

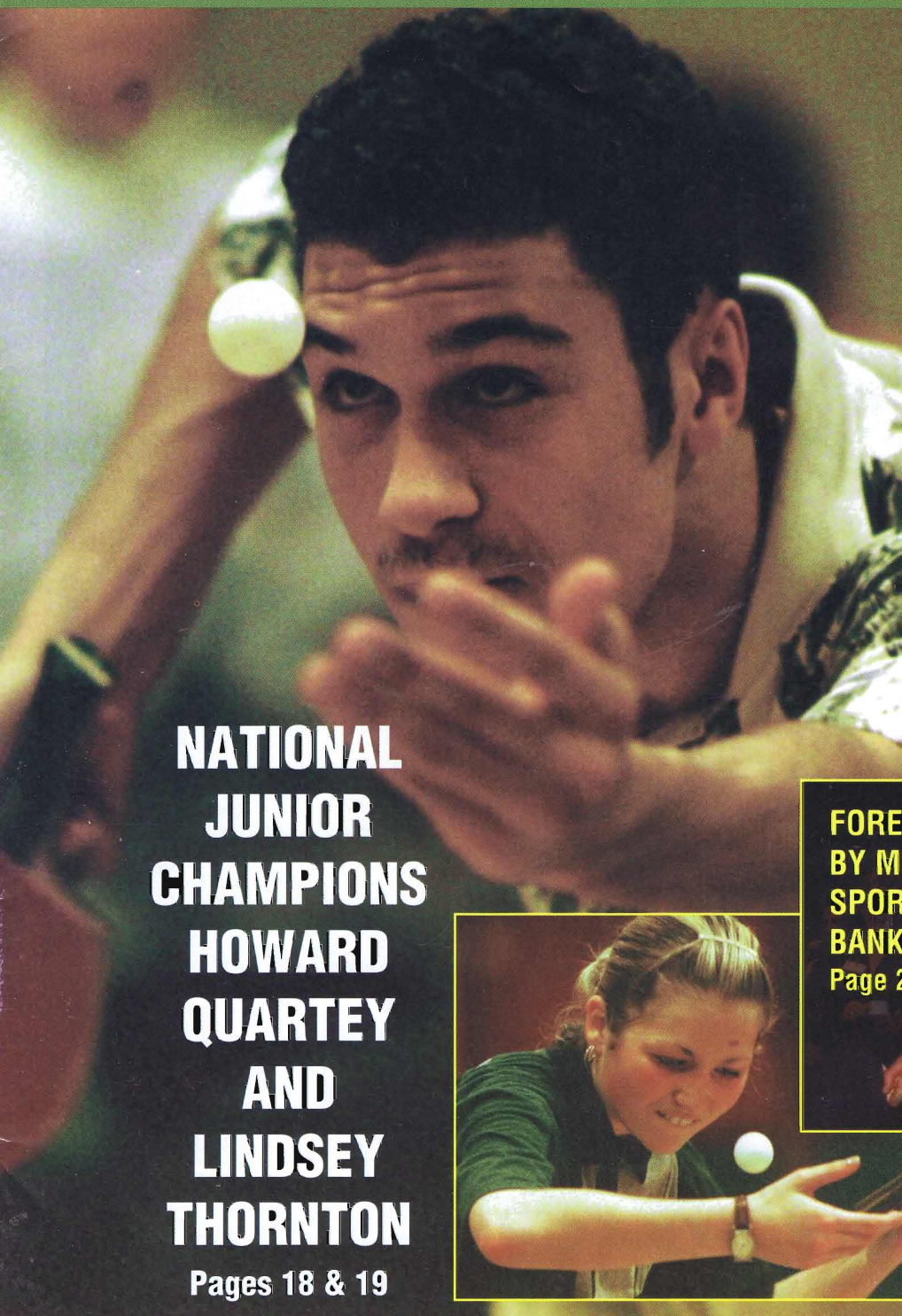

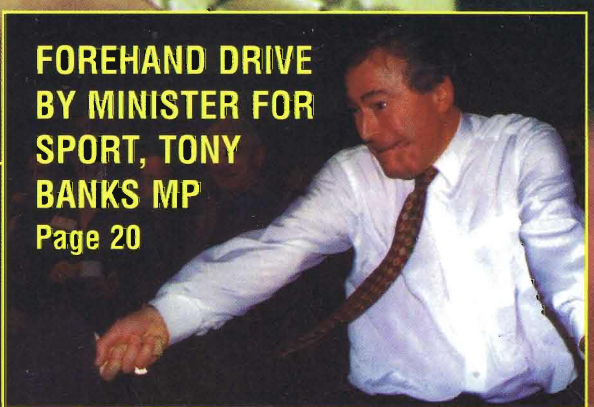

# SYED ON SONG

On the strength of his performance during the first four months of this season, Matthew Syed has significantly improved his stature in international table tennis. For England in the Joola European League Matthew has achieved a 100% record to date with 4 wins from 4 matches including two victories against Russia, one against the Czech Republic and one against Denmark. In open tournaments Matthew reached the quarter-final of the prestigious Swedish Open by defeating two of Europe's leading players, the man in form, Zoran Primorac of Croatia, and Swedish favourite, Peter Karlsson. Matthew was beaten in the quarter-finals by the famous Chinese player Ma Wenge. A few days later in the French Open Matthew beat the rising Japanese star, Toshio Tasaki, with the Asian penholder style player being unable to penetrate his outstanding defensive skills. Matthew lost in the last 16 to the reigning European Masters Champion, Jorg Rosskopf of Germany.

