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STRAIGHT TALK

June Summary

The recently announced new funding for the ETTA to cover a Club and Coach Development Programme and Capacity Building from our partners Sport England has been confirmed. It is in total £1,338,600 over three years from April 2007 to March 2010.

The planning process is well underway with our regional partners, and Management are discussing various aspects of this new funding in relationship to the needs of the ETTA from a staffing perspective and departmental structuring. Our goals will be to ensure that the support for our members continues to increase at all levels, with a clear emphasis on club accreditation, coaching, volunteering, participation and retention

The new policies of our funding partner, Sport England, from April 2009 are to ensure that the Regions are major players in the distribution of funds for sports to meet the goals of the Activity Survey and participation; this will mean some changes are needed within the ETTA.

It appears quite clear that in the future three funding streams will be available to Table Tennis, UK Sport for the Elite and Talent Programmes, Youth Sport Trust for the under 16s and Sport England for the over 16s.

BRITISH TABLE TENNIS FEDERATION

A recent announcement by UK Sport of the "Mission 2012" initiative for Olympic and Paralympic sports will mean closer monitoring of all sports and a commitment to meet the objectives of 2012 for all parties. A new panel has been formed dedicated to performance, which will review each sport quarterly within a new system covering three core areas of investment and activity. These will be monitored via a "traffic light system" of red, amber and green. Our ambition is to ensure in all areas we are at green, which means we have met the criteria.

The new national training centre for GB and NI will be opened in mid-August at the English Institute of Sport (EIS) in Sheffield. Players in the programme over 16 will be accommodated in the area and after school training will be in place for those under 16. It is anticipated that high quality sparring partners will be brought in and accommodated locally. The venue of 10 tables with quality lighting and flooring has been booked during the week for 27 hours; additional weekend and holiday times are also included in the programme.

MAJOR EVENTS

Progress to stage the first combined European Junior and Cadet Top 10 in January 2008, to be known as the European Youth Top 10, is being made and the event will be staged at the prestigious EIS Sheffield venue. Negotiations are continuing with UK Sport and other partners to stage the

English Open, part of the ITTF Pro Tour programme, over a three year period from 2009.

ITTF COMMITTEE MEMBERS

During the ITTF Annual General meeting and Board of Directors meeting, all of the four nominated candidates, the maximum we are allowed, were elected as Full Committee Members.

INSURANCE

them.

Negotiations are underway to have an ETTA insurance policy to cover all our members. This will result, once confirmed, in significant reductions for clubs, leagues and counties in the amount they pay for the premiums. The policy will be with the ETTA and pro rata costs will be collected from the clubs, leagues and counties.

MEMBERSHIP

Pressure is increasing from our funding partners to quantify and provide data of our membership. The Individual Registration form has resulted in us covering 45% of our estimated membership. We must progress this further and proposals will be coming out in the coming months to ensure we are not financially penalised in the future by our partners. The data is not just for them; it will help both the ETTA and those affiliated to the ETTA to meet the needs now and in the future for our sport.

CORPERATE GOVERNANCE AND RULES

We need as an organisation to move this whole programme forward, the changes in the way we will be funded in the future makes this essential. I have a number of qualified and interested Table Tennis people looking at our rules which are encompassed within the ETTA Memorandum and Articles. To change any of these rules it takes a 75% majority of voting members. We must make this more transparent, easier to accomplish and more democratic. Over the coming months 1 shall be putting forward some ideas to modernise this area and hope that the Table Tennis fraternity will support these endeavours.

CHAIRMAN'S OUESTION TIME

Q: What is the status of the National Training Centre and why do we need one?

A: The funding will enable a National Training Centre to open from mid-August 2007 at the EIS in Sheffield. The Centre will only include residential arrangements for the over 16s in the Development Squad; it is not cost effective to have residential arrangements for those under 16, albeit included in the programme is support/training for those under 16s in the Talent Identification and Observation Squads. It is essential and proven that to compete in the international arena daily training is given to the players, in addition a centre gives us the opportunity to have high quality sparring partners, coaches and the support services needed at the elite level for sports science and medicine. Being together improves the "team" attitude and also helps the competition within the players.

Q: How do you see Talent Identification working within our structure?

A: Looking and identifying young potentially talented players is critical for the long-term future development of our sport. The identification process continues through the training programme that exists within the ETTA and the BTTF from school to clubs to regions to the youth squads and to the elite group. This is all part of a Long Term Athletes Development and this must also be linked to a coaching structure which meets the requirements of the players from the start. The addition of the BTTF Talent and Observation Squads is there to work with players and see if they can progress to the Elite Development Group, and at the same time keep those already in this Group "on their toes" as places for all are not for life but based upon ability, potential, results and commitment. The ETTA also has allocated funding for non-BTTF English players only in its budget and this also covers Talent Identification.

Q: How does a player gain a place in the Olympic pool?

A: Peter Charters has put together an excellent document in regard to this question which has been circulated and is on the website. It should be realised by all that the funding from UK Sport for the BTTF is an Elite Programme with its primary goal as medals and guarter-finals in 2012 and beyond. It is not about producing players just to represent their home country, it is about becoming the best at the most prestigious sporting event in the world, the Olympics. Criteria are in place for monitoring and assessing the players with terms that they have agreed to for selection and deselection.

New National centre Prestigious EIS Facility in Sheffield

The British Table Tennis Federation has decided to set up their National Training Centre at the prestigious EIS Facility in Sheffield. Table Tennis will be one of a number of Olympic Sports to base their World Class Programme at the EIS. The outstanding facilities on site including a purpose built Table Tennis playing area, the availability of Sports Science/ Medicine and quality physical training will assist Table Tennis in its goal for Medals in 2012.

It is intended that the programme for players will start on 13th August with

June 20<mark>06</mark>

Ellenborough Table Tennis Club was awarded £593,000 as part of the government funded community club development programme. David Hope, Chairman of Ellenborough TTC, said "Thanks to the untiring efforts of our committee and support of certain councillors and officers of the London borough of Enfield, our dream will come true when we re-open in October 2006." The ETTA was announced as one of the first organisations to achieve the foundation level of the Equality Standards for Sport. The award was presented at the CCPR annual conference by the Minister for Sport Richard Caborn.

Lieutenant Brett Barder utilised his table tennis and Arabic skills to full potential teaching young children in Basra. Table tennis is a thriving sport in Iraq perhaps due to the necessity to play in confined indoor spaces.

