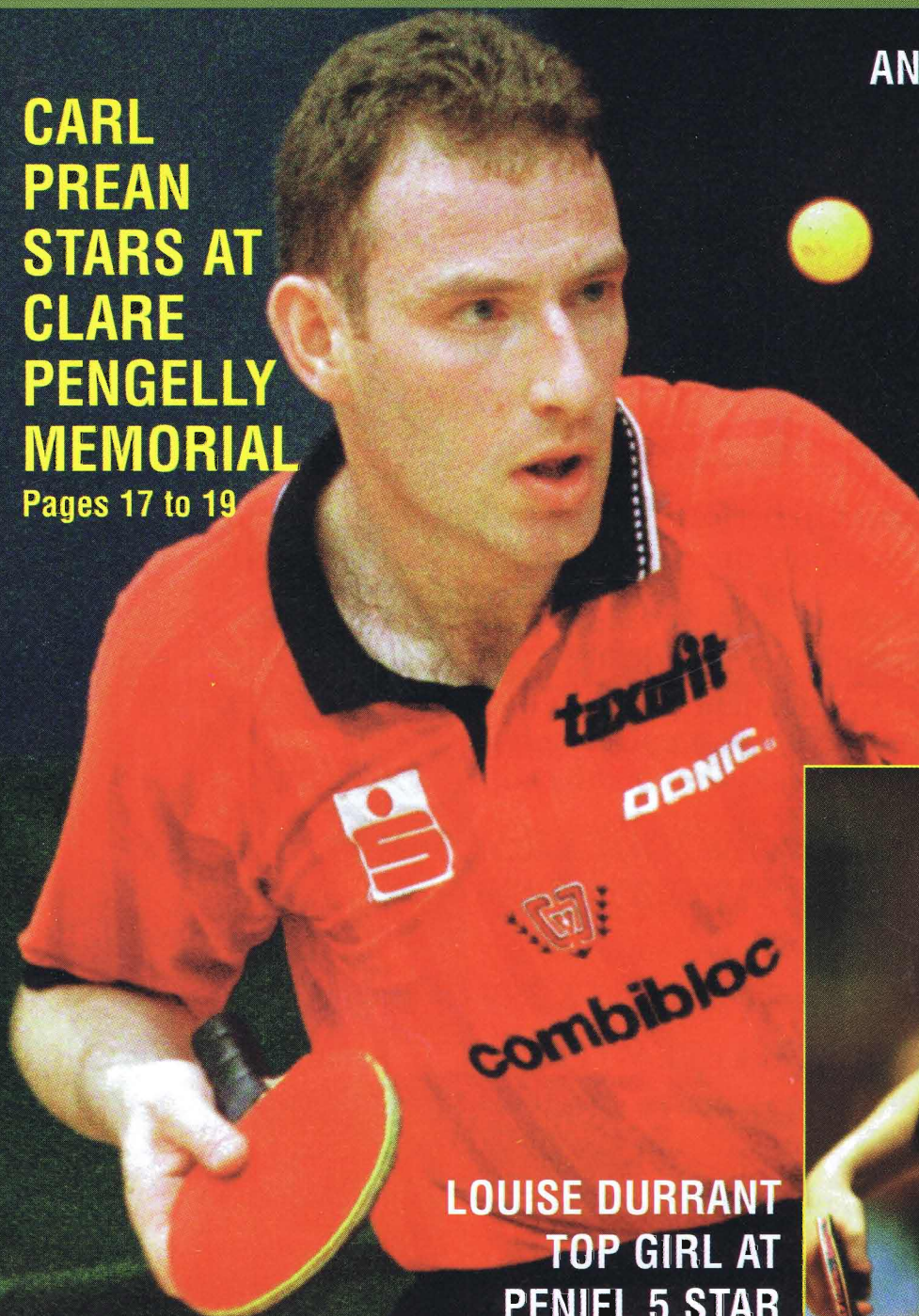

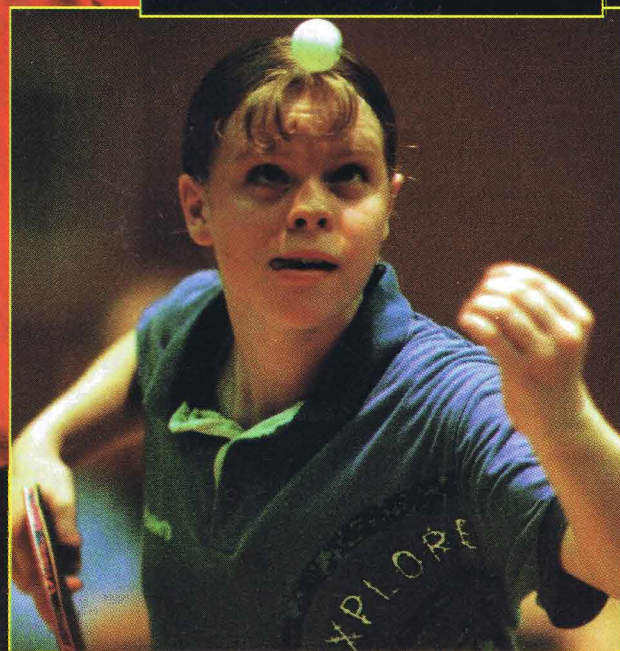
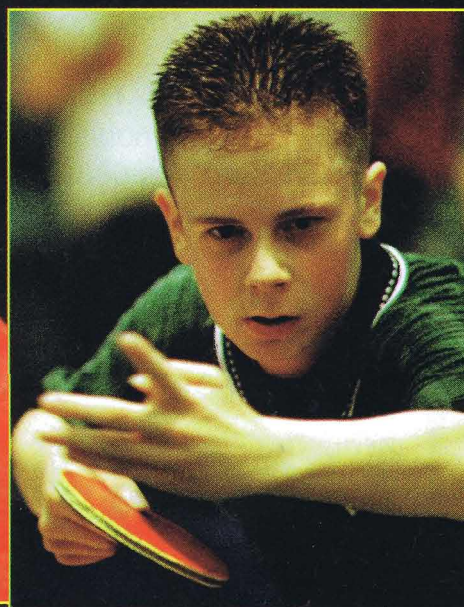

TOURNAMENTS BOOM

TABLE TENNIS in England is showing encouraging signs of increased popularity both in the number of tournaments which are being held and the number of entries attracted. The first four tournaments where data has been received in the ETTA office show a massive 25% increase in entries over last season. The growth is not restricted to any one age sector or any specific geographical part of the country. The renewed interest appears to be across the board.

At the senior level, the Grand Prix tournaments have been increased from six last year to nine scheduled for this season. The first of these, the Merseyside Open, which took place at end of August received an encouraging 255 entries. The second Grand Prix tournament the Clare Pengelly Memorial Open in Devon increased its entry from 130 in 1996 to 165 in 1997. Veterans tournaments are continuing to increase in popularity. The first VETTS Masters of the season the VETTS Midlands at Kettering at the beginning of October saw an increase in entries from 250 last year to 287 in 1997. Membership in the VETTS Society has also risen over the summer from 656 to 720, the main benefit of membership being priority entry, into the Masters tournaments. At junior level there is a similar picture. The Northwest Junior 2 Star which is to be played in Blackpool this month organised by Tony Meredith has received an increased entry from 75 last year to 120 this season.

Also the number of tournaments scheduled has increased, partially due to the expansion of the Grand Prix tournaments but more specifically because tournament organisers both experienced and new, are following the route that the Grove Club of Market Drayton established of organising different types of events. In Blackpool this year, for example there will be four tournaments where two years ago there was only one. In Gloucester, four tournaments organised by Ken Bridle against originally only the Cotswold Junior. In Selby Mick Wilcockson is planning to organise seven open tournaments this year. In the East Midlands Region there will be at least four extra tournaments initiated by the East Midlands Development Committee. Steve and Margaret Walsh and Mike and Lilian Payne are responsible for the organisation of these competitions which will take place in different venues throughout the Region. The recently opened Cippenham Club with its specialist facilities will be hosting junior, senior and Vets tournaments at their new purpose build centre in Slough. with Graham Trimming and Ken Phillips in charge. Grove under the management of David and Claire Morris (nee Marshall), will also be continuing to organise a number of championships.

