




Straight Talk

By the time you read this article the English Open will have finished and I hope all those who attended will have seen some fantastic table tennis. Discussions are taking place to have the 66th English Open in early January 2011. In addition meetings are taking place with the ITTF and the London 2012 organising committee about the Olympic test event which will take place during November 2011 at ExCel, the Olympic venue for table tennis and a number of other sports. It will include both teams and singles, the actual format is being put together, with our input, by the ITTF as a "standard" for all trial events for the next Olympiad.

Table tennis players from Great Britain will take part in the singles and a team will participate. About 2,000 seats will be available for spectators at this trial event, which will be increased significantly for the actual event in 2012.

Some other information and updates for you:

Biannual Review with Sport England

The first review of the 2009-13 Whole Sport Plan (WSP) with Sport England will take place in early November. This will cover the approved Interventional Policies and the status of the outcomes under the areas of "Grow", Sustain" and "Excel". Two of the main areas within these outcomes will be based upon the "Activity Survey" and "Satisfaction Survey", as conducted by Sport England via Mori. Other areas being reviewed are: volunteers, coaching, technical officials, 16-18 drop outs, club development, PESSYP, governance and talent pool.

Within our Intervention 7, we included that the ETTA is one of the six national governing bodies selected by Sport England and the Government to be involved in the Social Media Project with "Facebook". The scheme is being piloted through British Universities and Colleges Sports (BUCS) and hopes to reach 12,000 students in a four-month period.

The main purpose of this whole process and the WSP is to ensure that our members at all levels are supported and helped, our membership and participation increases, and improvements are made in the communication channels to the table tennis fraternity.

European Championships in Germany

Reports from the event will be included in TTN and the following is a resume of the ETTU Congress and other meetings which took place, including the Congress, Finance meeting, Women's Group and ITTF Board of Directors from Europe with the ETTU Executive.

An application was made to the ETTU for assistance with a Women's Conference in 2010/11 and the Performance Manager attended a meeting with regard to coaching and the 2016/2020 Olympic programme. Paul Drinkhall and Kelly Sibley are members of the 2016 project and Tin-Tin Ho has been selected to be part of the 2020 project.

During the ETTU Congress, discussions took place on a proposition from three Scandinavian countries to have the European Championships changed from 2013, to having one year a team event and the following year an individual event. The Congress agreed that a working group be set up which has representation from all team divisions and proposals will be made at the Congress in 2010. I expressed my concerns during the Congress debate on this original proposal and have since written to the working party with my reasons.

I raised questions about the European Veterans Championships in Croatia this year, in which I participated with over 200 others from England, from an organization and playing perspective. Following a report from the Chairman of the ETTU Veterans Committee, the following was approved by the Congress:

- 1. Using the official ETTU computer program
- 2. Computer drawing of lots, not manual.
- During the selection of a future organising city, preference for cities which can ensure appropriate playing conditions under one roof or in one sport complex (walking distance between halls).
- Changes in doubles should be approved only in the case of verified absence of one of the players. Players should be warned in the application form.

CRB and Vetting and Barring

A detailed presentation was given at the October National Council meeting and many questions discussed on the subject including timescales and its operation Details will be circulated to Councilors' and others in the near future. This has been in the news many times recently and you can be assured that the ETTA, along with other sports NGB's are following this matter up with the Government to ensure that any possible impact on all the hard working volunteers and helpers in sports is factually published and meets the needs of sports, whilst protecting our children and vulnerable adults

Commonwealth Games 2010

Some of you may have read the reports in the press that the completion of the table tennis venue will miss the deadline of December 2009, namely the Yamuna Sports Complex, for the 2010 Commonwealth Games in New Delhi

The Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) are putting together an Independent Technical Review Panel of International Games experts to fast-track Delhi's preparations to host the 2010 Commonwealth Games, which I consider will help in this regard.



