



CCPR relights flame for Torch Trophy Trust

THE CCPR (Central Council of Physical Recreation) today gave a timely boost to the Torch Trophy Trust's new fund to train young volunteers from the London Borough of Newham, one of the host boroughs for the London Olympic and Paralympic Games.

The CCPR was delighted and honoured to welcome its President, HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, to the fund-raising luncheon with past Olympians and other sports personalities at St James's Palace on Friday 4 November 2005, in support of the Trust

Brigid Simmonds, Chair of the CCPR said: "This new initiative has the whole-hearted support of the CCPR. It will provide bursaries for young people in the London Borough of Newham to attend courses run by the Newham Volunteering Programme. These courses will teach the skills and disciplines necessary to act as volunteers in their community and at events before the 2012 Olympic Games as well as the Games themselves. The role of the volunteer is critical in sport and in ensuring a successful Games. The CCPR believes that this training programme will provide a rewarding and life enhancing experience and will encourage more young people not only to train as volunteers but will also encourage the young to participate in sport."

The Trust was founded in response to the 1948 London Olympic Games. It encourages and recognises volunteers in sport by providing bursaries to individuals and clubs to participate in courses to improve their skills as sports volunteers. It also presents annual awards to individuals who have made an outstanding contribution as volunteers in able-bodied and

disabled sport and youth organisations.

Sir Bobby Charlton CBE, President of the Torch Trophy Trust, commented: "The importance of the volunteer in sport was never more apparent to me than in the staging of the Manchester Commonwealth Games. They added so much to everyone's enjoyment. I am delighted that the CCPR has given us this opportunity to raise funds to encourage and train young people from a borough which will play such a fundamental part in staging the London 2012 Olympic Games."


In keeping with the festive season there is a Christmas Book Review on pages 18 and 19.

JOHN WOOD has been Editor of TTN for almost 15 years, that's a long time to be editing a magazine that once the season begins comes out almost every month, writes Jim Beckley Vice-Chairman Public Relations.

He will be the first to admit it has been a rollercoaster ride. Everyone has their own ideas of what a magazine should do, what it should include and what it shouldn't and the editor is always at the sharp end.

Pressure becomes second nature and John coped admirably. But times are changing. A new management team came in with new ideas and whilst having a magazine published outside head office was possible, it made more economical and practical sense to go in-house. John took on the job in January 1991 from Jim Beckley, following several short term Editorships and brought stability to the post.

I recall we had to work quickly, following a short period when I held the fort after Alan Pickard's brief Editorship. John had been the ETTA's unofficial photographer for some time and following an interview at the Bonnington Hotel in London he accepted the position as Editor.

Like some previous Editors, John was doing the job from his home in Hertfordshire. Reports were re-routed from Hastings and although it wasn't the perfect arrangement John made it work.

Besides being a professional photographer John is also a talented cartoonist and over the years many of his cartoons appeared in the magazine. The general layout also improved, the magazine used more pictures (mainly John's) and TTN began to take on a more professional look.

In his capacity as editor he travelled widely to major events all over the country. World championships, European Championships they were all recorded on John's camera. Whatever the occasion he was able to present to readers a flavour of the events he covered.

His last major assignment was the English Open held in Chatham, Kent. There he was part of the ETTA team taking photographs, writing stories and producing a special issue of the magazine.

John was also something of a character which I'm sure helped in his professional life. A dry sense of humour and always with a twinkle in

his eye, I for one enjoyed his company. After a long day we would end up chatting over a drink or two until the early hours.

John then moved from Hemel Hempstead to the idyllic location of Charlestown in Cornwall and along with his wife Lesley, who became the magazine's proofreader, still managed to get the magazine out, more or less on time, quite a feat. His last move was from Cornwall to Broadway in Somerset where he now resides.

In his time he has produced well over one hundred magazines and that takes some doing, believe me. He also created a personal relationship with many of the leading players and officials, always a sign of a good editor.

John, I'm sure, will remain in table tennis perhaps in some capacity for his new county of Somerset, I hope so.

SANDRA & COLIN PLAYERS OF THE WEEKEND




SCHOFIELD'S GOLD

A PAPERLESS FUTURE?

BILL GATES of Microsoft has a vision of a paperless future, but until that happens, am I alone in regretting the recent absence of tabulated finals results in Table Tennis News?

I particularly noticed this in the September/October issue, when I looked at the reports on the Betfred Masters. As I had contributed the supporting report, I did not append the main results, wrongly assuming that they would be with the lead article. Then on reading through the mag I found results almost nowhere.

A justification for lack of results might be that you can get them instantly from the ETTA website www.englishtabletennis.org.uk and other sites, and that the role of the magazine is to allow space later for considered reflection on the event. However, that assumes that every TTN reader has access to the internet (and the results were given) and can remember these when they read the magazine.

It might also be said that if you are keen on getting results you will read the text for them, but I not sure that it works like that. Might many people simply not bother? How I think people often read a report is: first, glance the headline and opening paragraph (and maybe sub-headings), and then the end for the results, to get a feel for what happened. Then, if interest is fired, read (parts of) the body for elaboration. In other words, the results give the (quantitative, objective) framework or essence of the event, while the report gives the (qualitative, subjective) flavour. The former informs and complements the latter.

