Men's Singles and Women's Singles

The top 16 players in the February 2022 ranking list were invited to compete, joining 14 players who had come through the Qualifying Competition, plus two wildcards, making a maximum of 32 in each competition. If any players in the top 16 decline their invitation, their places are offered to those who finished in 15th to 32nd positions at the Qualifying Tournament and, if there are still spaces available, to the highest ranked players who have not already got

Competition format: Top 8 seeds have a bye to last 16; group stage - best of 5, top player qualifies; knockout stage - best of 7.

Under-21 singles competitions

Players are invited on the basis of their rankings on the February 2022 list, up to a maximum of 16 in each competition.

Competition format:

Top 4 seeds have a bye to quarter-finals; group stage - best of 5, top player qualifies; knockout stage best of 5.

Para showcase finals

Matches will be played as a showcase final between two players selected by British Para Table Tennis. Both matches are best of 5.

Doubles competitions

A player who has secured a place in any singles competition can also enter any doubles competition for which they are eligible. Their partner does not have to have a singles place. There is a maximum of 16 pairs in each category **Competition format:**

f it is true that you get out of life what you put in, then Daniel Bullen deserves all the success that comes his way.
The 24-year-old, who will compete in Sunday's wheelchair match against Tokyo bronze medallist Jack Hunter-Spivey, is not only one of the hardest working athletes in the British Para Table Tennis Team Pathway squad but also finds the time to umpire, coach and get involved with grassroots development in the sport that he admits has changed his life.

"Before I played table tennis, I couldn't sit up straight in my wheelchair," he explained. "I couldn't catch a ball, I didn't speak to anyone unless they were an adult, and I struggled to write – it was so bad that it would be one letter a page. Table tennis helped me to get that grip which has enabled me to write better; it has helped me in every way and that is why I give so much back as a coach and an umpire because it has given me a purpose in life."

Two years ago at the National Championships, Bullen pushed Hunter-Spivey to five sets twice, showing the benefit of competing with his opponent in the team event at the European Championships in 2019 – his first major championships.

"I'd never played like that before against Jack," he said, "and I think the Europeans helped me a lot to get used to some of the pressure of being on a big stage and the experience of having a crowd. Something I struggle with because of my disability is concentration and a couple of years ago I'd have been looking round at the crowd rather than focusing on my game, so it got

me in that mindset."

Having started umpiring in 2018 to help out at his table tennis club in St Neots in Cambridgeshire, Bullen will officiate at the Nationals, as well as compete.

"I'm really enjoying it and it has become my hobby," he said. "I feel it has helped me as a player because as an umpire I have to watch the serve closely to make sure it is legal, and I am learning how to read it. It has also helped me understand the best time to take timeouts and I'm not afraid to call someone up on something if it's not right.


"Coaching has also helped me – when I coach some of the juniors at the club, I'm having to watch the other player to work out the tactics and that has helped me be more tactically aware on the table."

Bullen secured his first international title in Costa Rica last December, fighting back from 2-0 down and saving match points to beat the PanAmerican Championship silver medallist Ahad Bakhshaei Sarand 13-11 in the fifth.

"Costa Rica gave me a lot of confidence," he acknowledged, "and meant a lot to me because I've been working so hard and it was nice to see all my game come together."

With support from BPTT psychologist Andy Hill, Bullen is growing in confidence and is impressing Pathway manager Shaun Marples with his progress on and off the

"Dan was playing a match in France last year when he had an experience that went against him and it fired him up and annoyed him a little bit," said Marples. "You saw his attitude change around —

rather than being a nice competitor he was fighting to win. He won that match and took that into Costa Rica, where he claimed his first title, which shows a good level of maturity.

"Off the table, he is more independent and growing as a person. On the table, he is starting to become a bit more tactically aware of what he needs to do against his opponents. He is not just playing to enjoy and hoping he wins, he is playing for a purpose to give himself a chance."

Bullen is hoping to compete in the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham later this year, having been inspired by the last multi-sport Games to be held in England, London 2012.

"It would mean a lot to compete at a Commonwealth Games, especially as it is

a home Games," he said. "I went to the Paralympics in London four times and watched our players winning medals and I realised that I could chase that dream of getting there one day. Before that I used to play table tennis and enjoy the competitions but after London it really made me think about where I wanted to go with it.

"Qualifying for the Commonwealths is my main goal for this year and I hope that I can get there. After my final in Costa Rica, Mat (BPTT coach Mat Kenny) said he has seen a big improvement in me and could see the potential there for me to go on now and achieve more and that has inspired me knowing one of the performance coaches can see that."