Planning continues with the Commonwealth Council for England and we have received confirmation from them in regard to our team size, which will be Men 5, Women 4, Coaches 2, Women's Wheelchair 2, Coach/ Carer 1, Team Manager 1

This is on the understanding that all players will meet the selection criteria.

British Table Tennis Federation (BTTF)

The BTTF Performance Management Group meet every quarter and report to the BTTF Board on all matters relating to performance, finance and Mission 2012. A number of meetings have taken place with UK Sport, English Institute of Sport and the British Olympic Association to discuss aspects relating to the programme. Close links have been established with the BTTAD

at both management and performance levels which has resulted in cost savings for both the BTTF and BTTAD. I thank the Management of the BTTAD for their support in the "integration" of table tennis, which aligns to UK Sport and the ITTF.

Team 2012 was launched recently at the London 2012 Olympic stadium, with leading payment system Visa announced as its partner. It represents a huge new ambition for British sport, and is the largest national team ever sponsored, comprising of approximately 1,200 athletes from 47 sports and disciplines, Olympic and Paralympic alike.

Team 2012 will help realise the dreams and ambitions of all of Britain's Olympic and Paralympic athletes and is a groundbreaking partnership between the British Olympic and Paralympic Associations (BOA and BPA), the London Organising Committee for the Olympic and Paralympic Games (LOCOG), and UK Sport. The four bodies came together earlier this year to create this initiative for Olympic and Paralympic sponsors to get behind the nation's top athletes aiming for London 2012 and beyond.

I hope your season is going well and look forward to seeing you on my travels. I am happy to meet with you, your members and committees to discuss table tennis, so please get in touch if you want to set up a meeting.

I was wondering what you think about some of my opinions re applause, bands etc? I think the big reason for difference is not culture in fan sense but in who watches TT events from England, I think we tend to have many coaches and players watching and very few pure fans, that is people who support TT (but don't play seriously, just watch) out of general support for names and or as a less knowledgeable fan type support. I wouldn't want to have a thousand clapping seals or a "lower level football crowd" mentality in the audience, but I think that is the difference. It's the same with speedway, similar to ice hockey support, even though the fans are quite knowledgeable, they still shout and have massive air horns and whistles and go nuts in support for their team and top individuals.

Thing is we may get it on tv more if it was more of a spectacle, instead of being so quiet. Most table tennis spectators seem more interested in the finer points so are concentrating too hard and taking it too seriously. Even so I can do both, so why don't more people? A few years back I all but got into trouble with people for going nuts with louder support, trying to liven it up after having been to the 1985 Worlds. Once when England was playing Russia

at Brentwood I clapped loudly and went "Yoh oooo" for a good point and the bloke behind taps me on the shoulder and says "If you don't mind we are trying to enjoy the match "Imagine somebody doing that to Gatien's dad with his trumpet or the Chinese fans when there are enough of them. They even have a cheerleader leading the chants! Another very amusing one was at a Grove School tournament (lan Marshall run), a lad I was coaching was playing a much better lad in another event after being hammered by him earlier and he was holding his own and they had a good rally, with my lad winning a point with some good lobs against vicious smashes, so I leap in the air and go "Yoh, wicked rally!" and a bloke standing near says (completely seriously, no joke) sympathetically "We all forget ourselves at times." What's the forget ourselves bit, I enjoyed it! Why not give them the applause they deserved, especially my lad as underdog.

So, if all our fans were quiet like football fans, rugby, cricket, etc, I could figure it out more, but why the vast difference in TT spectators? Not only that, but actively objecting to people who want to applaud louder!







With \$172,000 on offer in prize money, along with the prestige of being the birth place of the ITTF Pro Tour, the best players in the world have descended on Sheffield for "The Wimbledon of the table tennis world".

Nednesday

The first day's play ran predominately to form, with the higher ranked players making good use of their international experience.

Not one to be put off by a challenge, England junior number 2, Liam Pitchford, put in an outstanding performance to buck the trend and shine through as the player of the day. Ranked internationally at 560th, Liam faced a tall order when he came up against the Argentine player Liu Song (ranked 89th), in the men's qualifying groups. The Derbyshire player dug deep and made the best use of the home support to play some truly inspiring table tennis, toppling his significantly higher ranked opponent 4-3.


