


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
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# ALEX MURDOCH WINS VOTE FOR THE ETTA CHAI



### TOP AWARD FOR KEN PHILLIPS

Ken Phillips wins top award as Cippenham scoop four at Slough Sports Awards, writes Graham Trimmings.

Cippenham Table Tennis Club supremo Ken Phillips fittingly won another award to add to his illustrious collection when, on 21st March, he received the Service to Sport Award at the Mayor of Slough's

Annual Sports Awards.

Ken Phillips is the driving force behind the enormous success of the junior setup at Cippenham, one of the leading clubs in England. He has also been Chairman since 1997 and a part of the management team at the Club for about twenty years. Ken is a qualified Level 4 (Senior) coach, the highest level, and is also a tutor/assessor running coach education courses in the Southern

Ken was the coach responsible for the early development of both Terry Young and Gareth Herbert who are now both members of the England team in the

European League and were gold medallists at the Commonwealth Games in Manchester 2002. More recently under Ken's guidance the Cippenham club has produced a plethora of international players and national champions including Joanna Parker, Bradley Evans, Gemma Chapman and nine-years old Gavin Evans, surely destined to be the best of the lot. In fact, the Cippenham coaching set-up has produced no less than fourteen players who have represented their country over the past few years and junior teams from the club have won fourteen national titles.

Ken spends up to 60-80 hours a week on table tennis, mostly coaching but also finds time to organise and referee many competitions on behalf of the Cippenham club and other local organisations and do a great deal of administrative work such as liaising and negotiating with equipment suppliers. He was Coaching Officer and Treasurer of the Buckinghamshire County Association for many years and has been Joint Organizer of the National Junior League Southern Region since its

inception. Ken is always on hand to manage the setting-up and setting-down of the playing arena for weekend events and manages the liaison with the host

Ken's coaching activities take him all over the Southern Region where he is in great demand as a coach, tutor, assessor and presenter. 'He also coaches in local schools including Farnham Common Middle School, Burfield School and Arbour Vale School for children with special needs.

Due to his extreme dedication and success Ken was awarded the ETTA Male Coach of the Year in both of its first two vears, 1999 and 2000 and in 2001 was awarded the NCF (Sport England) Volunteer Coach of the Year in an Individual Sport Award, the highest possible accolade. In 2002 Ken was awarded the ETTA Merit Award for his dedicated service to table tennis.

Ken's was not the only award to come to Cippenham Table Tennis Club as an unprecedented four awards were won in total. Precocious nine-vears old Gavin Evans won the Junior Sportsman of the Year while Commonwealth Games double gold medallist Gareth Herbert won the Senior Sportsperson of the Year. For good measure the Club also picked up an award of its own - the Community Club of the Year. This is the third time that the Club has received this award that is given for service in the community. Fittingly, Jan Chapman was selected to receive this on behalf of the Club as it is, in part, because of the weekly sessions that she and Ken run at Arbour Vale special needs school that earns the Club this recognition.

# ENCOURAGING SENIOR RESULTS AT EUROPEANS


ALTHOUGH our teams were some distance from picking up any of the medals, from an England perspective the European Championships in Courmayeur, Italy, between 27 March – 6 April, produced some of our most encouraging results at senior level for some time.

In the team event, the men won a vital match over Norway by 3 sets to 2, which guaranteed a top 16 position and a place in the top section of the qualification tournament for the next European Championships in Denmark in two years time. This match was difficult for England to win as Norway are led by Wang Jianfeng who was able to win his two matches comfortably. Andrew Baggaley, Alex Perry and Gareth Herbert all won one singles to take England through.

In the singles events, the England boys also performed with credit. In particular Andrew Baggaley recorded excellent wins over Martin Monrad of Denmark by 4 sets to 2, and Peter Karlsson of Sweden, the former European champion and World No. 12 by a relatively comfortable margin of 4 sets to 1. After his win against Karlsson, Andrew's loss to the Austrian, Kostadin Lengerov, was an anticlimax, but nevertheless he did very well to win through to the last 16.

Gareth Herbert also enjoyed an excellent win as he defeated the talented Pole, Tomasz Krzeszewski, who beat Matthew Syed at the last European Championships, before losing to the brilliant young Romanian, Constanti Cioti, by 4 sets to 2.

The Women's team that was seriously weakened by the unavailability of Nicola Deaton and Katy Parker, was made up, with the exception of Helen Lower, of juniors, but produced a credible performance to finish in 23rd position. Their best result was a win over Luxembourg by 3 sets to 2 in which Helen, Joanna Parker and Georgina Walker all



contributed.

The stars of the tournament from a men's perspective were the players from Belarus. Vladimir Samsonov was outstanding to win the Men's Singles and in the Men's team event where Belarus were the surprise winners of the Gold medals. Belarus beat Poland, Sweden and Germany to take the title. Samsonov was unbeaten in the team event, which included wins in the final over Timo Boll and Jorg Rosskopf. He was supported by the defensive player, Evgueny Chtchetinine, who was also unbeaten and included a victory over Rosskopf in the opening match of the final which swung the match firmly in Belarus' direction.

## Controversy as European Team event is reduced

Off the table the main controversy surrounded the proposal to limit the number of entries in the team event at the next European Championships in Denmark to just 16 mens and 16 women's teams and to establish a qualification competition in two

sections, one for the top 16 countries in Courmayeur, of which 12 would qualify, and a second qualification competition for the rest of which 3 or 4 would qualify depending on the decisions of the host as to whether to play the qualification event or go directly into the finals. The rationale behind this was that the European League has not been as successful or popular in recent years and, therefore, to cancel the league and set up a European Championship Qualification has considerable merit. Added to this is the wish of some of Europe's larger countries to reduce the cost of staging future European Championships by limiting the number of teams who can play in the team event. This proposal proved to be very controversial and was only passed by just one vote at the Congress, 19 to 18 after the first vote failed to achieve majority at 17 all. Whether there should have been a second vote at all was highly controversial. Several of the smaller countries were not present due partially to the fact that the meeting was held the day before the competition started when some had not yet arrived. In fairness to the

ETTU, the meeting was called with due notice and additional hospitality offered for the extra day for the delegates. Nevertheless, some delegates who would have certainly voted against were not present.

This decision does not just affect the smaller countries as it could mean, for example, that England may not qualify for either the Men's or Women's team event in Denmark. For the other home countries such as Scotland, Wales and Ireland, the chances of qualifying are only slim. Many of the smaller countries were very disappointed at the outcome of the vote as they felt that it would deny their players and coaches the opportunity to participate in the team event at the Championships and it would reduce interest at senior level throughout the season leading up to the European championships due to the lack of a team competition for their national teams to compete in. One well known delegate who is normally conservative and reserved said to me, "what's the point of us having a strong junior programme if the main competition for our senior players at the European championships is beyond our reach." Other delegates were very worried about the potential for loss of government support for their programmes if they did not qualify for the European Championship team event finals.

It is also arguable as to whether reducing the number of teams actually reduces the financial viability of the European Championships as a proposition was passed at the last Congress to reduce the cost to the organisers by charging 50% of the team hospitality. Previously the hospitality was free for the basic number. From my experience host cities are one of the major backers for competitions of this kind and it is attractive to them to have as many participants as possible attending the championships to increase the so called economic impact. Several

associations have asked for a Special General Meeting of the ETTU to discuss this matter further. However, the Executive Committee have decided that the request to hold this in Paris at the World Championships would not give enough time and, therefore, it is likely that this whole matter will be next discussed at a General Meeting of the ETTU at the World Team Championships in Doho, Kuwait next

## Samsonov joins the Masters in Sheffield

The next significant international event in England is the Continental Masters BBC TV Invitation competition, which is to be staged at the Crucible Theatre in Sheffield on

9 August with BBC screening the highlights in Grandstand a day later on Sunday, 10 August. World Cup Champion, Timo Boll, was one of the first to accept the invitation to participate and the competition has been strengthened further by the confirmation that the new European Champion, Vladimir Samsonov is to enter. Further details will appear in the next issue of Table Tennis News.

Major Changes at Sport England

Sport England, the organisation that manages the majority of the Government and Lottery Funding distribution for Sport in this country has been going through the biggest changes that I can recall in its three decades. The new Chairman, Patrick

Carter, has postponed the approval of all new Lottery applications and has ordered a widescale review of Sport England's activities. At the same time there has been a very large staff reduction implemented at the organisation's headquarters in London. Amongst this review is a close look at the effectiveness of governing bodies and it has been indicated that the number of governing bodies like the ETTA who receive substantial government funds will be reduced substantially to around 16 on which the vast majority of Exchequer funding will be concentrated. With our record of grass roots development, table tennis has a good chance of being included within this priority group but this is by no means certain and, therefore, we have been taking positive steps to do our utmost to ensure that we are giving ourselves the best possible chance to be selected.

At the same time, we have had it finally confirmed that as a result of significant reductions in the Lottery funding available, the ETTA's World Class funding will be reduced for the coming season, to such a degree that it will not be possible to continue with the Academy in its present form at Nottingham. It is extremely important that if the very talented group of cadets that we have in England at the present time are to maintain their progress, that they are able to practice against strong opposition on a daily basis, receive tuition from world class instructors and have a suitable international competitive programme. This will not be possible to the degree that we have been able to provide over the past five years unless we are able to find additional resources through partnerships to make up at least some of the difference, and again significant efforts are being made to achieve this. It is also vital that we have a national centre where our senior players can practice and train together and that it is permanently available.

## ETTA Elections

Following the ETTA Officer election results that were announced last month there will be a new leadership of the Association after the Annual General Meeting at the end of June. It has been a great privilege and pleasure to be your Chairman for the last twelve years and I have really enjoyed the challenge. I am personally in no doubt that the sport has made significant progress over that period, particularly in the area of Development where many more facilities and centres have opened throughout the country and many more people are participating in

them. In addition there has been a very large increase in the number of players competing in a wide range of competitions at county and national level. The prospects for the national team are also much better with the current batch of youngsters coming

Much of the support in the election for my team came from people with a sound knowledge of what is happening inside the sport, whilst much of the support for our opponents came from the local leagues who held the majority of the votes, many of whom were not really aware of the progress that has been made as our main information tools, Table Tennis News and the Annual Report had clearly not been widely read and absorbed by their membership. On the other hand, much of the publicity generated by the opposition did reach more of them. Some of this was misleading and selective and unfortunately, from our perspective, it was taken at face

My team were disappointed not to be given a fresh mandate as the immediate future of the sport could be a watershed. Once the new arrangements with Sport England and other government agencies are in place, the opportunities for sports like table tennis will never have been greater. On the other hand, if we are not selected to be part of these programmes or do not take full advantage of them, we can lose the momentum which has been built up and start to slide in a backward direction. We felt that we were the best people to lead this challenge.

