

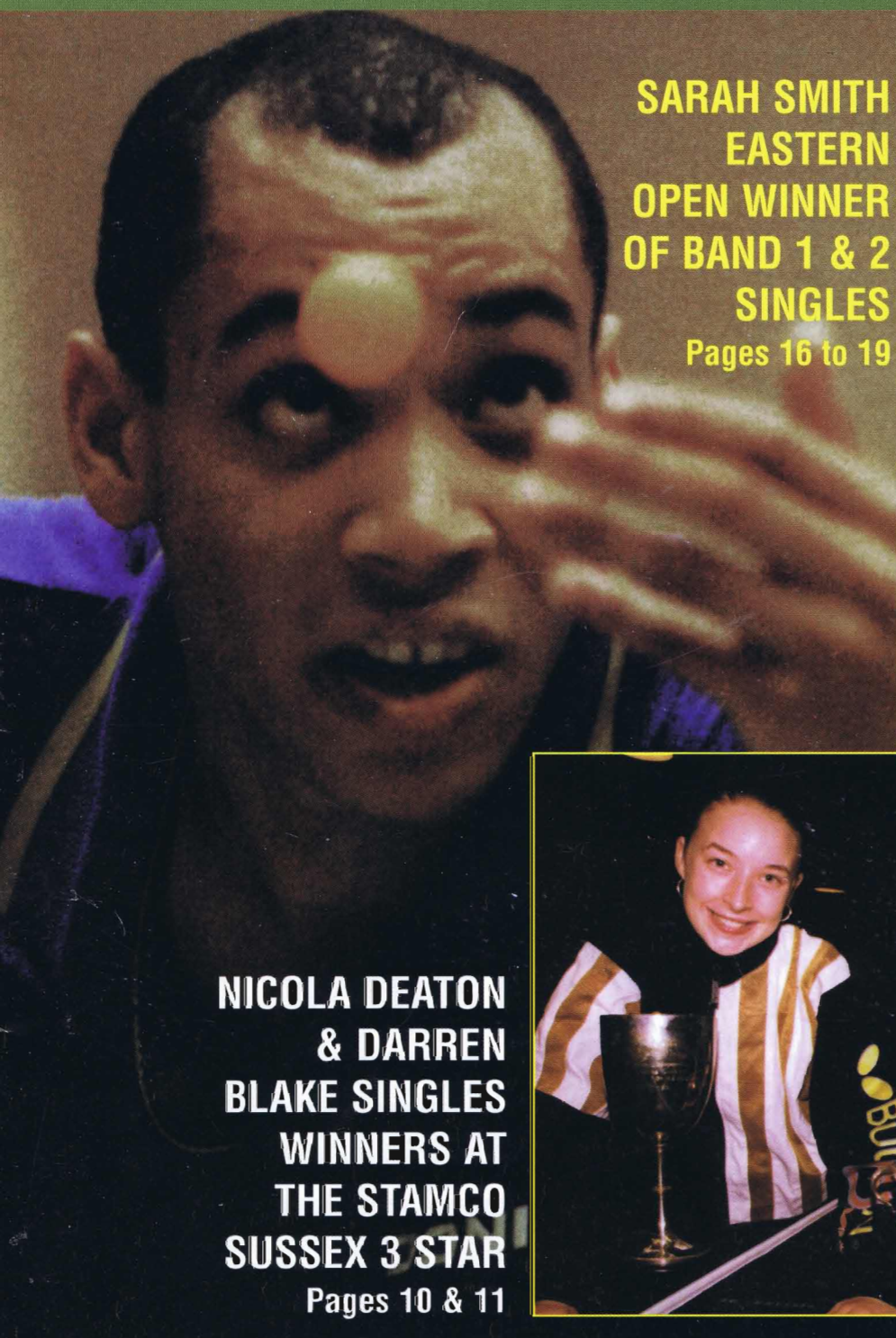

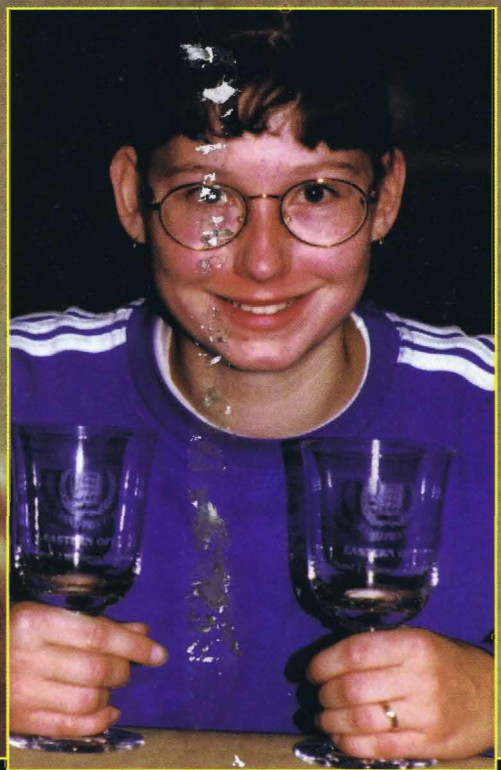

FIRST CLASS MICHEL GADAL

Michel Gadal, the world famous French coach, has been appointed as the new Performance Director for the English Table Tennis Association and will direct the implementation of the ETTA's World Class Performance Plan which recently received a National Lottery grant in excess of £1.2 million.