The expansion of competitive activity is not restricted only to tournaments. In the last issue of Table Tennis News it was

reported that the County Championships had experienced another increase in entries going up from 214 teams to 220. There were three extra junior teams and five extra Vets teams. The Woolwich Junior British League is full to capacity with 54 clubs entered again this year. To meet the extra demand for competition there will be five National Junior Leagues sponsored by the Woolwich which will accommodate a further 50 clubs consisting of approximately 250 juniors. These will be played at five regional venues on four Saturdays during the coming months. The Vets British League is also full with 36 teams and this year there will be two feeder leagues with a total of 12 teams. Both the Men's and Women's British Leagues remain stable.

This trend is clearly a very healthy sign for the sport and there is no reason why this upsurge should not continue. As clubs throughout the country are developing new improved and better facilities more players are being attracted into the sport and further growth in the future for tournaments will come with the new centres staging more and different events. Congratulations to all who have been involved in this turnaround!

JOOLA EUROPEAN LEAGUE VICTORY

England enjoyed their first victory of the season in the First Division of the Joola European League when they defeated Denmark by 4 -1 at

St. Austell this month. Carl Prean was the most successful English player in the match winning both his singles and combining with Alex Perry to win the doubles. Matthew Syed scored a comfortable victory over Alan Bentsen. Denmark's only win was by Martin Monrad who beat Alex Perry. The match was supported by Restormel Borough Council and organised in conjunction with the Cornish Table Tennis Association. In September England had lost their opening fixture against the Czech Republic by 4 sets to 1.

England's women were without the services of Lisa Lomas through injury when they visited Zagreb and were beaten 4-1 by Croatia with Andrea Holt winning the only set for England. England's women are at home to Germany at the Cippenham Club in Slough on 20th October, whilst the men travel to Moscow on 25 October for a match against Russia which will probably decide the semi final positions.

£1.28 MILLION LOTTERY GRANT APPROVED

At its full Council Meeting on 6 October, the Sports Council finally approved the English Table Tennis Association's Lottery Application under the World Class Performance programme and £1.28 million has been confirmed for the first year and, subject to annual review, the programme has in principle support through to 2006.

NO OPEN FOR 1998

The English Open, provisionally arranged for Kettering at the beginning of January will not now go ahead. We learned that the German Association had arranged a round of Bundesliga matches for the same date which would mean that many of Europe's leading players would probably not participate due to their club commitments. Furthermore, provisional arrangements with the BBC for TV coverage were not confirmed. Without terrestrial TV coverage and the leading players, it would have been unlikely that the event could have been a success from either a playing or financial point of view. Therefore the decision has been taken to concentrate on the 1999 English Open which has been given provisional Grand Prix status by the ITTF and is likely to be staged in March of that year. The ITTF were not happy with the January date due to the close proximity of the Grand Prix finals.

NORTH WEST AWARD

Congratulations go to Karen Tonge, Martin Ireland and the whole Development team in the North West! Table tennis has won the Barclaycard Regional Governing Body Award. The presentation was made at the Reebok Stadium in Bolton on 3 October. The award was made for excellence and endeavour with volunteer management and development. The large volunteer effort from the North West into the World Championships in Manchester was given as part of the reason for the table tennis success. The North West Region have received the first prize of £1500 which is to be invested into volunteers attending the Sports Council Running Sport courses. The North West Development Committee now go forward to the National finals where the prize for the successful governing body organisation is £3,000. Well done North West.

JOOLA EUROPEAN MEN'S LEAGUE DIVISION ONE

ENGLAND'S 4-1 victory over Denmark at the Polkyth Leisure Centre, St. Austell was achieved mainly because the home side were able to field two players well into the higher regions of the world list - Carl Prean and Matthew Syed, whilst the Danes top cards were one rising star Martin Monrad and the vast experience of Allan Bentsen, writes John Woodford.

There was an interesting situation - Monrad and Prean. The young Dane who plays for Dusseldorf in the Bundesliga, by far the world's most powerful national league, has recently defeated the Isle of Wight professional in Germany.

This meant that the Danish captain Swede Peter Sartz wanted the playing order to read Prean v Monrad. Alan Cooke the England captain did not want that order of course, but when the order was revealed Prean was down to play Bentsen and Finn Tugwell.

How that happened is a bit of a mystery, but I believe that Sartz thought the England order would be different, but he lost the gamble.

With that bit of luck going England's way, there were something like six lucky points for England throughout the match, but having said that Prean, Matthew Syed and Alex Perry all played to their potential. Prean put on one of his most impressive performances - massive top-spin drives and breathtaking counter-attacks that left the 400 crowd applauding wildly.

Syed only appeared once - in the opening game winning, 11, 6, making Bentsen look like a novice as he did Karlsson in Frankfurt.

England went two ahead as Prean's attack crushed Tugwell, 11, 7. But then Denmark hit back - Monrad as expected proved too strong for Alex Perry. The man from Devon is still improving. Now settled in his third Swedish club Perry collected 29 points from the talented Monrad but lost, -13, -16.

The vital doubles match saw England take the first, 15, Denmark winning the second 15, and the third stood at 19-19. But happily the Danes cracked in the dying seconds to the huge relief of the who foresaw the possibility of Denmark drawing level at 2-2.

But, a 3-1 lead left England with the best cards. This just left Prean to finish the job, 10, 16, against Bentsen who produced some of the finest quality backhand kills of the evening.

So, now England have to visit Moscow on October 25 to win against Russia to reach the semi-finals stage. Much will depend whether the Russian selectors will pick Dimitri Mazunov, who wears spectacles on court but has huge commitments in Germany to support Maxim Shmyrov who is world-ranked No.79.

We were overwhelmed, not only by the magnitude of the gift, but the kindness which accompanied it. There are many people we should like to thank Peter Linnekar, Ruth Gibson, Gill Green and Nicky Jarvis, being just a few.

So, in March 1998, we shall be in Paris, thinking of the many friends we have been lucky enough to know, but also taking great pleasure in having been able to be part of a wonderful sport over all these years. We won't become couch potatoes though - we have

DISILLUSIONED

After some thought and discussion with participating players, coaches and parents, many of whom were equally as disillusioned, I must protest strongly about certain aspects of the Organisation of the Peniel 5 Star. Notably The Consolation Plate competition. My daughter, Nicky Broome rising rapidly in the junior rankings, finished 3rd in a very strong first round group of the main competition, was left to contest the Plate competition on the following day, where on a ranking basis, she was in with a very good chance of winning the prize money, which at least would have helped to defray some of the heavy costs of competing in tournaments.

Lindsey Thornton, No 1 ranked Junior with points of 2601 on the national ranking list, arriving 2 hours late on the Saturday was scratched from the Junior Girls event, (which surely must include the next stage of the Junior Girls event i.e. Main Event &/or The Plate) but was advised that she could play in the Plate Competition. On Sunday morning her name was still not on the list of competitors, even though they knew that she would be playing in the competition, so she queried with the organisers who confirmed that she was in the competition. The starting time for the Junior Girls Plate was straight into the 2nd round due to start at 1.30 pm, and in fact Lindsey's name did not appear on the list until 3.20 pm, after I had insisted that her name must be added to the list. I then withdrew my daughter, Nicolette, from the competition in protest, and went home. This situation seemed so unfair and irregular, that I felt I had no choice but to withdraw my daughter.