The most important point, however, is that the health of the sport continues to improve and for this to happen more local leagues and clubs need to embrace the ETTA Development programmes and, in turn, recruit new players to the sport. This will only happen where enthusiastic and active local volunteers work with the ETTA and embark on programmes to increase the sport in their local area. There is no doubt that one of the good things to come out of the election was that it has created fresh interest in ETTA activities in some areas where little had been evident before and this in itself may spark fresh initiative which could certainly help.

I wish Alex Murdoch and his team every success in the challenges ahead. I intend to remain very active in the sport and have encouraged all the members of my team to do likewise. We will do all that we can to help and ensure that the sport continues in it upward trend. Alan Ransome, Ö.B.E ETTA Chairman

Having purchased a new table a year ago to replace our old Jaques wooden table, we find that it is very smooth, almost like glass. Although its great to attack on, it absorbs very little spin, so any defensive player has great difficulty in defending on it.

As we know, our Mens No.1 player Matthew Syed has bitterly complained many times that he is unable to defend at times on these types of tables.

May we suggest that the English Table Tennis Association recommends the return to wooden tables for tournament and league play and to ban tables made with the product MDF.

THIS is not about the merits of a particular scoring system. It is about choice, options, and the denigration of those holding different opinions, there has been far too much of this.

I understand that at the ETTA AGM at Milton Keynes to be held on 28th June the National Council is proposing a resolution to delete all reference to "21-up". I further understand that at the ITTF AGM to be held on 21st May, China is proposing that "21-up" be restored for world wide competition, as they consider this produces a better game.

My local League has asked for opinions on the two scoring systems, 75% of the membership have replied with 85% of these favouring 21-up, and I am aware that this system has substantial support elsewhere. Our membership has increased by 50% over the last three years. I don't want to see it fall back.

I have played in local Leagues for 50 years, and am still actively coaching and entering Juniors in my local League, and National and ETTA ("Woolwich") Junior Leagues I do not wish to be dictated to, and consider that options of choice should be preserved~ for the good of the game. I shall therefore be voting against the National Council's proposal on 28th June.

### NEW PRIZE MONEY LEAGUE FOR CIRENCESTER

OVER recent years the table tennis league in Cirencester (like many other leagues across the country) has seen a reduction

in its number of players and teams. To arrest this decline a new Premier League is being set up and this league will be unique in England as it will offer prize money to the top teams at the end of the season. It is hoped that as well as local teams, other teams will be attracted from across the region to compete in what will hopefully be a very competitive, high quality league.

The format will be the traditional 3-a-side, with each team playing the others twice at Cirencester Deer Park Table Tennis Centre. Matches will be played on the 11-up system with each singles being the best of 5 games. Doubles may be included as well, although this is at the option of the teams entering the league-if the majority wish for doubles to be played then doubles will be played.

The prize money awarded at the end of the season will be between \$ 600 and \$ 1,500 per division - this will be advised to the teams when all entries have been received as the prize money depends on the income generated from players registration fees and team match fees.

The entry fee for this league is £ 10 per player and there is a team match fee of £7.50 (£2.50 per player) payable on match nights. The maximum number of players allowed to be registered for a team is 5.

It is hoped to run 2 divisions in the first season, which will commence in September 2003. The minimum number of teams required to make the league run is 12 (1 division) and the maximum number of teams that can be accepted is 24 (2 divisions). All matches will be played on Monday or Tuesday nights and the closing date for entries for this exciting new venture is 30th June 2003.

# GOURTS DE by John Woodford

- **THE** biggest shake-up in the history of English table tennis has happened. Supporters of Alan Ransome (OBE) could be taking a pessimistic view of what lies ahead. I feel that we must be positive by giving our new chairman Alex Murdoch support for the huge task that lies ahead in front of him.
- **LEAGUES** with the four votes swayed the voting, especially those leagues who do not follow closely what happens in the corridors of power. They voted for a change, because twelve years is a long time at the helm.
- **THE ETTA** has been facing difficult times, as are a number of other nations in Europe and beyond. Germany's registered players list has dropped from one million to 700,000 they pay about £70 a year that produces a huge sum of money.
- **GERMANY** also lost their main sponsor Opel some time back. Holland are in a similar position to England with around 40,000 players and problems with their government support.
- **SWEDEN** and Holland have lost or are about to lose their worldclass players. In France, Gatien is not the force he was. In Germany, Rosskopf is never going to rise to previous heights and Timo Boll did not look a world-beater in Courmayeur.
- **ALL COUNTRIES** in Europe are having huge problems attracting spectators to major events. Courmayeur has a population of only 4,000, so only on the penultimate day did the watchers reach 1,000 boosted by many players.
- **SO**, supporters of Alan Ransome should now follow him in saying that he will help the new regime. The voting 65-35 in favour of a change showed that the country is divided. Now is the time to unite with all the problems coming up. At least the finances are on an even keel, although the news from the Lottery is not encouraging.
- **REGARDING** recent comments in TTN on errors. All sections of the media, even television and radio make errors. Max Hastings, for nearly ten years Editor of The Daily Telegraph has in his recent book made some comments on these lines...
- "DERANGED people write and telephone the media (newspapers, magazines etc) in large numbers. News desks have a tendency to dismiss angry readers brusquely....
- IT is in the nature of newspapers (even some magazines) with the extraordinary speed at which they are produced that even Great Titles have to live with a daily roll-call of errors."
- ALL journalists try to cut down the number of mistakes but some are bound to occur. That applies to this magazine as much as any other.
- **CHINESE** coaches I have spoken with in both table tennis and badminton, hold the view that changes in scoring and equipment are designed to hinder Chinese players as they strive for world domination. Hence the Chinese move in Paris to return to 21-up. A massive majority will vote for 11-up.

### THE SWAYTHLING CLUB INTERNATIONAL by Ron Crayden

IN the annals of table tennis, 1967 was a year to remember. It was the year when the European League was launched and perhaps more importantly the illustrious Swaythling Club was founded.

#### The Foundation


It was on Thursday, 20th April, 1967, that a gathering of ex-players and team captains, twenty three in number, met in Stockholm at the World Championships and initiated an organisation that has become quite unique in the world of sport. The Founder Members were players and champions from many different countries and they decided that the main aims of the club should be defined as follows:-To encourage international friendship through social activities, making it possible for older players, many of whom may be in bad health or without the means to visit and experience the atmosphere of a great tournament. To emphasise the importance of sportsmanship which could be symbolised by the presentation of 'special awards' in national competitions. To co-operate and maintain good relations with the ITTF and continental organisations and to give assistance to TV, radio and news media so that the sport of table tennis is given the best coverage. Finally, to instil into younger players that the cordial get-together of table tennis friends, was a sign of the

existence of a camaraderie club and was just as important as winning cups and medals.

'To establish a name for the new organisation' was met with approval in double quick time and when put to the vote, the title was readily accepted.

It was named therefore the 'Swaythling Cup' after the Dowager Lady Swaythling, mother of the Hon. Ivor Montagu. She will always be remembered as the kind Lady who had generously presented the original Swaythling Cup for the men's team winner in the World Championships. As the club grew in stature and to correctly establish its identity from that of similar named clubs forming in countries throughout the world, the word international was added in 1973. At the original meeting committee members were appointed and Victor Barna became the Founder President. The history of the club would not be complete without special mention being made of Victor Barna for his



influence on the development of the club was immense. He was a person of selfless compassion and a crusader to its cause. He became the mainspring of the club and worked tirelessly to promote it. The late H. Ron Evans paid tribute by saying: "In addition to his unique playing

skills, the other Barna miracle has been the inspiration of the fantastic organisation named 'The Swaythling Club'. His enthusiasm was infectious, so much so that he was able to motivate others to transmit the attraction of the SCI to cold bloodied sceptics.

At this point, I feel it would be remiss of me not to mention that great champion Zarko Dolinar who made the first moves to establish this

international club and in a speech to members he said:-

"I am sure that our Swaythling Club is a unique organisation in the world of sport and I hope that it will continue to develop and promote that which money cannot buy - friendship, health, love, faithfulness, loyalty and tolerance.

In 1982, the first World Veterans Championships were held in Goteborg, Sweden, and attracted over 400 entrants. Such a championship was an activity which fully expressed the principles of the Swaythling Club International. The SCI was quick to give these championships its patronage and presented perpetual trophies for all the singles events; what is more it promised to organise future championships to be held every two years.

Membership

Today, the Swaythling Club International is a respected organisation boasting of more than 600 members from 63 countries without compliance to creed or political affiliation. Many of its members are instantly recognised by wearing a blazer with a distinctive embroidered monogram on the pocket, plus a club tie or scarf. Membership of the SCI is by invitation and shall be available to the following:

1) Players who have won World Championship title events.

2) Players who have represented their country at a minimum of two World Championships.

3) Persons who have been non-playing team captains at a minimum of three World Championships.

# BAGGALEY GLIMBS THE KARLSSON MOUNTAIN

COURMAYEUR is the most spectacular venue in world table tennis. There is no other table tennis venue that I have seen or heard of that can match the snow-covered peaks surrounding Courmayeur, writes John Woodford.

So, Andrew Baggaley, who is a music addict, must have had the Sound of Music" in his mind when he pulled off by far the greatest win of his career bringing down the former European champion and world No.12 Peter Karlsson (Sweden) 4, -9, 6, 3, 5.

Andrew's list of previous best victories include Zoltan Batorfi, Matthew Syed and Carl Prean. His unrelenting two-wing top-spin attack took the Swede by surprise - he was completely unable to cope with the man from Milton Keynes.


The Baggaley triumph came in the second round, setting up a third round clash with the Austrian No.4 Costadin Lengerov.