The hard-copy magazine is an historical document, and eventually, if an electronic report is erased, possibly the only record. On their own, how meaningful will reports without some appended results — and I don't mean

reams of results, taking up lots of space - be to someone looking at them in say 30 years time? I accept that it in part depends on the writing quality.

Finally, recognition to other players who did very well can be recorded in results, even though no mention is made of them in the text. If we cannot be bothered to tabulate the key results of major competitions for posterity, are we saying that they were unimportant of no value?

UNAUTHORISED

AS MANY readers will know, the names of the West Middlesex TTL and mine are currently being banded around on e-mail by Jon Kaufman of London Progress who obviously bears a grievance but decided to go public rather than talk to the Committee. Given what Jon has said and insinuated in his emails, it is necessary for the WMTTL committee (with full backing from our

President, Jack Melnick) to give their version of events.

Firstly, Jon had no authority to publicise a league bulletin which contains personal details for several team secretaries - supplied for league use only! If I had known the bulletin was to be circulated nationwide, I may have included more detail for those of you who were not present at the Handbook Meeting and are not party to what was discussed. Representatives from all WMTTL clubs were in attendance although Jon was not present

On 11th Sept, I emailed Jon asking whether Progress could enter a second team into a rather depleted Div 3. On 13th Sept, Jon replied, "Players by the dozen but reliable team captains is another matter. If these new teams could play all their matches at Southall on a Friday evening we could manage two or three extra teams but this may be problematic for the league and the other teams."

In reply I said, "With so many other clubs competing in the division I'm afraid we can't allow for you to play

all at home" and suggested that maybe they could produce a rota for their players at the start of the season.

On 28th Sept at the Handbook Meeting, the Progress Rep. (also a member of the league committee) said that they could not enter another team as their juniors could not travel to away matches. (The first the committee had heard of a junior team.) It was suggested that Progress mixed the adults and juniors in their teams as other clubs already do. Nothing more was heard from Jon or Progress until Jon's emails dated 31st Oct in which he circulated the bulletin far and wide because I had said, "It is very frustrating when a club registers 10 players or more for each of their teams and therefore would be quite capable of entering more teams but will only do so if they can play all their matches at home! The league has refused this request in order to be fair to everyone!" No mention of either Jon's or Progress' name was made. The WMTTL is and always has been fully supportive of junior players playing in the league but will not give preference to juniors from 1 club if other juniors are involved.

Not satisfied with using the league bulletin to provoke a national debate on juniors playing in senior leagues and leagues playing in one venue, on 1st Nov Jon found it necessary to become a little more personal, "her own club has a creditable community record over a 60 year period. That should be acknowledged. However, we believe their development strategy to be fundamentally flawed and we are not afraid to say so".

Over 10 years ago, Jon told my late father, Eric Blanch (league official and Life President of The Oaks Club), that we would "all being playing out of Progress one day!" With 8 teams, The Oaks has the largest number of teams playing in the WMTTL and must be the biggest obstacle standing in the way of Jon having his "Progress League". The Oaks must be more of a threat to Progress than we ever realised!

We do have a fabulous 60 year history through which we have had many ups and downs but we must be doing something right because we are thriving and so is our weekly coaching session for juniors. My father always said that those difficult times have made us stronger as a club. In principle, the object of our club has remained the same since our Constitution was first drawn up in 1948, "to provide facilities for its members to develop their personalities in a pleasant and sociable atmosphere"

I and many others do believe that The Oaks' has something special which will keep us here for many years to come, hopefully at our current venue, Old Actonians' Assoc. of Sports Clubs where we have been for nearly 7 years and where we are part of a much larger organisation.

My time is now extremely precious as Martin and I have 2 young children and I am expecting our 3rd in March and they are my priority. Nevertheless, no matter what Jon Kaufman's says or does he will never deter me from doing my bit for table tennis locally! Gill Lesh

The letters, HANNAH HICKS.....,



ENGLAND and Europe won the Boys' and Girls' team titles at the ITTF World Cadet Challenge in Santo Domingo, the capital of the Dominican Republic in October.

In the final of the boys' event England beat Europe 4-1, whilst Europe succeeded by the same margin over Asia in the counterpart Girls' event.

The contest between England was very closely fought; every match went the full five games distance. Matters started well for Europe with Pierre Bezard beating Darius Knight but that was the end of their success. Paul Drinkhall, the European Cadet Champion, accounted for both Patryk Chojnowski and Pierre Bezard whilst in a nail-biting duel Gavin

Evans defeated Tomas Tregler.

In the Girls' final Europe made the better start with Amelie Solja defeating Sim Kai Xin but Asia levelled with the stylish Lee Ho Ching overcoming Ekaterina Kolodyazhnaya; Europe went further ahead with Maragaryta Pesotska defeating Neha Aggarwal and matters were brought to a conclusion with the powerful attacking skills of Ekaterina Kolodyazhnaya defeating the defender Sim Kai Xin in straight games to secure the title.



THIS year's Mens Open Singles Final, in the Cornwall Two Star Banded Open Satellite Grand Prix on in November, was contested by two rapidly improving 15 year olds, Cornwall's Darren Reed and Somerset's Shaun Hall, in a swash-buckling all-out attack battle, which saw Reed thrill an enthusiastic home crowd by narrowly

winning in the 5th 13-11.

The final see-sawed all the way through with one then the other having the advantage.