Gadal learned his skills in France where he rose up the coaching ladder over a 20 year period. Originally he was the club coach at the Auch Club in Toulouse. He then became the provincial coach for Languedoc-Roussillon, where he lived in Montpellier and met up with his star pupil, 11 year old Jean Philippe Gatién. In 1985 Michel was appointed as coach to the French Junior team and given a position at the French Table Tennis Academy in Paris. Three years later in 1988 he became the Men's team coach with responsibility for all high performance activities in France. During that time the French Mens' team won the European League twice and Gatién won the Silver medal at the Olympic Games in Barcelona.

Since late 1992 Michel Gadál has been working with the Canadian Association in Ottawa where a number of very promising junior players have been produced. He was also appointed by the ITTF to undertake a series of high performance coaching courses for the international body. Michel recognises that table tennis is part of the English culture and believes that the sport in this country has tremendous potential and sees

his new position as a very "positive challenge."

As well as the task of producing world class quality players for England. Gadál has a second objective and that is to create a system in English table tennis which in itself will produce a stream of talent for future generations. An important part of this programme will be coach education at the highest level.

Having appointed the Performance Director, the next task is the recruitment of the coaching staff and the Association is advertising positions for five full time National Coaches and four part time coaches for the Under 12 programme. The key requirement is to appoint coaches who have the ability to deliver results as the whole Performance Programme is based on the English team winning medals at all levels and restoring our National Teams to amongst the best in the world. The short lists for these positions is likely to be completed in December with interviews taking place in January.

One of the first tasks will be to establish the National Training Centre probably at the National Sports Centre at

Holme Pierre Point in Nottinghamshire and to form a new National Under 12 squad consisting of up to 24 boys and 24 girls who will train together throughout the year for between three to six days per month under the direction of the top coaches..

JOOLA EUROPEAN LEAGUE

The England men produced their best result since the World Championships in Manchester when they defeated Russia away from home by 4 sets to 2, gaining a position in the semi-final play-offs in the First Division.

Matthew Syed was the star of the England team beating Andrianov in straight games when the Russians led 2 - 0. Syed then defeated Smirnov again in straight games to clinch the 4 - 2 victory. Carl Prean contributed with a good victory over Dimitri Mazunov and combined with Alex Perry to win the vital doubles. England's next match is the away leg to Greece on scheduled for 20th December. The home leg of the semi-final is due to be played in the middle of January.

England women, after a remarkable victory against Sweden, were defeated 4 - 1 by the group winners. Germany at Cippenham Club in Slough. Lisa Lomas winning the only English game against Bottcher. Despite being below strength, the German team were comfortable victors. England will now play Italy in a two-leg play off series to avoid the relegation match. The first leg is to be played at the Cirencester Club in Gloucester on Wednesday 10th

December. A good result in this fixture will be very welcome.

BARCLAYCARD NATIONAL AWARDS

In the last issue of Table Tennis News I was delighted to advise readers that the Northwest Region had qualified for the finals of the Barclaycard Volunteer

Investment programme for Regional and County Governing Body Award. It was subsequently announced that the Eastern Region with Development Chairman Judy Rogers, and Regional Development Officer Sandra Collins, had won their Regional Barclaycard Volunteer Investment programme Award and had also qualified for the National Finals. The latest news is that the National Award, open to all Regional/County Governing Bodies, has been won by the ETTA Eastern Region for their Voluntary Development Officer programme and the award, received by Sandra Collins, was presented by Sir Rodney Walker, the Chairman of the English Sports Council, and Nick Gault, the Sponsorship Manager of Barclaycard, at a specially arranged ceremony in London. Congratulations to all concerned. The ETTA Eastern Region now go on to represent England in the U.K. Finals the result of which will be announced sometime in December. The potential prize for the U.K. Finals is a

commemorative plaque and £3.000 to be invested in a project.

The Eastern Region Voluntary Development Officer programme has proved to be an enormous success. Sandra Collins, with assistance and support from her volunteer network at regional, county and local level, the ETTA Development Department, and the English Sports Council East, organised a series of courses for around 30 local development officers in her Region and provided them with all the necessary training and materials to develop table tennis within their own locality. Now with support from the English Sports Council the programme has been adopted nationally under the name of the Local Development Officer programme. This will encourage each league and large club to appoint one of their members as their local Development Officer with the responsibility of developing table tennis within their own geographical area. The ETTA will provide the training and all necessary manuals etc.

PERRIER MENS WORLD CUP NIMES 1997

ZORAN PRIMORAC BECAME THE MENS WORLD CUP CHAMPION IN NIMES ON THE 26th OCTOBER 1997, WHEN HE BEAT CHINA'S KONG LINGHUI IN THE FINAL, WRITES KEN LYONS.

PRIMORAC WON THIS WORLD CUP FOR THE SECOND TIME WITHOUT DROPPING A SINGLE GAME .