The World Championships in Bremen proved difficult for a young English squad but did throw up an interesting comparison from top racket sports reporter Richard Eaton: "Bremen is the city where Beethoven gave his first symphony its world premiere, and although Paul Drinkhall and Darius Knight have not arrive internationally yet, you could see that soon they too would be composing some startling stuff".

Darius Knight starred in the singles at the Polish Youth Open, narrowly missing the final following a tight match against no.1 seed Rinus Filius of Germany who went on to win gold. The doubles brought further success when Knight teamed up with fellow star Paul Drinkhall, claiming gold by defeating Mikkel Hindersson and Kasper Sternberg of Denmark. Poland also provided a medal for Kelly Sibley as she combined well with her regular doubles partner Sanja Paukovic to gain bronze.

July 2006

England's young talents moved up to fifth position in the Junior Boys (U18) ITTF world ranking. This was England's highest position for over 20 years, an especially exceptional achievement considering the average age of the squad is just 15.

Rockstar launches its new Xbox 360 game 'table tennis' which is gratefully received by global gaming fans, soaring straight to number one spot in the gaming chart.

The Table Tennis News review said "The real joy of Rockstar's interpretation of table tennis is that you can just pick up controller and play, no fiddling around trying to work out crazy combinations (although possible) you can just switch it on and away you go, this is a credit to the game and reflects its versatility. Even in a virtual world table tennis is a true sport for all".

July also brought about another celebrity endorsement as Freddie Flintoff announced his love for the game. Flintoff battled it out with Matthew Syed in a challenge Freddie feature for Sky Sports Cricket AM. Matthew Syed said: "Afterwards, Flintoff – who was terrific company thoughout – asked me to make an assessment of his game. I told him that it was my guess that, had he played table tennis rather than cricket, he would have challenged for a place in the England team."

The National Under 11/12/13/14 Championships delivered some fantastic play and promise for the future.

Paul Drinkhall won his first singles title on the ITTF World Junior Circuit in Funchal, Madeira, defeating Austria's Stephan Fergerl in a close seven game encounter. Swiftly following that success Drinkhall continued on top form gaining a second gold combining with compatriot Darius Knight in the doubles.

Plus the England junior boys' squad returned with silver from the European Youth Championships in Sarajevo. Following the gold in the cadets the previous year it was a remarkable achievement. Stepping up an age category and gaining instant success confirmed the significant improvement the young English squad had managed to achieve.

Alan Cooke became the first English player to win the world over 40s title and triumphed over a high quality field of around 1,000 players.

August 2006

David Wetherill won gold and silver at the Disability Sport England Table Tennis Championships at Grantham, a tremendous performance by a young athlete who is touted as a top contender in the Beijing Paralympics 2008. Mason Haley, a talented nine year old, successfully defended his children's table tennis title at the British Transplant Games despite reaching the tournament without packing a bat. David [father] said: "We each thought we had packed it but as soon as we discovered we'd left it behind, we had to go rushing



around trying to borrow one."

August also saw the Olympic torch arrive at the ITTF Headquarters. Chuck Hoey, ITTF museum curator, said: "It will act as a reminder of the success of the table tennis events at the Athens Games."

September 2006

Lilleshall played host to the ETTA's annual conference and volunteer awards dinner which proved to be an outstanding success with over 100 delegates attending. Plus top keynote speakers, including Liz Nicholl (Director of Elite Sport, UK Sport), Stephen Baddeley (Interim Chief Executive, Sport England) and Lord Colin Moynihan (Chairman, British Olympic Association).

September also brought with it the first UK School Games; this will be annual event in the run in to the 2012 Olympics. Hosted by the city of Glasgow it was deemed a huge success. Triumphant this year were England North in the boys and England West Midlands in the girls. The top talents on display managed to draw the attention of several influential people including Cherie Blair, Kelly Holmes, Duncan Goodhew, Richard Caborn (Minister of Sport), Sue Campbell (Chairman UK Sport and Youth Sport Trust), Sir Craig Reedie (Member of the International Olympic Committee) and Paul Deighton (Chief Executive, London 2012).

The Panasonic China Open provided the best individual performance by any English player for some years as Paul Drinkhall gave Korean superstar and reigning Olympic champion a closer examination than anyone had managed throughout the whole of the Athens Olympics taking him to three match points until finally succumbing 6-11, 7-11, 11-9, 11-7, 4-11, 11-9, 13-11

06/07 overview

October 2006

The ITTF announced that nearly 80,000 spectators made the trip to watch top live table tennis at the World Championships in Bremen earlier in the year.

Paul Drinkhall became the Senior Men's no.1 at just 16 years of age. Jeremy Wilson caught up with John Hilton in a feature for Table Tennis News 26 years after his famous European victory. Not only did this provide a trip down memory lane, it produced a top quote to underline the unpredictability of table tennis. "It was", says Don Parker describing Hilton's European victory, "one of the greatest upsets in the history of any sport - absolutely unbelievable." Legend has it that John was rated number two in England, three in Lancashire and four at the Manchester YMCA. Jasmine Ould was awarded Player of the Weekend and DML Woolwell claimed top spot in the Premier Division as the first

weekend of the Bribar Women's British League was completed. Kelly Sibley became Warwickshire Sports Awards Young Sportswoman of the Year for her achievements in table tennis over the past 12 months.

November 2006

November began with the launch of Dr Daniel Amen's new book 'Making a Good Brain Great' in which he states that table tennis is the best sport for the brain..., saying "it improves hand-eye coordination, it's aerobic, uses both upper and lower body, and causes you to use all areas of your brain".

Kelly Sibley topped the English Senior Women's rankings list. Sibley said "Becoming England no.1 has been one of my goals for a long time and to fulfill it is a great feeling."

Gavin Evans continued to prove why he is touted as one of the top 13 year old players in the world, winning two gold medals in the singles and doubles at the Slovak Cadet Open in Bratislava. The ETTA launched its new website, with stacks of fresh information, a clean and clear layout, interactive content and more, it proved an instant hit with table tennis fans all over the world.

December 2006

Darius Knight played TT with top comedian Jimmy Carr on the Paul O'Grady Show, a prime time chat show on Channel Four. Whilst Christina Agruilera, the superstar singer, reveals her favourite two pastimes are table tennis and yes you guessed it shopping.