This was an excellent display of table tennis and with such young talent producing such a mature performance, it augers well for the future of the game in the South West.

A very disappointed Hall had the satisfaction of having beaten, for the first time in a ranking tournament, his father Steve in the semi-finals.

In the Women's events Sally Smith (Dv) was the most successful, winning the Under 21s, Bands 1 and 2 and the Open Singles where she beat the ever-steady Kate Alken (Co) in the final. Kate was also runner-up in Band 2.



REA BALMFORD - A YORKSHIRE LEGEND

On November 11th 2005 the Hull YPI Table Tennis Centre was officially renamed the Rea Balmford Table Tennis Centre. The contributions that Rea has made to table tennis, not only in Hull, but also in Yorkshire and nationally through the ESTTA Organisation, are immeasurable, writes Barry Snowden.

His story is a long one, so long that many of the early records of his career are lost in the memories of time. We have tried to recount what we can and hope that by the time you have finished our story you will agree with us that the honour we are bestowing on him today is richly deserved.

The first instances we have of Rea passing on his table tennis knowledge come shortly after the Second World War. He returned to University at Sheffield to finish his interrupted education and on completion returned to Hull and took up a position at Ainthorpe School as a Geography teacher.

He soon moved on to Thoresby and when that school closed he joined the staff of the newly formed Amy Johnson High School in the early seventies.

Throughout his teaching career he was well known in the sporting circles and was actively concerned in running schools football, rugby league and cricket. His love affair in cricket remains to this day and he is often seen at the YPI watching the matches.

It was table tennis that became his passion and in 1974 he coached the Girls under 19 team to the ESTTA Team Championship Finals. Many of Rea's former pupils are still playing table tennis to this day, and remember the teacher who used a rubberless bat as his cane and who threw the board rubber if the offender was too far away to be clipped!

It was during these school days that

he used to transport many of the pupils to tournaments (probably ones he organised) in his green Morris Minor. His nickname was Jet Balmford; I understand it was to do with his car registration plates JET 1. I am also reliably informed that no matter where the matches were in Yorkshire he always went through Pontefract, a pretty enough town but a long way to go when you're playing at York!

During his time at Thoresby in 1968 Rea was involved with the creation, and was a founder member, of the **English School Table Tennis** Association. His initial office there was as the Regional Competition Secretary, and he became Vice Chairman in 1969, a job he was to hold on two separate occasions during a 27 year span of involvement. During one of his non vice chairman spells, whilst he was the Humberside representative, a certain young lady called Janet Griffin was appointed as the new General Secretary. By the time the new season had started the

new general Secretary had become Janet Balmford. Not sure if it was a case of 'If you can't beat them, join them'!

Once the National Body was formed it was then up to individual cities and towns to form their own leagues. No prize on guessing which City was the first to be operational – yes, Hull with Rea at the helm. On his retirement from ESTTA in 1995 he was honoured as a Vice President. His work with ESTTA had impressed the hierarchy at the English Table Tennis Association and he was elected a Vice President in 1990, a position he still holds.

Many people would have been satisfied with that level of involvement, but not Rea. He was also a member of the Yorkshire TTA Management Committee and for many years he organised all the tournaments in Yorkshire. The Press Officer was another string to his bow and he regularly sent in reports to the local and county papers as well as the ETTA magazine.

In 1990 he was awarded the L. E. Forrest Memorial Award for outstanding service to the game of table tennis. At around the same time he was made a Vice President of the county TTA and has subsequently been "promoted" to Life Member, just about the highest honour a county can give to a member. Rea is one of only three Hull officials to be given this honour.

Just to keep his eye in he was also the Local Press Officer from 1955 until 2001. Add to this his 50 or so years of involvement in the YPI Table Tennis Club and you can start to appreciate just how much this Association, and table tennis in general, owes to Rea.

HOME DOUBLE for LEMON

Cippenham Senior 2-Star Open Championships (20.11.05) **By Graham Trimming**

Cippenham players won both the main events as their club staged the Cippenham Senior 2-Star Open Championships in November. Last year's runner-up, Rob Lemon, went one better to win the Men's Singles title while Sue Hayes captured the Women's Singles title, as she did in the Cippenham Banded Open in the summer

In a good day for the host club's players, three Cippenham players, all of whom have come through the club's junior coaching scheme, made it into the semi-finals of the Men's Singles where they were joined by Guildford's Adam Laws. The competitiveness of the event was tight throughout with many observers suggesting that any of six or seven players could emerge the winner The point was proved in the semi-finals as third seed David Hayes. the Irish national junior champion, beat top seed Robert Hansell and second seed Laws was defeated by Lemon after a very close tussle. That was just the starter for the spectacle of the final that Lemon won 15-13 in the fifth and deciding game, having saved three match points and coming back from a two-game deficit. Each of the five games was won by the minimum two points although there were wider margins during the games. Haves at one time led 5-1 in the fourth game and, in the fifth Lemon led 7-2 before Hayes stormed back to enjoy those match points.

