






DRIFT TO ASIA ACCELERATES ALAN RANSOME REPORTS ON THE DRIFT OF EUROPEAN PLAYERS TO ASIA

FOR the last decade or so the majority of Asia's leading players have competed for several of Europe's leading clubs. In the last two years the trend has been reversed and not only have the majority of Asian players stayed at home, but now most of the big European names are spending much of their year playing in effectively domestic competitions in Asia.

The main reason is that a Japanese multi-millionaire Kimono manufacturer, Mr. Yukaua, has been running the Kensheoen Super Circuit which involves a complex individual competition that takes place over 100 days each year. Each day of the competition is televised and broadcast over Mr. Yukuau's 24 hour television channel which broadcasts only table tennis. The attraction for the players is a mixture of very lucrative guarantees combined with high prize money.

The leading player this year is the French superstar, Jean-Philippe Gatien whose earnings are likely to approach \$1million. Even lower ranked European international players can receive guarantees in excess of £100,000. For the coming season the list of European players is extensive including Gatien, Samsonov, Persson, Rosskopf, Fetzner, J.M. Saive, Kreanga, Korbel and our own Matthew Syed who has been part of the circuit from its launch two seasons ago. In addition, most of the best Japanese players, including Matsuchita and other leading Asians, Chiang Peng-Lung of Taiwan and Yan San of China have signed up.

As well as the circuit in Japan, the Chinese Table Tennis Association have introduced their own National League and taking into account the enormous popularity of table tennis in China, it means that this competition will receive enormous publicity. In addition to the majority of the leading Chinese players competing, it is understood that Chinese clubs are now also trying to attract some of Europe's top players of which Sweden's former World Champion, Jan-Ove Waldner is a potential



attraction.

The ITTF are generally supportive of initiatives which increase the popularity and financial support for table tennis around the world and have reached an agreement with the Asians that the dates of the Super Circuit in particular will avoid the dates of the major ITTF events such as the World championships and the majority of the ITTF Pro Tour Open championships. This does mean, however, that the opportunities to see European players on home soil will be limited and clubs such as those competing in the European Champions League, the Bundesliga and French League will lose some of their best players, or only have them available for occasional matches. This will also affect competitions like the European League where national teams will have even more difficulty in fielding their best players.

There has been some comment in Table Tennis News and elsewhere of late with regard to more English players taking

advantage of offers from European clubs to participate in Continental National leagues. Much of the flow is dictated by the strength of the clubs in Europe. Despite this current Asian situation, the clubs in Europe are much bigger and much stronger than the table tennis clubs in Britain where the local leagues have been largely built on small local clubs, the majority of which only have access to their playing facilities for a limited number of hours each week. Over the last few years the English Table Tennis Association has been strongly encouraging the formation of larger clubs, in particular with the Premier Club programme where currently some 300 clubs are now registered within the programme. Many of those, however, are small community clubs or school clubs. but some are developing into bigger clubs with their own facilities open for most evenings during the week and the weekends and are following the

Continental model. One disadvantage that we currently have in this country in this regard compared to the Continent is the opportunity for our clubs to play important league home national matches as it is these matches that can attract local publicity and sponsorship. On the Continent clubs receive substantial local financial support from both the community and from local sponsorship. Two years ago the British League clubs voted to change the home and away system to four weekends at central venues, except for the Premier division. This is very enjovable from the players' perspective and follows the excellent model established by the Women's British League some 15 years ago. This limits the benefits to our clubs and reduces their opportunity of promoting the sport within their own community and taking advantage of 28 rounds of publicity, half of which are being reported from a local base rather than eight at the moment all reported from a venue often more than 100 miles from home.

You could not imagine even lower division football clubs surviving without home fixtures but this does not just apply to the big sports. Clubs in sports such as basketball would be much the poorer without their home fixtures with the publicity and revenue that this develops.

If we are to develop strong table tennis clubs throughout England in the future, then to provide home matches for the clubs is essential. I do appreciate the benefits of weekend club table tennis and the enjoyment that it brings to the players. This was clearly evident at the recent Schildkrot Junior British League weekend in Stoke where 37 tables were in use and 74 teams participated. The key will be to find a way which encourages the weekend club play to continue, but at the same time gives the opportunity for our clubs to develop strongly on a local basis.

SKILL AND MAGIE TABLE TENNIS is a sport where sleight of hand plays an ever increasing role, where legislators have wrestled with ways to counteract spin and speed and we are all aware of the devious effects of pimples, long, medium, and short. Then there are those disguised services where the ball appears at the last moment, to the consternation of player and public alike. To many it amounts to a combination of skill and magic - which brings me conveniently to introduce a player who has an interesting two fold expertise, writes Brian Halliday.

Steven Walsh started his table tennis career over 30 years ago at the YMCA in Tonbridge, Kent. There was a strong influence from coach Bob Woods, and after moving to Blackpool he made rapid strides within the game to become one of the leading players in the area, and where he reached a county standard of play.

His natural outgoing personality dictated a career path and before long he was a Pontins Bluecoat at Prestatyn. It was here he teamed up with international star Denis Neale for a series of exhibition matches. The art of "magic" was in the blood and his father had taught him the wily arts of the magician from an early age. As his knowledge of this branch of show business increased, Steven decided to try his luck on the cabaret and working mens clubs circuits in the North of England. A period of working as a taxi driver in the 1980s followed his early successes, but it was not long before he was back in the entertainment world.

Steven has been entertaining passengers on cruise ships for the past four years with a combination of tricks and illusions that are totally baffling. He has developed his act to incorporate his charming partner Tricia, and says that increased success has meant that he has been able to extend the range of his illusions.

Steven, whose stage name is Steve Blake, still retains his table tennis



interests, and asked specifically to be remembered to all the many friends he made in the sport in the 1970s and 80s. FROM THE CHAIR BY Alan Ransome ENGLAND WIN GOLD AT THE SAFIRS INTERNATIONAL 2002

WITH gold medals for Nicola Deaton, Helen Lower, Joanna Parker, Paul Drinkhall and Darius Knight, English players enjoyed one of their most successful international tournaments at one of Sweden's top tournaments, Safir's International Open over the period 8 - 10 February.

The tournament, which attracted players from at least 15 countries, saw a surprise victory in the women's Doubles for Nicola and Helen who beat Japanese pairs in both the semifinal and final. In the Junior Girls singles three of the England squad, Katy Parker, Georgina Walker and Kate Steward all reached the quarter finals, whilst in the Under 14 girls singles Joanna Parker won the gold medal beating Romy Borbouse of Belgium in straight games in the final. Success in the Under 12 and Under 11 boys singles came when Paul Drinkhall beat Joe Aberg of Sweden 3 - 1 in the final of the Under 12 boys and Benjamin Rogiers of Belgium in the semi final 3 - 2, whilst Darius Knight beat another Swede, Tim Bergman, and Poland's Patryk Chojnowsk in the Under 11 final and semi-final respectively.

Whilst this event is far from the standard of an ITTF Pro Tour, the results particularly for our younger players are extremely encouraging and bode well for the future.

PROPOSED CHANGE OF JUNIOR QUALIFICATION DATE

The Safirs Championships in Sweden was played using the proposed new junior and cadet

age category which effectively gives players born between January and June an extra year in the junior or cadet category. The ITTF will be holding the World Junior circuit for the first time this year and will be staging the first World Junior championships at the end of 2003. The ITTF Executive Committee are proposing to the ITTF Annual General Meeting which is to be held in Zagreb at the beginning of April that the junior age limit be changed for the coming season from juniors under 17 on lst July 2002 to being Under 18 on 1 st January 2003.

This change is being proposed because some of the continents operate their table tennis season on the January - December calendar year rather than the European season of July to June, or effectively September to May. The proposal appears to have wide support, especially in Asia, and therefore it is likely to be adopted by the ITTF. If so, the likely response to this in England would be to retain the junior July to June season so as to avoid all the various teams losing a proportion of their players at Christmas or changing the complete junior calendar orbit of our junior programmes. By only changing the eligibility date for participation for junior events by six months to fit in with the ITTF dates. This would create the minimum of disruption for our players.

After Zagreb all of this will be considered by the ETTA National Council and the Annual General Meeting or Special General Meeting at the end of June before the matter can be finalised for the start of the new season. The fact that half of the youngsters are being given an extra year in the junior events rather than time taken away from their junior and cadet careers is likely to remove much of the objection to this proposal. Such a change of date would benefit at least three of our leading prospects in that Joanna Parker, Paul Drinkhall and Darius



Knight all have birthdays in the first half of the year.

MORE PROPOSED SERVICE RULE CHANGES – DOUBLE THE HEIGHT!

law. At the last ITTF AGM in Osaka, Japan last May, the new service rule was agreed for introduction next September. This was designed to ensure that the receiver would be able to see the service at the point of contact between the bat and the ball rather than having the ball hidden by the server's arm.

Whilst keeping to same principle, this proposal is subject to further change in the form of a new proposal from the ITTF Rules Committee, that to make even more certain that the receiver is able to see the ball, that the server must throw the ball up 12" rather than 6" as at present.

REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The ETTA Development and Teaching & Training Departments are combining to launch a series of nine Regional Conferences aimed at addressing one of the biggest problems in the sport today, the recruitment and retention of volunteers. These conferences are being held in conjunction with Sport England who have launched their own volunteer initiatives and have earmarked some \$7 million over the next three years to encourage initiatives supporting local

It is anticipated that the above will be live coverage. Eurosport are expected to transmit some repeats which will be published in the television guides. volunteers.