Paul Drinkhall came second only to Theo Walcott in the BBC Young Sports Personality of the Year for his outstanding national and international success. Plus rising star Lewis Gray became proud winner of the 12 years and under Junior Sports Achievers Award at the annual awards evening organised by Tunbridge Wells Borough Council. Sun Jin, former Olympic silver medallist, demonstrated she has lost none of her guile putting in another unstoppable performance at the Hereford Butterfly Grand Prix to continue her dominance on the top domestic circuit.

Concluding a rather wet month, recognition for our top performers rained in as Gavin Evans became BBC East Midlands Junior Sportsman of the Year, Paul Drinkhall received the OCS National Young Sports Person Award, and Alan Cooke was named the Derbyshire Sports Veteran of the year.

January 20<mark>07</mark>

Paul Drinkhall started the new year as he finished the last winning another prestigious tournament. This time he defeated some of Europe's most talented young players to take the European Junior Top 12 singles title in Riga, Latvia. In doing so he emulated Carl Prean who was the last English player to win the title in San Marino, 1985.

Mathew Ware was presented with the Taut 100 award for his outstanding performances. He became only the ninth athlete to achieve this award since its introduction.

England elite continued to demonstrate their podium potential at the Australian Youth Olympics with Paul Drinkhall winning silver in the singles, and combining with team mate Darius Knight took top honours in the doubles. Paul Drinkhall was also selected to carry the flag in for Team GB in the opening ceremony. Drinkhall said "Holding the flag's a big honour and leading team GB out into the arena was an amazing feeling."

ANNUAL REPORT OVERVIEW OF THE YEAR

Plus UK Sport announced it is increasing the funding agreement for the GB table tennis programme in the 2007/8 season. A disabled table tennis demonstration was witnessed for the first time at this year's Senior National Championships. Four players battled it out with Mark Palmer (Wheelchair) and Will Bayley (Standing) succeeding over Shaun Newcombe and Chris Cattell respectively in the finals.

April 20<mark>07</mark>

Table tennis hit the theatre as 'Not a game for the boys' was performed at the Manchester Library Theatre. The Financial Times provided a glowing reference "A most impressive and absorbing debut, spiked with an almost ortonesque line in black humor and bursting with quick-fire one-liners."

Paul Drinkhall came second only to Theo Walcott in the BBC Young Sports Personality of the Year for his outstanding success.

February 2007

Sussex scooped the Cadets' County Premier Division without losing a match. The team of Steve Eckford, Ricki Weston, Helshan Weerasinghe, Sarah Russo and Yolanda King played exceptionally throughout.

The England senior women's squad of Joanna Parker, Helen Lower and Kelly Sibley booked their place in the Premier Division at the European Championships in Belgrade following a 3-0 win in Madeira and a 3-2 victory at the Draycott Table Tennis Centre. The Junior British League had another record attendance with Premier Division victories for York Gardens in the Boys and Draycott and Long Eaton recording success in the Girls. The award for Player of the Weekend went to Matthew Weatherby and Karina Lefevre. DHS London Progress, led by the incomparable Egle Adomelyte, fought their way through some nail-biting contests to take the Bribar Women's British League from DML Woolwell.

In the Premier British League Michael Marsden became the first player to get the better of Oxford Fireplace Centre's double Olympic silver medallist, Sun Jin (China), winning 11-9, 12-10, 5-11, 11-8.

March 2007

The National Championships took place at Sheffield's Ponds Forge International Sports Centre with Paul Drinkhall and Helen Lower crowned Senior Champions. This season also embraced new technology with 247.tv web streaming matches live and as replays for the whole world to see.

Top tournament information was received as the European Table Tennis Union confirmed that it had awarded the ETTA the Sport England confirmed further investment for the Club and Coach Development Fund awarding the ETTA a sum of £1,328,600 from April 2007- March 2010. Plus additional ring fenced funding for 2007/8 season of £162,625 for UKCC, Step into Sport and PESSCL.

Paul Drinkhall and Darius Knight became the only European players to be ranked in the world's top 15 in the U18s rankings list issued by the International Table Tennis Federation. Drinkhall reached 11 and Knight 15 with all other ranked players from China, Japan, Korea, Singapore or Taipei. In addition to this Drinkhall moved to an even more prominent position on the ITTF World Junior Circuit rankings by establishing himself at no.7 thanks to his success at the Canadian Junior Open.

May 2007

Cheeky girl Gabriela Irimia was photographed having a quick game of TT with her most recent romance Liberal Democrat MP Lembit Opik. Plus Kevin Spacey made us aware of his love for TT: "I'm a table tennis nut. I play constantly. I have a table in my apartment in London and I even have tournaments. Wherever I am that's one thing I always want – a table tennis table."

Ormesby Table Tennis Club announced a dedicated disabled table tennis session that will be held weekly providing top level coaches to assist all levels and abilities.

DHS London Progress became champions for the ninth season in the Premier British League, Premier Division.

Gavin Rumgay from Scotland heads up the men's singles Butterfly Grand Prix Series whilst the almost unstoppable Sun Jin from China looks likely to take the women's title.

Finally England finished May in a flurry winning every category at the Junior and Cadet Six Nations held in Coventry.

Exclusion zone for foreigners

With some 400 days before the Olympic Games in Beijing, Chinese Table Tennis Super League (CTTSL) shut its door to foreign players in the forthcoming 2007 season.

According to a register list recently released by the country's table tennis governing body, China's Table Tennis and Badminton Administrative Centre, there are nonon Chinese table tennis players registered for any of the 20 member clubs of the CTTSL. Liu Fengyan, director of the Table Tennis Administrative Centre, declined to admit that the table tennis governing body of China motivated to clean out foreigners from the league in the last season before the Beijing Games. "We have no such rule to stop foreigners joining the CTTSL," said Liu Monday at a press conference launching the new season of the league, which is to celebrate its ninth anniversary this year but only sailed onto the right path in 2005. "According to some new terms added to the CTTSL register regulations, a non-Chinese player must keep loyal before his/her contract with a Chinese club expired, having to play all matches

of the season and being forbidden to play in other leagues," said Liu. "It seems rigorous and new to China's table tennis league but has long been introduced to other leading leagues in the world such as Japan and Germany. Maybe that's why foreign players have all withdrawn from signing with a Chinese club," he added. In 2005, the first year of the socalled "Olympic Circle", a season of boom and bust was seen in the CTTSL in importing foreign players, with the Sichuan men's team having South Korea's Olympic champion Ryu Seung Min, his compatriot Joo Se Hyuk joined Zhejiang, Austrian world champion Werner Schlager in Shandong, and hot-tempered Greek Kalinikos Kreanga in Shaanxi.