Last year, at the Canterbury Kent Tournament, with the same tournament referee, the

Bournemouth contingent checked in a few minutes late, after a five and a half hour journey in terrible driving conditions including thick fog and occasioned by a road accident, confirmed later by another player actually involved in the accident and arriving later from hospital, and these players were scratched from that event.

I really think that it is imperative if tournament organisers are really serious about encouraging players, particularly young players, to participate, rules should be the same, logical, consistently applied and fair. Where they are not, in the interest of table tennis, they should be investigated and sanctions imposed by the relevant controlling body of the ETTA to ensure that they are. A 'take it or leave it' attitude just isn't good enough.

Finally, I would like to add that as a very keen supporter of this sport I do try to promote it by sponsoring and helping where I can, so I only want the very best for my sport.

RELUCTANT SECRETARIES

The past four years has seen three chairmen of Sussex leagues threaten to close down local league play unless a secretary could be found.

In all three cases the AGM's were adjourned a week or a fortnight and secretaries were eventually found and league play rescued in the nick of time.

The most recent instance happened in my own local league at Eastbourne. Despite the fact that we have a separate fixtures-match secretary who works out all the fixtures and computerises all the results and table weekly, no-one would take the job which last season was being done by ETTA professional Doreen Nightingale (perhaps too efficiently) on her own word processor. Doreen also organised our local tournaments with professional skills.

This seemed to 'frighten' people who might have taken the post. However at the eleventh hour the

cavalry came in from neighbouring Hailsham - an athletics organiser and marathon runner Alan Streeter saw the dangers outlined in the local and regional press and took the job, after which teams were allocated to divisions with five extra teams to last season.

I believe that too many leagues expect people to work their butts off with little or no reward in the shape of honoraria. Thought needs to be given to provide reasonable honoraria especially in the light of new technology. Secretaries need at least a good typewriter, agility on the keyboard - not necessarily a word processor. Times are changing. After three near shutdowns in Sussex, it would be wise for all league to look carefully at their honoraria situation for secretaries.

VOLUNTEERS

I have two essential concerns about the development of table tennis: those who do s-all and those, much fewer in number, who do too much.

The main factor to holding back table tennis is a lack of effective volunteers who are prepared to put something back into the game. Even if we can achieve a higher national profile and better media coverage - which is increasingly difficult to obtain we cannot then cater for any significant influx of new recruits unless we have the activities and structures, dependent largely on volunteers, on the ground to accommodate them. Developments that spring up from the grass roots are much more likely to be sustainable because they are organised and owned by local volunteers. Yes, more money; a greater preparedness to pay our way; harmony, collaboration and a common purpose to make English table tennis succeed; technical skills and know-how; enlightenment to make our sport more attractive, relevant and accessible to a wider population in this modern age - these all matter, but ultimately and underlying them everything depends on people doing something/working for table tennis. 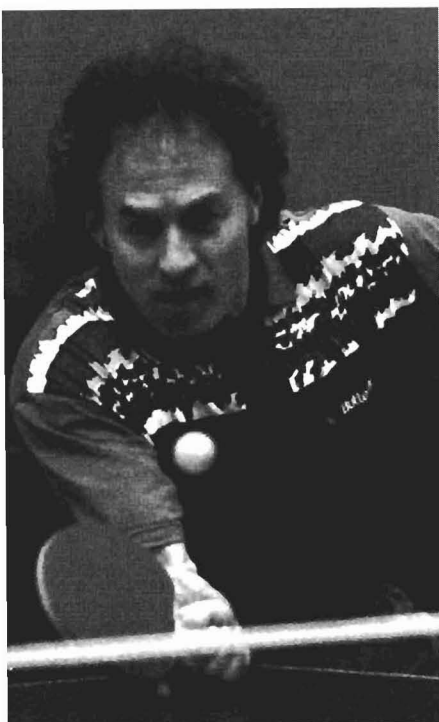

Baggaley was playing at his best and was first to finish the topspin rallies with awesome backhand and forehand power drives, going on to win 21-15, 21-15.

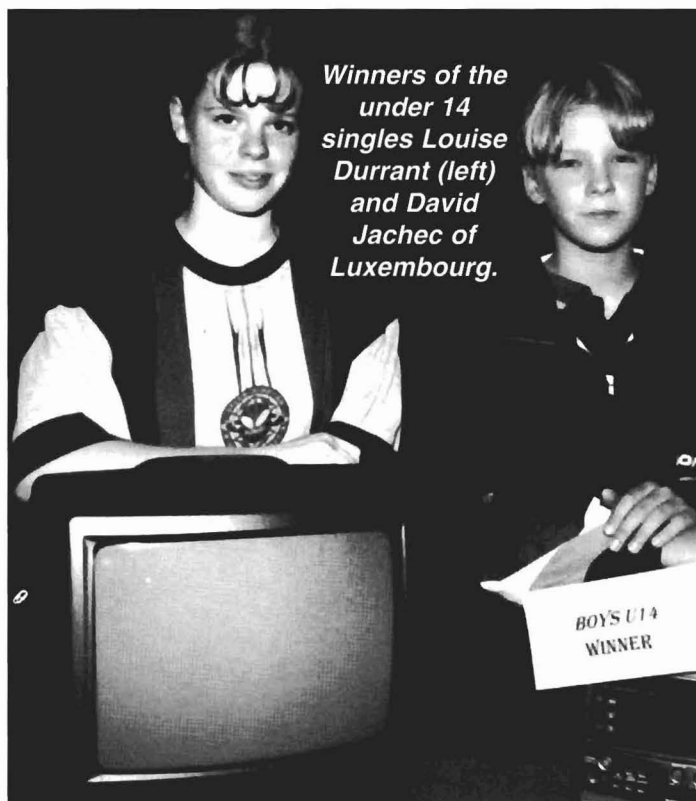

Winners of the under 14 singles Louise Durrant (left) and David Jachec of Luxembourg.

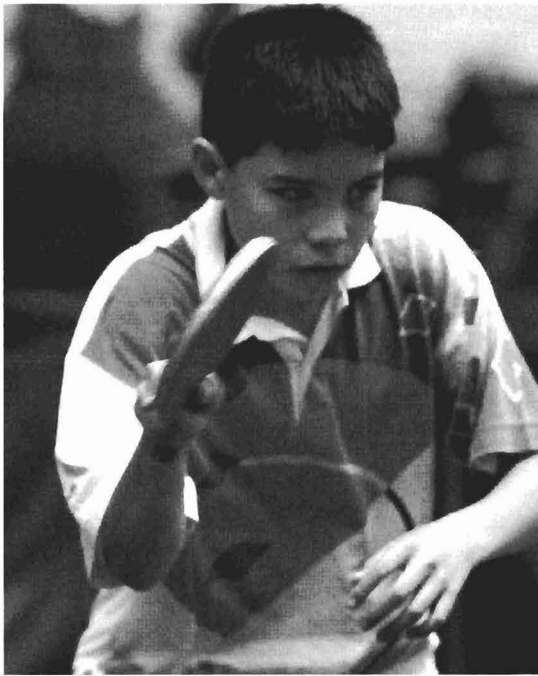
English counterparts, proved to be only a marginal problem for the Swiss top spinner.

ROSSKOPF'S THIRD MASTERS

**7th EUROPEAN MASTERS
CUP Bensheim, Frankfurt,

Jan Ove Waldner, the reigning world champion after losing 21-16, 21-15, 19-21, 21-11 to the German ace Jorg Roskopf in the semi-finals said, "At my age, 30, there is no way you can win them all. In Germany Roskopf is at his best. Most of his losses are away from home. He played well, I did not play badly. I am happy to have reached the semi-finals."

And so, it was the lean and lanky German champion ranked No.10 who won the massive Masters Cup for the third time after a 16, 15, 15, triumph over the pride of Croatia Zoran Primorac, a man who can never be ruled out and is good value for his world ranking of No.8.