Standing Class 6 -10: Kim Daybell (Class 10, age 29, from Sheffield) versus Ross Wilson (class 8, age 26, from Minster)

in-Tin Ho has been such a mainstay at the Senior Nationals that it's easy to forget she's only 23 and could reasonably expect the best years of her career to still be ahead of her.

Considering she has already played at the Olympic Games and has three Commonwealth Games medals in her collection – among many other accolades – it's amazing to think what she might add to her trophy collection in the coming years.

In fact, there could be a milestone achievement right here in Nottingham this weekend, because Ho's next National title will be her 50th – though she admits: "I haven't really been counting, I've just been playing, but it's a little bonus and I certainly never imagined I would manage to win that number of titles."

It all started in the 2007/08 season, when she won the under-11, under-12 and under-13 girls' singles and there is no title which has eluded her since, at Cadet, Junior, Under-21 or Senior level.

Her first chance to reach the golden landmark will be in the Mixed Doubles on Friday, but if that doesn't come off, there is always the Women's Doubles and Women's Singles to fall back on.

Ho, who is the defending champion in the singles having won the title for a fourth time in 2020, added: "I'm really excited to play again at the Nationals, it's always a great tournament to play and I'm excited for everyone to get together again.

"It would be nice to get some more titles but my main goal is just to play how I would "

I haven't really been counting, I've just been playing, but it's a little bonus and I certainly never imagined I would manage to win that number of titles.

like to play and take the things I've been working on and trying to improve in training into a competition. It's a good opportunity to do that and I'm trying not to put too much pressure on myself."

Ho's main threat is likely to be fellow Commonwealth Games medallist and 2019 National women's singles champion Maria Tsaptsinos, who missed the 2020 event through injury.

Senior England internationals Denise Payet and Charlotte Bardsley are also likely to be in contention, and it will be interesting to see how 2020 beaten finalist Mari Baldwin has developed since she reached the final as a 15-year-old two years ago.

Ho said of Baldwin: "I hadn't really seen Mari beforehand and it was interesting that she had a good run and got to the final – and it was interesting to play against her.

"I think if she can develop her game she can have more success. A lot of international players have a similar style, including (2018 Commonwealth Games gold medallist) Manika Batra of India, so it shows that style can do really well on the world stage.

"It's also great that Maria's back competing, it felt a bit of a shame for her that she missed it last time. She's a great competitor and she's always good to have in the competition."

Further Commonwealth Games medals are also on the horizon – Tin-Tin already has Mixed Doubles silvers from both 2014 and 2018, both alongside Liam Pitchford, and a team bronze from 2018 with Tsaptsinos, Payet and the now-retired Kelly Sibley.

Asked what her targets are for Birmingham

2022, Ho said: "It's hard to answer that one! It would be nice to get good results and exceed what I've done in the other two Games I've been to.

"Getting a gold would be very nice and we've got a chance in the Mixed because we've won silver twice.

"But the main thing will be playing how I'd like to play. I've been working hard in training, particularly on a lot of match stuff and knowing my game a bit more, and the mental side of things as well. If I take that into a big competition, hopefully the results will come with that.

"I haven't really thought much about the home crowd yet but it will be really cool to have that, and hopefully table tennis can be made a bit more popular in England on the back of the Games."

Off the table, Ho is well into her medical degree here at the University of Nottingham and has recently started her

clinical placements, which will in due course encompass a number of medical disciplines.

She said: "We had our dissertation over the autumn and that was quite a standard schedule, but I've just started my clinical placements and it's been a lot busier as I'm managing that with my training. It's a lot out of my comfort zone but it's exciting as well.

"I've been at QMC (Queen's Medical Centre) and I started with Ophthalmology and by the time of the Nationals, I'll be in ENT (Ear, Nose and Throat). I've got quite a few more to come. I'm really looking forward to the mental health placement, which is after the Commonwealths, and I'm excited for the surgery placement as well, which is after ENT.

"Actually, I'm excited for all of them because they're all so different."

It remains to be seen whether Tin-Tin is at her clinical best on the table during the Nationals.

Father-and-son achievement is relatively rare

Sibling rivalry is commonplace at the Senior Nationals, but to find two generations of the same family in the field is more unusual.

Certainly, since the competition became limited entry in recent years, it has not happened, but that has all changed this year as Lorestas Trumpauskas and his son Larry take the stage at the David Ross Sports Village.