The number of foreign players reached a peak in 2006, with almost all players ranked top 16 at that time in the world having shown up in China's table tennis league, including Germany's triple European champion Timo Boll and Japan's table tennis icon Ai Fukuhara.

All these big names, however, had been parted with their Chinese clubs for various reasons since late last year.

The 2007 season of the CTTSL, planned 18 rounds with 180 matches, began on June 9, seeing 77 players, 42 male and 45 female, of 20 men's and women's teams aiming to be crowned champions on September 12 through a team competition form similar to the Olympics.

Chinese players have dominated global competitions in recent years, sweeping all gold medals at the recently concluded Zagreb World Table Tennis Championships, and are favourites to win again at the 2008 Beijing Games after having taken 16 golds out of 20 since 1988.

Bristol Table Tennis League has a liking for statistics. As its website shows, they like facts and figures. For instance the highest recorded number of points in a five game set was the match where Paul Redman beat Geoff Mallett which ended 12/10, 11/13, 15/13, 9/11, 11/8. There were also figures for the highest scores in a three game set and four game set.

The highest number of singles points in an evening was 300 and the highest number of points in an evening 360. And there were ups and downs for the League's Filton College. Their first team won the Junior Premier Division whilst the college's other team Filton Hercules was relegated.

Use of speed glue is banned

The Board of Directors of the International Table Tennis Federation met in Zagreb on Friday 25th May at the Liebherr World Championships to discuss the situation regarding the use of speed glue. Following the meeting this press release was

issued by Adam Sharara President of the ITTF. Based on a majority decision taken by the Board of Directors of the ITTF, Glues containing harmful volatile compounds are no longer approved by the ITTF effective immediately. Although it is felt by the Board of Directors that the current levels of volatile compounds in Glues used to affix rubber coverings to the table tennis blade are in very small quantities and if applied correctly in a ventilated area provide no serious health risk to the players, it is felt, however, that long term use of such glues may have negative health effects. Therefore, as of immediate effect the ITTF informs all players to cease using glues containing volatile compounds (VCs). It is, therefore, the responsibility of each player,

or his/her parents in case of minors, to cease using glues containing VCs. Any player using such glues will be doing so at his/her own risk and the ITTF will not be held responsible of any consequences or ill effects resulting from the use of such glues.

All existing ITTF approvals of glues are WITHDRAWN effective immediately. This



withdrawal applies to ALL glues currently on the market. The ITTF will cease to approve any type of glue effective immediately. However, the ITTF's current "racket testing" programme and protocols will continue, which controls the amount

of VCs in a racket in order to protect the health of the players.

The ITTF will publish and circulate widely a list of available glues that are free of volatile compounds. This list will be updated regularly on the ITTF's website.

As of 1 January 2008 for ITTF Junior events, and as of 1 September 2008 for all other ITTF events, the ITTF will implement a new zero tolerance racket testing programme and protocol, using the "e-nez" and RAE instruments to ensure that all rackets used by players are VC free.

In addition, as of today, in the case that a proven severe health incident occurs and is confirmed by the medical authority recognised by the ITTF, then the ITTF would implement the new testing programme immediately (VC free) at that date (confirmation of the incident) and sanctions would be applied for failed tests. An exact legal announcement of this procedure will be made shortly by the ITTF.

The ITTF urges all parties involved, players, national associations, continental associations, manufacturers, and parents to act accordingly.

Streaming Success

The TV streaming we used at our National Championships in Sheffield last March has also been a success elsewhere. At the European Championships in Belgrade for example, 12.48m viewers logged on to watch the table tennis. And they were not just from Europe which attracted 58%, viewers were recorded watching from Asia, Australia, Africa and the USA.

the secret to SUCCESS

Success comes in all forms but underpinning it is usually a very strong support base. Simon Clifford is a football coach who has worked with several England internationals including Theo Walcott, Michael Owen and Micah Richards. He also trained Keira Knightley for her part in the film 'Bend It Like Beckham', and something he has identified as a common thread among each of those stars is an extremely strong paternal influence. By Jeremy Wilson

"It's interesting to see," he says. "A big thing for Theo is the family he has around him. His dad, Don, is like his best friend and has been with him every step of the way, and I knew Keira Knightley at a similar age and she was the same with her mum, Sharman. That was also true of Michael Owen with his dad Terry and also Juninho. You can't overestimate how important that foundation is."

"Coaches can help young sports people, but their parents are often the most important people in what they have achieved. It's the same in any sport. Yes, you can get to the top without that parental support if you have the drive and ambition but that support structure can be vital."

The dedication and commitment of some table tennis parents in supporting their children is incredible. They drive the length and breadth of the country and give up virtually every spare hour to ferry them to practice and tournaments. Gavin, Bradley and Myles Evans are all among Britain's top young prospects and their mum even arranged to have a shed built in the garden where they have a table so that they can train. The financial cost of entering and travelling to tournaments as well as the constant need for new rubbers and other equipment is also huge. Then there is the requirement of emotional support at the time of those inevitable defeats, as well as the skill of keeping their feet firmly on the ground if they do record a significant victory.

Geoff Ware, whose son Matt is among the country's top ten juniors, describes himself as a "mentor, secretary, chauffeur, corner man, drinks and food provider".

Like England's other emerging young players, Ware dreams of representing England by the time of the London Olympics in 2012.

His story is certainly not unusual and his dad, Geoff, estimates to have paid out some £30,000 to fund training, competition and equipment over the past six years.

"Since Matt took off in table tennis terms from when he was nine in 2000 l have devoted on average 30 weekends a year in the last six-seven

> years and probably three times a week for evening training," he says. "We have been fortunate to travel to Sweden, Germany, France, The Netherlands, Czech Republic and Bosnia – all of which could not have been possible without both of our commitment and without England selection. We have worn out three cars in our

travels around England and Europe and, at a conservative estimate, driven about 40,000 miles."

