VETTS society and the ETTA. I would like to thank their members for their contribution to the Championships as well as the many other volunteers from Manchester and other parts of the country who are assisting at the event, and particularly the students and management of Hopwood College who are providing a great deal of input into the Championships.

VOLUNTARY DEVELOPMENT OFFICER LAUNCH

In addition to the Veterans Championships being staged at the G-Mex Centre in Manchester, there are a number of events and activities surrounding the Championship. These include the launch of the ETTA Voluntary Development Officer programme. This programme, introduced by Judy Rogers and Sandra Collins in the Eastern Region is designed to provide a training and certification programme for voluntary development officers. The programme won awards at regional, national and UK levels and is being implemented throughout the country next

season by the Development Department.

The English Sports Council are giving a reception at G-Mex on 23 June when we anticipate that many of the key Sports Council people including Chief Executive Derek Casey will be present. Earlier in the day our Sport Team Leader, Jeff Neslan, has called a meeting of the English Sports Council Service Team and the ten Sports Council liaison officers from the Regions. Within the Exhibition area the Association will have an Information stand providing details of all the current ETTA programmes with Development staff available to assist with any inquiries that members may have.

FLOORS AVAILABLE

The ETTA has accepted the responsibility for allocating the use of the Taraflex Floors which were used at the World Championships last year and will be used at the World Veterans Championships in Manchester. Affiliated clubs are eligible to apply for a floor. There will be no cost for the floor itself however, there will be a charge for transportation of the floor from Manchester to the club. Clubs in Manchester and the Northwest will be given priority in the case of applications of equal merit. Clubs who are interested in acquiring one of these floors should contact the Facilities Officer, Paul Baker McCoy Associates, 31 Station Road, Henley-on-Thames, Oxon. TG9 JAT, Tel. 01491 579113, for an application form. The final date for requests for application forms will be 4th July, the date of the Annual General Meeting.

LOTTERY HELPS ENGLAND JUNIOR SQUADS

On the playing side after the World Veterans championships the next major event will be the

European Youth Championships which are to be played in Norcia, Italy from 10th to 19th July. England, with support from the Lottery Sports Fund will be sending a full squad of players who will be better prepared than any team that we have entered in the Championships in the past. The benefits of the World Class Performance plan and the Lottery funding was evident in the performance of our senior teams at the European Championships in Eindhoven in April, when the Women won a Bronze medal in the team event and the Men were promoted back into the top category at the first attempt. With two or three exceptions the performance of our juniors in Europe in recent years has not been good. The World Class Performance programme has not been in operation long enough to make medals a realistic expectation on this occasion but I would anticipate that with the increased training, coaching and competition that our junior teams have enjoyed this season, that clear signs of improvement will be forthcoming. The teams and non-travelling reserves will be selected from the following squads:

TV EXPANSION

The main international table tennis meeting of 1998 the ITTF Council Meeting, was held in Durban, South Africa from 20 to 23 May. The main concentration of ITTF work over the last year has been the development of the ITTF Pro Tour a network of international open championships brought together by the ITTF with significant international TV coverage aimed at lifting the profile and exposure of the sport throughout the world. The ITTF have been successful in achieving TV coverage for the Pro Tour in many areas of the world.

ESPN STAR will broadcast the Pro Tour events to 60 countries in Asia.

JSkyB, Japan are televising table tennis to a target audience of 10 million households. European coverage can be seen on the little known **NBC Sports channel**.

ESPN are broadcasting to one million paid subscribers in Brazil.

NTV Plus Russia are broadcasting 4 of the Pro Tour events plus live coverage of the Grand Finals in Paris next January.

Galaxy- DirectTV are covering the event to ten countries in Latin America and the Caribbean.

RDS in the French language in Canada will broadcast one hour highlights of 6 Pro Tour events plus the Grand Finals.

Coverage is anticipated to be finalised with **Fox Sports** in the USA, **TSDN** English network in Canada, **Jupiter TV** in Japan and **AD Sports** in France and that is all in addition to the domestic coverage in the countries where the championships are being played.

In Britain an agreement has been reached with BRITISH SKY BROADCASTING to broadcast significant coverage. The first event to be shown will be the Japan Open which is scheduled at the end of June provisionally at the following transmission times: Sunday 28 June: 13.00 (Sky Sports 2), 17.00 (SS2), 20.30 (SS1), 22.30 (SS3), Monday 29 June: 14.30 (SS2), 17.00 (SS2), all for a one hour period.

In addition to the work of the ITTF the ETTU are also making steps to increase the level of TV coverage given to major European title events. It is therefore likely that table tennis enthusiasts who can receive satellite coverage will be able to view considerably more television in the coming months. I will endeavour to keep track of all this coverage and to publish the transmission times in advance in Table Tennis News. It will not be possible to catch every transmission time but I will be active in looking for this information through official channels.

'TIME OUT' IN TABLE TENNIS

There has been considerable concern in the ITTF for some time about the attractiveness of the sport to spectators and television audiences and there were a number of moves in Durban aimed at making the sport more attractive to watch. All ITTF Pro Tour events which are to be played this year will be required by the ITTF to implement the new 'time out' experiment which gives players in the two singles events the opportunity to call 'time out' once each at any stage of best of a best of five set match. This experiment was used to full effect by Vladimir Samsonov in the final of the ITTF Pro Tour in Hong Kong earlier this year. He called a 'time out' when China's Wang Liqin had saved three match points and he had two match points remaining. Samsonov then won the next point and the Championship.

BIGGER TABLE TENNIS BALLS ON THE WAY

The ITTF Council have sent a message to both players and manufacturers that they intend to increase the size of the table tennis ball from 38mm to 40mm after the Olympic Games in Sydney in the year 2000. A proposition to confirm this is likely to be placed before the next round of ITTF meetings in Belgrade next April for final approval. The object behind this move is to increase the length of the rallies, slow the game down and make the game more visible to both spectators and tv

audiences. An experimental tournament was held in Manchester in conjunction with the World Championships last April and other experiments have been carried out by the ITTF in Asia with positive results. A separate proposal has from July 1999 reduced the length of pimples with the objective of making the game more predictable to the opponent.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The next World Championships will be held in Belgrade in 1999 with the 2001 Championships allocated to Osaka, Japan. Bidding cities for the 2003 Championships are Durban, South Africa, hosts of the Council Meeting, Qatar and Paris, France.