The Draw for the quarter finals contained the top four players on the world rankings. First match on was world champion Jan-Ove Waldner against world number two Kong Linghui. On this occasion Kong got the better of Waldner 8, 17, 12. In fact in the third the world champion found himself 11-0 down.

Second on was Samsonov against Lui Guoliang. Lui took the first 13 but the world number three stormed back to take his place in the semi's by winning the next three 14, 15, 16. Primorac, who had not dropped a single set in his group matches faced Kim Tak Soo. He continued this fine form by winning in three straight 16, 19, 16.

The next game on was what the capacity crowd had come to see Christophe Legout against Jorg Roskopf. With the idol of French table tennis Jean Philippe Gatien withdrawing from the tournament due to a broken wrist, sustained in a swimming accident, it was late replacement Legout who the French had high hopes for. Legout soon found himself two down 16,18, as Roskopf dominated play. The crowd went really wild as Legout took the next two games to level the match. And then pandemonium broke out as Legout took the decider 23-21.

In the semi final Legout met Primorac who had yet to drop a game in the competition, and once again he didn't, winning 19, 18, 19. But Legout ranked 30 in the world played great to say the least. In the other semi Samsonov met Kong who took the first two 18, 16. Samsonov fought back to take the third 17. But Kong stormed into the final game 11.

So the final was between the world number 6, Primorac and the world number 2, Kong. But Primorac was in scintillating form and took the final in style, proving he is truly a world class player, as he won the mens' World Cup to add to his China Open title.

Samsonov won the play-offs for third place beating Legout.

SHARING BEST MOMENTS

When you are in your teens and early 20's its easy to find fun around every corner. Thrills are ten a penny and life is good. The good wins of this year will be lost in the more satisfying wins of the future that go on and on as you still haven't reached your peak. When your older you hang on to your wins of the present and hope God will be kind and you'll be free from injury to play well again next year.

1996/7 was for me a memorable year on three occasions. I was lucky to be present at the 44th World Championships in Manchester. I wish you all had had this opportunity. For 12 days 117 Nations competed in team and individual events. It was a spectacular and successful event in spite of what you might have read and I for one felt privileged to see day after day the best table tennis the world could offer under one roof. The Men's singles final between Jan-Ove Waldner and Vladimir Samsonov was the highlight of the championships with Waldner displaying fully his mastery of the game - what a superb sportsman.

As a newly appointed National Umpire my greatest thrill was believing I actually umpired the Men's semi-final team event China v. Korea, and feeling very humble at the intensity and loyalty of each nation's supporters en masse singing, flag waving, encouraging their team to win. An unbelievable experience a sight never to forget.

In the summer I have to say I had two of my greatest wins. My best "moment" has to be when I was presented with a bronze medal in a Ladies singles event on the Podium, at the 2nd European Veterans TT Champs. in Prague in Czech Republic. This was another spectacular and successful event that takes place every two years (the alternate year the Veteran World's takes place), some say the European is by far the stronger. To see 1900 competitors, Over 40/50/60/70/80's playing on 60 tables - four great halls is another thrill and a wonderful sight.

My second proud moment was in the ladies doubles when together with Margaret Dignum from Warwickshire we beat the No.1 seeds (World and European Champions) to reach the quarter-finals - this was such a close match, it went to expedite too. For those of you who have not seen me play I am lucky if my games last 6 mins.

Sadly only a few of my club colleagues from Ellenborough Table Tennis Club in Enfield managed to get to Manchester and the Europeans, but I would say if you get the opportunity to see any international matches don't miss it - it will bring tears to your eyes.

THE OTHER SIDE

The other side of the coin to the lack of volunteers in table tennis - namely, that a few people do a monumental amount and the others let them! - was cut from my letter in the October edition. But this too is a problem.

I am totally convinced that given the necessary enthusiasm, commitment and time (and support), skilled volunteers can get table tennis to take off anywhere. Often this is very rewarding, but it can be at too much personal cost. The reason and the pleasure that encourages someone to willingly give service in the first place, can be sidelined as the volunteer is burdened with ever greater responsibilities.

You can become a victim of your own success (and willingness to help), and there is always too much to do. Even the most dedicated can feel overwhelmed and wonder if it is all worthwhile, particularly if stung by criticism. Such a person may, as I once briefly did, suddenly chuck the lot in and table tennis will have lost another invaluable worker for the cause. And the danger of doing too much is that there is no succession - no sustainability.

So the advice to these few is: take on only what you can reasonably handle, and delegate or leave the rest. Unfortunately, it is advice that I have not always followed! So come on everyone else, share the load! Don't you be part-guilty of 'killing a goose that lays a golden egg' for table tennis.

REGULATIONS?

When completing entry forms for tournaments, players have to sign a declaration saying they will abide by the tournament regulations and that the referee's decision is final. But does that this finality mean that the referee can ignore the regulations himself? And if so, is the declaration that the players signed still valid?

Such a situation happened at the end of last season in the Yasaka Grand Prix finals in Bath, when a group of four had reached the penultimate set with two players having already won 2 sets. The result of their encounter would decide who would come first and second in the group. During the first game one of the players couldn't continue and conceded.

