ENGLAND TURN THE TIDE

FOLLOWING on their champagne success over Rumania at Edmonton on December 3, the fighting qualities of England's representatives were fully demonstrated on the following weekend against West Germany at Crystal Palace.

From a trailing position of 0-4, in an eight set match, England banged down their foot on the accelerator to achieve equality in a tremendous recovery after the interval.

Out hit by Martin Ness in his first set, Denis Neale scored a telling blow when he overcame the tenacious Eberhard Scholer who had earlier beaten Stuart Gibbs. The young Essex player also came back into the picture by turning the scales on the fiery

Mary Wright, who took no part in the proceedings before the interval, was at ease in disposing of Agnes Simon and in partnership with Pauline Hemmings cruised to another comfortable success over her singles victim partnered by Edit Buchholz.

TWO TITLES EACH FOR HARRISON & MARY WRIGHT

THE first shock in the English Closed Championships at the Crystal Palace came in the third round, when Les Haslam, who recently beat Denis Neale in the Middlesex Open, added the scalp of the holder and No. 1 seed, Chester Barnes. Having lost the first and second games, Chester fought back to take the third, but Haslam clinched the match in

In the semi-final, Ian Harrison repeated his County Championship win over Haslam to meet Connie Warren in the final, which he won in three straight. Now 27 years of age, Ian, who has played for England more than a hundred times, last won the English Closed six years ago.

In the Women's Singles, Mary Wright won her fourth title and the third in succession, when she beat 16-year-old Karenza Smith, 19, -18, 17, 15. Afterwards Mary paid a warm tribute to Karenza, for whom she predicts a great future. Together they won the Women's Doubles by defeating Shelagh Hession and Judy Williams in three straight.

Harrison won his second title when he and Chester Barnes retained the Men's Doubles by beating Denis Neale and Brian Wright, also in three straight.

The final shock of the Championships came in the Mixed Doubles, when the Essex pair, Stuart Gibbs and Beverley Sayer, defeated Brian and Mary Wright, the holders.

Harrison Drops a Place in Ranking List

In the Ranking Lists published after the Championships, Chester Barnes and Denis Neale retain first and second places, with Connie Warren displacing Ian Harrison at No. 3. Les Haslam jumps from 11 to 7, followed by Mike Johns and Alan Lindsay, who both come into the ranking list.

First and second places in the Women's List are retained by Mary Wright and Lesley Radford, followed by Karenza Smith who jumps from 8 to 3 and Judy Williams, from 12 to 4.

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NO VOTES, NO GROUSE .

VOTING papers for the election of the Deputy Chairman of the E.T.T.A. for the remaining part of the 1966-67 season should by now have been received by every County Association and Local League whose current affiliation fees to the national body have been paid.

If not so to hand then immediate application should be made to the Organising Secretary, Derek R. Tremayne.

To a lot of Local League secretaries the position vacated by Norman Reeve may not seem all that important but to those having accepted nomination quite the reverse happens to be the case and rightly so.

Leaving personalities to one side the appointment is one that carries with it an official seat on the Management Committee which body carries out the dayto-day administration of affairs in accordance with the policy and directions of the National Coun-

It is logical to assume therefore that a league having paid its affiliation fees should have an interest in how its money is being spent and not to cast a vote would appear indicative of not caring what becomes of the money or indeed how the Association is run.

Apathy is a form of rust that is all too prevelant at election times even when a full season's appointment is at stake and some there might well be totally indifferent to voting a person into office for half a season.

But whether it be for all or part, the work of the E.T.T.A. must go on and to function on all cylinders is just as vital in the short term as in the long.

Each and every one of us are a part of the Association so do complete and despatch the voting papers you have received. Fulfil your entitled part and if the candidate of your choice succeeds but falls short of your expectations you will have just cause to moan which is what some do now without having the moral right to do so for it should be no vote, no grouse.

INTERNATIONAL ROUND-UP

Work on the World Championships is now in full swing, and the "big five" responsible for the organisation are AKE ELDH, who is the Chairman of the whole organisation and also responsible for international contacts; Allan Eriksson, who is the Hon. Referee; Erik Extergren, the Chairman of the Propaganda Committee; TORD OSTNER, Chairman of the Hospitality Committee and responsible for finance; and JOEL HASKEL, who is the Public Relations Manager for the Championships. Other important members of the Organising Committee are Bo BJORKMAN, Secretary of the Organisation and Hospitality Committee; AKE ROBERTSSON, Secretary of the Tournament Committee; and BORJE BERGKVIST, Secretary of the Propaganda Committee.