Matthew is playing for Bordeaux in the French League and to date has won 10 out of 11 matches, including wins over Damien Eloi, Nicholas Chatelain and China's Liu Guozheng. On the domestic scene Matthew won the Eastern Open Grand Prix event at Kings Lynn and is currently both the English and Commonwealth Champion. As a result of his excellent performances, Matthew has climbed eight places up the latest World ranking list to No.33. Given a good draw on his current form, Matthew must be a contender for the European title in Eindhoven in April.

England on home territory will be the second leg of the vital Joola European League Division 1 semi-final against Greece which is being played on Saturday 17th January at the Potters Leisure Resort, Hopton-on-Sea, Norfolk, commencing at 7.00 pm. Potters is a leisure resort on the East Anglia coast which specialises in providing holidays and weekend breaks for sports enthusiasts. We hope and expect that this will be the first of many events that the ETTA will promote with

sponsorship from the resort. The Greek team is likely to include the dynamic former Rumanian, Kalin Kreanga.

In the Super Division of the Joola European Women's League the England team produced one of their best performances to defeat a much improved Italian team at Cirencester on 10th December. The vital victory for England was Lisa Lomas' win against Alessia Arisi with the score very evenly poised at two-all after the doubles. After all the injuries that Lisa has suffered over the last couple of years it was nice to see her back in such good form. Andrea Holt joined Lisa in winning two matches for England from the No.3 position. England play the second leg of the fixture in Italy next month and if they can produce the same form then our position in the Super division should be secure.

Their presentation entitled "Investing in Grass Roots Participation for the Development of Excellence" gave the Association an opportunity to explain details of our current programmes, in particular the BT Top Sport, Top Club and the Woolwich Junior Leagues. The seminar was attended by 200 delegates from the Sports Council, Youth Sport Trust and a large number of local authorities throughout the country. Later that evening the ETTA and Woolwich Plc received the Sportsmatch Special Award for 1997 for successful sponsorship programme in the youth category. The award was presented by Tony Banks the Minister for Sport. The reception was held at Wembley Stadium to mark the 5th Anniversary of Sportsmatch which encourages sponsorship of grass roots sport by matching the sponsors money £ for £. Jane Adams attended the presentation on behalf of the Woolwich Building Society.

A day later table tennis completed a hat trick at the CCPR's National Conference entitled "Who Governs Sport" when the Association was given the opportunity of providing the setting for an Association which involved Tony Banks playing table tennis against the Robot. Diccon Gray ran a series of competitions for delegates as they were arriving at the Conference with all funds raised being donated to the British Sport Trust.

The above, together with the recent Barclaycard National Awards won by the Eastern and the North West Regions, indicate how highly our recent table tennis programmes are regarded in government, Sports Council and in local authority circles. Well done team!

## BUSY YEAR

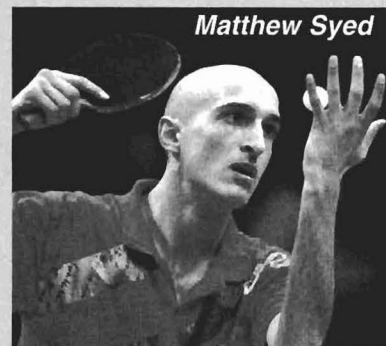
1997 has been a very busy and heavy year for English table tennis. Much has been achieved and the ground-work laid for more exciting development programmes which are capable of producing massive improvements in both the standard and participation in table tennis into the next Millennium. We have seen the World Championships in Manchester which were the largest ever staged with significantly more than 100 countries participating and the widest and best television coverage ever provided for a table tennis event anywhere in the world. In the same year we have been awarded £1.28 m for our World Class Performance programme which is already showing a significant improvement in some of our players. At the other end of the scale several new first class facilities have been built and opened by local clubs and associations, and with the BT Top Sport programme table tennis is being played in more schools than any other time in the history of the sport. # FRENCH OPEN

**MATTHEW SYED is the world's most spectacular defender - of that fact there is no doubt. If there are other players around capable of returning balls lethally backspin from positions so far from the table, I have yet to see them, writes John Woodford in Lyons.**



At the French Open at the Palais de Sport in Lyons, December 4-7, the Richmond-based Balliol graduate put on a show of world-class attack and defence with Jorg Rosskopf that I would not have minded travelling 2,000 miles to see instead of the actual distance to Lyons from England of over 500 miles.

The Syed-Rosskopf clash in Round 5 was on the day when the crowd was at its peak - around 5,000 - they stamped and cheered standing at the end as the poker-faced German champion threw himself into the battle; left-handed drives of immense power streaming into both corners of the huge court with the English champion scraping balls off the floor, but Syed was defeated 14, -14, 16, 18. The crowd appeared to want nothing more than the defeat of Rosskopf - he eventually as the No.1. seed, was brought down in the quarters by the lean and lanky Wang Liqin of China at 20 in the fourth.