Strong moves are being made by some of the leading national associations, particularly from Continental Europe, to reduce the number of associations who can participate in the team events at World championships. This move has been strongly opposed by a large number of smaller Associations, who would be eliminated from participating if this move is successful.

NEW MEMBERSHIP STRUCTURE

The next main event in the official calendar in England is the ETTA Annual General Meeting which is to be held in Loughborough on 4th July. One of the main items on the agenda at this meeting will be the proposals to change the current membership system from one which just includes players who compete in local leagues to a three tier system which caters for tournament players, local league players and emerging players through the Top Club programme. The initiative for change came from a speech made at the AGM two years ago by the National Councillor for Kent, the Rev Bernard Rowley. Since then proposals have been worked up by the ETTA Membership Committee and have been discussed at length at a number of National Council meetings. The new proposals will give the Association the opportunity to provide better service for it's tournament players and more assistance for

the emerging clubs, whilst not affecting players in local leagues throughout the country. This move will raise more revenue for the Association which is necessary if the Association is to fully contribute to the various development schemes currently being supported by the Sports Council and National Lottery. Without some additional contribution from the sport itself, these programmes will not continue to receive the very substantial support which is currently being provided from the Sports Council and National Lottery Sports Fund.

H. ROY EVANS OBE

I would like to pay tribute to the contribution made to table tennis by the former President of the ITTF H. Roy Evans OBE who died last month. An Obituary in memory of Roy Evans will appear elsewhere in this magazine. There is no doubt that the contribution of Roy Evans and his wife, Nancy, is one of the largest ever given to table-tennis. In addition to Roy's work for the ITTF spanning more than thirty years, he and Nancy made a great contribution to the early development of the ETTU, were stalwarts of the Commonwealth Federation and organisers of two Commonwealth Championships in Wales. Roy was the originator of the British Olympic Table Tennis Committee and that is all in addition to the enormous contribution to Welsh table tennis. Perhaps Roy's biggest contributions were to persuade the IOC to include table tennis in the Olympic Games and playing a major role in the decision to use table tennis as the vehicle by the Chinese government to re-establish relations with the rest of the world, the event known as Ping Pong Diplomacy in the early 70's.

Finally, at this time I would like to take the opportunity of thanking both the hundreds of volunteers, our professional staff and members for their contribution and dedication to our sport during the 1997/98 season and to wish everyone a very happy summer.

NOT FULLY USED

Lisa Lomas and Alan Cooke, both national champions and stalwarts of the England team, have recently announced their playing retirements. Fortunately they will continue to serve England as national coaches, Lisa part-time and Alan full-time.

I felt that as players, Lisa and Alan could have done even better. To my mind, despite her fight, great allround ability and natural talent, Lisa for her level (top European defender) lacked consistency and the ability to regularly pick the right ball to attack. Alan, a fighter too and with excellent ball control,

could have achieved more if he had attacked harder, particularly with his excellent backhand, instead of tending to back off. Nevertheless, though beset with injury and lacking practice opportunities in this country, they were classy players who achieved a lot. But that is not the point of this letter.

I am sad about their playing retirement not only because we won't see them in top class action anymore, but also because I feel

they never fully achieved the public recognition they deserved or were fully used to promote table tennis in the way they could have been. They were good role models: serious, skillful, athletes with sporting attitudes-attractive personalities with attractive games.

For example, could they have not been used (professionally) more in major exhibitions? In an unpublished article to Table Tennis News a few years ago I, as a then non-ETTA employee, said, "We should take our sport to a wider audience, through wonderful 'roadshow' exhibitions such as provided by Alan Cooke and Chen Xinhua and the 'fluorescent', 'Art of celluloid' format of Lisa Lomas, Andrea Holt and Jackie Bellinger."

The point is, we know that table tennis exhibitions go down fantastically well with an uninitiated public, and Alan and Lisa were particularly good at doing them.

I have good reason to be grateful to sisters Lisa and Jackie, a great defensive v attacking double act (who still hold the Guinness Book of Records world speed record - 173 shots in a minute), who did schools exhibitions for me free in Milton Keynes. Such a glamorous and gifted pair, yet so essentially modest and nice! And Alan Cooke, with his 'boy next door good looks and personality' - easier for ordinary people to relate to than Tim Henman! Somehow, we should have made more of them - and done more for them. (Money and resources was doubtless the problem). Thankfully, Lisa and Alan are still in the game coaching.

NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT ROADSHOWS

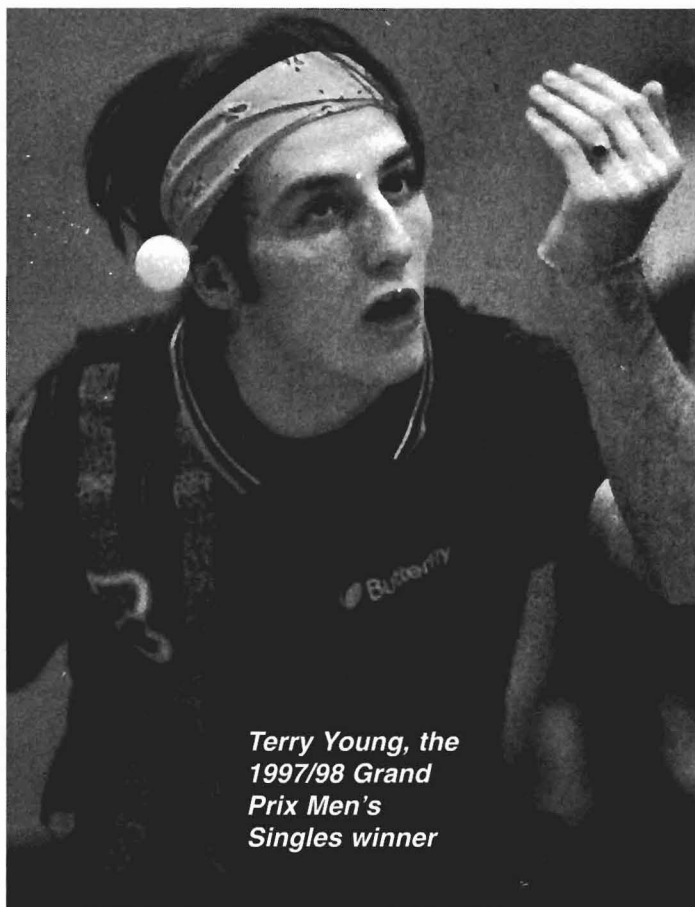
The ETTA is planning to hold 10 regional roadshows next season to explain, discuss and hear feedback on ETTA development programmes.