The referee then completely ignored the tournament regulations by deciding that, that player would not finish second in the group and

that his previous results would be ignored and all Grand Prix points/computer points would be expunged. The last two players in the group would then play for second place. If this becomes a precedent it could have harmful implications and be open to abuse.

As I was the player due to play the runner-up I asked the referee about this ruling, and was disappointed with the brusque and curt response. But, I reflected that the referee is always right, even when he ignores tournament regulations. Or is he?

ENGLAND FACE ITALY

JOOLA EUROPEAN WOMEN'S LEAGUE SUPER DIVISION

England will play Italy in the second stage of this season's Joola European Women's League Super Division over two legs in December and January. The first leg will be held at the Cirencester Table Tennis Centre, Deer Park School, Cirencester, on Wednesday 10th December, commencing at 7 pm. Should England lose over the two legs, they will be forced into a play-off to retain their Premier Division status.

NATIONAL JUNIOR AND CADET CHAMPIONSHIPS

A large entry has been received for this year's championships which will be held for the second year running at the Stratford Leisure and Visitors Centre, Stratford-upon-Avon, on the weekend of 29th/30th November. Junior events will be held on the Saturday with the finals scheduled to start at 1900 hours, and cadet events on the Sunday, the finals scheduled to start at 1700 hours.

ETTA GRAND PRIX

The Eastern Open, recently staged at Lynnsport, Kings Lynn, was possibly the most successful yet. A large, high quality entry, good local organisation and an excellent schedule made this a first class event. The decision to stage the finals, although meaning a later finish (2145 hours), seemed to be well received with over 100 people from all parts of the country staying to the very end. Graham Rogerson, the organiser, and Phil Gower, the referee, are to be congratulated.

The circuit now moves onto the beautiful city of Bath where the Western Open will be staged

on 6th/7th December. A total of 28 tables will be used with a similar schedule to the one used at Kings Lynn. Carl Preat will be making his second Grand Prix appearance of the season.

On 20th/21st December the East Midlands Open will be held at the Kettering Leisure Village. 27 tables will be in use, all in the same hall. With such a central location we are expecting a large entry.

On 31st January/1st February the 2nd West Midlands Open will be stage at the Stratford Leisure and Visitors Centre, Stratford-upon-Avon. Last season this event was extremely popular and with a maximum of 18 tables early entry is advised.

For those who have not visited Stratford-upon-Avon, it is a lovely town with excellent restaurants, pubs and shops, all within easy walking distance of the venue,

A new Grand Prix event this season is the South Western Open which will be held at Polkyth Leisure Centre, St Austell, over Easter weekend, 10th-13th April. Over the last few years we have staged a number of very successful events at Polkyth, thanks mainly to an enthusiastic local table tennis association and the help of Restormel Borough Council. It is hoped that the South Western Open can emulate the success once achieved by the North East of

England Open, which for many years was held over Easter at Wallis' Holiday Camp, Cayton Bay, on the outskirts of Scarborough. This became something of a holiday for players and their families, and was sorely missed when the venue ceased to be available over Easter.

The following weekend the very popular Blackpool 4 Star will be making its debut as a Grand Prix event. Held at the Blackpool Sports Centre, it is certain to attract a large entry and could be over-subscribed.

The final qualifying event will be the re-launch of the South Yorkshire Open, which will be held in the impressive Ponds

Forge Leisure Centre, Sheffield, Over the weekend of 9th/10th May. 22 tables will be used and, no doubt, many players will use the event in a last ditch effort to get the necessary points to qualify for the finals.

As last year, the finals will be held at the Bath Sports Centre on 30th/31st May. The banded events and possibly the under 21's will be held on the Saturday with the Senior events, plus the veterans, on the Sunday. With most of England's leading players playing in the Grand Prix this season, the finals should produce some excellent table tennis. Tickets will be available from the ETTA Events Unit from early May.

The English Table Tennis Association (ETTA) in the East and in the North West both won the regional governing body categories of the VIP Awards and pocketed £1,500 each in the process.

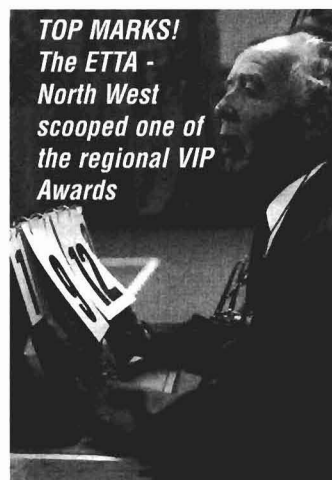

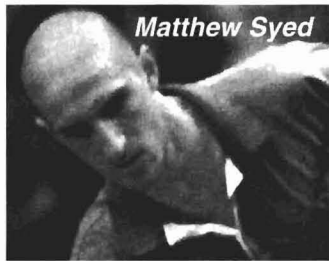

team managed to get the essential practice they needed before the match, which was delayed due to the Moscow Championships being played at the same venue, on the same day.