The conferences will be looking at ways of rewarding and encouraging existing volunteers and in particular methods by which they can improve their skills by attending ETTA training courses in coaching, development, umpiring and refereeing, administration, tournament organisation etc, as well as examining ways of recruitment of new volunteers to be able to assist with the workload at local league and club level. From my experience one of the best ways of recruiting volunteers is through the family. When youngsters become keen on the sport with the backing of parents and other family members, these supporters can become excellent volunteers, using their time and expertise to support the organisation that is providing the opportunities for their youngsters

Details of these conferences which will run from May through to October, will be issued shortly and information can be obtained from the ETTA Development Department in Hastings.

TABLE TENNIS WEEK

Another important initiative is one that is designed to take advantage of the extensive television coverage and publicity that table tennis is expecting to receive from the Commonwealth Games in Manchester which are to be played from 25 July through to 4th August. The ETTA will be launching through local leagues and Premier Clubs a TABLE TENNIS WEEK which will run from Saturday, 3rd August through to Sunday 11 August. Local leagues and clubs will be encouraged to promote a series of local competitions, come and try it sessions, shopping centre promotions and other activities which bring the sport into the community and give members of the community the opportunity to join local clubs. Further details of this project will also be available from the Development Department shortly.

3 BALL GAME

WHERE, oh where is English table tennis going? We seem to drop lower and lower every year in the World ratings.

There are of course several reasons for this in my opinion.

The first reason is that in the Boys table tennis, every youngster starts off with a 'One dimensional type of game.' That is the three ball game', serve, return and wallop. Then by the time they come to the notice of a coach, their playing style is already set. This must be almost 100% true of all youngsters playing boys table tennis.

We do not now have anyone of the stature of Peter Charteris, who would stand back and advise how to broaden a voungsters game, to include attack, defence and a middle game. To keep the playing style and tactics open. To make changes later.

It has to be a mystery how our top player Matthew Syed has few, if any players, trying to copy his very successful style. Matthew would seem to be the perfect role model for at least a few players.

A few seasons back it did seem that the playing styles would open up when Chen Xinhua came to England from China. Very few got the message to copy Chen, with his very good services, great forehand hit backed up by a 'cast iron' close to the table back spin defence.

This style took him up among the very best in the world. His opponents just did not know what he would do next. All parts of his game were joined seamlessly.

Had Chen learned his table tennis in England, in all probability he would have been a defender of the Matthew Syed standard, but more than likely a three ball attack player, lucky to get in the world's top one hundred. How many English born Chens have been lost to the three ball game.

The way we go about table tennis in England, if applied to say athletics, Steve Cram, would be trying to sprint like Linford Christie, or in soccer Tony Adams would be trying to play like Michael Owen.

The main conclusion I have come to is that we just do not have players with that fanatical desire to win. To leave no stone unturned to reach the top

In the period that Chen and

Matthew Syed have been beating most of the three ball English players, quite often in straight games under ten, I doubt if there is one person, ranked in the top hundred, that has been prepared to take a year out to reinvent their game.

There are and have been many players with services that would rival Chen's, a forehand hit as good and even maybe a better backhand hit.

What Chen, Matthew Syed and a few others around the world do is not 'rocket science', it has been and can be learnt.

Over the years several players in the UK have made very dramatic changes to their game. Pre-war Richard Bergmann seemed to hit a great deal, but post-war he was mostly defence. Ian Harrison went the other way from defence to attack, and of course John Hilton and Stan Jacobson were great table tennis students and thinkers, shaping their game to suit their own strengths and weaknesses.

If you can't beat the likes of Matthew Syed etc., why not join them and learn to play their game. John O'Leary Willesden, London

POSTPONEMENTS?


I READ recently in TTN of some Leagues having problems with postponements and cancellations of matches. We also had this problem until at last year's AGM, where I proposed a new rule that was adopted and so far this season has met with almost 100% success.

The rule reads as follows: "For all league matches played by or within the scheduled week of play and score sheets posted to the Divisional Secretary within 48 hours, both teams will receive three bonus points. Any team which cancels a match forfeits the three bonus points, and a late score sheet will results in the home team forfeiting the three bonus points.

This means it pays to play a man short rather than cancel as it would still be possible to gain 10 points (7+3), whereas with a cancellation and loss of bonus points the 3rd player would have to win all his three games in the re-arranged match to equal the 3 bonus points.

We in the Wisbech League have found this rule to work very well this season and I am led to understand that our neighbouring league, the

• PARENTS who keep their distance when their children or teenagers are on court have my respect. I have never yet come across a parent who is not biased. An umpire's or referee's decision against the player watched by mum or dad or both is invariably challenged.

• AT a recent soccer match in Eastbourne played between two under-10 teams, one of the teams was taken off the field for safety reasons - the result of parents abusing match officials opposing players and opposition parents.

WHAT is sport in general coming to when at soccer, seated yobs stand to throw coins and bottles at the players? Happily, that has not happened at table tennis, but tempers have been lost and players suspended in the last few months after one incident in China and then the rumpus at the Western Open at Bath in December triggered by Ryan Owen.

• HINDSIGHT is often better than second thoughts. I am wondering who the first person was that thought of granting English leagues the right to continue with 21 points for their local events.

• IT is beginning to look as though England could be the only nation in membership of the ITTF who have allowed this to happen and probably unwisely, allowing this to continue until further notice, i.e.: next season.

• RICHARD YULE, chief executive ETTA assures me that the ETTA is all in favour of 11 points. There is a feeling that the dispensation given is to avoid veteran players dropping out of local leagues and so making worse the current drop in affiliations that has been going on steadily (we are told by Andy Seward) since 1978 !

• INFORMATION currently available is that a number of local leagues who tried out 11 points this campaign are preparing to return to 21 points.

• A FEW MONTHS ago, it seemed that about half the English leagues were playing 11 and the rest 21 points. Now, it seems the balance is tipping towards 21. Most young players are accepting 11 points but many older players yearn for 21.

• THE question is - is this an embarrassment for the ETTA or are they quite happy with the prospect next September of a large majority of local leagues playing 21 points ?

I also know that, should the ETTA ever force the issue on the membership, then certain leagues would recommend their members to vote on leaving the ETTA. I am told that many players who are in leagues playing the 11up system dislike it so much, are now leaving to join another one that uses the 21up game. I know of members who are prepared to give up the game altogether if they are directed by the ETTA to play the 11up game. Is this what you really want? By the tone of your article, it appears that it is. Surely the only way to settle this continuing controversy is for the ETTA to hold a national referendum to ballot every member. VISIONARIES

ETTA E-MAIL ADDRESSES

IT WAS pleasant to start taking the

Table Tennis News again, having let my subscription slip when we moved up here, to Norfolk.

Î smiled at the description of the founders of The London Junior Table tennis scheme. "Visionaries" Thanks Jon! We were called anything but when the scheme started "Nutters", "Mickey mouse", are two of the politer things we were called. Some coaches called us poachers and wouldn't let their youngsters come to our events.

The Scheme started with Malcolm Springthorpe and Reg Rockall deciding to do something for the kids in Haringay during the long summer holidays. Having advertised a free table tennis tournament with the only instructions wear plimsolls or trainers, and bring a bat if you have one. They were overwhelmed by the numbers who arrived, and thought that there was a clear demand for this type of event. I was asked if I'd help out at the next event As both Reg and Malcolm knew me, I'd been umpiring for Reg's "Edison" British league team. After my baptism at the second LITTS Free tourney, where we were again over run with numbers. We had to stop play several times to demand some of the bails

back so that we could continue. Several hundred children had passed through the doors that day. Unfortunately there were not enough of us to deal with that number, we didn't have time to get all the names and addresses. Tried to get them to write their own names and addresses most were illegible or incomplete.

After dismantling the tables, the three of us sat down and had a cup of coffee in the centre and London Junior Table Tennis scheme was born. Malcolm to use his skills to raise money, Reg agreed to loan Edison clubs equipment and delivery and collection etc. I was asked to devise a scheme and organise the running.

The ethos was that it was to be entirely free, open to all and no requirement to book in advance! The scheme I devised was three levels of skill, non players - club/school players - league players, and again divided into three age groups, a very young group and the two older groups to match the ETTA cadet and junior levels.

After a few years we had to make a small charge or loose our grant. But it was still anyone come and play on the day, that was such a nightmare that we finally put in a booking scheme. Was I ever glad, made the referee's life a lot easier.

This system stood us in good stead? Well it worked after a fashion! Len Pilfold joined us and put in a very much improved system! His was well thought out and a considerable improvement on my hastily thought out scheme. My wife fed up with being left alone so much put her foot down. I had to cut back. I was away more weekends that I was home!