Earlier, in Round 2, Syed was involved in yet another stunning battle - he defeated the polished, dynamic Japanese attacker Toshio Tasaki 16, 12, -15, 17. Syed in this match, on two occasions, admitted to edge balls against him unseen by the court officials, both of whom obviously need new spectacles.

There were several players who played above themselves - Kreanga was fortunate to get to the semis, Allan Bentsen had his best ever tournament getting to the quarters and Danny Heister really excelled by reaching the men's singles final. For the French, having Gatién injured and Chila not currently at his best, it was left to Christophe Legout to win it, and win it he did, in great style beating Heister in the final -19, 19, 20, 19.

England had a squad of ten players in Lyons plus two who paid their own way.

## RANKING PROBLEMS

What was witnessed at the first of the County Championships days involving Division 1A was very serious indeed and will only encourage more players NOT to compete. The creditability of our Ranking System and the game of table tennis has been jeopardised.

Dale Barham a skillful player I admire and who is a high ranked cadet and junior with a promising future was selected for his county, Huntingdonshire. He pulled out of the team at 4 p.m. the previous day to the event leaving it impossible for a replacement to be found as another event in the County was taking place.

He then had the audacity to turn up at the event uninjured and practiced several times during the day, in full view of everyone, with Andrew Rushton. When our County and others approached Ken Elliot, the Official Referee of the day, we were told that Dale Barham had just started playing with glue and that his coach did not want him to play - why?

This was all done in full view of the National Junior Coach Jia Yi Liu who is in charge of the Junior Boys and Carol Moore Chairperson for the Selectors.

Barry Shannon who was running the Hunts team has my sympathy as do the other members of the Hunts team who had to play all day with a player short. This will cost Hunts £40 for missed games funds which Hunts can ill afford to lose. I only hope that the parents are made to pay as they were there and condoned all that happened.

This is not the first time that players have pulled out of tournaments etc. and has been bought about by our Ranking system, of losing points for lost games.

The Ranking Committee must listen to players, junior and senior, and their coaches as they do not want the loss of points system. It is being imposed on them and encouraging players like Dale Barham to pull out of events to protect their points.

Something must be done to stop this behaviour as all the hard work done by coaches will start to be eroded and players will stop playing.

The Ranking Committee have already reduced the amount of points that players can lose so they know there is a problem.

All some players achieve is the glory of playing for their County and are proud of their achievement why should top players be allowed to 'play' the system at the expense of the lower players when the system is wrong.

## CALENDAR CHANGES

In July/August having received the final Calendar draft and my copy of the ETTA Diary I sit down with my colleagues at county, local league and club level to plan for the coming season. In the past this planning has resulted in a good balance between local and national events providing a full and generally harmonious season.

Suddenly we find ourselves in conflict on a regular basis as the calendar is changed frequently with no apparent thought given to the effect on

local organisers.

The first bombshell was the move to January of the second session of the Woolwich Junior British League. Then the Kent Junior 3 Star was advanced by a month to clash with with Woolwich Junior National League, The Leach Cup and Carter Cup. The VETTS Western date has changed as have the National Team finals and the National under 10/11/12 championships.

I now hear that the Essex Junior 3 Star will not take place as scheduled.

Moving the National Team Events to weekend dates seems a very good idea in theory but this adds to the congestion of an already full calendar.

I have no wish to sound totally negative and will readily admit that I can suggest no answer to solve the problem. However I feel we must give more thought

to local organisers without whom our sport would struggle to survive.

At Cippenham we entered a team in the Premier Division of the Woolwich Junior British League and with Gareth Herbert spearheading our challenge, felt we had a good chance of winning or of at least finishing 'In the Money'. A few weeks before the first weekend we found that Gareth had been selected to represent England at Senior level in Austria. Whilst I have no wish to stunt Gareth's progress and realise that European experience is essential for him, I feel that with a major national tournament due to take place in this country, the selectors could have given some thought to the local organisers and on this occasion selected a non-junior younger player.

Finally may I offer for sale a diary slightly soiled, one careful owner - going cheap (the diary not the owner).