Winner in 2003 and 2004, Jack Boult, seeded only five this time, also

reached his allotted position in the quarter-finals where he lost a most entertaining and close match with Hansell. The other three seeds were all displaced into second place in their groups. Sixth seed Fred Dove lost his opening match to Ray Jordan but still made it into the quarters where he lost to Lemon. Seventh seed Matt Squires lost to Everton Wilson while eighth seed Mark Banks only came third in his group after he lost to both Paul Baker and Sampson Reid. The same fate nearly befell Rob Hansell. He lost his opening match in the top group to up and coming junior Matt Ware. However, Ware lost to Marc Armstrong who in turn lost to Hansell. Hansell secured top spot in the group by virtue of games ratio while Armstrong was the unlucky player who was relegated into the consolation event. Ware and Jordan were the other players that made up the quarter-finalists.

The Womens Singles was run as one large round-robin of seven players following two withdrawals. Sue Hayes was the ultimate winner by virtue of her win over runner-up Sally Hughes; this being despite losing her last match to Sue Adamson. Adamson had earlier lost to both Hughes and Chloe Thomas. The event was organised by Paul Baker, refereed by Peter Hillier and attracted 69 entries.

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
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ALTHOUGH saddened, I am deeply honoured to be able to write about Bernard Rowley.

Bernard, to many of us, was not a priest, he was merely our friend.

I had known Bernard for over 30 years, having met him through our mutual interest in coaching table tennis.

Some of my earliest memories, are of the summer camps that Bernard organised every year at the convent in Littlehampton. Over the years, hundreds of youngsters spent time at these camps, improving their skills and having an enjoyable time. These camps were originally organised for boys from Surrey, Sussex, Kent and Essex and were manned by coaches from these counties. When I came on the scene, girls were included and we progressed from sleeping in tents, to rickety beds, to mattresses on the floor. Bernard masterminded it all and even persuaded the sisters to let the kids exercise their dog which was grossly overweight when we arrived each year and much slimmer when we left. That dog hated us!

These camps ran for many years until the site was sold to the developers and they attracted players from all over the country and the Isle of Man. Many coaches served their apprenticeship at Littlehampton they were fun times.

Bernard had many administrative

roles in table tennis - he was the SE Regional Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the National Coaching Committee and currently Secretary of Surrey and their National Councillor, and Chairman of the Trade Committee. Bernard's fairness and strong sense of moral justice were invaluable in this latter role. His was the voice of sanity, when all around were going mad! But by his own admission, administration was not his real strength. Bernard was at his best, when working with and organising voungsters on his own patch. In every parish that Bernard lived, he found, converted or built a hall that could be used for table tennis. He badgered his parishioners to support various ventures both financially and in kind. There was a lot of wheeling and dealing that went on in Bernard's parishes! Through his commitment to table tennis, Bernard touched the lives of many. His players learned how to win graciously and to lose with dignity qualities that will remain with them throughout their lives.

We generally expect a table tennis coach to stay in the game for about 5 years - so in table tennis terms, Bernard ran a marathon and his contribution is priceless.

Bernard's other great love was

boats. From his little dinghy at Littlehampton, to his 7 berth cruiser, wherever he was a boat was not far away. He had great pleasure by sailing on the QE2 to see his brother in America and even overcame his fear of flying in order to get home quickly when he was needed. And even when we were in Liverpool, many years ago, for the European Catholic Championships, Bernard took me on a ferry over the Mersey whilst the kids were discoing at the Cavern.

For the last 4 summers, Mike and I have spent time with Bernard on his boat, cruising up and down the Thames. The memories of Bernard at the helm - skipper of the boat with Mike as the 1st mate and me as the galley slave - spending wonderful quality time with Bernard, knocking back a glass or two of good wine on the deck in the evening, putting the world to right, will be treasured for

I worked with Bernard during the morning session as he supervised a number of tables and was impressed by his obvious enthusiasm and ability to communicate with the voungsters. Later he worked on one to ones with selected players and he seemed equally at ease. It was during these workouts that I became aware that the players were referring to him as Father and learned that he was a priest! When I reported back to Jack of my findings he said that he knew Bernard was a priest but he did not want me to be prejudiced! On the question of Bernard's image Jack asked me to talk to Bernard about improving this aspect. On the way home Jack admitted that he wanted to reward Bernard for all the good work he was doing in Sussex but could not get that image out of his mind. It was only a few years ago that Bernard told me that it was about that time he was awarded his Teaching Theory Certificate. A couple of years after that first meeting Allen Fisher (of Kent) asked

me if I would be interested in helping at a proposed "Summer Table Tennis Camp" at Littlehampton. I drove down one week-end to meet the organiser who was non other than Bernard who I instantly recognised because he was wearing the same gear as on his assessment day. Bernard wanted to set up a two week "Table Tennis Holiday", camping in the grounds of the Convent and using the table tennis facilities he had set up in the adjoining school. The following Summer the Littlehampton Camps were born and thanks to Bernard they were a resounding success. At first it was Sussex, Surrey and Kent boys with a few from other parts of the Country who Bernard invited on his travels and then Alan Shepherd came on board with his Essex players. Apart from running the Camp Bernard would be doing his "day job" plus organising the food, arranging for the boys to visit the local swimming baths, pitch and putt and trips to Arundel Castle to watch first class cricket. All this on the equivalent of fifty pence per day per boy. Nothing was too much trouble for him and the boys thrived on it.