The other notable England performances, where the home couradvantage flipped the ranking list on its head, was Tim Yarnall's excellent six game win over Eric Berner of Norway in the seniormen's, and in the Under 21s Chris Doran scored a fine five gamwin, disposing of the considerably higher ranked Johan Sondell Sweden.

English success wasn't all male dominated, as Emma Vickers wa victorious with a four game win against Divya Deshpande (India) in the Under 21's. Emma almost stole the show a second time, displaying great resilience when she came up against the backsp of Alena Dubkova, holding the Belarusian all the way to the fifth end, unfortunately succumbing 4-3 in the end.

Thursda

Day two of the English Open saw more qualifying action, although with the majority of English matches being played yesterday, the pressure was on a select few.

Liam Pitchford again despatched a higher-rated opponent, this time it was in the Under 21 singles when he faced Patrick Franciska (Germany), ranked no. 383 in the world. The German was no match for the inform Chesterfield 16 year-old, who was a well deserved 3-1 winner, ensuring qualification for the main competition.

Regularly competing on the English national scene, Gavin Rumgay (Scotland) from just north of the border is always a crowd favourite and was adopted by the home fans, as well as having a few Scots "shipped" down especially! He had to bridge a 145 place difference in the world rankings when he faced Emmanuel Lebesson of France. It looked promising after winning the first game, however he faltered in the second and couldn't quite push the Frenchman all the way, losing the third and fourth. A resilient fight back to take the fifth game wasn't quite enough, as Lebesson denied Rumgay any further progression in the tournament by winning the sixth and final game.

England no. tive Hannah Hicks dismissed the 326 places between her and her higher ranked opponent to take a well earned victory over her Indian counterpart Neha Agg. This game was, however not without its drama: having fought all the way to 13-11 wins in the first and third games, it was looking as if all that effort had







Goaching Certificate

Developed with the aim of improving the level of coaching across sport in the UK and born out of the government Coaching Task Force report in 2002, the UKCC is now offered by over 20 sports against these criteria.

- Advance coach education programmes and practices with a view to helping coaches support the participants, performers and teams they are coaching
- Support the development of coaching as a profession
- Support the concept of continuous improvement and further develop good practice in existing programmes

By creating a recognised standard for coach education, the UKCC will make it easier to identify a quality coach in any sport at any level and contribute immeasurably to the professionalisation of coaching, whilst ensuring that all coaching takes place within a safe environment.

As a part of this process, coaches who qualified through the ETTA (or other home country) system will be required to transfer to the UKCC system by 2012. This involves attending a bridging course (see 'Overview of the Qualifications') and assessment to gain a UKCC qualification.

Overview of the Qualifications

This article will only cover Levels 1 to 3 of the qualification; Level 4 will be covered in a separate article.

For all of the qualifications, it is a pre-requisite for certification that candidates must have completed a sports coach UK 'Safeguarding and Protecting Children' workshop (3 hours) and a St John Ambulance Emergency Life Support (Adult or 'All Ages') course (3 or 4 hours), or appropriate equivalents.

1st4sport Level 1 Certificate in Coaching Table Tennis (L1CCTT)

Successful candidates will be qualified to plan and deliver basic table tennis coaching activities, normally under the direct supervision of a more qualified coach. The course consists of two days, separated by a period of 3 to 6 weeks for home study and coaching practice. There is also approximately 3 hours of precourse study.

An assessment is included in the second day of the course, which consists of a 40 minute written exam and delivery of a 15 minute coaching session to a group of up to 4 players. At Level 1 the coaching group will be made up of your peers on the course.

Candidates must be 16 years of age or over to achieve certification.

The course structure is as follows:

1st4sport Level 2 Certificate in Coaching Table Tennis (L2CCTT)

The Level 2 qualification builds on the planning and evaluation skills learnt at Level 1, and involves a more advanced level of technical knowledge. At this level, coaches would be expected to demonstrate more of an ability to analyse and improve the performance of their players.