Lorestas, 52, earned an invitation by virtue of his place in the rankings, while 14-year-old Larry came through the Qualifying Tournament - not as an automatic qualifier but as one of the next in line when a small number of invitations were declined.

It is a first Senior Nationals for Larry, who recently won his first major trophy by lifting the Cadet National Cup, a tournament which sees the top 10 under-15s in the rankings play each other on a round-robin basis to decide the champion.

The youngster said: "It feels very good to get here and I think I'll get a very good experience and see my true level against the best players in England and I'll be very interested to play in an environment like that."

Lorestas says of his son: "He's improving on a weekly basis so far and I'm happy to see the way he is learning from his mistakes and progressing the way I wanted him to play. If he's going to be playing like that, with listening and learning, hopefully he will go far.

"For him to be just 14 and playing National men's last 32, I think that's a big achievement, that's really good, he will learn a lot seeing the best players in the country and that will be an experience itself."

As for those siblings, look out also for brothers Naphat and Naphong Boonyaprapa, twins Connor and Anna Green and their older sister Erin, plus brother and sister Toby and Bethany Ellis, who are all competing this weekend.

hey say that as one door closes, another opens. So, while Paul Drinkhall's late withdrawal from these championships through injury and Liam Pitchford's absence to play the WTT Star Contender in Doha mean neither of England's top two will be able to add to their long lists of Senior Nationals titles, it does create an opportunity for others.

Pitchford and Drinkhall have won the last 10 Men's Singles titles between them and the last time there was a different winner was in 2010, when Andrew Baggaley claimed the last of his three titles.

Baggaley is competing this weekend, the first time he has been at this tournament since 2014, and will certainly have his eyes on the top prize. Tom Jarvis, David McBeath and others will also sense an opportunity.

But it is Sam Walker who now carries the tag of No 1 seed and favourite and who, having been beaten in three previous Men's Singles finals, now feels ready to seize his moment.

"It's a big driving force," says the man from just up the road in Worksop. "I don't want to make four finals and get four second places. I want to make sure I win it this time."

Walker beat Pitchford in the semi-finals two years on the bounce in 2016 and 2017, losing to Drinkhall in the final on both occasions, and was then defeated by Pitchford in the 2018 final.

He feels the middle of those finals was the one where he really had the chance to get his name on the famous Guernsey Trophy.

"The one against Liam, I didn't feel like I had much of a chance," he said. "I know it was 1-1 after the first two games but I felt I was chasing the game and Liam was the more dominant player and, to be fair, was the better player.

"Against Paul they both ended 4-2 but I was 2-1 up in 2017 and I think that was a good chance for me. If I could have won one of the next two, it puts a lot of pressure on him. I've never beaten Paul in a competitive match but I've always felt I played well against him and a lot of the time I've been the dominant player or more aggressive player and still lost because, and this is all credit to him, he's very good at finding a way to win."

Walker feels that the experiences of three finals will stand him in good stead, but he adds that his approach to the tournament has not changed just because Pitchford and Drinkhall are absent.

"Obviously, it makes me the No 1 seed but that doesn't mean anything changes for me in terms of preparation," he said.

"There's still a lot of players in there who are dangerous and it's still going to take me playing some good table tennis to win the tournament.

"Even if Pitch and Paul had been playing, I'd be looking to win the tournament. I can

only play who's in front of me and whoever that is going to be, my preparation is still the same. I've just got to go out there and perform as I know I can.

"If I do that, I know I'm good enough to win the title.

"It's very open and even if I am the favourite, it probably puts more belief into all the other top seeds that they have more of a chance to win it.

"But I welcome the challenge and I hope they're thinking like that because it's good for the sport and good for me.

"I very much believe I'm going to be the best player at the tournament and I have to show that now."


Beyond the Nationals, the home Commonwealth Games this summer loom large, with England confident of going better than the team bronze they won at the 2018 Games in Gold Coast.

"Birmingham has been in my thinking for 12-18 months already and I'll definitely be looking to take confidence from the Nationals to go into the summer months with more international tournaments — with the Commonwealth Games being the biggest goal," said Walker.

"We haven't had a formal conversation about it recently, but it's clear to everybody what the goal is as a team. We were all very disappointed with our team result at the last Games and we felt like we could have done more

"We don't really need to talk about it as a team because it's clear our aim is to win gold."

TT Kidz proving a huge success

After the uncertainty around sport in general across the last two years during the pandemic, TT Kidz returned to our clubs once again during autumn 2021.