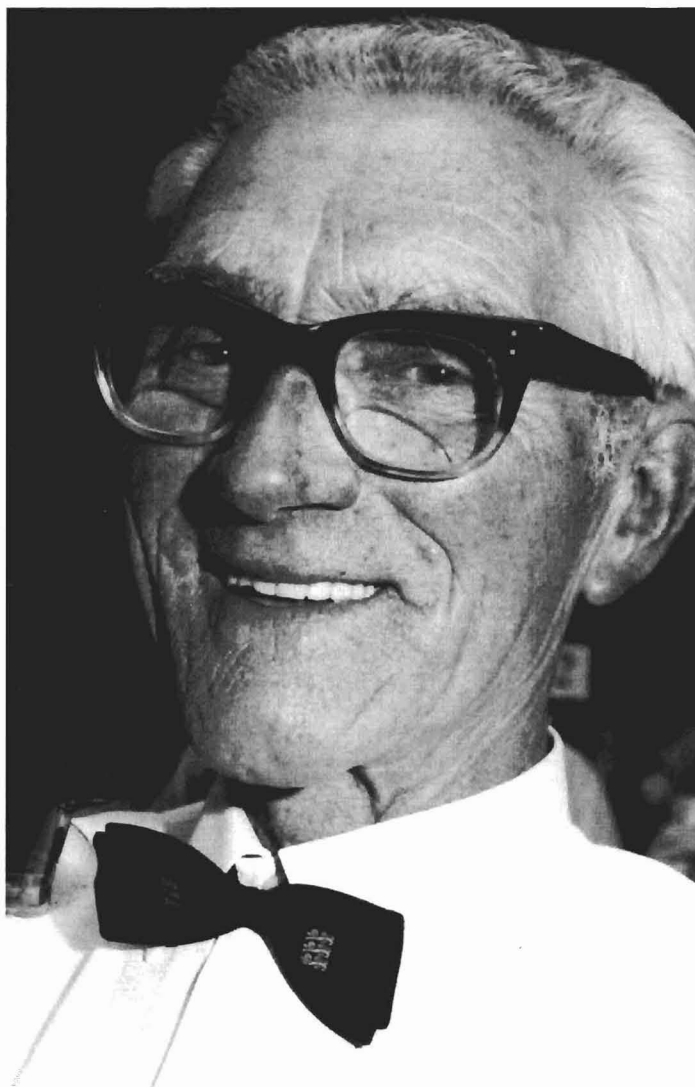
# KEITH WATTS - AN APPRECIATION

**KEITH WATTS**  
 16th July 1913 to  
 12th November  
 1997

Integrity, probity, rectitude, reliability - these are the words which come to mind when considering Keith's contribution to the work of the ETTA, and doubtless other activities in which he was involved.

He had a skill with words and an ability to see the core of a drafting problem which made his membership of the Rules Committee invaluable; in the debating chamber of National Council he was the one who let members know what was the right thing to do; he was the enemy of expediency; he reminded his listeners that the right course was the one to follow, not the one which was easier, or more convenient, or more popular, if that was not the right one. Keith was in his 34th year as a member of Rules Committee, for 25 of which he bore the responsibilities of committee chairmanship, with distinction. "What does the constitution require us to do? Ask Keith."

Rules Committee meetings were not the dry-as-dust affairs which some might have imagined. The cross-fire was often entertaining, particularly between Keith and the late lamented Mike Greatrex. During the years we were on the committee together the excuse of table tennis justified a regular and fruitful correspondence which will be sorely missed. The work was covered, but



space was usually found for that something extra.

Keith was greatly interested in meeting procedure, and because what is correct is so often a matter of opinion, or at best custom, rather than law, there was talk over the years of producing a "little book" to contain hints and views, customs and advice on this subject; unfortunately it got no further than a file into which were put notes and jottings. This interest made him an ideal person to be a member

of the Standing Orders Committee, and when in 1965 this body began to be appointed by the A.G.M. (instead of by the National Executive Committee or the Rules Committee or National Council, as it had been for the first 4 years of its existence) Keith became a member and, re-elected every 3 years, remained one until his death. Numerous chairmen benefited from his unwavering advice.

Keith became Sussex's first National Councillor when the

National Council came into existence in 1964/5, and after only one year was elected by his colleagues to serve as one of four on the pre-Departmental style Management Committee. He served until 1976/7, one year before constitutional changes saw the introduction of a Management Committee consisting of Vice-Chairmen in charge of Departments.

Keith believed, or said he did, that all things mechanical were made to go wrong as soon as he tried to operate them, and certainly he would not admit to understanding them. This was Watts' Third Law (do not ask me what the first two were). It cannot have operated all the time as he learned to drive late in life and drove many miles, to see the countryside and buildings of England which he so much enjoyed, as well as on duty runs to meetings and other events.

Keith is survived by two sons, Derek and Paul. He was proud of his grandchildren. His wife Gladys, whom we remember with great affection, died some years before him.

All who knew him will miss him, some of us greatly more than others.

## A TALENTED ATTACKER

Keith Watts was a remarkable person - in the best sense of the word. He was strong, courageous, often controversial or even provocative - but always

honest and straight-forward.

I was not really contemporary with his activities in his early years. My first recollection of him was as a very fine attacking player. I recall that in the early 1930's, when I was still in short trousers, my parents' club had moved premises to the ballroom of the Alexandra Hotel on the sea front at St. Leonards-on-Sea. They had the bright idea of having an official opening, with the young mayoress present to see an exhibition of table tennis. The players involved were Tommy Spencer, later to be a Kent county cricketer and then a first class cricket umpire (a spectacular defender) and Keith Watts the talented attacker. It was a great success with Tommy treading on the feet of the spectators, endeavouring to return the sustained Watts' attack. They were often rivals in competition with Keith doing very well, and I recall his receiving the Hastings Closed Championships Men's Singles Cup from the hands of my mother on several occasions. At the height of his form he was the strongest player in Sussex, and must have been close to international standard. In those days there was not the modern yardstick to measure talent, and one needed to be well known in the main table tennis centres to receive international selection. Then at about the age of 21 his health failed. He contracted TB and one lung had to be collapsed. All active sport was forbidden. This also finished his football career in which he was a fearless goalkeeper in local league matches.

