FURTHER SUPPORT FOR TABLE TENNIS CLUBS TO UPGRADE

THE Foundation for Sport & the Arts that supported table tennis facility projects to the extent of more than \$500,000 in the 1990's is considering applications via the ETTA **Development Department for** further support for table tennis clubs. This programme supports Premier Clubs who submit proposals to assist them to upgrade or refurbish existing buildings to facilitate the playing of table tennis. The grants for individual schemes endorsed and recommended by the ETTA will range from \$5,000 to **£15,000**.

Applications can include improved flooring, lighting or heating, refitted toilet or changing areas, access for the disabled, improvements to the building or provision for equipment storage. The first scheme that the ETTA have recommended is for the Byng Hall TT Club in Tunbridge Wells, Kent. This project is a joint venture between the club and the St. John's C of E Primary School in Tunbridge. The grant, if approved, will contribute to the upgrading of lighting and the provision of a sprung floor. The hall will be big enough to accommodate six match tables or up to 10 tables for coaching, and will enable the club to significantly expand its activities. Some other schemes are in the pipeline and there has been considerable interest shown in this new project. Any clubs interested should contact in the first instance their Regional Development Officer or Paul Baker the ETTA Facilities Officer to discuss their ideas. The previous grants from the FSA

supported via the ETTA for new build table tennis centres in Cippenham, Cirencester, Isle of Wight, St. Austell, Mossford (London), Guildford, Widnes, Hyndburn, Bolton, Hull, Scarborough, Barrow and Dewsbury.

EURO KIDS TO CONTINUE

The European Table Tennis Union are continuing with their programme to bring together the best Under 12's in Europe for week long training camps. Two camps have been held so far this year in Italy and in Luxembourg. Three more will take place over the next 12 months, the first one in France in December. At the last camp in Luxembourg Darius Knight was nominated by the ETTA and was selected by the coaches as one of the leading prospects. At the previous camp Bradley Evans and Paul Drinkhall participated in addition to Darius, however, at the time of the Luxembourg camp they were both part of the

England team participating in competitions and training in China. In a recent report commissioned by Sport England, former World Champion, Stellan Bengtsson attended the National Training Centre in Nottingham and gave an opinion that the group of Under 12 players in England were amongst the best in Europe, so that whilst the performances of our senior teams this season have not been as good as we would have liked, the youngest age category are clearly impressive.

EURO SPORT TO COVER THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS The 2002 European

Championships which are to be played in Zagreb, Croatia from Easter Saturday, 30 March 2002 through to 7th April, has attracted extensive television coverage on the Euro Sport channel. The team event finals, plus the semi finals and finals of the singles events are to be broadcast with approximately 8 hours of coverage being agreed. The coverage of the Leibherr European Champions League is still under discussion between the ITTF and the broadcasters and further details will be issued as soon as they have been finalised.

The European Championships have been selected by the ITTF as the venue for this season's ITTF Annual General Meeting so that the major meetings for both the European and World bodies will both take place in Zagreb.

Two of the main items on the ITTF agenda will be further consideration given to the wording of the new service rule which is due to be introduced in September of next year, and consideration of the launching of a new competition, the World Junior Championships.

JUNIOR AGE DATE CHANGE?

For this competition the ITTF are seriously considering changing the age qualification for the junior and cadet events from lst July, as at present, to fit in with the calendar year of lst January. This change would make a significant difference to the junior programme as it is likely that the new date will be imposed for all junior international open events and, therefore, would cascade down to both national and county events. The rationale behind the change from the ITTF is that most of the continents operate the calendar year as opposed to the European year traditionally season to season which has been the norm. Executive Committee which met in Luxembourg at the end of October are unanimously opposed to this change and will be lobbying in Zagreb and before to reject the change. The qualification dates are within the ITTF International regulations and therefore only 51% majority vote is needed for the change at a meeting of the ITTF Board of Directors (formerly the ITTF Council)

DATE CHANGE FOR THE EUROPE TOP 12

The Europe Top 12 tournament which was scheduled to be held in Rotterdam on 2/3 February 2002 has been moved to a week later, 9/10 February to suit television schedules in the Netherlands. TABLE TENNIS INCLUDED IN OLYMPIC YOUTH TOURNAMENT

The French Table Tennis Federation have been successful in their bid to have table tennis included in the multisport European Youth Olympic Days competition which is to be played in Paris in July 2003. Table Tennis was included in this competition when it was played in Belgium in the early 1990's but has not been one of the ten sports involved since that time. The age limit which is to be recommended by the ETTU and the French Federation is Under 15. This event in date terms is very close to the European Youth Championships and, therefore, the top youngsters of Under 17 and Under 14 level will be heavily involved in the Youth championships in Yugoslavia. This competition in Paris gives youngsters in their first year out of the cadet age group the opportunity of a major

international competition in which to participate. The competition is under the auspices of the European Olympic Committee.

EURO TALENTS

In addition to the Euro Kids programme, the ETTU are introducing a second high level training programme for the best 10 - 15 youngsters at the Under 16 age level in Europe under the title EURO TALENTS. The aims which are to be delivered through three training camps per season are to create a training environment for Europe's best youngsters to play together so as to enable them to challenge the world's top players, now mainly from Asia, in the future. It is also intended to run coach education programmes in conjunction with the training camps.

These two programmes will be partly financed by the ETTU and the national associations whose players participate and sponsors. The next Euro Kids week in France is to be sponsored by Vittel.

COMMONWEALTH GAMES TICKETS

In the last issue of Table Tennis News I gave readers full details of how to obtain tickets for the Commonwealth Games in Manchester next summer. Brian Stocks who is Head of the Sports Division in Manchester has advised that the ticket sales for the Games at this stage are exceeding all expectations and that supporters who wish to be sure of obtaining tickets need to book now.

YORKSHIRE VALUE

Table tennis fans in Yorkshire enjoyed two interesting and exciting European League matches over the last month. England men were beaten 3 -1 in Halifax by Spain, but the England women recorded their first victory of the season with an even more exciting win over Poland in Scarborough.

In the Polish match, Helen Lower opened the England scoring with one of her best performances to beat Monika Pietkiewiez This was followed by two cliff hangers as Katy Parker won the battle of the number three's against Magdalena Gorowska at 11-7, 9-11, 11-13, 11-3, 11-8 and then Nicola Deaton won her singles against Monika Pietkiewiez in a match that lasted three quarters of an hour and finished at 23-21 in the decider (using the 11 up scoring system!).

The England men's team were beaten 3 - 1 by Spain with Alex Perry scoring the lone England victory. Gareth Herbert's play swung from patches of brilliance to spells when he appeared to miss or miss hit relatively easy shots. If the brilliant spells had been a bit longer, the result could have easily turned in England's favour. In both matches the audience witnessed exciting and interesting contests. The match was staged at the Halifax Sports Centre and supported by the Calderdale Council and the Halifax Table Tennis League. The matches started just after 7 pm and finished shortly before 10 pm

and were some of the best European League matches that I have seen from an interest and competitive perspective. Perhaps it is the 11 up system that is making the difference ?

The Women's match was played in the recently built Scarborough Table Tennis Centre at the Graham School. From a design and appearance perspective it is one of the best centres in the country. It was good to see that the Centre is proving very popular with the local table tennis community and that John Caton and his team in Scarborough are very pleased with the very extensive use that the centre is experiencing.

POLISH PRESIDENT BECOMES MINISTER OF SPORT

Adam Giersz, the very active President of the Polish Table Tennis Federation, who established the table tennis academy in Gdansk and is behind the running of the Polish Pro Tour event, has been appointed by the Polish government as the new Minister of Sport. Adam is perhaps better known in England as the popular coach who always accompanied Andrezj Grubba on his many visits to play in events and matches in this country. Congratulations and best wishes are extended to Adam in his new important position!

IGNORED

AT a recent Regional coaches meeting we South West coaches heard about the work going on in our region/leagues, or with Primary School children - usually 10-11 year olds. Our own small league has 11 clubs catering for some 200 young players. Some of them (sometimes with parents also playing) have filtered into the Bridgwater League, which has increased in size by 22% this season.

It was argued that we should provide more regional competition for young players at 11-12 level. This should provide a more numerous base of young players for the game.

It was clear that a National Committee has passed along an edict that an 11-14 Regional League should be formed and that was it!

However, it was suggested that under 14's are either committed players doing the Open's, etc., or late enthusiasts to the sport with uncertain futures. In one case the under 14 league would be just another fixture, or in the other too difficult.

An under 12 league would eventually feed an under 14 league and it was voted unanimously that a regional under 12 League should be formed. This appears to have been ignored!

I sadly predict that table tennis will decay further if local coaches' views are ignored. Can the same be said for these National Committee who tell us what to do and otherwise ignore us?

DIFFERENT GAME

FOR the first time ever I did not looking forward to the start of the table tennis season. Quite simply because two of the Leagues I play in have switched to the 11up game. The tempo of which makes it an entirely different game and in my opinion nowhere near as enjoyable. With 11up doubles, due to the constant change of server and receiver, proving particularly hard for both players and umpire to adjust to.

Fortunately, I am registered for teams playing in three other Leagues which have decided to continue playing 21up. So taking into account the enjoyment factor I will be playing as many games as possible 21up and as few as possible 11up. Partly because I don't enjoy playing 11up and partly because the two Leagues concerned involve far more travelling and I would be likely to spend more time on the road than on the table.

The problem as I see it being that any players dropping out will cause a disproportionate amount of disruption and loss of income both to the County and the ETTA. Saying this because these days most players are in the habit of playing in a number of Leagues, so one doesn't necessarily equal one anymore, but anything from one to five.

With, I would suggest, any League losing as the Season progresses, significant numbers of players as a consequence of the switch to 11up, holding a Special General Meeting with a view to reverting to 21up for the Second Half. *Micbael Bunting*

Editor's Note: I am sorry to hear that you are having difficulties with the new 11up scoring system Michael, but your suggestion that would see Leagues return to 21up would create administrative problems as well as playing difficulties. It would only sensibly work in the lower league divisions, otherwise it would unfairly inhibit the progress of senior, junior and veteran players of the Premier and 1st divisions, who also play in open tournaments, County Championships and British League.

Your statement that you are spending more time travelling than playing table tennis differs with mine. My early season experience both as an umpire in County Championships, and as a player in local league, seems to prove that playing best of five 11up is reasonably popular and takes approximately the same length of time as a 21up best of three game.

Anyway it's early days yet. I can remember the furore raised when the new 40mm ball was introduced, now most players say it's fine.

Even Europe's top player Vladimir Samsonov commented at the German Open recently, see page 10, that he was unhappy before the new ball and the 11up system came in, but now he is okay with it, and stated, "I support 11 points - it's definitely right for the sport."

• **THERE** is a saying in old Czechoslóvakia (acknowledgment to "The Manor Born") -"I do not agree with what he says, but I will defend to the death his right to say it".

• **SERIOUSLY**, I hope that by the time these words appear, the members of Mancom who so unwisely hooted down their colleague Brian Halliday when he suggested that John Prean be allowed to write some carefully worded articles for Table Tennis News, will have had a rethink.