Vladimir Samsonov is the Belarussian to whom all Europe are looking to as a future world champion, but he is only 21 and cannot be expected to have learnt all the lessons so soon.

After comfortably beating Andrzej Grubba 17, 12, 16, it seemed as though it would be a Roskopf-Samsonov final. But it was Primorac who intervened, bringing down Samsonov 10, 17, 18, in the second semi-final.

Roskopf took away the top prize - 40,000 Deutschmarks - from a kitty of 120,000 Dm with the strength of his left-handed attack, always so strong on the backhand side.

But, Roskopf is 28 and there are few signs of young Germans coming up of the highest standard under him. 'Speedy' Fetzner can still turn it on - he took Waldner to five games -

Peter Franz is once again injured and Ralph Prause is ranked 94 in the world. Prause defeated Carl Prean, but it was Matthew Syed who gained revenge for England when he stopped Prause in the second stage.

Prean, appearing as determined as ever on court was so unlucky to lose his qualification on a recount by a single point to Florea of Romania.

Prean dumped the Chinese-Spaniard He Zhiwen, 18, 12, and Florea -13, 17, 11, - two excellent wins - Florea is No. 27 - but Carl lost 18, 15, to Prause, one of the disappointments of the first day.

Syed overall had a successful tournament, finishing second in his group which was won by Christophe Legout of France.

The Berkshire defender thrashed the former world No.4 Peter Karlsson, 11, 9. Karlsson was made to look like a novice - unusual for a player who has at times done so well for Sweden,

but who has now slipped to No.18 on the worldlist.

Timo Boll, the European junior champion whose face appears on the cover of the new DTTB handbook was also a Syed back-spin victim. The young German showed some excellent strokeplay, but when it came to some of Matt's best returns - not too high and laden with backspin - he did not know whether to hit it, float it or push it! After gaining revenge for England over Prause, Matthew then seemed a good bet to reach the third stage by overcoming the Polish No.2 Lucjan Blaszczyk. Where did the Pole learn to play against world-class backspin? The answer is in Germany at the Grenzau club practicing for many hours with Jie Schopp!

Blaszczyk is without doubt, a vastly improved player, arguably now stronger than Grubba. He hit through the Syed defences as if Matthew was just an ordinary chopper. It is now clear that Matthew

Syed is amongst the best three defenders in the world.

So, the two England men with five wins between them kept the England flag flying high. Captain Alan Cooke said "We had a good tournament, the opposition was as expected, of the highest calibre. I could not have asked for greater effort."

NEAR PERFECTION

The organisation was as near perfect as is possible to be. The transport and the hotel seemed faultless. On the second and final days the crowds numbered in excess of 2,000, a fairly quiet crowd, none of the bass drums and trumpets seen elsewhere in Germany and other countries last season.

SERIOUS CHALLENGE BY HORSHAM

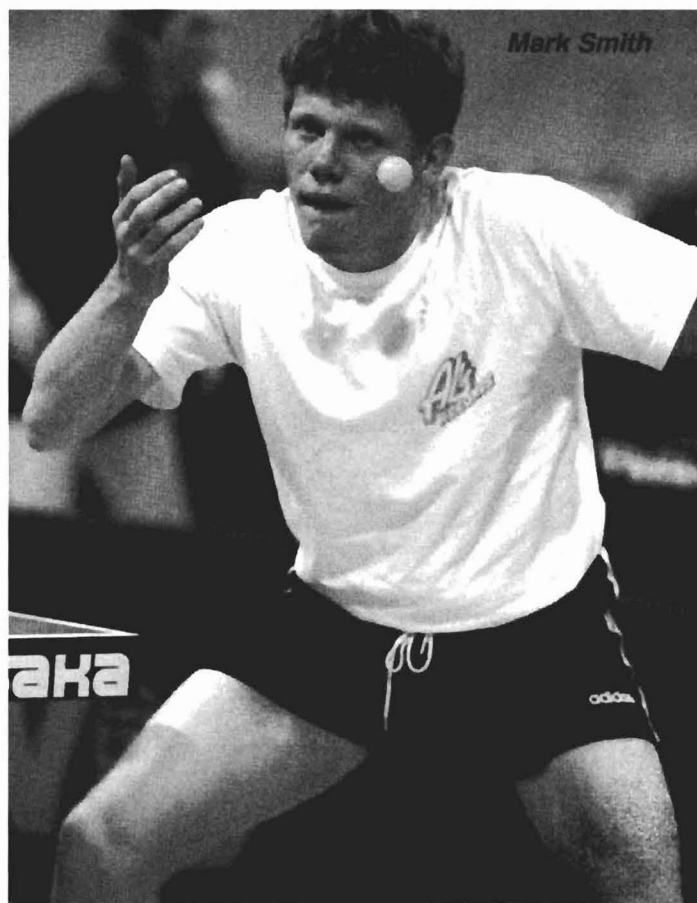

Newcomers Aylesbury have

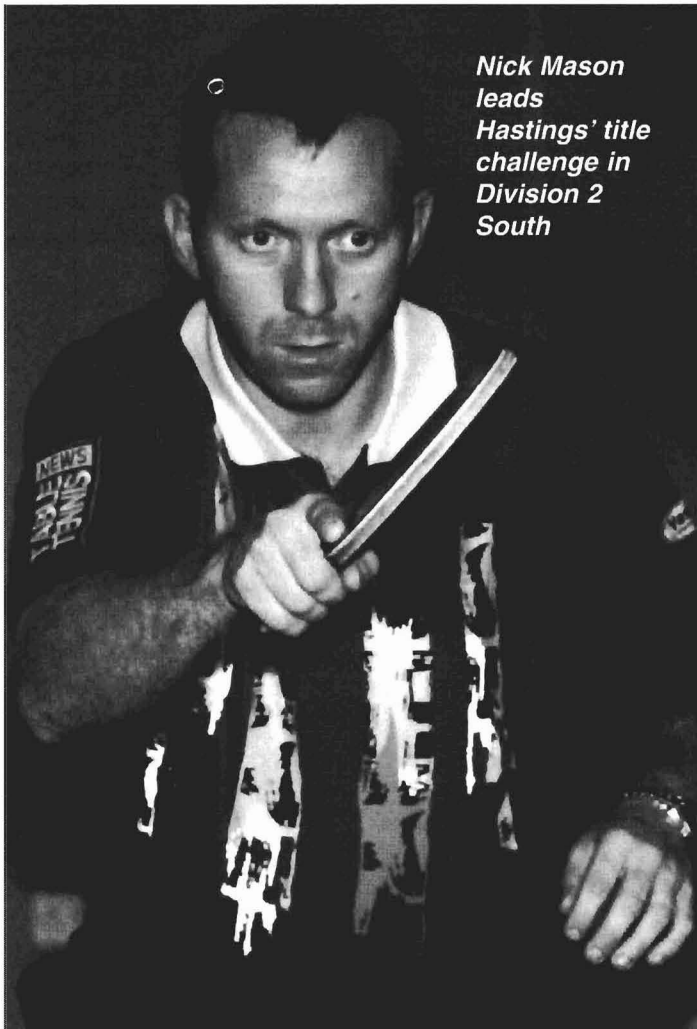

battle royal with Gemma Schwartz, in a final that was fantastically exciting, with both girls giving their all for the right to wear the women's crown.