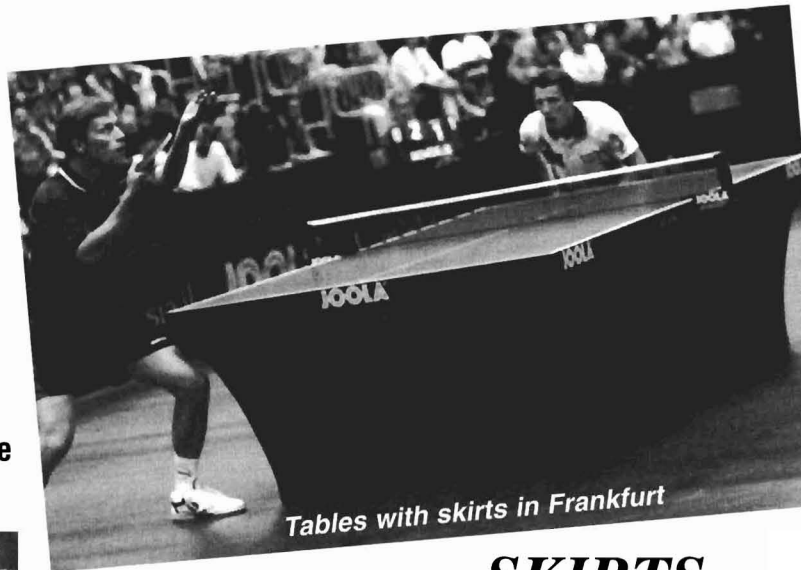
WICKED SERVES

CIPPENHAM - DREAM CENTRE



THE CIPPENHAM TABLE TENNIS CENTRE, built at a cost of over £500,000, recently celebrated its first birthday. Five years of hard work and intensive planning came to fruition on 1st October 1996 when the first ball was struck at the Centre by Graham Trimming, founder of Cippenham Table Tennis Club in 1973 and Secretary ever since. For Graham and the other members of the Club's Building Committee - Steve Crow, Frank Earls, Stephen Joel and Alec Watson - it was the realisation of a life long dream.

The Centre is situated within the grounds of The Westgate School in Slough, Berkshire and is a shared facility with the school who use the playing hall during school hours. From 4 p.m. each school day as well as at weekends and during school holidays the facility is used exclusively for table tennis.

A playing hall of 25m by 22m offers a range of table configurations, the most widely used being eight courts of 11 m by 5.5m. Up to 9 Grade 3 courts can be accommodated at tournaments. 12 individual courts are used for the Woolwich Junior

League and up to 18 tables for coaching.

The Centre also boasts a large storage area, a 40 seat licensed lounge bar from where play can be viewed, kitchen, office/tournament control point, reception area, disabled facility and toilets plus a link to the school's existing changing facilities with upgraded showers.

The bar and refreshment area have proved very popular and financially lucrative under the keen management of Jackie Lovell.

Cippenham Table Tennis Club operates a comprehensive timetable of activities on weekday evenings including four coaching sessions, local league matches, club competitions and open practise sessions.

Weekend use has proved extremely popular with over 50 dates having been booked for the current season. The Centre is extensively used by the ETTA Southern Region, Bucks and Berkshire county associations, the Slough League as well as for Cippenham club events. It plays host to national events such as the Junior and Cadet Masters, the Veterans British League, Woolwich National Junior League, Slough

Woolwich Junior League plus open and closed tournaments and inter-league competitions. The Southern Region uses the Centre for its coach and player development programme on a regular basis and Cippenham has so far hosted three international matches.

The Cippenham club runs 32 teams in various leagues, including 6 in the British Leagues and is committed to providing a pathway for player development to the very top. Out of its 150 members, four are national champions at their age group - Gareth Herbert, Jesper Hougaard, Robert Wilson and Gemma Chapman. Under the guidance of Cippenham coach Ken Phillips the Slough boys' teams won both the Carter Cup and the Leach Cup last season, and the Cippenham coaching set up is widely regarded as being amongst the best in the country and is one of the schemes chosen to pilot the TOPClub introduction. A similar scheme has been in operation at Cippenham for three years.

In 1996 Cippenham was nominated as the ETTA's Club of the Year a great tribute to the management team which also includes Mike Rhodes, Peter Hillier and Rhys Evans.