In the decades that followed he had several relapses in health, and had periods in hospital. I remember telephoning to his wife, Gladys, on these occasions,

and she advised against visits as she feared the worst. However he was courageous and kept fighting - and succeeded.

His efforts passed to table tennis administration and he was always a stickler for the rules. His motto was that if a rule was there it had to be observed. If the rule was bad - take steps to change it! I found that at local level his strict attitude was inappropriate on occasions. If a team was one player short he would favour fining the absentee, as the opposition were deprived of some of their games. But sometimes the absence was not the player's fault - perhaps he had not been informed!

His undoubted administrative talents saw him appointed, with myself, as Hastings TTA delegates to the Sussex County TTA. I recall that when a subject came up for discussion and decision that was not on the agenda - thus we had no briefing as to how to vote - we each expressed our personal views, and then voted, one 'for' and the other 'against' the proposition! This was not the only occasion that we differed, but we always respected the other's opinion and integrity. Keith progressed to be Sussex County TTA Chairman and then President. Some found him to be a pessimist but they soon found that he was a realist, as he insisted that the true facts must be faced. His work here was valuable to the extreme, and he also served on several ETTA committees with great credit and was elected an Honorary Life Member of the ETTA.

In his professional life he was employed in the Borough Treasurer's Department of the Hastings Corporation, and rose to a position of high responsibility, being in charge

of the overnight investment of Corporation funds on the Money Markets.

We shared a love of classical music which arose from his listening to my car radio as we returned from Sussex TTA meetings on Sunday evenings. He greatly enjoyed the 'Your Hundred Best Tunes' programmes introduced by Alan Keith. He mentioned this in recent correspondence. He was present at the Sussex Open finals at Hastings on October 12th last, and was still resilient despite being alone, having lost his wife several years earlier.

We shall miss him - a great talker and a great character.

## A LEGEND

Keith would have been proud of the Memorial Service organised by his two sons Derek and Paul at the United Reformed Church, on November 20, attended by around 120 people.

In between two extracts from the world of opera - Bizet's duet from "The Pearl Fishers" at the start and ending with the magnificent "Nessan Dorma" aria from Puccini's Turandot, sung by Rose Carreras, we learned that Keith was a legend both in his home town of Hastings, where he worked for many years in the Borough Treasurer's department and of course, in table tennis.

The tribute for our sport was given by Tony Chatwin. The ETTA Deputy Chairman said "He was a man with an extraordinary flair for organisation, an acknowledged expert on rules and a man who had so many other interests. At times he was controversial, but he was of the highest possible integrity - we have lost a true friend".

Choosing just a few facts

from a huge list of Keith's appointments and milestones - he was the original organiser of the Sussex Open in 1933 - still marching on 64 years later he was the chairman of Sussex from 1977-1987 when he was made a Life Member; in 1972 he was made an Honorary Life Member of the ETTA.

Some people were aware, many were not, that at the age of 21 he contracted pneumonia and TB and was not expected to live. He lost a lung, but with his great courage he lived on for another 63 years. Throughout his life he came through a huge range of medical problems and the death of his beloved wife six years ago.

After her death, he still carried on with his interests, opera, The National Trust, letter-writing and contacts abroad. He was the sole surviving member of the original committee of the annual multi-sporting exchange visits between Hastings and Dordrecht, Holland that have lasted 40 years.

He was also involved in exchange visits for table tennis between Hastings and Caen in France - The Caen TTA sent a representative to the Memorial Service.

Amongst the table tennis people who attended were, in addition to Tony Chatwin, Mike Smith (Vice-Chairman administration) who came originally from Hastings, the general secretary Rob Sinclair, Colin Clemett representing the ITTF, Mr Bill Goldfinch (new President Sussex TTA), the Sussex TTA chairman Keith Jackson, Peter Wales and Mrs Pat Wales, Mr Ron Spencer (Hastings TTA Chair) and Mr Colin Hyland. Also there were Mr Roy Stevens and members of the ETTA office staff.

# PURE CLASS PREAN & OWOLABI



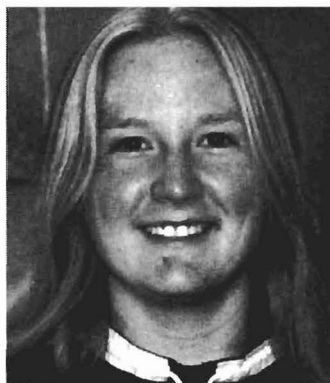

The new look National Team Competition got underway on Saturday 29th November when the holders of both the Wilmott Cup (Crawley/Horsham) and the Rose Bowl (Wolverhampton) were made to fight hard to qualify for the 2nd stage, writes Mike Johns.

## WILMOTT CUP

The lesson learnt so far from the consortia approach is that local table tennis must get its act together in each district authority area and work closely with the council, or it will be left out - no question!

Also in Newcastle, Peter McQueen has set up a new Newcastle's Schools Woolwich Junior League at Blakelaw Comprehensive School.