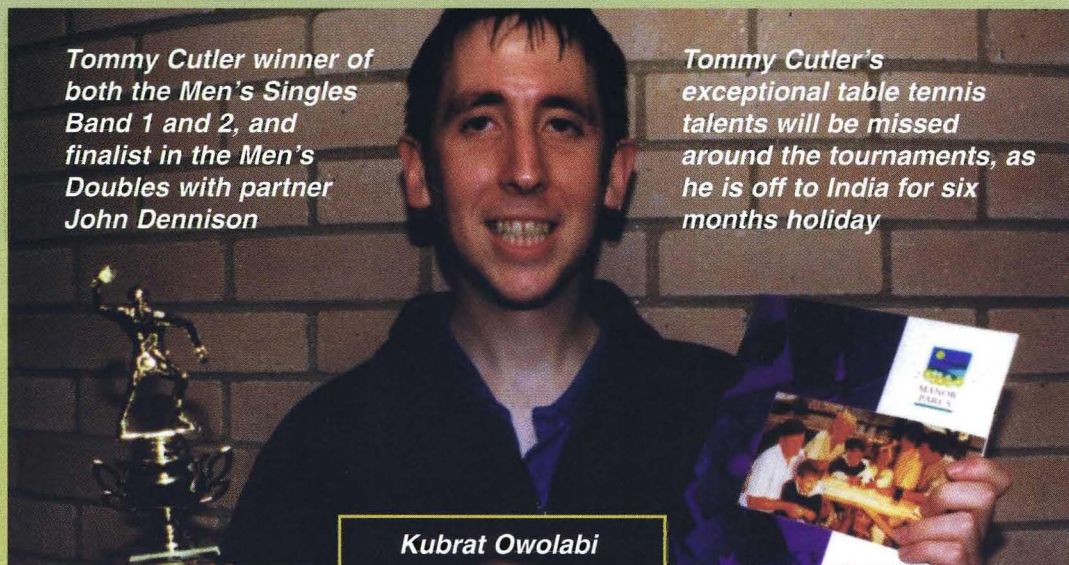

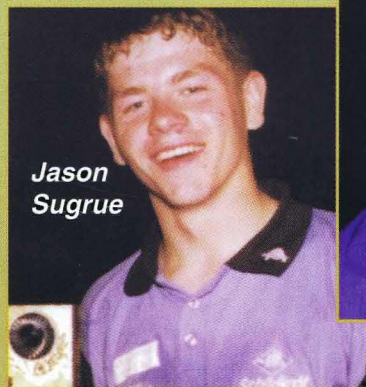

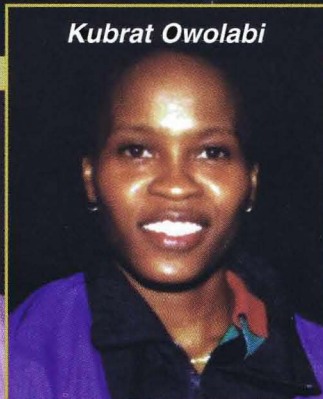


Tommy Cutler winner of both the Men's Singles Band 1 and 2, and finalist in the Men's Doubles with partner John Dennison

A tiring Johns called on his vast international experience and got his forehand looping and super spin serves into gear, as he went on to win the next two, 16 and 16.

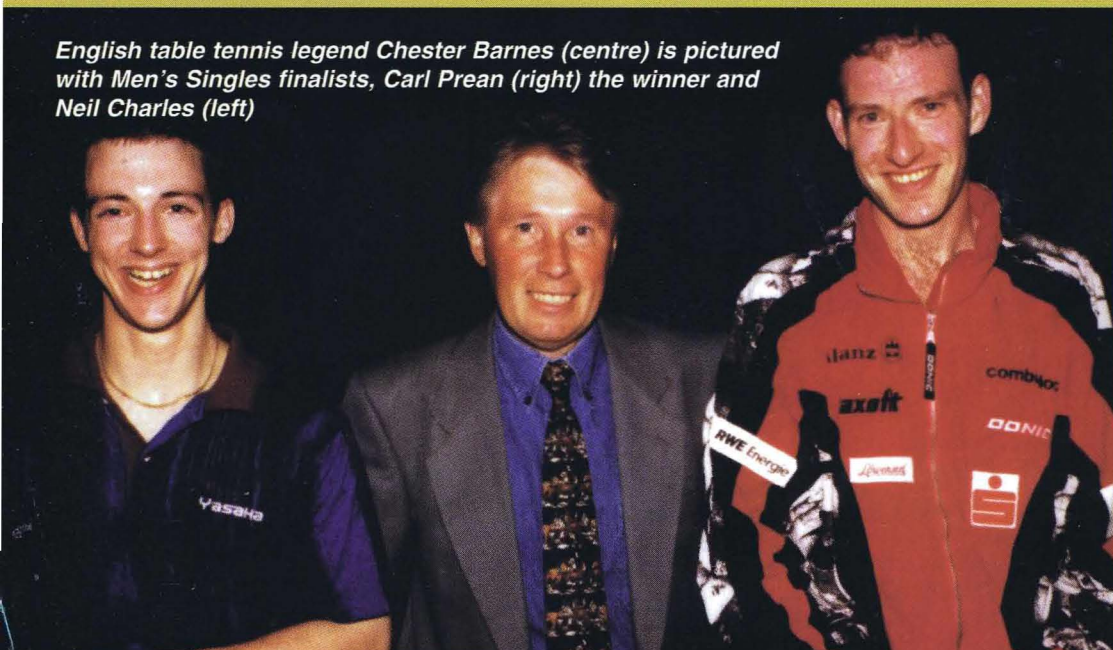
Mike then had the pleasure of playing with his son Dominic in the Men's Doubles.

Local girl Penny Perry won the Women's Veteran's Singles crown when she defeated Somerset's Shirley Dark, 10 and 11 in the final.

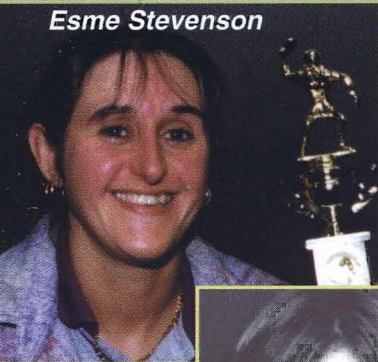

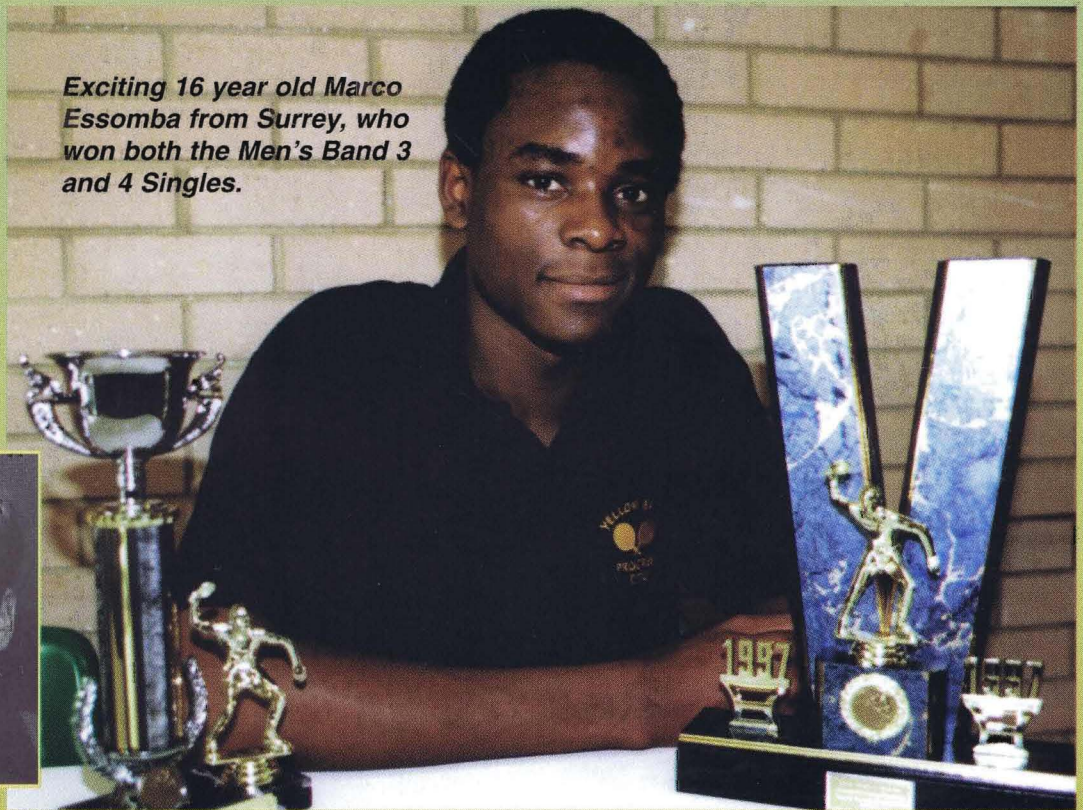
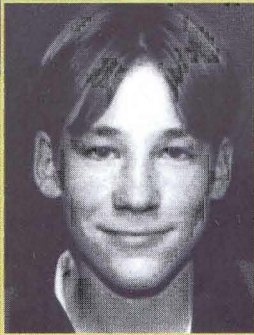