• **AS** I have said before, I am sometimes labelled "an Alan Ransome man" because I support him in a number of ways, but not in all his policies and of course by speaking up for John Prean on his magazine veto, some will say I should move to the Isle of Wight and be a complete John Prean man!

• **THE EUROPEAN** Court of Human Rights sometimes surprises me with the apparent triviality of some of the cases it deals with and sometimes upholds. I suspect that when it comes to the rights of contributors to national sports magazines, much would depend on how they saw the strength or weakness of the editing process.

• **THIS** magazine, as I may have said before, has three editing forces - Brian Halliday, Mancom and John Wood. I am not saying to Mancom that a house magazine does not have the right to stop the publication of certain critical material including personal abuse.

• **I AM** quite sure that no harm would be done by allowing Brian Halliday to oversee John Prean articles. Last word on this subject for now - had I been in Mr Halliday's position I would have resigned from Mancom on this issue.

• **LOOKING** ahead on the fixture list, I am hoping to be courtside at most of the events including the German Open, Swedish Open and all the home European League fixtures. Plans to run an English Open in 2002 have been abandoned and moved to 2003.

• **THAT LEAVES THE TWO** major events in the first half of 2002 as the European Championships in Zagreb starting on March 30 and of course the Commonwealth Championships in Manchester July 25-August 4 at the City of Manchester stadium where Matthew Syed will attempt to win the Commonwealth gold medal for the fourth time. Tickets are now on sale.

• **THERE IS A** new theory being put forward by Alan Ransome and others in the power corridors (which is extremely difficult to prove) on the number of players in England compared with the past.

• ALMOST every league in England has suffered losses of players and teams in the last decade. Some leagues who had twelve divisions now have six, but the decline has slowed down. The new theory is that we have many more people playing table tennis because of a "huge rise" in participation in schools and table tennis centres and clubs, especially with movements like the Premier Club scheme.

• **THE THEORY** of lots and lots of new, young players emerging from schools and top clubs is great but can we prove that this influx can anywhere near match in numbers the league losses over the past decade? Heads can be counted in leagues, but trying to count the new young players seems to me to be impossible.

GREAT EXCEPTION

I TAKE great exception to the remarks made by John Woodford, that were published in the September and October editions of Table Tennis News, relating to Helen Lower's conduct.

In the September issue, commenting on the Grand Prix Finals, he writes: "What happened to Helen Lower? She came to Potters, stayed the previous night, found she had been drawn in the same group as Barbara Kiss and headed back home."

I must assume John Woodford hasn't heard of the telephone, else he could have asked Helen, 'Why?

before his article was published.

To set the record straight, the reason why Helen did not stay was due to being misinformed by the ETTA Head Office over her playing schedule. Helen had entered both the Doubles and Singles (but due to holidays she didn't know if her doubles partner had entered). However, three days before the event was to take place, she had not received her playing schedule. She therefore telephoned the ETTA Office for information and she was informed that her first doubles match was in the morning and her singles group match would be in the late afternoon. On arrival at Potters at 10am Helen was informed she was not in the doubles as her partner had not entered and her group matches would start at 5pm, leaving her a seven hour wait, which is no way to prepare for a tournament, plus her knowing that leading players would only be playing one game to claim the prize money. It was for these reasons why she decided not to stay.

In the October issue, reporting on the Home Countries Senior International, he writes: "CONFUSED - On match point against her (Katy Parker), Helen hit the ball, according to most spectators, six inches off. She raised her finger for an edge ball - the umpire was confused and gave the point to Helen."

Yes, Helen did raise her hand, only to apologise for winning the point from an edge. Katy did not dispute the point, which the umpire accepted. Anyone who knows Helen, be it player or umpire, knows that she is completely fair over disputed points, even to the point where she will stop the game to be sure her opponent wins the point when deserved. 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

ITTF PRO TOUR - GERMAN OPEN

MASTER SAMSONOV

VLADIMIR SAMSONOV



VLADIMIR SAMSONOV. 25, No.7 in the world is the master of European table tennis. Now living in Charleroi in Belgium and he has recently become a Dad, he is, it appears, reaching the peak of his career after crushing Jan-Ove Waldner 7, 2, 6, 6 in the semi-finals of the German Open in Bayreuth, writes John Woodford.

Samsonov went on to the final, where he easily beat off a challenge from Werner Schlager 6, 8, 10, 4.

Analysing Samsonov's game is not easy. His accuracy is the key. When attacked he usually stands a pace back to produce a top-spin counter-hit that frequently has his opponents floundering.

His progress through the draw went like this - Daniel Zwicki (10, 8, 5, 4); Maksim Chmyrev (9, 6, 9, 5); Oh Sang Eun (Korea) (13, -11, 3, 10, -4, 4), finishing off with Waldner and Schlager. Jan-Ove did complain of a back problem towards the end of the tournament. But as he said at the press conference: "I do have a problem keeping up with the fitness of the younger players. I am now playing only in the Swedish League. I hope to keep going for some time yet. I am not going to make any forecasts ahead. Barring injury, I shall be playing in the European Championships in Croatia, regarding the Olympics in Athens, I will wait and see.'

Samsonov's comments: I am happy with the new ball and the eleven points scoring. I admit I was unhappy before the new ball came in and before 11 points came in, but now I am O.K. I support 11 points - it is definitely right for the sport. The new service rules could bring many problems for players and umpires from next September.

Clearing two points - the Japanese team failed to arrive in Bayreuth because they were worried by the attacks by the terrorists in New York. The Chinese nationals found a better excuse for their absence - a clash with their national games, all sports, difficult to miss out

table tennis, obviously.

There was one Chinese player present -Ma Wenge winner of the English Open and the holder of the German title. He lives in Europe, but he went under to a fine show by Patrick Chila who went through to the quarters 8, -5, 4, 11, 9 against Ma Wenge.

RYU WINS WOMENS

Now for the top ladies - the winner from Korea now lives in France - Rvu Ii Hve. In the final she took a few minutes to become familiar with Jie Schopp's chop losing the first game 6 ; after that the Korean patiently piled on the top-spin into the German woman's defences to win 7,7,1,4.

Mihaela Steff (Romania) the top seed was at the receiving end of the biggest shock of the four-day tournament when in the first round of the womens singles she was floored 8 in the seventh by Petra Lovas (Hungary) who is ranked around eight in Hungary.

In the next round however, the Hungarian Lovas was easily defeated 4, 9, 6, 1, by another Korean Kim Kyang Ah.

Vyktoria Pavolich (Belarus) is a name I was not familiar with. But it seems she is quite a player - she brought down Krisztina Toth 6 in the seventh to reach the semi-finals where she fell into the Schopp backpsin trap, beaten 7, 8, 6, 10.

BRIGHT SPOTS

The English contingent did not have a great tournament. Leaving Gareth Herbert behind with a wrist strain was not a good start, but Alex Perry in the mens singles came within touching distance of victory before losing in seven games to the former Polish player ~ No.3. Michal Dziubanski. Perry, the pride of Devon and Nottingham, levelled the Pole at 2-2 and led 9-6 in the fifth game but Alex could not hold the advantage. Neither Nicky Deaton or Helen Lower reached their best form in Bayreuth. Both secured single victories in the qualifying rounds but that was not

enough' to go onwards.

England's best show came in the mens doubles when Perry and Terry Young came through two rounds. In the second round they defeated a highly rated pair -Chen Wei Xing (Austria) and a top-rated chopper from Belarus Evgeni

Chtchetinine, before losing to Zoran Primorac and Roko Tosic from Belarus.

A general comment from Soren Ahlen: "All our players battled hard. I was especially impressed by Andrew Rushton on this trip"

Finishing with the Mens Under-21 event where Rushton almost won his group but not quite - bear in mind that Rushton and Adam Robertson were playing against men mainly three years older.

FIELD DAY Adam had a field day. In his first season as a senior player he made a breakthrough following a lean time over the past six months.

FOOTNOTE: Bayreuth is a small town famous for its connections with the composer Richard Wagner whose house is now a museum complete with Wagner music for the tourists to enjoy.

Why Marco appears only on the English dummy ranking list is unclear. He has been resident in England for sometime, like Barbara Kiss who gets a full ranking at No.6.

For the record, on the October 1 list, Marco had amassed 4037 points which puts him in twelfth position on the England list. His first grand prix victory was at Hastings,13 months ago. However, the Torbay event was not, unfortunately, awash with star players, which is hardly surprising when we count up the number of top players appearing on the continent.

Adam Robertson the Welsh No.2 in his first season as a senior is not quite maintaining the progress that we all had hoped for during the past two years. He was an Essomba victim 8, 8, 8, in the mens singles quarters and again lost to Essomba (and Jason Sugrue) in the mens doubles final partnered by Stephen Jenkins.

Prague and the ever-present Hungarian Barbara Kiss who is a student living in North Middlesex.



The England Women's Team 3-1 win over a young side from Poland is their first European League First Division win for a long time and represents a huge psychological boost. It was also an excellent team effort, Helen Lower and young Katy Parker putting in fine singles performances, and Nicola Deaton, although below par in losing her first singles, demonstrated tremendous courage and fighting spirit to overcome Monika Pietkiewicz 23-21 in the fifth (!) from 2 games down, to give England the match.

It was a tremendously exciting match and the lady mayor and the packed house at Scarborough Table Tennis Centre loved it. England NPC Alan Cooke considered Nicola's last game an 'absolute epic and that the up-to-11 scoring system, with more pressure points, added to the tension and entertainment value.

Terry Young, who has been losing too many frustratingly close singles, has had recent greater international success as a doubles player. After going through 2 rounds with Alex Perry in the German Open Pro Tour in Bayreuth, he partnered Austrian Robert Gardos to reach the Dutch **Open Pro Tour (Rotterdam) men's** doubles last 16, with good wins over Czechs Plachy and Vozicky and Germans Steger and Wosik. The Anglo-Austrian pair finally fell over 5 games to Korean top seeds, Lee Chul Seung and Ryu Seung Min.

They are now both out of the respective age group categories, but the only British players in the **European Youth Ranking List** following the Youth Championships in Terni in late July, were **Joanna Parker (England), no. 19 in the cadet girls, and Adam Robertson** (Wales), no.13 in the junior boys. However, **expect Katy Parker back soon** following her recent return to form.

It has been put to me that juniors and cadets do not get enough publicity in Table Tennis News and I tend to They need the recognition for agree. their efforts. I have previously advocated a 'With The Juniors' column on the lines that Laurie Landry produced many years ago, but we need a volunteer for this. Meanwhile, send in to John Wood and your myself. letters, articles. competition reports and photographs about improving youngsters and we will try to put them in. Incidentally, as I write I am pleased to learn how well the South of England Counties Cadet Championship went at Westergate, Sussex on 3rd November, and no doubt similar regional divisions around the country went of this very welcome addition to the County Championships.

Jon Kaufman has suggested using the senior British League to promote itself and junior table tennis by having junior matches as curtain raisers to Premier Division League ties. London Progress apparently invited visitors Batts Team Peniel to bring a junior team to their last home fixture to compete against a team of youngsters of their own, and this match proved to be a very popular experiment, a bonus being that the juniors then boosted the audience for the senior match. London Progress will now repeat this junior match formula at future British League matches and encourage other Premier Division clubs to do the same.