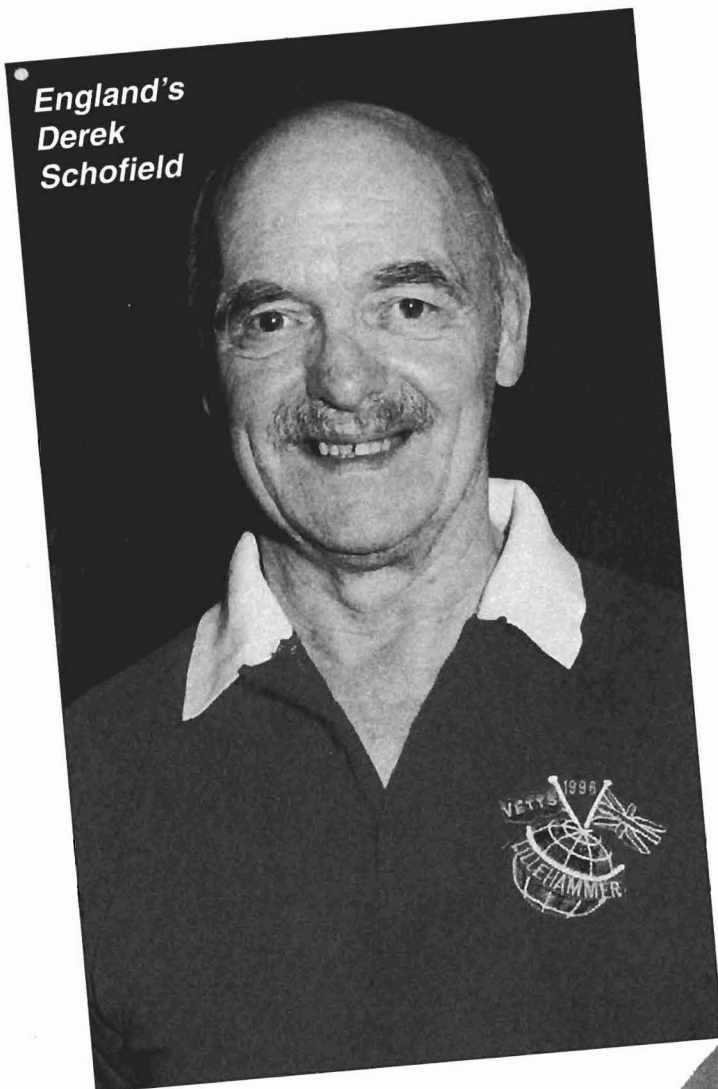

GETTING INTO SHAPE FOR MANCHESTER



RUSSELL LOOKS FOR MAGIC TOUCH

Forget sports psychologists and personal trainers. Norfolk table tennis ace, Russell King, is preparing for the veterans' world championships with the help of a 'witchdoctor'.

"I'm leaving nothing to chance" said the 39 year-old manager of Palms Health and Fitness Club at Potters Leisure Resort, Hopton-on-Sea, near Great Yarmouth. "Some of the best players in the world will be taking part in these championships and I want to make sure I am as well prepared as possible."

Russell's preparations include:

- A gruelling 16-week fitness programme
- Regular practice sessions against Norfolk's top players
- A robot opponent to help improve his stamina
- Some good luck magic from 'witchdoctor' Abadabadu.

"Training is hard work and, let's face it, it can be extremely

tedious" said Russell. "The real magic that Abadabadu works is in making me laugh while I'm working out in the fitness centre and that's worth a lot. It proves that training can be fun."

Abadabadu, a member of Potters' entertainments team, plays an over-the-top witchdoctor in one of the centre's stage shows, storming onto the stage armed with rattling seed heads and a cigar-smoking skull on a pole.

He caused pandemonium when he burst in on one of Russell's training sessions at Palms and has been keeping him entertained at subsequent work-outs.

Strangely, Russell's fitness levels have increased dramatically since Abadabadu's intervention. His computer-calculated performance index on the Technogym System he is using, has risen from 16, in the needs improvement category, to

22, in the good sector. And he has been able to increase his exercise sessions from 40 minutes to 80 minutes in less than a month.

"Who knows, maybe there is a bit of the witchdoctor coming through from my past," said Abadabadu, eyes staring madly through lensless spectacles.

"Laughter really is like a magic potion and I firmly believe that a bit of fun in the gym can make a work-out that much more effective. I know Russell takes his training regime very seriously, and everyone at Potters will be cheering him on in June."

Russell will be the youngest ever player to compete in the veterans world championships, which takes place at Manchester's G-Mex Centre in June. With a birthday in December he just meets the age qualification, which requires players to be 40 or more in the

year of the competition. At least one of those taking part will be in his 90s.

Half a dozen of the entrants are ranked in the world's top 20 and Russell is determined to be in top form for the championships, which with 1,500 competitors is the biggest sports event in Britain this year.

Russell, who has entered for the singles and doubles, was ranked eight in the England junior list and reached 35 as a senior. It is 15 years since he has trained so seriously.

He broke two world table tennis records at the age of 19, when he played for 48 hours against two robots and took part in a rally lasting five hours, 14 minutes and 42 seconds with local player Ray Stone. He completed both feats in the same weekend and afterwards slept for three days.

HERBERT CYCLES
UP MOUNTAINS

Herbert Neubauer is a complete professional. He always prepares himself thoroughly for every tournament he plays in.

He cycles almost every day between 30 and 60 miles (sometimes more), including riding up mountains.

In the summer he jogs once a week for about 5 miles (in the winter 4 times a week).

Herbert practices table tennis 4 times a week.