His national and international profile could hardly be higher, but in the region he has also been a player, coach and administrator (league secretary at 15!) at every level; club (the famous Ormesby), league, county and region. Has anyone in table tennis ever done more? And of course as ETTA Chairman he is currently ably steering us through very dangerous waters, where, if our members and structures don't quickly adapt to modern times, there is a serious chance that we could sink, but the opportunities are also great indeed.

Table tennis depends so much on quality volunteers! One stalwart who has just retired as Sunderland League Chairman after 26 years and as executive committee member after 40 years (although he still a vice-president) is Ken Taylor. As a player, Ken represented both Sunderland and Durham County, but he also has served the county (for which he is still president) as chairman (for 11 years), national councillor, team organiser, tournament organiser and in too many other capacities to detail. It goes without saying that Ken is also an umpire and a coach, and a club official of nearly 50 years standing, and has been a manager of a (Sunderland) British League side. When major international matches came to town, Ken was the man to organise them. For 3 years he was employed as Table Tennis Motivator for Tyne and Wear. A hard act to follow! Mike Nilson is his successor as Chairman of the Sunderland League.

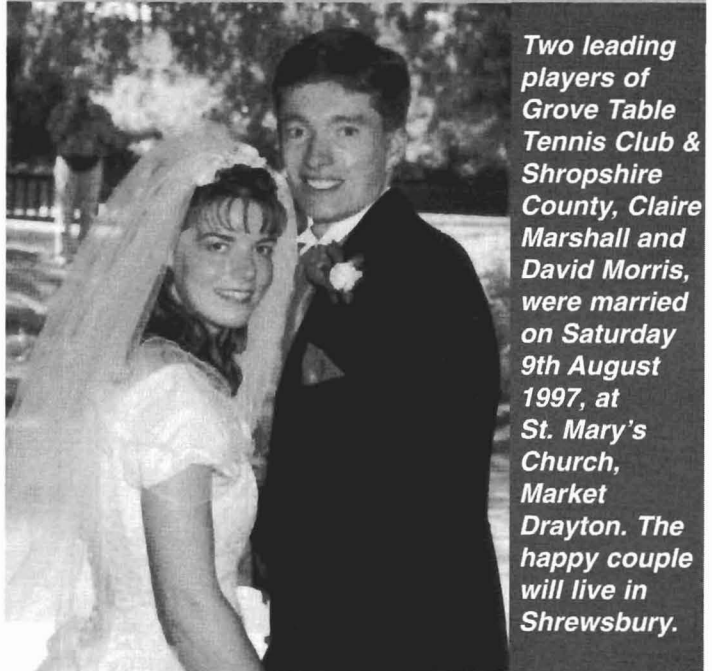
There are other officer

Dave Schofield is now Chairman of Northumberland and the Northumbria League but his predecessor, another wise elder-statesman of table tennis, Alan Morpeth, continues to give service as county secretary.

Darlington British League Club hosted 1st round tie Nancy Evans European Cup matches against STK Rabotnicki (Macedonia) and Cordoba (Spain) at the Dolphin Centre on 29-30 August. Such was the writer's pronunciations as MC that our visitors did not recognise their names when being called out to meet the dignitaries (Alan Ransome, Ken Taylor and the mayor) - I am no competition for Colin Wilson! Kate Vickers (Newton Aycliffe) was twice a losing girls' singles finalist at the same tournament.

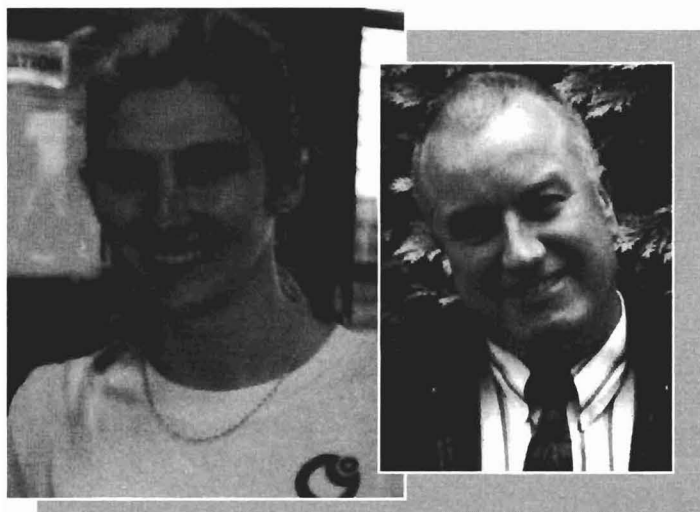

“Another season, another win, another loss, another game to umpire, whichever it is, good luck to you. Much has been written and said about Manchester, 1997, but little has been said about the outcome of meetings held by the ITTF Rules Committee in Manchester. This committee hold meetings at each World Championships at which associations put forward proposed changes to the rules, which if agreed, become effective for the following two years. This year many proposals were put forward, but few were agreed, writes George Tyler.

Those agreed were:

- The ball must be either white or orange.
- Testing of rackets for harmful solvents will be mandatory in all major competitions
- ITTF authorisation of clothing will be discontinued. (Present approvals to continue until 1/1/99).
- If anyone in the playing area is bleeding, play must be suspended until all traces of

blood have been removed.

(Play may be suspended for 10 minutes plus clearing up time).

- The playing space must be at least 5m high.
- A doubles pair consisting of players from different Associations may have 2 advisers.
- In a team match, a warning or penalty point for bad behaviour will apply for the remainder of the team match. (Activities on the bench and playing are to be treated separately).
- The warning for a first un-notified change of racket will be given by the umpire and reported later to the referee.
- Eligibility will be based on

nationality, as for the IOC. (3 years residence or by mutual agreement of Associations involved).

Nothing very earth shattering, nothing too radical to change the face of table tennis, which implies that it does not need changing - or does it?

Among the proposals were many regarding the service laws, such as:

- The ball must not be struck until it has fallen 16cm from the highest point of its trajectory.
- In Singles, the service must be done crosswise, at the choice of the server.
- The ball be should struck between the front of the

server's body and his end line.

- The service action must be visible to both umpire and assistant umpire.

All of these propositions have been deferred for study by a Working Group. Some of these may well have had an impact on the game, now, however they are unlikely to be put to the Rules Committee until the next World Championships.

There are many umpires, and dare I say it, players, who would like to see some changes made to the present service laws, and some of the above may well be worth considering. If so, surely sooner than later.

SAME OLD SCENE.