Candidates must be 18 years of age or over to achieve certification.

The course is organised as two weekends, separated by a home study period of 6-8 weeks as follows:

1st4sport Level 2 Certificate in Coaching Table Tennis (L2CCTT) - Bridging Course

As stated earlier, the L2CCTT bridging course is aimed at coaches who qualified through the ETTA system prior to the UKCC, and provides a route for them to gain either a L2CCTT qualification, or to gain entry to the L3CCTT course.

The course content includes those areas of the L2CCTT syllabus not already covered by the old ETTA courses, and is structured as two days separated by a period of 6-8 weeks for home study and coaching practice, structured as follows:

1st4sport Level 3 Certificate in Coaching Table Tennis (L3CCTT)

At this level, candidates will gain the skills and knowledge to plan and implement effective annual coaching programmes, applying the principles of player profiling and goal setting.

Candidates are required to be at least 18 years of age to achieve certification, they are also required to hold a 1st4sport Level Certificate in Coaching Table Tennis or an ETTA Level 3 (or home country equivalent) and attend an L2CCTT bridging course.

In addition to the above requirements, candidates are recommended to have experience of coaching table tennis players on a regular basis and to have access to players of the appropriate level to coach (defined by the Level 3 Technical Syllabus). The ETTA will consider applications from candidates who are actively coaching at the appropriate level and have shown commitment to the sport.

The L3CCTT course is delivered in five phases:

- 1. 4 day residential course (option to attend non-res).
- 2. 6-8 weeks home study.
- 3. 2 day residential course (option to attend non-res).
- 4. 12-16 weeks home study and coaching practice.
- 5. 2 day residential (option to attend non-res).

Because there are various specialists involved in the delivery of the Level 3 course, the order of the programme is likely to vary, however a typical programme would be as follows:







Talk to anyone who followed British table tennis during the golden post-war era of the 1970s and they will instantly recall an assortment of wonderful memories.

From the crowd-pleasing antics of Chester Barnes to the domestic dominance of both Denis Neale and Desmond Douglas, it was a time when table tennis players from this country commanded a national profile and also caused ripples on the world stage. Yet speak to those who regularly packed out venues such as the Brighton Dome to watch their idols in action, and, even now, they will still sound slightly awe-struck when recalling Jill Parker (then Hammersley) in action.

Her masterful defensive style meant taking the ball exceptionally late and the sound of her bat actually striking the floor as she sent the ball back over the net became almost a trademark.


Before the days of long pimples and anti-loop rubber, Parker developed a mesmerising ability to disguise her 'chop and float' (returns with heavy backspin and no spin) simply by the skill of her timing and adjustment of her wrist.

It was a style that carried her all the way to the top table of the international game, and at a time when the sport in this country has been relishing the return this year of the English Open, it is worth remembering that Parker won the table tennis equivalent of Wimbledon on three occasions.

On top of that, she was a European Champion in both singles and doubles, a Commonwealth Champion, 17-times a national champion and a triple winner of both the European Top 12 and Hungarian Opens. At her peak, she was ranked number one in

Put simply, Parker is the finest British player in the history of women's table tennis, and alongside the likes of Douglas, Johnny Leach and Fred Perry, among the all-time greats from this country.

Reflecting on almost 50 years in table tennis as a player or a coach, Parker regards her performances in the 1976 European



Championships in Prague as the best achievement of her career, rather than winning the English Opens of 1975-6, 1978-9 and 1979-80.

"The English Open was a very prestigious event with great crowds – the Dome in Brighton would be packed out," she says, "but I can better remember the European Championships of 1976. We had a great team and a great spirit."

"The ladies team reached the final but we lost against the Russian team, even though we had beaten them in the groups. With Linda Jarvis Inée Howard!, we also won the doubles."