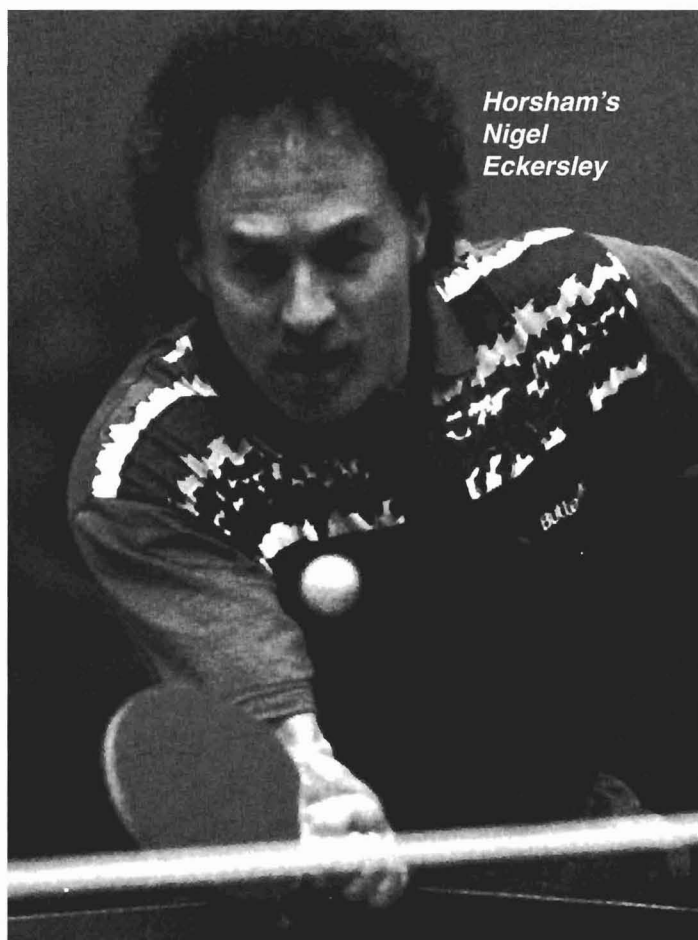

SYED & DEATON'S EASTERN PROMISE

The Women's Doubles final was a desperately close affair with Deaton and Johansson just winning -18, 22, 19.

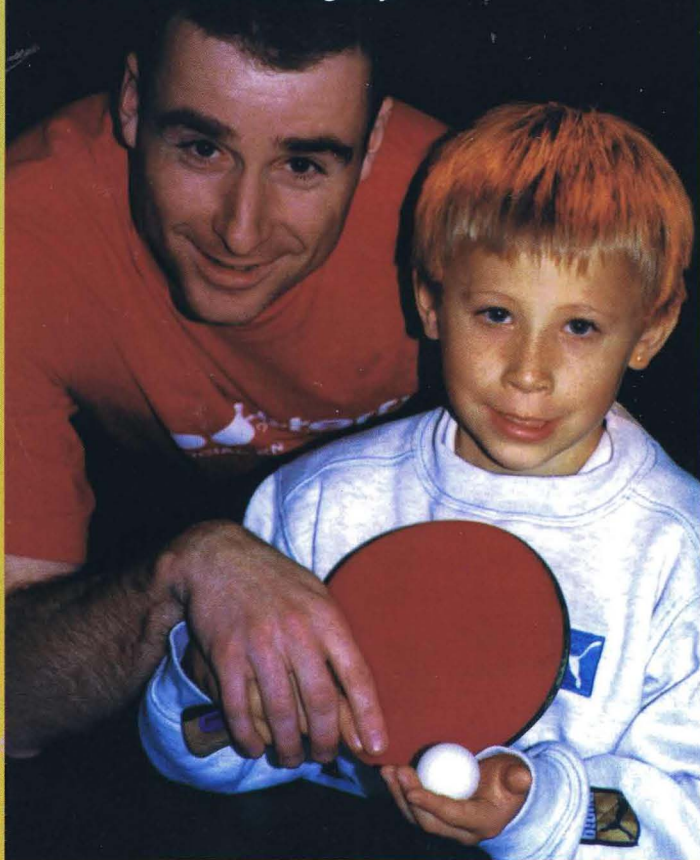

CASH SHORTAGE BITES

Having just joined the regional committee as press officer, my first and very sad duty is to report the loss of Sue Adamson, London's regional projects officer. As London did not receive any funding at all this year, were unable to renew her contract. Not only have we lost Sue but the regional office as well. She will be sorely missed and we wish her well for the future.

HOPE FOR MORE FUNDING

Funding for 1998 and thereafter will be by the ETTA making an application to be divided amongst the regions rather than each region making an individual-submission. The allocations to the regions must include funding for a development officer.

GREATER LONDON CHAMPIONSHIPS

At the last minute the championships were cancelled because of withdrawal of funding by English Sports Council, London Region. Will there be funding for the championships next year?

LONDON YOUTH GAMES

Crystal Palace was again the venue for the finals, and congratulations go to Brent who won the boys event and to Croydon who won the girls event.

MAJOR NEW FACILITIES

Ealing Tertiary College has received an Offer of £2.4m from the National Lottery Fund, for a multi purpose sports centre dependent on meeting facilities criteria and to include a six table T.T.unit.

The ETTA and the Wembley & Harrow League have not yet received a reply from the National Lottery Fund, to upgrade the Harrow Leisure Centre to English Sports Council standards.

Edison have lost the premises upon which the funding application was made, but the offer may be available for another site. £75K is required, the London Borough of Haringey have only offered £40K.

Bromley Council have been asked to consider the inclusion of table tennis in any future development of

Crystal Palace.

SPORTS SCIENCE/MEDICINE

This project, which is being funded by the English Sports Council for three years, is for an elite London squad, who having undergone physiological testing, would receive advice on diet, psychology and fitness. It will also include an introductory seminar for parents and coaches. There will also be coaching sessions by the national coach and a leading international player. With only a few lines dedicated to this stroke in the coaching manual, I feel it is crucial to our players development that we recognise the importance of this often neglected shot, writes Bradley Billington.