The ETTA's plan for a tiered membership scheme will undoubtedly invoke much discussion but one thing is certain and that is without the implementation of such a scheme it is impossible to calculate accurately how many people play the game. Elmtree's side includes Rik James, Terry Dowsett, Andy Wadling and Steve Edmonds whilst Colin Marco captains a strong Danbury side with Ian Attridge, Mike Hayes, Terry Guymer, Dave Wright, Neil Brierley, Mark Stones and Mike Blake at his disposal. 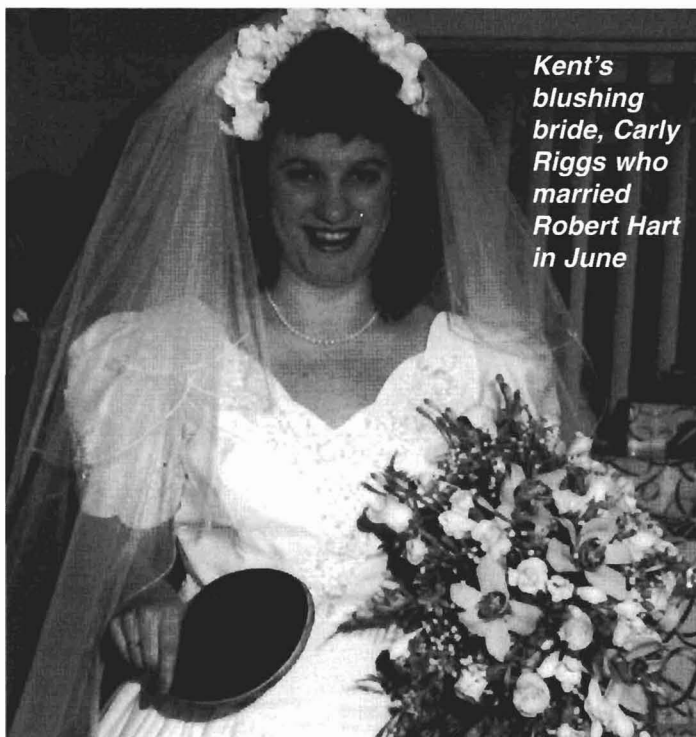
Isle of Wight

Eagerly though we look forward to the new season, it looks like another decline in membership, this time from 51 teams to 48 which will finally kill off our 5th division which stumbled along with six teams only for the last couple of seasons.

Throughout the summer our Carl Prean Centre was open and quite a few players and parents from the "mainland" who were holidaying here came to see us and to play. Sadly, our experience seems general and widespread. The anticipated boost from the World Championships did not materialize at all. No new members or new interest can be reported. Neither can we confirm what one reads elsewhere, that there is rising interest and that it is only league play which seems on the decline. We found that the "social" players, those who do not play in the league, were also fewer. We do, of course, lose the equivalent of a couple of teams every year, as keen young players leave the Island to go to college on the mainland and are often not seen again, though they usually continue in other leagues.

The Ryde Club has flourished in the Carl Prean Centre and is now the largest on the Island and the Newport Vics Club is also doing well, being soundly based with adequate, if not great premises and a bar. It has the considerable advantage of leadership of Gordon Burns, who will also take my place as Chairman of the Island Association. I think he will do a great job.

John Dodds will take over as Deputy Chairman and Philip Rorke as League Secretary which involves the running of the leagues and writing the press reports of the league matches, invariably under time pressure. Mike Platt continues as Treasurer, as will Erica Prean as General Secretary of County and League. I remain involved with the management of the Centre and some press work, including these notes. I have always felt that three to four years in the top post are enough. After that, it is time for new ideas and management. I followed this view when I was Chairman of the ETTA, stepping down as I said I would when assuming office within the three to four year period I regard as optimal. Voluntary work requires the momentum of change and volunteers require the momentum of rest. There is no reason why volunteers should not return after their breaks and resume old or new duties after their break. I have not found organisations have run well if their leadership has remained in office too long. There is often a certain staleness which impedes progress and even leads to disillusionment and bitterness. There are, of course, routine tasks which the

office holder can do for many years, but in the posts which require leadership and innovation to hang on too long does not serve the sport or it's members well.

By the time you read this a large contingent of Island players will have attended the Clare Pengelly 3 Star in Devon, perhaps even Carl Prean. An aspect which is disturbing is the high cost of entering such tournaments. John Pointer tells me that Lucy's entry fees amount to £32 and that is after giving the main event a miss, understandably under the circumstances. After that come the cost of hotels, the long trip and crossing the Solent (£40 a time). The conclusions are obvious. To achieve growth as well as excellence we need a broader base and costs like that will not achieve either objective. Half the competitors, in the nature of things, will depart after the first round or group and not all will feel they have had good value or may not feel the need to come again. In the case of children or juniors, they need to be accompanied by parents, which will double the costs, sometimes more, if tournaments become a real family occasion.

One often reads of our disappointing performances in the "European Youth" which indicate how we have fallen behind in European terms. I wonder whether our tournament structure and costs are not ending early what might have become promising careers. Juniors need a year or two of relative failure before success may be expected. Are we losing some potential winners by making our tournaments too unattractive as well as expensive?

If Juniors go to fewer tournaments on account of expense, they will get fewer ranking points and may feel failures and try something else and drift out of the game. Be that as it may, in recent years

we seem to have produced few European "winners".

These reflections at the start of the season may be seen as "criticism" and so lead to stern "self defence" and little else. Instead I hope it will encourage a degree of soul searching and a search for ways of doing things better.

Sussex by John Woodford

MAIN TARGET

Much time here is being spent on development. A 14-point plan has been produced, principally to try and guide the local leagues down the roads expected of them as of course, grass roots is the main target area and that is the local scene where things are rarely as they should be - three Sussex leagues in recent years have had to threaten closure because they could not find a secretary - happily the threats worked but the fact that so many are happy to play but not help the administration is worrying.

The latest problem in Sussex is the drop in entries for the oldest tournament in the country - the 3 star Stamco Sussex Open at Hastings. This event has been regarded as one of the most popular tournaments in the country since God was a boy.

But, this year's entry showed a shortfall of nearly 50 players. There is

no doubt whatever, that the reason is the emergence and take-over of most of the opens by the Grand Prix circuit. Mike Johns is due for congratulations and a salary boost for his efforts in bringing the total from five to nine in this second season.

But, "If you cannot beat 'em, join 'em" is a cliché which is too often used, but applies in this instance. The Hastings TTA obviously decided that they would not like to lose their identity worked hard for so many years on the Sussex Open. But I believe, their identity and the local and so valuable sponsors could be retained with the tournament still

"surrendering" to the GP circuit.

I am sure that the GP circuit players will agree that Money is the problem - players cannot afford to enter as many tournaments as they would like, so they have to pick and choose - mainly on the basis of those nearer home.

On the Grand Prix circuit three nights accommodation can be necessary, unless players are prepared to leave home at 4 a.m. on a Saturday morning and they may even have to stay on the Sunday night if there is a late finish. A 10 pm finish on the Saturday is not such a problem, but it is essential that the ending on the Sunday is around 8 p.m. or earlier.

However, back to the domestic scene in Sussex - Horsham's premier team are delighted to have Nigel Eckersley on board for their crack at the title. Darlington however, having signed Jon Taylor to partner Michael O'Driscoll become favourites although the holders Launceston have other ideas. Hastings are the new team in the British League - they comprise largely of ETTA staff plus Nicky Mason - just about a premier division team, but starting in Division 2 - they should leapfrog over Division 1 for next season.

Both Sussex top teams in the county championships will struggle to retain their premier division status - the juniors have Jonathan Atkinson (Worthing) and Heidi Sims (Haywards Heath) as the top ranked players. Footnote: Some Sussex players tell me they just cannot afford to play in the GP tournaments a long way from their homes. Another Cash Factor is that veterans events are still increasing and

the numbers entering are also going up.

