am delighted to welcome you to Redbridge Sports & Leisure Centre for the 56th English Senior National Championships. I hope everyone enjoys a great weekend of table tennis.

It doesn't seem 12 months ago since our last showcase championship. But as I look back, much has happened

and I truly believe all aspects of table tennis are stronger now than they were a year ago.

Liam's aiming to be

Pitch perfect

in bid for title hat-trick

iam Pitchford has his sights set on joining an elite band of players to have won a hat-trick of National Men's Singles titles.

The Chesterfield man took his maiden senior singles title two years ago and successfully defended his crown last year.

A third successive triumph would see him join Chester Barnes, Denis Neale and Alan Cooke in achieving that milestone – the great Desmond Douglas is virtually over the horizon with nine titles in a row between 1979 and 1987.

The man Liam beat on both occasions was Paul Drinkhall, who in turn had defeated him in the 2012 final, and the smart money is certain to be on the top two seeds meeting again in the title-deciding match here in Redbridge.

It's an outcome Liam himself is predicting – though he admits both men will face a tough challenge on the way.

"I'm going there to win it," says the 21-year-old. "I won it the last two times and it would be nice to make it three in a row, but it's going to be a tough tournament.

"We've got two players in the world top 50 and me and Paul (Drinkhall) are probably heavy favourites – we've played the last three finals against each other and at the moment it's looking like it will be that again.

"But you never know on the day. Sam Walker played well in Hungary (he reached the last 32 of the men's and quarter-finals of the under-21 singles).

"He's training at Ochsenhausen with me and he's working really hard and it's nice

to see he's got some good results.

"I haven't seen much of the others, but you've obviously got Andrew (Baggaley), Danny (Reed) and Darius (Knight) – and David McBeath is practising out in Germany and he can play well.

"It's going to be a good challenge but hopefully I can play well and it's going to be a great tournament."

Walker's success in Hungary saw him

climb almost 100 places to a career-high of No 175 in the world rankings and follows Drinkhall's rise to No 33 on the back of his run to the final of the Russian Open and appearance at the Grand Finals. It means Liam is no longer the leading English player in the rankings. And while he would love to reclaim that position, he sees the bigger picture in terms of a group of English players all pushing each other to improve both their rankings and their games.

"I think it's great for English table tennis that we have two players in the top 50 for the first time in a while," he says. "I don't think many people saw it happening a few years back but we've worked hard and improved.

"Me and Paul get on well, we're friends off the table. If we play, we'll have a good match – there's not going to be any bad blood or anything like that – but I think it's going to spur us both on.

"It's nice to have that now and hopefully Sam, or whoever else is No 3, can improve and when we get to the World Team Championships in Malaysia next year we'll compete well.

"Last year surpassed everyone's expectations but I don't see why we can't do it again. We're all still improving and we're all still young."

Much of the credit for Liam's ascent up the world rankings lies in his professional status, playing for TFF Liebherr Ochsenhausen in Germany.

After a recent Bundesliga match, he was even able to talk to the media in German.

"It was my first interview in German," he said. "I can understand pretty much everything but you need the confidence to speak. I'm getting there and hopefully I'll be fluent one day.

"It gives you a bit more confidence in yourself to speak another language, so I'm doing my best."

Liam's hoping it will be 'Pitchford über alles' in Redbridge.



Joanna Drinkhall admits it will be a strange feeling attending the Senior Nationals as a spectator rather than defending the Women's Singles title she won last year.

The top-ranked English player will be in Redbridge to support her husband Paul and as an interested onlooker, but will not be competing because she is expecting the couple's first child.

And although she is excited about impending parenthood, she says it has not always been easy to step away from the table.

"It's been weird," said the 27-year-old. "I stopped in November – I haven't played properly but I've done a bit of coaching here and there. It was nice for the first week, then I thought 'what shall I do?' You get used to being active and after more than a week off you start climbing the walls a bit.

"To be there as a spectator will probably be a bit weird as well – I haven't been and watched without

playing for a while – and whenever you watch, you're itching to play.

"But I definitely know I can't play, so it's not really an option. The fact that I'm expecting is a far more exciting prospect. It's something different in my life that I'm really looking forward to.

"If I have to forfeit a few tournaments... as a female athlete you're always going to miss something when you decide you want a family – but it's worth it at the end of the day.

"I won the Nationals last year and won the Commonwealth Games gold last summer, so it's worked out really well that I've done those before having kids. It's worked out perfectly."

Although Jo will not be defending her title, the other top English players will be here in Redbridge, including fellow Commonwealth Games team members Kelly Sibley, Tin-Tin Ho, Hannah Hicks and Karina Le Fevre. So who does last year's chan to take her title?

"I don't see why it should always be in the same place – we could do with sharing it around the country and I'd rather be travelling to different places than going to the same one every year."

With the baby – which the couple know will be a boy – due on May 20, will Jo be back and looking to add to her tally of titles, wherever the Nationals are held in future?

"I've got to wait and see how it goes but I can't imagine not playing," she said. "I can't imagine my life without table tennis. I have intentions of coming back but you never know how you're going to feel."




he Guernsey Trophy has not always been the trophy awarded to the Men's Singles Champion at the English National Championships.

It superseded the original trophy in 1973 following the England team's success at the Guernsey Table Tennis Association's 50th Anniversary Tournament held in May 1972.

Eight teams competed for the solid silver trophy. Denis Neale, Nicky Jarvis, David Alderson and Karenza Mathews, captained by Bryan Merrett, were the England team. The players comfortably won their group against Wales, Guernsey and the Netherlands before defeating Scotland in the first round of the play-offs 4-1. The final against West Germany's team of Klaus Schmittinger, Gunter Kocher and Wiebke Hendrikson was another 4-1 victory.

Denis went on to complete a hat-trick of individual titles, the Men's



Singles, Men's Doubles with Nicky Jarvis and the Mixed Doubles with Karenza Mathews. Karenza also won the Women's Singles event. So all in all a very successful and profitable tournament for England.

It was subsequently decided to use this trophy for the Men's Singles Champion at the National Championships. The first recipient was Trevor Taylor in 1973, the second year he had won the title. Denis Neale was the only member of the team who helped England secure the trophy

in 1972 to hold it again, as National Champion, in 1975 and 1977. The wonder years of Desmond Douglas were to follow, with nine consecutive titles between 1979 and 1987 plus additional titles in 1976 and 1990. Other holders of this trophy have been: Chester Barnes, Paul Day, Chen Xinhua, Carl Prean, Matthew Syed, Alan Cooke, Alex Perry, Andrew Baggaley, Paul Drinkhall and Liam Pitchford.