It was after the Lord Mayor's Show next morning when Baggaley clashed with Lengerov. All the England team and coaches except Alan Cooke were on their way home, continuing this absurd arrangement of sending teams home two days before the end of a tournament. There is so much to be learned watching the best players in Europe battling through the the final rounds.

In this case, there was a need to get the three junior girls back for the Junior Masters at Cippenham.

Lengerov is a class act. In a fine example of controlled play the. Austrian took out Baggaley 0, 10, 6, 8. A further confirmation came as Lengerov bid for the quarter-finals - He was so narrowly defeated 10 in the seventh game by Alexei Smirnov (Russia) after losing seven match points.

That was some consolation for our man Baggaley, who we now know is



capable of great victories, but like all players (even Samsonov) can lose to opponents he should overpower.

Andrew Rushton was the first English man to fall in Qualification knock-out group No.23. He defeated a Bosnian called Hadzijahic 7, 9, 5, 8 before losing in the "final" 7, -7, 5, 7, 5 to the Latvian Vasiljevs. But Rushton is a solid prospect. He looks as though he means business on court, has a good range of strokes in his armoury and like Baggaley, keeps calm in battle.

Alex Perry had to pull out of his first round match with tendonitis in the shoulder - he would have met the top seed Timo Boll.

But, we did see Gareth Herbert in

fine fettle. The wicked serving man from Slough secured a fine win over the Polish No.2 Tomasz Krzeszewski at 6 in the seventh game - a torrid clash, probably one of Gareth's best wins.

Gareth, in a bid for the third round then came up against the young Romanian Constantin Cioti (the former European junior champion). In an enthralling battle Cioti went through at 6 in the sixth game.

### **OUR GIRLS**

Girls is the key word - the England women's squad was led by Helen Lower plus, arguably, our three leading juniors - Georgina Walker, Joanna Parker and 14-years-old Kelly Sibley, possibly the youngest player in the tournament.

Helen secured a smart win in Round 1 of the womens singles over Anna Fedtshenko (Estonia) 3, 9, 8, 5 but then went down to Silvija Erdelji from Yugoslavia. In the womens qualifiers Walker lost to Abbasova (Azerbaijan), Parker found Aldis Larusdottir (Iceland) a shade too strong, whilst the big-hitting looper Sibley lost 4-1 to another Icelander Kristin Jalmarsdottir - an icy business - Iceland is a new nation in European events.

However, our team of girls did beat Luxembourg to finish in 23rd position (men 16th) understandable perhaps when top people like Matthew Syed get injured and Nicola Deaton naturally decides to put her university studies first, bearing in mind that women are unlikely to earn substantial sums of money playing table tennis.

## SAMSONOV UNBEATABLE

I have seen Vladimir Samsonov play poorly on several occasions over the years. This time, the slightly slower conditions suited him. He proved unbeatable and deserved fully his second European crown. Timo Boll was a huge disappointment as the world No.1.

His performances in Italy did not rate him a ranking in the world top ten. He beat the ever-improving



# THE END OF AN ERA? OR MAYBE THE START



EVERY two years since the inception of the European Championships in 1958 the majority of the member counties of the European Table Tennis Union have competed together for the European Team Championships. Never again it would seem according to the President of the ETTU Mr Stefano Bosi. The current European Championships format is a "Monster" in his words. The next championships are planned therefore to only have 16 elite teams participating in each event but the smaller countries (supported by England) will fight this decision further, writes Malcolm Macfarlane.

Enough of the politics, our England Men's team started tremendously in their first match against Norway. Norway, you may remember, had soundly beaten England in Portsmouth not so long ago and that was with Matthew Syed available. The team of Andrew Baggaley, Gareth Herbert and Alex Perry performed exceptionally to win the only 3 games coach Alan Cooke felt they had a chance to win.

Wang Jianfeng of Norway won both his games as was expected but good wins from Andrew and Gareth over European No 51 Geir Erlandsen and a win from Alex over No 81 Istvan Moldovan took the match 3-2. Three very close matches won well.

If only that had continued, from then on having held a place in Division 1 of the qualification for the new format championships with the win over Norway, the England Men's team lost the next three matches 3-0. First Greece, Andrew Baggaley lost to Ntaniel Tsiokas, Gareth Herbert to Kalinkos Kreanga and Alex Perry to Panagiotis Gionis, no real surprise against a very strong Greek team.

Then came Slovakia, Andrew lost to Peter Sereda, Gareth to Jaromir Truska and Alex to Lubomir Pistej, this qualified the team for a final match against Belgium. Alex Perry dropped out and Andrew Rushton came into the team but again there were just three defeats, Herbert lost to Phillipe Saive, Baggaley to Martin Bratanov and Rushton to Marc Closset.


The England Men therefore finished 16th in the Men's Team competition, just one better than previously in Zagreb, and will have to get two wins at least from home and away matches against, probably, Germany, Poland and Russia over the next two years to qualify for the next Championships. The habit of getting close to opponents but just losing at the end must be put behind us, as it was in the Norway match, if we are to have any chance of qualifying for 2005 in Aarhus, Denmark. For example, in the three 3-0 defeats the count on deuce games was 2 for, 9

The England Women's Team is definitely at the start of a new Era. No more Nicola Deaton, no more Katy Parker (at least for now). The experienced Helen Lower was

leading a team of Juniors: Georgina Walker, Joanne Parker and youngest of all Kelly Sibley who is still a cadet. The Women's team was promoted from the second division at the previous Championships in Zagreb and thus could be expected to struggle in this company and that was the story of the first three matches, all 3-0 defeats; first France, Helen Lower lost to Anne-Claire Palut, Georgina Walker lost to Solene Legay and Joanna Parker lost to Agathe Costes, next were Sweden, Georgina lost to Marie Olsson, Joanna to Susanne Jonsson and Helen to Susanna Nilsson.

In the third match Helen Lower was rested and Kelly Sibley joined the team for her first full International, the opponents Poland were just a little too strong, Georgina lost in four to Daria Luczakowska, Joanne lost in five to Magdalena Gorowoska and Kelly three straight against Marta Pilka.

Finally in the match against Luxembourg the Women's Team gained their one 3-2 victory to match the Men's Team. Experienced Peggy Regenwetter was unbeatable for

Luxembourg, although Helen Lower got very close, but wins from Helen and Georgina over Jessica Heinz and a win from Joanna over Simone Haan put the Women's Team in 23rd place, two better that in Zagreb. They are therefore placed to qualify over the next two years in the second division fighting for the four qualifying slots available to that division for the 2005 championships.

Winners in the Men's event, quite unexpectedly, were Belarus, who beat Sweden in the Semi-final and Germany in the Final. The Germans who beat the Czech Republic in the Semi-final were stunned as Evguenij Chtchetinine beat Jorg Rosskopf in the first match to put them on the back foot.

Vladimir Samsonov then destroyed world number 1 Timo Boll to put Belarus two nil ahead, Zoltan Fejer-Konnerth brought Germany back to

2-1 with a win over the young Dimitry Chumakov but Samsonov won the Gold medal for Belarus with a fourth game win over Jorg Rosskopf.

If the winners of the Men's event were unexpected that was nothing as to the Women's event. Italy, the host nation, surpassed I suspect even their own expectations. In the Quarter Final they beat the might of Germany, Struse, Stumper and Elke Wosik 3-2, in the Semi-final it was the Hungarians who fell by 3-1, Csilla Batoffi beat Wenling Tan Monfardini but Maria Fazekas lost to Negrisoli and Krisztina Toth lost to both Nikoleta Stefanova and Wenling Tan Monfardini.

In the final it was Croatia who succumbed. Tamara Boros losing to both Nikoleta Stefanova and Wenling, with Cornelia Vaida beating Wenling



and Andreja Bakula losing to Laura Negrisoli.

The Italian team of 19 years old Nikoleta Stefonova, Wenling Tan Monfardini and their unbeaten captain, Laura Negrisoli had beaten the cream

of European Women's teams on their home soil and were quite unsurprisingly delighted.

Of the other home countries, Wales finished 29th, Scotland 38th in the Men's Team Event and Wales finished 33rd in the Women's Team Event.

GEOFF TAYLOR'S MOUNTAIN VIEW
COURMAYEUR in the Aosta Valley provided the venue for the European Championships, an area usually noted for it's year round skiing and mountain scenery above which Mont Blanc, Europe's tallest mountain, towers, writes Geoff Taylor.

Here it was Vladimir Samsonov and Otilia Badescu, who scaled the heights to win the Mens and Womens singles.

Samsonov beat Torbin Wosik, who has in recent years failed to realise earlier potential, but made good here with wins over Primorac, Gatien, and Rosskopf.

Samsonov had wins over Peter Korbel, Trinko Keen and defending champion Timo Boll.

When Kreanga withdrew with a shoulder injury, I thought that section of the draw might open a path for Alexander Karakasevic, who plays for a team in the USA called "Killer Spin", but a Swede Jens Lindquist won all the close games. Another surprise first round loss was that of Jean Michel Saive to Sedan Milicevic of Bosnia.

Badescu capitalised on the poor form shown by the early favourites Boros, Steff and Toth.

The host nation Italy provided two of the womens semi-finalists, with Wenling Tan Monfardini beating countrywoman Stefanova in one semi. Badescu defeated Erdelji of Yugoslavia, who had despatched top seed Boros.

There are a greater number of defensive players in the womens game, where less powerful attacking strokes makes this type of game

The World Championships in Paris are at the end of May, apart from Samsonov, Boll and Michael Maze, there was no evidence here that the Europeans are in the same class as the Asians, not just the Chinese, but also the Koreans, Japanese and Taiwanese could dominate this forthcoming tournament.

# KOU LEI & ZHAO SHUANG DOMINATE

ANOTHER huge grand prix entry, 200-odd with thirty turned away at a tournament run by a club-The Blackpool TTC. But the downside is the meagre prize fund and the embarrassment of two talented Chinese teenagers winning the two main singles events, writes John Woodford.

The only player from the England camp was the third seed Natalie Bawden (Essex) who reached the quarters but then went down 5-3, 3, 10 to Karen Shepherd from Cheshire, in a bid to reach her appointed spot in the semi-finals.

In the womens singles the shock-ofthe-day was the third round defeat of the local favourite Lyndsey Thornton who crashed to the long pimples owned by Judy Morley (Gloucestershire) 5, 10, -10, 3. Miss


The womens final saw a very determined and spirited attempt by Miss Kiss to bring down the Chinese teenager, whose presence here owes much to Ian Marshall.