The initiative, which was highly commended at the ukactive Awards 2021, aims to provide a fun, engaging and inspiring first experience in table tennis for children aged 7-to-11.

A total of 29 clubs from Torquay to Middlesbrough, keen to reinvigorate their junior offerings, signed up to deliver the eight-week programme - between them attracting 390 new children to the game!

To support clubs to bounce back from the pandemic, Table Tennis England provided the equipment and training free to clubs as



well as reducing the session costs in areas of high deprivation.

Feedback from the programme has been overwhelmingly positive, with 98% of children finding the sessions fun and 87% of children becoming or wanting to become a member of the club after the eight weeks. 99% of parents surveyed were also highly satisfied with the equipment and value for money TT Kidz provides.

TT Kidz is also supporting Table Tennis England's Level the Table campaign with 30% of the 390 participants being female, 21% having a disability and 41% being from an ethnically diverse community.

Some clubs are now using the TT Kidz Awards scheme to support the children's ongoing development and enjoyment.

Another success story from TT Kidz is Bankfields Primary School in Middlesbrough. For the first time, they have qualified boys' and girls' teams in the National U11 School Team Championships, with six out of the eight children involved starting their table tennis journey with TT Kidz.

TT Kidz is running during the spring of this year with more than 200 children engaging. The initiative will run again in autumn 2022 and we really want to use the excitement of the Commonwealth Game to inspire a new generation of children to take up the game. Is a future Team England player waiting in the TT Kidz wings?

It has been six months since we launched our diversity, and inclusion strategy Level the Table.

At a glance

A portfolio of work to embed inclusion across the sport has commenced within the organisation. We have strengthened our partnership with British Para Table Tennis (BPTT), aligning our strategies to develop a set of shared goals to ensure there is a pathway of opportunities for Disabled People across our sport.

Our programme of work together looks at increasing the number of disabled coaches, holding joint talent recruitment days, increasing the opportunities for players from grassroots to performance, and providing opportunities for coaches to upskill in knowledge when creating accessible and inclusive environments.

We're proud signatories of the Sporting Equals charter, supporting a global movement to put ethnically diverse communities on the sports sector agenda, specifically tackling the ethnicity gap.

In our race representation audit, we were awarded top marks for our Board diversity, however we do have targets to improve representation across leadership and performance.

The charter's framework enables us to continue to contribute towards a sport that is inclusive and representative of the population in England, where we capture data, commit to tackling inequalities and celebrate positive role models.

To accelerate the pace of gender parity, we pages 32-33 introduced a women and girls internal working group, which promises action, regular updates and maximum transparency. We're making excellent progress in the focus of developments across the women and girls work-streams and target

To ensure we move with intention and support our commitment, it is important to us that we work with organisations who are on the same journey.

Internally, we have formed a Partnerships Group and have made significant strides in how we initially engage, offer resource and eventually work with partners. Our partner engagement must result in the delivery of our strategy and ultimately support and engage more diverse audiences.

Remarkable life of England star Joyce

ometimes, one is privileged to be able to speak to or meet a person who is a bit special and that was the case when I contacted a lady whose name may not be familiar with the players of today, Joyce Bogoni - or Joyce Roberts as she was when she started playing table tennis.

Joyce was born in London in 1926, the year the foundation meeting of the ITTF was held. She lived through the Blitz and was a WAAF working at Bletchley Park before playing in two World Championships, winning a bronze medal in the Corbillon Cup (women's team), and then as a member of the England squad which had an eight-match tour of East and West Germany in 1951.

Joyce later went on to be a Founder Member of the National Autistic Society and later still helped establish two homes for people with learning disabilities on the Isle of Wight.

It was while at Bletchley Park where Joyce saw Sergeant Cadet K Sebestak and Private E Berger of the Czechoslovak Army and England's Cyril Merrett and Maurice Kriss in a war-time final. This enthused her enough to take up a bat seriously and it wasn't long before she was representing the WAAF against the WRENs and other services, along with Betty Blackbourn, who later went on to win a World Championship gold medal in the Corbillon Cup. Excellent company indeed.

Nearly all the canteens in the WAAF had table tennis tables and it wasn't long before Joyce was beating all the men, which didn't always go down too well. However, it was after the war that her game really blossomed and by the late 1940s she was winning a considerable number of Open tournaments in singles and also in doubles with Peggy Franks — a World Championships multiple gold medallist.