However, it was in the singles that Parker achieved her greatest result, beating the Romanian Maria Alexandru - the 1966 champion - in the final. She also reached two further European Championships finals, losing in 1978 and then 1982, before retiring from international competition in 1983.

Parker first began playing at the age of 10 when she attended the Slough British Legion and immediately developed her own unique style. "I was quite small when I started playing," she says, "and found it difficult to attack. I had a tendency to take the ball later and my game really just developed from there."

"You had to learn to attack to take advantage of the chop and float and the changes of spin, but I used normal rubbers with reverse on one side and short pimples on the other. It was in 1977 that the long pimples came out and I didn't think it was right — I didn't think it was table tennis."



"But the attacking rubbers were also being developed more and more, and after I lost in the 1978 European final, I did try long pimples and I played Judit Magos, who I had lost to in the final. I didn't lose again so maybe I was stupid to have had those principles."

For Parker to achieve such international success from within the limited table tennis structure of England was particularly impressive. Her defensive style owed much to a high level of physical fitness, and while based in Dorking, she would be required to travel extensively into London for high level practice and then around the world for tournaments.

"It was very different from now with the national centre," she says, "you would mostly organise your own practice, although the coaches would give you schedules for your physical training and there would be training camps. There was also the European

Indeed, it is interesting to note that Parker has a considerable Wikipedia entry in German (rather than English) after several years entertaining crowds in the German Bundesliga for the club TSV Kronshagen, who were twice runners-up in the late 1970s and early 1980s. She also spent two spells training in Japan and gaining first-hand experience of the different approach to table tennis in Asia. "The culture is very different – very repetitive – and I'm not sure how easily the British players would stand it," she says. "My daughter Katy trained in Japan and I remember her telling me that they spent one entire day simply hitting forehand chops."

Following retirement, Parker has remained involved in table tennis, with daughter Katy also having represented England. Jill currently works as the ETTA's Talent and Coaching Manager, overseeing 10 regional coaches in the strive to develop a greater depth of emerging young players in this country.


So, what are Parker's words of advice to the young players of the current era? "It is not just about talent, it is about commitment," she says, "I listened to Alan Cooke and Alex Perry talking to coaches recently and they emphasised five things: commitment, concentration, communication, control and confidence."

"You have to be able to control your emotions and you do need a positive attitude and belief that you can deliver a performance. I was always striving to improve, but my attitude was simply that you can't give more than 100 per cent."

European Championships

Stuttgart, Germany / 13th-20th September 2009

The European Championships was Michael Maze's event: putting any injury worries behind him, he claimed the gold in the singles after knocking out Timo Boll in the semi-finals to stop his German counterpart claiming his third successive title and helping his country to secure silver in the men's team event. "This was the championships of my career I played best table tennis in my life in Stuttgart. This is the best MAZE ever" said the European champion. It was also a great tournament for the English, with the men's team claiming promotion to the highest level for the next championships in the team event and the women equalling their result from St Petersburg.

It was a three strong women's and three strong men's team consisting of Joanna Parker, Kelly Sibley and Hannah Hicks and Paul Drinkhall, Darius Knight and Danny Reed who ventured to Stuttgart for the European Championships. Here's how they


European no 1 Liu Jia from Austria was too much for Kelly Sibley who lost in four straight games in the women's singles, as was the European no 6 Wu Jiaduo of Germany and for Hannah Hicks, who also lost in four straight games.

Joanna Parker was really close to winning an encounter with European no 15, Li Quingbing of Austria. The Austrian dominated the first set and edged the next two on deuce, Joanna came back to take games four and five, but the Austrian closed out the match in the sixth game.

The men had a less challenging draw but still faced higher ranked opponents. Darius Knight showed real fighting qualities: after losing the first three games to European no 51 Daniel Zwickl of Hungary he bounced back to take the next three games to level the score at 3-3. A poor start to the final game was just not recoverable and Zwickl took the game and match 11-4.