Geoff has been involved in table tennis from a young age, although he did not have the opportunity to play in tournaments. "I realised early on that Matt had something special, his appetite for the game, his keenness to train, his determination and drive to get right to the top, has been an inspiration for me," he says. "The roller coaster of emotions I have gone through these last years with Matt at tournaments you could write a book about. We have met some wonderful characters through the

sport and long may it continue." He estimated that Ware goes through 16 rubbers a year on top of the constant need for new blades, shoes, shirts, shorts, socks and Butterfly

track suits. He has received sponsorship from a drink company called TAUT as well as SportsAid SouthWest, while Tees Sport supplies his equipment. "Without their support, I don't think Matt would be where he is now," says Geoff. The journey will take them across Europe next year when Matt will spend a year training in Sweden. "All the sponsorship money has been put into Matt's bank account, and will pay for his accommodation and training/playing in his 6-12 months out in Sweden. His ever demanding need for better coaching and top quality sparring has taken us to so many clubs and has now finally meant going abroad, to receive higher standards of all round TT."

It is some commitment. The rewards, however, are impossible to quantify. "We are living the dream – it's worth every penny," says Geoff.





Brushing up your skills with Jean-Michel Saive

e know that sharpening your skills over the summer months will be top priority so here is your second instalment. This month we feature former world no. 1 Jean-Michel Saive's favourite drill which is a real tester of both technique and stamina, enjoy!

PLAYER PROFILE – JEAN-MICHEL SAIVE D.O.B: 17 November 1969 Place of birth: Liège, Belgium

Jean-Michel Saive was born into a table tennis playing family and was predestined to become an exceptional player. His father at his peak was ranked no. 10 in Belgium and his mother won the Belgian ladies' doubles championship when she was pregnant with him. At the age of 13 Saive was ranked fourth in Belgium and joined the national squad. In 1985 Saive reached no.1 in Belgium, a place which he kept until 2006 without interruption. In 1994 Savie made it to world no.1 which he retained for 515 days (from 9 February 1994 to 8 June 1995 and from 26 March 1996 to 24 April 1996). To date Jean-Michel Saive has won a total of 130 medals (51 gold, 38 silver and 41 bronze) in international singles tournaments.

A sign of things to come?

Wang Liqin defeated Ma Lin in an historic world championship final in Zagreb in May to become the first man since Zhuang Zedong to win three singles titles in the modern era. In a dramatic contest the defending champion recovered from 3-1 in games and 7-1 in points to complete one of the greatest comebacks in a major final in table tennis history.

> There was a time when Wang was considered too mentally frail to fulfil his awesome potential, but the languorous righthander will feel that his Herculean performance in Croatia has finally obliterated such doubts. He looked dead and buried when Ma – who has the most fearsome serve and third ball in world table tennis – raced into that six point lead in the fifth game. Up in the commentary box 1 remember saying: "Ma is on the verge".

> But a combination of elements conspired to give Wang an opportunity to pounce. First, the world number one, who must have thought the contest was over, started to relax and play his shots with less inhibition. Then, as he roared back into the contest, Ma suddenly began to exude self-doubt – which, in turn, emboldened Wang to believe he could pull off the miracle. Midway through the decider Wang's victory looked inevitable.

Ma's fragility will have been compounded by his other experiences in major contests. Back in 1999 he lost deuce in the fifth (when games were up to 21) in a spectacular final in Eindhoven to Liu Guoliang – now the coach of the China men's team. Two years ago Ma lost rather more one-sidedly to Wang. He also lost to Jan-Ove Waldner in the men's singles last 16 in Athens in 2004 in one of the most emotionally charged contests in the sport's history. Such experiences tend to leave mental scars. Wang's victory places his achievements amongst the top rank. In the last half century only Waldner, Zhuang, Guo Yeuhua, Kong Linghui and Liu Guoliang bare comparison. Few would disagree that Waldner's accomplishments still place him, by some margin, at the top of any list of great players, with Zhuang ahead of the bunch in second position. But Wang knows that, if he can win the men's singles title in the Olympic Games in Beijing next summer, some might even dare to compare him with Waldner himself.

Perhaps the most disappointing aspect of the championships in Zagreb was the performance of the Europeans. Timo Boll and Vladimir Samsonov – the only European's with a realistic chance of threatening China's hegemony – each made it to the quarter-finals before imploding in spectacular fashion. Samsonov fell to Ma Lin – despite having many golden opportunities – in a way that will have convinced many that he lacks the psychological tools to succeed on the grandest stage. As so often in the past, the tall Belarussian became far too passive on the big points.

Afterwards we lunched together and he told me: "I am not sure what happened towards the end of the games. My mind seemed to shut down and I overcomplicated things." He was, understandably, bitterly disappointed – but, as ever, charming company. The manner of Boll's defeat to Ryu Seung Min of South Korea was more unexpected and, therefore, that much more disappointing. The German youngster stepped to the table with a strong track record of success against the Olympic champion but, like Samsonov, fell apart on the big points. Given Boll's historic resilience under pressure, this was a huge surprise and it is to be hoped that this is a temporary aberration in the normal scheme of things.

Afterwards he spoke of his disappointment, but his coach – the irrepressible Richard Prause – argued the Boll would be back and stronger come the Olympics next year. We all agreed that, had Boll reproduced the form that took him to the European singles title earlier this year, he would have been in with a realistic chance of going all the way. Judging by Boll's

countenance I suspect that he will quickly put the disappointment of Zagreb behind him and re-double his training efforts as he looks forward to Beijing. Personal memories of Zagreb will be a commentary position so far up in the stands that it was almost impossible to see the action, meaning that we had to rely almost exclusively on the television monitors on the table in front of uş, More pleasantly, my hotel was in the centre of the old town, providing a glimpse of the charming Croatian tradition of drinking a leisurely al fresco coffee whilst reading the morning papers. On the morning after the final I sat back in one of the lovely cafes and, as I sipped some Earl Grey, reflected on one of table tennis's greatest comebacks.

England's young table tennis squad found the competition tough at the World Champions in Zagreb, seventeen-year-old Danny Reed was the only survivor of the qualifying rounds in the men's individual competition. Ranked number 706 in the world Reed showed great promise by winning a set against world number 33 Trinko Keen of the Netherlands, before eventually going down 75-11, 11-9, 7-11, 11-13, 11-13 in the first round.