## WORLD VETERANS CHAMPIONSHIPS MANCHESTER 1998

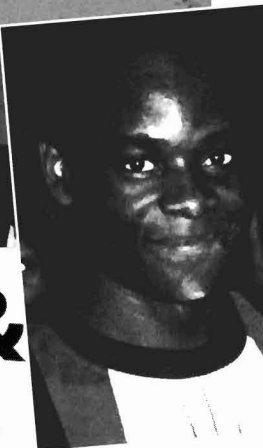

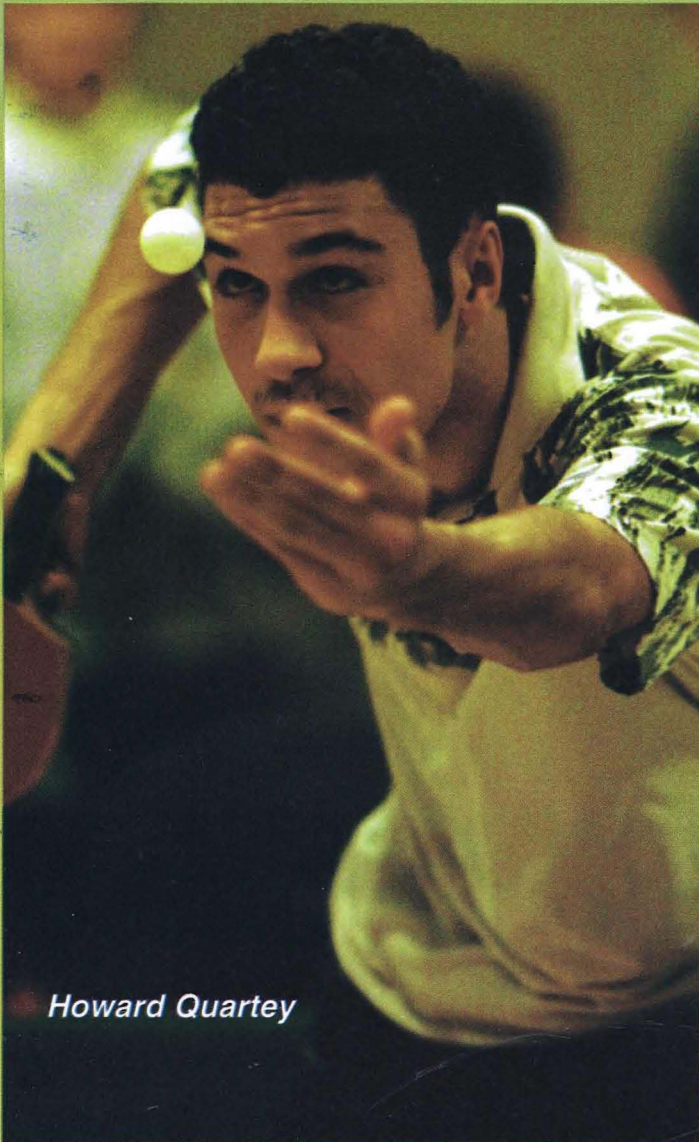

Louise Durrant played magnificently to win this year's Cadet Girl's crown. With powerful forehand drives she beat Katy Parker 14,-19, 10.