Bernard went on to become heavily involved with the Sussex County Association and when he took over as their National Councillor he was asked to go on various committees

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
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A PERSONAL REFLECTION

A LARGE part of the table tennis fraternity, particularly Sussex and Surrey, plus the parishes' of Littlehampton' Frimley and Thames Ditton will be saddened by the death of Father Bernard Rowlev on the 2nd November. A Thanksgiving Mass was held at his Church, Our Lady of Lourdes, Thames Ditton, on the 14th November and a packed congregation included many of his friends from table tennis particularly those on the coaching side where he has left a lasting impression.

I must confess that I thought that I had known Bernard all my life but on checking the archives it seems that our first meeting was in 1968. Our meeting occurred when Jack Carrington asked me to accompany him on a trip to Uckfield (or was it Cuckfield) for a coaching day. On the way there he told me my main task was to make an assessment of Bernard for a coaching award. When I was introduced to Bernard in his faded maroon tracksuit bottoms, green table tennis shirt and old style black basketball boots I could see instantly that he did not measure up




but at first he declined because he thought he could make a bigger contribution from the floor Eventually he succumbed, and although he was always a staunch member of the committee on which he was serving I think he was always a maverick at heart. I do not know what other offices he held for Sussex but for Surrey he was both Secretary and National Councillor. He was also for some time the Deputy Chairman of the National Coaching Committee and at his death was still the Chairman of the Trades Committee.

Bernard always spoke with pride and fondness of the young players he had helped along the way, from Suzanna Kavalleirou at Littlehampton to Edward Hatley at Frimley and many others. I never saw Bernard play a competitive match but whilst checking on the spelling of Suzanna's name I found the Sussex notes of March 1969 by John Woodford referring to an article he had submitted to the local '`Evening Argus" about the Sussex entries in the English Open that year and the editor had given it the headline "PRIEST TAKES ON THE WORLD - at Table Tennis.

Bernard was one of that rare breed who you could always have a discussion with, disagree strongly and yet never get angry with. The talk after the funeral was all in praise of his contribution to table tennis as well as those more personal memories. Not being a Roman Catholic I did not have any knowledge of him as a priest but if his parishioners had the same treatment as the boys did at those camps, and I am sure they did, then he must have been very good at his job. I and all those many others who got to know him will remember Bernard with great affection and respect and he will never be forgotten.

I never met his brother and sister but to them and their families our sincere condolences at the passing of a lovely man. Mike Kercher

TIM BOGGAN's latest volume on the 'History of US Table Tennis', which was first published last year, will make an ideal Christmas present for the table tennis enthusiast.

This edition is festooned with photographs and great graphics, that bring memories flooding back of the glory years of table tennis. It covers the early sponge years through to the 32nd US Open, where Dick Miles won his last US Championship title.


Although the book mostly records the progress of US table tennis, there is an abundance of reports on English players, too numerous to mention all of them in this review Firstly on page 22 there is a photograph of Richard Bergmann and Johnny Leach being greeted in Sapporo for their tour of Japan, with the adulation afforded only to the football stars and pop celebrities of today.

Page 79 records the US Team's efforts in the 1954 World Championships held in London, where they lost in the Swathling Cup to defending Champions England. In this match Richard Bergmann beat both Bernie Bukiet and Dick Miles. This was Bergmann's first victory over Miles in a Swathling Cup match. Aubrey Simons (England's 'Player of the Year-1953") was victorious against Bukiet and John Somael, whilst Johnny Leach also beat Somael, the father of Kate Alken a Cornish County player

The 1955 English Open, which is featured on page 112, saw England's Di and Ros Rowe win the Womens Doubles title and Richard Bergmann lose to Jimmy Lowe, England's Junior Champion of 1950.

England's Ann Haydon gets several mentions, not only for her table tennis exploits but also for her Lawn Tennis successes in the USA.

Page 121 covers the ITTF Congress Meeting at the 1955 Utrecht World Championships, where members voted to permit the controversatial sponge bat by 40-28 votes. This meeting was Chaired by ITTF President Ivor Montagu.

Since Vol. III was published Vols. IV and V have been and VI will be ready by the spring of 2006.

In Vol. IV Stan Jacobson and Derek Baddeley get Tim's attention because as early loopers they toured the U.S.; Denis Neale even more attention, for

he played both in the U.S. and Canada (had a famous 1967 match with Bobby Gusikoff in Toronto).

Canadian players get many mentions because of Tim's access to all of Jose Tomkins Ransome's Canadian News.

Vol. V has a Foreword by Roy Evans dealing with the Ping-Pong Diplomacy and the U.S. visit to China.

THE MEANING OF SUCCESS By Jon Kaufman Book Review by Steve Leven

WOW, a new book on table tennis! And it's a compelling read. Jon -aschoolteacher and ex-trade union activist -tells the story of London Progress, the table tennis club he has built up over fifteen years to be the best in the country. He is frank and honest throughout, he tells it like it is. And the compulsion? Well, there's a whole frying pan on his shoulder and you want to read every page just to see if you're one of the chips in it.

The book, however, is a story of one club's, and one man's, pursuit of national and international sporting success. And London Progress are seven times British League champions, so you can't argue with that. The subtext is that Progress are a multi-ethnic, multi-table and predominantly youth-oriented club who are pleased to do things differently. That differences have caused run-ins with authority is of

little concern to them. Rather than being a chronological history of the club, in each succeeding chapter Jon skits from telling the story to describing characters or events. This is one of the successes of the book, which only mentions one actual table tennis game score in its 202 pages.