Last October, the Swedish T.T.A. celebrated its 40th anniversary, and there is no doubt that the World Championships will be a testimonial to the outstanding organising ability of the Swedes.

SPONSORSHIP GUARANTEES

The budget is something which we in England can only regard with envy. Total budget is estimated at Sw.Kr. 800,000 (£55,000) and the Swedish T.T.A. have already secured Sw.Kr. 500,000 (£35,000) thanks to sponsorship guarantees by BP and Philips, and advertising revenue arranged through the Expressen newspaper. They are also running a national lottery in which the first prize is a house, and other prizes include four cars and five motor-boats. The lottery is receiving support from everyone—the Swedish maga-zine shows a picture of their Prime Minister purchasing tickets, and all sports organisations are lending their support.

I think the Swedes are doing a service to table tennis by the "big" way in which they are organising the Championships. We in England could not match these facilities unless similar support were forthcoming from British industry. Of course, we have received generous help from the Sports Council, from our friends in the sports goods manufacturing trade, and many welcome donations from British firms such as Ferranti, Marks & Spencer, Atkinsons and others too numerous to mention. But when it comes to staging a World Championships, we would be faced with a budget in the region of £60,000, and it was the impossibility of getting sponsorship to guarantee against a possible loss of up to half the budget amount that forced us to abandon the idea of holding the 1967 World Championships in London. Table Tennis has a bigger playing membership than any other sport

Table Tennis has a bigger playing membership than any other sport in the world, and in many countries it has risen to be one of the major sports. It could do so in England, if really substantial help in the way of sponsorship could be obtained from British industry. Of course, this time of squeeze and restrictions is a difficult one in which to seek sponsorship, but I think it is not too much to hope for that in the years ahead, sportsminded industrialists and big businessmen will help to make it possible to bring the World Championships to this country once more.

Reverting to the World Championships, these are being played at the Johanneshovs Isstadion, which is an arena originally built for ice-hockey and indoor athletics. It holds more than 10,000 people. 18 Stiga Expert tables are being used. It is expected that the Swedish Association will have to cater for 1,100 people, and although some 20 hotels will be used to accommodate the visitors, all feeding arrangements will be in one restaurant, which should greatly help matters.

MIDDLESEX POINTS THE WAY

AN idea put to use by Middlesex County Umpires secretary, John Wright, in recent matches concerns the determination of the order of striking in doubles.

Suppose say Adams and Barna are down, while the players are knocking up, with spaces as indicated A B HIBERNATE OF CIRCULATE down, while the players are up, with spaces as indicated A B A B and then fill in the gaps with by Louis Hoffman, O.M.S. letters arranged as A C B D A C B D. Then go out to toss up and suppose that Barna elects to serve, and Carrington to receive. This is not in the forward order, so place under the letter B in place 7 a backward pointing arrow.

The order of striking is then found by reading backwards to be B C A D etc. In the second game you start at C or D and work forwards, in the third you start at A or B and work back-wards going forwards again at the change of ends.

If Decker had elected to receive from Barna in the first you would have gone forwards in the first, backwards in the second, forwards at the start of the third and backwards at change of ends.

Simple, but it will cut out that writing down after the players have decided who is to serve : all you have to do is put in a forward arrow or backward pointing arrow starting at

Barna to Carrington first game back-wards order. Second game MUST be forwards starting C or D. Third must again be backwards to change of ends when it becomes forward.

IT is a well-known fact that a good deal of one's life is spent asleep. In this idyllic state your cares and worries, successes and failures, are, or should be, cast aside and your mind at complete rest. This hibernation period, which unfortunately too many people prolong even into their wakeful period, is of no use whatsoever to the Table Tennis News.

An O.M.S. (official magazine salesman) must be awake at all times.

Remember, you cannot circulate while you hibernate. He must push the "News" down the throats of players. He must make sure that not one person evades his beady eye and tries to read over another shoulder. He must circulate himself among the players, spreading the gospel of the Table Tennis News. We have now reached the half-way mark in our first season. We cannot go backwards. Our target at all times must be more than last month. Treat the selling of John Wright please.

Example: as per second paragraph:

A C B D A C B D

Inan last month. Treat the selling of the News as your No. 1 priority. I beg of you DON'T GO TO SLEEP
ON THE JOB. Remember, you cannot circulate while you hike

ARRANGEMENS FOR THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Extracted from a bulletin issued by the Swedish Table Tennis Association, in connection with the forthcoming World Championships in April, officially titled BT-VM-67, are the following details of concern to those contemplating a visit to Stockholm.