The introduction of 'bicycle glue' in the late 1970's and widespread use in the mid 80's effectively changed coaching philosophy. Emphasis on serve and third ball attack overshadowed previous ideology of long control rallies. Contemporary World Table Tennis involves shorter rallies and an increase in speed, spin and power of shot. In order to exploit these changes to the game, attacking players, where possible look to get in first. Indeed players who make the first attack should be looking to win between 70% to 80% of these points (for players of approximate equal ability). However, irrespective of how good a player becomes at making the first attack, they will never stop their opponents getting in as well. Therefore, with this knowledge, players have developed the ability to control their opponents attacks. Often with the variation of the block. A quick look at the leading players in the world suggests that players who can 'contain' opponents attacks are currently a dominating force - Waldner, Kong LongHui, Samsonov and Primorac.

In England generally, we are considerably weaker at containing attacks than our foreign counterparts. Two key reasons for this are:

- 1) Players do not practice or concentrate enough on the block.
- 2) It is neglected technically and tactically in coaching sessions at all levels (maybe due to the focus of serve and third ball, whilst the control of

this was neglected).

In order to address this balance in our game it is important that in coaching sessions:

- attention is paid to the controller as well as the 'active' player during the set exercises.
- exercises are set specifically for the controllers. Beginning with regular exercises to improve the technique and develop a feel and control of the ball. Progressing to irregular to improve anticipation and footwork.
- players should be encouraged to experiment with the variations of the block.

THE VARIATIONS OF THE BLOCK

Variations of the block have been developed by players to significantly reduce the attackers probability of winning the point. Each variation used at the correct time can be an effective tool. For all blocks the racket begins from a high position (at the minimum above table height) and the timing point is before the peak of the bounce. Variations of the following strokes can also include sidespin and are dependant upon the spin, speed and power of the oncoming shot.

The Topspin Block

A short stroke starting slightly below the contact point of the ball. Using a closed bat angle the timing point is just after the bounce. As contact is made with the ball the wrist is rolled over the top of the ball to produce the topspin. This can result in the ball 'kicking up' at the opponent and increases the difficulty for them.

The Punch Block

Most effective with the timing point just above net height, the racket is held a little more open than the topspin block. The stroke begins slightly above the contact point with the ball. The back of the ball is struck firmly with the bat travelling slightly downwards in order to keep the ball down and to produce the 'flat' shot. Generally most effective when the opponent is too close to the table, ensuring that they have to lift the ball.

The Chop Block

Taken very early with a fast wrist action this is one of the most difficult shots in Table Tennis. To produce backspin on a shot taken very early, off a heavy topspin with a fast racket, is even more difficult than it sounds.

Contact is often made at the side of the ball with the bat at the appropriate angle for this. As contact is made the wrist accelerates forwards and downwards to impart both backspin and side spin. See Waldner for demonstration of this. It is effective if a player is too far from the table or used to change the pace of the rally.

Once players have a feel and control of spin they will be able to experiment this.

It is important to remember that attacking players should look to get in at every opportunity with spin and speed, and should continue to practice this. It is also possible to attack the opponents topspin if possible in order to put pressure on the opponents attacking game. However, if a player develops a game with limited ability to contain attacks this will be exploited as they progress up the levels. Therefore I feel that we should work with players to develop both attacking and containing skills to fully equip them for the challenges ahead.

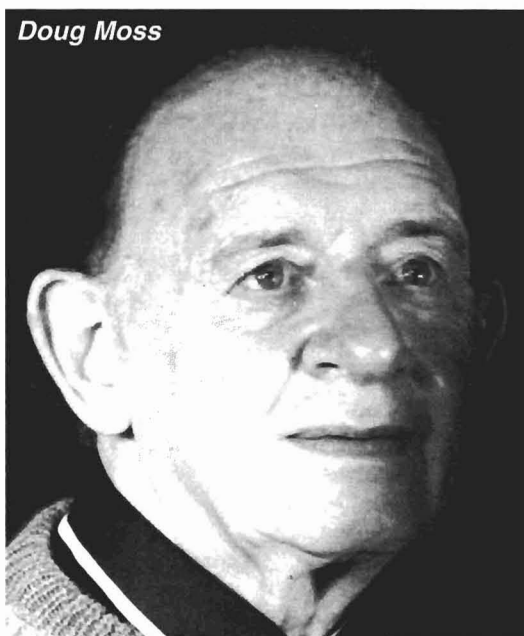
DOUG MOSS

For some 11 years the Press and Publicity Secretary for the County Championships, Doug Moss died in hospital on 7th October at the age of 75 years.

A devotee of the sport he took on his first Committee role some 60 years ago and in the succeeding years he became more and more actively engaged in the administration of the game within the City and County areas.

Doug was involved in the formation of the Worcestershire County Table Tennis Association in 1952 and shortly afterwards became its Chairman, an office he relinquished only 3 years ago. It was at about the same time he retired as National Councillor for Worcestershire.

His services to table tennis were first recognised at National level when in 1973 he was awarded the Leslie Forrest Memorial Trophy for his outstanding contribution to the sport in the County field. In 1983 he was elected a Vice-



President of the Association.