Jon – admirably – has published the book himself. This has, however, led to a number of production downsides. First of all, there's not a picture in the whole book, not even the cover, which consequently lends the look of an academic paper to the whole tome. It would have been good to lift it by including some pictures of the players celebrating

another trophy or the venues at which the club has resided. Meanwhile, several of the chapter headings are in a different font to the others, there are a host of spelling mistakes (in German and French as well as in English) and the apostrophe key on Jon's keyboard appears to have a mind of its own. Last but certainly not least, there is neither an index nor a list of contents, a shocking omission for any book.

Despite some philosophising in the closing pages, the 'meaning of success' isn't really defined here. There is much on the ethos of the club which has delivered sporting

trophies and enriched and enhanced people's lives and in some ways the question is posed as to what success means. The world of table tennis has a lot to learn from the Progress story, and whilst all may not be as rotten with the world as Jon makes out this book is a welcome addition to the contemporary table tennis library.

Editor's Note: The above was the first review of Jon Kaufman's thought provoking book that I had received, the second by Ken Muhr was three times as long as Steve's, so unfortunately Ken's has been beavily edited due to lack of space.

THE MEANING OF SUCCESS By Jon Kaufman Book Review by Ken Muhr

This 200-page book narrates, in a fast, engaging, snappy style the origins, history, rapid expansion and almost heroic endeavours of England's most successful table tennis club of recent years -7 times

British League Champions - in breaking down the old barriers (of race and social discrimination) and winning against the odds.

I found it very difficult to review, partly because I fear that I an unable to do justice to the important issues it raises, and partly because Graham Trimming has already done an excellent, comprehensive job in The Table Tennis Collector, Summer 2005.

However, I do have a special interest in London Progress, being once connected with the precursor club, Brent Juniors, as well as with other West London Clubs like Gunnersbury Triangle & Fulham (and latterly the Harrow Centre of Excellence, at which Progress coaches and players participated). I knew many of the early characters so accurately and mostly affectionately described.

Right from the beginning the club had a Black flavour and I like the way Kaufman proudly describes how it embraced in a real sense, without conscious thought, social inclusion, long before politicians jumped on to the concept. "Colour never came into to it. Neither did class or culture...the club was genuinely becoming a melting pot." He also makes it clear that he loathes any bigotry and fundamentalism, whatever the religious persuasion. But at Progress, 'ping' is secular and takes precedence over difference.

It is the suggestion of racism unfairly applied that disturbs me most. Although there still is in English society some deep prejudice, I simply don't believe that it is a prominent feature in table tennis. Where it exists, I (perhaps naively) believe that it is largely of the unthinking, unintended or patronising kind (as opposed to the 'I'm not racially prejudiced but...' kind).

Even the apparent coldness or 'disdain' of old white middle class opposition supporters outside the

London metropolis, could partially reflect discomfort or uncertainty at facing (exuberant Progress) people beyond their normal experience. Might any local antagonism to Progress be based more over fear that their best players will be recruited (poached?) by the all-powerful big club?


Yet I finished the book wondering whether Kaufman's contempt, for the table tennis establishment at least, is partly tongue-in-cheek, for effect - to shock. The 'revolutionary' mellows a little, to reflect, "We shouldn't hate the old guard too much. The old always resent the new.....We too will no doubt hang on beyond our sell-by date. And in their own way the existing generation of county and league administrators have given many free hours of genuine service to the sport." Later he also reflects, "Actually, England isn't such a bad place to live in. It's ability to absorb newcomers over time with relatively

little fuss and bother, puts it among the more tolerant of nations."

They may irritate and unsettle some people, but maverick activists like Jon Kaufman at Progress and Keith Wilson in Darlington do a fantastic job and service in energising and reviving table tennis, and developing the sport in hard-to-reach and excluded communities. Whether you agree or disagree with Kaufman's philosophy, I think you will find this unusual non-illustrated book a riveting read. Like an aunt of mine who took the Guardian despite being Conservative, you might read it to challenge your thinking, and in that it is highly recommended.

A LOAD OF OLD BALLS



A LOAD OF OLD BALLS By Simon Inglis Published by English Heritage &7.99

IN museums and trophy cabinets, in cupboards and attics, there are loads of old balls in Britain.

And now, in all their battered glory, Played in Britain - English Heritage's exciting series on the nation's sporting heritage - presents the best of them, up close and personal. Stuffed with feathers, inflated by pig's bladders, handsewn and leather bound, chipped and cracked, but not always round, here are the balls which British sportsmen and women have kicked and thwacked, hurled and chased over the centuries.

In Hull we pick up what may well be the oldest British ball in existence - a late 13th century timber bowl only to find half of it missing. Or could it have been designed that way? Does the name rolly polly provide the clue?

From the Orkney Isles we weigh up the richly polished, leather panelled 'Kirkwall Ba' contested for every year by teams known as the Uppies and the Doonies. In deepest Sussex we follow the mysterious stoolball, contested by the Plumpton Shrimps and Hayward Heath Bluebells. On other pages we catch the cork and string balls swatted around the oldest tennis courts in the world by the likes of Henry Viii. Skittle balls, marbles, beachballs, billiard balls, table tennis balls, gutta percha golf balls from St Andrews and tennis balls from Wimbledon.