There are two people who]on missed out - who were very much involved. The first because Jon never met him, was Graham Bartrop, who for several seasons was our mainstay referee, he worked incredibly hard for the scheme. His job changed and he was unable to continue as referee as his work involved weekends. The other person is the incredible Iris Moss! She has been the schemes treasurer almost from the first year. how she fits it in with all the other treasurer's jobs she does - I'll never know - in her spare bedroom the bed is (was) covered in neat piles of invoices, receipts, etc. for each of the organisations that she officiates for. Our committee meetings were held at Iris's flat, a range of sandwiches, plates of biscuits, with Iris trotting in and out with as much tea or coffee as vou wanted. I think everyone loved her - I certainly did. To conclude, a huge well done to

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COVER STORY - LOOKING INTO JAN OVE WALDNER'S CAREER WALDNER'S WATERSHED ZAGREB 2002

BRIAN HALLIDAY looks at the life and career of Jan Ove Waldner and tries to assess his position in the overall history of the game - however there is a sting in the tail!

Waldner - a name known and revered in table tennis world-wide. A name that has dominated the sport for 20 years. A name that belongs to a man who has reached the summit but still strives for more.

For Waldner Zagreb 2002 is the probable watershed. The European Championships have, in the past, been a happy hunting ground for the Swedish superstar and he will be straining to peak one more time for one last massive attempt for the glory of yet another major title.

Maybe its a tournament too far. The reflexes are perhaps not as sharp as yesterday, the services lack a little of previous potency, and the ability to clutch unlikely victories from from almost certain defeat is on a diminishing scale. A wise man would be foolish to write him off completely but age, and perhaps even boredom, may contribute to his possible demise.

This is a player who has built his game around years of practice, a talent supreme, wonderful technique, artistic, elegant, an extraordinary improviser, and of course those lethal services that have confused and confounded opponents throughout his career. Now comes the snag. The revision of the service law next September means that the potency of the disguised service will be reduced, and for Waldner this will pose a problem against the world's best players. He has trouble enough now with some of the better Europeans, and to take away his major point winning attribute could well spell the end of the road. The forthcoming Championships allow one last chance of glory.

Jan Ove Waldner was born on 3rd October 1965 in Hagersten near Stockholm, and as a six year old boy was encouraged by his elder brother



to join the Sporvagen Club in Stockholm. Although extremely small, his head only reached the top of the table, he was a quick learner, and by the age of eleven he was playing his first Swedish League match.

Soren Ahlen, the Swedish National Coach and at present helping to shape England's future stars, says Waldner had an uncanny ability to exactly mimic other players in practice. He was able to combine the best strokes from many players into his own game. This facility became of major importance as his career flowered.

His first visit to China made a significant impact on the young

Swede. He was fascinated by the serving technique and decided that here was an area where, if he worked hard enough, he could perfect an immediate point winning shot. The disguise of point of contact and degree of spin, coupled with the ball thrown high enough to distract and confuse the opposition, were added to an ever increasing armoury that was to shake the table tennis world.

After a glittering junior career he reached the European Singles final in 1982, and then became Top 12 winner in 1984. A feat he was to repeat in 86, 88, 89, 93, 95, and 96. There was just no stopping the string of successes. European Team Champion in 86 and 88. In the World Singles final in 1987 he came within a whisker of beating Jiang, but slight over confidence at the crucial moment gave victory to the Chinese. Jorgen Persson, his great friend, provided the opposition in the 1989 final and this time it was Waldner's turn to take the crown. Even here there was a narrow escape as he led 2-1 and 20-19 only to miss the match point and allow Persson back into the match. No mistake in the fifth as he won 21-10. He finally won the European title in 1996 by beating Persson again.

Even his Olympic exploits, he won Gold in 1992, paled beside his performance at the Worlds in Manchester in 97 His final win over Samsonov was perhaps one of the most perfect of performances of power and technique that one is ever likely to see.

He was seven times Swedish Champion and won too many international titles to list. Perhaps the matches that he will most be remembered for were as a member of the Swedish team that beat the all conquering Chinese for the first time. A combination of supreme athleticism and a clever tactical plan, whereby the Swedes played an off the table top spin game, brought a thrilling and deserved victory. Then there was that quite breathtaking win in the Team Final in the Worlds in Kuala Lumpur. Playing alongside Persson, the two 34 year olds tore the years back to record the most unlikely of victories over the resurgent Chinese.

What makes this man tick? Poker faced and enigmatic on the table. A mental process so hard to fathom. At one moment focussed to the point of fanaticism, the next distracted by events taking place elsewhere and on other tables. A combination of boredom and brilliance. Always the need to demonstrate the unusual and the unexpected. The four times World Champion Richard Bergmann also had that need to flirt with danger, even in the most important of

matches. Two games and 15-20 down, there indeed was the supreme challenge to the master. Waldner is of the same ilk. He relishes adversity to a degree that is heart stopping for his supporters but frustrating in the extreme for his opponents.

Off the table he is remarkably shy and at times displays a surprising lack of maturity. He says that when he plays he is nervous but tries to conceal it, and recognises that the game is a battle of wills and that the image of an ice cool temperament is paramount. He has a great love for sports, especially football, volleyball, and golf. When playing at any of these games fun is pushed to one side and a ruthless competitive streak emerges. He is a student of the games history and expresses surprise and delight as to how he is regarded among the world's elite. Quiet and retiring he admits to a love of beer and the opposite sex, but rather surprisingly has never had a steady girlfriend.


Those that know him well speak of a quirky but totally endearing man with no vindictiveness whatsoever. His peers speak of him in hushed tones - such is the status of genius. The No.1 Belgium player Jean Michel Saive summed him up so well. "When he's good he reads your mind. When he's really good, he reads the ball's mind".

Well, is he "the greatest" that has ever been? My personal reaction is very near but not quite. It has been my privilege to see all the top players over the last 50 or so years and I have tried hard to analyse their strengths and weaknesses. Wonderful players like Leach, Bergmann, Vana, Liang, Barna, Deng, Roseanu, Alexandru (now there was a special player), all excited me. All displayed a sort of genius most of us strive for but never achieve. Waldner lives above them. He is without doubt almost at the top of the tree but not at the pinnacle.

Who was the best? My nomination would be for Chuang Tse Tung. I was fortunate that I saw him play a number of times. One night in London was memorable when he destroyed our own Chester Barnes and again in 1965 in Ljubliana which gave him his third consecutive World Singles title.

Chuang was at the peak of his powers. Extremely quick with a forehand that was like a machine gun in action. He never missed. Liang told me that he was the fastest player of all time, and I believe him. Three successive titles could so easily have become four but for the advent of the Cultural Revolution. Remember this powerhouse of a player did not have the advantages of todays technology. No excessively spinny rubbers, no speed glues then. He just relied on sheer ability to become the best player from the millions who played the game in China. I have never seen anyone quite like him. OK, Waldner comes close, but even he must bow to the most extraordinary player that ever graced a table.

SOUTHERN OPEN BUTTERFLY GRAND PRIX

A JENKINS' HAT-TRICK

BEARING in mind that the Welsh and the Scots and the Irish enjoy sending squads of players to the England Grand Prix tour tournaments, it is now emerging that Ryan Jenkins is the most successful player in Britain at this time, writes John Woodford.

The man from Pontypridd devoured his third GP title at the Sir David English Sports Centre with a rewarding final round victory 11, -7, 5, -5, 8 over the very impressive former Swedish international Tommy Danielsson.

Danielsson last played for Sweden in Novi Sad in 1981 at the world championships. He still possesses a slick all-round game, flowing strokes on both wings, but being 23 years older than Jenkins, did not possess the power of of his opponent.


THE mens and womens finals were brought forward some three hours something I have been campaigning for for a long time - the result was a crowd of over 200 people. In the other Grand Prixes, the late finishing singles finals, foolishly left to last, have often resulted in a crowd of between 10 and 20 fans. Common sense this time prevailed.

There are two old-fashioned and parochial things that happen in table tennis that hold us back when competing with our rival racquet sports - one is the reference to "closed" events instead of championships and the other always running the main singles events last at tournaments of all sizes.

Players especially, come a long way to GP events, often road journeys of five hours or more. At 9pm they expect to be on the road, if not they can expect to arrive home in the small hours with work or school early next morning.

Another player who had a good day was Cris Sladden (Essex) - he reached his first GP semi-finals losing to Danielsson -7, -6, -10, but before that taking out Gavin Rumgay (SCOTLAND) at 12 in the fifth game.







THE womens singles was of course, dominated by the European No.4 Ni Xia Lian. She destroyed the Swedish girl Sophia Westholme 2, 5, 1 in the final.

I heard it said that Lian's strength was about the same as Ryan Jenkins. What an exhibition it could have been between Ryan and Lian, had it been possible.

From the English girls point of view



, Karen Lockwood (Cheshire) excelled to reach the semi-finals before losing to Lian; a major shock came when Louise Durrant lost to Sussex's Rose Rainton. Another surprise came in the womens groups when Gemma Yarnley (Kent) defeated the Welsh No.3 Jenny

In the banded events, Gloucester lifted a great double when Darren Griffin took Band 1 and Suzy Robinson landed the womens Band 1 in the final over Egle Adomelyte from Lithuania - a new name, poker-faced, but talented, a student at Willesden and scooped up by London Progress. 





BOLL TOPS THE POLL

IT HAS taken Germany a long time to find a replacement for their world-class Jorg Rosskopf, but now they have found one, he is Timo Boll, aged 22 a pleasant young man who with a fine display of pace and purpose, who snatched the European Top-12 crown in Rotterdam, writes John Woodford in Rotterdam.

There is nothing spectacular about his game. It is conventional top-spin. He came through a titanic struggle in the final to bring down Samsonov, whose ball control has to be seen to be believed.