# TONY MEREDITH'S VIEW OF THE 10th BLACKPOOL 3 STAR OPEN

### A PLAYERS POINT OF VIEW

ONE of the few consolations for the less-than-successful tournament player is the capacity - with the inconvenience of playing actual matches quickly dispensed with to partake of the other assorted amusements to be found at a large Grand Prix event, writes Rob Parsons.

For this writer, this was probably just as well, after a series of remarkably uninspired performances ensured that I made about as much impression on the various competitions as Iain-Duncan Smith makes at Prime Minister's Question Time.

With plenty of non-playing time to kill, my first recourse was to grab a chair (from the other end of the sports hall naturally, are there ever enough chairs at table tennis



tournaments?) and take in a little action. My forlorn hope was that watching some good players might miraculously provide me with a half-decent forehand and passable footwork via some kind of table-tennis osmosis. Unsurprisingly,

it didn't.

There was some vicarious enjoyment to be had however, as I witnessed one of my travelling companions from the East Midlands cut a swathe through the Men's Band 3 to win the final. Being a consummate showman, he managed to wring every possible drop of drama out of his progression: staving off match points in the second round and somehow coming back from 8-2 down in the final set of the semi-final to win 11-8.

The competition was organised with typical professionalism as both days finished virtually on time, a remarkable achievement given that many of the referees, announcements were rendered nearly inaudible by a tannoy system

that wouldn't,t have been out of

place in a railway station. The umpires went about their business in mostly unobtrusive fashion for most of the weekend too, though I was slightly surprised when an innocuous pre-match knock-up was curtailed by an umpire strolling past the court, despite the fact it had been going on for less than a minute.

I observed with interest to see how strictly the new service rules would be enforced, given that any form of disguise at the point of impact was strictly illegal. This was anything but apparent in the matches I watched, with a few players making a nominal effort to throw in a few more backhand serves, while their use of arm, hand and shoulder to shield the bat-face for forehand serves went entirely unpunished. Clearly, if players are willing to accept illegal serves from their opponents, then umpires are rightly reluctant to enforce the new rule before many have been given a chance to get used to it.

Away from the table tennis, the venue provided an upstairs bar complete with food and FA Cup football, and the usual bevy of American fast-food eateries were within two minutes drive. For those playing the whole weekend, accommodation was cheap and plentiful, and afforded the opportunity to sample the seaside town's numerous nightclubs, gardens and amusement arcades. Given, all this, an excursion to play at the Blackpool Grand Prix is well worth the effort, even for those who, like me, left their table tennis skills somewhere on the M6.

#### **Editorial**

So a new team of ETTA Ltd senior officers, Alex Murdoch as Chairman, Mike Johns as Deputy Chairman and Martin Clark as Treasurer, have been elected by large majorities, to take office immediately following the AGM on 28th June.

They will take the helm at a difficult time. with the World Class Performance funding for table tennis having been slashed (which will have repercussions on the ETTA as a whole), and the level of future exchequer funding being dependent on table tennis being prioritised as one of 16-20 **priority** sports – not yet certain. Staff at Sport England, which distributes Lottery and exchequer money to sport, themselves have suffered from the chill wind of financial economy, jobs having been reduced from 570 to 250 in six months. Being considered a priority for sport Lottery funding depends not so much on size of participation but the ability to bring in the medals now or soon, as the £2.6 million for rowing, £1.06m for judo, £1.19m for canoeing and £1.2m for equestrian suggest (funding figures at 31.3.03): but unfortunately any major international table tennis medal prospects for us are in the longer term and will have to be achieved in the face of almost overwhelming opposition.

The ETTA electorate decided it was 'time for a change', and the Alex Murdoch team heralds the opportunity for a fresh perspective and openness to ideas for developing the game. They were also considered to be approachable, in touch with and listening to the grass roots, and while they are on their honeymoon period, they may have the chance to 'grasp some bullets', namely:

To persuade local leagues and clubs and the players them they are the custodians for the table tennis cause their in with localities, responsibility for seeing it develop and prosper, and they cannot expect the governing body to do this for outgoing As chairman Alan Ransome

- said, 'Local people make things happen'. ('Ask not what table tennis can do for you, ask what you can do for table tennis'!)
- Encouraging local people to make their local league formats and competitions, indeed the whole table tennis experience, more attractive, so as to recruit and hold on to newcomers. (Don't just try to satisfy the (ever-dwindling numbers of) backwoods players who want table tennis to stay as it is and has always been.)
- Developing individual (catch-all) forms of ETTA membership/affiliation for all players.
- Encouraging everyone to work together, united in a common cause, for the good of (greater) table tennis. Utopia! But we must work towards this, and which means we must support Alex. Mike. Martin et al and wish them every success.

Perhaps unfairly perceived by some as remote and out of touch with members, the outgoing management team have worked very hard to promote table tennis and deserve our thanks. And not through any sense of sycophancy or subordination (and I have always been given a freehand in my editorials), I give special mention to Ransome, who with his legendary workrate and formidable powers of persuasion has ensured that table tennis has punched much heavier than our weight and that we have been included in many national programmes and funding streams rather than being sidelined. His knowledge and passion for table tennis are immense and the Ormesby Club will become an even greater force, now that Alan has more time to devote to it!

Accepting the lifestyle problems for residents and that there was a lack of finance for building up a regional structure to feed it with new players, I have always been supportive of the National Training Centre at Nottingham, which has never had its funding, and hence its future, secure.

To reach top international standard, you have to train hard every day with the right sparring partners, coaching and sports science back-up, and be able to play in top level competitions abroad. Nottingham brought all these factors together, and bearing in mind our declining playing standards, and the availability of the Lottery funding, I saw no better way to Of course you can only work with the players you have got, some players did not take full advantage of the opportunity and in any case in takes 10-15 years from scratch to bring on new generation of senior internationals, but just where would we now be had we not had the Centre? It does not bear thinking about!

Acting Performance Director Steen Kyst Hansen would not be human if he was not now considering his future, but I hope he stays in England. Always rational, approachable and interested, he has worked exceptionally hard as an administrator, active coach, non-playing captain and manager, and tournament/competition observer (he more than any other national coach in recent years has attended the junior domestic circuit), and under his brief stewardship England has made steady progress.

The England men had an excellent 3-2 win over Norway at the European Championships in Courmayeur, Italy, which ensured they finished 16th and will play in the top group for qualification for the 2005 European Championships. A young (apart from Helen Lower) women's squad did well to finish 23<sup>rd</sup>. In the men's singles, 20 year old Andrew Baggaley produced results of the like that we have not seen for a long time for an England player: after knocking out the highly rated Dane, Martin Monrad. he then sensationally defeated the world no.11 and no.5 seed, Peter Karlsson (Sweden)! And Gareth Herbert, who seemed to be making similar break-through two years ago, returned to form with a great win over the world no.48, Tomastz Krzeszevski (Poland).

Stop press! I have just learnt that Tim Yarnall and Bradley Evans played well at the Austrian Youth Open on 18<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> April, and Darius Knight lost in the cadet boys' final (he had beaten Tim 3-2 in the semis).

ETTA Director of Teaching and Training, Peter Hirst, has moved on to become the new Performance Director for the English Squash Association (more about that in Muhr's Memo). Peter of course had a long stint from the early 70s as an ETTA national coach (when he had a big input into the coaching manual), before moving out to New Zealand for a similar position in 1985. During his more recent employment with the ETTA over the last 4-5 years, Peter very successfully re-constituted the annual conference at Lilleshall, and revamped the coaching syllabus so that, for example, reading the game and self-learning had a much higher priority. We wish him well in squash.

China have submitted a proposition for the ITTF AGM, in Paris in May, for the return of the 21 up scoring system, very possibly because their top players have been less assured of winning under the new (somewhat unpredictable in terms of results) 11 up system, and owing to China's political clout it is just possible it may be passed! A Rules Committee proposition to change the wording of the service law to, 'From the start of the service until it is struck, the ball shall be above the level of the playing surface and behind the server's end line, and it shall not be hidden from the receiver and the umpire by the server or his doubles partner or anything they wear or carry', is likely to gain majority support.

Owing to TTN coming out late (apologies again), and to a relative shortage of copy for this edition, I have brought some county notes forward for publication now. Could contributors please note that I do not normally publish local closed tournament reports unless they are incorporated into county notes. However, in the absence of notes from a particular county, I very occasionally place a closed tournament report into the appropriate county slot.

# COMMUNITY CLUB DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

The ETTA has been invited to be part of a new funding programme for facilities launched recently by the **Department of Culture Media and Sport and Sport England**. Paul Baker,

ETTA Facilities Officer, provides further background to the programme.

The government, through the **Department of Culture Media and Sport (DCMS),** has allocated £60 million over the next three years to a **Community Club Development Programme (CCDP),** which is being administered by **Sport England**.

The National Governing Bodies (NGBs) of sixteen sports (Band 1: cricket, football, rugby union and tennis and Band 2: badminton, basketball, canoeing, cycling, gymnastics, hockey, judo, netball, rowing, rugby league, swimming and table tennis) have been invited to be part of the programme. The NGBs were selected based on their national participation rates, number of registered clubs, level of funding, participation in Clubmark and national facility strategy.

The four **Band 1 sports** each have a **fixed allocation**, while the twelve **Band 2 sports** will be **bidding for a share of £20 million**. It is intended that altogether around **250-300 projects** will receive support.

#### Aims and Objectives

The overall aims of the programme are to:

- assist in creating a sustainable and financially viable sports club infrastructure in England that links with schools, provides support and pathways for identifying and developing talented individuals, and meets the needs of local communities
- increase club membership levels among young people and to support the development of quality assured 'junior' sections of clubs
- increase club membership among women, black and other ethnic groups and people with disabilities.

The programme's objectives are to:

- promote the development of sports clubs for young people through enhancing club school links and extending community access
- promote the development of 'hub/beacon' clubs that create club networks and pathways through sport linked to the NGB programmes
- promote the development of multisport clubs to achieve economies of scale and to promote cross sport co-operation and development
- ensure that facility investment is supported by investment in the training and development of key

- people (coaches, officials and administrators)
- create a large investment programme and ensure long-term viability and sustainability.