The table tennis section which is on page 46 states that when Major Wingfield took out a patent on his new game of lawn tennis in 1874 he gave it the unlikely Greek title of Sphairistike. But if the name failed to catch on, the game did and it was not long before manufacturers sought to emulate its success with an indoor version.


After several failed attempts from both sides of the Atlantic using flat markers, balloons and even 'Tiddledy Winks', in 1890 an English company, David Foster, brought out the first recognisable table tennis set, using strung rackets and a cloth covered rubber ball. A year later John Jaques of London launched Gossima. This featured battledores - vellum-covered


bats designed for shuttlecocks - and a webbed cork ball. Both games failed however. Foster's ball had too wild a bounce while Gossima's did not bounce enough.


The breakthrough came in 1900 when, according to one source, a man called James Gibb returned from the USA with some celluloid balls that, despite their crude seams, offered a much improved game. Developed, as we read earlier by the American inventor, John Wesley Hyatt, in 1863, celluloid was already in use for billiard balls (as well as for film stock).


Not only were the new balls exceptionally lightweight, when struck by the drum-like surface of a battledore they made a distinct sound, one which led the London store Hamleys to register an inspired brand name for the game in 1900. Soon after they teamed up with John Jaques, who quickly mastered production of what would become the standard ball thereafter. 'Ping Pong' had arrived.

For a few heady years the world went Ping Pong crazy. At Ping Pong parties people sang Ping Pong ditties, danced the Ping Pong Polka and ate Ping Pong biscuits. This, of course, culminated in Ping Pong diplomacy between the USA and China in 1971; proof that sport and politics can mix if both sides know the name of the game.









ALEX PERRY, the reigning British and Irish champion lifted his game with the help of his lethal backhand attack to win the **Butterfly Super Grand Prix Mens** Singles title, at Bath Leisure Centre and to pocket the £700 first prize, in the absence of the top seed Alan Cooke, writes John Woodford.

Ryan Jenkins snatched the first game of the final 11-6, as it seemed vet another Welsh victory was coming. The crunch game was the second as Perry piled on the pressure with superb topspin, especially to, the Welshman's backhand. From then on it was downhill for Ryan, as he tried in vain to stem Perry's attack.

In the final two games Perry, originally from Devon, burst through to win 6 and 7.

After his victory, congratulations pouring in from his families at Nottingham, Derby and Devon, Alex said "This is my happy hunting ground, I won my England title here in 1999 and this is my second grand

Asked for her comments after winning she said "I am disappointed at not being chosen for the Melbourne Commonwealth Games, when Kelly has been selected."





LONDON PROGRESS IN A GLASS OF THEIR OWN

THE second weekend of British League Premier division matches, played in Blackpool over the weekend of 19/20 November 2005 saw the seven times Champions London Progress I totally dominate the action. After this showing only a distinctly brave or plain silly person would bet against them taking the title for a recordbreaking eighth successive time, writes Steve Kerns.

In the Saturday morning fixture, second-placed Darlington fielded a young side and it was the youngest player of all who notched up their sole success as Gavin Evans saw off Darren Blake 3-1. However, Darren won't have been too concerned as his team-mates Terry Young, Jason Sugrue and Marco Essomba took the remaining seven games. Bradley Evans was also on good form and his "emergence" continued as he pushed Terry Young all the way before succumbing 11-9 in the fifth.

In round six third-placed Ormesby (who by their high standards had a disappointing weekend) came closest to taking a point off London Progress. Even without their top player - Paul Drinkhall, the Ormesby players really had the bit between their teeth in the first three games as they surged into a shock 3-0 lead. All three successes were "out of the top draw" as well as Craig Bryant beat Jason Sugrue 3-1, Bryn Drinkhall scored a superb 3-1 victory over Terry Young and Danny Reed added a 3-1 win over Darren Blake. You might have thought that Progress were in trouble but they weren't having any of it. Marco Essomba opened their account with a 3-0 win over Steve Bailey and Terry Young brought them right back into the match with a 3-0 success against Craig Bryant. From then onwards it was Progress who were calling the shots and Jason Sugrue came through in four ends against Danny Reed whilst an impressive Marco

She is 12 and now the England No.1 Under 13 Girl.
- HELSHAN WEERASINGHE is only eight. He is resident in Brighton, was unbeaten against opponents in the most recent National Cadets League at Tunbridge Wells and has beaten several adults in the 4th division of the Worthing league. He also plays in the premier division of the Brighton league

where his current coach is Rory

- HAVING reported on table tennis events in New Delhi in the past and just escaped before my stomach seriously rebelled, the recent bombings have no doubt made all sports wary of the constant invitations to visit the sub-continent with all its troubles including earthquakes killing thousands.
- OUR biggest danger of seeing table tennis events run there is the Commonwealth, especially as the administrator in India is also secretary of the Commonwealth. His hand is permanently raised when it, comes to finding venues.
- THERE is a possibilty that one event some way ahead is destined for

India on our calendar, so the best of luck to our Ashes-winning cricketers who are now there. Just before they left one player was quoted as saying "things are not as bad as they were in Pakistan and India some years ago" - I beg to differ. Earthquakes high on the Richter scale do not happen frequently, but terrorist bombings (specially in capital cities are increasing.