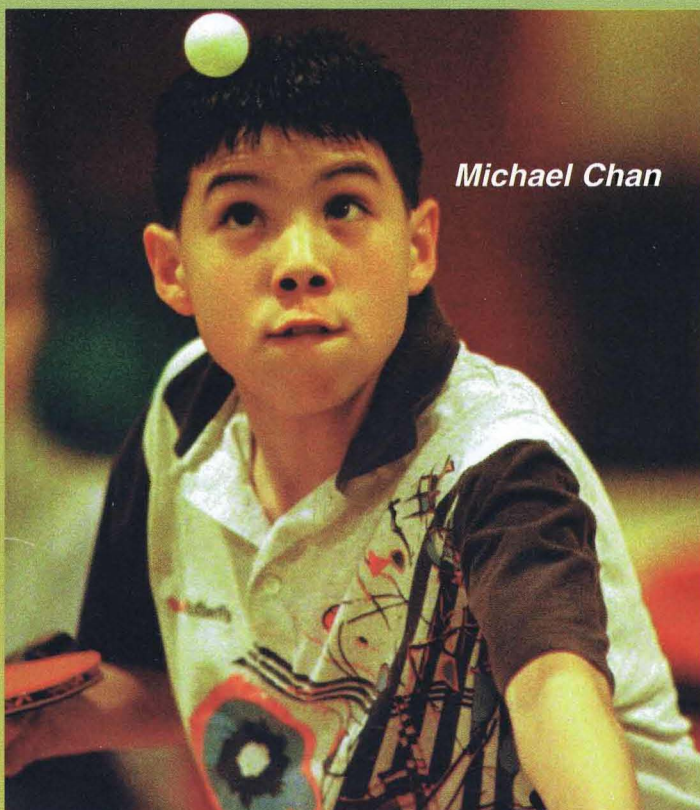

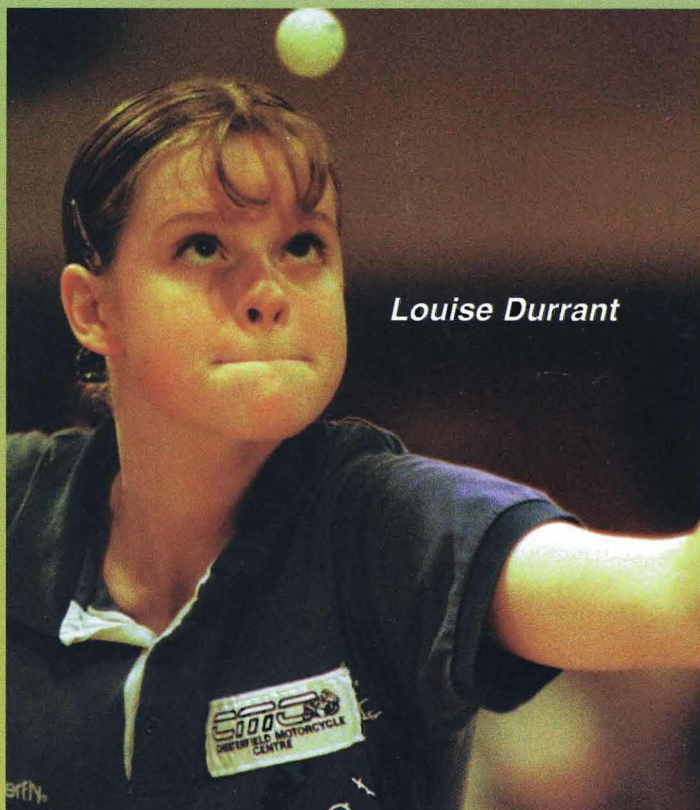

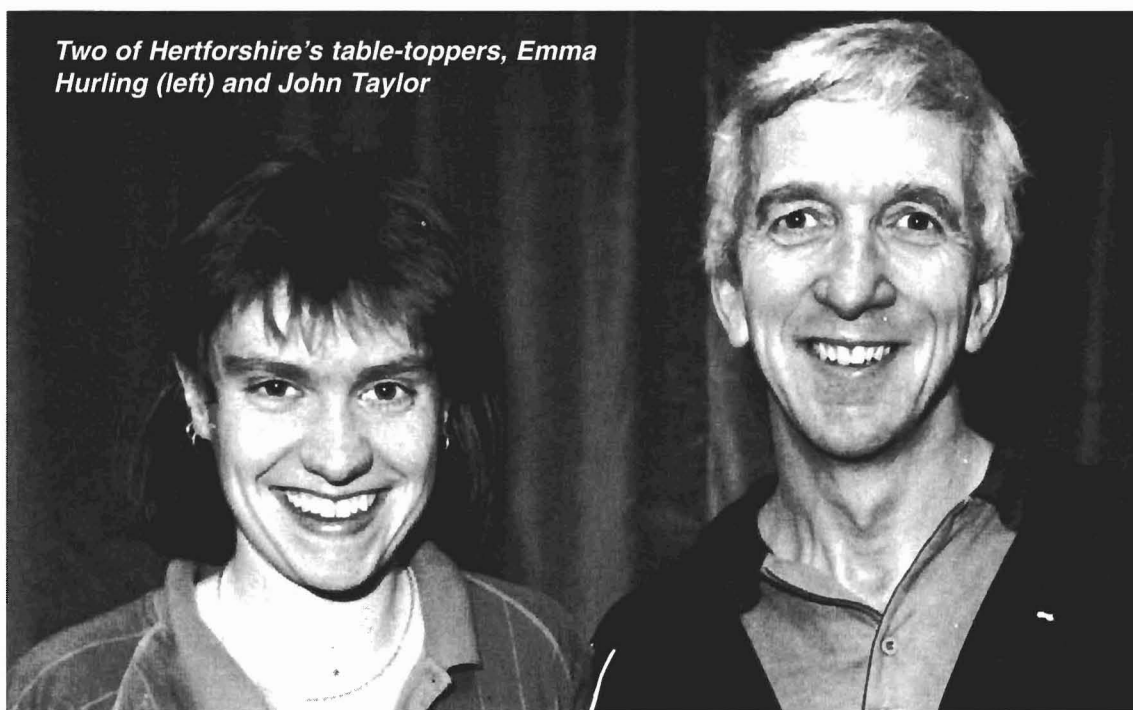


# YORKSHIRE *on* TOP

The reason I am told was that the player had recently changed the type of glue he used and his Coach felt that there was a possibility of losing matches and so affecting the Player's ranking position. Or do we need to look closely at a ranking system which seems to suggest, at least to the Coach concerned, that it is better not to play and conserve the status quo. I only hope the rank and file league players of Huntingdonshire will be sympathetic and understand why their affiliation fees are needed to pay the fines that this incident will undoubtedly attract.