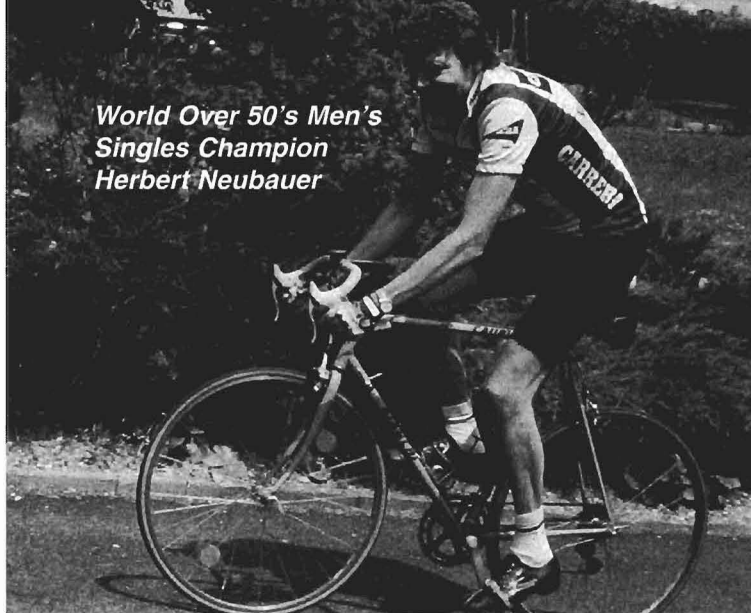
His diet consists of eating muesli, salads, Italian and Chinese cuisine. Milk and mineral water are his favourite drinks, although he said, "I can easily bring myself to have a

good glass of wine or some pints of beer."

SUPER-FIT NIGEL

Before major championships Nigel Eckersley likes to prepare well in advance. "You can't cram everything in to the last few weeks, you'll be over-tuned and prone to injury," he said.

He tries to plan 4/6 months ahead making sure he can get in the gym at least 3 times a week, a session in the gym for Nigel lasts approximately 1.5 hours. I start with gentle stretching to warm up, 10 minutes on a stationary bike the last five minutes under pressure, then 20 minutes on the step machine, excellent for strong legs, then 30 minutes of light weights mainly for lower body and abdominals, finishing off with a twenty minute run. He uses a heart rate monitor which helps him train with specific targets for

maximum gain, this way it's impossible to over-train and it keeps your heart in the correct zone.

Nigel added, "After a workout it's important to cool down, stretching helps recovery and prevents injury, and as well as working out you need to rest sufficiently too."

On the playing side, he practices 3 times a week working on specific areas and concentrating his footwork and services, with match practice being at tournaments.

Nigel tries to eat plenty of pasta, rice, chicken and fish, and drink plenty of mineral water.

MANCHESTER TIPS by Brian Halliday

JOHN HILTON - No excuses for putting John top of the list. Must have a chance of a medal although there are a host of very good players within his age group. Has, along with his great rival **NIGEL ECKERSLEY**, dominated the VETTS scene for the last few years. John who is the world master of chop and float was of course European Champion in 1980 with wins over Lieck of Germany, Gergely of Hungary, Secretin of France, and Dvoracek of Czechoslovakia.

LIANG GE LIANG - This extraordinary player believes in giving back to the sport by way of example. He is a walking Public Relations act - a perfect performer both on and off the table, always willing to talk with and play against less talented players of all nationalities. He was ranked No.1 in the world in 1978, reached the world singles semi-finals in 1977 in Birmingham and then again in Pyongyang in 1979. World Doubles winner, Pioneer of the 'twiddling' era. Now resides in Germany. About a year ago suffered a serious car accident but now happily recovered. There will be no more welcome guest in Manchester than Liang.

LI YUXIANG - Like Liang he now plays and lives in Germany. Won the Veterans 040 Men's Singles crown in Lillehammer with a mixture of penholder power and electric speed. Looks about 25 years old and plays like a teenager. Super fit - could easily win the title again.

PETER STELLWAG - Well known to British fans as Bengtsson's opponent in the oft repeated table tennis film on Channel 4. Ex German Champion. Superb all-round player making his veteran debut.

ANATOLI AMERLIN - Ex Russian Champion. Rather dour serious sort of player - would beat you 21-0 if he could! Worked for Russian TV at the Senior Worlds so is no newcomer to G-Mex.

HERBERT NEUBAUER - Has quickly established himself within VETTS - now even a legend! Caused a mammoth upset in Lillehammer by beating the incomparable Dragutin Surbek in the Over 50's final. Followed this by winning the European Vets in Prague. Very, very fit. Always ready with a joke. Popular and likeable - the current master of funny rubber - will be devilish hard to beat at G-Mex.

SVETLANA FEDEROVA - It was as Svetlana Grinberg that I first saw her. She was representing Russia in the Europeans at Wembley in the mid 1960s. She went on to represent her country on many occasions and reached a pinnacle in 1969 when she won the worlds doubles title with Zora Rudnova. Won the Over 50's title in Melbourne. Very competitive with a strange flicked arm movement before she serves.

EVA KOCZIAN - Superb exponent who won the world mixed doubles title. Eva who hails from Hungary was European No.1 in 1966 along with our own Mary Shannon.

HORST HIRT - Another quite extraordinary German player. European Veterans Champion in Prague. Very fine defender with a superlative backhand kill. His ambidextrous skills were demonstrated in an expedite match some years ago. One game all in the final, 19-18 to his opponent, and Horst to serve. He waited until the twelfth shot, threw his bat from his left hand to his right and killed an outright winner down the line. He won the next two points to win the title.

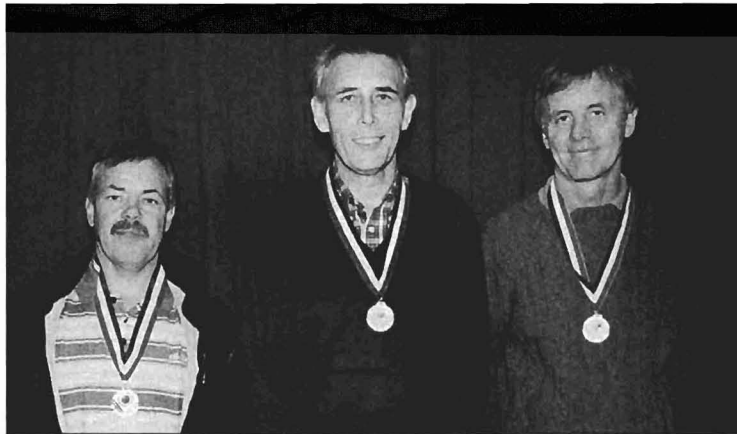
MARTY REISMAN - Is without a doubt the most colourful player in the world. And at the age of 68 years, this likeable man from the USA, is probably the best hard bat player in the world!