Danny Reed had no answer to the power of Dutchman Trinko Keen who proceeded to a comfortable four straight game win. At the same time as Danny was losing to one Dutchman, Paul Drinkhall had the advantage of ranking over Michael De Boer, also from the Netherlands, and it showed, Paul took a comfortable four straight game win to set up a confrontation with Fedor Kuzmin, the European no 24, from Russia.

What a superb display it was from both players, Kuzmin came out of the blocks quickest with faultless counter hitting that forced Paul into mistakes in game one. For the next three games, however, Paul played better and better to take a 3-1 lead in games. The fifth game was very tight, Paul had a match point on 10-9 but it slipped away. In the sixth game Paul edged ahead to 8-5 but Kuzmin countered again superbly and took that one too. So to the final game: Paul 3-0 down, they changed ends with Paul 5-1 down, Kuzmin moved on to 8-2 and then Paul exploded back to his best, 2-8 became 9-9, but Kuzmin to serve, a sublime shot onto Paul's backhand corner, off a strong drive from

Firstly Stewart Crawford S2 took an early bath after succumbing to the French hotshot Wilson Huart (winner of the Men's Band 2) in the round of the last 16, followed by Darius Knight S1 making his way back to Sheffield after a dramatic and unexpected loss to Flying Scotsman Niall Cameron 9-11 in the fifth, after leading 6-2 in the deciding end. Wow what a dramatic match, then total silence followed! With Cameron S5 safely through to the last four, this left the remaining quarter-final match between Damien Nicholls S3,,(who had earlier been responsible for the departure of Scott Barton) and Craig Hardie (who had a famous win over Ben Barlow and was on cloud 9 from day 1) in the top half of the draw to be played

Damien Nicholls was simply superb in blasting away yesterday's hero Scotsman Craig Hardie in straight sets to set up a last four clash with Niall Cameron (on a high after displacing Darius Knight in the previous round) This meant that three out of the four semi-finalists hailed from the Grantham College Academy! The Scotsman Cameron was probably playing his best ever table tennis and was in the zone throughout his semi-final battle with Nicholls, taking the match 3-0 to await his final opponent. Two tables away Matt Ware was also finding top form to halt the Frenchman's dramatic progress, coming through in three close sets to set up an England v Scotland final

Ware took first blood in the opening set of the final, however it was once again the Flying Scotsman Cameron who soaked up

everything that Ware could throw at him, countering spectacularly with top class back from the table pinpoint topspin rallies that the audience were in awe of. Niall levelled at 1-1, and then followed probably the finest set of wall to wall class from both finalists. Cameron then took that all so important third set 15-13, which he then followed up 11-8 in the fourth leg to secure an unexpected but thoroughly well deserved victory to be crowned Newcastle Men's Open Champion, together with a nice cheque for £300.

The Women's Open attracted a poor entry of just eight competitors. Naomi Wilson finished winner of group 1 with Melissa Wright taking the runner up spot In the other group Lindsey Reynolds prevailed with Lisa Radford taking second place. Following a titanic marathon first semifinal Lisa Radford just got her head in front of Naomi Wilson in the fifth set to await her final contestant Meanwhile Lindsey Reynolds proved too strong for the defender Melissa Wright to take her concluding place with Lisa.

The final turned out to be a roller coaster ride with Reynolds quickly going 2-0 up only to see her lead vanish with Radford finding top gear to level at 2-2 Lindsey established an early advantage in the final leg, which she grasped to take the Women's Open title and a £175 cheque

Twenty four players contested the Under 21 Men's event, with the final being played out by top seeded Damien Nicholls S1 and Matt Ware S2 for possibly the tenth time in the last two seasons of Under 21 Grand Prix finals The Hampshire player was quick out of the blocks taking the first leg of the

final 13-11, and from there on Ware closed out the match in two further tight sets.

The Under 21 Women's event was played as a round robin competition with five competitors.

Melissa Wright won all her four matches making her the Champion with the gallant runner-up Rebecca George losing to Melissa in three straight sets, but proving too good for Emily Ross, Bethany Ross and Eszter Soos.