Board and Lodging at skr 70 :- per day

"It is usual for many visiting Associations to announce more persons than only the participating players, for whom the host country pays.

The cost for these extra players will be skr 70:— per person per day which will entitle them to stay at the same hotel as the rest of the group. They will get a continental breakfast at the hotel and lunch and dinner at the restaurant for the Championships, Gota Kallare, where lunch will be served from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and dinner from 5.30 to 7.30 p.m.

A ticket, valid for the whole period of the Championships on underground, bus and tram costs skr. 10:— and a farewell-party ticket costs skr 30:—. One day's sightseeing is included in the price."

Reserve Rooms in Good Time

"In addition to those extra persons who will join the participation group, there is surely a great interest also in supporter or tourist trips. Naturally, these people may wish to reserve rooms and tickets, and we will, of course be pleased to assist them.

But reserve rooms in good time. BT-VM-67 has reserved a number of rooms at the hotels in town, but it will definitely become difficult for those who wait until the last minute to make up their minds.

There are hotel rooms in different price classes, as from skr 20/50:—in single rooms, and as from skr 30/80:— in double rooms. Private accommodation can also be arranged from 15/20:— for single and 25/30:— for double rooms, but all are subject to a 1967 price review.

The youngest England senior team of recent years played with much skill and sparkle to beat a strong Dutch National side 7-2, at Boreham-wood, Herts, only three days after Christmas.

For Mike Johns it was an occasion of special importance, being his first senior International appearance. It is to his credit that he did not let the moment affect his confidence or ability.

Stuart Gibbs was perhaps the architect of the victory with 100% per-formance which he achieved with his amazing brand of unpredictable shots -some frighteningly reckless, some positively brilliant.

Our girls were a little more subdued than usual, but nevertheless fought tenaciously. Full marks are due to Karenza Smith for winning her singles against the more experienced Anne Marie Wijnants.

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SERVICES RETURNED

WITH all respect to Jack Carring-ton's article, isn't it about time we got away from a subjective view-point on the topic of the T.T. Serve? The use of words like "the stink," "small and twisty," "verulent" is specious, in that such expressions pre-inder the problem by making it judge the problem by making it impossible for most readers to dis-sociate their thoughts from the emotions aroused by the words used.

The history of the game shows that the service has periodically dominated to an extent where, unless action was taken to curb the service power, the

- (a) tended to lose its spectator appeal;
- became rapidly less enjoyable to the players; and
- was in danger of turning itself into a freak performance instead of remaining what it ought to be—a minor but skilful and athletic sport (at the upper levels).

However, despite the lawmakers. the players, using those current techniques and materials which com-plied with whichever service law was in force, have always attempted to regain the ascendancy and apparently the ingenuity of the server will overcome that of the law maker in this particular respect.

Why not approach this from a different basis? IF—a very big if—it be right to curb the server in an attempt to get a rally to take place, then a solution could be:

"Neither player may win the point unless (excluding the delivery of the ball in service) the ball shall have passed across the net on at least two occasions."

This is not meant to be a definition, but the technical wording of a suitable rule would not be difficult. Such a solution would be easy for umpires a solution would be easy for umpires to decide in practice, and since it could not give the server any material advantage to deliver a very difficult service, I imagine that the "cupped hand, below the table, ball thrown to the maximum height, watch me while I bounce it on the bat, only another five minutes before I serve, I'm a better stamper than you, etc." brigade might disappear.

There are other solutions which one can suggest, by analogy from other sports. For, example, the point could only be won by the receiver, not the server, and then only after the service had been safely returned across the net. This might need to be coupled with say, a revision of the coupled with, say, a revision of the service and scoring rules:

(i) Each player alternate balls. could serve

If the server won the rally, but not the point, he could opt for the receiver to serve the next.

(iii) If the receiver won, he could opt for the server to serve again, to give him, the receiver a chance to win another point.

Rallies, and play generally, might become more interesting, as in squash where only the server can win the point—if the server wins the rally he becomes the server, but the rally is not scored. Games might be restricted to say 11 up instead of 21.

I am of the opinion that some thinking on these lines might be more productive of a return to popularity of a game which, unlike lawn tennis has largely lost its spectator appeal, than attempts to modify a service law which is very difficult to apply in its present form.

Advocates of the ball being struck whilst on the downward path may wish to ponder again on the services of the type produced by, e.g., Grin-berg and Haslam, to name only two exponents, which would still comply with this rule.