Spanish Youth Open

Gavin Evans: Gold - Cadet Boys' Singles, Paul Drinkhall: Gold -Junior Boys' Singles, Darius Knight: Bronze - Junior Boys Singles another outstanding performance from the Junior Boys squad at the Spanish Junior Open, a World Junior Circuit event. Drinkhall and Knight had relatively untroubled passages to the semi-finals, Drinkhall beat Kim Min Seok of Korea in 4 games, Jin Ueda of Japan in 5 games and Alexander Shibaev in 4 games, Jin Ueda of Japan in 5 games and Alexander Shibaev in 4 games to take his semi-final slot against Abdel Kader Salifou, the French no 1. Knight had a similar passage beating Attila Vajda of Hungary in 4 games, Taiyo Nomura of Japan in 5 games and Ivo Silva of Portugal in 6 games to take a place in the other semi-final against Kentaro Miuchi of Japan.

The semi-finals provided much tougher contests, Drinkhall took his place in the final with a 4-2 win over Salifou, no less than three games went to deuce with two more 11-9 but Drinkhall just had the edge winning 13-11 in the sixth. The other semi-final was also an up and down affair but Kentaro Miuchi took the fifth and sixth games to 9 limiting the England no.2 Knight to a bronze medal.

In the final Drinkhall dominated from the first point and never gave his Japanese opponent an opportunity to get on top taking his second World Junior Circuit gold medal of the season in four straight.

In the Cadet Singles Gavin Evans was the no.1 seed and with all the rest of the seeds losing in the early knockout rounds it was not surprising his passage to the gold medal was serene, In the initial group neither of his opponents took a game, on his way to the final only one set was conceded as he overran Cedric Nuytinck of Belgium in 3 games, Thomas Le Breton of France in 3 games and in the semi-final Simon Gauzy of France in 4 games. In the final his opponent was the unseeded Italian Marco Rech Daldosso, and Evans not unsurprisingly dominated the match winning in three straight to take his second World Junior Circuit Cadet Singles gold medal.

You might think that with the dominance of the English boys in the singles that playing together in the junior doubles and team event they would be virtually unstoppable; however, there were a few close scrapes. Drinkhall and Knight had a comfortable first round win over a Belgian pair but in the second round they had another of those very close matches and this time lost it 10-12 in the fifth to present the French pair of Thomas Le Breton and Romain Lorentz with a shock win.

The other English players also started well, Danny Reed playing with Hrvoje Staba of Croatia negotiated the first round successfully as did Evans who was partnering Hunor Szocs of Romania. The second round, however, saw their demise as well, Reed and partner to Alexander Olonov and Alexander Shibaev of Russia, Evans and partner to Taras Merzlikin of Russia and Youn Joo Hyun of Korea.

Top performances for Great Britain

Britain's top disabled table tennis players are progressing well in their qualification for Beijing, winning medals at recent tournaments. At the Irish Open, which took place in Dublin, British Paralympian Arnie Chan won his first international title, taking gold in the class 3 event, ahead of fellow Brit James Rawson, who won bronze.

Mansfield-based Arnie, who has competed at five Paralympic Games, then paired up with Rawson to win silver in the class three men's team event.

Meanwhile GB's Sara Head also won gold in the women's class 3 singles before pairing up with Cathy Mitton to win bronze in the class 3 doubles. This was a second bronze for Mitton, who also finished third in the class 2 singles There were also medals for class 5 player Scott Robinson, who won silver in the individual competition before partnering Bridgend's Neil Robinson to another silver in the doubles.

Commonwealth Games gold medallist Sue Gilroy took home two medals - winning silver in the open singles before taking bronze in the women's class 4 to 5 singles. Meanwhile at the Slovenian Open, which took place in Kranjska Gora, Britain's youngsters showed promising performances.

Seventeen-year-old student David Wetherill and 18-year-old Will Bayley beat the current European class 6 team champions Denmark to win gold in the international class 6 team competition.

Arnie Chan won his second gold medal of the month – again pairing up with James Rawson to win the class 3 team title. However it was Rawson that this time took gold in the class 3 singles.

Meanwhile Swansea's Paul Karabardak won silver in the class 7 singles before partnering Farrell Anthony in the team event to pick up his second silver.

Deeside's Scott Robertson repeated his success in the Irish Open again winning silver in the doubles competition but this time was paired with Germany's Sel Cetin.

Both tournaments were qualification events for the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games so put Britain in good stead ahead of next year's Games.

Wetherill edging nearer his goal

The Torpoint Community College student, who last December was named the Herald's Young Sports Personality winner, amassed 150 ranking points and is confident he can continue to rise even higher if he replicates his recent form.

Wetherill needs to be in the top 12 to guarantee a place at the 2008 Beijing Paralympics but believes he is edging nearer his goal.

The 17-year-old says he no longer fears facing any of his top 10-ranked rivals and proudly points to his career-best victory over Vjekoslav Gregorovic in the quarter-finals at Ostrava.

Buoyed by his victory over world number six Gregorovic - who had been unbeaten for six months prior to meeting the ultra-talented Cornish star -Wetherill was defeated in the semi-finals by another Russian, Alexandr Esaulov, who went on to claim a silver medal. The self-belief instilled by these and previous results has given Wetherill the confidence to underline his Great Britain potential in the Czech Republic next week.

He said: "I really feel that I have it within me to push on and get into the world top 12.

"I think I've proved that I don't need to fear anybody in the top 20 and even higher-placed players than myself. "Until recently, while I had been confident of beating players from outside the top 20, I didn't automatically go into games against the top players in that frame of mind.

"But now 1 think 1 do, not just because 1 beat Gregorovic, which was my best-ever win, but as 1 think 1've proven that 1 can hold my own at this level.

"So if I can take my form into the Czech Open and in more competitions this summer, then I really do think I will have a good chance of getting into the top 12 by the end of the year."





Special Olympics in sight

op table tennis players representing Great Britain (GB) at the Special Olympics will be catching up for a training session in Manchester this month where they will be hoping to hone their skills further before they travel to Shanghai later this year. The GB

players are Emma Jones (Wolverhampton), Kimberly Gillian (Arbroath), Duncan Feltham (Bornemouth) and Jeffery Jarvis (Melton Mowbray).

The training session also includes a charity dinner in which the athletes representing the 16 Special Olympic sports will be honoured, along with new ambassadors Darren Campbell, Mark Cox, and SOGB athlete Moira Brown at a black tie fundraiser called Shanghai Nights: On the Road to Gold in Shanghai.

"The World Games is the pinnacle towards which all of our athletes strive," said Lawrie McMenemy, SOGB Chairman, "this is a chance for Special Olympics athletes to showcase their abilities and talents on a worldwide level, proving that they deserve just as many accolades as other world-class athletes."