- **PREPARING** for the 2008 Olympics, China's efforts are immense. According to one report gymnastics is a likely banker for the host nation, along with Diving, Table Tennis, Badminton, Shooting and Weight-lifting.
- OUR best hopes of upsetting the Chinese applecart on their home

tables at this time rest with Timo Boll. His last appearnce at Croydon was disappointing, but recently he has beaten most (if not all) the leading world-ranked players. Whether that can happen in Bejing three years hence is anyone's guess.

• THE overall coaching set-up in China is immense - 20,000 "specialist" sports schools, 540 athletes including table tennis attending, not to mention 79 specialist sports colleges, again including table tennis.

• CHINA, as we know is seeking to dominate the economic world. It is now setting its sights on swamping the world of sport - they are front-runners in a few but they have a long way to go to breakthrough the other 25 Olympic

Andrew Baggeley (22) and Sue Gilroy (35) will defend their Commonwealth Games titles in Melbourne, from the 15th to 26th March 2006. The pair feature in a ten strong Team England squad for Melbourne announced by the English Table Tennis Association, writes Jim Beckley

Baggeley from Milton Keynes won a brace of gold medals in Manchester 2002. He won the men's doubles title partnering Gareth Herbert and was a member of the England team that won the men's team gold.

He will be joined in the men's team by a combination of youth and experience. Paul Drinkhall (15) from Cleveland, was a member of the England team that won the team title at the World Cadet Championships in the Dominican Republic and also won silver medals in the singles and doubles with Darius Knight.

Alan Cooke (39), is the most experienced member of the team. Cooke, who played at the Seoul and Barcelona Olympics in 1988 and 1992 won the men's singles title at the 1989 Commonwealth Table Tennis Championships and will celebrate his 40th birthday during the Melbourne

Games while Manchester's Andrew Rushton (22) completes the men's

England will once again hope the women's wheelchair singles competition for Elite Athletes with a Disability provides a rich vein of medals when they field two of the four medallists from the Manchester Games.

Sue Gilroy took the gold medal and Cathy Mitton took bronze. Both players are still in peak form with Gilroy winning the gold medal in the class 4 category at the European Championships in Italy last month while Mitton (49) the reigning world champion and a bronze medallist at the Paralympics in Athens last year, won silver.

It was the twenty-four year old German's second ITTF Pro Tour Men's Singles title of 2005; in September he had succeeded at the Volkswagen Open Japan beating the 2004 Athens Olympic champion, Ryu Seung Min in the final.

In the semi-finals Boll beat China's Hao Shuai, whilst Saive defeated Hao Shuai's colleague, the fourth seed, Liu Guozheng.

In the Women's Singles final, eighteen year old, Cao Zhen of China won her second consecutive Women's Singles title at an ITTF Pro Tour tournament; one week earlier in Magdeburg she had beaten colleague, Fan Ying in the final of the Liebherr German Open; one week later in Gothenburg at the Liebherr Swedish Open she overcame Hong

Kong's Tie Yana to capture the crown.

Defeat for Tie Yana in the Women's Singles final but success in the Women's Doubles final. Partnering Zhang Rui the duo beat their Hong Kong colleagues, Lin Ling and Song Ah Sim to win their sixth Women's Doubles title on the ITTF Pro Tour in 2005 and thus finished the year in number one spot on the ITTF Women's Doubles Standings.

In similar vein, the Koreans, Lee Jung Woo and Oh Sang Eun finished the year at the top of the ITTF Pro Tour Men's Doubles Standings. In the final in Gothenburg they beat the Polish pairing of Lucjan Blaszczyk and Wang Zeng Yi to win their fourth ITTF Pro Tour Men's Doubles title of the year



Alex Perry won the men's singles and is no stranger to the Chesterfield area where he coaches at local schools with the Gifted and Talented pupils. It can't be bad to have a Commonwealth Gold Medallist slipping in and running a coaching session during school hours.


Hodder in the group stage.

LEAMINGTON LEAGUE were saddened to hear that one of Colebridge's leading players, Barry Hunt, collapsed and died during a table tennis league match at the Colebridge Club in Shirley. He had played in the Warwickshire veterans side, for Birmingham in the Midland League and had



BARRICADE is in fact extremely light and designed for the defensive minded/allround players and those using long pimples and seeking a slow blade for maximum spin reversal. It permits safe as well as

dangerous chopping.

BULLDOZER is an allround blade and has been developed for the combination bat player. It produces a high amount of spin reversal while blocking with long pimples. At the same time it can be used very dynamically for powerful attacking on the other side with short pimples or spin reversal rubbers. BAT TESTS

These bat tests were carried out by John Wood and Roy Harrison at the Ilminster TTC in Somerset.

The Bulldozer had Roulette (red) long pimples on one side and a 2mm Friendship 802 short pimples on the other. Playing with Roulette on the backhand was very comfortable and it was easy to control the opponents ball with either pushes, blocks, creating vicious reverse spin and when the occasion arose it was great to attack with. In combination with short pimples it was a dynamic allround/attacking weapon.

The Barricade blade had Boomerang on one side and 2mm Butterfly Bryce on the other. This blade combination was much more controllable, due to it being a slower blade. Against forehand drives it would appear that one could chop all day with Boomerang. Blocking was very effective against a heavy looped ball creating lots of spin reversal and when possible it was also great to attack with. Barracade, Boomerang and Butterfly Bryce is a match made in Heaven, for defender/allround players.

In our opinion these products have enhanced the progress of extreme long pimples.





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
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A RISING STAR