Regarding a slightly older age group, **Mike Payne** (<u>mipayne@ontel.net.uk</u>) is of course a **great advocate of university table tennis.** He encourages league secretaries to contact university clubs (he or Jo Kirk at BUSA on <u>Joanne@busa.org.uk</u> can provide a list of those they know of) about entering local league teams for season 2002/2003 or to encourage

them to enter the BUSA team competition next season. University playing students are also TT encouraged to enter the Universities Individual Championships in Warwick on 16th/17th (closing date 17th January). February Further details available from Mike or Jo. То publicise university table tennis activities, contact Mairi Irvine (Mairi@busa.org.uk) or Mike, and you can also send interesting items to John Wood or myself for TTN.

As we went to press with the October TTN, we were shocked and saddened to learn of the (too sudden) death of Mike Watts through cancer. Worthier people than I pay tribute elsewhere, but Mike, a modest and sincere man, was a true enthusiast of table tennis who did a gigantic amount for the game, both as a volunteer and a professional. I doubt if anyone can get to grips with the full extent of his involvement, and much will be left un-noted. Nick Standen told me that Mike even ran a British League, team while he was working as ETTA Events Manager in Hastings, and Bill Clark, former chairman of the Milton Keynes League, said that he used to play football with Mike in Southend in the 60's, before Mike moved on to a higher level of play – he was later also to become a football referee.

Key recommendations of Dr Jack Cunningham's Funding Review of Elite Sports are: support for 'modernisation' of governing bodies (e.g. in IT), need for further development of high quality coaching and club structures, the production of integrated lottery plans with one lead body for World Class Programmes for Olympic/Paralympic sports (like table tennis), and revisions to athletes' funding arrangements. Subject to the Government's response, they could have major implications for elite sport, including table tennis.

MUHR'S MEMO: Information Officer Messages from Ken Muhr

Again not a great deal to report on in the national media, although John Woodford virtuously gets table tennis , snippets regularly in The Daily Telegraph, and occasionally in other dailies through his Press Association copy. Soren Ahlen, as a governing body of sport 'overseas invader', got a tiny mention in a Guardian article about the new Australian chief executive of Sport England, David Interestingly, he also did a Moffett. 6 minute BBC Radio Leeds interview after the England men lost to Spain in Halifax, a comparison with the Swedish, England football manager Sven Goran Eriksson apparently being made.

The biggest table tennis feature was the two thirds of a broadsheet page given in The Independent on Sunday by Jonathan Thompson about the general aspects of our sport. It was fairly basic stuff but gave contact numbers and this kind of exposure is very valuable to us. I was also very gratified when a two page article, together with photos of an attractive model playing, a front-page billing ('Burn fat fast with Table Tennis (we kid you not)') and several quotes by myself, finally appeared in the November Slimming magazine. The health and fitness aspects of table tennis and the famous people who play it can continue to be successfully promoted.

Table tennis very nearly got a rare mention in The Sun. However, I blew it when I told their reporter that I thought it highly unlikely that the 4 hours 18 minutes he had read (in a local paper) that it had taken to complete a Huddersfield League match, made it the longest ever local league match. In my experience many matches have gone on longer and my first 'phone call after speaking to The Sun, bore this out: Brian Halliday told me about a match in the Reading League about 10 years ago, between Sonning Common and Post Office, that had gone on for 6 hours 15 minutes (finishing at 1-45am!), with 6 of the 10 sets going to expedite! Beat that! I think that hearing about some of the longest ever local league matches would be a fascinating feature for future editions of TTN Extra – contributions are invited – and maybe even for local media.

Did anyone see Hung Kei Li on BBC TV Newsround? It has been recorded but I am not sure whether it has been broadcast.

There is always much more table tennis media coverage in the regions that I am specifically aware of (correspondents, please tell me). For example, Butterfly Grand Prix's nearly always generates a lot, and it is really only because I work locally that I was able to see in print the extensive press coverage in Sussex by John Woodford and myself for the Sussex Open Butterfly Grand Prix in Hastings, and I also know that Ritchie Venner was interviewed by BBC Southern Counties Radio. International matches also still generate a lot of local (if not national) interest, and I know for example from the extensive communication with the Halifax Courier that they will have given the England v Spain men's European League First Division tie much space. Likewise, Colin Deaton tells me that Nicola's photograph was on the front page of the Sheffield Star following England women's 3-1 victory over Poland in Scarborough.

The 2002 Commonwealth Games in Manchester, 25th July – 4th August (tel. 0161 240 2002, fax. 0161 240 2004, e-mail. info@manchester2002.co.uk website. www.commonwealthgames.com should increasingly generate table tennis media exposure, and our best title hope for a gold medal, Matthew Sved, who hopes to become Commonwealth men's singles champion for a record 4th time, had a small feature and photo about himself in the 5^{th} edition of the publicity magazine Our Games. There will be 200 hours of coverage on BBC terrestrial TV for the Games so table tennis should get a very good look in, particularly if we are successful. Incidentally, the Games are still looking for volunteers: tel. 0845 345 3457 or write to: Volunteers, Manchester 2002, PO Box 2002, Manchester M60 3RP.

Bits of advice I gleaned from a UK Sport media study day are: BBC -'promote healthy and active lifestyles through participation and use the power of **sport** to help people develop and improve their lives', build up personalities (can be used for programmes such as Blue Peter and Saturday morning show) particularly focussing on new heroes for the Athens 2004 Olympics (too soon for us!), take up on an ad hoc basis TV and radio broadcasting opportunities as they arise, be receptive to new ideas and create links with media personnel; UK Sport - Maximise your presence on the internet making the most of your resources (keep it simple, engage the user, be unique in content, keep it up to date etc), think 'out of the box' to get media coverage.

The BBC Sport Academy is being launched in the late spring 2002 on **BBC** Online and it will be about participation in different sports (initially the major ones). The ETTA continues to make endeavours to get more table tennis on terrestrial television and Matthew Syed has recently met the BBC to discuss However, although possibilities. more than anything else I am asked by our members why the ETTA does not get table tennis on terrestrial TV, it is much tougher than they are aware badminton and squash are also frustrated by this.

Finally, as it was not mentioned in the October issue, I think it only right that I should give Mighty Walzer author Howard Jacobson's word's about our new Random House supported ETTA Press Officer of the Year Award winner, Steve Kerns: "He wrote with a bit of zest, giving the drama of play, the strokes and the sense you were there. He was more absorbed in matches, the comedy of it, the social by-play." A good example for other press officers to emulate.



Gloucestershire by Alf Pepperd

Editor's note: Unfortunately, owing to ill health, Alf is having to give up writing Gloucestershire notes and, therefore, on this exceptional occasion, we publish all of his very long report below.

Table tennis legend Desmond Douglas gave his seal of approval to new facilities for sport in Cheltenham.

Top seniors, veterans and youngsters are expected to use the facilities at Cheltenham College Sports Centre, which were funded by Lottery money and a grant from the Cheltenham Table Tennis Association.

The Lottery's Awards for All scheme contributed $\pounds 4,500$ and the local association $\pounds 1,000$ which has paid for 12 new tables and will also fund coaches.

Chairman of the newly-formed Cheltenham Table Tennis Club, who will use the facilities on Tuesday and Thursday nights, Nick Davidson, said that the money would provide a toplevel coach for the club and also allow the club to develop the possibility of obtaining as many local coaches as possible.

The new club will also be able to provide performance days for certain groups of people, such as schoolchildren, women and the disabled. Douglas, National Champion 11 times and twice English Open title holder in his illustrious playing career, opened the centre by taking on two players at the opposite end of the county spectrum.

His first match was against youngster Andy Merrick, and played under the new 11-up scoring system, Douglas won the first game 11-7 and was 5-0 up in the second before Merrick hit back to 6-5, only for Douglas to go on to win 11-8.

Next up for a crack at Desmond was Gloucestershire's top male player Darren Griffin, ranked at 52 in England and 12 times County Champion, Douglas bear Griffin in straight games 11-5, 11-4, in a game full of good rallies.

Speaking afterwards Douglas said that the new centre was exactly what the game needed, and that it should provide a solid example to other parts of the country – to see a centre like this is fantastic, he said and this is how it should be.

Desmond further added that it was good to note that the new club is open for everyone to use, and he stressed the fact that table tennis has always had a problem in competing with other sports and that we have got to try to keep pace with them as much as possible.

The ETTA is trying, but it is hard unless the game has a major sponsor and gets television interested, the game is bigger abroad, especially in the Far East, but Europe is catching up fast.

We all need to attract the younger generation to the sport and keep them interested, by going into schools and selling the game to them.

In conclusion, the above event took place in Cheltenham on Tuesday 4th September 2001, and the following committee workers are to be congratulated upon the culmination of doing a very fine job.

There is a clear connection between the two. When the road was passable, our numbers were actually rising. How hopeful everything looked then!

At least we did not have to disband our county team, which we would have done, if forced into the hard labour of block weekends. We still take the view that, with so many weekend events that stretch over two days, we do not need another. We still see our home matches as a focal point where members can meet socially to watch some decent table tennis as opposed to playing. The young can see a clear next step up the ladder. We don't see much point in having a county team, if no one ever sees them play. I accept that this is a probably a minority view, but so far a tolerated one.

After our relegation last time, we are hopeful of a return to the higher section. Much will depend upon the availability of Jill Fothergill in the second ladies spot and how well she will play after a year out of the game. Similarly, we hope to have Carl Prean for some of the matches. There are only six this season. Lucy Pointer is still waiting for her op. It must be a couple of years since she saw the first specialist and joined the National Health queue, but she battles on as a once-a-week player after her long spell (full-time) at the ETTA academy in Nottingham, where she was injured. Danny Burns and Roger Hookey will again fill the others places with Alex Rorke a distinct possibility, not least when opponents have a player who is weak against defence and we know about it in time!

The 11-up playing system was accepted by a large majority - not with real enthusiasm but sensible realism. As the International Congress has voted for it, there is no point in battling against the tide. Some thought the sport must change to have a chance of gaining greater public acceptance, not least to generate more pressure points and excitement than is often the case with 21 up. We did not think there was a great deal we could lose and perhaps there was a chance of mass TV with a shorter playing system, as had already been imposed on, say, bowls, by TV demands. Time will tell.

Carl, although now our only player in the top 10 of an English ranking list, has to endure some good-natured ribbing over his no. 7 spot. He can only reply "I shall not allow this great honour to go to my head."

In real life, in a German league match, he did beat the new English no. 1 Gareth Herbert 3-2. In the same

match Ryan Jenkins won the battle of the top Welshmen against Adam Robertson 3-0. It seems you have to go to Germany to see our top players play each other, but that is another story.....

Northants by Dennis Millman

A muffled church clock strikes 12 in the background while indoors the rhythmical ping-pong of a table tennis ball indicates that a match is still in progress. This familiar scenario could well be a thing of the past with the advent of the 'best of five, up to 11' format adopted by all four of the county's main leagues – Kettering, Wellingborough, Northampton and Towcester.