At the World Summer Games in Shanghai, the athletes will represent Great Britain, competing against 170 countries and 7,000 Special Olympics athletes. The event includes 40,000 volunteers, 3,500 event officials and thousands of families, volunteers, spectators and journalists from every continent. The 159 Team GB 2007 athletes were selected from 2,500 competitors who competed at the Special Olympics GB National Summer Games in Glasgow in July

2005, they represent each of the organisation's 19 local regions across England, Scotland and Wales.

Team GB is comprised of 16 squads including: Aquatics, Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Cycling, Equestrian, Football, Golf, Gymnastics, Judo, Kayaking, Powerlifting, Sailing, Table Tennis, Ten Pin Bowling and Tennis.

Albert Shipley

It is with great sadness that the death of Albert Shipley, former General Secretary of the English Table Tennis Association and Secretary General of the International Table Tennis Federation, is announced.

Albert Shipley, an instrumental character in the world of table tennis, recently passed away at St Michael's Hospice in St Leonards-on-Sea, East Sussex. He had entered the hospice four weeks earlier suffering from bone, bowel and lung cancer. Albert Shipley was 'Mr Secretary'; whatever the organisation of which he was a member, more often than not, he assumed the administration and organisational role.

In the world of table tennis he served as the Honorary Secretary of the Bromley Table Tennis League in south east London from 1960 to 1966 before turning his hobby into his job. He became the Assistant General Secretary of the English Table Tennis Association in 1967 rising to the post of General Secretary in 1976, before joining the International Table Tennis Federation as the Secretary General in late 1989, a post he occupied until his retirement in 1996. Born on 25th November 1930 in Bromley, he succeeded academically and won a scholarship to the local grammar school. After leaving school he worked for the Borough Engineers Department of Bromley Borough Council before joining the Fleet Air Arm to complete his National Service from 1949 to 1951 where he trained as a photographer. He married Betty Sambridge in 1950 and after National Service spent six months with British Rail at London Bridge before joining Unilever in 1952. Sport was his main interest, in particular table tennis, snooker, cricket, football and golf. He enjoyed participating in sport but it is in the role of secretary that he will always be best remembered and most revered.

He was Secretary of St Luke's Cricket Club, Secretary of Bromley Table Tennis League, Secretary of North West Kent Artisans Golf Championships and Secretary of Hawkhurst Golf Club. In the sport of table tennis his progression to national and international office started in 1965. He assisted with the organisation of the European Championships in Wembley, London, in 1966, which led to him becoming Honorary Secretary of the National Selection Committee and so on to his professional appointments.

It was a step that was eventually to take him to all parts of the world either as a delegate, teacher of umpires or television commentator.

He visited most countries in Europe and enjoyed many trips to Asia, whilst also attending the Olympic Games in Barcelona and Atlanta, the latter being his final duty in the role of ITTF Secretary General.

Albert played cricket and football locally, in one cricket match he took all ten wickets, whilst in the sport of football he was the goalkeeper. Golf was his passion. He managed to play on some of his overseas trips but in later years his abilities suffered as a result of arthritis in his hands; having played off a handicap of 12 for most of his adult life, he had to be content with his handicap rising to 20 plus in later years. Undoubtedly the fact that his playing standard was falling did disappoint Albert but he did receive a well deserved reward for his efforts. He was elected President of Hawkhurst Golf Club in October 2003.

Also, Albert took great pride in his abilities as a mimic, particularly regional accents and foreign languages. When called upon to do a party piece at functions for the International Table Tennis Federation, he would speak utter rubbish but with the accent and intonation of usually some six different languages!

In the world of information technology Albert's baptism was somewhat late in life; it was not until after he left the employment of the International Table Tennis Federation that he started to use a computer with any degree of regularity. However, he taught himself how to use what is increasingly becoming a modern day necessity and enjoyed sending e-mails and illustrating the notices of events at the golf club.

In 2003 Albert suffered bladder problems which he overcame but in April 2004 more health problems started.

He suffered from general fatigue, a swollen right knee, degenerated bones in the neck and an irregular pulse but by February 2006 he had recovered to a large extent and was in reasonably good health.

However, he was still plagued by the knee problem which led to a fall on Easter Sunday 2006, he broke his femur which was repaired with a rod and plate held in by four screws. Subsequently, the knee was diagnosed as a torn cartilage and an operation to remove this was carried out on 13th July 2006. Two months ago in 2007 he fell and once again broke the femur; following an operation there were complications, he was unable to walk and understandably was very depressed. Soon afterwards he was diagnosed with cancer of the bones, bowels and lungs and was admitted to St Michael's Hospice.

Albert had a room facing the sea front and very near to 53 London Road, St Leonards-on-Sea in East Sussex where the offices of the International Table Tennis Federation were situated during his time as the Secretary General.

Albert Shipley was a man of the highest integrity, respected worldwide; he was the secretary of secretaries.

The condolences of the table tennis world go to his family, Mr Secretary the pain of the recent months is over; may you rest in peace.

It was the veteran men of Sussex, assisted by the not so veteran women who carried the county to the senior County Championship Premier Division title which came to an exciting conclusion at the Meres Leisure Centre, Grantham. Sussex retained the title that they had won in spectaular fashion last season.

Sussex took the title after seven gruelling rounds over the two weekends, which started in Cippenham in November. The south coast county were unbeaten in their seven matches, winning five and drawing two, to take the title by one point from Derbyshire with Middlesex third. The Sussex squad of veterans Ritchie Venner, Nigel Eckersley, Adrian Moore and Peter Bartram were joined by Rose Rainton and Sarah Stedman in their quest for glory ,and all six players contributed heavily to their title success as draws against their two nearest title contenders saw them just clinch the title.

Newly promoted Derbyshire were a revelation this season and their runners up spot was remarkable considering that they were in a division below last season but their defeat to Middlesex added to their drawn clash with champions Sussex left them tantalisingly one point adrift of Sussex. Last season's runners-up, Middlesex, had to settle for third spot this season and will look at their shock defeat against Devonshire as the reason for their one place slip in the division.

Their draw against Sussex was one of the matches of the division but had they been able to snatch even a point in this match they would have taken the title, such was the intensity at the top of this division.

Middlesex did have the only unbeaten player over the two weekends as Egle Adomelyte won her 14 straight sets.