Conclusion: The only way the Sussex Open is likely to return to its 200 players from the present 130 is to join the Grand Prix Bandwagon!

BRIAN KENNEDY

A SORROWFUL PARTING

It is an irrefutable fact that no person is immortal, but even so it is depressingly sad when an obituary needs to be written for one who dies when in the full flow of life. This sadness struck at the hearts and minds of Brian Kennedy's family and close friends when news of his sudden death filtered through from Holland. After racing his yacht across the North Sea, Brian was having a celebratory drink with members of his crew in a local bar, when he collapsed and died of a massive heart attack. The celebration was for their joyful arrival which unexpectedly and tragically became a sorrowful parting.

To most of today's aspiring table tennis enthusiasts the name of Brian Kennedy will mean little as he was of a previous generation. He was however, an International player of note whose left-handed skills demolished the also rans and troubled great champions. All who played against him, competitively, felt the impact of a special talent.

ROAD TO SUCCESS

Brian was born and raised in the Leeds area of Yorkshire and his character, personality and the distinctive quality of his voice, immediately singled him out as a native of that illustrious County. It was at the early age of 14 that he first became acquainted with table tennis when visiting Leeds YMCA and it soon became apparent that he had a natural flair for the game. Within two years he was chosen to represent England in the first-ever Junior International match played in this Country. His team mates on that occasion were Ron

Thompson, also from Yorkshire, and Michael Thornhill, a youthful prodigy from Middlesex. The match was played at the Wimbledon YMCA on the 2nd February, 1948 and they trounced a visiting Swedish team by 7-2.

While still a Junior, Brian gained a Senior International badge when he was chosen to play against Ireland in Manchester, and later when only 19 years of age he became a fully fledged Swaythling Cup player. Unquestionably, his greatest achievement came in 1953 when he was a proud member of England's Swaythling Cup team that won the coveted trophy for the first and only time. It was in this same year that he received an invitation that highlighted the appreciation foreign competitors had of his T.T. ability, when he was asked by the Indian Table Tennis Association to spend four months coaching their leading players. He gladly accepted the invitation.

A NEW LIFESTYLE

It was while coaching at Butlins Filey Camp during the summer months that Brian became enamoured with the pretty, young Catering supervisor there, named Molly, a relationship that eventually led to marriage. In 1959, Brian opened a small snack bar in Leeds which introduced him to the catering business that was to play such a rewarding part of his life. I have always found that Brian was a realist and he was endowed with the basic ingredients of commitment, determination and hard work, that are so essential for success. As his business expanded he stated that he could no longer commit himself to the hours of practice needed to maintain an International level of play. At the end of 1959 he

announced his retirement from competitive matches.

To fill the limited spare time he had, he tried his hand at golf and I understand became quite proficient, but then he got the call of the sea. Brian and Molly then moved to the North Riding coastal town of Scarborough and purchased a racing yacht. Such was the enthusiasm and calibre of Brian for his new sport that he became a key member of the Scarborough Yachting Club and for a designated period held the august title of COMMODORE. I know little of any other prominent contributions he may have made, but I feel sure there were many: he was that kind of a person.

Brian was cremated on 24th July, in Scarborough and the funeral service was well attended by representatives from all walks of life. A fitting address was given by his close friend, Michael Thornhill. A potent reminder of his popularity and acclaim was fully demonstrated when the Scarborough Life Boat Crew took his ashes out to sea and scattered them on the waves. He has left behind a legacy of both admiration and sadness - the latter for a life that was axed in its prime.

Finally let us spare a thought for his widow, Molly and their three children to whom we offer our heartfelt condolences.

Many table tennis friends, representing both the local leagues and the County Association, with myself an ETTA Vice President formally representing our National Association, attended a service on 6th. August at St. Johns

Church, High Wycombe, in remembrance of Alan Catchpole a Life Member of the High Wycombe & District League. Until the last AGM in June Alan was Chairman of the Buckinghamshire County Association, a position which he held with distinction for a decade.

After a successful Civil Service career which included approximately 10 years service abroad, in two different sub-continent, Alan then commenced an equally busy and successful life in our local community being an arduous worker, not just for table tennis and cricket (as Farnham Royal CC will confirm) but especially for the local branch of the Royal British Legion. As their organiser, for the last six years, of the local Poppy Day Appeal he was largely responsible for a new record every year and a combined six year total in excess of £175,000.00.

On the table tennis front both locally and in the County his cheerfulness, integrity, enthusiasm, reliability and leadership will be badly missed and very hard to replace. He played regularly for the successful DEN Club in our Premier Division and, even in his sixties regularly achieved an average which more or less equated with his age.

Our condolences go to his wife Anne, daughters Jo and Jane (who now lives in Australia) and son Ian, himself a regular Premier Division player for Telecom. Games between father and son were always especially competitive, with no "quarter" given or expected.

In both his playing and administration Alan will be remembered as a true sporting "gentleman" who never gave less than 100% and led by example.

CHRISTOPHER SEWELL

18th January 1959 to 31st July 1997

The sad news of Chris Sewell's death, result of a car accident in Germany on Thursday 31st July brought shock and sorrow to his family, friends, and colleagues alike.

Chris was a talented player with a burning ambition to succeed at the sport he loved and succeed he did. First as a junior reaching the English Junior Championships final, subsequently chosen for his first International v Holland and later awarded his senior cap when selected to represent England in Hong Kong at the Five Nations Tournament.

Many successes followed during Christopher's sporting career both in England and Germany when competing in the Bundesliga. Chris owed much of his success to Ray his father who spent countless hours as his coach and companion, and to Margaret his mother, quietly proud and ever supportive.

Bristol, Christopher's home town may never see his like again for a very long time, but the classic style, devastating forehand and attention to fitness are fitting memorials to any young players who seek to succeed in the sport of table tennis.

For the many colleagues, friends and family who attended his memorial service at the church in which his marriage was blessed, it was a time for reflection on Christopher's life, and prayers for his widow Petra and son of but ten months Kieran.

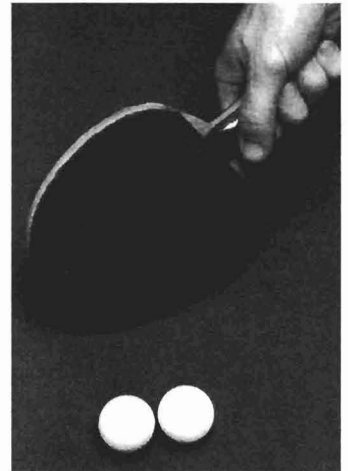
USING THE 'HAMMER' GRIP

THIS story will be of more interest to local league players than to players attending Centres of Excellence, writes John Woodford.

Most from international standard down to the thousands in local leagues use the Western or 'shake-hands' grip to hold their bat.

In Asia, where we are told that the national coaching system is about one hundred times more powerful than here in England, many still favour the 'penholder' grip, but many more Asians are now favouring the Western grip. There are a few players, even at high level, who use slight variations. No doubt, there are more players at local level who get away with the unorthodox 'hammer-grip' illustrated here in the right-hand photograph.

I came across one such player recently - Ken McEwan, who happens to be my local sports editor for the Eastbourne Gazette & Herald. Playing in division four of the Eastbourne

league he met defeat only twice last season using the hammer-grip. At the Eastbourne Championships he landed the biggest shock of the day when he defeated an Eastbourne Division 1 player and Sussex veteran Clive Beaumont, a very experienced contender indeed.

This proves that even holding the bat like a hammer, limited success is possible, albeit in division four of a local league.

Coaches (who may care to comment) will I assume, advise their pupils to use the Western grip because it is more flexible whilst the penholder has some obvious disadvantages on his or her left side, although it does appear that Asian players' have been coached skillfully and as a result definitely in some cases, generate devastating extra power.