But Samsonov lacks the 'Big Kill'. The Belarussian forged a 3-1 lead in the final. He should have won it, but the German bounced back skillfully to take the seventh game 11-7.

Boll was fresh from winning the Austrian Open, although Jan-Ove Waldner (not present in Rotterdam) had to pull out through injury in the Austrian final.

The French came up with two semifinalists - Chila falling to Samsonov in five and the tiny Eloi also going under in five to Boll whose odds against winning the European crown in Zagreb must have shortened considerably.

PAY-BACK TIME ?

MUCH of Brian Halliday's insert (TTN December), was devoted to my own article 'La Grand Illusion' (Sport Break). This was offered to TTNews, accepted by Brian and then forbidden by his management colleagues. I find it hard to accept Brian's protests that there is no censorship. it is sad that so constructive a contribution could not be read in that spirit. The main thrust was to show how the vast sums of Lottery money we have been getting could have been used better, benefiting far more players and clubs and producing, much better international results,

After all, Chairman Ransome inherited excellent teams which in four successive European Championships over 8 years had won bronze and silver and now we are in the second category of European Nations, outside the top 12. What we previously achieved we did on a shoestring and now with so much more money we are doing rather badly. I had hoped for a more positive response.

Apart from putting all our eggs into one basket, that of the small but costly "academy", we seem to have lost an awful lot of good players. According to the official versions, they all departed of their own volition. It is easy to remain blind to the obvious, but I prefer to look a little more deeply and ask " why? "

Others must speak for themselves, but in the case of my own son, my knowledge is a little better than that of official ETTA spokesmen and apologists. One should always ask how such decisions are made, since players do not turn their back easily on what they have worked for years to achieve, a place in the England team.

In Carl's case, there was no choice, as he was treated so badly that to endure what was heaped on him would have destroyed his selfrespect.

He had contributed substantially to our international teams' successes and when he left he was only 32. How important he may or may not have been may be noted from the following: Apart from the 4 European medals above (plus one at World level) which lasted till 1994, in 1996 (when Carl did not play) the team was relegated from the first category of 12 top nations. In 1998 he did play and was unbeaten in the team event and our team was promoted to the top category. In 2000 he did not play and the team was again relegated

In the European League, his last full season, in a match for promotion to the top division, the team won the first match (vs Czechoslovakia) 4-2 when he did play and lost the return 4-0 when he did not play and so missed promotion.

Perhaps these are selective occasions and nobody always wins, but, after 20 years service, one would have thought that our chairman or one of the highly paid coaches would have summoned the energy to lift the phone, as Alan Ransome did so often in the past to resolve various problems. Alas, today we prefer to lose matches and strike postures and the game is the loser. Some have put it to me that the awful treatment accorded to Carl is the establishment's revenge on me - "pay back time". I hope not. 'The real loser is the England team, which misses a player who has often won at the highest level. John Prean

UNFAIR?

OVER the years the ranking scheme in this Country has come in for considerable criticism for various reasons. Unlike a lot of other coaches, I have long been a supporter of the system in the belief that ultimately each person ends up in their correct position despite one or two hiccups on the way. Recently,however, I have found it necessary to write to the Ranking Committee to question the policy which allows selective results to be fed into the scheme.

At the beginning of the season I made enquiries about European Junior Tournaments with a view to taking a number of youngsters abroad so that they could gain experience against foreign opposition. I could not believe my ears when I was told that only England squad players could qualify for ranking points at these tournaments.

One member of the Ranking Committee has sent me a personal reply, for which I am grateful, in which he states that we place too much emphasis on ranking points. I can wholeheartedly agree with this but my complaint is about fairness rather than the relative importance of the points.

In this Country the 'top' juniors do not appear at many tournaments and for someone just outside the top the opportunity to gain points is extremely limited. We already have a "them and us" with the Academy group and the present method of treating players in Europe will only accentuate this.

More recently I note that the Greater London T.T.Championships are offering ranking points for a 'closed' event. Does this mean that the Kent closed and the Slough closed can in future be treated as ranking events? I think not.

All players pay the appropriate licence fee and can therefore expect to receive equal treatment, but at present it would appear that the powers that be are making up the rules as they go along

I have had an amenable chat with the Chairman of the Ranking Committee and I now await his written reply attempting to justify the unjustifiable. *Ken Phillips ETTA Coach Maidenhead, Berkshire*

AMAZED !

I WAS amazed that some local leagues are reluctant to play 11up. Though these comments are my own they reflect what a number of players have told me:

 Two players of equal strenghts can be boring when played up to 21. The better player may find it a time-waste and the poorer discouraging.
 Equal adversaries find the 11up system very exciting, and it more often goes the distance, very exciting for players.

 11up matches are not so drawn out, likely finishing earlier, therefore attracting more competitors.
 Many leagues have players, who

play beyond the league, so a uniform scoring system would be better.

Could it be that some players find scoring a problem, knowing their 5 x table best, it being easier and more familiar. Do practice scoring in two's. You'll soon get the hang of it.

For ancient players like myself, 11 up followed by a minute's rest is a Godsend.

STRAIGHT TALKING - New monthly feature



WE'VE all heard the same conversation in our local leagues over the last year. It probably went something along the following lines: "I don't know what they're doing to this sport; first it's the ball, now it's 11-up and next year they're changing the service rule. Why are they doing all this?"

The reply will have varied from "Well, actually I quite like 11-up" to "I couldn't agree more; if this league goes to 11-up I won't be playing next year ".

Whereas most players accepted the change to the 40mm ball with the minimum of fuss there can be little doubt that those same players are exceptionally reluctant to embrace the new scoring system.

Somerset National Councillor Andy Seward's research on the decline in the number of affiliated teams threw up a telling statistic. Those 48 leagues who have changed to the 11up system have lost more teams – 5.6 % compared with the 2.8 % lost by those leagues who have stayed with 21-up.

SO WHAT IS PEOPLE'S PROBLEM WITH 11UP? FROM SOME PLAYERS' PERSPECTIVE IT SEEMS TO OFFER MANY PLUS-POINTS:

• Games are over more quickly so younger players should be keener to

take part

• The shock result is probably more likely and the best players have less chance to coast before moving up a gear

• You could say that it helps in an unevenly matched game – losing 11-0 somehow seems less traumatic than losing 21-0!

• By alternating service every two points, the server does not have the opportunity to build up a psychologically important lead in the

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first five points.

• Play can arguably be more exciting as you are more likely to reach 10-10 than 20-20.

• Contrary to some people's opinions you don't have to alter your tactics. You can still use the same serves - you just get fewer of them at once!

• And of course we are constantly reminded that it makes table tennis more attractive to television.

CRITICS OF 11UP WILL PROBABLY RESPOND ALONG THE FOLLOWING LINES:

- "If it ain't broken don't fix it"
- "I take 10 points to get going -
- what chance have I got?"
 "Who cares whether the score is 10-10 or 1-1 - a great point is still a great point!".



• "When was table tennis last on main-stream television? And when it is, they only show the highlights starting at something like 15-15, so it makes no difference."

• "Doubles is more difficult under 11-up as players fail to come to terms with the constantly changing playing formations."

• "Playing under the extra stress of the new scoring system is less enjoyable and players are less likely to go for their shots."

SO WHAT IS THE ANSWER ?

NO one wants to see players giving up prematurely but there doesn't seem to be a lot of choice in the matter. The sport's international governing body have changed the rules and it isn't really in the best interests of the sport if local leagues are left to their own devices for ever (although the ETTA have said there are no plans to change that this year).

People point out that other sports such as bowls and squash, even athletics and boxing, have different rules for different levels of competition but are the rule changes they have undergone really as fundamental as the 11-up? And a number of players are saying it's not easy swapping between systems and they will therefore pack up local leagues if necessary to concentrate on the higher-level competitions.

On the whole I think the ETTA probably made the right decision in allowing local leagues to make up their own minds. They were heavily criticised in some quarters for not having taken a more active stance on the matter but at least this way, the more reluctant players have had a chance to think about it and may be less likely to give up the game if the change becomes mandatory.

As ETTA chairman Alan Ransome said: "I've never received a post -bag anything like this before. Literally everyone has an opinion on the subject."

And finally how long will it be before some of those same players who were the most critical of 11-up actually admit: " I prefer the new scoring system". I know at least one who has!

Editorial

At Christmas in Cambridge I met up with a former TT pupil, **Emma (nee Swan) Laughton**, who played for England cadets some 30 years ago but then gave up to concentrate on her academic studies (she did English at Kings College, University of Cambridge). I gave Emma some old copies of Table Tennis News, and a few days later she wrote to say that she had been reading through them: "It's so interesting and stirring; how valiantly everyone struggles to keep the sport afloat and developing, a bit like the Church really."

The comparison with the Church, I think is a good one and true, with many worthy stalwarts doing their bit for the sport, often in difficult circumstances and without obvious reward. Taking the analogy further to include small religious or political sects, then the positive elements among the leaders and activists of passion, commitment, fortitude and strongly held beliefs are great strengths which can bind people together, but there is also the potential for division, accusation, division, accusation, internecine strife and character assassination which holds back the cause. Whilst constructive criticism, questioning and debate within such organisations is a good healthy thing that allows them to develop and evolve, being intolerant of difference and criticising destructively leads to fractiousness, ultimately denying the organisation the possibility of mass public support.