Devonshire ended the season in fourth place, one point behind Derbyshire and Middlesex, winning five and losing only to Sussex and Middlesex ,but the remainder of the division was left to determine which two counties were going to be relegated.

After a disappointing first weekend Yorkshire, bolstered by the inclusion of Mary Fuller, completed the season in fourth place on six points followed by Devon and Essex a point behind, which left South Yorkshire to join Buckinghamshire in Division 1 next season. As usual the Premier weekend was run by Ken Eliot with his effortless efficiency which is a glowing example to all prospective event organisers, and for the second weekend County Championship administrator, Les Smith, refereed the event with his usual style.

Ormesby pair Danny Reed and Karina Lefevre have produced outstanding results over the

Reed won his qualifying group with a victory over Ahmed Lofti El-Jetil of Lebanon 4-0 and by defeating the world no 255 Kazeem Nosiru of Nigeria 11-5 in the seventh game. This took him through to the final qualifying round where he was drawn against Bojan Miolsevic of Bosnia. Danny raced into a 3-0 lead against the player ranked 249 in the world and led 3-0 in the fourth before the Bosnian won 6 points in a row. Danny fought back well to win the match at 12-10 and by 4 games to 0.

In the first round proper, Danny was drawn against the Dutch no 1 Trinko Keen, ranked 33 in the world. Keen won by 4 games to 1, with Danny taking the second game at 11-9. The third and fourth games were both at 13-11 so he gave the Dutchman a hard contest before going out. 13 year old Karina Lefevre won her most important championship to date, the English Under 14 Girls' Singles Table Tennis title in Norwich on Saturday 2 June.

Surrey by Chris Andrews

Darius Knight won the National Junior Mixed Doubles title with Sara Wang and retained his National Junior Doubles title with Paul Drinkhall. He was also the runner-up in the National Junior Singles Final. At only 17 years old Darius is ranked 15th in the world in the 18 and under age group. In the Senior British League Premier Division Darren Blake was Surrey's top player winning 73% of his matches for London Progress who won the ninth consecutive senior British League Premier Division title. York Gardens 1 were Surrey's top team coming fourth in Division 1 South.

The county senior first team came second in Division 1B whereas the senior second team won the title and got promoted from Division 2D. The new junior first team did well to stay in Division 1B and the second team came third in Division 2D. Relegation hit the cadet first team from the Premier Division with the cadet second team coming third in Division 1B. The Veteran first team came fifth in the Premier Division, the second team came sixth in Division 1B, the third team came fifth in Division 3B, the fourth team came fifth in Division 3C and the fifth team were promoted due to winning the Division 4C title. In the Thames Valley League Graham Spicer 1 won the title with John Payne from Graham Spicer 2 being top of the averages having

played the minimum four matches. His only loss was to Vidal Graham from Graham Spicer 1 who also plays for London Progress 2 who won the senior British League Division 1 South title. Molesey 2, Alexandra 2, and Malden 3 won Divisions 2, 3 and 4 respectively of the Thames Valley League.

Sussex by Graham Carter

It has been an extremely busy and successful few weeks for the county's teams. Sussex retained their Senior County Championship title, Sussex juniors became Division One champions and the cadets' second team emulated their first team, who had already lifted the Premier Division title, to win Division'One.

Congratulations go to the senior first team of Ritchie Venner (captain), Nigel Eckersley, Adrian Moore, Peter Bartram, Rose Rainton and Sarah Stedman. They completed their campaign unbeaten and finished the final session at Grantham with three wins and a draw, which included a terrific hard-fought 7-3 victory against Devon in what proved to be a decisive five-hour long marathon battle. Venner is closing in on Roger Chandler's alltime record after winning the Sussex Championships for a 12th time. This year the tournament was played at a brand new venue, the excellent spacious sports hall at Holy Trinity School in Crawley, which is the home of Crawley Community Table Tennis Club. Venner recovered from going 2-1 down to beat talented topspinner Mayur Majithia 11-1 in the fifth. The previous day Majithia had retained his Crawley & Horsham League title by defeating in-form all-out attacker Phil Richardson 3-1 in the final. Venner is now only one more win away from equalling Chandler's 13 successes, which were achieved in the 70s and 80s.

Rose Rainton made it a Hastings double when she lifted the women's crown for the eighth time after overcoming Teresa Bennett 11-9/8-11/11-8/11-6 in a see-saw final. Ashley Miles and Stacey Furnival are the new junior champions of Sussex. Miles beat Stephen Eckford 3-0 in the U18 boys' final, while Stacey claimed the girls' title for the fourth time when she came back from being 2-0 down to beat Yolanda King 3-2. King had just returned from a three-day long England training camp in Cardiff where she played in matches against Germany, Belgium and Wales. Miles had earlier won the junior event at the Haywards Heath Championships, also reaching the men's singles final before bowing out to winner Marc Burman.

The easy-going former Surrey player/professional coach now lives in Haywards Heath and as well as doing some well-received coaching at Warden Park School in Cuckfield, is making an impact in Sussex leagues. He added the Brighton Championships men's singles crown to his local league title. To win this he beat defending champion Wesley Bush-Harris 14-12 in the fifth game of a great final. Peter Bartram was triumphant at the Worthing Championships, where he overcame Jack Boult in a thrilling five-game final. However, Boult eventually gained his revenge at the Worthing Top Eight Invitation Cup, winning the title after knocking out holder Bartram 3-1 in a close semi-final. Boult's opponent in the final was Alex Rourke, who he outpointed 13-11 in the fourth, watched by an impressive 65 spectators. Worthing junior Sally Hughes won the Best Performance Award at the Brighton tournament, coming away with four titles, including ladies singles where she caused a shock in taking the scalp of reigning champion Christine Wicks. Hughes did well too at the English Junior Championships in Doncaster, where she beat England no.15 Emily Bates to reach the last 16. Chelsea Furnival did equally well in the U15 event, also progressing to the last 16 and reaching the girls' doubles guarter-final, partnered by Derbyshire's Lucy Davidson. Brighton Bats retained the National Cadets League South East title. In a series of matches at Tunbridge Wells, Tom Baxter won all 12 of his matches, while younger brother Joe and David Tyler both took 10 out of 12 as the team beat Weald, Byng Hall, Horsham, Hastings and Battle and drew with Howard. All this was achieved despite being without their no.1 player, Helshan Weerasinghe, who won 20 out of 20 for them earlier in the campaign. Congratulations to them and their organiser, Rory Scott.