Joyce's first international took place in 1949 before she went on

to play in two World Championships. The first in Vienna in 1951 where with Peggy Franks, Diane and Rosalind Rowe, the Corbillon Cup team took home a bronze medal, she reached the quarter-finals in the Women's and Mixed Doubles that year too. Joyce also played in the 1954 Worlds on home territory at Wembley.

Further caps came when Joyce was selected to go on a tour of Germany in September 1951, the first visit after the Second World War. Matches were played in both East and West Germany as well as an international against a combined team, the players were warmly welcomed in most cities. Eight matches were played in total and England won them all.

Having lived through the blitz in London it gave Joyce a very special feeling when the National Anthem was played after the win in the international. Ivor Montagu accompanied the team which comprised Kathy Best, Ken Craigie, Aubrey Simons and Michael Thornbill.

Joyce played in other internationals and also achieved success at



the English Open when she was runner-up in the Women's Doubles with Peggy Franks in 1952, at the time the English Open was regarded as only second in importance on the world stage to the World Championships.

The French Open the following year also proved a good hunting ground when Joyce won the Mixed Doubles with Brian Kennedy and a silver medal in the Women's Doubles with Ann Haydon.

Joyce reached England number 3 but in an era when England's ladies were on top of the world this was no mean achievement with Betty Blackbourn (WR 2), Vera Dace (WR 3), Rosalind Rowe (WR 3), Diane Rowe (WR 5), Dora Beregi (WR 6) and Peggy Franks (WR 7).

Joyce was described as sporting, good-natured, one of the most popular players in the game and her attitude was never, never give up. An attitude which served her well in later years.

Following her marriage to Bruce Bogoni which lasted nearly 60 years, Joyce's interest in table tennis waned as he had little interest in the game and when Joyce gave birth to her son, who was autistic, her energy and drive were directed into helping found the National Autistic Society. Later, a daughter was a further addition to the family.

Later still, when the family moved to the Isle of Wight, Joyce went on to help establish two homes for people with learning difficulties.

Joyce still meets up with old friends and colleagues at Bletchley Park for a Veterans Reunion and on their Open Day the former WAAF ladies are paraded before those fortunate enough to attend.

At 95, Joyce retains her vibrant personality and looks back with affection on her truly remarkable life. A very special lady.







Our gender commitment

It is Table Tennis England's vision to achieve gender parity in table tennis. Women make up 51% of the population in England (Census data) but only 12% of our members, 17% of coaches and just 3% of club or league chairs are female.

Therefore, we will unapologetically focus on increasing women and girls' involvement in our sport and making table tennis a space where females feel welcomed, valued and visible and have the opportunity to progress.

Through surveys and direct contact with our female members and women involved in the sport, we have a clear understanding that, for many people, table tennis looks and feels like a space designed and dominated by and for men.

This doesn't negate that there are women and girls having fantastic experiences in the sport and that there are clubs, leagues, coaches and volunteers doing some great work to create inclusive spaces but, we cannot ignore that there are also females having very bad experiences in our sport and who are being put off playing and participating.

Our insight shows that females would like to engage more in our sport and, when provided with the right opportunities, they do! So gender parity is not only important for our inclusivity agenda, but for the growth, development and future of our sport too.

Our commitment to females does not mean that male participation becomes less important - we will continue to work hard to develop opportunities for men and boys too - but we must acknowledge the disparity that exists.

We are therefore wholehearted committed to #LevelTheTable for women and girls and, going forwards, a much higher percentage of our time, funding and energy will be directed towards increasing opportunities for females in our sport.

Jenny Leach – Women and Girls Lead: "We know that for many women and girls, the traditional table tennis environment can be an intimidating and unwelcoming space and therefore, responding to our insight, we have started to create more female only opportunities such as girls only TT Kidz, Women's only Bat and Chat and girls' schools' projects through the Jack Petchey programme.

Our Level the Table grant scheme has also supported club and league projects as well as charities and community groups to start creating more female only spaces.

Our next steps will be to look into other areas of the sport such as committee roles, coaching and education, branding and performance as our gender parity ambition is much wider than just participation based."





he 2018 Commonwealth Games held in the Gold Coast saw a record-breaking medal haul for Team England, however, things didn't look quite so rosy for England's Technical Officials and the event highlighted the need to diversify the umpire and referee community within England.

All sports were mandated by the Commonwealth Games Governing Body to produce a team of officials for the Birmingham 2022 Games that would be much more diverse and have a 50/50 split between males and females (we were currently 80/20).

The modernisation of training was the first thing needed to inspire the next generation of officials and it was achieved by the creation of online learning methods for the entry level qualification.