Watch out also for **VALENTIN LANGEHEGEMANN** from Luxembourg, and **NICOLE PILLIERE** of France.

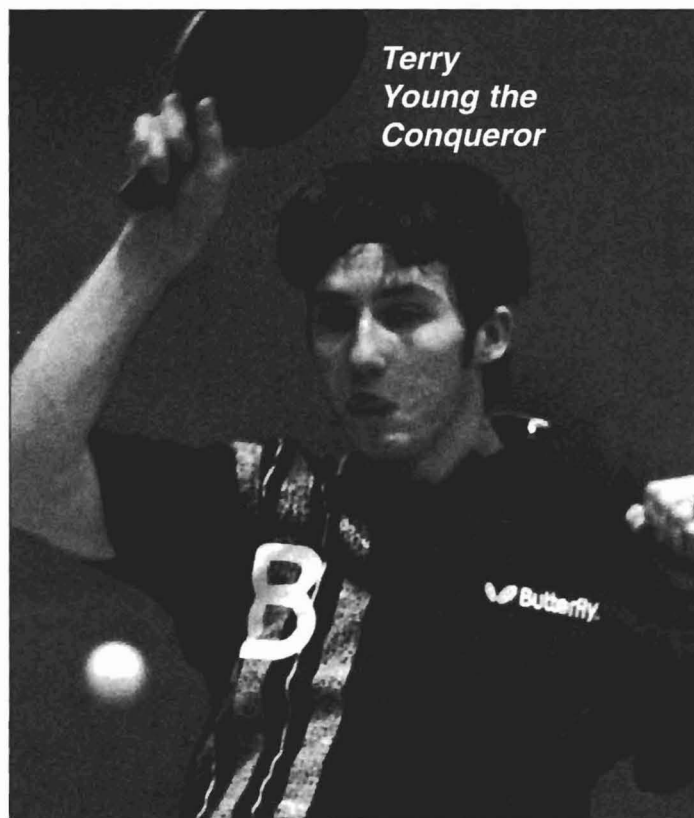
YOUNG CONQUERS SYED IN SHEFFIELD

Terry Young became the Maidenhead conqueror when he magnificently defeated English legend and ace defender Matthew Syed, 18, -18, 19, in the final of the Men's Singles at the South Yorkshire Open Grand Prix, at Ponds Forge International Sports Centre, Sheffield, in May, writes John Wood.

The final was a breathtaking spectacular display of attacking and defensive table tennis that probably surpassed the National Men's Final between Syed and Desmond Douglas earlier this season. The cut and thrust of these two superbly fit athletes was a privilege to witness.

This was the first time in six years that Syed had lost to an Englishman.

The first set was truly magic, with the awesome power of Young being equally balanced by the world-class defending of Syed. And it was Matthew that looked odds on favourite to take the first leg with a big 17-13

lead. But the new self belief that Terry has now acquired saw him blitz the England No.1 aside, taking the early honours

21-18.

But, Syed showed his true class by fighting back spinning and floating his returns, interspersed with the occasional rapier like forehand and backhand drive, to win the second 21-18.

Syed had dominated the early stages of the deciding third leg, taking a 9-6 advantage at the halfway stage. But this young man from Maidenhead, who has developed a new maturity, powered his way back into the match sending Syed scampering to both sides of his half of the court.

Young took the lead at 14-13, and never looked back as he roared into the history books with a classic victory that will long live in the memories of both the players and spectators.

This truly magnificent win for Young put into an unassailable position at the top of the Grand Prix points list.

Young said after his historic victory, "It's been my ambition to beat Matt because he is a fantastic table tennis player and a good friend. The first time you win is always the best! And fare dues to Michael Isherwood who gave one of my hardest matches, not just this tournament but this season as well."

Young also took another mighty scalp as well in the semi-finals when he defeated fellow England international Andrew Eden. In the another semi, Syed won another classic battle with Scotland's Euan Walker.

Young, however did taste defeat when he lost in the Men's Doubles final in partnership with Andrew Horsfield, to the Welsh pairing of Ryan Jenkins and Steve Ward, 11 and 14.

OWOLABI A WORTHY CHAMPION

Kubrat Owolabi proved herself to be a worthy Women's Singles champion, when she clawed her way back from almost certain defeat at the hands of Sue Collier, to win a close final -13, 19, 12.

Collier from Berkshire won the first with consummate ease and was looking good in the second at 17-13, but Owolabi's non stop accurate attack saw her take the second narrowly 21-19.

Collier started the third off like she ment business, but the girl from Middlesex had other ideas



as she went on to win yet another Grand Prix title.

YOUNG ALSO WINS U21 MEN'S TITLE

Terry Young also took the Men's Under 21 title, when he defeated Surrey's Marco Essomba, 9, 8.

But the real excitement was in the semi-finals where Young looked like he was going out, when he was 8-18 down in the third to Yorkshire's Michael Isherwood.

Young suddenly turned on the style and power to take the next 11 consecutive points, and then the victory 21-19.

However, Isherwood did taste success when he won the Men's Band 1 final, beating Sheffield's Andrew Horsfield 18 and 12.

South Yorkshire were successful though in the Men's Band 2 final, where David Charlton defeated Paul Cicchelli - 18, 14, 8.

Cambridgeshire's Cicchelli bounced back to win the Men's Band 3 title, when his combination twiddling defensive bat confused the topspinner from Hastings, Dominic Johns, 11 and 8.

Sadly for Yorkshiremen the Veteran title went to Lancashire's Nigel Eckersley, who defeated Gloucestershire's David Harvey - 13, 7, 9.

The Women's Veteran trophy went to Devon's Penny Perry, who out chopped Yorkshire's Jean Newton, 17 and 6.

MORE YORKSHIRE SUCCESS

Yorkshire's Joanna Roberts cheered the hearts of the Sheffield spectators when she defeated Suffolk's Claire Lowe, 17 and 14, to take the Women's Band 1 title.

Band 4 Men's title went to Michael Malcolm, whilst the Band 3 Women's was won by Lucy Perry.