It is not that bad in table tennis, but I sometimes do find it painful how people I respect for their love and contribution to the game can be at loggerheads with each other or the establishment. Remember, 'united we win (stand), divided we lose (fall)', and to gain popular appeal our real competition within our sport should be with other countries, the competition for our sport should be with other sports, and for sport it should be with 'culture' or recreational pastimes, whatever. Be mindful of the bigger picture and work together for the common cause.

A band of (too few) volunteers and a tiny clutch of professionals are creaking under the strain of keeping English table

With this in mind, I tennis going. struggle to find an adequate response to supremely dedicated and highly successful coach Ken Phillips, who said (Jan/Feb edition) that he thought he was not valued. I often hear people extolling the value of the volunteer in general, and praising Ken in particular (so he obviously is valued), so I find it hard to believe that he always feels like that and has not been shown appreciation to his face. Apart from telling people you appreciate them which we all should do but often don't think to - and occasionally in some formalised way making a point of it, such as giving a presentation or recognition award, I am unsure realistically what can be done. Remember, even the 'top table' is composed of overworked volunteers and professionals, and who thinks to tell them that they are valued?!

However, although we all derive some pleasure and satisfaction from doing what we do - else we would not do it and stickability when the going gets rough is one of the most important attributes for a worker for table tennis. Ken does have a very serious point: sometimes the only praise we get is when we retire, move or die (when it is too late!) and occasionally, the time and effort we give to table tennis and the aggravations we face can feel too much. Then we feel undervalued. 'Comforter, where is your comforting?!' It is at these times that there needs to be someone who can give some recognition, comfort and support, or even offer to run sessions/write letters/take minutes/organise a team for a short time, etc to give the worker a But, apart than through break. occasional training, or support groups or mentors or back-up rotas for specific positions, I don't think that realistically this support can be officially/formally provided. The only answer I can see is to be collectively aware of the need and to build up a culture of mutual support, so that help and encouragement are there when they are needed. This would more easily follow if we could more genuinely all work together for the greater good of table tennis. I appreciate my rambling response is inadequate but readers may have more helpful ideas (such as going on a Valuing Volunteers Course?)!

Following European League success in December by England women over Poland at Scarborough and England men over Slovakia at Newton Aycliffe, there have been the terrific successes in February for Darius Knight, Paul Drinkhall and Joanna Parker in winning, respectively, the under 11 boys' singles, the under 12 boys' singles and the under 14 girls' singles the high standard Safirs at International Tournament in Sweden. As England Performance Director Soren Ahlen says, these encouraging results show that the National Training Centre is, "working in the right direction."

It has not been my intention to show the introduction of games up to 11 in an undue positive light, and therefore I must report some significant findings from Andy Seward's analysis of local league affiliations which I did not know when I penned my last editorial: that of those leagues he looked at, the rate of decline in affiliations in those going over to 11-up was twice (5.61%) that of those sticking to 21-up (2.83%) the overall rate was 3.41%. Of course you can interpret statistics in different ways, but I would still say that a 5.61% loss, though regrettable, was less than most people feared.

My sense of the situation is that from initial negativity, more people are coming round to thinking positively about the new scoring system, but that Management Committee the and National Council will probably be content for local leagues to continue to have discretion next season as which scoring system to use. However, whether you are for or against it, I still say that the future must be with what is now the international law of table tennis

Thank you those clubs and leagues that continue to send me copies of their **newsletters**, some of which are excellent. I particular liked all the interesting facts and useful information in Allen Roper's Hillingdon Table Tennis Newsletter.

Southampton boys got a look in at under 12 where Alistair Jones defeated John McBeath 11-9, 12-10, 11-5.

Southampton's Emma Dohson retained her girls' junior title when in a repeat of last season's final she defeated younger sister Jenny 6-11, 11-9, 11-9, 11-8. Jenny was also the loser in the girls' cadet final when in a surprising reversal of the previous final the title went 12-10. 11-7, 12-10 to the Isle of Wight's Joanna Hurt. This was a big surprise as in the same week Jenny finished second in the final regional trials (Jenny subsequently finished 8th in the national trials which earned her a reserve berth for the masters congratulations). Annabelle Morle, last season's runner-up, took the under 12 girls' title defeating Sarah Warwick (Southampton) whilst the junior doubles went to Southampton in the hands of Christ Willsher and Daniel Long, and Michael Gibbs and

William George took the cadet doubles trophy back to Pompey.

These championships, as most major TT events in Hampshire, took place at Redbridge Community School in Southampton, where County Secretary Harold Albery is a Governor. Many readers will know the school through county and school visits and will be interested to know that the school is currently being completely rebuilt within the grounds and that they are applying for sports college status with table tennis as a nominated sport, and further that they have been accepted as a Premier Club at introduction level.

ISLE OF WIGHT by John Prean

Our Newsletter draws attention to opposition among 'older, longer-serving members' to the 11-up system, even threats to retire and form a breakaway league, if 21 up is not restored! There was, of course, a vote at our AGM in the summer where there was a large majority for the new idea, admittedly attendance being a record low. Nevertheless most clubs were represented. As I no longer play competitively, I I liked the scoring abstained. system when watching our county team in action, as indeed I did in national experiments some years ago. Even then, as ETTA Chair, I noted much opposition.

My advice remains to practice Too many harder, to play more. people play once a week in their local league match and half the year they don't play at all. The new system does require good nerves and consistency at the more frequent pressure points and the answer is obvious. As Gary Player observed elsewhere, it is amazing how one's luck improves, when one practices more. I remain sad that this minor matter stirs up such emotions, when so many other things in our sport need urgent not least that reform. our membership numbers have fallen so long, which places a question mark about our future as a sport. lt should be a lively debate at AGMs all over the country during the summer, the prospect of playing up to 21 one day and to 11 the next very real.

I read in various papers sent to me by the ETTA that county notes generally are only read by people in the county in question. This is not my experience, as I read all county notes, even my own. Similarly. people go out of their way to tell me that they have read what I have written and "always do". One of the questions I am most frequently asked is why I don't write more! But that is another story. There was a time when county correspondents chanced their arm and commented on national matters. My own notes were once called "Letter from the Isle of Wight" (with apologies to Alistair Cooke) when I reported on my travels around the country. Later county writers were encouraged to concentrate on parochial matters, which I did not think a good idea for the obvious reason of the national readership and interest. I was accused of using mv column to criticise ETTA management. No such complaints were ever received when I praised what had been done, as I often do. I hope the lesson will be learned that my colleagues will be encouraged to cover wider fields of general interest to counties.

Our county matches again produced respectable rather than stunning results. We drew 5-5 with both Bucks and Surrey II. We welcomed back Danny Burns who decided to risk his knee, which needs an operation and won two out of four, his win against Surrey and Simon Philips being a landmark, as his opponent is in the top 100 in England. Jill Fothergill's three out of four in these matches deserves applause, her only defeat against Gemma Chapman, Alison Botha scored her first win against Jane Dickens (Bucks) by 8 in the 5th. . Carl provided the usual four bankers. To return to a higher division, our players will have to practice a lot harder (see earlier notes).

Lucy Pointer returned against Bucks. The kindest comment one can make is that her heart was not in it and her spell in the ETTA Academy seems ultimately to have led to her retirement at 17, not the bright England future hoped for. She was capped at cadet level, even made the European Youth team in one year. Here she was a sensation, a young girl beating grown men, a never-ending source of copy for the local newspaper. One noted that, in Nottingham, her game was not improving despite practising every day and basic faults seemed undetected, certainly unchanged. For us locally Lucy was a "star", one we seem to have lost.

Our other "star" Carl Prean seems to have returned to the National Ranking List in 4th place, having previously been omitted or rejected. He will sink further, I imagine, when Matthew Syed returns to the list after a couple of wins. Matthew knows that there is a bonus of £1,000 waiting for him, if he can beat Carl in a specially arranged challenge match in which I would hope some TV coverage may be possible. The money would be oneway. It would cost Matthew nothing, if he loses. I await his reply with interest.

On the knock-out cup scene Wellingborough's best of four ends up to 11 format a much better bet than Northampton's three ends up to 11, while Kettering's retention of the tried and trusted '21 up' system for two of its three cup competitions has gone down favourably with those traditionalists who remain suspicious of the up to 11 scoring now used in all four of the Northants major leagues.

Regrettably, I have to report the deaths of two of our table tennis enthusiasts, Kettering's Harry Hanger and Wellingborough's Ken Bussey.

Harry, despite a prolonged illness, always retained that sparkling personality most evident when in his hometown he won two men's singles, six men's doubles and three mixed doubles between 1950 and 1959, with a further men's event added in 1967 in partnership with Dick Cole.

On the other hand, Ken Bussey, the quiet man of table tennis, was able to retain his enthusiastic contribution to the game until he died in hospital on 7th January.

He was born in London but at the age of seven he was evacuated to Northamptonshire where he attended Harlestone Village School.

After the war he returned to Islington, but he had fond memories of his adopted county and when his firm relocated, Ken moved to Wellingborough. Nevertheless he retained his London roots and remained a fervent support of Arsenal Football Club. However, his main interest was table tennis and he enjoyed a longplaying career, first with Irthlingborough Band Club, then at Wellingborough Working Men's Club before finally representing Burton Conservatives. Former opponents still recall his close-to-the-table style allied with a penetrating backhand that won him many games.