Graduates of this were then supported at the start of their journey with training and mentoring opportunities at events, from senior officials and all new umpires were fast-tracked to gain a higher qualification, making them eligible to officiate at national events.

Although controversial to some, a new casual style of umpires uniform was also introduced. The blazers and ties were discarded and polo shirts (made and designed to be fit for purpose by umpires and referees themselves) were introduced. This approach copies the ITTF's and has also been adopted by the 2022 Games.

Sheila Walshe from Scunthorpe was inspired by the 2018 Games and has turned from Accountant-by-day to umpire-by-weekend! She took up umpiring while her two young sons were playing and was

convinced by a local umpire to take a formal qualification, which she passed, and subsequently attended some lower level events.

At one of these events she bumped into another highly experienced umpired, who was also a member of the Table Tennis England Technical Official Committee, who inspired her and gave her the dream of umpiring at major events.

Although nervous, she was supported well by a local International Umpire, who guided her to National Level where she became eligible for Commonwealth Games selection and has subsequently been given a place to umpire.

"I like the big family atmosphere at an event and once I got the

idea of umpiring at Birmingham 2022 I gave it 100 per cent," says Sheila.

"My training has now taken me to Finland as well as many domestic events and I cannot wait to get to Birmingham this summer.

"Next up for me is my International Umpires exam in September and hopefully I will get selected for more major events in the future."

The process of diversifying and modernising the training process and kit for umpires shows if the right opportunities are presented to the right people, it can really be a catalyst for change.

By engaging younger and more diverse umpires to take part in the Commonwealth Games, the impact of them will hopefully trickle down to inspire the next generation and continue to build on this success . . . and at the 2022 Commonwealth Games ,there will be two 18-year-olds from England umpiring too!

TT Kidz: a way to increase the number of girls at your club

s part of the successful TT Kidz programme, Table Tennis England are looking to support clubs and leagues to develop girls-only TT Kidz sessions.

One club that took advantage of this in the autumn 2021 phase was Ormesby Table Tennis Club in Middlesbrough, with 16 girls signing up for the session.

The club's TT Kidz Lead Activator,
Malcolm Muldoon, who decided to run the
girls-only session, also ran a mixed session
and a boys-only session alongside this.
He recruited the children through local
schools, working closely with the teachers
and speaking directly to parents.

Before running a girls-only session, Malcolm had always delivered to this age group as a mixed group. He believes there is still value in this but the girls-only session had very clear benefits to the participants and the girls were more confident to interact, all of them getting involved in the activities with less reservation.

The TT Kidz programme focuses on being fun, engaging and inspiring which Malcolm believes is the way to keep the girls coming back

The girls improved very quickly and were all supportive of each other, in fact there was more of a cohesion amongst the group with even the best players wanting to help



the ones with less ability. Four months on, the session is still going strong, with 10 girls regularly attending.

Players from Ormesby previous TT Kidz phases have had some fantastic success in Table Tennis too:

 Four of the primary-aged girls have reached the Butterfly Schools Team National Final and one reached the Schools Individual National final, both to be held in Wolverhampton next month.

• Two of the now 12 year olds reached the county finals of the same school competition.

How your club or league can help to #LevelTheTable for women and girls

Know your target audience and ask them to help design your 'offer'

When planning your project, try and narrow down who you want to engage, perhaps focusing on a particular age group, standard or ability or maybe even a specific cultural group if you have the knowledge and personnel for this.

Ask them to help design your project by them telling you what the perfect session looks like for them.

Find the right session leaders and deliverers

It's really important that you have the right people to lead and support the sessions. Having the right qualifications is just a small part of what they need; do they also have the right personality and the right experience to deliver a session that is engaging and enjoyable for the audience? For women and girls, the most important thing to begin with is fun and friendship, so can the people leading the session create the right environment for this?

The session environment

Before hosting a session for women and girls, try to think of anything that lessen the enjoyment for them. For example, are there suitable changing facilities and usable, clean toilets that they can access? Are there other people using the facility and if so, does their behaviour need to be

modified to ensure that women and girls feel welcome and safe?

Language and marketing

The marketing of the session needs to reflect the group you want to engage - if your potential participants can't see themselves in your marketing, they simply will not see the session as something for them. Contact us to access our image library if you are struggling for the right photo for your marketing.

Ask for feedback

Once you have delivered your first session, ask people for feedback straight away. What did they enjoy, what didn't they enjoy, and, are they going to come back?