Grand Prix Champion of 1997/98*

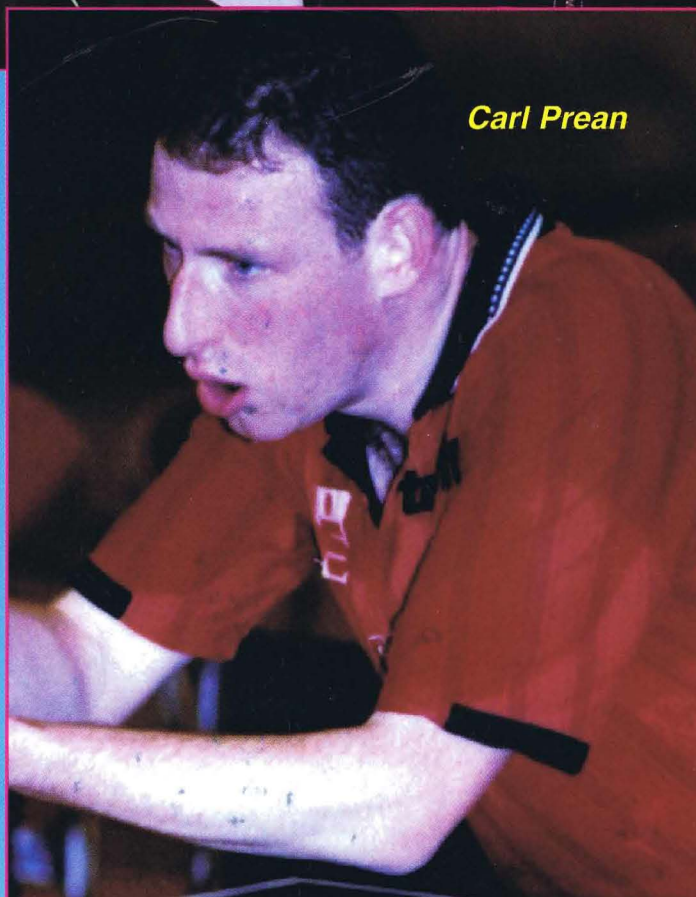


Terry Young became the 1997/98 ETTA Grand Prix Men's Singles Champion, when he reached the final in Bath in May, but it was Carl Prean who took the glory by winning 21-18, 21-18, in a powerful attacking battle, but Young took the £1000 prize money, writes John Wood.

Young, conqueror of Matthew Syed earlier in May at Sheffield, had his moments in this final, in fact he should have taken the second leg when he led 18-16, by banging in his awesome forehand loops and drives, but Prean's greater experience plus the awkwardness of his combination bat saw him home.

Young won the Grand Prix with accumulated 537 points, pushing Prean into second place on 441 points.

Young had his second

moment of glory when he won the Men's Under 21 final, beating Andrew Wilkinson 21-13, 21-15.

Terry also became the ETTA Grand Prix Under 21 Men's Singles Champion with a massive 611 points, whilst Wilkinson came 7th on 251 points.

Young's aggressive style and his regular attendance at these popular tournaments, has seen him develop into England's main challenger to the top two, Matthew Syed and Carl Prean.

Terry's attitude of not fearing anyone, has seen him blossom into a real prospect for the future, not only in England but also in Europe.

OWOLABI ON TOP
Kubrat Owolabi, as expected following her fantastic Grand Prix season, took the Women's

Singles crown with an impressive 664 points, but she was made to fight all the way by Berkshire's Sue Collier in the final. Which saw Collier take the first 21-18, and looking to

cause an upset. But Middlesex's Owolabi proved that she is a worthy Grand Prix Champion for the second year running, by fighting back to win the second 21-15, and the

decider 21-9.

Collier came second in the points tally, but a long way behind on 463 points.

Owolabi also earned some more money when in

partnership with Holland's Anja Heijnen, they won the Women's Doubles final and became this year's Grand Prix Champions

The Welsh aces won the Grand Prix title with 420 points, whilst Walker and Blake had to settle for 4th place with a tally of 275.

Middlesex's Neil Charles, who didn't play too well on Saturday in the Bath Sports and Leisure Centre, but he still managed to take the Band 1 Men's Singles title with a creditable 483 points, 30 in front of 2nd placed Michael Isherwood.

On the day Isherwood played superbly in the final against Clive Carthy, coming from behind to win 21-11, 21-11.

Sue Collier got over her bitter disappointment of losing the Women's Singles final, by winning the Women's Band 1 Singles with 315 points, although she lost in the final to second placed Joanna Roberts on 269.5 points.

WOOLWICH

PLAYERS' PLAYER Part 2

MATTHEW SYED, *English Closed Men's Singles Champion for the second year running and credited with being possibly the best retriever in the world (and with a first class honours degree in Politics, Philosophy and Economics from Oxford University, one of the best brains in table tennis).*

"The two players I have got in mind are both French. **Jacques Secretin** is certainly my favourite player to watch - amazing defense, and an amazing ability to use his wrist to generate different types of spin, huge amounts of charisma, somehow managed to exude a certain enjoyment whilst he was playing, ability to move around the court - he had it all! When I was coming through, it was Secretin I most wanted to watch and most of the punters wanted to watch. So from an aesthetic point of view I think we have never seen anybody who would be able to trump Jacques Secretin. However, I have always believed that the thing you have got to do in life is to maximise the potential you have been given. We all have a certain genetic make-up and we all have a background that we don't really choose, and subject to those constraints we try to make the best out of things under our own steam. And therefore when I look at people who are up for respect, I look for people who have managed to maximise their abilities, subject to all the constraints that we are all under. The person who has done that is **Jean-Philippe Gatien**, because Gatien's natural gifts were not as large as some of the other players in his generation. But in conjunction with the French system - and Michel Gadal had a large input into the system - he has managed to win a World gold medal, an Olympic silver medal, a European Top 12 and World Cup, and he has led the French team to numerous medals. And for somebody of his ability, without a good backhand, to have done that is a tribute to absolutely extraordinary will and desire to be successful which was based on very hard training at home and an exceptional mental strength on big points. For that reason, for someone to have accumulated big titles under severe constraints, Gatien is the one I would have to pick as my player.