#### Strategic Need

Projects must relate their NGB's Development and Facility Strategy Plans, which will be best met by:

- projects which provide enhanced facilities for sports at clubs with inadequate existing provision
- projects which demonstrate links to other NGB priority development work, e.g. volunteering, coaching, talent development and club/school links
- projects serving clusters and/or meeting the needs of several clubs/sports
- clubs able to provide the greatest sporting and community benefit in terms of contributing to improved health, community cohesion, crime prevention, etc.
- clubs in areas of both sporting and greatest social deprivation
- projects providing greatest increased access to facilities for community use.

#### **Eligibility**

The programme is for the **development** of **capital facilities**, which can be for new buildings or the conversion/upgrade of existing facilities. It can also cover items of major fixed equipment for indoor and outdoor spaces.

The programme is targeted at areas of multiple deprivation in the 20% highest ranked local authority wards as identified in the Index of Multiple Deprivation 2000 (IMD2000). These are the same areas covered by the Priority Areas Initiative of the Sport England Lottery Fund, details of which can be found on the Sport England website at www.sportengland.org

Each NGB is currently working with Sport England to produce an 'Investment Strategy', a framework that will be used by each NGB to select projects. The ETTA strategy will reflect the success of the *PremierClub* programme and of the model for facilities of the ETTA Facility Development Strategy and their relevance to the Community Club Development Programme.

The ETTA will be looking for projects to demonstrate how they:

- are development led and are a catalyst for change
- have a detailed development plan

- are about increasing participation particularly amongst the programme's priority groups
- are needed strategically in terms of location, design and intended use
- are financially viable
- have a strong development team both within the TT organisation and possible partners
- support the development of coaches and volunteers
- offer 'value for money' in relation to the amount of funding sought and have partner funding where appropriate.

#### **Process and Timetable**

Projects will be considered in **three rounds**, round 1 will be for Band 1 NGBs, while rounds 2 and 3 will consist of both Band 1 and Band 2 NGBs.

NGBs will present portfolios of projects to a **Project Board** consisting of representatives from **Sport England**, **DCMS and the NGBs**. The Board will select schemes and give in principle Stage 1 support for each round. Selected projects will then be required to develop detailed applications at Stage 2.

Current dates for submission of Band 2 NGB portfolios are **September 2003** for Round 2 and **March 2004** for Round 3.

#### Conclusion

This programme represents a great opportunity for the development of table tennis facilities. Hockey coach Trevor Chandler gives an (edited) view from another sport. From Sports Coach UK FHS October 2002:

# IN MY VIEW Coaching: Destroying the Flair and Spontaneity of the Individual?

There are a lot of us who think we know best, but I also believe that the potential negative consequences of over-coaching should be more recognised by the preachers and teachers in sport. The difference in confidence and motivation level between individuals learning for themselves as opposed to being taught - whether they are players or coaches is often a significant factor in that person's development and fulfilment of his or her potential. Although some people like to be guided, perhaps from the cradle to the grave, it is through such guidance that the importance of the flair spontaneity of the individual may not be fully realised. The wide use of the expression 'to be focused' also suggests that outside influences should be kept to a minimum.

Shouldn't we learn from the success of our top sportsmen and sportswomen who use the tools around them, but are never dominated by them? A focused Faldo in his day and, for that matter, Nicklaus and Palmer would not have allowed a psychologist to intervene as Ernie Els did during the last stages of this year's Open Championship. Els won despite the psychologist help; not because of it. He had a psychologist, so his play faltered until his individual, focused skill finally shone through.

Sport, it seems, may be going the same way as business, commerce, the legal profession, health and safety legislation and the like. Whatever your nine-tofive job is, it's unlikely that you haven't experienced the everincreasing pressure to attend expensive courses only to be reassured that you're not missing I recently attended a child protection course which, while being a pleasant social evening, only served to raise more questions than answers. It also highlighted the fact that the present system achieves little in the way of prevention and, in fact, only served as a deterrent to the coaches attending. Similarly, is it just that I read more these days, or is our sports jargon getting more complicated?

this is a real turn-off for many of the people I know who help out on Sunday mornings.

Getting back to the concerns about too much coaching for players and teaching for the coaches, this is not just the British way, it is the way of anywhere else in the world – apart from the good old USA. We all know what happened in last year's British Lions rugby tour when flair and spontaneity were coached out of the game. For those who don't, we lost despite being the better side. In the same way, why do we love the way the Brazilians play football? Didn't they win something recently?

One final point on spontaneity as my meanderings are beginning to resemble, without the humour of course, those of a certain Billy Connelly. Let's take a quote from the great man, when he's expressing a level of intolerance with bureaucratic this evermore controlled world. 'They're taking more and more away from us everyday. We shouldn't let them get away with it'. However, in the interests of good balance, we all know the benefits of teamwork, coaching in its rightful place and good discipline.

Although Peter Hirst has now moved on to become Performance Director for the Squash Association, readers may be interested in one of the last articles he penned (for the English National Championships programme, 2003).

#### THE FUTURE OF COACHING By Peter Hirst, (former) ETTA Teaching & Training Director

The Prime Minister is reported as saying that sport is a major asset, which is under used. **Sport means many different things to many people**; to some it is keeping healthy and fit, for others it is social inclusion and just being with friends.

The statistics show that it costs the government £26k to keep someone in care per year and a massive £126k to keep someone in custody. Obesity and related ailments costs a staggering £2 billion per year. So it's about time that sport got more of the cake to keep people occupied in a healthy environment, such as playing table tennis. After all, we all know the benefits, don't we?

A government task force on coaching is saying that coaching is central to sport at every level and that we need more coaches. There is a perception that there is a 'black hole' where Level 1 coaches disappear, never to be seen

again. This is certainly true in table tennis. A strong rumour is that coaches can earn money, which is true, but most coaches coach only to put something back into table tennis, with the majority paying for the privilege in just the same way that people pay to play or watch our sport. Some coaches simply cannot afford to stay in coaching.

There is a need, definitely a need, to **professionalise coaching**, not just in financial terms but in attitude and training so that we can **move our sport of table tennis forward in positive ways**, that provide all who choose to play the best opportunities that we can.

The news is not all bad, as new initiatives by government will very soon be investing heavily into coaching over a three year period, with £15 million coming on stream in year 1 starting April 2003, rising to £30 million in year 3. We will first see an impact with a TV campaign on BBC to attract people to the virtues of coaching. The two key areas to move forward will be coach development and coach deployment with career pathways, targeting adults and parents of children already playing, to have an impact at introduction and participation levels. The money will be going into sports coach UK for coach education and into local authorities for deployment, with some going into national governing bodies of sport, so we in table tennis will be bidding for our share along with all other sports.

Another former ETTA employee – he was our first Performance Director – Michel Gadal, now Technical Director for his native France – was the then Canadian National Coach, having previously been a National Coach for France and having coached Jean-Phillipe Gatien. Below are my (KM's) notes on Michel's presentation to the training course at the Manchester World Championships. Owing to the difficult circumstances, we may have not got the best of Michel in England, but his ideas are always worth referring to:

PRESENTATIONS FROM INTERNATIONAL TRAINING COURSE FOR COACHES held in conjunction with the 44<sup>th</sup> World Table Tennis Championships, Manchester 1997

Michel Gadal felt that the training components for achieving a higher

performance level of were technical/tactical, physical and mental preparation, and that at the highest level it was the mental side that could make all the difference. Fundamental elements to achieve a higher level were adaptability (players need to learn techniques to adapt to any given situation, 'giving an answer before a question is asked'), anticipation ('knowing the question before the question is asked', knowing and watching opponent rather than focusing on self - in practice, players tend to focus too much on themselves - and if you play at high speed, being aware that 80% of balls will come back in the same direction if you play down the line), speed (the need to be fast, to give speed to the ball, to take it early between off-the-bounce and the top-ofthe-bounce - and to move fast, which must be taught early), precision (top players use the lines - corner and wide of the corner - and occasionally hit to the crossover, while weak players play mainly to the middle and a study in 1989 indicated that it was better to play the ball 20% slower but deeper rather shorter but faster) than concentration (it is a game between two brains, and you need to focus on the right element and learn not to be distracted, and practice for keeping focus in non-playing time between points/games, etc.).

Every time a coach is coaching, he should ask himself whether he is including at least one of these elements; adaptability, anticipation, speed, precision, concentration. Coaches sometimes know too much about technique but do not know about the game. The game is more important than technique – you adapt your techniques to the game. Speed and accuracy should be increased together. On service, teach first with wrist only for backspin, sidespin and topspin. The right service should be adopted according to the player's game and the situation

Adaptability: a player must be able to give a good/appropriate answer, preferably a topspin with speed, to any ball. The technique may be with the whole body if there is time, or with just the elbow and wrist. The player should train for the game: practice should be for the game aimed situation. Sometimes it is more important for a player to adopt his own tactics and learn from his mistakes. Train for courage: table tennis is a very risky game. Many coaches tell players not to take risks, but from the beginning, we should train players to think for themselves, take risks and make unexpected play, and when the situation is tight to do something more (though not crazy). Coach for the future: the player should practice the game – his game – for the match at the same intensity as for the match. He should try to win every single point.

In practice, one partner can first be cooperative (i.e. feed), then be 50% cooperative, then be competitive/difficult all of the time. The number in a training session should ideally be 10-16, and partners should be changed every exercise (30-40 minutes per exercise) so as to adapt to differing playing styles. If a player is making less than 4 successful routines out of 10 then the routine is too difficult. But if he is achieving 8 out of 10, then it is too easy. Therefore, make the exercises easier or more difficult. Do not accept the player making too many mistakes. Also, in practice, teach refocusing in non-playing time to break high level of mistakes.

Multi-ball is good for learning/fixing technique but not for thinking skills, and there should be a break for refocusing between each routine. Do not use multi-ball within 2-3 weeks of a competition. The ideal time is July and August.

Regarding duration of exercises, it is good to change the length of exercises, being adaptive of time, and not staying too rigid to timing. Be open to what is happening, listen to players (if you can trust them) and be flexible. Players need to be fresh. Let players try things out in games and learn from their own experience. Before competition, use the type of practice as in competition, scheduling in breaks between exercises so as to learn to wait between matches.