Whilst I am on my soap-box my other pet gripe is Counties not providing qualified Umpires for their home matches. This is particularly the case when Divisions play over two weekends, but the fact of the

Down from 51 teams to 47 (not 48 as I reported) we said good-bye at last to our fifth division and are now down to four, the same number as when I first entered the scene in the 60's. Gradually we built up to 7 divisions and the years immediately after the Worlds in 1977 produced our high point in membership terms. We have a certain amount of "natural wastage" as the equivalent of a couple of teams, sometimes more, leave the Island for higher Education and seldom return, which is something that happens every year. For all that, the trend is disappointing. We certainly welcome the idea of a national membership committee, although this is not new. In my view, the deeper problems will be outside their powers. The "image" of our sport has become blurred to a point of invisibility because of rare and limited press coverage and particularly the near-loss of BBC Television. If youngsters don't know about us, how are they to take up the sport? The impact of the recent Manchester World Championships was a huge disappointment for us after such high hopes.

Our youngsters, Lucy Pointer and Deane Whittington had moderate Regional Trials and so did not get through to the National Trials, although Lucy's failure was only in the Juniors. In the Cadets she achieved automatic qualification. The higher ranking points are proving elusive despite good results for the Hampshire County Juniors. Lucy has recently been to a couple of England Junior training camps, which may bring a break-through in performance and confidence. She must hope for a cadet cap in the "Cadet 6 Nations" later in the season. More will be a bonus.

Deane had a wonderful "South of England Junior" event and, adding his excellent wins for the County juniors, he seems to have passed the magic 150 points total in a ranking period which qualifies him for re-ranking. Watch this space.

Carl Prean has been less fortunate in

terms of ranking points. His recent win in the "Clare Pengelly 5 Star", a Grand Prix event, after all, was worth exactly 7 points, one for each win, nothing for winning the tournament! It is a good thing he does not rely on ranking points for a living. Better luck in his recent international matches, where he chalked up decisive contributions against both Denmark and Russia, where, unlike Napoleon and Hitler, our players actually won in Moscow. Winning doubles in each match (with Alex Perry) made a big difference. Those wins, after an earlier disappointing start against the Czech Republic, put our team in with a real chance of promotion to the Superleague, if they can overcome Greece and then the winners of Yugoslavia vs the Czechs.

Alan Cooke (as temporary England captain and team manager) certainly did an excellent job. All reports indicate that team spirit is back to where it once was. Alan now rides off into the sunset to be replaced by Michel Gadad from Canada and France. He has all our best wishes, but I will be forgiven if I shed a tear or two for our own coaches who have been overlooked. After all, till 1994 we were winning team medals in Europe quite regularly on shoestring budgets. Now that the big lottery money is coming about, we seem to kiss our own people good-bye or relegate them to minor posts at some future date.

I recall many years ago (if my memory does not fail me) a quote from Chairman Alan Ransome that our national team was our greatest asset. I may have a conflicting interest in such judgements, but I, too, do not see how else we are to get the media and TV interest, the oxygen of publicity which will bring us the new members we so badly need as well as retaining the old ones who are thinking of calling it a day. At this time our best players are largely scattered all over Europe engaged in the hard task of making a living from their chosen sport. Thanks to the lottery money there is now a chance of a fresh start in our own country.

Our Cadets (Nathan Godolphin, Chris Hughes and Andrew Hookey) won their first two matches in the Hampshire Cadet Inter-Town competition. Leaving Lucy at home was probably not the greatest idea, but luck was on their side this time. Andrew is the son of Roger, 8 times Island Champion and he certainly made a good start. Nathan and Chris were excellent. The Juniors also won their first two matches, again not without difficulty. Lucy played in one of the boys' spots with James Ovnik and Deane Whittington in the others. I think the titles may be hard to win and the good past record offers no guarantees this time.

I noted that Harold Alberty will step down at the end of this season as General Secretary of Hampshire. Among so much else, he has always run these inter-Town days so well that on those grounds alone he will be a hard act to follow. Because he is so

efficient, few realise how much time he gives to the sport and how much work has to be done. A big thank you therefore to Harold - still in the hope of second thoughts which will keep him on board.

It was a day for the enthusiast, and with Richard Elliott and Gordon Shaw both falling into this category, it was not surprising that at the end of twelve hours cut and thrust they found themselves opposing each other in the premier final.

Elliott had progressed smoothly to the final without being troubled, but Shaw was twice extended, first by team-mate Andy Thomas, and then by Alan Ashberry in yet another expedite extravaganza.

Shaw started well in the final, his pinpoint defensive accuracy forcing Elliott into errors. Shaw took the first 21-10, but from then onwards Elliott's penetrating topspin forehand gave him complete control as he took both remaining ends 21-11, to take the title for the first time.

The women's final was a game of attack and counter attack and after a stirring contest, Helen Watts repeated her success of four years ago, simultaneously relegating Viv Smiley to the runners up berth for the third time in four seasons.

Consolation for Mrs. Smiley came in the women's doubles, in which she and Jenna Ashberry accounted for Muriel Cox, to take the title for the third time. Overall in the County the loss of teams seems to continue but at a noticeably slower pace than before. Still not having all league handbooks in we are approximately 4 teams down on last season. Our schools organiser has been unable to continue this season for personal reasons but we have a volunteer to take over and are now trying to catch up with the paper work to enable us to compete at least in the individuals, if not the team events.

All our 3 junior, 2 senior and 4 veterans teams have been in action and eventually I am informed of results to late to get in the local paper - as is the case with matches coming up. I then get calls to say we have tried 23 players what happens next?.