Early reports suggest that overall there may have been a minor reduction in team strength, but at Kettering – the first league to get underway – the starting numbers were the same as last season, after early forecasts had promised a fourth successive increase.

Now, just three days into the new season, the six scorecards received contained the names of 14 new or returning players, with the most significant of these the former Northants and Kettering Veterans champion Mike Pond, who began where he left off, and with no previous experience of either the big ball or the new scoring system, raced to a treble in straight games to give SAS Thrapston a good start to their Premier Division campaign.

While 14 newcomers signifies that all is well on the coaching and publicity front, somewhere along the line a similar number of players must have departed and the reasons for such an exodus must be addressed.

Last year Higham Band took their 10th Premier title in 12 years and although Graeme McKim has again decided to call it a day, a muchimproved Steve Silk should prove an adequate replacement. With Kettering no. 1 Richard Elliott supported by Ryan Keates, Mark Nannery and Steve Brown, it looks like an 11th title success for Higham Ferrers side.

The new format brought little change to Northants County Championship fortunes, for they always seem to play second fiddle to Yorkshire opponents and sure enough both veteran sides ended on the wrong end of 7-2 defeats.

Chris Gibbons took over as skipper of the Veteran Firsts but had the misfortune to take the first two ends in both his singles, before going down in the decisive fifth. Even in the mixed doubles he and a consistent Clem Little held an initial lead before going down to Pat Thorley and Bill Grant.

However, Gordon Shaw, with the advantage of 10 years' experience in the GRP Designs Trophy, a Kettering cup competition that has always used the 'up to 11' format, took one of his singles and joined Michael Edwards to add the men's doubles against a pairing that included Trevor Williams, a member of the Keystone team that won the Kettering Premier Division title in 1981.

The Veteran Seconds also faced strong opposition but this did not phase new Northampton League Secretary Janet Wright, who took her singles in five close ends after teaming up with Gerald Finney for a straightforward doubles success.

Pete Wingrove and Mike Hawes made their debuts, with Wingrove coming closest to victory when he went down in the fifth and final game to Dave Adams.

It was glory for Wright but defeat for Northants.

Northumberland by Pauline Long

The Northumbria Summer League season was successfully completed, with North Shields YMCA remaining unbeaten throughout the season to regain the Division 1 title from last year's winners, St. Gabriel's. Other division winners were: Division 2, St. Jude's (after a countback of ends and points won over runners-up Cramlington Codgers); Division 3: Cramlington Stingers; Division 4: DSS 'B'.

The Winter League commenced on Monday 17^{th} September with 58 teams – only one less than last season, despite some reservations among the older players regarding the new 11 up rule – contesting five divisions. Cramlington Table Tennis Club has now taken over from North Shields YMCA as the largest league entry with eight teams, as opposed to seven for the YMCA, who has dropped two of its teams for this season. Cramlington is still the only club to adopt individual names for its teams instead of the more usual letters of the alphabet according to standard. The existing Codgers, Stingers, Tigers, Knights, Rejects, Spartans and Colts are now joined by Trojans, who appear to have replaced the Belles.

Teams have also been entered in the Wilmott Cup and Alec Brook team competitions, but not in the Rose Bowl or Carter Cup, as the availability of players of a high enough standard could not be guaranteed.

Yorkshire by Rea Balmford

It is with great sadness that I open the Yorkshire column this month by extending condolences to the family of ETTA stalwart Mike Watts, with whom, in the past, it has been my privilege to work on occasions, particularly on the tournament circuit, both in the 'Broad Acres' and further a field.

Tributes will be paid by many who knew Mike better than I but on occasions when I have worked with him, particularly on the Yorkshire Open and Yorkshire Junior, I never found him less than efficient, friendly and helpful.

He will be missed, and our thoughts are with those close to him.

It may seem banal to return to routine, but life must go on, and the first series of matches in the junior and cadet competitions played in October are to hand.

Doncaster (Jnr Div 1), Hill (Cadet Div A) and Halifax (Cadet Div B) lead their respective sections after returning clean sheets, but it is sad to note that some of the bigger leagues were not represented.

This is a malaise that has plagued table tennis for many years, but the situation seems to deteriorate rather than improve. A 'crowded calendar' is the reason given, but if our sport is to cater for the 'grass roots' as well as for the 'high fliers', it is now time that some serious thought was given to the problem of an overcrowded calendar and the blind, mad chase for ranking points.

What about two open tournament weekends each month of the season, leaving the others free for county matches, closed/invitation events, inter-league programme, coaching at all levels, etc?

The sport has been revolutionary about 11-up – every League has the opportunity to try it and eventually to accept or reject it – bring back the 'County Closed' and 'League Closed' tournaments, the once flourishing inter-league programmes as all levels from cadet to over 70 – or whatever other age limit is put on super-vet status.

Don't say 'it wouldn't work' – ask the old hands who played in Leeds v Bradford, Hull v Doncaster, Halifax v Huddersfield confrontations. Yes, I know things were always better in the old days, but there was intense competition to represent your league, as opposed to today's apathy – fact!

Do put forward your positive ideas for re-introducing to our sport the popularity it used to engender – I can remember some hundred plus spectators locked out of, a county match at Pontefract Town Hall – I was one of the lucky ones to get in – I was an umpire!

I accept that one crucial factor is television, but other sports still manage to claim their 'fans' and entice them away from the 'box', we must do the same.

Reaching into the Community by Mark Smith

A demonstration on the benefits of table tennis impressed a variety of people who attended the New Opportunities Fund's 'Reaching Communities celebration last month in Durham. The New Opportunities Fund (UK-wide Lottery distributor) has supported а number of educationally based initiatives in the Northern Region and nationally, under 'Study Support' - 'Out of School Hours Learning' section.

Table tennis received £39,000 to fund a 3-year programme to develop 'Out of School Hours' table tennis Clubs within 4 schools (1 secondary school and 3 primary schools) in the Stockton on Tees area. This funding covers the coaching fees, resources, transport costs, promotional material and coach education, to deliver a structured programme to develop both table tennis skills as well as leadership and officiating skills through the ETTA's Dunlop Skills Award and Junior Umpire Award. The programme is also linked closely with two Premier Clubs, Ormesby Table Tennis Club and Northfield School Table Tennis Club, who will provide the exit routes for these new school clubs to feed into.

Mark Smith, ETTA Regional Development Officer for the North said, "This new cash boost is fantastic for the development of grass roots table tennis in the area. With £750 million of Lottery money earmarked mainly for sport on school sites over the next 3 years distributed through local authorities, this is a great opportunity to include table tennis."

Launch of UK's first centre for Child Protection in Sport

Sport took a giant leap forward in the fight against child abuse on Monday 29th October with the launch of the first UK Child Protection in Sport Unit (CPSU).

The new unit, a partnership between the NSPCC and Sport England, will advise organisations on how to introduce child protection policies, commission research into abuse within sport and raise the profile of child protection among sports governing bodies.

The CPSU, based in Leicester at the NSPCC National Training Centre, is a key development of the NSPCC FULL STOP campaign to end cruelty to children. It will improve the protection of millions of children involved in sport and provide anyone who knows or suspects child abuse within sport with someone to turn to. It will:

- Act as a first point of contact for sports bodies concerned about child protection in sport;
- Establish systems for dealing with allegations of abuse within sport;
- Commission research into prevalence and risk factors for child protection and abuse in sport;
- Minimise opportunities for inappropriate individuals to enter or operate and raise awareness of the importance of child protection in sport;
- Provide information and training;
- Develop cross-sport standards and systems;
- Provide advice and support in developing child protection policies.

Since March this year all bodies funded by Sport England must have protection policies in place (as the ETTA does have) to receive funding.

Trevor Brooking, Chair of Sport England, said "Sport plays such an important part in the lives of young people that we have а real responsibility ensure to their experiences are safe and fulfilling. The Child Protection in Sport Unit will enable the sporting world to take the issue of child abuse by providing clubs and governing bodies with the expertise and support they need to protect and nurture children in their care."

Quoted in the Guardian (30.10.01) Steve Boocock, the head of the Child Protection in Sport Unit, said "There is no sport in this county which has not been affected in some way. But we can't just say there is a problem and scare parents from sport. CU want to address the problem and come up with a solution". The new scheme is more than just dealing with sex abuse. Boocock also wants to educate sport about overstretching its young talent.

Message from ITTF President Adham Sharara, regarding the new service rule

The new service rule will come into effect on 1^{st} September 2002.

During this AGM modifications to the rules could still take place. Therefore, the ITTF will not provide any final wording until after the next AGM in case of any changes or modifications that may be adopted. For the time being the new rule is provided in the ITTF Magazine and in the ITTF Bulletin according to the AGM resolution passed.

The official interpretation of the rule as well as explanatory diagrams will be made available and distributed after the next AGM (after April 2002). In any case we cannot use this rule until next September so there is no need to speculate now.

The main thrust of the new rule is for the Receiver to be able to see the service clearly at the moment of impact. The umpire's role is to judge that the Receiver had a clear view of the ball. This is a much easier judgement than the current rule. The final effect of this rule, once properly implemented, is that the service will be clear to the Receiver, and the Server will not be able to hide the point of contact or obstruct the view of the Receiver.

This rule was proposed by England and the Rules Committee and was supported by the Executive Committee and passed by the AGM in Osaka.

It is obvious that a clear interpretation will be needed in order to give the umpires a clear mandate on how to apply the rule. It will also give the players and the coaches a clear understanding of how to technically perform the service within the newly established rules and parameters.

Patience is a virtue and any unnecessary false interpretations and variations are not beneficial at this moment. After the next AGM, the final detailed wording and interpretation will be the final guiding principles and rules to be applied.

Trade Websites by Ken Muhr

There is a notice in the latest Butterfly World Report (Nov.Dec. 2001, no.114), a useful glossy illustrated newsletter that gives international tournament reports and articles, to say that it is the last issue for 'the time being'. However, occasional Butterfly Newsletters will come out in the future, and meanwhile readers were referred to websites www.butterfly.co.jp (Japanese) and www.butterfly-world.com (English, Of course the French, German). Japanese site is not easy to follow for us westerners, but if you click into "top players' gallery" or "technique", you will come across some excellent active photo sequences of top players showing advanced technique. There is some interesting information and articles on the European language site, but overall one has the impression that it is still being developed, there is more apparent emphasis on the Butterfly equipment side and the technique sequences are absent.

The TIBHAR magazine 'Tischtennis Aktuell' in German and English had a lot of very interesting articles and opinions, but unfortunately it too is no longer published in hard copy. Readers are invited to visit the website <u>www.tibhar.com</u> where there are still a few shorter articles under 'tta', as well as theory papers and player profiles led by Vladimir Samsonov. The TIBHAR trade side is (unsurprisingly) plugged more on the website than in the old magazine.

In my TTN Extra review I was not totally flattering about Dimosthenis E. Messinis's coaching book 'Table Tennis From A to Z' – thorough but too dry and technical - but his website www.tabletennis.gr (Denis' Table tennis World) is really quite good! There was lots of basic information and links, articles to read and things to do, photos of top players to look at, but about the best feature from my point of view was the playing sequences ('movie clips') of Kalinikos Kreanga and others performing various shots and movement patterns. I might have been using the control panel incorrectly, but I found you had to watch each clip through in juddery slow motion before clicking on to play to see the action at normal speed. I will forgive Dimosthenis in heavily promoting his book on his own website!