Adaptability of technique; technique should be taught for use in different situations. The hand/wrist is the most adaptable and precise joint, appropriate for speed and accuracy. youngsters, first teach, 'What should I do with the ball?' Maybe it is an arm action first, starting with the wrist and building up with the forearm, whole arm and then whole body (upper body and lower body for power). (When the player is timid, use the whole body.) Youngsters learn this very quickly. A soft hand is important for returning short service. Let players find their own motion and tempo. Start with an early timing (although it is more difficult). Start playing slow and build up to fast rather than fast to slow - the timing point is slightly later (near top of bounce) for the slow ball. Teach difficult techniques - what is hardest to learn - early, as youngsters are more able to absorb new knowledge quickly. The best age to begin learning the table tennis is 7-8. Build round

something good/new in the player and always be positive in your coaching. A challenge always needs to be given to a very talented player, possibly by giving a more difficult task within the same exercise, e.g. playing to half of the table side instead of the whole table.

Michel conducted research before the Olympics on the amount of practice time players put in. Japanese/Asians did the most (2,000 hours a year), but the average for seniors was 1,200 hours (4 hours a day). For juniors the average was 700-800 hours and the cadets 400-500 hours. In France cadets trained 10-12 hours a week (6 hours was not enough!), and juniors 16-18 hours. Cadets had a competition every 3-4 weeks and juniors more competitions. All top players have, when they were juniors aged between 15-17, beaten top seniors. Regarding competition, should always have a players reasonable chance to win or at least put up a fight. Players learn from playing at 19 all.

Michel had used the following **physical exercises** to develop fast footwork and strength in the legs, short sprints (say 30m) with short steps, running down hill (used short steps) and running round the side of cycle tracks. Multiball for speed (and strength of the arm) should be done at the beginning of a practice session before a player is tired.

**Speed glue** can be used when players are young provided practice is plentiful: if they practice only 3 times a week – no glue; if they practice 12-15 hours a week, use glue. Also let youngsters try out **different rubbers**, perhaps 30 minutes a week in match play. They will develop a better understanding of playing against different rubbers (e.g. long pimples). Be flexible in teaching **flicking** – the timing and the action. There are many answers.

Remember, it is the player who plays, who wins, who loses. Therefore the coach should keep a distance.

#### IDENTIFYING THE (CURRENT) LEADING PLAYER/PERSONALITY

Cheshire correspondent Alan Blears has suggested an interesting idea for TTN:

"How about asking our leading players to supply early photos of themselves? Then you could include one (picture) each month and ask readers to identify him/her, giving a few clues. The first correct answer to win, say, six balls."

Sounds good, and I will pass this on to editor John Wood. What do readers think?

# IDENTIFYING (PAST) LEADING PLAYERS/PERSONALITIES

Terry Ridgway has suggested another idea, which like the one above has been used before, but does create a lot of interest: printing old photographs of major table tennis occasions and inviting readers to identify the occasion, the place and the people pictured.

The example Terry gave was of a picture that a Margaret Murray of Shrewsbury had come across while going through her grandfather's things and had sent to the Shropshire Star for their 'Pictures From The Past' spot. Two Star readers in particular, Eddie Shotton and Frank Leath, responded saying that they had actually been to the event: an exhibition given at the old Shrewsbury Swimming Baths in February 1939 (or 1938!) by touring world champions, Bohumil Vana (Czechoslovakia), Victor Barna and Laszlo Bellak (Hungary) (Hungary), who were shown with (identified) local officials and players in this and another photo.

Thoughts or contributions from readers on these lines would also be appreciated.

#### CAUTION ADVISED ON SUPPLEMENT USE Athlete Supplement Advice Statement

UK Sport – which is responsible for promoting ethically fair and drug-free sport – is among a number of prominent UK sporting bodies releasing an advisory statement today to UK athletes on the use of supplements. The statement warns athletes to be 'extremely cautious about the use of any supplements'.

Athletes are advised that 'no guarantee can be given that any particular supplement is free from prohibited substances as these products are not licensed and are not subject to the same strict manufacturing and labelling requirements as licensed medicines'.

The statement – published by UK Sport, the British Olympic Association, the British Paralympic Association, the National Sports Medicine Institute and the home country sports councils – reminds athletes of the strict liability rules that exist in sport, which state that athletes are responsible for any substance found in their system.

The last few years have seen a number of findings for substances such as

nandrolone which have been traced to poorly labelled or contaminated supplements. In February 2003, UK Sport published its 'Nandrolone Progress Report' summarising the findings. It highlighted the findings of a major study conducted in Cologne in 2002 which showed **94 out of 634** samples from non-hormonal dietary supplements contained prohibited anabolic-androgenic steroids listed on the label. In each case, athletes taking the contaminated supplements would test positive under the Olympic Movement Anti-Doping Code rules.

Richard Callicott, Chief Executive of UK Sport, said: "We know that the vast majority of UK athletes are committed to competing drug-free. Part of our role as the national anti-doping organisation is to provide athletes and their support personnel with the information that encourages and allows them to do so. That is why we are delighted that seven other organisations in the UK have joined us in sending this important message about supplements to our athletes."

"The last thing we want is to have a British athlete test positive by taking a contaminated supplement and facing consequences which could so easily be avoided by heeding this advice that has been developed by qualified members of the major sporting organisations in the UK."

The statement draws particular attention to the difference between a medicine and a supplement, with licensed medicines being labelled with a product license number which will not be found on a supplement label.

"Claims of 'quicker recovery' or an 'instant increase in strength' are commonplace on supplement labels", says Callicott. "However, if these supplements do as they claim and make physiological changes to the body then they should be viewed with caution. This is an important distinction for athletes to remember. The absence of an approved quality standard is of major concern, not only in the UK, but throughout the world. organisations represented here in the UK are all committed to working towards a permanent solution to this problem. This may require some significant changes within the supplement industry."

#### (SPORTSMATCH) FUNDING FOR GRASS ROOTS SPORT RENEWED

Sport England has confirmed funding for Sportsmatch, the incentive scheme for grass roots sport sponsorship, for 2003/04. The scheme will have £3.675 million to support some 370-400 grass roots sports programmes.

Sport England has also confirmed its intention to continue funding for the following two years at the same level subject to provision being made to Sport England by the Department for Culture, Media and Sport which has separately confirmed its intention to include Sportsmatch in its forward plans.

"This is great news," said Sportsmatch director Mike Reynolds. "It means that unless there are major, unforeseen economic developments our future is secure until March 2006".

"Applications, however, continue to be well above the funding levels available, as they have for every one of the ten years of the scheme's existence. Most of these applications are for perfectly viable grass roots sporting programmes and their rejection is a source of huge disappointment to organisers, sponsors and, of course, ourselves. So despite the good news on Sportsmatch we will continue to make a case for increased funds to Sport England and Government."

Note: Sportsmatch in England is funded by the Department for Culture, Media and Sport through Sport England. Sportsmatch is administered by the Institute of Sports Sponsorship and has an annual budget £3.675 million approximately 370-400 awards each year. An independent panel meets eight times a year to assess applications. In 10 years Sportsmatch has encouraged 4,000 companies to sponsor projects in 73 sports. An estimated 12 million people - overwhelmingly under 18's have participated in Sportsmatchbacked schemes which in total have put £75 million into grass roots sport.

# TOP SPORT NET AND WALL GAMES

BT TOP Sport, sponsored by BT and developed by the Youth Sport Trust with relevant governing bodies of sport, supported teachers and community deliverers as they introduced specific

sports and games, including table tennis, to young people aged 7 to 11, providing them with the opportunities to develop sporting skills.

The TOP Sport table tennis bag came with cards and the necessary equipment to deliver games.

Now the Youth Sport Trust and the governing bodies of table tennis, badminton, lawn tennis, squash and volleyball, with the (somewhat controversial!) support of Cadbury, have developed generic cards for 'Net and Wall' games and in this editor's (KM's) opinion, racket skills learnt in the early stages are transferable across racket sports. Below is what the Youth Sport Trust says about the programme:-

TOP Sport Net and Wall Games have been designed to give children an introduction to the skills needed for the games of badminton, squash, table tennis, tennis and volleyball. The activities offer a range of net and wall games skills in an enjoyable format. The cards cover the following areas:

**Are you ready?** – The ready position and its importance.

Flights and arrivals, Rebound ready – Judging the flight of an object and getting into position to catch it.

Getting a grip - Holding a racket.

**Serving it up** – Striking a ball.

**Roving returns** – Returning a ball or shuttlecock thrown by a partner.

**In or out** – Getting the ball or shuttlecock in court.

**Reliable rallies** – Keeping the ball or shuttlecock in play

Far and near and side to side – Sending the ball or shuttlecock to different areas of the court and finding the effect on opponents.

**Go for ten** – Attacking space to score points.

**Team two v two** – A team game for all the sports.

**Including young disabled people** – Ideas for including all children in the activities.

Knowledge and understanding of fitness and health – Ideas for embedding knowledge and understanding of fitness and health in every lesson.

The front of each TOP Sport card contains the following:

- a brief description of the activity
- safety points
- suggestions for equipment
- think INC, advice.

The brief description should help teachers understand the activity and give information about numbers in teams and court sizes.

The safety points offer simple things to check to help provide a safe environment for children.

The list of equipment helps teachers see at a glance the essential equipment necessary for each game.

**Think INC.** stands for think inclusive. These panels offer specific advice for young disabled people or children who may be challenged by learning games.

TOP Sport now uses the four aspects of **National Curriculum 2000** on the back of the cards. These include:

- Acquiring and developing skills
- Selecting and applying, skills and tactics
- Evaluating and improving performance
- Knowledge and understanding of fitness and health.

Acquiring and developing skills list key teaching points to help children improve. Adaptations and variations are also offered in this section using the STEP format.

S Space

T Task

E Equipment

P People

Teachers can use the suggestions under these headings to vary games and to make them easier and harder and to include young disabled people.

Selecting and applying, skills and tactics and evaluating and improving performance offer simple ideas for questions that teachers could use to help children develop in these areas.

Knowledge and understanding of fitness and health is covered in two ways. There is a panel on each card offering one outcome that could be achieved with the activity. There is also a separate card which gives ideas that could be incorporated into any of

the activities in the TOP Sport Net and Wall Games.