No mean player himself he became Worcester Singles Champion in 1941 and was recognised by other leading players as an accomplished doubles partner, as evidenced by the number of times his name appears as a winner on the Trophies.

After his retirement, in his capacity as Coaching Officer for the Worcester League, Doug actively encouraged schools to

participate in table tennis having earlier been instrumental in setting up a School of Sport in the City. He keenly undertook teaching beginners, particularly youngsters the basic skills of the game and continued to help with the development of those interested in progressing into the League.

His other interests included Lawn Tennis, which he also played, Cricket and Football.

Doug's funeral took place on

13th October and was attended by representatives of local, County and National table tennis bodies recognising the contribution he had made to our sport and the high esteem in which he was held by all those privileged to have worked with him.

He is survived by his wife, Diana his sons, Martin and Dominic and his daughter, Pamela to whom we extend our sincere condolences at this sad time.

PREAN SUPREME IN TORBAY

The players who had formed the team that won the Inter-Island Games travelled to Torbay for the "Clare Pengelly Memorial Tournament", now part of the ETTA Grand Prix series. I had not previously seen any of these events which are certainly different and break some new ground.

Carl Preat began playing in national tournaments at the age of 8, but had never played one in Devon. We both knew and liked the late Clare Pengelly and had wanted to be at one of the tournaments as soon as Carl's contractual commitments in Germany permitted.

I am a strong supporter of banded events, which give players a chance to progress and play against their equals. I like the group system which affords more than one game to those knocked out early. I had heard such tributes as "a huge success" and "oversubscribed" at a time our sport needs all the breaks it can get. The tournament itself was nicely organised, troublefree and unobtrusive. I thought the combination of the banded events with the main event a somewhat uneasy alliance and the main event dragged on far too long, some ten hours from early morning to 8 at night, whilst other events were played in between and, inevitably, players engaged in various events began to hold up the schedule.

The ground directions seemed designed for people who knew the way. Others got lost, making a long journey longer. The loudspeaker was loud and obtrusive. I think it might have been better to call a "general let". Fortunately these interruptions were rare.

Pre-event publicity had indicated large entries, but my impression was that relatively few players played a lot. I was reminded of the old joke about a hair restorer. "We can't grow any more hair, but we shrink your head and so make it look more." Here, too, it looked more than the actual numbers. Some veterans seemed never off the table. Off

hand, I cannot recall a time prior to the finals when I did not see either Brian Burns or Frank Hams on the table whenever I entered the arena.

As ETTA Events Manager Mike Johns (also winner of the Veterans) said, "It is important that the top players play, it helps us to achieve more publicity...". I don't think the Grand Prix Series, in any way, have met that objective. Publicity was near-zero, at any rate in national terms.

With none of the top ten on view, Carl was expected to win, but he hoped to win also in style, which others must judge. Those who remained to watch the Final were small in number, but perhaps the late finish was responsible for that. I must pay tribute to all of Carl's seven opponents who fought till the end and surrendered no point without a battle.

Of the rest of our team, Lorna Dutch and Mike Turner had excellent tournaments. Mike again improved his ranking with "unexpected" wins, which motivate the computer points and Lorna had a couple of mega wins against ladies in the top 20. As she herself is not in the top 100, she can be well pleased.

Roger Hookey had performed heroically last year, but this was not his tournament and the high ranking points remained elusive, as they did for Danny Burns, who could not hit his best form. Conversations with players indicated that they saw their priorities as ranking points collection exercises rather than winning the various bands. We had hoped that Lucy Pointer (13) would gain some older "scalps". Although she played quite well, the ranking points did not come in quite the hoped for quantities. Still, in team terms we did quite well, not least when Carl won the main event.

The Hampshire Junior Trials again ensured a strong Island presence in the Hants Junior Team. Lucy is, of course, a fixture by now and she won her two singles in the opening game. Deane Whittington went straight into the first team after winning the trials. He had chances in his opening match, but eventually lost two. Ruairie Farrelly won one on his debut for the second junior team.

Only Lucy made the trip to the Peniel Junior, probably the best junior event of the season. She showed she was close to the cadets above her, but did not in the end beat any of them. She won the cadet girls team event, although her only contribution was in the doubles with Louise Durrant who won the two singles required.

Carl Preat played in the European Masters in Germany, winning two and losing one in his group, after which he was eliminated on a count-back on points, not the best way to go out. He never got to play the "big boys" as he had hoped.

I am often asked whether the new lottery funding of over a million may lead to his return to England. That would be nice, but my doubts remain. I note a salary of £40,000 being advertised for a new coach. I doubt

whether Carl's English earnings have amounted to that in his entire English career which began at the age of 15 some fifteen years ago. One can see the exquisite irony of players earning so little, whilst the guys who give corner advice for 2 minutes (and little more) earn so much. It will explain why our ten best players and quite a few more now play abroad, why, in local terms, we so seldom see the player after whom the "Carl Preat Table Tennis Centre" is named. He has to earn a living and this reality in professional players' lives has completely escaped our leadership with the predictable results.