Famous People Who Played Table Tennis

I forgot to mention the new International Olympic Committee (IOC) President, Belgium Jacques Rogge, in my October report, but John Wood included in the glossy his meeting with ITTF President Adham Sharara, where he stated he enjoyed playing table tennis, 'especially as an attacking player'.

Responding to all the cricketers mentioned in the last issue, Charles Usher from Kendal says, 'Another cricketer who was more than useful (at table tennis) in his teens is Grahame Burgess, the ex Somerset all-rounder and now first class umpire. Grahame, who played for Street Youth Club, was a member of the Somerset Association of Youth Clubs team, who twice reached the National Association Finals, which in those days (the mid 60s) were held over a weekend at Crystal Palace. (I was their Coach and NPC!)'

Dave Hutchinson from Teesside has reported that Northants county cricketer and now a member of the international panel of cricket umpires, George Sharp, was a Hartlepool junior table tennis champion and schoolboy international who played with Paul Freeman in Hartlepool. George apparently still asks after Alan Ransome!

The Young Athlete's Handbook: Your guide to success in sports. By the Youth Sport Trust (Penny Crisfield et al). Reviewed by Ken Muhr

The blurb on the back cover, addressing the young athlete, says, 'This essential handbook contains everything you need to create your own training programme, including a 52 week diary that helps you to see how your own training plan is progressing. This book covers it all in comprehensive and easy-to-understand chapters.

You have to cope with: balancing home life, school life and sports. This handbook guides you through the sometimes difficult decisions and often conflicting pressures to allow you to concentrate on each area of your life and make sport participation a positive and enjoyable experience.'

But although the 'How to use this book' preliminary chapter says that The Young Athlete's Handbook has been written to help young talented sportspersons become the best athletes they can, it does stress that it is, 'a substitute for a good coach, supportive parent or guardian'.

As can be seen by the title of the first main chapter, 'Knowing Your Sport and Yourself', which deals with sport analysis, training phases (what we call periodisation) and personal profiling, the book is appropriate for athletes from all sports including table tennis. It really is very well set out, pretty thorough in covering all aspects of pursuing high level sports participation in a user friendly way, and assumes that athletes will take a fair amount of responsibility (including planning) for their own careers – which is only right and necessary!

It would be wrong to pick out specific chapters for praise because they are all good and valuable, but maybe table tennis players know more about 'Training Smarter' and 'Getting Fit' – even if they don't always follow the precepts – and I think England Performance Director Soren Ahlen would agree that 'Eating Right' and 'Tuning Your Mind' are particular areas which our junior and cadet international need to work on. The last two chapters which are about goal setting, action planning (short and long term) and designing and maintaining a diary, emphasise that if you the athlete are serious, in the end it is down to you – though with a little help and advice from your friends.

So I would highly recommend this book, both for the aspiring young athlete who would be motivated to read it (but let's face it, some players do not like reading!), and for coaches and parents who can gain insights also. This is the gap that The Sportswoman aims to fill, providing in-depth and positive coverage of women's sport, targeted specifically at women who are themselves active participants. It aims to celebrate the achievements of sportswomen and address areas of interest to the female sporting community (e.g. sponsorship & funding, health & nutrition, fitness, coaching & psychology, and careers for women in sport).

The Sportswoman is a monthly magazine (£3 an issue) for competitive female athletes and covering women's competitive sport from all over the world from a British perspective. Non-competitive, participatory sporting activities are only covered in so far as they are fitness tools for the competitive sportswoman. Regular feature articles are published by top female sports journalists such as Sue Mott of The Telegraph and Teresa Mclean of The Financial Times, and the big issues within women's sport are debated. Published on quality glossy paper there is a strong pictorial content in full colour (including a small picture of Bettine Vrieskoop of Holland, in the August issue I reviewed).

It is an attractive, well-produced magazine but I just wonder whether it might be a tad too mainstream, and not risk controversy enough. Anyway, it is not for me (KM) to judge. An Interview with Alan Hedley – Cramlington Table Tennis Club (ETTA Premier Club at Participation) by Mark Smith

Alan Hedley has been involved in table tennis since the tender age of 10 playing for South Shields YMCA. 45 years later Alan had played and coached all over England and also worked for a number a local authorities promoting sport and leisure and whereever possible table tennis. Now he runs a very successful Table Tennis Club in Cramlington, Northumberland, which allows people of all ages to take up the game and enjoy it at whatever level they wish to reach. With a wide cross section of the community playing at the club it

enjoys many social events with everybody getting involved.

Q. How did you get involved in Table tennis?

- A. I started playing at the local youth club in South Shields, Tyne and Wear. Table tennis was a great deal more popular then and it was hard work even getting on a table. I was 10 years old when I started playing and 15 years old when I began competing in the local league for South Shields YMCA.
- Q. What made you decide on your present post?
- A. I have always worked with youngsters through my job and passing my knowledge on seemed the natural thing to do through running a table tennis club and coaching within it. Youngsters are the future to the popularity of table tennis in this country and opportunities to play in a supportive club environment I feel are essential to keep table tennis moving forward.
- Q. What has been your greatest success?
- Α. Starting Cramlington Table Tennis Club. In settling back Northumberland after in working all around the country there has been the support locally to build a strong table tennis club. Because there has been a strong commitment from these people the club has got a good reputation in the local area as being a well organised JUNIOR FRIENDLY TABLE TENNIS CLUB.

Q. What has been your greatest moment in table tennis?

- A. The first time a youngster who I have coached beats me. This gives me a great deal of satisfaction as all the time invested has paid off.
- Q. What do you like best about your job in table tennis?

A. Organising events. club tournaments, social evenings, anything which brings people pleasant together in surroundings to have fun. I also enjoy involving new people in the game and supporting then to develop their skills as players, coaches or administrators. I love making things happen.

Q. How many hours per week do you give to table tennis?

- A. Too many! (Joke!). Approximately 15 hours per week for when my wife reads this! I do enjoy other hobbies such as playing the guitar but table tennis takes up most of my time.
- Q. What changes would you like to see?

A. More support and understanding of the life long benefits of the sport from local authorities and sports centres/ leisure centres to support table tennis clubs. Also a change in attitude from many people who enjoyed the game for so long to put something back into the I believe it is the game. responsibility of everyone involved in table tennis in whatever capacity to take a little bit of ownership and promote/develop the sport in some way.

Q. Who is your favourite table tennis player and why?

- A. As a defender myself I can relate more to the skills involved in combating the modern fast attacking game as its seems to be a dieing art. Matthew Syed has masters this and also is a great ambassador for table tennis.
- Q. If you had to choose a tip to pass on about table tennis what would it be?
- A. Try and play to your strengths and your opponent's weaknesses and above all enjoy a wonderful game.

Three Things Mere Mortals Can Learn From Tiger Woods by Sean McCann, Phd. Edited by Ken Muhr

I publish below the body of an article by Dr Sean McCann, taken from Sean O'Neill's excellent American website www.tabletennis.about.com

'The careers of Michael Jordan (Basketball), Wayne Gretzky (Ice Hockey), and Tiger Woods (Golf) all show three key behaviours that can help any athlete at any level.

Talent isn't a gift, it's a job!

A series of research studies found that people have two differing points of view about talent. One view is that talent is something you have or don't have. Athletes with this view of talent expect things to come easy and tend to give up quickly when skills are hard to learn. This makes sense to them, because if it is hard to learn, then they must not be talented.

The other view is that talent must be developed through hard work. People holding this view stay at tasks much longer, expect skill development to take time and do not become highly frustrated when things aren't easy. Research found that this viewpoint results in much higher performance, because these athletes <u>expect</u> to have to work long and hard to develop their talent.

Superstars are athletes with physical talents and a strong work ethic that refines and develops talent. Virtually every basketball coach and team-mate describe Michael Jordan as the hardest worker they ever saw in the sport. Gretzky and Woods also shared this intensity and drive to constantly improve their special talents.

Woods and Gretzky had success as children, while Jordan didn't make his high school basketball team in his first try. Despite these differences, all three worked relentlessly athletes to improve. They never expected greatness to be easy. They didn't become frustrated by the work to develop skills, and they didn't stop working until they were satisfied that their talent was fully developed.

Be willing to change a successful formula to be even better.

Despite winning the Masters' Golf Championship by a record margin a few years ago, Woods did something that takes a special kind of bravery and confidence. He took apart his golf swing and was willing to get worse before he got even better. Changing the basics of your game is hard enough to do when you are losing; doing it when you are winning is almost unprecedented.

Woods made the change because he felt his swing was not consistent enough. Making a change took time, and it initially caused a decline in Wood's performance. As most people now know, the change ultimately paid off. Tiger's recent victories in the U.S. Open and British Open by record margins are proof of a special kind of courage.

This type of courage comes from measuring yourself against your own high standards rather than another's standards. Although Woods and Jordan could beat most other players without making changes, their courage allowed them to improve and rank among the greatest athletes of modern times.

Learn emotional intelligence - stay in control!

Another common thread linking the careers of Woods, Jordan and Gretzky, was their shared ability to maintain control, despite the tremendous pressure they faced. A simple term for this control is emotional intelligence. It is the ability to use emotions effectively; emotional intelligence is absolutely necessary when athletes are asked to carry the burden of tremendous expectations.

In addition to the task of managing pressure, emotional intelligence allows these three superstars to be efficient and effective while competing. With a remarkable gift for scoring goals, and owning nearly every scoring record in NHL history, Gretzky was remarkably efficient while playing. He never appeared flustered or out of control, despite his intensity. Similarly, Jordan and Woods are both tremendously focused despite environments that would distract almost anyone else.

In Wood's recent record victories at the U.S. and British Opens, he awed his opponents with his focus and control. One example of this control is a patience and restraint beyond his years. This type of self-restraint is a sign of emotional intelligence; it takes great mental discipline and a talent that requires work to achieve. Jordan developed emotional intelligence over time, learning when to attack and when to be patient. By the end of his career, Jordan learned to save his best performance for the most important moments at the end of the game - for the win. This consistent ability to remain in control and act decisively when it counted led Jordan's teammate Luc Longley to describe him with one word, "Predator!".

Lessons for your athletes

If you are talented, you can be good without working hard; but to be great, you must work hard. If you expect things to be easy, you will become frustrated easily, give up early and never reach your potential. If you expect sport to be hard, you can take pleasure in the gains you make as you do hard work. Talent is a job, not a gift.

Coaches, you can make this distinction by praising the process rather than the product. Try saying "good work" instead of "nice shot." Tell an athlete that they are a "terrific worker" rather than a "terrific talent," and you reinforce the skills that take them to the next level.

• If you want to be better than you are, you may have to change the way you do things. You need the best information about your current level, focus on what level you want to reach and decide if you can get there from where you are. If not, have your coach help you understand what you might need to change. A big change may cause you to perform poorly for a while; this may be scary. However, if you are brave

enough, you can take your performance to a higher level.