Split into two groups, an interesting innovation had the higher ranked players in group A with the remainder in group B, with the group winners to meet in the final.

Chris Ross and Andy Trott made the best starts in group A with three wins each, but where as Trott went on to remain unbeaten, Ross lost heavily to Trott and then in straight games to Richard Elliott, who had started with two defeats but still finished second Elliott's clash with John Fuller was the only one to go the distance with Elliott winning 11-9, 10-12, 11-7, 16-18, 11-8


It was a different story in group B where seven of the fifteen sets went to five ends One of these, as early as the third round featured a 23-21 opening scoreline with Paul Gatiss going on to beat Kevin Bird in a fifth end decider At that stage neither player thought it would prove the deciding factor, but so it proved and with both players gaining four victories, the early win for Gatiss put him in the final

Gatiss faced a daunting task against Trott but produced some outstanding winners on both wings. Nevertheless Trott playing as well as he ever did, used his guile and touch to such good effect that he emerged a straight game winner 11-8, 11-9, 11-4.

Joanna Parker led the England Women at the European Table Tennis Championships in Stuttgart, whilst Darius played in the Men's Team. In the team event Joanna finished on 8 wins out of 10.

In the Maccabiah Games Adam Laws was part of the bronze medal winning team and even won the decisive match in the 3rd/4th place play-off. This is the first medal won by the men's open team in almost 30 years, excluding the intifada games of 2001. In the singles, Adam lost in the last 32 to the World no.888.

At the China Open both Joanna Parker and Darius Knight got through to the main event, however both players were beaten by World top 10 players in the first round.

Tin-Tin Ho, who previously played for Surrey club Crusaders, did amazingly well to reach the final of the 5th Euro Mini Championships in Schiltigheim, France. She beat players ranked a lot higher than herself and came back from being behind in the quarter-final and semi-final in the under 12 European event when aged only 10 at the time.

Miles Collins was the Band 4 Butterfly Grand Prix Champion for the 2008/09 season, along with Abdul Wuraola who won the veterans' overall title and Zoltan Hosszu who took the restricted overall event. England number two, Darius Knight, is to be used in a new up and coming pan-European advertising campaign for Nintendo's new Wii Sports Resort game. In the last Grand Prix of the season, held at Hereford, Emre Hussain won the Men's Band 2 and Emre Ibatoglu won the Men's Band 6 event.

The first Grand Prix of the 2009/10 season saw an all Surrey affair in the restricted event where Matt Pernet beat Adam Laws.

The eleventh annual Cippenham Summer Festival saw Lucy Lou win the under 14 girls' singles title. In the first Cippenham series of the new season Janice Lee won the Veteran Women's Singles event against a 3 times title holder, Sue Hayes.

George Heath won the Horsham 2 star under 13 event without losing a single set.

Abdul Wuraola won the July Horsham Super sixteen event.

Foster Takes Yorkshire Title

The Yorkshire Closed Table Tennis Championships were held at Halifax TTC, with the junior events being held on the Saturday. The day proved successful for Hull in particular, but it was the victory by James Foster in the boys' cadet event which gave the home town something to smile about.

Hull's Reece Lo as expected won the junior boys' singles (U18) as Halifax and Hull players dominated the event with four players from Halifax and two from Hull qualifying from the group stages to the knockout event.

Top seed, Hull's Josh Thompson, just got the better of Yorkshire team mate and Halifax player, James Mason, although Mason will be kicking himself as he led two games to one and 9-5 in the fourth, but was unable to close the game out which allowed battler Thompson back into the game and it was the Hull player who booked himself a place in the final by virtue of a five game victory.

Second seed Lo eased into the final by virtue of a comfortable three game victory over Halifax rising star James Foster.

Although they showed Thompson as top seed, he was only one ranking point above Lo, but it was his final opponent who ended the season better and eased to a comfortable 11-5 13-11 11-6 victory to take his first junior county title.