LAST month I mentioned match be handled by electronic sorting result cards. A common size for machines and to fall within the range result cards. A common size for these is 6in. × 4in., the 6in. side being useful for checking the height of the net. What is not generally realized is that this size of card (when completed with results, etc.) is not within the limits for sending by post at the minimum, 3d. postage They should, therefore, carry 5d. in stamps. The saving of 2d. can be readily achieved by removing \$\frac{1}{2}\$in. from the length as, to be sent at the 3d. rate, such cards must not exceed $4\frac{1}{8}$ in. \times $5\frac{2}{8}$ in.

The latter is size A6, one of the International Paper sizes which are gradually being introduced. All sizes are exact multiples of one another. A4, 8½in. × 11½in., when halved along the longer side gives two sheets of A5, 5½in. × 8½in., which is twice as large as A6. A4 is intended to replace quarto (10in. × 8in.) and foolscap (13in. × 8in.) for stationery but the change to it is rather slow and stocks are not always available

At present there are no major limitations on the size of envelopes which can be sent through the post and, provided the weight does not exceed 2 oz., the postage is 4d. sealed and 3d. printed paper rate (PPR).

From July 1, 1968, only the Post Office Preferred range of envelopes (POP envelopes) will qualify for these lowest rates of postage. Envelopes lowest rates of postage. Envelopes outside the POP range can still be used after the middle of next year but those weighing not more than 2 oz. will be charged at the next higher rate, i.e. 6d. sealed or 5d. PPR. The preferred sizes are to enable mail to

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envelopes must, among other requirements, be at least 3½in. × 5½in. and not larger than 4½in. × 9½in. Full details are given in a leastet (Ref. PL 197 3/66) obtainable from head post offices.

offices.

One size of envelope which falls outside this range is the large court envelope $4\frac{1}{8}$ in. \times $5\frac{1}{8}$ in., which is designed to take a quarto sheet (10in. \times 8in.) folded into quarters. It might be advisable to start using up all non-POP sizes during the next year and a half. 9in. \times 4in. envelopes, which take quarto folded in three and foolscap folded in four, are POP and can still be used, particularly for circulars, at the minimum rates.

Secretaries are often the last persons to learn of a change of Fortunately, the Post Office is quite helpful if the person you send a letter to has gone away. For all but the 3d. postage the letter will be returned to you if no forwarding address is known—even if the letter has to be opened to find out who sent it. Obviously a return address on the envelope is helpful. On a 3d. envelope, unless it is clearly marked with instructions to return it, the envelopes and contents are destroyed. On most PPR envelopes I use a 3-line rubber stamp (2in. long and costing under £1) with the following word-

If not delivered please return to P. B. Lindley, 13 The Jinnings, Welwyn Garden City, Herts.

Although I have to pay the return postage at least I know who has moved and can contact alternative persons if necessary.

THE County Championships has risen Dorset, Gloucestershire, Somerset, to establish itself as the premier Wiltshire. to establish itself as the premier table tennis competition in England, and there is no doubt that competitive play based on county teams arouses more interest than any other type of domestic competition. Many county matches—and not only those in the premier division at that—attract a paying public, and I am sure it is the ambition of every good class the ambition of every good class player to be chosen for the county team. The County Championships have probably reached saturation point by now, and generally speaking counties will not enter more than two senior teams.

Yet I feel there is room for still Yet I feel there is room for still more inter-county play, and so I would like to air the possibility of starting a knockout cup competition for county teams. I would suggest this be regional in its initial stages, and the natural thing to do would be to base it on the Sports Council regions, except that Yorkshire and North-East would be combined, as otherwise Yorkshire have nobody to play against, being a region of its play against, being a region of its own. This leaves us with a convenient eight regional zones.

Considering the congestion in the table tennis calendar, I would envisage zone play-off matches in the off-season. Unofficial experiments have proved to me that there is a definite demand for summer table

Some star players are not available in the summer as they have coaching engagements, and also holidays can interfere. But I think this is an advantage rather than a handicap, because it will encourage counties to try out new blood, perhaps field some younger players—in fact, what one would like to encourage is that the stronger counties, while trying to win, field teams attuned to the type of opposition that is encountered.

Counties could be left to arrange their summer matches in each region according to very simple rules, pro-vided only that a regional winner must emerge before the start of the

Then I would suggest that the eight counties who have won their region play a knockout competition on the Thursday preceding the English Closed Championships to establish the cup-winning county. Assuming all the 35 counties in the E.T.T.A. take part, this would be the regional line up