Coaches, you can assist by paying close attention to any small successes achieved by these changes. Athletes may be too upset about poor performances to stick with the change, and if you don't put extra work into reinforcing the little wins, you may lose your last chance to make meaningful change. Remind them that Woods was "pretty good" before he took apart his game, and he was also anxious and frustrated during the change process.

Emotional self-control is the key to competitive success. Great athletes know when to act and when to be patient. Controlling fear, anger, frustration and confidence is an <u>athlete's responsibility</u>, and you should work as hard on emotional intelligence as on the physical part of your sport. It doesn't matter if you are in a bad or unfair situation or if you are under real pressure. You may not be able to change your environment, but you can change your response to it. This is your job, no one else's.

Coaches, you can help athletes develop emotional intelligence by acknowledging that a situation is tough, but emphasizing that there are many ways to respond. Ask the athletes to develop two responses, one that helps and one that hurts performance. Ask them to make a choice; don't do it for them. Your job is to control as much of the environment as possible and model positive responses to the things you can't control. It helps if coaches work regularly to enhance their own emotional intelligence!

Paying Homage to the Class Shot by Ken Muhr

Twice I saw it at the Sussex Open Butterfly Grand Prix in October - the paying homage, by deep-bowing, outstretched arms supplication, by an opponent or spectator of a wonderful shot from a player. First Chris Beckley did it when Clive Carthy power flicked past him a tight backspun serve positioned short to his forehand. And then in the men's singles final, several spectators so honoured a ridiculous backhand power loop-flick down the line by Ryan Jenkins, of a heavily spun short serve from Marco Essomba.

Is this a new trend? Or has it been around for some time? Jon Kaufman says that left-handed Londoner Terry Brown may have been the originator of this mode of expressing awe and appreciation of the class shot. What do readers think?

Jarvis Sport Grand Prix Essex 4 Star 29th/30th September 2001 Harlow Sports Centre By Alan Shepherd

It is gratifying to be able to report a well-supported event, although disappointing to have to say that, despite a nationwide distribution of entry forms, only 10 of the top 30 ranked boys and 14 of the girls actually entered. There was a very large contingent from Durham, led by the intrepid Keith Wilson, and one Day 1 they had their first success. This came when the excellent David Meads came through to the Final of the Under 12 Boys' Singles where he met the pride of the Gideon Ashison stable, namely Darius Knight, of Surrey. Neither boy had so far dropped a game, so it was par for the course that a tremendous battle should have been won by Darius 7, 11, -18, -13, 9!! The corresponding girls' event was contested by England's top two players, Lauren Springthorpe, from Grantham, Lincs, and Sarra Wang, from Braintree, Essex. In what was to become the first of three matches over the weekend between these two girls, Lauren won -9, 2, 8, 5. Incidentally, she also won the other two!

Onto the Under 14 category. There were quite a few big matches among the boys. For instance, David Meads (above) ousted the higher-ranked Tony Halling (Essex) by the scores of -10, -4, 11, 9, 8 in Round 2. At the same stage Daniel Rees (Essex) and Niv (Middlesex) Bogen were both successful in five games against Michael Harvey (Glos) and Samuel Cannon (Essex). The two semi-finals could not have been closer. In the top half Adam Bleakley (Lancs) had to pull out all the stops to defeat Darius

Knight (9, 9, 12) while in the bottom half Niv edged home against Bradley Evans (Bucks) -6, 5, -8, 12, 11. The final was a triumph for the lowerranked Niv, who was in tremendous form in defeating Adam 8, 9, 4.

The Cadet Girls' quarter-finals were contested by the top 8 in the Ranking List, and the top 4 all managed to get through. The ranking order was then upset, with Kelly Sibley (Warks) defeating no. 1 Abigail Embling (Essex) following which Kelly vanquished no. 2 seed Lauren Spink (Norfolk) in the final. In the main event the top boys all came through to the latter stages with the addition of Saturday's Under 12, hero Darius Knight and his mate Paul Moore, who is so far unranked, having not played for a year or so, but will clearly be climbing up there very soon. He came into the latter stages thanks to a 5-game win over no. 27 ranked Richard Moss (Yorks). Eventually, Paul lost to Dominic Hall (Kent) and Darius to Daniel Horner (Cheshire) the two finalists. The final itself was a classic as the scores reveal. Daniel won the first two games and was moments away from a 3-0 victory. However, Dominic 'hung in there', took the third game by 13-11 and took the next two games not comfortably, but with a little in hand.

The highlight of the Junior Girls' event was undoubtedly the semi-final

between Natalie Bawden (Essex) and Kelly Sibley. Natalie was well behind in the first game, but upped the tempo to take that one 11-9. She would now win easily, everyone thought. However, Kelly played brilliantly to win the next two games and lead by quite a margin in the fourth game. Only then did Natalie succeed in bringing the experience that she gained in competing at international level to bear, and she secured the fourth game by 11-9. Thereafter she did go clear and won a memorable match in the fifth game. What a performance by Kelly, however. The final was a slight anti-climax, as however hard Joanna Parker (Surrey) fought - and she is a very tough competitor - Natalie always had a few more shots up her sleeve, and got home 7, 9, 9.

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SPORTBREAK-ETTA REPLIES

THE English Table Tennis Association has no wish to either censor or stifle comment. Informed, truthful, and constructive criticism on all aspects of the game is welcome. In Issue I of the Sportbreak TTC magazine there are a number of items which require a reply. I. The editorial implies censorship within the E.T.T.A. This is not true. In Table Tennis News the Editor, together with advice from the Editorial Board, decides on matters of policy.

2. Page 3 suggested that Brian Halliday (Vice Chairman, Public Relations) had rejected a coaching article submitted by Karen Tonge (Vice Chairman, Teaching and Training). This is absolutely untrue. No articles on coaching have been received from Karen yet. The comments concerning Mike Holt (Vice Chairman, Marketing) are not accurate. Mike was told by his employers in August that his role in the company had changed and would require a far greater commitment from him. This would affect the amount of time he could give to the E.T.T.A. and it was decided to review this matter when it became clearer on his return from holiday in October. By the time of the National Council meeting in October Mike felt that he was unable to continue and gave a full explanation to Council. Mike has contributed a great deal to the Association and it is to be hoped that his absence will be short.

3. There are a number of statements in John Prean'ss piece that need clarification. a) Mr Prean took over as Chairman of the Association in 1986 and in the ensuing year lost the entire Management Committee, with the exception of Alan Ransome. This included Peter Charters, Colin Clemett, Ian Whiteside, Aubrey Drapkin, and George Yates. They were replaced by among others, Malcolm Allsop and Peter Hillier. In the 4 years of Mr Prean's stewardship there were a total of 15 Management Committee members. In the 11 years of Alan Ransome's chairmanship there has been a smaller turnover total of 17 Management Committee members over the much longer period. b) Peter Hillier, who Mr Prean quotes "had done a magnificent job" continued in his role under the new Chairman until he was challenged through the electoral process and decided not to contest the position.

c) Questions concerning the Chairman's companies sponsoring support for the English Table Tennis Association have, as a matter of course, been reviewed by Sport England as part of their various audits. Everything has been found to be in order. The Trade Committee, as proposed by Alan Ransome before he became Chairman, monitors all trade matters and concerns, to ensure strict impartiality at all times.

d) Michel Gadal is the subject of Mr Prean's criticism. Mr Gadal said it would take 8 to 10 years to ensure success at European level. Mr Gadal was employed on the basis of his record of success in producing World and European Champions, and was the best candidate for the post at that time. The E.T.T.A. policy of attracting the best coaches available has continued with the appointment of Soren Ahlen of Sweden.

e) The subject on the generation of sponsorship would need an article of its own. The past 10 years have seen generous support valued in the region of £5,000,000 from the Foundation for Sport and the Arts, Birmingham City Council and Sport England (events) for the European Championships, Friendly Hotels, the Woolwich, major sponsorship from Manchester City Council, Manchester Airport, Sport England (events) for the Vorld Championships and Manchester City Council for the 1996 European Olympic Qualification tournament and the World Veterans Championships, Sportingbet.com for the 2001 English Open, as well as many local authorities and venue providers. The impact on our sport has been significant.. These achievements are being built on through the appointment of Brian Spicer as Commercial Manager. Brian Halliday - Vice Chairman, Public Relations

WOMENS BRITISH LEAGUE by Brian Lamerton

HEREFORD LEISURE CENTRE was the chosen venue for the first week end of the Women's British Leagues 14th season. Having carefully studied the numbers and quality of entry (many more top ranking players appearing than of recent seasons) the organisers opted for an 8-team premier division. As the round-robin will not be completed until the second session of the second weekend an already tight league table still has much interest contained within it, writes Brian Lamerton.

Leaders London Progress have yet to play Suvi Sportswear and Hull Sandhill whilst Grove have already played each of the remaining top four. Leading individual players, both with ten out of ten maximum wins, were Bosse Kafo of Progress and Sally Marling (Hull Sandhill) who did remarkably well returning from a layoff and whose selection as 'Woman of the Weekend" was enthusiastically acclaimed by all. Grove, 7 times winners from 1990-96, who fielded Trudie Bloor, Georgina Walker and Louise Durrant were top of the pile at the end of day 1. but fell apart on Sunday losing, by 4-2 on each occasion, to Hull Sandhill and London Progress The battle of the two Sussex clubs, Horsham and Hollington, was won 5-1 by the former with Janet Dunning and Sally Weston winning two apiece but it looks likely that these two together with a disappointing Irish Ladies are battling to avoid the two relegation positions The Irish Tina Bollard did however win 8 times from the number three spot. The Womens British League was probably the first such competition played under "11up"; it made little difference to the overall time and produced some very close and exciting individual encounters; Suvi Sportswear's Karen Smith being involved in two of these; defeating Georgina Walker 20 -18 in the fifth and losing in five to Sally Marling when 4 of the games went into overtime.

Cippenham, despite dropping points to SEH Windows and Doors and Pinewood Fullerians look set to regain their premier division status as they lead division 1 with Gemma Chapman their driving force going through the week end unbeaten. Star of this division was however Marketa Myskova (Eagle Printers) who won

each of her 10 sets 3straight with her opponents only once obtaining more than 7 points. S.E.H and Pinewood can still play a big part in the ultimate shape of this division; much will depend on their own reverse fixture after a first half draw in which Pinewoods Lisa Crick won twice. Halton who had jumped two divisions will struggle to keep their place but rotating from a squad of 5 players will have gained much experience; Gemma Lloyd with 6 wins from 8 outings the most successful.

Gautby Ladies from the Wirrall are in command of division 2 after 8 wins (out of 8) from Karen Lockwood, 7 from Terri-Anne Nolan and 6 Cherith Graham but they have yet to play second placed Graham Spicer Angels. Lesley Keast (Suvi Sportswear) was on course for a maximum but after winning nine times on the trot went down in her final game after holding a 2-1 lead over Karen Lockwood. Diane Pearce was responsible for 6 of Ellenborough's 8 winning sets and continuation of this form into the second half should see her team stay ahead of Ashford and East Midland Ladies in the fight to stave off relegation.