The final proved too much for Lowe, but only just, as top seed Paul Sanderson needed a deciding end win to become Leeds **Men's Singles champion**.

Sarah Noutch retained her Ladies' Singles title, again leaving Bramley club mate Amanda Bell as runner up. In his third final of the day, Keith Bell lost out to doubles partner Paul Sanderson in the veterans' event.

The **junior events** were dominated by players from Bramley Ebenezer as Minesh Tanna reversed last season's final by defeating Chris Parker in the **boys' final**, while Amanda Bell finished undefeated in the **round robin girls' event**.

Victoria team-mates Paul Stephenson and Nigel Pennock had the better understanding in the Men's Doubles final, as they took the title against Paul Sanderson and Keith Bell. The following notes should have been included in the April TTN. Our apologies for the omission:

#### Keighley - A Success Story

One local league that has reversed the national decline in playing numbers is the West Yorkshire association of Keighley and District. In 1996 Keighley seemed to be heading into oblivion as they were no longer affliated to the Yorkshire TTA and by

1997 they had one league with only eight teams and the same team had won the league for the previous five seasons.

League Secretary John Paul Dunn was joined on the committee by David Adams who soon became development officer and between them assisted by a number of willing volunteers they have transformed the Keighley League. They rejoined the Yorkshire fold and their first action was to introduce a non league players competition and they went about this in a novel way.

Adams took posters to local filling stations and after receiving permission attached them to petrol station doors. The same posters were left at newsagents which simply said "Wanted Table Tennis Players. Must be between 10 and 70 years old". With the help of about a month's free advertising on local radio station, Fresh AM, they were able to hold a 60 player tournament of non league players and through this tournament they were able to introduce 7 new teams to the league.

The next step was to introduce some coaching into the area. They now have regular coaching in the four regions of the district. The area is set up in a novel way as Keighley is on the gateway to the Yorkshire Dales and it was decided to set a compass on Keighley Town Hall and radiate 15 miles in each direction to decide the outer boundary. With many villages scattered around the dales the next attempt was to convert village halls into venues which proved a success.

Table Tennis was generated in the district thanks to two lottery sports for all grants as tables, etc were bought and spread around small village halls where interest had been shown, and in the meantime the demise of the nearby Lancashire leagues in Colne and Nelson brought some fresh blood into Keighley to play. Due to the fine work shown by the Keighley officials and the influx of new players the standard of play in the league had rocketed by 2000 with many local league players using Keighley as the second league they chose to play in during the season. This season sees 3 divisions of 10 teams playing in the Keighley League whilst their representative teams are performing with distinction as their men's team has won the Yorkshire league, with the juniors and veterans still unbeaten well after the halfway stage of the campaign.

Major driving force JP Dunn recognises that the league cannot rest on its laurels and work goes on. Pockets of young players are being coached throughout the region and as well as practice they are all involved in a weekend junior league. The league is confident of being able to introduce a 4<sup>th</sup> division next season.

It is also hoped to appoint a specialist table tennis coach to work in schools. In a recent survey, table tennis had come out top as the most popular sport wanted by the area schools.

The more established youngsters are involved in the British Junior League and often attend open tournaments and more and more older players from the league are also playing British League, Grand Prix and Veterans tournaments. The league now has around 120 registered players and has two schools who have table tennis clubs each around 30 strong. Their closed championships attracted an entry of 60 players.

JP Dunn and David Adams deserved immense credit for what they have achieved in such a short time but would not like to forget the efforts of local volunteers such as Steve Rutherford and Peter Holbrook.

# MUHR'S MEMO: Information Officer Messages from Ken Muhr

Matthew Syed made much of the table tennis news over the month. Times feature of 18th April described how and why he was practising with speed glue on his forehand as, 'one last-ditch...attempt to qualify for the (Olympic) Games', a theme that was picked up by John Woodford in the Daily Telegraph. Matthew also got a feature in The Times (19th April) on snooker's Stephen Henry, coinciding with the start of the Embassy World Championships at The Crucible, **Sheffield**, on which he (Matthew) was commentating for British Eurosport. Matthew also slipped into the article the fact that the Continental Masters tennis event (with Samsonov and himself competing) was being held at the same venue on 9<sup>th</sup> August, and being filmed by BBC During the snooker world championships, Matthew actually got himself filmed by the BBC for two long plugs for the Continental Masters table tennis (hotline: 0114 2496000)! He has also been interviewed on BBC Radio 5 Live and Talk Sport about the event.

The European Championships in and particularly **Andrew** Italy, Baggaley's performances, achieved some shorts in The Daily Telegraph (John Woodford), The Times and the Daily Express. John Woodford also got a few pieces published on the ETTA election result, while in The Times (9th April), a triumphant John Goodbody gloated over the unseating of Alan Ransome and repeated some unsubstantiated allegations.

While John Woodford has mentioned directly that the Liebherr World Individual **Table Tennis** Championships are still to go ahead in Paris from 19-25 May, despite SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome), this fact has also been referred to (including by Richard Eaton) in several newspaper reports on the postponement, owing to SARS, by the International Badminton Federation the World **Badminton** Championships, due to have been held in Birmingham from 12-18 May. It is perhaps also worth recording that the table tennis championships is the bigger event, having 700 players from 116 countries, as opposed to 300 plus players from 48 countries for the badminton. However, our sympathy should be with our English colleagues in badminton - we too would have been devastated if a big event to be staged here had been cancelled. The Observer Sport Monthly (May), by the way, has published a rare preview on the Paris World TT Champs.

I believe that Darius Knight has appeared again on a BBC children's TV programme, because they asked me for background information on him. Table tennis and The Mighty Walzer were again mentioned in a large (two page) Daily Telegraph feature (12th April) on, 'our funniest, most overlooked, most furious living writer', Howard Jacobson. Howard has also been filmed for a BBC 4 feature on table tennis, which has not been broadcast yet, while there are still plans to make a full length film of 'his semiautobiographical book, The Mighty Walzer.

Readers may already be aware that the ETTA is developing a new website to come live at the end of May with SportFocus, who already give table tennis good coverage on www.sportfocus.com

published report on www.sportcal.com stated that 'sports broadband service users are to rise 543 per cent by 2008'. However Tang was his equal in the fourth, levelling the match and then sneaking home 11-9 in the fifth. It was a match of world class quality.




Italy's star Chinese Yang Min joined in too. He and Mark Palmer played a succession of matches during the


first day of the Grand Prix which thrilled everyone.

The addition of Simon Rockall to their squad in the no. 1 position gave EBS added strength in depth, and their side of Rockall, Keiron Dabbs, Steve Munson and Dave Gattiss were simply that little bit too strong. EBS also came close to nicking a draw against Cippenham, finally succumbing 5-3. # ESSEX PREMIER CHAMPIONS

THE final round of matches in the Junior and Senior Premier Divisions were played at Grantham over the weekend of 22/23 March 2003, writes Stan Clarke.





To get some topspin on the ball using Half Long it is best to use 2mm sponge thickness with speed glue. When defending the rubber is very safe and it is easy to swap from defence to attack.



Even Shaun Marples (now no. 70 in England) couldn't produce his best form finding himself outgunned 3-1 by Stephen Horsfield (ranked no. 165 in England).

Division Two (South) - PSP

Westinsure were able to saunter to the title eventually taking the division by a massive margin of eight points despite losing their first match of the season against London Progress III. In comparison the battle to avoid relegation could not have been more intense as no fewer than six teams could be seen scrutinising the scoreboard closely on the Sunday morning realising that two defeats could see them relegated. The Final League table showed just what an evenly matched division it was; with a mere two points covering those teams placed second, third, fourth and fifth.

After a dramatic change in fortunes it was Guildford (who quite incredibly had not scored a single point after the first round of matches) who came through to take second place. Those football followers hoping for a Newcastle United success in the Premiership should certainly be encouraged by this! Guildford showed they meant business on the Saturday morning by holding PSP Westinsure to a draw. Michael Hill won twice including a vital 11-7 in the fifth end success against Dave Richards in the last game. Three further victories, against EBS-Orange Northampton II (5-3), Cippenham II (5-3) and Hastings (6-2) saw them complete their meteoric jump from sixth place in the table. The 5-3 victory over EBS went a long way to deciding second place as Guildford surged into a 3-0 lead. Adam Laws was on superb form with convincing wins over Simpon Pryke and Dannel Pang whilst Pryke hit back with a 3-2 victory over Jason Tendler. Their no. 3 Laws with seven wins out of eight proved to be their most succesful player with Jason Tendler (six wins out of eight) adding excellent support from the no. 1 position. EBS Orange Northampton were also well beaten 7-1 by PSP who turned in their most impressive performance of the weekend. A very strong allround team effort from Eddie Roofe, Trevor Lloyd, Tim O'Mahoney and Dave Richards throughout the season. With England no. 60 Kevin Satchell "in reserve" PSP should give a good account of themselves in division 1 next year.

Horsham II's weekend started promisingly enough with a 4-4 draw against London Progress III with their no. 3 player Matthew Gander taking the Player-of-the-Match Award by winning twice. Matt's 13-11 in the fifth end victory over England no. 13 ranked Junior Girl Egle Adomelyte undoubtedly played a large part in enabling Horsham to secure their point. It was also to be the only game



Egle lost all weekend as she went on to take the scalps of such established British League performers as Graham Carter (Horsham), Robert Lemon and Robert Hansell (Cippenham), Andrew Packford and Mark Newns (Oxford Fireplace Centre) and Tim O'Mahoney (PSP Westinsure), an outstanding weekend's work. The Saturday afternoon clash between Horsham and Oxford Fire Place Centre suddenly took on a renewed significance and also produced one of the weekend's most unexpected results. Horsham were never in the match as Oxford ran out 8-0 winners. a result that wiped out the games advantage Horsham had over Oxford going into that game. Karl Bushell, Mark Newns, Ray Powell and Andrew Packford totally dominated affairs. A Sunday morning match against PSP Westinsure saw Horsham miss out 5-3 and a final 6-2 defeat against relegated Hastings saw them demoted along with their Sussex colleagues. Joint second at Christmas they could not have seen this coming. Former Sussex first team star Paul Barry was unbeaten for Hastings whilst current Sussex County first team player Rose Rainton took the Player-of-the-Match Award for her excellent wins over Matt Gander and Simon Pink, A buoyant Oxford were in no mood to be denied and they did well to draw with Cippenham II in their last game. Cippenham's England no. 25 Junior Boy Robert Lemon excelled with wins over Ray Powell and Andrew Packford whilst Mark Newns made his mark with his victories over Mark Jackson and Paul Baker. Jackson in turn hit back with a very good win over the Oxford no. 1 Karl Bushell.