"I must add a footnote: **Jan-Ove Waldner (Sweden)** is without question certainly the best player I have ever seen, and from a close

examination of the past players and their records, I think he is the greatest player of all time. And I think that the primary reason for that is that he was born with a natural ability level significantly higher than anybody else - and he has utilised that. It is actually possible that he could have been even better because he could have translated that unbelievable quantity of natural talent into even greater results, but the last 2, 3 or 4 years he has not been training as hard as he could have done. He is famous for various activities outside of table tennis, which if they had not been there - if he had the temperament of a Surbek or a Samsonov - he might have been better. But it is part of the charisma, the persona, the intrigue that one feels about Waldner that he does have these other attributes. If you meet and talk to the guy he is very enigmatic; he has the most remarkable personality. That is one of the reasons why at any big tournament, if you take a poll of the top players, who they want to win, the person who will come out top by miles will be Waldner - a remarkable thing for someone who has won so much already. A bit like Des (Douglas) in the old days in the English Closed!"

RICHARD YULE, *Chief Executive of the ETTA, but as a player many times men's champion of Scotland. Still an active veteran.*

"The first player who really made an impact was **Malcolm Sugden** (Scotland), who was the first player to win £100 prize money in the UK at the Nisson tournament. He was originally from Edinburgh but moved down to London to improve his game. He made a big impact on me when I was a junior player - the first player that I saw with real qualities, superb balance, who had broken the mould at that time with not only the new techniques that were coming into the game in the '60s but also very well prepared physically. So probably one of the first athletes that I saw playing table tennis. Beyond that I was a fan of the Swedish system and the Swedish players of that era. And the two players who made the biggest impact and who I enjoyed watching throughout their careers and my career, were **Hans Alser** who tragically was killed in a plane crash in the '70s and **Kjell**

Johansson. I wouldn't say I modelled my game on them but I always enjoyed watching them and their approach to the game, their temperament - technically it was something I could relate to, it was the type of player I was. Certainly **Kjell Johansson** gave me many hours of pleasure in terms of how he comported himself as a man - superb athlete - and they had a reputation for being terrific sportsmen which they still have. On the back of that, **Stellen Bengtsson** came along to make up a formidable trio. So the Swedish model in terms of players impacted most on me at that time."

NICOLA DEATON, *perhaps the main future hope for the English women, won the national title for the first time last season and reached the final again this year before losing to Lisa Lomas.*

"I think from an early age perhaps my highest mentor was **Jill Hamersley (Parker)** and my dad (**Colin Deaton**) was a mentor as an enthusiast. He really gave me a lot of inspiration to play. Probably now people like **Cookie (Alan Cooke)** as well. He has been a great ambassador for the sport. Now as I get older I tend to focus more on my game rather than anybody else's, but probably Cookie is a good inspiration as he works so hard and has achieved a lot."

ALEX PERRY, *now England No 4, is the leading young male English player and hope for the next decade/millennium. When he was younger, he practiced with another talented lefthander, Trevor Taylor!*

"When I was younger, **Mikael Apelgren (Sweden)** was the person I looked up to most, being left handed. I used to go away from the table quite a lot and I liked his variation of spin, his ability to play away from the table and his mental attitude as well. He said if you played a 15 shot rally and lost, and the next point the guy served in the net, he felt mentally on top. Every point, no matter how well it was played, was a point and an advantage if you won it. I played in a club with him a few years ago and got to know his attitude. **Des (Douglas)**, being lefthanded, I was looking at a lot of left handed players Des was a good model for me: speed, and speed going round his backhand - very good. And **(Jean-Philippe) Gatien's (France)** mental strength. I think Gatien, mentally - if you are

watching a 5 game match and Gatien is in it, you expect him to win."

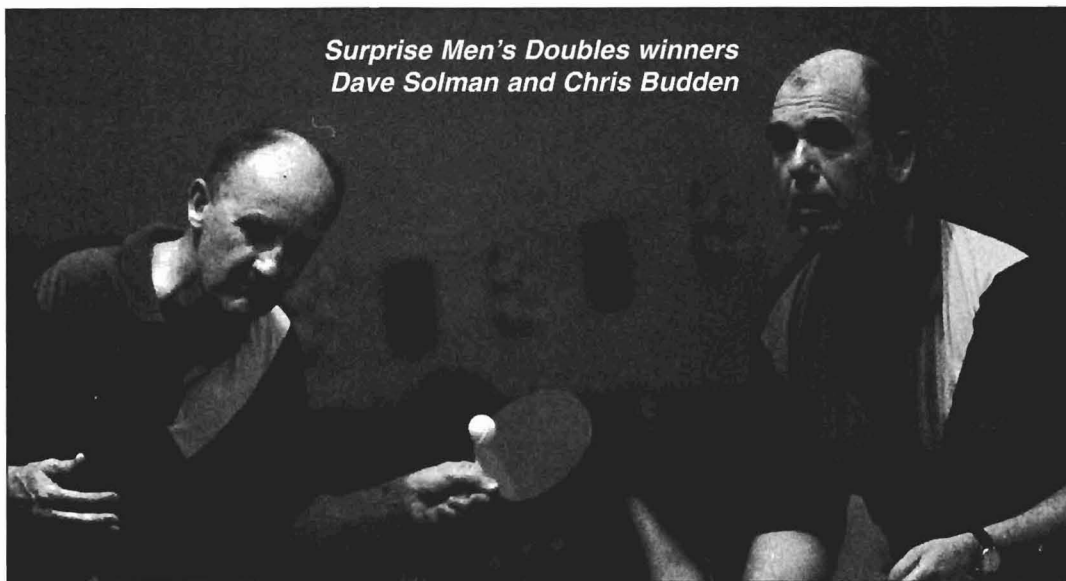
So who is the players' player? Some names cropped up several times: of men, Stellen Bengtsson and Kjell Johansson (past) and Jean-Philippe Gatien (present); and women, Jill Hamersley-Parker (past) and Deng Yaping and Bettine Vrieskoop (present). Undoubtedly the player who comes out top overall is that brilliant Swede, World Champion Jan-Ove Waldner. It will be difficult to interview him. But not far behind, and the most popular player in England - the English Players' English Player - is Des Douglas!