Team of the week end Grove 2. represented by Kelly Sibley, Naomi Owen and Heather Shutt were heading for a perfect score in division 3 before in their final match coming up against Hilton and in particular Annabelle Sorrentino who retained her 100% record whilst the Grove team won a set apiece in a drawn match. Sibley's loss against Sorrentino was her only setback throughout the week end and she shares second spot in the averages with Zoe Fisher (Hull Sandhill 2) who lost only to Naomi Owen. The arrival of this prestigious event

was enthusiastically welcomed in Hereford, great co-operation from Leisure Centre management and staff, Saturday's proceedings were opened by Bryan White, secretary of the local sports council and Hereford league management members Dave Gough and Rod Dawson after leaving the hall around midnight on Friday were back to present the prizes on Sunday.

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THE FOSKER REPORT

WALKOVERS

IN his second article on the approach different leagues take to thorny issues, Ron Fosker looks at walkovers and claimed matches, writes Ron Fosker.

It may not happen at Anfield or Highbury but in the real world of club table tennis, there are going to be occasions when a team is unable to raise enough players to fulfil a fixture. How often this happens may depend on what the rules say on postponements, the subject tackled in the last issue.

The harder it is to postpone a match, the more likely it is that teams will have to give it away. So what penalty should they face for doing so? And what about fielding teams of two players, or even one?

For some leagues, giving a 10-0 victory to your opponent is seen as adequate punishment (although it is not always 10-0: see below). Others regard it as a more severe crime and lay down additional penalties. In some cases this is a fine, in others a loss of points.

And in one case both. In the random selection of handbooks that I researched. Maidstone, one of the hawks on postponements, was the only league to fine the team (\$5) and dock points: three for a first offence (in a 10-point for

a win system), six for a second and ten for a third.

Some leagues threaten expulsion after repeated offences Hastings: Teams consistently incurring defaults may be withdrawn., London Banks and Civil Service League: The management committee may call for an explanation and may direct that the team should be expelled., Braintree is straight to the point: will be automatically removed,.

Northampton on the other hand insist that the match should eventually be played, but the team that failed to turn up may lose ten penalty points.

In some cases an unearned 10-0 victory for the aggrieved team is seen as too much. The Banks and Civil Service League regards it as a 7-0 victory (but a 10-0 defeat for the offenders) while West Essex has a more intricate system. There the score is recorded either as the average number of points the team has gained so far, or, if it is in the second half of the season, the number of points they gained in the first fixture between the two clubs, or six points, whichever is the greater. It sounds complicated, but you can see the logic behind it.

Short-changing your opponents by turning up a player short incurs fines in a number of leagues and the more bureaucratic penalty in Hastings of having to send in a written explanation to the league.

One-person teams are banned by some

leagues and in Lowestoft 2v2 is not allowed. In most cases this would result in a scoreline between 7-2 and 5-4 with both teams able to claim two sets. North Herts, however, allows no claims on such occasions but leaves the score at 5-0, 4-1 or 3-2.

The Clacton League has an innovative approach of guest players in an attempt to avoid both walkovers and turning out a player short. Teams are docked two points for turning up with only two players, four points for having only one player and six for conceding. To avoid these penalties, they may call on guest players whose games don't count but enable the team to avoid losing extra points and also to give their opponents a full evening.

Clacton League chairman Brian Rowlen explained the thinking behind the rule: "In the days when we had two points for a win, some teams didn't try too hard to get a third player if they knew they could win with two. We therefore brought in a rule to penalise teams who turned up with only two players. When we moved to a point per set, the penalty was a deduction of two points.

"But we had complaints that there were occasions where it was just not possible to turn out a full team, particularly if it was the lowest ranked team, or the only team in the club. "We therefore brought in the rule that

allowed teams to use a guest player,

either from a higher ranked team within their own club, or from another club, so long as they were registered in the league. Any wins don't count but it enables the opposing team to have a full evening and it saves them having points deducted."

There are two exceptions to the rule. Teams are not allowed to borrow players from the club they are playing against, and they are not allowed to use players who are already playing in another match.

Brian Rowlen reckons guests are used around 20 times a season, and last season there were only eight two-man teams, so the rule seems to be working.

He said: "By and large it works. It is liked by the players, who can see the sense in it. Teams mostly stick to the spirit of the rule by not asking a first division player to play in division four and it usually means that teams have a decent evening."

And last season it actually saved a team from withdrawing from the league. One of the teams in the lowest division had started with four players but two dropped out early on. They played the next half a dozen games with two players and a guest while they searched round for another player to sign on.

They eventually found one and carried . on for the rest of the season.



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

Alex piled on the top-spin on both wings winning the first two games 5 and 4; Machedo hit back 8 and 12 but the man from Devon and Nottingham bounced back, especially quick on the backhand to win 6 in the 5th.

At that point it seemed that if Gareth could lift his game a 2-2 situation could be on the cards, leaving Terry Young to face Torres in the decider, but it was not to be.

Terry himself seems to have hit a plateau - he always looks capable of winning at this level - he scored 28 points against Carneros who notched

MESSAGE FROM THE ITTF PRESIDENT ADHAM SHARARA



THE new service rule will come into effect on 1 September 2002. In the meantime, there will be an AGM held in April 2002. During this AGM modifications to the rules could still take place. Therefore, the ITTF will not provide any final wording until after the next AGM in case of any changes or modifications that may be adopted. For the time being, the new rule is published in the ITTF Magazine and Bulletin, and on page 21 of this magazine, according to the AGM resolution passed.

The official interpretation of the rule as well as explanatory diagrams will be made available and distributed after the next AGM (after April 2002). In any case we can not use this rule until next September so there is no need to speculate now.

The main thrust of the new rule is for the 'Receiver' to be able to see the service clearly at the moment of impact. The umpire's role is to judge that the Receiver had a clear view of the ball. This is a much easier judgement than the current rule. The final effect of this rule, once properly implemented is that the service will be clear to the Receiver, and the Server will not be able to hide the point of contact or obstruct the view of the Receiver.

This rule was proposed by England and the Rules Committee and was supported by the Executive Committee and passed by the AGM in Osaka. It is obvious that a clear interpretation will be needed in order to give the umpires a clear mandate on how to apply the rule. It will also give the players and the coaches a clear understanding of how to technically perform the service within the newly established rules and parameters.

Patience is a virtue and any unnecessary false interpretations and variations are not beneficial at this moment. After the next AGM, the final detailed wording and interpretation will be the final guiding principles and rules to be applied. Adham Sharara, ITTF President

"I always had good services but in my normal game I make too many mistakes. This week has been different, let's hope that this is only the beginning".

SECOND TITLE FOR RYU

RYU Ji Hye (Korea) took the second Pro Tour title in two weeks, when she won the final the in the womens singles. Ryu also won the German Open last week and in the final in Rotterdam she once more showed that she has taken her game to a higher level.

Tamara Boros (Croatia) was not playing badly, Ryu was just too strong. It looked like an easy walk in the park for Ryu who went to 3-0. Then Boros came back though. She went to 2-3 and she was also close to reaching 3-3. Ryu though kept her head down and took the game and the title.

Mens doubles champions were Timo BOLL/Zoltan FEJER-KONNERTH (Germany), whilst the womens doubles champions were NIU Jianfeng/BAI Yang (China).

EARLY CHEERS FOR HEISTER

Earlier in the tournament Danny Heister really gave his Dutch supporters something to cheer for in his 3rd round match in mens singles against Jorg Rosskopf (Germany). He was several times on the verge of losing, but each time he fought back.

In the 7th game he was down 6-9, but then he won 5 points in a row to take the match 11-9 and advance to the quarter finals.

MENS WORLD CUP The best players of the World

will compete in Courmayeur, Italy, over 4 days 8th to 11th November 2001.

Thursday the 8th is the opening day of the Mens World Cup with an entry of the best players on the World Ranking and all the continental champions.

There are no easy matches at the World Cup but nevertheless the players were looking forward to the draw with interest.

The draw put two Chinese in group 'A'. The World Champion WANG Liqin (CHN) will have to face the older compatriot MA Wenge who won the World Cup twice a decade ago. MA Wenge was invited on a wild card because LIU Guozheng (CHN) had to cancel due to a shoulder injury. Jean-Michel SAIVE (BEL) 'landed' in group 'A' as well.

Group 'C' looks like the other difficult group. CHIANG Peng-Lung (TPE), Werner SCHLAGER (AUT), Peter KARLSSON (SWE) and Ahmed ALI SALEH (EGY) will have to fight for the two first places in the group which qualifies

for the quarter finals.

Werner SCHLAGER was not that enthusiastic about the draw. "CHIANG Peng-Lung is very good, and to get the European Champion (Peter KARLSSON) from the third seeding group of players is not good for me. I don't think anybody would find it lucky to play the European Champion as a supposedly weaker player. Anyway nothing is supposed to be easy at the World Cup", says the Austrian top player.

Ahmed ALI SALEH (EGY) would normally be considered as a 'trainee' in the group. ALI SALEH though was shocking everybody two weeks ago when he defeated No.15 in the World MA Wenge at the Dutch Open.

The Italian entry, Yang Min, is in the group with Jorg Rosskopf (GER), Vladimir SAMSONOV (BLR) and Augusto MORALES (CHI).

"Yang Min is a dangerous player, I don't like playing him", says Jorg Rosskopf. "Anyway, regarding that we could have had MA Wenge or Kalinikos KREANGA in the group, I cannot complain".

2.6 A good service


- **2.6.1** Service shall start with the ball resting freely on the open palm of the server's free hand.
- **2.6.2** The server shall then project the ball near vertically upwards, without imparting spin, so that it rises at least 16 cm after leaving the palm of the free hand and then falls without touching anything before being struck.
- **2.6.3** As the ball is falling the server shall strike it so that it touches first his court and then, after passing over or around the net assembly, touches directly the receiver's court; in doubles the ball shall touch successively the right half courts of server and receiver.
- **2.6.4** From the time at which the ball leaves the server's hand until it is struck it shall be above the level of the playing surface and behind the server's end line.
- **2.6.5** When the ball is struck, no part of the body or clothing of the server or his doubles partner shall be within or above the triangular area formed by the net and imaginary lines between the ball and the tops of the net posts, at a height where it could hide the ball from the receiver.
- **2.6.6** It is the responsibility of the player to serve so that the umpire or the assistant umpire can see that he complies with the requirements for a good service.
- **2.6.6.1** If the umpire is doubtful of the legality of a service but neither he nor the assistant umpire is sure that it is illegal he may, on the first occasion in a match, warn the server without awarding a point.
- **2.6.6.2** If subsequently in the match a service by that player or his doubles partner is of dubious legality, for the same or for any other reason, the receiver shall score a point.
- **2.6.6.3** Whenever there is a clear failure to comply with the requirements for a good service no warning shall be given and the receiver shall score a point.
- **2.6.7** Exceptionally, the umpire may relax the requirements for a good service where he is satisfied that compliance is prevented by physical disability.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS A NEW SEASON PACKED FULL OF CHANGES



SO here we are again, all set for a new season packed full of changes, an extended County Championships with the inclusion of two new sections i.e. Cadets division and over 60 Veterans division. Unfortunately despite an introductory offer of two for the price of one, the take up of places has not been as good as may have been expected when compared to the response from Counties in their replies to the questionnaires of last season. In particular the entry to the under 21 section was so poor that it was not viable to include this section in this years Championship, unfortunate, as this seemed to be a popular section when the Counties were polled, writes Stan Clarke.