Division Three (Midlands) - Hot favourites Wirrall Premier didn't disappoint and four wins from their last four matches meant they took the title in style. With Andrew Eden playing at no. 1 this wasn't altogether surprising and he breezed throught his seven singles without dropping an end. Wirrall weren't really pushed as they overcame Kingshurst Bribar (7-1), Woodfield (6-2), Rotherham Scorpions (7-1) and Darlington IV (6-2). Eden's team-mates displayed a strength in depth as Neil Powell, Tom Page, Gavin Lloyd and Aaron Beech all showed good form. Perhaps it was their no. 2 player Powell who scored his side's best individual win of the weekend as he made a mockery of his England no. 561 ranking with a superb win over Kingshurst's Mike Browne (ranked no. 213).

Bedford Modern with three wins and a draw finished strongly to take second place and afforded themselves the luxury of using two different players in the no. 1 position. Andy Trott played the Saturday matches against Rotherham Scorpions and Darlington IV and stayed undefeated whilst Mick Harper entered the fray on the Sunday and won three of his four singles against Grove III and in the draw against Birmingham University. Harper tasted defeat against the Birmingham no.1 Sharzad Waseem as the Birmingham side also enjoyed a great weekend which saw them annex seven points from their four matches. Without Waseem the University side did well to beat Woodfield 5-3, Earl Sweeney moving

#### THE OLYMPICS 2004 - ATTACK TO CEMENT A PLACE

# "ATHENS"

DEFENSIVE table tennis players such as myself tend to get, well, defensive when it is pointed out that we are on the verge of extinction. There are no defenders left in the world's top 40 and there has not been a single world champion since the postwar triumphs of Richard Bergmann and Johnny Leach. Sensible coaches refuse even to teach the technique any more. And yet those of us who still compete at international level have stuck resolutely to our chosen craft, vainly attempting to triumph through guile and subtlety rather than brute force, writes Matthew Syed.

Until now. With the qualifying competition for the 2004 Olympic Games looming, the penny has finally dropped. The Olympics is like that—as with impending death, it focuses the mind. And my mind has grasped the brutal fact that has been obvious to everyone since the International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) brought in the 40mm ball two seasons ago: stick to defence and kiss goodbye to any prospect of going to Athens.

And the upshot? Instead of retiring at the end of the season, as many have advised in recent months, I have decided to experiment with speed glue in one last-ditch—many would say futile—attempt to qualify for the Games.

This may not sound all that remarkable, but a defender using speed glue is the table tennis equivalent of a Trotskyite joining the Conservative Party. Even as I applied the very first layer of the odoriferous liquid last weekend I became burdened by a sense of treachery, relieved only by the slow and rhythmical chanting of "Athens".

Speed glue has been responsible, more than any other technology, for cementing the ascendancy of attackers. Spread liberally between blade and rubber, it mysteriously transforms the bat into a trampoline—a ball dropped from six inches rebounds past your ears before doing a double somersault with halftwist. In the hands of a world class attacker, a freshly glued bat can propel the ball at velocities upwards of 100mph.

What hope for guile against such legalised brutality? Well, until 1999, there remained a glimmer. Despite the glue, defenders could retreat to the back of the court and ensnare impetuous opponents in a web of backspin. Even the most accomplished offensive players had to fence for an opening, spreading the defender around the court—heedful of the disguised variation in spin—before trying to unleash a winner. It was a compelling spectacle. Audiences loved it, novelists wrote about it.

And then the ITTF destroyed it. Two asinine rule changes—the reduction in the length of long pimples in 1999 and the increase in the diameter of the ball in 2000—critically reduced the quantity of spin, leaving defenders hopelessly exposed. The mesmerising, 70-year conflict of attack versus defence was transformed into a turkey shoot.

But having recognised that I am doomed never to beat them, how then to join them? The problem is that it is practically impossible to effect a wholescale conversion from defence to attack—attempting to stay close to the table after a quarter-century in the deep would be tantamount to learning a new sport. No, the plan is to use glue on the forehand side, while retaining long pimples on the backhand; to become an all-rounder in the manner pioneered by Chen Xinhua, the former China player who spent the final part of his career playing for England.

Yet that is not quite how it worked out during the first practice session at the weekend. My shot selection was hideous. Twice I fell over attempting to deliver a power-topspin at precisely the wrong moment; later, my training partner could barely keep a straight face when I hurtled in for a forehand winner, lost my balance and dispatched the ball over his head. At times it felt more like slapstick than table tennis. But more unnerving was the deterioration in control caused by the speed glue. My forehand chop lacked sensitivity: the ball sprang away before I could cradle it. For the first time in years, the bat no longer felt like an extension of my living body.

Steen Hansen, the England performance director, from Denmark, is convinced that I must persevere. "The only way to qualify for Athens is to attack whenever possible," he said. "I know that it is both tough and very risky to make the change after all these years. You have

to change both your mindset and technique. But the greatest risk of all would be to change nothing."

Only the top 20 or so in the world rankings are spared the ordeal of having to win through to the Olympics via the continental qualification competitions and, unlike in 2000, I will not be among them. A mere 11 places are up for grabs at the European event in Luxembourg in November, which leaves barely seven months in which to prepare. So here goes the unlikeliest twist in a career nearing its conclusion: a defender using speed glue.

Bergmann will be spinning in his grave.

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

Division Three (Midlands & **South)** - This turned out to be the closest division of all as Generation 2 and Brirmingham University were tied on 23 points and also on their Sets records of 83-29. It was Generation who finally took the title by virtue of having a superior Games record of 285-139 as opposed to Birmingham's 272-136. Rather like losing one of those photo-finish races by less than a hundredth of a second. Birmingham may be disappointed as they won all four matches convincingly, beating Guildford II (8-0), Grove II (8-0), Ashford II (7-1) and finally BATTS Team Peniel II (6-2). It is so easy to reflect that had they managed just one more win they would have been Champions but you could argue that they did well to restrict a strong BATTS Team Peniel side to two games. Stuart Seaholme did very well to beat Ayo Ademakinwa 3-0 and Glen Wilkes had his work cut out in beating Daniel Rees 11-8 in the fifth end. Rees hit back with a 3-0 victory over Tim Seaholme so they can't feel too disatisfied with this result.

Generation 2 amassed seven points out of a possible eight over the weekend, their blip coming against London Progress V, a fiercely contested match where they had to retrieve a 4-2 deficit to secure a

Dixon and Martin Ireland knew what they had to do and their haul of six points meant they took the title by a single point. Forget the decisive defeat against a very strong Club Mid-Cheshire team; Blackpool look perfectly equipped to do very well in division two next season.

Darlington III finished an isolated third but their young side will have impressed many with their determined play. They took seven points out of eight as their games were punctuated with good individual performances. Highlights included a superb individual win for Claire Wilson over Seasider's Brian Allison and an 8-0 drubbing of fourth-placed Halton Croda II as David Meades, Kevin and Claire Wilson and Andrew Leighton all stayed unbeaten.

Barrow's match agaimst Seasiders can possibly take the plaudits as the best game in this division as all bar one game was decided in a fourth set and three matches went all the way to deuce in the fifth end. The canny Brian Allison had to use all his experience to hold off Harry Carter 12-10 in the fifth whilst Cherith Graham also scraped home, 13-11 in the fifth end against Jon Crawford. It all came down to Barrow's Jason Million's match against Brendan McAleese and it was Jason who sealed the 5-3 victory for his side as he won 13-11 in the decider. An excellent match.

Division Three (South) - Ashford, one of the Clubs with a real British League tradition (older players will remember that a fairly reasonable player named Jean Michel Saive used to play for them in the 1980s!) played superbly to take the title and their 5-3 victory over York Gardens also featured an act of outstanding sportsmanship on their part. Mark Smith's car broke down and he had to catch a taxi from Wandsworth to Ashford. Not turning up until halfway would have been too much for many teams, but it was no problem to the Ashford side who were keen to win the title on the table. They will have won many friends with their attitude altough they showed less compassion on the table. Tomas Svensson played superbly to beat Smith 3-0 (having earlier retrieved a 2-0 deficit to get the better of Steve Holloway) and Henry Buist, Dave Crowley and Nic Ravalec completed a great team effort with a win apiece.

Ashford had also been pushed hard by JAGS II who weren't too far away from taking a point. Tomas Svensson missed out against Farhat Rasul 11-8 in the fifth end and Rodney Farquharson scored a superb 3-1 victory over Henry Buist. It was left to a relieved Nic Ravalec who kept their challenge on course with his 3-0 victory over Neil Stewart in the last game to give his side their 5-3 victory. York Gardens managed to beat Guernsey 6-2 but this wasn't plain sailing either. Steve Holloway was pushed to the fifth end on two occasions; by both Lucas Waring and Phil Ogier whilst Vlodymyr Chodnobad was at pains to see off Dipan Shah, which he eventually managed at 11-7 in the fifth.


This division quickly became a competition of two "halves" as Champions Ashford down to the fifth placed team (Horsham III) all scored well whereas the bottom three sides all finished the season on six points. With seven of the sixteen results this round being decided 7-1 or 8-0 it wasn't ultimately as competitive as some of the other divisions either. Possibly due to the quality of the better players playing for the Ashford and York Garden sides; but may be also because the British League is achieving its main objective, to encourage as many players as possible to take part in a higher level of Team-play than is usually available at Local League and Inter-League

Horsham III had a tough weekend having to face Ashford, York Gardens and Guernsey but they did manage to add another two points to their tally by beating London Progress V 5-3. Doubles for Simon Pink and Andy Castle gave them the edge. Guernsey proved too strong on this occasion as Ogier, Waring and Richard Veale raced to a 7-1 victory. Peter Bretel found himself outgunned 3-0 by Graham Faulkner but he hit back well with a 11-9 in the deciding game win over Andy Castle.