Ken was already a proficient umpire and in 1994 he became Northants Umpires Secretary, a task he fulfilled with his customary patience and dedication for the remainder of his life.

When he retired after 42 years service with the same firm, he became a volunteer driver for both the Wellingborough Volunteer Bureau and the Wellingborough Sports for the Disabled Club, continuing to put back more into other people's lives than he himself obtained.

He will be greatly missed by all his many friends and playing acquaintances, whose condolences go to his partner Eva and to all his family.

Cippenham Veterans' 2-Star Open by Graham Trimming

Fourth seed Derek Holman came back from two games down to win a superb Men's Singles final at the Cippenham Veterans' 2-Star Open Championships on 3rd February. Holman's renowned resilience eventually got the better of his Surrey and Graham Spicer TTC team-mate Steve Davis in a final full of exciting attacking table tennis. Davis' powerful two-winged attack. especially his lightning backhand, looked to have sealed another title for the fifth seed as he won the first two games 11-8, 11-8. Holman came back to level the match at 2-2 but Davis again emerged as favourite as he raced into a 5-1 lead in the fifth deciding game. Holman found a backhand block shot that was the equal of Davis' backhand and this became the telling factor as, summoning up all his fighting spirit, Holman eventually won 11-9.

No one should have been surprised as Holman had also come back from two games down in his semi-final against Barrie Gilbert, filling in the top seeded position in place of the injured and absent Henry Buist. The Gilbert defence won the early exchanges but was eventually worn down by the forehand topspin loop and clever backhand of Holman to the extent that the fifth game closed 11-3. Even one round earlier, in his quarter-final match against David Crowley, Holman dropped the first game and eventually won 17-15 in the fourth.

The shocks, however, happened in the bottom half of the draw where the highest ranked player, Terry Haley, was beaten in the second round by the unseeded Michael Wilkins, a Bucks county player. Wilkins won a close first game 14-12 and then won in the fourth after dropping the third game. However, Wilkins was no match for the power of Steve Davis in the quarters and took his leave of the competition. Davis' semi-final victim was Charlie Childs who won the first game of their encounter after having provided another second round shock when he dispatched his Hampshire colleague third seed Ramesh Bhalla.

Other seeds who were displaced included Chris Pickard who lost in the groups to Keith Yarnley 11-9 in the fifth and Tom Adams who lost to the same player in the second round, also 11-9 in the fifth. Adams had also been beaten 13-11 in the fifth in the groups by Geoff Grange.

Other interesting results included Barry Morten's defeat of Mike Wilkins 18-16 in the fifth (in the groups) and John Barclay's fifthgame win over Geoff Grange in round one.

Top seed Sharon Mitchell, from Reading, duly won the Women's Singles, beating in the final Mary Heffernan of High Wycombe. It was the pair's second meeting of the day as both came out of group one. In the final Mitchell won in three straight games whereas the clash in the group had been a much closer affair and required five games to establish Mitchell as the winner.

The second seed, Haruko Posford, only managed 'to finish second in group two having been beaten by Flavia Wade. Both of these players then lost their semifinal matches. Local players were involved in close matches. Evergreen Georgia Veneer, just turned eighty years of age, took Heffernan to a fifth game and Jan Chapman, who later won the Consolation event, led in the third against Posford when 2-0 up in dames.

Andrew's ace day playing world table tennis champion! by Judith Hayman

Table tennis is something that runs in the Goldstein family genes.

The late Maurice Goldstein, of Birmingham, was dubbed "Mr Table Tennis" and as President of the English Table Tennis Association was the country's no. 1 organiser of the sport from the 1960s to 1980s.

His son, David Goldstein, 63, says "Dad played too, but his real contribution was promoting and organising rather than playing".

"At one time Birmingham had the biggest table tennis league in

Europe. He made a massive contribution to the organisation of the game at local and national level."

Younger brother Rabbi Andrew Goldstein, of Northwood and Pinner Progressive Synagogue in London, also caught the table tennis bug from his father.

He recalls: "We used to have our own table tennis team at home in Birmingham with my father, my mother Gladys and brothers David and Bernard. We played in the Birmingham League in the 1950s."

The family home, as well as accommodating dad's tailoring business, was also the headquarters of the table tennis association.

"World champions Richard Bergman (a Hungarian Jewish émigré) and Victor Barna (a Viennese Jew) came to our house", says Andrew. "One of the highlights of my life was playing Bergman as a 12-year-old".

In the 1960s the Goldsteins hosted the first Chinese team ever to come to England. Maurice also organised the 1977 World Championships in Birmingham.

Andrew recalls "The whole family was involved."

David thought it a shame that his father never read Howard Jacobson's book "The Mighty Walzer" which, he says, "encapsulated what the game was like in the 1950s."

Andrew said "Although Jacobson's book was based in Manchester, all the characters could have been members of the Birmingham table tennis world".

Birmingham's Maccabi and Frederick Jacombs table tennis leagues, established in the 1950s, still flourish today.

David regrets that table tennis in this country is something of a spent force, but he does his part to bolster its popularity.

Every Thursday lunchtime he teachers 80 students on 10 tables at Wheelers Lane Technical College. But, sadly, none of his children has taken up the sport.

Thursday night is table tennis night at the Northwood and Pinner Synagogue – and the rabbi plays league matches, too. He says "I am playing better now than ever. It really matters that I win. The playing also keeps me fit."

He admits that his rabbinical and table tennis duties sometimes overlap.

Says Andrew "There is a problem when matches are drawn on a Friday night or yomtov or when I have a shiva house to attend."

Andrew's daughter Ruth is a professional cellist and son Aaron an all-round sportsman, will gain semicha this year.

Has he influenced anyone to take up the game?

"I might have inspired a couple to become rabbis, but I'm not sure about the table tennis," he smiles.

A Decade of Computer World Rankings By Andre Damman (abridged by Ken Muhr)

It all started in the year 1991. The first official World Ranking by computer was published in October 1991. Since then 89 lists have been published, an average of nearly nine a year.

Eleven Number Ones

In the course of these 10 years, eleven players occupied the top position on the ranking, some of them during one uninterrupted period, others at several distinct times.

At the start the reigning world champions Deng Yaping and Jorgen Persson were automatically placed in the top position of the ranking; this lasted until the 1992 World Championships when no precedence was given any more to the champions.

As far as the women are concerned the situation is very simple and very clear: Deng Yaping took the lead from the beginning and only gave away her sceptre in January 1999, when she retired; her position was immediately taken by Wang Nan who is still strongly in the lead today.

On the men's side, nine players have contested the leadership, the tenure being achieved by Jan-Ove Waldner. Jorgen Persson and Jean-Philippe Gatien, the first two leaders, never regained their top ranking once deposed. However, Kong Linghui, having reached the number one spot and been overtaken, regained the position on a further seven occasions.

During the 10-year period, five players have been ranked in the top 20 throughout. Kim Taek Soo (KOR), Jorgen Persson (SWE), Zoran Primorac (CRO), Jean-Michel Saive (BEL) and Jan-Ove Waldner (SWE). However, no female player has managed to achieve the same performance.

On two occasions there has been a tie for first position: in December 1996 when Liu Guoliang and Kong Linghui shared the first place and a second time when Kong Linghui and Jan-Ove Waldner did the same in October 1997.

I am sorry to say that most of our children's clubs in Russia have currently to be run on a shoestring and thus we can't pay big money for films.

Sizzling Chops & Devilish Spins, by Jerome Charyn

(Four Walls Eight Windows, 2001, \$24)

CHARYN'S ART OF STAYING ALIVE

"...wasn't l also a confidence man, tricking people, blowing wool over

their eyes, asking them to take some mystery tour...?" (135)

This unique book by Jerome Charyn, which I hasten to say I recommend, is about ping-pong, yes, but, more entertainingly to me something of a pongiste and table tennis insider whose writings Jerry has borrowed liberally from - the sizzle has less to do with the Game and more to do with the Writer. For the most part, the table tennis history sections of the book "Ping-Pong including Diplomacy" and the backgrounds of Ruth Aarons, Dick Miles, and Marty Reisman, at home or abroad, I'm of course already very familiar with but the interviews with Dr. Jean-Francois Kahn, the International Table Tennis Federation's Sports Science Chair, and Jerry's account of his visit to see Michel Glikman, the 1931 French Champion, plus some of the historic photos, particularly one of young Miles as he graduated from the 8th grade, were to me new and welcome. What most interested me, though, in this "tale of two cities" (New York and Paris), is Charyn's permeating image of himself as a writer cum ping-pong player...as presented through an often romanticized and somewhat schizoid persona. This for me is the soul of the book.

Let it be said that, though the uninitiated reader might not realize it, Charyn, as a table tennis writer, is outsider. ITTF President an Sharara's name is spelled Shakara; World and Olympic Champions Kong Linghui and Liu Guoliang are rendered as Kong Linhgui and Lui Guoliang, Lou Pagliaro, who's shown in a great action shot on the cover of the book, is referred to not as "Paggy" but "Pagi," Reisman's Club at 96th and Broadway is said erroneously to be the "Riverside" Club (but Bobby Gusikoff, who for a decade ran the rival 73rd St. Riverside Plaza Hotel Club, where Miles played, is never mentioned, and his once popular Club, called inaccurately "a poor man's Marty Reisman's," is subsumed under a later guise as "Morris' club on West

Seventy-third Street...in the basement of the Ansonia [Hotel]"), and there are a number of other mistakes - all of which inadvertently make a valid point: namely, that Charyn doesn't really care to be a table tennis insider.