The response to the Cadet and over 60 Veterans sections was also disappointing but enough Counties entered for the committee to agree to include them in the competition this year, hopefully they will prove a success and next season will see an increase in numbers.

We also have the introduction of the dreaded / loved (delete as appropriate) best of eleven points per game, five games per set format. It is perhaps a little soon to be passing judgment, but it seems to me that to be successful in this format that it is an advantage to be a sprinter rather than an endurance person, there is so little time to settle down and assess your opponents strengths and weaknesses, I'm just glad I'm not a defender.

The Championships seem to have started early this season with the first matches being played on 15th September, long before many local leagues started their matches, but with the calendar so congested it is inevitable.

SENIOR DIVISION 1B

Only two results from this division, but Middlesex 2nd got their season off to a flyer disposing of Hertfordshire 8/2 in the morning before crushing Cornwall 9/1 in the afternoon, not a bad days work .

SENIOR DIVISION 2B Three matches played in this division, Glamorgan disposed of

Herefordshire 8/2 whilst Devonshire 2nd battered Worcestershire 2nd 10/0, mind you Worcestershire did little to help their own chances by fielding only one lady player.

Somerset played a close fought match against Cornwall 2nd, running out winners by 6 sets to four after the match was tied on four sets all, Naomi Wilson beat Michelle Turner and Mike Hurley beat Chris Brown in the last two sets to earn the two points, 3 of the sets going to five games and 3 requiring four games to produce a winner.

JUNIOR DIVISION 3C

A total of five matches played in this division at three venues, at Godney Somerset were hosts to Cornwall first and second teams and pretty poor hosts they were, holding the Cornwall first team to a draw in the first match before going on to beat the second's, to move to the top of the division

JUNIOR DIVISION 3D

They started their campaign by beating Buckinghamshire 4th by 7/3, a closer match than the score suggests, having warmed up they then thrashed Sussex 3rd. 10/0, then in the afternoon round of matches they disposed of Gwent 2nd 9/1, not a bad days work, winning twenty six sets and dropping only four.

Gloucestershire are currently in second place with five points having won two and drawn one, They struggled to hold a depleted Wiltshire team (Only one girl) to a draw, before beating Sussex 2nd 7/3 and Essex 3rd 6/4. Third place is held by Essex 3rd who started off well with wins over Sussex 3rd and Gwent 2nd before Gloucestershire upset their applecart.

Sussex 2nd and Sussex 3rd are the bottom two teams, both teams loosing all three matches, Sussex 2nd avoid the wooden spoon by virtue of having won two sets more than their third team.

Mike Holt said how privileged he was to have known Mike and that he would miss his friendship very much. He was respected by the Table Tennis fraternity worldwide and would be a great loss to the sport. One lasting thought "I expect Mike is up there now checking out the venue size to make sure that he can get enough tables to run his next tournament" God bless you Mike, Rest in peace.

A DEAR FRIEND AND COLLEAGUE A tribute by Derek Schofield (VETTS Chairman 1984-1998).

When Mike passed away in hospital on Sunday 14th October 2001, we didn't just lose a dear friend and colleague, the world of English table tennis lost one of the finest and most highly respected administrators the sport has ever known.

His knowledge of the sport was boundless, having served in practically every capacity from club level, to international level, organising World and European Championships, and countless other international and national events.

His talents were also recognised by the European Table Tennis Union, who invited him to serve on their Veterans European Championships Committee - A position he carried out diligently for many years. Although I had known Mike for many more years than I care to remember, it wasn't until 1983 when, following on from the successful staging of the first ever World Veteran Championships, he approached me with the inspirational idea of forming some kind of veterans association in England.

During January 1984, at an inaugural meeting of many interested parties, Mike's 'Brainchild' became a reality, and the Veterans English Table Tennis Society was born.

As General Secretary, he used his special talents to help steer VETTS through its formative years, until it became what it is today - Arguably the most successful innovation in English table tennis over the last twenty years.

On his retirement as General Secretary in 1993, Mike was immediately invited to be President -An office he carried out with great dignity.

Mike was also an accomplished player, notching up many veteran doubles titles playing alongside Henry Buist, and in the County Championships, had the distinction of playing for no less than four counties - Warwickshire, Essex, Sussex and Norfolk.

In 1998, The Veterans English Table Tennis Society for the first time teamed up with the English Table Tennis Association, to stage the 9th Veteran World Championships in Manchester, with once again, Mike being the focal point as Organiser, and setting his own usual high standards.

Certainly from the VETTS point of

view, the tournament was an unqualified success, and could quite easily be used as a role model for future championships.

Mike was essentially a family man, so naturally, our thoughts and prayers go out to his loving wife Hilda, daughters Deborah, Lynn, and the rest of the family in their time of sadness.

I believe that the undoubted success of the Veterans English Table Tennis Society, which currently enjoys worldwide recognition, is a fitting tribute to Mike, whose original idea and dedication most certainly helped to provide veteran players everywhere with many more extra years of competitive pleasure.

I AM sitting here, looking at a blank sheet of paper, not knowing how to begin writing about the devastating events that have happened in the lives of Mike and myself over the past five months until sadly in October the end of Mike's life.

He had been unwell since May and spent a total of eight weeks out of twelve in hospital both in Kings Lynn and Addenbrooke's in Cambridge. There they tried very hard to find the cause of his jaundice. He had many scans and tests over these weeks but it was only at the end of August that his cancer was finally diagnosed. We had such a short time to come to terms with this unexpected news before his condition suddenly deteriorated and he passed away on Sunday 14th. October.

Words can never express how I felt about the cards, letters, 'phone calls, donations and flowers I have received, not forgetting of course the cards Mike himself also received whilst he was so ill.

The number of people who attended Mike's funeral was completely overwhelming for myself and my family. The tributes paid by Mike Holt and Derek Schofield were a great comfort to us.

The donations received for Cancer Research and The Macmillan Nurses have exceeded \pounds 1,000 and I cannot possibly put into words what this means to both myself and the family.

I once again thank you all from the bottom of my heart for your love and support which has helped me so much at this sad time in my life.

JOHN PREAN REVIEWS THE SERVICE RULE

THE MAGICIAN'S ART or DAYLIGHT ROBBERY


THIS SEASON'S big rule change, playing up to 11, and talking point seemed to arrive quite suddenly. Next season will see another profound change. This concerns the service. The relevant clause is this : 2.6.5 "When the ball is struck, or part of the body or clothing of the server or his doubles partner shall be within or above the triangular area formed by the net and imaginary lines between the ball and the tops of the net posts, at a height where it could hide the ball from the receiver. "

Like Colin Clemett in his excellent article (TTNews May/June) I hope that clearer wording will be found, but the intentions must be applauded.

THE SKILL ALMOST OF MAGICIANS

Services SHOULD be delivered in a manner which allows the opponent to see the ball being struck. I like to think that this also is the intention of the present rules and that this is what most players want. The problem remains that things happen very quickly, that a few gifted players have the skills almost of magicians, whose hand is quicker than the eye, certainly than of most of us. At top level the flat hand may be shown to the umpire and opponent, but not when the ball is struck. The hand will move quickly towards the body and the body toward the ball to shield it from view. Then, unseen, it will be propelled against the bat, producing further spin and disguise, and a service will be produced where the contact of ball to bat is not seen and the return is the result of guess work. A mistake will follow or a poor return. A thunderous fast loop to finish the rally will punish the indifferent return from the disguised, invisible service. The rally will have lasted exactly two points.

To most this will seem against the spirit of the sport as both a fair contest and as a spectacle. To a minority it will appear as a new skill and so good luck to those who have learned it, perhaps the result of years



of practice.

It is not a new situation. In the late 1930's, the hard bat era, there was the invention of the finger or knuckle spin service, which reduced world class players to novices and even 5 times world champion Victor Barna found it difficult. Such services were banned, because most people wanted the game to flow, to see rallies. The present service, did not arrive overnight. It was a gradual development, each year presenting new challenges, as the contact moved a little further out of sight behind the body. The transition was slow, the hand so quick, that the profound change was barely noticed. Complaints by victims were attributed to the bitterness of those who had been defeated.

DISCRETION THE BETTER PART OF VALOUR...?

How are good intentions to be translated into firm rules that everybody understands and honours? Players and umpires are on different sides of the table. How can an umpire, sitting on the side, know what is visible to the player positioned at another end ? Then there is the ongoing problem that umpires, at any rate qualified ones, do not appear until the player has reached a high standard. Even ETTA

Grand Prix events and the German 2nd division (in which appear internationals from all over the world) do not have qualified umpires. In our local leagues it will be one of the players from either side who will umpire. There is no surer way of making an enemy than to call him or her for a foul serve and even extend a warning about such a possibility! 99 out of 100, among which cowards I include myself, will see discretion as the better part of valour and will try to avoid the pleasures of a truly ruined evening.

Higher up, real umpires may be made of sterner stuff, but by no means all. There will be those who will not wish to see their weekends ruined by the deeply felt anger and hostility of the offended player, supported by camp followers and coaches and the rows and controversies which will follow.

Internationally, umpires may not get the backing they deserve. They may be upheld at the time by the referee, but invitations will grow fewer, if an umpire is seen as a 'trouble maker'. Top officers of leading nations do not want to see their stars, their main hope of TV and sponsorship, called for foul services and seen as cheats. They may not forgive umpires who have upset the happiness that comes from sitting at the top table, basking in the reflected glory of their stars' victories.

PLAYERS WILL GO TO ANY LENGTHS

Sadly, what we like to call 'winners' are also those who will go to any length in pursuit of victory, in their ambition to be the best. That is the main reason behind the drug culture which has poisoned so many sports. It is also the reason why the service of today has developed as it has. The opponent may be cheated, but what is that compared with victory, national glory and lottery grants? The more honest will say 'Everybody does it' and such are the facts of sporting life.

Unfortunately, leading officers and legislators, influenced by their top players, shrink from the one really obvious remedy, that of making everyone serve in front of the body. This would kill the current practice of serving from the side and the temptation of moving bat and ball behind the body for the brief moment of impact when nothing can be seen.

This practice is spreading fast and more and more players are seen as getting away with it, improving their results and ranking. One should not be ungrateful that the ITTF has at last grasped the nettle, but it will require a great deal of courage to kill the foul serves which now haunt the sport at the elite levels all over the world.

I cannot help recalling how obstinate has remained the problem of GLUE.

A few top players apart, everybody knows that this is awful for the game, cutting rallies, speeding up rubbers already too fast, reducing the sport's appeal as a spectacle, but there it is in all its foul smelling grandeur, an integral part of our modern game.

With that experience in mind, I can only give two cheers to the rule change in respect of the service. I remain grateful that, due to different skill levels, this will not be a major problem in our local leagues where the rare combination of the magician's hand and the willingness to cheat for victory has not yet taken root.