The U13 boys' event saw another Hull player Daryl Gee take the title. Having won the Yorkshire trials at this age group, Gee was the clear favourite and won all his group and knockout matches in three straight games, including a final victory against Leeds player Edward Hollingsworth 11-4, 11-0, 11-5.

Gee was also favourite to take the cadet boys' singles (U15), but came unstuck in the final against Halifax player James Foster, as once more Hull and Halifax players dominated the event. On this occasion it was going to be one player from each town that contested the final, as Gee faced team mate Sam Tompkins in the first semi-final, whilst Foster played Matthew Stephens in his semi.

Both semi-finals followed a similar pattern with Gee comfortably accounting for Tompkins to book his place in the final where he was due to meet Foster, who accounted for club mate Stephens in the other last four match.

The final proved to be the most exciting final of the day, as Gee established a 2-1 lead, only to see the Halifax player draw level at two games each and in the final game, points were traded all throughout the game, but it was the Halifax player who held his nerve the best to take an 11-9 final game victory and with it his first Yorkshire title.

So what has football got to do with table tennis?

Good question The Premier League 4 Sport project is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the ETTA and table tennis locally to officially work with the "stardust" of the Premier League.

The Premier League 4 Sport project, which is being funded with £3.8m from the Government, is a major investment towards four Olympic sports, table tennis, judo, volleyball and badminton Working in partnership with Sport England, Youth Sport Trust and the top 20 Premier League football clubs of the 2008/9 season, the

aim is to get 25,000 young people aged between 11 and 16 to take part and join local sports clubs (6,250 table tennis) during the three year scheme.

Each Premier League football club will appoint a project co-ordinator who will manage the scheme locally, working with clubs (table tennis) and school sport partnerships to achieve 80 community sports clubs (20 for table tennis) and 320 new satellite school based sessions, four per community sports club (80 for table tennis)

There will be challenges along the way to bring together key partners, working towards new table tennis activity and to build upon our current club infrastructure of PremierClubs, including venue availability, engaging new volunteers and coaching delivery. Working closely with each of the Premier League football club community trusts, we can create a network of strong TT clubs, linked to school sessions, and appoint new ETTA club support and coaching officers created by the funding partners involved in each project. These club support and coaching officers will encourage, support and drive the new activity and in turn offer new young children to table tennis, the opportunities to play and have a great experience in our sport.

You are also the programme manager for PremierClubs, what does that involve?

A varied and exciting role to manage, support and drive club development through the PremierClub programme.

We have a target set in our Whole Sport Plan 2009-13 of increasing and retaining the number of Clubmark table tennis clubs in this country. Good club activity is the catalyst for long term development of the sport, and the Clubmark accreditation process is the sign of a quality club working towards a secure long term future, expanding its volunteer base, offering a safe and effective environment for young people and players of all ages and abilities. It also helps to increase the membership, in turn increasing the number of local league teams or players, and works to improve the standard of coaching, developing more talented players of the future.

However, we need to ensure our volunteers are supported and not stretched, with appropriate action planning and working with other sporting partners. There will be regular club visits by ETTA staff to include club health checks, action planning meetings and regional and sub-regional workshops, where clubs and key volunteers can learn about new funding streams. share ideas and practical advice on running a successful club. New resources and benefits to PremierClubs will also be implemented to ensure we have a vibrant and healthy club volunteer workforce based in clubs to take us beyond the 2013 Whole Sport Plan funding.

Before you started this role you were an RDO, how do you think that helps you in your new role?

I'd like to think my six years as the Yorkshire Regional Development Officer has stood me in good stead for being successful in my new national role. I've worked with many different partners within Yorkshire and on many different projects, from clubs, leagues, school sport partnerships, local authorities, county sports partnerships, Sport England and the Youth Sport Trust. Projects include facility development, funding projects, recruitment and line management of new coaching positions and club action lanning This experience will certainly help when developing relationships and working with partners of different levels involved in the PL4 Sport project and my other role as the ETTA national lead officer for clubs and the ETTA development programme PremierClub.