Let it be said, too, that Charvn's "I" persona, who I often think of as a fictional stand-in, a double for the author, certainly considers himself an outsider - in fact, is pleased to be "mongrel," a "wanderer," а "vagabond," a "voyager," a "fellow outlaw" welcomed into "Reisman's band." To Charyn, Reisman, whom he's also dependent on for guite a bit of background in this book, is a USATT-outlaw hero. "The Needle," Charyn's fictional appellation for Marty, suggests a criminal subculture?

What engages me in this always readable book is the way Charyn (who, like all fact/fiction writers, really is a confidence man taking us on tour), has romanticized his to persona reflect "neurosis. rebellion, creativity, and criminality" all attributes of he who comes to Paris to write (a la Hemingway), and also to fiercely play table tennis as a way of saying, like Miles and Reisman, "no to the dominant culture." Indeed, it's these four attributes of the writer/player, which in a moment I'll take up one by one (but unfortunately not in TTN Extra!) that gives some cohesion to what otherwise has to be considered a hodge-podge of a stimulating book. For Charyn, the "Art of Staying Alive" (as he sub-titles his book), has surely as much to do with writing, how that flies, as with the bounce of the ball off his pippled racket.

Which is not to say that Jerry, who says he's ranked 11013th in France, doesn't very much enjoy the Game l've played with him, and he does. It's just that he enjoys writing more. The writer/ping-pong player analogy is inescapable: "What had given me the edge," he says, "was my own unorthodoxy. I played like no one else. And I felt a kind of kinship between table tennis and my scribbling, which had its own wild side...." Editor's Note:

Famous People Who Played Table Tennis

We are indebted to Peter Forrest, who provided all the material for this month's column. He writes:

'Another famous person - possibly the most famous person in Britain after Blair, Posh and Becks - who plays table tennis. This is the opening of a long article I discovered from Q magazine, July 2000:

'You join us at a tense moment in the Hook End pingpong qualifiers. The score stands at 20-12, final game, Britain's toppermost pop star to serve. He allows the ball an inch of air, sells a deceptive forehand dummy then nimbly pirouettes and plays the entire shot from behind his back. This amoral manoeuvre inevitably wrong-foots his opponent and seals the match for the goodlooking lad from Stoke On Trent. "Soz about that," says **Robbie** Williams cheerily. "Couldn't resist it."

He celebrates his table tennis supremacy by assuming a pained expression and breaking wind melodiously.'

He's just been voted best British male singer for the third year in a row at the Brits, though, so is definitely very famous as well as flatulent. I once played against a man called Martin Barre, in the Exeter TT League. I had no idea who he was, except that one of his team-mates said he played electric guitar. I didn't realise till later that he founder member and was а continuing mainstay of Jethro Tull one of the top groups worldwide since 1968. He was modest and charming, and never mentioned his famous credentials, despite my asking all sorts of questions about the guitar he used, etc..

A US band called **Fun-Lovin' Criminals** are very big in Britain and Europe, trading on a tough New York City image. They headline festivals regularly. Their contract always stipulates that a table tennis table is provided in their accommodation.

The French electro-pop band Air had a very successful track in the late 90s called Kelly Watch the Stars. The video for this consisted largely of a table tennis match between two vouna The video's director, women. Mike Mills, says he chose this theme simply because he 'loves the game'. Mills, a former professional skateboarder, is one of the top directors in the world, and this is one of the videos for which he is best known. It was regularly shown on MTV. and can still be seen occasionally on other satellite channels.

A German film magazine on the internet has this to say about the idea of Balls of Fury, the film you mentioned as a table tennis version of Enter the Dragon: 'Oh mein Gott'!

The ITTF describes this book as an official photo document and that really is what it is - nearly 170 pages of colour photographs from 4 major World events: Championships, Eindhoven, 1999; World Championships, Kuala 2000; Olympic Lumpar, Games, 2000; World Sydney, Championships, Osaka, 2001. The forward explains:

"At the World-title events, the supreme competitions where all players aspire to take part, powerful rallies are exchanged and mental battles fought. There are moments that can never be captured by any audio-visual image. There are some scenes not visible to the spectator's The only way to preserve a eve. player's expression forever - photos have that mysterious power of arousing peoples' emotion. Boundless energy and life brought forth by a tiny white ball. And all the ensuing drama. This edition contains all thrills and the fascination of table tennis. All the magic moments."

It might sound trite, but I could add that this collection of photographs does reveal the agony, the ecstasy, the action, the emotion, the drama of crucial points and moments in and top-level matches, the photographs good. are very However, my only small criticism is that although there is great value in recording the jubilation and despair of winning and losing moments, I would have liked to have seen even more (because there are quite a few) pictures and sequences of big and tricky shots, by top table tennis athletes, within the rally and concluding the point.

The narrative, in several languages including English, is minimal, but that is no problem because the photographs largely speak for themselves. One other observation: whereas large crowds often are to be seen in the photographs, too often the 'moment' in table tennis time seems to have witnessed by too been few spectators and the camera only, which makes the photographs an even more valuable record of what happened.

My Table Tennis Story by Tony Jervis, an inmate of HMP Kingston, Portsmouth where he says the warders are very keen on TT.

I arrived at Gartree prison in July 1995, a good allrounder at P.E., but knowing nothing of league table tennis, rubbers, blades or the ETTA. The prison ran a table tennis club twice per week in a large sports hall (4 x badminton courts) with 4 quality tables, one in the middle of each badminton court. Table tennis was also on in each wing association room – the 4 wings having much older metal tables.

I began playing the no.1 in the prison from 6 to 8-30pm every night on the wing, and all day weekends plus in the club sessions. Within 6 months I was ready for the 'B' team at the start of the 95/96 season in the first division, and the player coaching me was in the 'A' team in the premier division (Kettering & District League). My end of season averages in 4 seasons of K.D.T.T.L. 1st division were 43% (1996), 66% (1997), 72% (1998) and 86% (1999-2000) until I was moved to Kingston in Portsmouth in January 2001.

Kingston is a much smaller prison and table tennis tables were only taken out of a cupboard for Xmass competitions here. I began getting them out during dinner times, and sounded out interest on the landings.

The next step was to have them placed in the corner of a large dining room/stage hall, where they would be accessible every evening during association times. The prison then bought 2 new quality Butterfly tables and plenty of 40mm 3* balls. organised a season of friendlies with local teams from the Portsmouth & The matches went well D.T.T.L. but we unfortunately missed this season's league formation meeting, but hope to play in the East Hampshire summer league now the E.T.T.A. have given details.

The hall we play in is ideal for table tennis, with good lighting, a hard floor and space for 3 match tables. Four of us who play regularly have local league experience and a number of stayers are also ex league players. Quality rubbers are scarce, although there are plenty of old bats for keen players to knock up with.

I write to the (equipment mail order) catalogues for old rubbers and have made up bats for anyone seriously interested. Alex Perry sent me his old 'Scrivers' in '97 and I found my game instantly improved. If we get in a league I will save and experiment with 'Bryce', as we tried opponent's rubbers and they are superior to 'Scriver'. Anyone with old 'Bryces' in a reasonable condition and prepared to donate them to our team, could kindly send them to me at H.M.P. Kingston, Portsmouth PO3 6AS.

Top Player Conduct

Most top table tennis players do not take their overall responsibility for promoting the best interests of the game very seriously, although it is interesting to note ITTF President Adham Sharara's concern over recent televised matches not being up to standard owing to the uncaring and nonchalant attitude of some On the conduct of top players. British sportsmen and women generally, a UK Sport survey has revealed that while 80% of spectators think that professional sports people act in a fair way, they also thought that there was an overall decline in sporting conduct over the last 10 years. My own (KM's) view is that top table tennis players generally are a great example of good sporting conduct.

MUHR'S Information MEMO: Officer Messages from Ken Muhr February was a short and frantic month so I apologise if I leave out important media exposure from this column. The national newspapers copy was again led by John Woodford (regularly The in Telegraph) and occasionally in The Express and Daily Mail, and Richard Eaton (who has been writing a little more on table tennis recently) occasionally in The Times and Guardian. 
such as Butterfly Grand Prix results and the planned Chinese super League.

In fact there has been a very big effort to publicise the Championships within a large radius of Sheffield, and I know that some excellent press coverage has been achieved.

This is definitely so when a Butterfly Grand Prix tournament is staged locally, but of course there is much else besides. For example, from the south, Brian Lamerton has sent me full pages achieved in the Southampton Echo, and John Woodford a full page on the local championships closed in the Eastbourne Herald. I am always pleased to receive cuttings.



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VETERANS BRITISH LEAGUE by Jim Beckley

THE POLICE had to come from behind to retain their title as Veterans British League Premier Division champions, writes Jim Beckley.

After the first session in Stoke they trailed Ryelands by two points. But they came out fighting and although they slipped up against Ryelands in the last match of the weekend by then they knew they had done enough to win.