DESMOND DOUGLAS MBE, *who has been English Mens Champion an incredible 11 times and at 42 was still good enough to take Matthew Syed to 16 in the fifth in an excellent final at Bath this year. He has also won the English Open twice, but probably his best individual performance was winning the European Top 12 in 1987. However, as a team player his record is even better, with the pinnacle being at the European Championships in Duisburg 1978 where he was unbeaten in leading England to and in the team final and then reached the singles semis before going out to Istvan Jonyer. Des reached no 7 in the world rankings.*

"For me, people like **Stellen Bengtsson** and **Kjell Johansson (Sweden)**, because when I was coming up Bengtsson was No.1 in the world and Johansson was very high up in the world. So for me it is Stellen Bengtsson, I think he is one who helped bring the standard very high in Europe and the world. Denis Neale a little bit because he had a similar counter hitting, quick game, over the table. He influenced me a little bit as far as the English standards go. But I would have to say world wide Bengtsson and Johansson, because in those days everyone looked up to the Swedes. The modern era is different because of the glue - someone like **(Jan-Ove) Waldner (Sweden)** or **(Jean-Philippe) Gatien (France)**. But they did not really influence me because the game is different now."

TAYLOR MADE FOR JONATHAN

*Surprise Men's Doubles winners
Dave Solman and Chris Budden*



Jonathan Taylor, ranked No.10 nationally, has become the Police Athletic Association's Men's Singles table tennis champion, when he won the final at the PAA National Indoor Games Championships at Potters Leisure Resort in Hopton-on-Sea, in April.

Table tennis is just part of these championships, which also include darts and snooker.

All the contestants who appeared in these games had to win their regional championships first, so the standard of play was very high indeed.

In the Men's Singles final Jonathan Taylor faced the Cheshire Veteran Ian Johns, but his many years experience couldn't prevent the exuberance of youth from attacking his way to victory, to win what will be the first of many titles he will surely win at future PAA Championships.

Taylor beat Greg Bridgett 14, 12, in the semi-final, whilst

Johns won his way to the final beating David Greaves 17, 14, in the other semi.

Taylor also reached the final of the Men's Doubles in partnership with Greg Bridgett, but his dreams of a debut double were dashed when their express charge to the title was surprisingly halted by Dave Solman and Chris Budden.

Looking home and dry, with one hand on the trophy, after taking the first 21-16, and leading the second, they crumbled under the mesmerising accuracy and varied defence of the boys from London, who went to save the second 22-20, and go to win the third 21-16.

Ian Johns had a good couple of days, not only did he reach the Men's Singles final, but also the Veterans were he lost to well known Lancashire policeman Dave Newton, -19, 7, 16.

But Johns did taste the joy of winning when he teamed-up

with his brother Alec in the Veterans Doubles final, winning 13 and 9 against that normally successful London pairing of Budden and Solman.

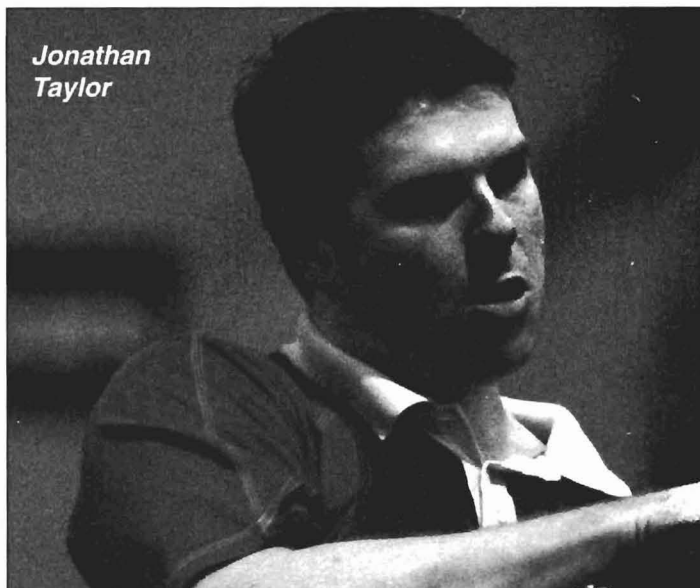

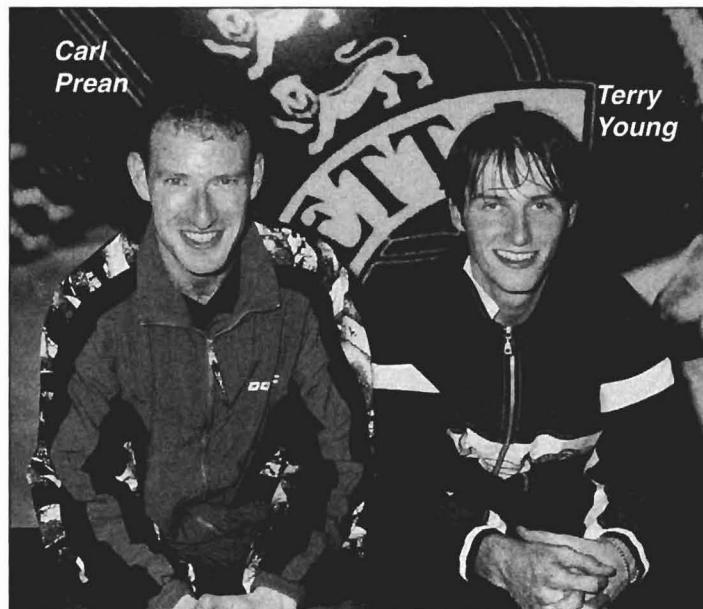

H. ROY EVANS, who died in Cardiff aged 88, was the Welshman behind the 'Ping Pong Diplomacy' that broke political deadlock between China and the United States nearly 30 years ago.

As the then President of the International Table Tennis Federation, with it's more than 100 member nations, he was asked by China to visit them on his way to the 1971 World Championships in Japan.

During that visit he suggested to the Chinese that they should invite the Western countries to visit them following the World Championships in Japan.

Out went the invitations, including one to the American team, which was accepted, with the agreement of the US State Department.

Then in February 1972 President Nixon was in China, the visit climaxing what became known as the 'Ping Pong Diplomacy'.

The Cardiff born elder son of the Table Tennis Association of Wales's first treasurer Morgan 'Mog' Evans, had table tennis in his blood.

Roy is survived by his wife Nancy, who travelled the world with him.

Nancy, who is in her nineties and has been unwell, became the first woman member of the ITTF Council in 1956.

- Member of Welsh Sports Foundation. On GP and F Committee of British Olympic Association.
- One of the four independent members of the British International Sports Committee, and Chairman of a Working Group charged with the task of reviving British influence in international organisation of sport through development aid to Third World, and newly emerging countries.
- Awarded the OBE in Queen's Birthday Honours list in 1972 for services to sport, which included the historic "Ping Pong Diplomacy" development in which he played a major part.