This was a weekend to forget for the Ryelands players who clearly lacked the support of Scottish international Richard Yule. But give the Belles their due. They played with the same three players throughout and it came off. Sheila King, Helen Shields and Sandra Harper pulled out all the stops with each finishing in the 80% or above. Three whitewashes against Ryelands, Colleens and Worcester Ladies gave

them an unbeatable sets advantage.

But no close results in the ladies Division One. HEL Ladies were clear winners finishing six points clear of the nearest rivals Combined Counties with Merseysider Brenda Buoey finishing with 90%.

Tameside came down from the mens Premier Division last season after finding the going too tough. Well this time they started well leading the first division on sets average and looking comfortable leaders. But they were finally edged out by eventual winners Potters Leisure Resort in a Sunday morning clash.

Ellenborough will move up to the first division next season after a good all round performance from their four players who failed to get into the top five averages but whose all round performances won the day.

Cippenham were the clearest of winners in Division three finishing the tournament with a six point lead from South Essex. With Clive Payne finishing with a creditable 100%.

Batts Bulldogs finished unbeaten and claimed promotion by a clear margin of five points with Fred Lockwood, Neil Brierley and George Reeves all finishing in the high 70/80 % averages.

But if Colebridge ladies failed to clinch the premiership title, their men will be well pleased with their performances in winning Division 5. Again the same three players dominated the weekend with Neil Wheatley, Barry Hunt and Roy Prosser the heroes.

The importance of table tennis was emphasised by the Mayor of Halton Councillor Chris Loftus who said, before handing out the trophies, how important the competition and the publicity it brought to the town was.

But perhaps the loudest applause of the closing ceremonies went to organiser Gill Smith whose diminutive form was half hidden by a big floral display of flowers presented to her by referee Alan Duke on behalf of all the players and officials.

THE FOSKER REPORT



This column has been picking its way through league handbooks to look at the different ways leagues approach problems with the intention of giving food for thought to management committees and AGMs up and down the land. It has looked separately at postponements, walkovers, playing up, start times and points systems. In the process, various other snippets have caught the eye. So as a final round-up, this month's column looks at some novel approaches and idiosyncrasies, writes Ron Fosker.

How, for instance, do you deal with misbehaviour, either administrative or on the table. Most leagues have a fines system, with fines in some cases as little as \$1. Table tennis players may not be on footballers' salaries but that must be a fairly limited deterrent – and something of a nightmare to administer. Some leagues prefer to take away points, or suspend or expel miscreants, or act 'as they see fit' as Maidstone has it. Reading threatens to 'suspend privileges'. Sorry, lads, no more Rolls Royces or executive suites.

Some of the misdemeanours are clearly spelt out, suggesting an attempt to stop a repeat of something that embarrassed them in the past. 'The insertion of fictitious results on scorecards' will result in the team being 'severely fined', says Sunderland. Yes, we've all seen those. Similarly Eastbourne will suspend for a year players playing under assumed names.

There are leagues that refuse to allow teams to have Saturday or Sunday as home nights. Others probably don't think it necessary as no one has ever asked. None of the handbooks I looked at included teams playing at the weekend apart, that is, from Braintree, my own league where one club - mine, as it happens – has been playing on a Sunday for more than 20 years. It would be naive to pretend this has been universally popular but it has been gradually grudgingly accepted. Indeed two other clubs later adopted Sunday as a home night and one year there were more teams playing on a Sunday than any other night.

It started because it was the only way to fit in eight teams on two tables in a venue that had only one evening free during the week. But it

came to be favoured by a number of players, particularly those who commuted to London and were saved the dash back home and late appearance at matches that weekdays involve.

Other snippets worth noting:

Eastbourne bans people playing two matches on the same evening A number of leagues refuse to allow teams to play with one player

Two leagues ban smoking, Stamford asks that the room temperature

should be around 13 degrees C.

West Essex tackles the problem of the strong player from a neighbouring league having a disproportionate effect on the league table by popping in to play a couple of games: 'A player from another league will have their registration cancelled if they have not played three games by 31 January, unless ranked below the three most regular players.'

The length of the rules section

varies, but normally runs to around four pages of the handbook. Reading leaves no stone unturned and occupies 16 tightly printed pages.

Reading's contact list helpfully gives not just the address of the venue, but directions how to get there.

And finally a personal gripe. Numerous rules are infected by estate agent-speak, where you don't buy or sell a house, you purchase or vend a property. Matches invariably commence rather than start, people become persons and things happen 'prior to' rather than 'before'. One league even asks for its teams to be ranked in meritorious order.

So, a meritorious suggestion: Get the blue pencil out.


However after being pushed to beat second-to-bottom placed JAGS 8-6 they won't allow complacency to set in. JAGS put up a magnificent showing and actually led 6-5 in a match where no single player remained undefeated. There were shocks galore with former Lithuanian international Lorestas Trumpauskas avenging an opening 0-3 defeat against Jason Sugrue by sensationally getting the better of Marco Essomba 11-8 in the fifth end (only Essomba's second defeat). Trumpauskas went on to beat County colleague Cris Sladden 3-1. Sugrue was a shock 3-1 victim of Abdul Wuraola whilst Sladden was also beaten 3-1 by an inspired Clive Carthy who had previously defeated highly impressive newcomer Tomek Gretschell 12-10 in the decider. With the pressure mounting Progress produced a finish worthy of the "Champions-elect" as Essomba despatched Carthy (7,7,9) Gretschell (who had been unbeaten in the division One South weekend in December) saw off Wuraola (8,8,7) and Sugrue completed the job by beating Selwyn Campbell (13,8,9)

BATTS Team Peniel trail Progress by six points but made it 6 wins out of 9 after beating Byng Hall Farningham Print I, 9-5 and then proceeding to get the better of a slightly under strength Wellow House School very convincingly 12-2. John Holland was unbeaten in both matches whilst Chris Jamieson excelled against Wellow House by also staying undefeated. COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS by Stan Clarke


CHESHIRE & SURREY WIN W CADET DIVISIONS

SAFIRS INTERNATIONAL 2002

ENGLAND SUCCESS IN SWEDEN

THE SAFIRS INTERNATIONAL 2002, one of Sweden's premier grand prix tournaments, was an ideal event for an England squad, blended with a mix of youth and experience to compete in, writes Bradley Billington.

With 621 competitors from 18 nations, 28 categories and 37 tables it was the largest tournament many of our 11 strong squad had played in.

The opening day saw the mens and womens 'Elite' category. The strength of the competition evident with the first round exit of Swedish international Frederick Hakansson. Both Andrew Rushton and Dale Barham qualified through the groups but were eliminated in round one, as were Katy Parker and Kate Steward in the womens. Nicola Deaton also went out first round as Helen Lower progressed through the first round but lost a close match to Ito from Japan.

That evening, alongside the staged semi finals, a friendly international between Sweden Cadets B team and our young side of Bradley Evans, Paul Drinkhall and Darius Knight was being keenly contested. A resounding 3-0 victory for England was to be a the start of a successful weekend for the talented trio.

The boys followed up this performance with some quality play in the individual competition. Bradley reaching the semi finals of the under 13's, Paul winning the under 12's and Darius taking the under 11's title. At times their play was of a very high standard and their quality of shot selection under pressure was a key feature of their matchplay.

Success for Nicola Deaton and Helen Lower in the womens doubles showed that they have the potential to do well in this event at the Commonwealth Games this summer. With semi final and final victories over Japanese opposition, the two performed admirably and as the tournament progressed began to look an accomplished partnership. Dale and Andrew also did well reaching the quarter finals of the mens doubles.

More success came in the girls with Joanna Parker winning the under 14's and reaching the semi final of the under 15's. Kate Steward, Katy Parker and Georgina Walker all played well and reached the quarter finals of the under 17's. Suggesting that the depth

of the junior girls squad this year is strong enough to push for higher places at this years European Youths in Moscow.

They all played in many more categories but these were the highlights from their main events. The development of the three youngsters shows that there is a fantastic base of talent on which to build.....and as table tennis enthusiasts we should pull together so that the opportunities for such talent to blossom remain in place.

The tournament itself was a shining example to all involved in the 'real' purpose of tournaments.....for players to be playing. 621 players, 28 events,37 tables...with only the elite on Friday, this left 26 events to be played over two days! No problems whatsoever. Playing numerous events, players (with their own individually printed schedules from the organisers) were on and off playing matches throughout the weekend. The most notable feature was that there was not any 'periods of nothing happening' and free tables with no matches on for long periods.....a sight unfortunately all too familiar at many English tournaments.

The concept of having under 10,11,12,13,14,15,17,20 plus senior



banded events is one which I feel we could adopt in this country. The opportunity for youngsters to play in their own categories alongside top seniors is one which should appeal to the masses of tournament goers.The quality of organising here shows that it is possible to hold such an event and one which I feel could benefit the future of our competitive structure. We have the organisational and refereeing experience to do it....lets draw upon it.

The club's formation was initiated by the Portsmouth & District Table Tennis Association as part of its Development plan, with the intention to concentrate on junior player development with the longer term objective of arresting the decline in league competition.

The club gained ETTA Advanced Premier Club status in 2000

• Affiliation: the club is managed by a steering committee headed by the P&DTTA's Chairman Brian Hall. While the Association retains an interest in the club's affairs through appointees to the management committee, the club has become largely independent in its operation and finances.
